Six Buchanan Cars Are Taken in Two Days

In a period of two days, six cars were stolen in the Buchanan area. A 13-year-old boy admitted to taking five of them.

It all started at 4 p.m. on January 13 when a Volkswagen was seen being driven out of Habicht Ford's lot. At 5 p.m. on that evening, Ray Locklear reported that his car had been taken from in front of his house at 121 S. Detroit. At 6:33 that car was discovered at Habicht's lot where the Volkswagen had been.

At 7:20, Theodore Houtaling reported that his Volkswagen had been taken from in front of his house at 110 S. Detroit. In the meantime, the first Volkswagen had been found abandoned at Smith Street near the entrance of Centennial Park. It was out of gas.

At 5 p.m. on January 15, Karen Harner's car was taken from the city lot near the Inter-City Bank. It was later discovered that a Buick had been taken from the Riverside Mobile Home Court.

Later, Richard Rossow observed a car in front of his house and people attempting to get gas from his private pump. He followed the car and came upon it where it had hit a utility pole.

on Fulton Street. Two suspects were seen fleeing this accident and the crash had caused a power failure to that section of town. The car turned out to be Mrs. Harner's.

Then the boy broke into Habicht Ford's and took keys from Bill Holsapple's office and took a Pinto wagon from the lot. At 4 a.m., Buchanan police observed this car going north on Redbud Trail at 40 miles per hour in a 25-mile zone. The car turned into Habicht's lot where the driver apparently observed the following patrol car and pulled out at a high rate of speed. The state police finally forced the car to a stop at Redbud and Avery Road.

The boy was arrested and questioned by the Buchanan police. He said that when he hit the pole with the Harner car, a wire fell down over the car causing sparks. He said that he had attempted to take another car at one point, but had been unable to start it.

He was questioned in the presence of his mother, who refused to accept custody, so he was taken to Juvenile Home.

The Bloodmobile has been scheduled at short notice partially because of a cancellation, and also because the need for blood at this time is urgent.

We are, therefore, asking everyone to take a few moments and donate the necessary pint of blood which could mean the difference between life and death for any one of us.

The Varsity B Club of Buchanan High School, under the direction of Larry Robinson, will be participating in the community project. 17-year-olds may donate with the permission of their parents. The permission slips may be obtained from Mr. Robinson, or at the Bloodmobile site.

Two new local doctors, Jack Barden and Don Brogan, have agreed to donate their time and will be present at the Bloodmobile the entire time of its operation.

Anyone in good health between the age of 17 and 65 is urged to donate a pint of blood in order to make the goal of 75 units for the day. An individual may give blood every 56 days, therefore giving at this time will not interfere with the next scheduled visit to the Buchanan area in May.

Here's Our Chance

A young businessman recently moved to Buchanan. His reaction is that he's never seen such an apathetic community. That may not be completely fair, because apathy seems to prevail everywhere.

At a recent meeting, considered important by most of those present, a man left because he didn't want to miss the Waltons on television. He's rather typical because he'd prefer to absorb the creative work of somebody else rather than to offer any input of his own into something which can proceed without him.

Churches have noted this apathy. Congregations today are difficult to stimulate. The service clubs complain of sagging attendance. Even the local unions have trouble getting people to come to a meeting.

People will not fail to make their weekly bowling date. Many won't miss certain nights of television. This is apparently happening all over. But it's hard to generate any direct action of a positive nature from Buchanan's citizenry. It's easier to stir up interest against something rather than for it.

Citizens will have a chance to help in a big decision if they can shake off their apathy long enough. They will be given the opportunity for their voices to be heard.

On February 3, the city has invited everybody to a meeting. They have a chance to gain a considerable amount of money from the federal government and must have some idea for what use this money would go. They are asking all of us for advice.

What does Buchanan need most? If it is given large quantities of federal funds, where best should those funds go? Ideas, no matter how impractical, will be welcome. Out of somebody's suggestion may come a big development for Buchanan, just at the time when Buchanan needs another shot in the arm.

So think about it and let your ideas be known. There may never come another better chance to participate in some top-grade thinking and planning.

School Board Won't Encourage Early Graduation

The regular secretary and the treasurer of the board of education were absent Monday, so Gerald Moulds acted as secretary and William Moon as treasurer.

