



**Richard W. ## Police Report

The city received the annual report from the Buchanan police department. There were 30 less accidents than a year ago, but the number of traffic arrests has gone from 884 in 1973 to 1393 in 1974. Criminal arrests rose from 222 to 381.

There were more juvenile criminal arrests. In 1974, 109 boys were arrested for crimes here, and 41 were arrested last year. The number of female juvenile arrests went from 20 to 43.

In traffic arrests, those driving under the influence of alcohol were 36 in 1973 and 43 in 1974.

Among arrests, the largest category was for disorderly conduct, soaring from 26 to 93. There were 50 arrested for larceny in 1974, and only 19 in 1973.

Arrests for assaults, mostly not aggravated, stayed at the same figure of 35. There were 17 arrests involving narcotics and nine last year. Auto theft arrests went from six to eight.

## Break-ins

Last Thursday it was discovered that somebody had broken into the John Minder home on 703 E. Front St. while the Minderes were away on a trip. There were fresh footprints which indicated that there were two suspects. They broke a window and entered a bedroom where they took watches, rings and a 22-caliber revolver.

On Friday, somebody got into the Steve Kandstorfer home at 306 N. Cayuga. This party drank rum from a bottle, took a bath in the tub, powdered with talcum and took some of Mrs. Kandstorfer's clothes, a watch and ring and some food.

## Auto Crash

On Sunday night, Army private Paul Przybylinski, formerly of Buchanan and now stationed in Alaska, escaped serious injury when his car crashed into the guard rail of the Walton Road bridge. He lost control of the car which rolled over, knocking out a large section of the rail. Przybylinski had scalp wounds but refused treatment.

## Chance to Get To Know Your Child

An opportunity is being provided for all parents of school age children to attend without charge a series of five Monday night meetings aimed at answering a question often asked by parents - "How can I give my child the kind of homelife that will help him most in his development toward adulthood?"

The series, starting this Monday, January 20 at 7:30 in the Buchanan High School library, has been arranged by Ellis May, coordinator of special education, who stresses that these programs are planned to have significance for all parents and to provide help in understanding the problems of all children. He hopes that parents of average children, not just those of impaired children, will take advantage of these programs.

The speaker for the first program, devoted to helping parents better understand the problems, goals, emotions and special qualities of their child, is Dr. Katherine K. Rice, who has a private practice in psychiatry in South Bend with both children and adults as her clients. She has a special interest in family therapy.

Since graduating from John Hopkins University in 1930, Dr. Rice has had many experiences with children in various capacities and has co-authored a book, *Alphatic Free Radicals*, as well as writing many articles on psychiatry for various journals. Most recently she served as chairman of the Indiana Region Two Child Mental Health Committee. She was chief of staff for Psychiatry at St. Joseph Hospital in South Bend and presently serves as psychiatric consultant for children's and adolescent's services at Beatty Memorial State Hospital in Westville, Indiana.

The January 27 speaker will be Mrs. Mary Hick, a parent consultant, whose topic will be "Parents, Help or Hindrances." Mrs. Hick graduated from Miss State at Benedict, Minnesota, and received her master's degree in psychology at Western Michigan University. She is now connected with Corvillia Home for the Retarded, a half way house for the emotionally disturbed, at Westville Hospital.

The other three programs on succeeding Mondays will be given by John Hulecki, speech therapist, Mrs. Karen McBratnie, child development specialist and Mrs. James Brown and Mrs. John Holm, teachers of the learning disabled.

## City May Get More Federal Money to Spend

On Monday the city commission tackled the problem which had been created by going ahead with construction on the Schirmer Parkway before all arrangements for easements and rights-of-way had been finalized. Orpurt's, through their attorney, had come up with a proposal which entailed a trading of land and the payment of legal fees and other costs by the city. The costs were estimated at \$2254, and since the engineers Cole Associates had to take some blame for the goof, they finally agreed to knock \$2,000 off their bill to the city, and the city would pay the rest.

