## City Turned Down In Latest Request For Funds

On Monday the city commission learned that it had been turned down for a 701 fund application in which they had asked for over \$10,000 for a planning study. They indicated that they would apply again next year. They did hear the recommendations from Leslie Cripps on the administration of the HUD funds they will get for community development. For people expected to apply for either grants or loans to improve their property, there will be a required limitation of \$10,000 in personal assets which Cripps said was a usual figure.

The city received a letter of appreciation from Bertrand Township thanking Buchanan for its help with the fire calls and the use of Buchanan's landfill before the new one was established.

The city had asked for permission from the Department of Natural Resources to build a new Charles Court bridge. That department said a permit wasn't necessary but gave one anyway. The city voted to join the other

municipalities involved in the Landfill Authority to hire John Spelman as attorney to prosecute the Acme Disposal case.

Invoices of \$968.66 for engineering services on the Charles Court bridge, for \$318.63 for inspection of all the bridges and for \$388.35 for engineering services in the northeast area project were approved for payment to Cole Associates.

The commission appointed Dr. Robert French to the Bicentennial Committee and decided to ask one of the members of that group to meet with the city to further brief the commissioners on the activities planned.

Commissioner Wesner reported that people are cutting through the Catholic church property on their way to middle school. He also said that there was a great deal of trailbike activity through private property down Miller Street. During a discussion which followed, more police activity was urged. There was also discussion about the practice of allowing beer in the park during the summer softball games.

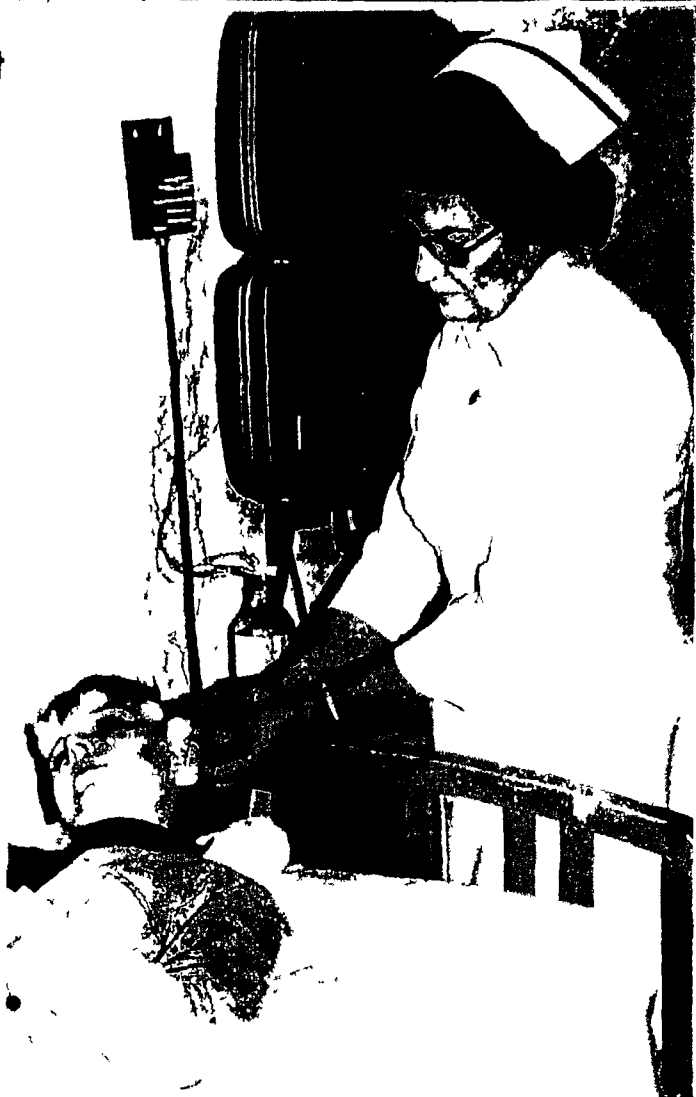
## New Equipment At Unity

Buchanan's Unity Hospital now has an electroencephalogram. This device can record and transmit the electric activity of the brain of a patient. Electrodes attached to the scalp transmit tracings to a center in Chicago by telephone. Results can be immediately analyzed and reported back to the hospital.

