

Black Topping Of Red Bud Rd. Starts In 2 Weeks

Resurfacing of the entire 9-mile extent of the Red Bud Trail with a stronger and more durable bituminous top is slated to start in two weeks, stated Ralph Hornbeck, manager of the Berrien County Road Commission.

The bituminous surface will be the best in its kind, stated Hornbeck. It is officially designated by the Michigan Highway Commission as Specification 400 meaning a mixture of asphalt and the native gravel, rigidly controlled throughout in a local "batch plant." A native gravel mixture is ranked much stronger than one of crushed stone.

The 4 1/2 miles from the Berrien Springs Road intersection to the US-31 junction will be widened 4 feet, from a total of 16 to 20-foot width. The trail from Buchanan to that point is already 20 feet wide. The sharpness of a curve is to be reduced near the Berrien Springs intersection. This was made possible by the generosity of W. S. Rowley, who donated the extra land needed.

The commission had considered the straightening of curves along the front of Moccasin bluff, immediately north of Buchanan, but decided against it for two reasons. 1. The cost of building the large grades to straighten the curves would be excessive. 2. The road was built in the beginning, in part at least, as a scenic highway and the commission decided that as long as possible it would avoid any interference by straightening.

Manager Hornbeck stated that the Red Bud Trail would be open for traffic during the 30 days of resurfacing, on a "at your own risk" basis.

Address By Frank Habicht, Head County Road Commission

Michigan highway authorities are not likely to alter their programs overnight to accommodate suggestions from across the Inland state line, said Frank Habicht, chairman of the Berrien County Highway Commission, in a pithy and informative talk before the members and guests of the Buchanan Business Association at the Moccasin school gymnasium Tuesday evening.

Not will toll road boards listen to suggestions that aim to move their traffic inlets from more to less congested areas. The toll roads will be paid for from the tolls received and it is the business of their managers to study objectively the inlets from which they are likely to gather the most tolls.

These inlets are at places linking principal "traffic magnets," which in the main are the already existing centers of heavier population. Such a center to the immediate north of South Bend is Niles. Niles and South Bend are already linked by a main-traveled highway, US-31, and consequently the state highway commission will not find it practicable to build any alternatives in the immediate future, said Habicht.

"Traffic magnets" in Berrien county, meaning such locations as have the requirements to pull traffic to them are 1. The Benton Harbor-St. Joseph areas, 2. the Niles area. These areas gained first momentum in accretion of population because they were centers of converging traffic routes, or the crossroads of traffic routes, from the very earliest times. They remain in these positions of advantage, which tend to gain momentum rather than to level off.

Buchanan is a main secondary traffic center in Berrien county. The Niles-Buchanan Road, with an average of about 2,000 cars daily, is one of the heaviest-traveled in Berrien county.

Funds for maintaining and occasional building of new roads comes mainly from the receipts of the State Motor Vehicle Tax, which in turn are derived from the weight license charges and the gasoline tax. Last year the income from each source was gasoline, \$82,000,000, licenses, \$49,000,000.

These amounts are annually distributed as follows: 44% to state highways, such as Nos. 31, 12 and 140 in Berrien county, 3% to county roads which are outside of any town incorporation, 19% to avenues of traffic entirely within city limits.

Pres. Spatta Of Clark's Optimistic

Long-range optimism for continued growth and expansion of the construction materials handling and automotive industries was expressed today by George Spatta, president, Clark Equipment company, Buchanan, in an address Tuesday before the New York Society of Security Analysts.

Clark Equipment company, which had sales last year in excess of \$122 million, is a leading producer of materials handling industrial trucks and transmissions, axles and other drive components used in the manufacture of heavy trucks and automotive equipment. The company recently entered the construction equipment field.

"Although the industries we serve have grown considerably in the past decade, there is good cause to believe their growth cycles will not reach full maturity for some years to come," Mr. Spatta said. "Consequently, we consider the long-term outlook for our own company to be good."

In speaking of the more immediate future, Mr. Spatta said sales for the second quarter will be approximately 15% higher than first quarter sales, or approximately \$4 million higher than the \$24 1/2-million for the three months ended March 31. He said earnings will be correspondingly higher for the quarter, and that 1954 overall earnings are "most likely to surpass" the earnings figure of \$5,177,230 in 1953.