The city has a chance to apply for more federal funds under the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. They hired another consultant, John Kistler & Associates from Grand Haven for a maximum of \$2500 to help in preparation of the application for the funds. On February 3 they plan a public hearing to get advice on how best to use the money. The public will be invited to give their ideas. Merriam Ohmann, from the consultant firm, will be present.

The commission noted a letter from Adrian Koert, traffic consultant, who stated that he was opposed to a 4-way stop sign at Fourth and Chippewa.

A letter from Rex Porter resigning from the plan commission after ten years was received and his resignation accepted with regret.

The commission voted to have a public hearing to determine the necessity of establishing a special assessment district for installation of a sanitary sewer to 703 Rynearson and to 706 Rynearson. The estimated cost would be \$5185.

The commission tabled discussion about getting a new jeep for snow plowing. They asked for more information.

There was some discussion about the new Clark Equipment signs on the tree lawns, and the commissioners were to go and look at them.

The three members of the Board of Review each get \$20 a day for about three days. It was recommended that this be raised to \$30 a day, and the commission will study this.

City manager Faulhaber reported that the city had just received another \$19,396 from federal revenue sharing.

## Mother Nature Plays Some Strange Tricks Here

Whoever heard of lightning and thunder and heavy rains on January 10 in Michigan? The temperature climbed to the fifties. If it had been cold, there would have been ten inches of snow on the ground.

When Royal Valley planned their Winter Festival, they consulted the statistics which showed that this particular weekend was historically a good one for winter. People from all over the midwest were planning on coming to Buchanan. The Roll-ands and red cabbage was prepared on Thursday. Banners were set to go up all over the place welcoming skiers, and Doug Leiter's band was on tap for the big dance. The Jaycees had a special license to dispense beer and mulled wine.

Al Rottmann said that if the temperature got down to 26 degrees, he could start making enough snow to cover one or two slopes. As late as Thursday, there was still a little snow left, but it all washed down the hills on Friday.

The weathermen kept talking about blizzard warnings in Minnesota and North Dakota. They predicted that it would get cooler on Saturday and much colder on Saturday night and Sunday, too late to do any good for Royal Valley.

Collectively Buchanan felt bad for Royal Valley and, like one with a neighbor in trouble, tried to figure out ways to help. Possibly people could form parties and go to the dinner and dance at least.

Three television stations had indicated that they intended to cover the Festival Newsweek International was to have been there for a special feature. But as the rains continued, it was decided to cancel everything. The heat could be frozen for another dinner dance later when Mother Nature decided to cooperate.

Fruit farmers peered nervously at the thermometer, and those who have planted winter wheat wished for a good snow cover with more consistent weather.

And on January 10, Mrs. Ralph Spears called to say there was a happy robin on her lawn.

On Friday the thermometer climbed close to sixty. Then in the evening a cold front passed over Buchanan, bringing more rain, sleet and even a little hail and winds which brought down trees and power lines with near tornado force.

On Saturday morning the temperature started to fall, and by nightfall it was down close to zero.

## Something to Bring Us Together

At this point, Buchanan seems to need "togetherness." The various sectors of the community need to get to know each other. The community needs to work together as a community.

Several other towns have tackled this problem. Several have "Bridge-O-Rama" where couples play bridge with assigned couples each month. This is a good money maker, a tremendous mixer, and an event where interest can be developed. Euchre can be substituted. Such a plan is great for people who are single or new in town.

One town has a wonderful church league softball league where everybody plays, where those who strike out become members of a fictional club, where everybody has fun, where there is much good-natured kidding, and where the local paper will report, "The Millwood Christians were thrown to the lions last night."

Another community has a completely amateur civic theater where top-notch performances have been given and in which over 1,000 individuals in the town have participated either on stage or behind the scenes. Senior citizens are always invited to the dress rehearsal, and the high school students compete to see who will be invited to usher. There's a group who chooses a recipient each year for an academy award. The women of the town spend weeks making the costumes.

