To Hold Hearing March 22 On East Front Rezoning

Contract For Days-Portage Storm Sewer Let To Elkhart Company

The city commission set March 22 as the date for a public hearing on the rezoning for Lots 11 to 17 in Barton Acres on East Front street east of the Poorman Recreation property. Frank Babano, owner, has requested rezoning from Residence to Business A. The request is made on the basis that when rezoning the area to Business B was refused it was stated that there would be no objection to making it Business A, limited to retail stores according to specifications of the zoning ordinance.

The Elkhart Excavating company was awarded the contract for installation of the Days-Portage storm sewer system. It is expected that the work will start in April. The contract provides that deductions shall be made on the contract cost for all damaged sidewalks, curbs and gutters and drive-ways, also open excavation, in which case the city will repair the damages. The bid of the Elkhart company was \$4,771.75.

The commission set April 26 as the date for a public hearing on the necessity for a sanitary sewer system for both Arctic and Fulton streets. Twenty-eight lots are involved and assessments would approximate \$110 per lot. Taps to the property lines, if laid at the time the sewer is installed would average about \$35.

The Commission authorized refunds totaling \$450.02 to owners of lots in Paden Park of record on March 15, 1954, on the city tax rolls. The total job cost 6 1/2 per cent less than the city estimate. The over-charge costs will be refunded on a pro-rata basis.

Arrangements were made for a public hearing on May 8 on the installation of curbs and gutters on Chicago street between Detroit and Terre Coupe.

The commission approved a grant of permission to the Bertrand Fire Department to sponsor a one-day stop on May 14 by the Mills Bros circus in old Athletic field, on condition that the township also received the assent of the Buchanan Business Association. Buchanan Steel and Hubbard Tool and Gage.

Bucks Nip Vikes, Go To Regional

Is First Buchanan Class B Team To Win District Tournament Title

The Bucks drew East Grand Rapids for the opening game of the regional at Kalamazoo Wednesday night (March 11). East Grand Rapids defeated Grand Rapids Goodwin in that district. The East Grand Rapids team were Michigan Class B champions four years ago.

Buchanan won from Niles in the district finals at Eau Claire Friday night, by a score of 42-37.

It was a thriller for the books. A footrace is never very exciting when one runner leads all the way—it's when a runner comes from behind and wins with a finish kick that the grandstands get their money's worth. Niles led at the end of every quarter in the game except the last, which told the story.

The first quarter ended 9 to 8 for Niles, and was a slow period marked by defensive play. Buchanan got the ball first, got no where, and Niles took over with the same fate. The play was slow with Anderson for Buchanan and Neesley for Niles leading with 4 points each.

The tempo accelerated at the start of the second. Anderson scored first but neither team maintained a lead. A margin of points from free throws, Niles scoring four to Buchanan's one gave the Vikings a 21-19 lead at the half.

The third quarter opened and Niles started pulling away from the Bucks. Maddox and Scott each made a basket. Two free throws were then made and Niles then had an eight point lead. The score was 27-19. The Bucks hadn't made a point. Jim Letcher then went to the bench with four fouls. After 2 minutes the Bucks began to go. Gordie Smith made two baskets, Neesley of Niles made one and then Ralph Anderson made one. The quarter ended 29-26 Niles G. Smith had 4 points and Marazita had 5 points for Niles.

The fourth quarter got underway and the Bucks didn't waste time. Anderson quickly put one in and then the Bucks made three more baskets. During this period Neesley, Maddox and Teutz went out with 4 fouls each and the Bucks made 5 free throws. Buchanan had taken the lead and had command of the game. After a few minutes of stalling, the game ended, Buchanan 42, Niles 37. Ralph Anderson and Jim Letcher had 16 and 13 points each and Scott had 12 for Niles.

This was the first time in history that Buchanan won a district tournament in Class B. Lets follow the Bucks to Kalamazoo and the regionals.