The board received communication from the Buchanan Education Association stating that they wanted to get started on negotiations and would like to meet for a preliminary exchange on February 3. The board will appoint its representatives.

Vernon Lubben was appointed delegate and William Moon alternate to represent Buchanan at a meeting February 26 when the Berrien County Intermediate School District will present its budget.

There has been much discussion about changing graduation requirements to allow certain students to finish in less than eight semesters. The board adopted a change in the policy stating that the normal duration of high school will be four years, although exceptions may be granted by the board of education after review by a special committee. They insisted, however, that completion of the full eight semesters should be encouraged. Jeanette Mahan was appointed to the committee which will be reviewing cases of early graduation.

The traffic around the new middle school still poses a problem. The situation is made difficult because of the lack of sidewalks. A meeting will be proposed between members of the school board and the city commission to discuss long-range plans for traffic control in that area. In the meantime, there is a shuttle bus operating between the high school and the middle school. It was decided that those in her neighborhood could board Lucy Hubbard's bus at her home and ride it rather than going to the high school to catch the shuttle.

To accompany an application for a grant from the state, the board passed a resolution of support for programs for the academically talented. Classes for such students are now being conducted at Fernwood.

The official approval by the board of the athletic code of conduct approved by the coaches brought a statement from Robert Luke urging consideration of an athletic board of control, similar to the one which Niles has. He said that he anticipates future complications in such matters as discipline and from outside athletic activities which are using the school property.

A large class of adult education graduates were certified including Robbe Anderson, Angelina Marie Bailey, Richard Bromley, Bobby Capps, Sharon Chase, Rickey English, Joan

Gobble, Constance Kelly, Tom Tate, Amelia Miler, Sharon Mullins, Robert Nichols and Linnee Jo Wade.

From three bids for bus chassis, the board finally accepted that of Kennedy Motors for \$28,942.50 for three GMC chassis. There were three bids for the bus bodies, and the one from Great Lakes Coach Sales for three Bluebird buses at \$22,035 with a trade in of \$5,800 for a net of \$16,235 was accepted.

Ellis May gave a report on the special education program. He said there are currently 7 teachers, counting two consultants and two aides with approval for another aide. He said that there is now considerable work in the field of psychological evaluation to determine a student's need. Special current projects include a study committee for the evaluation and a series of parent seminars, the first of which was Monday. He said there is concern for a self-contained classroom for certain types of students and there is need for pre-school screening of students who may have special needs. He said that there are now 134 special students with varying needs including 75 from Buchanan and Galien who are receiving speech help.

Ms. Bonnie Harris, a psychologist from the Intermediate School District reported on the emotionally impaired student. She said there is a need for self-contained rooms for these students with a class maximum of ten with a teacher and an aide. She said that no therapy is involved in this program, but that the job is purely to educate these students in a more conducive environment away from disrupting regular classes. Apparently Buchanan now has three or four such students who are being sent to the program for them in River Valley.

LaSalle Sees 1975 As A Challenge

At their annual meeting Tuesday, chairman of the board Robert F. Koenigshof gave the 65th annual report of the LaSalle Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Koenigshof said that the year 1974 had provided many challenges for management which was plagued by the energy crisis, inflation, recession and government entrance into competition for the saver's dollar. In the early months, economists had predicted that the flow of funds into banks and savings and loan associations would far exceed the demand and that interest rates would gradually decrease, but competition for money became keen, the prime rate rose to unprecedented heights and treasury bill rates also rose. This led to high mortgage rates and a limited supply of money for home financing. Koenigshof said that many financial institutions "suffered high losses in savings, but LaSalle Federal, while not achieving records, still had a satisfactory year.

From an earnings point of view, LaSalle Federal ended the year with their best record. Assets increased from \$38,746,000 to \$40,888,000 for a gain of 5.28 percent. Mortgages, land contracts, etc. increased from \$34,823,000 to \$37,400,000 for a gain of 7.45 percent, and savings increased from \$34,903,000 to \$36,759,000, a gain of 5.31 percent.

Koenigshof predicted that 1975 will be a challenging year, although not a banner one. He said that neither should it be a disaster. He expressed the hope that by mid-year, the escalation in the cost of money will diminish, and yield spreads will improve.

Koenigshof reported on the new addition to LaSalle's building.

Clark To Build Another Plant In N.C.