It would be highly desirable if members of the country club or of the Moose or Legion or of the Lions could occasionally break out of their restricted circle and exchange ideas and friendships with other groups of people. It would be exciting if everybody could latch on to a single project and pull together and work together for its successful conclusion.

One of the advantages to a small town is supposed to be its friendly, family-like atmosphere, unique from a big city or a suburban "bedroom" community. This single advantage should outweigh many of the disadvantages of small-town living.

If a small community can't engender this type of spirit, "There's trouble in River City."

## I & M To-Build A Fish Ladder

The Solitt Construction Company of South Bend has been awarded the contract for construction of a fish ladder at the Berrien Springs Hydro Dam of Indiana & Michigan Electric Company.

The announcement was made jointly by I&M and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources who will share the costs for the construction of the facility.

Construction is expected to get under way early this year and be completed by next June.

The fish ladder is expected to be completed in time for the 1975 runs of salmon and steelhead whose path to the St. Joseph River presently is blocked by the Berrien Springs Hydro Dam.

In addition to shared construction costs, I&M is providing the plans, will supervise construction, and assume maintenance of the fish ladder. The Department of Natural Resources' share will be provided from federal funds allotted to Michigan under the Anadromous Fish Act of 1965 and additional monies from the State Recreation Bond program. The Fisheries Division will have the responsibility of operating the fish ladder and perpetuating the anadromous fish runs.

The fish ladder will incorporate a sea lamprey barrier that will prevent the upstream migration of lampreys.

It is anticipated that the fish ladder will open up about ten miles of mainstream, as well as several top quality small tributary streams, to runs of chinook and coho salmon, and to steelhead. New fishing areas will develop in the Buchanan-Niles vicinity in the mainstream.

A fishway was included when I&M's Berrien Springs Hydro Dam was built in 1907, but because of its design fish did not readily pass.

While fish runs early in the century were small, today the St. Joseph River has large runs of salmon and steelhead and plays an important part in the sport fishing scene in southwestern Michigan.

## Buchanan Police Are Busy Friday

Friday night started out as a routine evening at the Buchanan police department. There had been reports of a breaking and entry, which later proved to be dubious. Earlier, the police had coped with safety problems with the new middle school.

Then at 7:30 a report came that there had been a shooting. The victim was rushed to the hospital in critical condition, and the woman accused of shooting him was ultimately brought to the police station.

To enter the house where the event took place required a search warrant. It was necessary to find the correct person to issue one and a judge to sign it. This took a matter of hours. Then authorities were able to enter and to gather the grisly evidence carefully and scientifically.

In the meantime, the accused was being questioned at the station. Pat Henson was called in to act as matron. The woman was, at this point, unable to give coherent answers.

While all this was going on, calls on other matters came in. There was a car stalled out on Route 12 with no lights. A woman came in to report that she'd just been through a terrible storm on Main Street Road, and that there was a line down. This was followed by more reports of storm damage. Rain and sleet swept the department's parking lot, and occasionally the force of the wind would blow open the door to the station.

A great many of the police were in the station. There were the regular duty officers, those questioning the woman, those working at the house where the shooting happened, and the two officers in the squad car. All was quiet efficiency as each went about his assignment in close cooperation.

A great deal of compassion, gentleness and kindness was shown the woman in custody. Another member of her family was called in to calm her. Reports kept coming in about the condition of the shooting victim who was in surgery for a matter of hours. Finally it became necessary to transport

## Husband Shot

On Friday night, the Buchanan police received a call from Leon Clifton, 708 W. Roe St., stating that he had just been shot. When they arrived at the scene, he was outside the house, and his wife, Darlene, had gone to a neighbor's house. Clifton, who was shot in the abdomen by a shotgun, was rushed to Pawating Hospital where he underwent surgery for several hours.