The staff of Unity underwent a training period in the use of the machine and the correct method of taking an EEG. This process can be helpful in clinical situations involving head injury, headaches, seizure disorders, tumor suspects, altered consciousness or meningitis or encephalitis.

The new system was first presented to the American Medical EEG Association in Galveston in 1971. Now one center is receiving five hundred EEGs a month from thirty one different hospitals.

Unity Hospital administrator Don Cioffi said that the addition of this service is another step in making the hospital more complete for the doctors and patients who use it.

## McKernan Sees Recovery In Axle Division

A recovery from the present decrease in schedules at Clark Equipment's Axle Division plant here is expected, but it will be a slow one, according to Leo J. McKernan, division vice president and general manager.

"We do not anticipate any significant improvement in the level of schedules between now and the end of the year," McKernan said. "While 1976 appears somewhat uncertain, I think we should see an increase in orders beginning during the first half."

A decline in schedules has been plaguing production at the facility which manufactures axles, axle housings, and a small line of hydraulic products. The rate of new orders has been down during the first half of the

year and a similar decline in backlog has been reflected in the reduced production schedules.

The substantially lower level of business has resulted in the Division, one of Clark's largest, laying off hourly and salaried employees.

The most recent lay off occurred last month when 100 employees were dropped from the Division's employment roll. The cutback brings to 695 the number of employees on lay off.

In a letter to all employees explaining the reasons for the lay off, McKernan said, "We may have additional, relatively small schedule cuts, but basically it appears we have hit bottom."

ment's drive, and Ruth Bromley at Gulton Electro-Voice. Ron Timmons and Steve Young will be in charge at Buchanan Steel, Thomas John at Pride Pattern, Jane Housand at Buchanan Metalform, Bob Bellare at Indiana and Michigan, Larry Gardner at Fapco, Joe White at White Welder, William Moon at H.S. Cover Co. John Montgomery is vice coordinator of the drive.

This year's drive will be launched in Buchanan on September 23.

## We Like Him

A lot has been written about the Mayor of Chicago. Most of it is unfavorable. But his record is one to be admired.

He's a politician. Not only does he win elections, but he has amassed enough power so that he can get things done. Everybody in Chicago owes him favors which he collects regularly, to the benefit of his city.

His is one of the largest cities in the country. With the usual amount of problems of a large metropolis, Chicago doesn't yet face the miserable financial plight of New York or San Francisco. The Mayor's purchasing agent is considered one of the best in the country. His police and fire departments are highly rated.

Although Chicago has one of the largest percentages of minority populations in the world, there has been relatively little in the way of unrest or riots. Although the Sears Tower, the John Hancock and the Standard Oil Building have been added to the skyline, at the same time the slum clearance and urban renewal programs, much with private capital, are recognized as major accomplishments.

There's a lot going on in Chicago. It is fast becoming the cultural center of the country. Its Mayor should be given a great deal of the credit. It is also an interesting fact that Chicago, of all the large cities on the Great Lakes, is doing less to pollute them with a sanitary system which is a model for the rest of the world.

During this economic recession, Chicago is doing a good job of taking care of its own. Its welfare system is one with less waste than many and has become a model of efficiency. Interestingly enough, Cook County's tax rates compare favorably with any area of dense population.

But there's one thing which really endears us to Dick Daley. He has the good judgement to make this part of Michigan his summer home.

## Three Nabbed In Drug Raid

Last Thursday, Buchanan police, in cooperation with the county, conducted a raid at 308 Main Street. They had to go through the procedure of obtaining a search warrant from the prosecutor which had to be signed by a judge in Niles.