Posse Finds Dog Who Bit Center Buck Cage Team

Physician States Frustrated Romance, Not Rabies, Is Cause Of Bite

Consternation prevailed in Buchanan over the week-end when it was learned that Jim Letcher, son of Mrs. Thessie Letcher, 206 Clark street, had been bitten by a dog, owner unknown. Jim is the center on the Bucks championship basketball team.

The event occurred at 7:45 Friday morning, just as Jim and John were ready to go to school. The Letcher pet female dog had escaped from the home and a small white Spitz was with her on the premises. When the boys tried to drive the Spitz away, the Spitz bit his left hand, breaking the skin but not drawing blood.

Jim's hand was bandaged at home and he went to school. He also played (like mad, they say) in the game with Niles that night. After arriving at school he was sent to a physician. The Spitz had meanwhile disappeared and it was necessary to find it to determine any danger of rabies infection. In that event Joe would have had a wave of shots which might have prevented him from playing in the Kalamazoo tournament.

Sunday afternoon a large posse of about 50 men and boys set out in a systematic search, locating the dog as the possession of a family on Maple Court. It was there found that the dog had had regular shots, and the physician stated that Jim would not have to take the shots, since the inoculation of the dog had been established. The posers were made up of members of the Buchanan Lions, men teachers, and a number of high school boys. The leaders were Pierre Bailey and Chief Krugh.

Some anticipation had meanwhile been aroused that opposing team members at Kalamazoo might not have guarded Jim too closely if the doctor's verdict had indicated possibility of rabies. The police, as a matter of caution, are checking the dog regularly in its home for a week.

John M. Hittle, Local Resident 40 years, Dies

John M. Hittle, a resident of the Buchanan district most of his adult life, and an employee of the Buchanan plant of the Clark Equipment company since Feb. 27, 1918, except for time out in the army in World War I, died at his home at 503 Berrien street at 4:45 a.m. Friday, March 5, 1954, the cause being a sudden heart attack.

For a number of years, in the 1930s, he was very active in promoting baseball teams, managing two successive teams, the Buchanan Grays and the Buchanan Arrows. At the same time, Bob Reamer, who took Fred Mead's Buchanan Blues over about 1930, organized the Buchanan Merchants and the two teams in the same town were keen rivals.

Mr. Hittle served in the U.S. army during the latter part of World War I, spending some time overseas in Europe. After his return he became a member of the Ralph Rumbaugh post of the American Legion, in which he was quite active in past years.

He is survived by his wife, by his stepmother, Mrs. Lavina Hittle, by a daughter, Mrs. William Mammion of Buchanan; by two sons, Harold of Niles and Robert of Buchanan, by a stepdaughter, Ardell Reamer, a stepson, Fred Reamer of Buchanan, four sisters, Mrs. Clem Burger of Osceola, Ind., Mrs. Alice Allen and Mrs. Carl Duns of Buchanan, Mrs. Von Weaver of Grayling, Mich., three brothers, Joe, Amos and David of Buchanan, by six grandchildren.

Funeral rites were held at the Swem Funeral home at 2 p.m. yesterday (Wednesday) with the Rev. W. D. Ruff in charge. Burial was in Oak Ridge cemetery with military rites by the American Legion at the grave-side.