Mrs. Clifton was taken to the Buchanan police department, where she was charged with the shooting. The police finally obtained a search warrant and were able to enter the house, and Mrs. Clifton finally regained composure enough to make a statement. She was lodged in Berrien County jail and pled not guilty Saturday to assault with intent to commit murder.

Clifton was reported in fair condition Monday in intensive care at the hospital.

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### A Minute With Mary

Putting on Heirs  
The U.S. Postal Service and the California Attorney General are investigating at least one

west coast "lost heirs" scheme that has spread its solicitations to Michigan.

Companies thriving on the scheme use titles containing official sounding words like "probate court document service" or "estate administrators". Their mode of operation is to hunt through the public information in probate court files for unclaimed estates or abandoned property. Then they use telephone directories from dis-

tant cities to get addresses of people with the same last name as those appearing in unclaimed estate files.

Letters are sent informing these people that they may be eligible to collect from the estate of a "long lost relative" and asking them to send a fee for more information.

People who respond with the necessary fee usually receive copies of court records, public information that could have been

obtained from the court free of charge.

It is a rare coincidence if the people solicited by these companies actually turn out to be heirs to an estate. The companies provide no further services to help legitimate heirs collect from estates. The only ones to collect anything, in most cases, are the promoters of the scheme.

In Michigan, the state pays administrators to trace heirs.

They work at no expense to the estate or to the heirs. An unsettled estate is not closed in Michigan until the administrator has traced an elaborate family tree and located all eligible heirs.

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## Parent Group Asks Questions And Gets Some Answers

The next meeting of the High School Parents' Communications Group will be Thursday, January 16, in the high school library. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. Members of the committee will discuss with the high school principal and other faculty members any areas of concern which you ask them to bring up.

At the December meeting many things were discussed. A summary of most of these discussions follows:

1. A number of questions were raised concerning vandalism in the high school.

A. What has vandalism in schools cost the taxpayers?

B. Is insurance available to cover broken windows, etc? We have \$1000 deductible on damage to the building. The costs of more insurance than that would not be worthwhile for us. We do have insurance to cover the costs of thefts of school property.

C. What can be done to minimize vandalism?

D. What can parents do as a group to minimize vandalism?

2. Why does the middle school start before the high school? Because students are riding the same buses, it is necessary to start either the middle school or the high school fifteen minutes later than the other. There were no overwhelming reasons for deciding that one or the other should start first. It was decided to have the high school begin later for these reasons:

A. The 8:10 a.m. to 2:40 p.m. schedule works out better with our shared time programs (programs whereby students attend classes with students from Niles, Brandywine, Berrien Springs, and Eau Claire).

B. High School students tend to stay up later at night than middle school students. For those who are not bus students, a later start will mean 15 minutes extra sleep. We noticed during our split sessions that many high school students had difficulty getting enough sleep due to the early starting hours.

3. Why do we have students buy class rings as sophomores?

The purchasing of class rings is strictly a student activity. The students choose the time of purchase, the company from which to purchase the rings, the design, etc. We think that the custom of class rings is a nice one, however, we in no way pressure any students to buy them. The school gets no "kickback" of any kind.

A related question was asked a

few days after the meeting. We were asked why the rings are no longer fitted at a local jewelry store. The answer to that question is that the students save a few dollars having it done this way. Parents are welcome to come at the time of the fitting to watch, ask questions, etc.

4. Why do we make students have their pictures taken by the school photographer?

All 9th, 10th, and 11th graders have their pictures taken at school so that we may have pictures available for our records and as a service to the students and parents. The pictures are much less expensive than they would be if each student contracted with a photographer individually. No one has to buy pictures, of course!

As far as senior pictures are concerned, these may be taken by a photographer the student chooses. Mr. Lemke, the local photographer, is selected by a large number of our students.

5. When may students take driver's training?

The present class started in December. Students who were born from January 1, 1959, until April 10, 1959, are eligible. By March 1st a class will begin for students born between April 10 and July 10, 1959.