Clark Equipment Company announces that its Construction Machinery Division, Benton Harbor, will build a 309,000-sq-ft manufacturing plant near Asheville, North Carolina.

The division will fabricate and assemble 1- to 2 1/2 cu yd tractor shovels at the new plant, which is scheduled for completion in 1976. The manufacturing facility will consist of fabrication and assembly plants covering 300,000 sq ft. and a 9,000-sq-ft office building.

Currently, Clark builds its line of 1- to 2 1/2 cu yd tractor shovels in Benton Harbor. Once the Asheville plant is completed, this line will be manufactured there, with 3- to 12 cu yd tractor shovels produced in Benton Harbor.

Construction in Asheville is expected to start shortly and the division presently plans to be producing tractor shovels by the second quarter of 1976.

"This new facility will improve our ability to meet existing and future demands for Clark's medium-range tractor shovels," said J.C. Huntington, Jr., Group Vice-President and head of Clark's Construction Machinery Operation. He said current plans are for the new plant to employ about 500 persons by the end of 1976, with most of them coming from the Asheville area. "If production rates continue according to forecast, the expansion will not effect production employment at our Benton Harbor plant," he said.

ing, which is now nearing completion. He said that it will enable the association to provide more and better service to its customers by adding more parking space, providing a double drive to render faster and more efficient services for its drive-in customers, and will offer more private offices for mortgage loan and savings account officers to give more privacy for patrons.

Koenigshof said that by March 1 it is hoped that all LaSalle's mortgages will be on the computer, creating an efficiency in labor cost.

Koenigshof announced that he plans to semi-retire, but will continue as chairman of the board and of the executive committee. Eugene Rokely, formerly manager of the Bridgman office, and president and manager for the past year, will continue as president and operating manager. Koenigshof was with the Buchanan Co-Ops since 1934 and with LaSalle Federal since 1961. He became the Association's president on March 1, 1973.

In closing his report, Koenigshof said, "In looking ahead for 1975, we anticipate that the savings inflow will increase. However, should the government enter into the market for funds such as they did in 1974, we expect the cost of money will continue to rise. However, we enter fiscal 1975 with great strength. A solid asset base, proven performance and progressive management to provide us with confidence in our ability to perform in today's economy. Even in the world of uncertain economic and political conditions, we fully expect to continue our momentum of the past years and achieve record growth in earnings in the years ahead."





By Edward Linn

This is a best seller. Possibly it's because of all the advance publicity it received, although it is not one of the books which will have future impact.

It is the story of a murder. A U.S. Supreme Court justice is shot in front of the television cameras. The man who did it is caught right on the scene.

The adversaries are the two main lawyers. The tough assistant district attorney is one who's fed up on the present court actions which have made it easier for criminals. The defense attorney is a flamboyant, well-known lawyer who seeks publicity and who is a courtroom actor.

Linn takes too long to tell his story. There is the pre-trial hearing, the tedious selection of the jury and the long trial. All of this could be cut in half without much loss. But the courtroom episodes are for the most part, fascinating. At each turn, one of the adversaries scores on the other.

There are some good characters well portrayed. One of the best is the too-human judge who's way out over his depth in the company of two brilliant men.

THE SPINAL COLUMN

Quite often when we are talking with a new patient, the patient will tell about slipping and falling on ice, a number of years previously. He will then state that it only bothered for a short period of time and then gradually went away.

The sudden falling on ice puts a tremendous shock to the spine. This shock will force several vertebra out of their normal position, impinging on some spinal nerves, and interfere with nerve transmission. Very often, after a short period of time, the major area of shock and pain will subside.

However, the force that has been introduced by the fall will keep the vertebra out of their normal position to a certain degree after the pain subsides. It will continue to impinge on some small spinal nerves. It may be years before the accumulated damage done to the spine and nerves starts showing up in symptoms. Tragically, by then the damage done may be beyond repair, and a certain amount of problem will always be there.