They announced themselves before entering the house and could hear noise of people running around inside. For fear that the evidence might be destroyed, the police forced their entry into the house. They found Joel Bradley and Douglas Bowker of Buchanan and Milton Bristler of Galien. A large quantity of marijuana was found in various places throughout the house along with the equipment used for it.

The three were arraigned and released on \$50 bonds charged with possession of marijuana. Buchanan officer Ernest Foster, Metro Narcotics officer Lt. Drach and county deputy Larry Casto along with patrolman Jim Ellis participated in the raid.

The house on Main Street had been purchased by a man from out of town who has rented it to a variety of people. The police had been made aware of the situation by several complaints where various people were accused of disturbing the peace.

Flint (February 11, 1937) The 44 day old sit-down strike by the United Auto Workers against General Motors ended here today.

An agreement was signed in Detroit earlier today. Provisions of the agreement include recognition of the UAW as a bargaining agent for its members for at least six months, a commitment to begin collective bargaining talks February 16, and the ending of the strike with evacuation of the occupied plants.

Union workers held the plants for forty-four days. The strike was relatively peaceful with only one incident of violence between police and strikers in mid-January.

Union leaders hailed the agreement as a "vital victory" for the union.

Wyndham Mortimer, First Vice President of the UAW said, "Our key demand was for recognition of the UAW as the sole bargaining agent for its members. In effect, we have this guarantee for six months."

He praised Governor Frank Murphy. "The Governor was under tremendous pressure. He was being attacked from many sides, but he knew that the time had come for a change in employer-employee relations," Mortimer said.

The sit-down strike only actually involved only about 2000 workers, but at the peak of the walkout over 100,000 General Motors workers were idled. Most of them awaiting parts from striking plants.

### At The Library

The Stonewall Brigade  
By Frank Slaughter

This author has been around a long time and always comes up with a good historical novel. This particular one has an interesting subject.

Stonewall Jackson was one of the most popular military leaders of the Confederacy. He had been a professor at V.M.I., and his background was evident in the way he planned his strategy. He was also a deeply religious man and his knowledge of the Bible was used in war.

The book takes us through some of the major battles of the Civil War. It is presented from the point of view of the south, and a reader may wonder how the north ever was ultimately successful.

This book could be highly recommended for young people. The sex is at a minimum, and it's a good example of how a novel can be written without unnecessary filth.

The Glory and the Dream  
By William Manchester

This is a ponderous book about the times since Franklin D. Roosevelt up to Nixon. It tells us nothing we didn't already know, but refreshes our memory on many of the events of the past forty years.

Throughout the book there are little biographies of people who gained prominence during these times. One such is on Walter Reuther. There are more pages given to Roosevelt's funeral than there are to his fourth term.

Manchester writes well, borrowing all his material from accounts of people who were present at certain events. There are some minor inaccuracies, which don't get in the way of the whole narrative.

This would be a worthwhile book for younger people studying the history of this country since 1932. As it goes along, it tells what movies we were seeing, what songs were popular and what were the latest fads. It even mentions the Dow-Jones averages from time to time, which give an interesting story in themselves.

### Guidance Notes From B.H.S.

Students at Buchanan High School who are planning to go on to school after graduation will have five opportunities to take the Test Section of the ACT Assessment Program during the 1975-76 school year.

The first of five national test dates on which the ACT Assessment tests will be offered is Saturday morning, October 18. Students planning to take the exam on that date must have registered by September 22, it was announced by John A. Dick, counselor.

Mr. Dick also emphasized that the October 18 test date is the last opportunity seniors will have to qualify for a state of Michigan Competitive Scholarship. The State of Michigan uses the ACT results to determine eligibility for financial awards for those students entering college in the fall of 1976.

Announced also was the complete schedule of 1975-76 national test dates for the ACT Assessment Program. The dates (with registration periods in parentheses) are:

October 18, 1975 (Aug. 18 - Sept. 22), December 13, 1975 (Oct. 20 - Nov. 17), February 14, 1976 (Dec. 15 - Jan. 19), April 10, 1976 (Feb. 16 - March 15), June 12, 1976 (April 12 - May 17).