6. Why do our students have to take twenty credits?

We believe that five credits per year over a four year period is reasonable. Students may take six credits during the normal school day, and may take seven if they are involved with share-time programs, co-op, or correspondence classes. In addition, they receive 1/2 credit for driver's education and may take credits at Niles during the summer.

7. A new program to be offered during the second semester was discussed. About twenty students will go to Fernwood for a two hour block to take part in a course designed for our better students. The course will be taught by Mrs. Don Harker, the wife of the naturalist, with help from Mr. Harker. Using the facilities of Fernwood, the students will receive advanced training in the natural sciences.

8. Why have we had so many students coming door to door this year? Many of the students who have been selling items on a door to door basis have been members of high school groups seeking to raise money for a club, etc. Of course, there have also been middle school students, girl scouts, teen center representatives, church groups, and even students from Niles.

It has long been an established tradition at Buchanan for the band to raise money via calendar and candy sales. The Board has authorized these sales. Therefore, we have permitted other clubs to conduct a door to door sales campaign during the year. We have more than thirty such groups in school. Thus, the potential for door to door sales is rather great.

9. Why have ticket prices to athletic events gotten so high? This is certainly a legitimate complaint. We are bound in this matter to Blossomland Conference decisions, for the most part. It is Buchanan's philosophy that student ticket prices should be minimal so that students are never discouraged from attending games.

Season ticket prices for students are low. However, very few students take advantage of them.

10. Why doesn't the band share in receipts for football games?

There are a number of answers to this question. First, the band is greatly subsidized by the general fund; it is not dependent on money making projects for its basic needs. Money raised by the band goes for "extra" activities, such as band camp. While band camp is a very valuable program, it is an "extra," one that none of the athletic teams can afford incidentally. There are many fine camps for football players, basketball players, baseball players, and wrestlers.

However, any of our students who go must pay their own expenses. Football receipts go toward financing our very extensive girls' and boys' sports program -- not just to the football program. All of these receipts go toward basic costs, necessary to have a program -- not to "extras."

Secondly, the football games are primarily that - football. The cheerleaders and the band add a great deal, however, the major activity is the game. The band could charge, if it liked, for band concerts, etc.

11. What can be done to improve our students knowledge of basic English grammar, etc?

We are aware of a problem in this area, which is not peculiar to our schools, incidentally.

It is a districtwide problem, and long range steps are being taken to improve the situation.

Immediate steps being taken at the high school include a change in our English requirements which would mandate that each student pass at least two phase elective courses in the grammar-composition area before being graduated.

12. What is the Youth Service and Assistance Bureau?

The Youth Service Bureau is a county organization whose primary purpose is to divert young people from the Juvenile Justice System. Counselors work with students and their parents to prevent delinquent behavior.

The long range goal is to reduce home, school, and community pressures to which children react with antisocial behavior.

### Offer Course In Snowmobile Safety

A new law went into effect January 1, 1975, governing the operation of snowmobiles by youngsters through the age of 16. The law states a person between 12 and 16 is not permitted to operate a snowmobile in Michigan unless...

He has in his possession a snowmobile safety certificate or is under the direct supervision of a person 18 years of age or older.

Or, is on land owned or under the control of his parent or legal guardian.

A person under 12 may not operate a snowmobile without direct supervision of an adult except on lands owned or under the control of parent or guardian.

The Berrien County Snowdrifters Snowmobile Club is sponsoring a snowmobile safety training class to include eight hours of classroom instruction and actual performance testing on a snowmobile. Upon successful completion of the course, youngsters will be awarded a snowmobile safety certificate and a brassard (arm patch).

The classes will be on January 23, 24 and 27 from 3 to 5:30 p.m. in the Buchanan High School Auto Shop. There is no charge for the class, but class size is limited to 25.