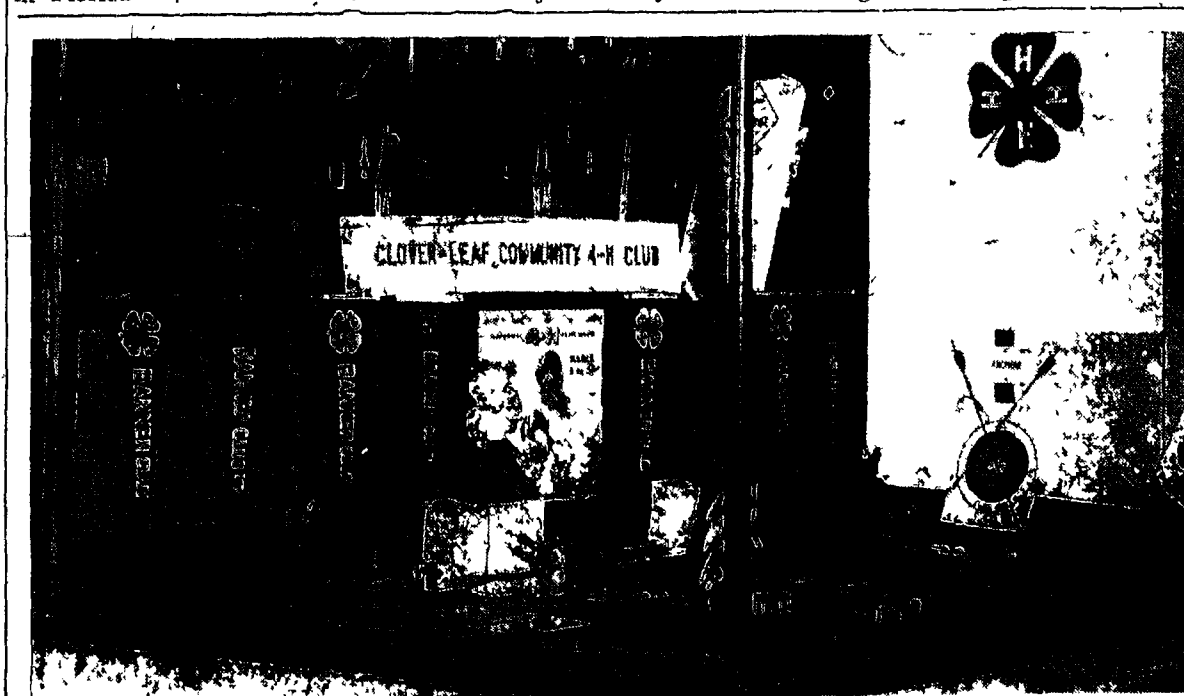

Probe Possibility Of Local Economic Development Committee

The Buchanan Business Association held its March meeting at the M & M restaurant Tuesday evening with 34 present.

A main topic discussed was the idea of assistance in some way for the retention of the smaller industries in Buchanan, adding them to find suitable locations within Buchanan, where they may be legally operated in conformity with the city zoning ordinance.

A second main consideration was the possibility of organizing an Economic Development Committee for the promotion of such enterprises and others which may wish to locate here in the future. It was proposed that a committee be named to represent the financial interest, present industries, merchants—Buchanan Co-ops, attorneys, medical men, local schools, auto agencies, the present city government, the press and other interests in such development.

The Association voted approval for granting the Berrien Fire Department permission to sponsor the appearance of the Mills Brothers Circus on public ground in Buchanan May 19. Francis Mitch attended as the representative of the Jaycees and asked for and secured the assurance of support in financing the selection of the Buchanan candidate for the 1954 Blossom Queen.

8 Tell Stand On Present Form City Government

Commission-Manager Form Endorsed By 4; Opposed By 2; 2 Noncommittal

The Record has been asked to canvass the eight candidates for the city commission who had taken out petitions as of Tuesday this week, to determine their attitude toward the continuation of the present commission-manager form. They stated that, in their opinion, that is the important issue before the voters, and that they feel that the voters have a right to know. A canvass was made and the following expressions secured from the candidates, given in alphabetical order.

Grey Best—"I have made up my mind in favor of the present commission-manager form of government. Of course there may be arguments for and against. But I think that we have had sufficient evidence to prove that the city is profiting from that form."

Deming—"I am 100 per cent for the commission-manager form of government. It is the most efficient and most economical way to handle city business. I think that I am qualified to speak, because I have served under both forms. Anyone who will study the city records carefully will be convinced that we have saved money by the adoption of the commission-manager form. I believe I can prove it to anyone who will listen."

John Giver—"I think that Buchanan is not large enough for a city manager. The money that is paid to him for his salary could be used elsewhere to better the city. As it is the city government of Buchanan is too much of a one-man show. I am for the form of government that is best for the business man, and now they are not giving a chance. I secured an option on a lot on East Front street, where I wanted to put up a building for my business, but the city refused to rezone it for business."