On those national test dates it takes students about three hours to complete the four standardized exams that make up the Test Section. Another important section of the ACT Assessment Program is a two part questionnaire that is completed by students at home as part of the registration process.

Information reports resulting from the test and questionnaire sections are sent to the students and their high school counselors, as well as to colleges designated by the students.

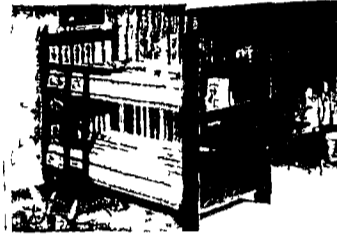

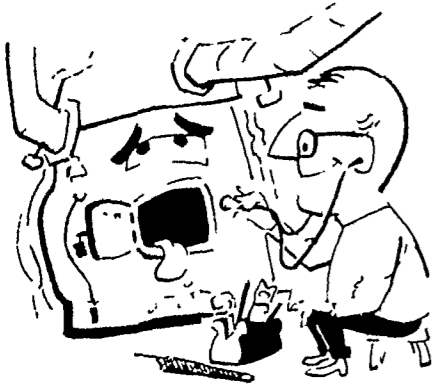

A school bus driver for six years, she won second place recently in the Berrien, Cass, Van Buren Bus Driving Roadshow at Berrien Springs and received the trophy she is holding. Mrs. Gradeless took part in the event following the yearly training session all Buchanan bus drivers attend, competing against 41 other drivers for a total of 287 points out of a possible 350. More about the training program is told in an accompanying article.

### Training Makes Good Bus Drivers

The chances are good very few Buchanan residents are aware what a fine school bus system Buchanan has. Standards are high in Michigan and particularly so in Buchanan where high value is placed on the safety of school youngsters.

Each bus driver in the state is required to take a two-day summer training program, or if that is not possible, a four-night makeup session after school starts. Upon completion of the program the drivers receive a

certificate good for three years, and each school bus driver in the state must hold a valid certificate.

In the local school system, where the bus transportation is directed by Paul Spaulding, it is asked that all sixteen drivers take the course each year.

Mrs. Marjorie Gradeless, pictured here with a trophy she received at an event following the recent course, feels this is an excellent idea, and that much new information is learned each year in the program which constantly updates techniques for maintaining bus safety in a myriad of situations and road conditions. It also enables drivers to keep absolutely current on new rules and regulations.

The program, given by Public Transportation System, under the sponsorship of Eastern Michigan University and Western Michigan University, is unique in the U.S.A. Many other states are now learning of Michigan's fine record of school bus safety and are seeking help in starting one for their own drivers. Requests for such help have come from as far as Hawaii where PTS is scheduled to send a representative in the near future.

Another example of the program's thoroughness is the sending of someone to any location in the nation where a fatal accident involving a school bus occurs. The causes are studied and everything possible learned to help protect Michigan children from such a misfortune.

In addition to the PTS course, all school drivers in Michigan must take a written exam and driving test each year. It is no accident that this state has an exceptional record. Buchanan's own record is excellent and the school system is doing its best to see that it continues. Mr. Spaulding feels fortunate in his roster of high quality drivers, all women, most of whom have been driving buses for a number of years, the longest period of service being from 1956.

### What To Do When Your Freezer Stops

Suppose electric service to your home is cut off during a storm. Lights go off, you can't cook on your electric range, your kids are going through TV withdrawal and maybe worst of all, your well-stocked home freezer stops running.

Visions of spoiled food flit through your mind: the beef you bought on special, the fruit you picked, the produce from your garden, the perch Dad brought back from up north, those extra batches of chili, spaghetti sauce and vegetable soup - all lost!

"Don't panic," advises Anita Dean, Extension Foods and Nutrition Specialist at Michigan State University. "The food may not spoil."