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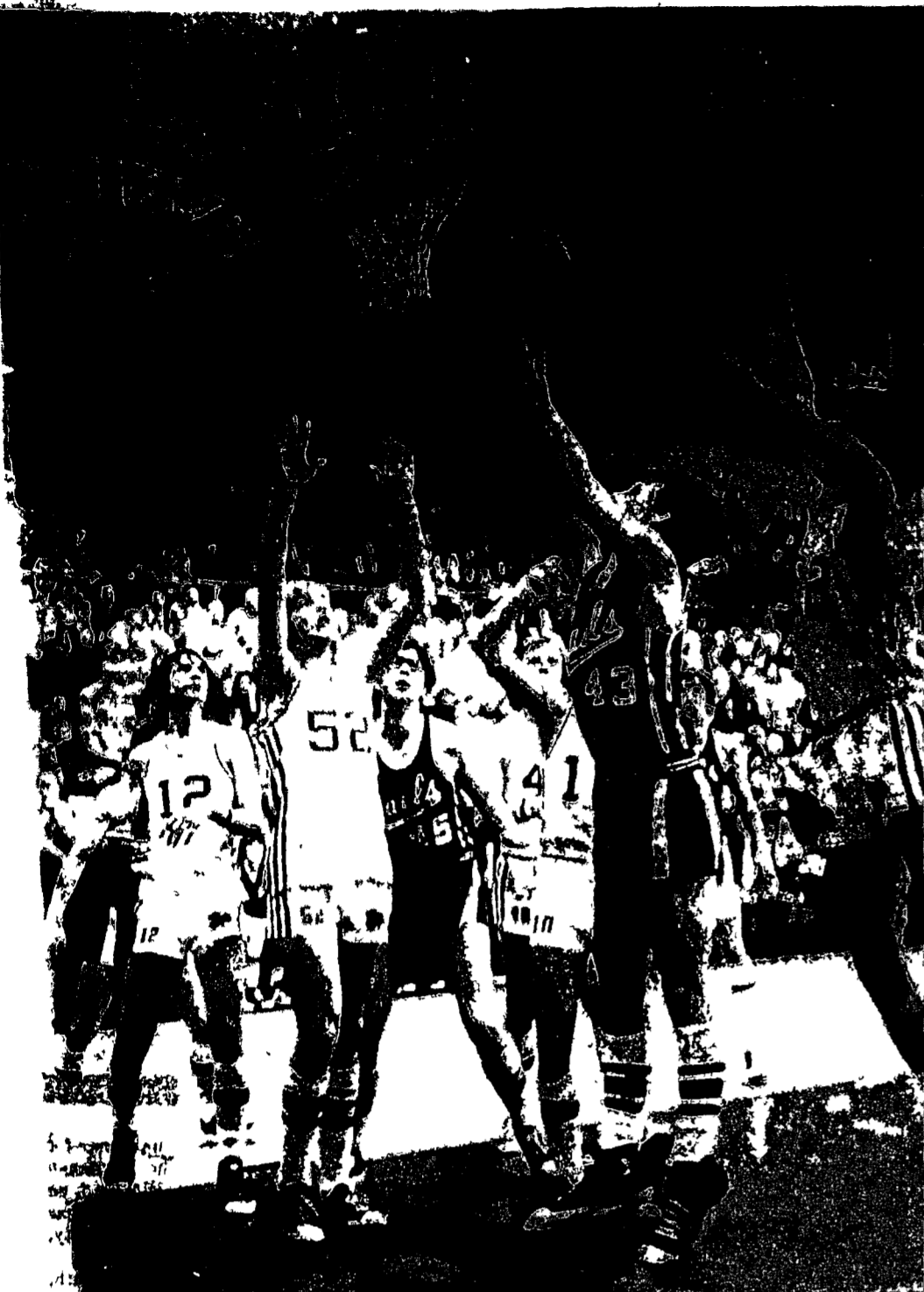