In reviewing elements on which his long-range forecast is based, Mr. Spatta said, "only the surface has been scratched in the application of materials handling equipment." To substantiate his claim, he cited Clark's experience in a recent test leasing program which was "so successful the company" (Continued on Page 2)

Dangers May Be Opportunity Says Rev. Wesley Oldt

Rev. Oldt spoke from a text in Proverbs: "It is the glory of God to conceal things but it is the glory of men to search them out." The conditions in which we now live furnish a great challenge to us, expressed in the Biblical text: "Seek the truth and the truth shall make you free." One of the greatest joys that can come to men is the joy of discovery, said Rev. Oldt. It seems that God has deliberately hidden many of the more important things, in order that man may experience the inner growth which is the result of the search of truth.

Farmers May Apply For 1955 Wheat Allotments

Tells Story Of Senior Cruise

The "weather man" must not have liked us, because it was raining "cats and dogs" while we were waiting at the station for our train. It was supposed to leave Buchanan for Chicago at 10:30 a.m. but it finally arrived an hour late.

In Chicago we had to wait about 1 1/2 hours. We went in groups of four and five in taxis to the pier, from which we embarked at 2 p.m. on the S.S. South American, a fairly large ship with a displacement of about 2,600 tons.

Three girls were assigned to one cabin, which was more like a big closet. We could hardly turn around. There were senior classes from six different schools on board, with 503 students in all. Buchanan was represented by 48 students and three chaperones—Mr. Rizer, Mrs. Snyder and Mrs. Sexton. The other schools represented were Mendon, Frazier, Wayne, Chelsea, all of Michigan, and Holland, O.

The weather didn't get any better in the evening. It was quite stormy and at dinner-time we had our first seasick casualties. It seemed strange at first to see them sit down and start eating and then suddenly get up and run out of the dining room.

We had fine entertainment. Two bands gave us real "jazzy" music. The first night we had "stunt" night, while enroute north on Lake Michigan. The next night there was a treasure hunt. We listened to concerts, played cards, and the last night the students from different schools took part in a talent show in which Marion Baker and Beverly Morelli won sixth prize.

On Wednesday we had wonderful sunshine and at 2 p.m. we arrived at Macinaw Island. As there was not an auto on the island we went on either horseback, horse and wagon, or, in the case of some of the boys, on bicycles, to see the island. Citizenry Along West Front Street To Voice Opinion

It is reliably reported that a petition has been widely circulated among the property owners on West Front street between Moccasin avenue and Terie Coupe road protesting the proposed change in policy on the part of the city government in charging property owners 65% of the cost of replacing curbs and gutters, after they have "lasted a reasonable life."

Practically all owners involved have signed the petition. The city commission had discussed and announced this policy at their last meeting on May 24. "Reasonable life" for curbs and gutters was interpreted as from 25 years and over. Reasons given at that time was that there are about 18,000 feet of curb and gutter that had reached this period and needed replacement. Assumption of entire expense of replacement by the city would entail a prolonged spread of the work, it was argued.

The reaction of the property owners involved was expressed by one to the effect that the widening and consequent replacement of curbs and gutters on West Front street is a continuing project and that the city had not charged the property owners for such replacements thus far, and should not change the assessment policy in the middle of the project.

The meeting will come up for discussion at a hearing to be held at the regular city commission meeting June 14.

4 Candidates Seek 2 Posts on Board

The annual election for Buchanan school District No. 1 Fractional will be held Monday, June 14, with two vacancies to fill and four candidates competing for them.

Vacancies have been created by the expiration of the terms of Philip Hanlin and Dr. H. M. Beattie. Candidates properly entered are Harold Thomas, Donald Roti Roti, Harry Kennedy, Philip Hanlin.

The balloting will be done in the same room which has been used for that purpose for many years, the room on the first floor of the older part of the high school, immediately east of the office of Supt. Stark. Hours of voting will be from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Philip R. Hanlin, president of the school board of Buchanan School District No. 1 Fractional, will be a candidate for re-election at the annual district polls June 14.

He was first elected to membership on the board in June, 1942. In June of 1945 his fellow board members elected him treasurer. Following the death of Dr. J. C. Strayer, a 20-year veteran of the board, on June 14, 1951, the board advanced Phil to the leadership, and he has been annually re-elected to that post since.

