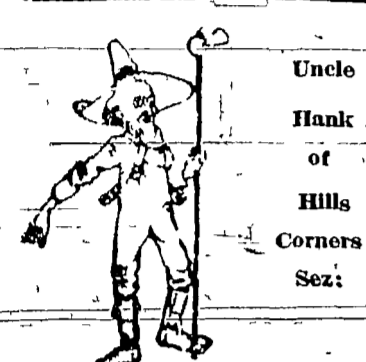

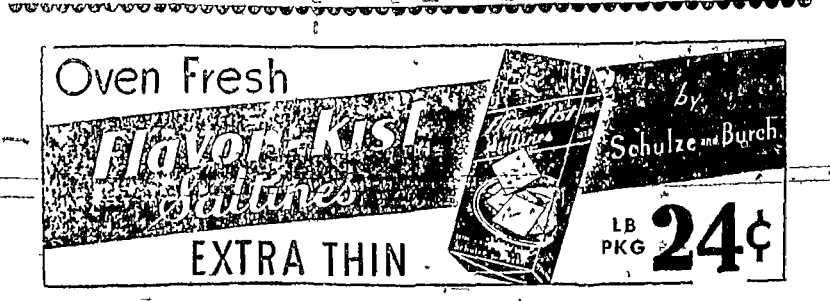

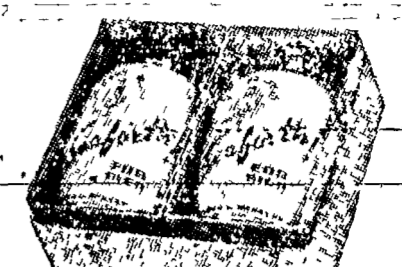

The Wiles Take Trip Through Old World Of Canada

Quaint Glimpses Of Quebec, New Brunswick Are Described

A recent trip into that part of old Canada that is more "old world" than the Old World of Europe itself was made some time back by a Buchanan family, whose observations may be of interest yet, since they were not published then.

Mr and Mrs Artur Wile and family went last August to the neighborhood of Windsor, Nova Scotia, the former home of Mr. Wile, to meet his family and old friends. They drove there by way of Detroit, crossing into Windsor, Ontario, and from there on taking a beautiful scenic highway 816 to the north side of Lakes Erie and Ontario and the St. Lawrence River. They stopped in Montreal, and especially in Quebec, and crossed the St. Lawrence at the latter place.

Ontario is too much like the United States to be outstandingly interesting, they report, but starting with the province of Quebec, and from there on into New Brunswick and Nova Scotia the land took on a different and most interesting character. Mr and Mrs. Wile, who are not Catholics, observed the very deep, fundamental place that religion seemed to take in the daily lives of the French Catholics in these provinces. They saw the religious shrines which the farmers had in their yards, many of them generations old. At these shrines they held services twice daily, in the early morning before they went to work and in the evening when they returned from the fields. Several families who did not have shrines at their homes would gather in the yard of one who had one, and worshipped together.

The people of these provinces, they stated seemed to have a feeling of security and contentment. They seemed to have plenty in their homes, although they did not have the modern appliances that we have, either in their homes or in places of business. The bicycle took the place of the automobile has here in personal transportation and the use of horse-drawn rather than the tractor still prevailed in the fields.

But there seemed, to the casual observer at least, less worry, less hurry, less friction and more contentment than prevails in the American scene.

Fences were high there in many

respects, but they could get good meals, with steak or porkchop meat dishes and desserts for from 40 to 45 cents. Sugar was the only apparently scarce food article. It was rationed to the extent of a half pound per person per week, with ration stamp for each half pound. The Wiles were given ration stamps by the immigration officials at Windsor when they entered Canada.

But when they arrived at Mr. Wile's old home in Nova Scotia, they found that the farmers were getting high prices and were enjoying a prosperity that started in war days and now continues as it does here. One of the relatives of Mr. Wile maintains a "caneen" which is the Canadian name for a roadside stand. He received last summer 35c per pound for tomatoes, 5 cents each for plums and ten cents each for pears. Fruit is of course scarce there.

Although they passed through great tracts of timber in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and saw vast piles of lumber in the yards of great sawmills, they report that it is as hard for Canadians to get building materials as it is here in the United States. Perhaps as a result of "war" rationing. Mr. Wile stated that in general Canadians seemed to have plenty of money, which was not the case in the days when he was a boy there. Then there was a scarcity of money in the hands of the people in general.

One very marked difference between Canada and the United States was that soap shortages ended when they crossed into Canada. Everywhere they found plenty of soap and soap powders of the brands that prevail here. They heard, however, that they came from branch factories maintained by the great soap companies in Canada, and did not come from the United States. They returned through New England and New York state and found it impossible to get soap anywhere.

Although the evidences of the drought were apparent throughout most of the parts of this country which they traversed, there had been an abundance of rain all through Canada and crops were fine.

Brethren Field Man Pleads For Overseas Relief

Small Denomination Has Great Record In Aid To Victims Of War

A small attendance at the January dinner meeting of the Buchanan Christian Brotherhood at the Brethren Church head a fine talk by Dan West of Goshen, Ind., field representative for the Brethren's Service Committee.