Edgbert Helms—"The commission-manager form is probably a good thing, if we had the right man at the head of it. The system as it now operates is a one-man form of government. It gives one man too much power."

Carleton Money—"I am for the form of government for the city that we now have, and I am for a city manager. I think that it is the logical and the most economical form for efficient city government."

William Morgenthau—"I am noncommittal at the present time. I am not sufficiently informed on city government to express an opinion, because I have never served on the commission. I served on the Buchanan school board and I consequently know about that branch. But I will enter the city government if elected and will form an opinion when I have sufficient knowledge from experience."

Sam Rouse—"I am not for or against the commission-manager form. As I look at it now I see nothing against it. I am very definitely not a member of any group or party who wish to abolish it. If elected I will enter the commission with no prejudice and no grievances, and will form an opinion then."

Goldwyn Smith—"I am for the commission-manager form. 100 per cent. To abolish it now would certainly be a step backward to horse-and-buggy methods. I am so wholeheartedly convinced that our present form is the right one that I do not now see how I could serve under the previous form if re-elected. My opinions are definite because I have served the city under both types of government."

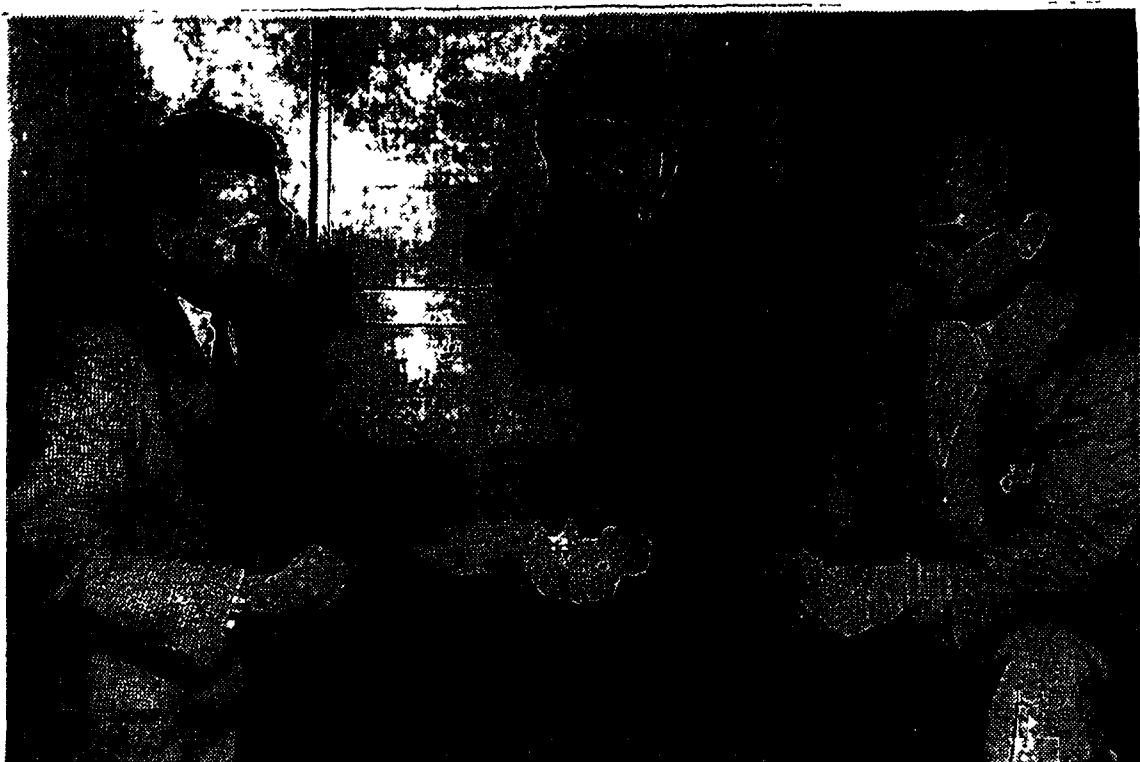