"I am aware of two things," stated Hanlin, shortly after he had faced the Record photographic and editorial squad. "First, that a survey of my opponents assumes me that the school board will not be lacking in the ability and interest of its membership, whether I am elector or not."

"Second, I filed for re-election because I have been responsible, together with my fellow-workers on the board, for some developments in the Buchanan schools. I would like to see through. For several years I worked with the board and with the school executive head in a necessary expansion of the school plant. With that taken care of for some time at least, we are now shifting our attention from plant to program. "My name is on the ballot because of a deep desire to see this whole development through, also because I believe that the knowledge and experience I have gained from my continued association give me something to contribute to its fulfillment."

Harold E. Thomas

Harold Ed Thomas, candidate for the school board in the election on June 14, is very widely known and very active in public affairs in his home community.

He came to Buchanan from South Bend about 19 years ago, when he entered the employ of the Clark Equipment company. He has continued since in the experimental department with associations also in the engineering department.

He is very active in civic affairs, being a member of the city board of appeals, and the representative of that board on the city planning commission.

"I have no feeling other than deep respect for my opponents," said Mr. Thomas. "One important reason for running is that I will have three children in high school this fall. Another is that I have a number of friends who seem firm in their belief that I could do a good job, if elected."

He and his wife and three children still in school here live at 510 West Front street. An older son, Bill, a graduate of Buchanan high, is now a student at Western Michigan College.

Donald Roti Roti, candidate to fill one of the vacancies on the school board membership, came to Buchanan from Chicago when he was six months old. That makes him practically a Buchanan native. He has a background both in education and business.

He attended the Buchanan elementary and high school departments and was graduated from the latter in 1935. He attended the Ferris Institute for two years, and then transferred to Western Michigan College, at Kalamazoo, where he was graduated with a degree of Bachelor of Science. He later attended the Kalamazoo division of the University of Michigan Graduate School during two summers.

Then he continued his education after another fashion during 4 1/2 years in the U. S. Navy during and after World War II. That stint over with, he came to Buchanan and taught physical education for a part of a year during the absence of Coach Lester Miller. Arthur Knoblauch To Speak At Commencement Program

Replaces Late Dean J. B. Edmonson Who Died Quite Suddenly June 5

Owing to the death of Dr. J. B. Edmonson, Dean Emeritus of the University of Michigan, on June 5, it was necessary to secure a replacement to speak in his stead at the 1954 Commencement exercises at the Buchanan high school, Wednesday, June 9.

The Buchanan school authorities were very fortunate in securing for the occasion Dr. Arthur Knoblauch, who taught in the Buchanan high school from 1929 to 1935, the latter part of that time also serving as high school principal. The selection could not have been more fortunate.

During his six years here Knoblauch made himself one with the community. He was a president of the Lions club, and in many ways manifested a wide and understanding interest in community affairs. His main relaxation was attendance at potluck suppers at rural grange meetings, and he was a member of the Wagner Grange.

Dr. Knoblauch is now Director of the Division of University Extension at the University of Connecticut, at Storrs, Conn.

In this story we include a picture taken in the dewey-eyed morning of his youth when he first entered local school employ. It was all that could be found, but his many friends will find him not so much changed after all. We trust he will be reasonable, but, if he is not, all we can hope is that he is not as swift in the pursuit as once he was. found it necessary to set up a separate subsidiary to handle the operation.

"The interesting part of the story," he said, "is that the leasing program enabled us to open up markets which had not been available with conventional financing. Most of our lease customers are new customers—people who never before used a fork truck."

He said the Company's outlook in the automotive industry is sound because of the continuing growth of over-the-highway transport. He said he "takes the word" of his friends in Detroit that the number of trucks on the road will double in the next ten years. He pointed out that Clark's activity in the automotive field is a producer of components used in medium and heavy trucks, the market for which has been relatively stable in spite of a falling market for lighter trucks.

"More trucks on the highway—and more passenger cars too—mean more roads," Mr. Spatta said. "That's one of the reasons we thought we should get into the construction equipment business. Another reason is that our men are experts in the transmission of power through gears—the transmission and the power train are the 'vitals' of construction equipment."