How long the freezer has been off when you discover it and how long it will stay off are important.

"If the freezer breaks down just after you leave for a two-week vacation, there's not much hope," the specialist declares. "The food is bound to have spoiled by the time you return."

On the other hand, if you are home when the freezer stops, you can take steps to save the food inside.

"The first thing to do is to keep the freezer door closed," Mrs. Dean advises. "Next, see if you can find out why the freezer stopped and how long it will be off. If a power outage is the problem and it will last only a few hours, leave the freezer closed and the food inside. A fully loaded, insulated freezer of thoroughly frozen food will stay cold enough to keep food from spoiling up to two days. A freezer less than half-full, however, will not keep food for more than a day."

If the freezer itself is on the blink or power will be out indefinitely, your best bet is to move the food, wrapped in a thick blanket of newspapers and packed into boxes, to a nearby commercial food locker plant.

"The next best option is to use dry ice to keep your freezer cold," Mrs. Dean suggests. "In a half-full, 10-cubic-foot freezer, for instance, 25 pounds of dry ice will keep the temperature below freezing for two to three days. Food in a fully loaded freezer would last even longer if the dry ice goes in soon after the freezer goes off."

Don't put the dry ice directly on the food packages, she cautions, because the extreme cold may cause the food to dry out. Protect the packages by putting a piece of cardboard between them and the ice.

Insulating your freezer by surrounding it with crumpled newspapers covered with blankets or quilts will help it stay cold longer, she notes. Be sure to leave the back of the freezer uncovered, she warns, so that the unit will be properly ventilated if the power comes on unexpectedly.

"Don't wait until the problem arises to check around for food lockers or sources of dry ice," Mrs. Dean advises. "Make a few phone calls before an emergency occurs so you can make the best use of the time you have to work with when the freezer stops."

## Bucks Ready To Face Niles Friday

The 1975-1976 Buchanan Buck football squad opens its season this Friday with a home contest against traditional rival Niles. Kickoff time is set at 7:30 p.m. The Bucks, coached by former Buchanan football star Dave Shoemaker, lost to the Vikings 13-12 in overtime in last year's opener. Niles has beaten Buchanan eight consecutive times, and will be favored this year. However, Coach Shoemaker has been working hard to continue the progress that he has made in rebuilding the Buck football fortunes, and an upset in this series is always a very real possibility.

From a 2-7 record two years ago in his first season, Coach Shoemaker has brought the Bucks back to respectability in just one year. Last year, with a couple of breaks, Shoemaker's force, who finished at 4-5, could have been 7-2, or even 8-1. There is hope that this year, with some better luck, that improvement will continue.

This year's Buck offense will probably be directed by Bryan Virgil at quarterback. Virgil, who started at split end last year, has made the switch to quarterback smoothly. Contesting Virgil for the job is senior Barry Manley. Manley had been considered to be the better passer, but Virgil's arm looked very good in Saturday's scrimmage.

The Buchanan running attack will again be led by all-conference running back Willie Brown. Brown, who was voted the most valuable player by his teammates last year, broke the school rushing record, while leading the team in scoring and rushing average. At this time, it appears that the other two running backs will be Joe Kyles and Gino Jackson. Kyles, a junior, averaged better than 5 yards a carry last year, is at wingback, while Jackson, a hard runner, and probably the best blocker of the three, is at fullback. Still battling Jackson at fullback are juniors Kent Cooper and Eddie Smith. Backing up Kyles and Brown will be two more juniors, Rick Layher and Chuck Heiney. Heiney sprained his wrist in the scrimmage Saturday and will be out for two weeks.