NOTICE OF HEARING

The Michigan Public Service Commission (Commission) in its Opinion and Order dated November 19, 1974 in Case No. U-4701 initiated proceedings on the design of the rate structures of gas utilities within the State of Michigan and other mechanisms to encourage the conservation of natural gas and to assist in increasing the possibility of adequate future supplies of natural gas. The mutual hearing in these matters is scheduled to commence at 9:30 a.m. on February 7, 1975 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan. The hearing shall continue thereafter on such dates as a presiding officer may set until the matters have been fully heard.
Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate, subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. Any party seeking to intervene in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules shall file with the Commission, at least 5 days prior to the mutual hearing of February 7, 1975, an original and 6 copies of the petition to intervene, together with proof of service upon their serving gas utility.
The proceedings initiated by the Commission will focus on two basic issues:
1. Any adjustments in the rate structure for gas service of gas utilities within the State of Michigan that would be appropriate for the promotion of the conservation of gas, and
2. Any other mechanisms appropriate for encouraging the conservation of gas.
The Commission emphasized that it had formed no firm findings or conclusions relative to the issues raised therein. However, in order to facilitate exploration of such issues, the Commission attached to the Opinion and Order several proposals upon which the Commission solicited evidence and other comments.
The proposals set forth in the Opinion and Order are divided into four parts:
Part I would direct, among other things, that gas utilities in the State of Michigan undertake a program of advertising and promotion to encourage the conservation of natural gas and establish a program to identify customers using disproportionate amounts of natural gas for space heating. Gas utilities would also be required to establish a residential inspection program to implement the "Discounted Residential Insulation Rate" provided for in Part II of the proposals.
Part II would establish a rate structure designed to reward residential customers who adequately insulate their homes. Four Alternatives are set forth which could implement such a rate structure. Under each alternative, residential gas customers having ceiling insulation adequate to meet the R-19 standard as set forth in the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) Minimum Property Standards for Single Dwelling Units, paragraph 607-3, effective August 1, 1974, and residential customers who rent their dwellings and those whose living units are such that they are physically unable to install ceiling insulation that meets the above R-19 standard would be entitled to a "Discounted Residential Insulation Rate" (Discounted Rate) for natural gas service.
Under Alternative 1, a portion of the revenues collected from residential customers failing to qualify for the Discounted Rate would be rebated annually by the utility collecting the same to those who qualified for the Discounted Rate.
Under Alternative 2, a portion of the revenues collected from residential customers failing to qualify for the Discounted Rate would be expended by the utility collecting the same for special conservation programs, or special actions to assure adequate future supplies of gas.
Under Alternative 3, a portion of the revenues collected from residential customers failing to qualify for the Discounted Rate would be rebated annually to all residential customers.
Under Alternative 4, the rates for gas service for residential customers qualifying for a Discounted Rate and those not qualifying for a Discounted Rate would be established at levels calculated as nearly as practicable to result in no change in net revenue for each gas utility.
Part II would prohibit the attachment of new residential gas service unless the living unit of the prospective customer meets one or more of the following requirements: (a) ceiling insulation meeting the FHA R-19 standard, (b) wall insulation meeting the FHA R-11 standard, (c) storm door or storm windows or their equivalent, or (d) in the case of a mobile home the living unit is in compliance with the heat loss standards promulgated by the Michigan Construction Code Commission in the Mobile Home Code R 408.30611 of the Michigan Administrative Code.
Part IV would prohibit the use of gas for "ornamental purposes." As used in the proposal, "ornamental purposes" means for the primary purpose of decoration or for the primary purpose of enhancement of the aesthetic quality of an object, space, or environment, and include, but is not limited to, a tree primarily for the purpose of providing light.
Each of the foregoing proposals would, if adopted as proposed, be made effective September 1, 1975. The Commission requests all parties, Staff and intervenors to address the impact of any proposal on residential customers of "limited financial means," renters and customers whose dwellings cannot physically be insulated and to suggest methods of treating such customers equitably. Under each alternative, residential customers who do not meet the insulation standards or other qualifications for eligibility to purchase gas under the "Discounted Residential Insulation Rate" would pay a higher rate for gas.
The Commission also ordered that each gas utility file evidence as to the future availability of and demand for gas.
The Commission also specifically solicited other proposals from the utilities, its Staff, and any other interested person which fit within the scope of the proceedings.
This action is pursuant to 1909 PA 300, as amended, MCLA 462.2 et seq.; 1919 PA 419, as amended, MCLA 460.51 et seq.; 1939 PA 3, as amended, MCLA 460.1 et seq.; 1923 PA 94, as amended, MCLA 460.23 et seq.; Section 57, 1909 PA 300, as amended, MCLA 24.267; and Rule 53 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1964 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.52.