"A third reason we decided to get into the construction equipment business is that earthmoving is materials handling—and Clark is a recognized leader with the most comprehensive line of

products available in the industry."

He told the Security Analysts that production of the Company's new line of "Michigan" tractor shovels has been under way for more than a month and that acceptance of the product has been excellent. "It would ordinarily not be a backlog of orders which he described as substantial."

Michigan Battles Gypsy Moth

Action is being taken by the state of Michigan to contain the invasion of the dreaded gypsy moth, which is reported to have a foothold in Ingham and Clinton counties. The state has appropriated \$150,000 for defense against the insect threat, which if not curbed, might eat the foliage of leaves throughout the lower peninsula, with danger to the life of trees as well as annual crops.

The gypsy moth is known to be one of the most destructive of insects. In its larva, or caterpillar stage, the gypsy moth attacks its prodigious appetite on the green leaves of trees, shrubs and other leafy plants. The larvae appear in such astonishing numbers that they can totally destroy all foliage in an area.

State officials were faced with the urgent problem of what to do. The choice was to immediately adopt a program involving spraying and other precautions in cooperation with federal authorities, or face a federal quarantine under which every material that stands out-of-doors would be inspected and certified before it could leave the area. They chose to take action.

C. A. Boyer, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry for the Michigan Department of Agriculture, tells of how the gypsy moth came to be found for the first time west of Pennsylvania.

"A peculiar bug is raising havoc with my plants," reported a Lansing housewife to the city forestry office. "Will you tell me what to do to get rid of it?" Samples of the insect picked by these men showed it to be foreign to the area. They called upon Bower of the Agriculture department, Dr. Gordon E. Guyer and Prof. Ray Hutson of Michigan State College's entomology department. These men identified the insect as the destructive gypsy moth.

Specialists of the Conservation and Highway departments were quickly called into consultation and the U. S. Department of Agriculture was notified. USDA sent 10 top experts, headed by Vern Odell, a leading gypsy moth fighter of 30 years experience in New England. Together they studied the situation.

Quick action was taken by the Governor. He called the "Little Legislature" into emergency session and \$150,000 was set aside for a mammoth "do-nothing program."

Plans to spray 104,000 acres of Ingham and Clinton counties were put into effect. A 4-motor B-17 and three single-motor planes were hired to spray 58,000 gallons of DDT solution from an altitude of only 200 feet. The multimotor plane was to fly over the metropolitan areas. Spraying was to be done when wind velocity was less than 8 miles per hour. The cost of spraying will be \$78,500. Residents would also benefit from DDT's effect of killing flies and mosquitoes.

Traps will be set for the gypsy moth in a circular area stretching 50 miles in all directions from Lansing.

Nature makes the gypsy moth a difficult opponent. Its eggs are laid on "almost anything" — from a stone to an automobile. From 4,000 to 5,000 eggs make up a mass, as many as 400 masses are found in one group. Eggs hatch into larvae which float through the air. When it lands "it chews the heck out of everything green — even pine needles." Once developed into adulthood, the female quickly becomes so heavy with eggs, she cannot fly. Other reports of the moth have come in from along US 16, at Brighton and Detroit. These, and all other reports made are to be quickly investigated. If conditions warrant, spraying and other weapons will be put to use.

This was the third annual event of the show and it drew a crowd of 1,500 persons from the Michigan area.

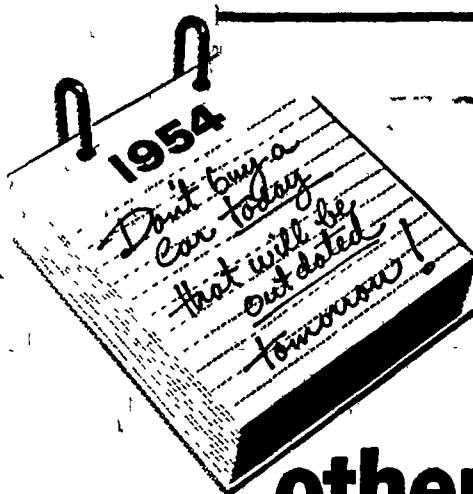

Meet Your Merchant

Herb Is One Boy Who Was Educated In War

This week's "Meet Your Merchant" subject is Herbert Russell of "Russell Electronics." He is much better known as Herb by the many fellow-townsmen who have known him more or less since he arrived in Buchanan at the mature age of three years.