Opening the holes for these backs will be a strong offensive line. This year's line will be anchored by two veteran tackles, Richard Sanford and John Donley. Sanford and "JD" were both voted second team all-conference last year. Also at tackle are Benny Cramer, Mark Schwartz, and Tim Mitchell. Both Schwartz and Cramer have the needed size, but lack varsity experience, while Mitchell is capable of helping at either guard or tackle. At one starting guard will be Bart Vergon. At the other, Aaron Nelson seems to be the probable starter, although Steve Rifenberg still has a shot at starting. Larry Granger is expected to start at center, although Chuck Dougherty is still in the picture. At tight end will be Robert Luke, a sometimes starter last year. Backing him up are Rick Swem and Mike Byrum, both juniors. At split end, Kevin Vanderbush, out for his first year, has the

edge over Bob Fischer, also playing for the first time. Sophomore Greg Frazier, Junior Jim Bissel, and Junior John Perrin are all gaining experience with the junior varsity, but each of them is expected to help the varsity before the season is too far along.

The defensive team will be similar to the offensive with these players leading at their positions. Donley and Jackson at defensive ends, Sanford and Vergon at defensive tackles, Nelson at middle guard, Virgil and Granger at linebackers; and Brown, Kyles, Manley, and Luke at defensive backs.

The kicking game at Buchanan will be very strong this year. Bryan Virgil is considered by many to be the best place-kicker in Southwestern Michigan. He will also punt for the Bucks.

A scrimmage with Berrien Springs and Three Rivers last Saturday gave Shoemaker a chance to better evaluate his team. Although he was "satisfied with the skill positions," he felt that work was needed in some phases of the game. "We weren't sustaining our blocks on offense, and we weren't doing any downfield blocking at all," commented Shoemaker. However, he was satisfied with the overall defense, citing Jackson, Luke, Nelson, Sanford and Donley as "hitting well."

Although the scoring in a scrimmage is sometimes deceiving, Buchanan did outscore Berrien Springs two touchdowns to one, while playing to a scoreless tie with Three Rivers.

An added attraction for this year's football season will be a state playoff, the first one in modern Michigan football history. One team from each of the four classes (A, B, C, D) will be chosen from the four sections of the state, to participate in the post-season action. A point system has been developed for choosing the representative. Even though the senior student enrollment at the high school will almost certainly make Buchanan a Class C school, the football team will have to qualify in Class B, since the change isn't official until January 1.

## National Motocross Event To Be Here

On October 19, Red Bud Track and Trail will host an event which will attract people from all over the country. It is the Trans-AMA International Motocross-500cc International Class and 250 cc Support Class for Americans only. It is the fourth event of a 10 race series which annually attracts the world's best motocross racers.

Awards for this event will total \$18,350 including purse and contingency award.

The day at Red Bud Track and Trail will include two motos (heats) in both 500cc International Class and 250cc Support Class. The International motos will be 40 minutes in duration plus two laps, and the Support Class motos will be 30 minutes long plus two laps.

The Trans-AMA scoring will be the Olympic system, and the top 20 finishers will receive points toward their titles.

The Trans-AMA International motocross series was started in 1970 primarily to generate more interest in the sport of motocross in America. No American rider has ever won the championship. Only Jim Weinert of Laguna Beach, California, has ever won a race within the series. Gene Ritchie of Track and Trail predicted that it's just a matter of time before an American cracks this European domination. He said that most of the best riders in the country will be in Buchanan to try to add to their points.