This committee has been in charge of the relief work conducted by the Brethren in the United States and overseas. He was in charge of the livestock aid program in which large numbers of heifers and bulls have been sent by boat to a number of "European" countries, including Czechoslovakia, Belgium, France, Italy and Greece.

West spoke forcefully against the use of food as a "political weapon." Aid should be extended in the name of humanity and in a Christian spirit, he said, which precluded its use as a political club. In their designation of "Communism," he said that the more reactionary regimes proscribed everything that does not conform to their own narrow interests. In Spain he stated, outward loyalty to Franco is the condition of receiving relief.

The right kind of aid, which is chiefly the rehabilitating aid, commands deep respect and rapidly wins friends, he said. In their program to furnish milk stock the Brethren have worked toward self-help for Europe.

In their program they have had remarkable success in winning the cooperation of other denominations, including the Quakers, the Catholics and a number of Protestant sects. "People work together on a moral level much better than on the verbal level," he said.

West said that in Poland multitudes are living in dugouts without fuel, shoes or adequate clothing, and that similar conditions persist in other middle Europe countries. He protested the closing of the UNRRA program in which a number of countries, including the United States, co-operated on the basis of giving 1% of their national income.

Last Covert Road Issues Retired

Refunding Program Saves County Taxpayers \$265,000

Berrien county is free of all Covert road bonded indebtedness, Morris G McGawn, chairman of the Berrien county board of supervisors, Friday morning in making the road board's annual report.

The final payment of the \$5,000,000 worth of bonds issued years ago was made last May, Mr McGawn informed the supervisors. He added that taxpayers of Berrien county were saved approximately \$265,000 by the refunding program adopted by the county road board, which cut the bond interest rates in some cases from 4 1/2% to as low as 3 1/4% of one per cent.

Mr McGawn reported that \$519,923.56 in weight and gasoline taxes was received in 1946 from the state, and that of this amount \$167,361.07 was paid to the cities and villages in accordance with the action taken by the board of supervisors a year ago. The county also received \$45,521.23 from the McNitt fund for maintaining former township roads, and \$39,945.51 in liquor taxes and for former township roads.

During the past year the road commission's program included 42 miles of collective patching with asphalt and stone on Macadam surface, and 32 miles of surface treatment with heavy asphalt seal coat.

Twenty-six bridges were repaired and repaved, but no guard rails could be repaired due to the paint shortage.

Nine miles of former township roads were re-graded, widened and graveled, with about 65,000 cubic yards of gravel used on these projects.

Equipment shortage handicapped the road commission's plans to grade and gravel former township roads throughout the year.

The report also asks that the county board authorize the expenditure of \$12,000 to erect a new steel pier at Rocky Gap park to protect the property against erosion by the high lake level. This amount has already been authorized by the board of supervisors.

All Berrien county banks have voluntarily agreed to accept contributions in the campaign, which will run two weeks under the general chairmanship of Robert G Miller, Baroda business man.

Michigan and the nation are hunting for a way to stabilize our economy, to give consumers of this country's vast production fair prices and necessary services.

The effect is to help stabilize industry.

Therefore, I, Kim Sigler, Governor of the State of Michigan, do hereby proclaim January as "Cooperative Month" in Michigan and ask all Michigan citizens, in the city and in the country, to find a common basis for understanding and appreciation of the aims of the cooperative movement.

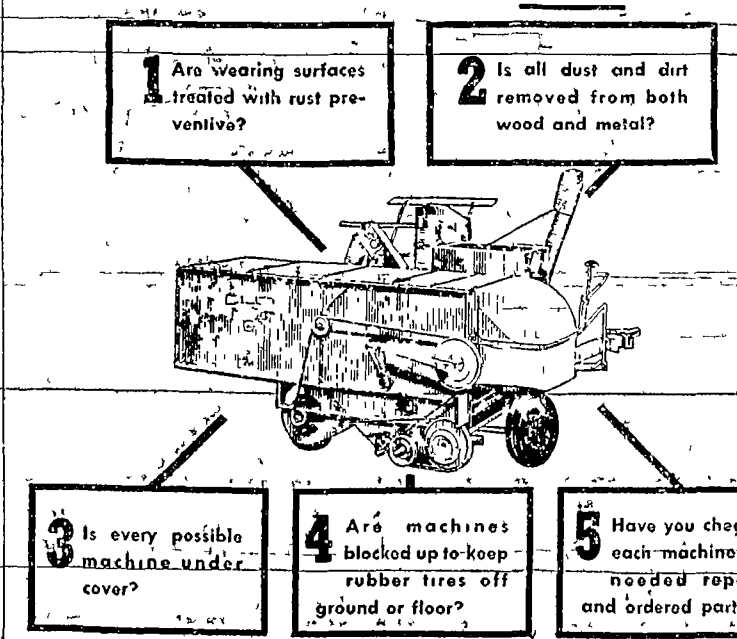

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