The story that he arrived holding a milk bottle in one hand and a toy television antenna in the other is entirely untrue, as all reasonably informed people know there wasn't even such a word as television then. As near as the writer knows his favorite employment then was playing marbles for keeps with that pum-bess throng of urchins who used to block the traffic on Theoda and Charles Courts. He was just one of the kids who grew up,

graduated from high school (1939 in Herb's case) and eventually went to the wars.

Herb was one of the fortunate boys who took a square look at coming events and judged that, since the army would need many men with scientific training, he might as well be one of them. So he joined the Army Signal Corps Reserves in October, 1942, and was sent to study the various phases of that work at the Army Signal Corps School in Chicago where he remained until September, 1943, during which a part of his training was received at the Illinois Institute of Technology. In that month he was called into service.

According to regular war-time routine he was shifted immediately to another field than the one he had trained for, from Army Signal Corps work to the Army Air Force Radar technicians. Instead of going immediately into active service he was sent back to the schools again, including several technical training centers in Florida and New Jersey.



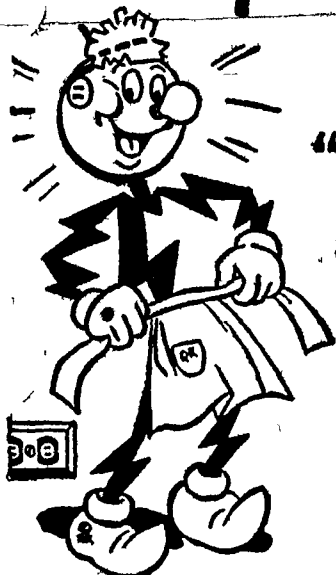
Finally he was sent overseas in May, 1945, stationed first on the Pacific island of Guam, and then at two Jima. By that time the war was nearly over and Russell says that he has no regrets that he "never saw the enemy, alive or dead."

He was discharged from service in March of 1946, and came home to "the States" and Buchanan. The radar work he had learned in the army had helped him, since it was allied in some ways to radio work, but it provided no jobs, once the war was ended. Herb went to work at Batchelor's Electric Appliances, doing radio repair work.

As television began to loom large in the near future he went to Chicago where he studied two years in the American Television Laboratories. Then he returned and worked two more years for Batchelor's Electric Appliances. Then he went into business for himself, setting up headquarters in the basement of his home for television installation and repair.

The Story of Buchanan



A Long Farewell To Bedstead And Wagon-Making

The Wooden Age of Buchanan manufacturing, dependent on local timber supplies, was drawing to its close in the middle 1880's. By

1888 the furniture and wagon-makers had "scraped the bottom of the barrel." Through the foresight of John Holmes, pioneer in the creation of hydro-electric plants, Buchanan secured a second lease on life by the coming of iron and steel-using industries, starting with the coming of the Lee & Porter Axle Works in 1895. Before we leave the wooden age, it will be worthwhile to reproduce a picture of the town in 1874, when the wood-using plants were booming. It is taken from an issue of the Chicago Commercial Advertiser of June 20, 1874. This paper was distinctly one of the old time "puff sheets," devoted exclusively to advertising and to special "write-ups" of towns in the Chicago area. Such newspapers usually "drew a long bow," but nevertheless the picture given

of Buchanan is interesting and more authentic and complete than any other available.

We omit the only "blurb" of the beginning and reproduce their description of the furniture and wagon-making plants of 1874.

Buchanan Manufacturing Co.

"Their main building is three stories high, with a wing 40 feet square. A 60-horsepower engine works noisily. Sixty hands are employed here upon common to medium classes of furniture, including bedsteads, lounges, tables and stands.

"They make a specialty of the maple spindled bedstead. In the smoothness of their turned work they are well in advance of any establishment in the West. They are using 1,200,000 feet of choice selected walnut, ash, poplar and hickory annually, all kiln-dried before working. No part of the West affords these varieties of lumber in finer quality than the neighborhood of Buchanan. Not an inch of imperfect timber is allowed to go into this furniture.