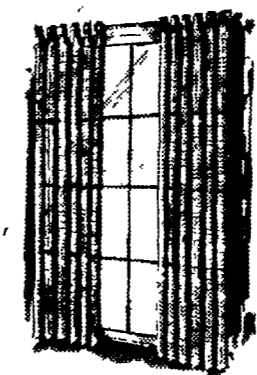

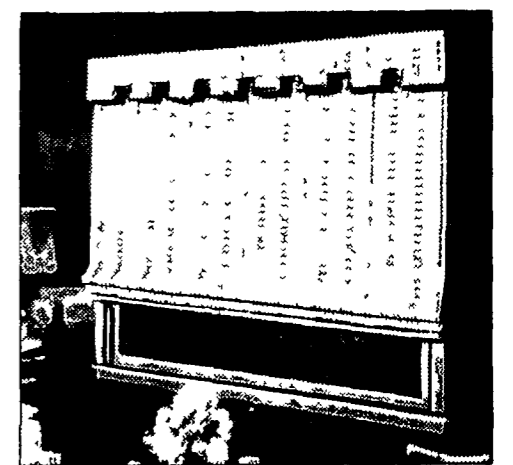

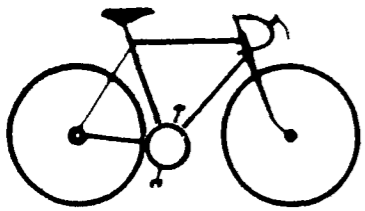

The meeting house is the first stop followed by a leisurely walk to the office building and pole barn, and then down the hill for a visit to the craft cabin and pottery studio. At each point visitors will be able to view live demonstrations as well as projects completed during the past Fernwood season of classes.

Exhibits and demonstrations will be in the following locations at Fernwood:

In the Meeting House lecture room - an exhibit of photographs by the Fernwood Photographers, Spinning, Weaving, Stitchery, Rug Hooking and Quilting in the Library of the meeting house - Cornhusk Flowers, Basic Design and Flower Drying - exhibit only.

Office Building - Basketry, Bonsai, Whittling and Leaded Glass.

Craft Cabin - Silk Screen, Silver Jewelry, Batik and Copper Enameling.

Pole Barn - Sculpture, Sand-casting and Lapidary.  
Pottery Studio - Raku firing, Pottery, Natural Dyes and Fernwood Potters' Guild sales gallery.

Ron Eversole will be a special guest Saturday afternoon to demonstrate whittling. His whimsical creations and Appalachian toys will be on display and for sale. A whittling class has been taught several times at Fernwood. His wife, Nancy Eversole, the Kentucky Woman, will be present Sunday afternoon with her dulcimer, redoing the old ballads she discussed in her music workshop last month here.

Three special areas will make examples of the many crafts demonstrated available to purchase. The Fernwood Potters' Guild will have handmade pottery and raku available as gift items at the Pottery Studio with the proceeds to go toward a remodeling project of the studio. The Fernwood Nature Photographers will have numerous still-life and landscape photograph prints available for sale at the Meeting House, and the Fernwood Gift Shop will house the largest cross-section of handcrafted gift items.

Fernwood members may attend this last of the season's special events without charge, but a small admission fee for non-member visitors will be charged. Everyone is welcome to come. Transportation between areas will be provided for

the handicapped or those unable to walk.

On Tuesday, September 16, the Natural Dye class begins at 9:30 a.m. for a week of conjuring up bright colored liquids in which to dye their yarns. From margolds to elderberries come the soft earthtone colors of natural dyeing, an age old process now being revived as a popular craft. Home-spun yarns are available to the class. Over 50 samples of one ounce skeins of yarns are usually dyed.

The class is taught by Beth Pennington, a "dyed in the wool" teacher from the University of Michigan and guest teacher for the Henry Ford Foundation at Greenfield Village. She has taught adult education classes of many revived old crafts including handspun soap, colonial candlemaking, and spinning in addition to dyeing. Beth and her husband, David, have their own collection of American spinning wheels and A Pictorial Guide to American Spinning Wheels by David Pennington and Michael Taylor has recently been published.

Class members will begin their adventure into the past with the winding and tying of yarn into small skeins, followed by mordanting to prepare it for dyeing. Natural materials such as nuts, barks, berries, flowers and leaves are then prepared in large kettles and cooked over wood fires until the right shade of color is reached. The prepared yarn is dipped and stirred until each person is satisfied with his results and the skeins are hung among the trees to dry. By the end of the week, the woods are strung with a clothesline of yellow, gold, tan, brown, green, blue and red yarns, a sight one has to see to believe. Everyone will have a chance to do just that. Natural Dyes class members will once again leave their yarns for all to see during Arts and Crafts in Action.