"The output of this plant is valued at \$100,000 annually. Two-thirds of it is sold west of the Mississippi. The company was organized in 1872, with William Peas as president, T. M. Fulton as treasurer, William Osborn as secretary and superintendent and A. Willard as foreman. . . . They have two large warehouses at the railway and fine facilities for shipment."

H. S. Black Furniture Works

"The machinery of this fine establishment is driven by a superb water power. . . . Mr. Black is manufacturing bedsteads, tables, stands, what-nots, towel racks, etc. His goods run through many grades from the common styles up. He has many unique and original designs of his own for his finer furniture.

"He has a large lathe for turning his rolls (the only one of this kind in this region) whereby the

cost of turning is reduced 75 per cent. The finest pattern of a child's bedsteads I have anywhere seen has just been introduced here by Mr. Black. It is very elaborate, both in design and finish. . . . His scroll work is exceedingly fine and tasteful. His yards are heavily stocked with the most perfect seasoned walnut lumber to be found anywhere in western Michigan. His goods find a ready market in the south and west. Thirty skilled workmen are employed in his factory. Most of his goods are finished in the white. . . . He is a master in this line of work.

"I saw in this factory the finest style of card table I have ever found in the market. In its variety Mr. Black's stock is unrivaled."

Buchanan Wagon-Manufacturing Company

"This is a stock company of local capitalists with B. E. Binn as president, O. W. Rose, treasurer; J. H. Richards, secretary; H. T. Briggs, superintendent. Their main building is a four-story brick, 48x127 feet, with a blacksmith shop 60 feet long and large storerooms adjoining. They employ 50 men and turned out last year 1,500 lumber wagons and 200 spring wagons and carriages. Their carriages are of superior finish, and are worth from \$175 to \$300.

"The timber used in this factory is of the best quality, none other is allowed in their work. In the fourth story I saw 6,000 sets of gearing from one to two years old, thoroughly seasoned, tough as were ever put into a vehicle and ready for the finishing stroke of the working. All lumber is kiln-dried before using. Their spokes, felloes (outer wooden rim of wheel supporting steel tire), and hubs are saturated with oil before painting, so that for years there can be no shrinkage or necessity for tire-setting."

Manufacturing Works of Richards & Fox

"Richards & Fox are working on the New England plan, with a large variety of articles in stock for the trade of agents. They are quick to take hold of anything which finds general use and consequent demand. They are patentees and owners of the Luther Carpet Sweeper, the simplest and most effective device for the purpose. Any active lady could sell these by the score in any town in the country. They are also making Valley's Patent Reversible Clothes Bar, a portable folding ironing table. It is shaped so that the leaf or platform may be slipped into a shirt or dress very conveniently, saving an immense amount of perplexity and labor in heavy or fine ironing. It also saves spoiling the

tea-table."

The next chapter will treat of the working conditions, wages, hours and other aspects of the Wooden Age of Manufacturing, also of the large printing industry here then, and the Zinc Collar & Pad factory, a major enterprise in Buchanan for 60 years.

Legislature Enacts New Laws Affecting Local Government

Improved employee retirement plans, authority for counties to band together for flood control projects and a basic state grant of \$5,000 to county health departments headed the list of new laws passed by the Legislature affecting local governments in Michigan.

Under the new retirements law, municipal and county employees can draw \$2,200 pensions yearly, compared with the present \$1,800.

Three or more counties may join together to build flood control projects as a step to prevent flood damage.

Other important new laws in the field of local government are:

Counties may levy a 1/10th of a mill tax for construction of medical care facilities, with state cooperation, for care of aged persons in their home communities. This is part of a new social program to care for the aged near their families and friends instead of committing them to mental hospitals.

Municipal utilities in 47 counties were allowed to issue revenue bonds, without a referendum, for plant expansion.

Mayors may appoint civil defense directors.

Townships can hire attorneys for civil and zoning cases. Sheriff's fees for service of process were increased in line with costs.

Counties may destroy old tax records. Sheriffs may purchase one bond to cover all deputies.

Boards of supervisors may set salaries of court stenographers. Cities and townships may pay drain bonds if drain tax collections fail.

Police and firemen may make their widows eligible for pension rights.

Mental patients are a county charge for one year, whether committed as a public patient or not.
