



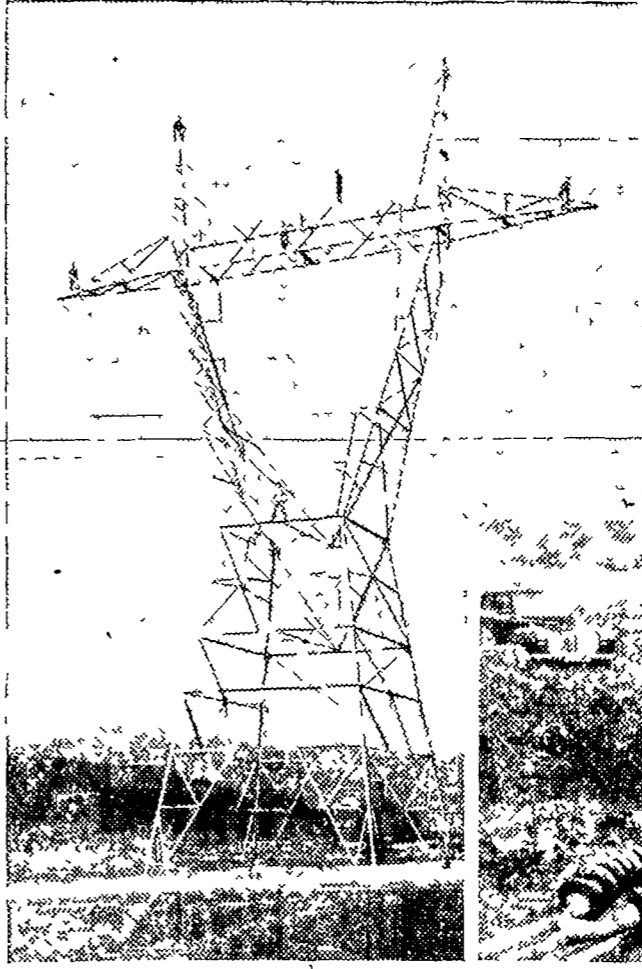

World's Mightiest Transmission Line

Test Begins on 500,000-Volt Line—Designed to Improve Electric Power Transmission

Brilliant, Ohio, October 1—Accompanied by a group of engineers from Indiana & Michigan Electric Co., Mr. J. G. Mooney, Vice President, participated today in the making of tests on the recently completed experimental transmission line constructed near this community along the banks of the Ohio River, ten miles south of Steubenville. A half million volts of electricity—mightiest electrical pressure ever used on a transmission line—surged today along this new high-voltage "superhighway" beginning tests which may lead to more economical transmission of electricity to the nation's industrial and residential centers.

On this electrical "superhighway"—actually three separate high-voltage transmission test lines—engineers hope to find means of sending more electricity more economically than ever before.

The research program was touched off in brief ceremonies before a group of newspapermen, editors of electrical trade publications, officials of the cooperating companies, and state and federal regulatory authorities by Mr. Philip Sporn, President of the American Gas and Electric Service Corporation. Standing within an observation tower high above the ground, he operated the controls that boosted an initial supply voltage of 69,000 volts up to 500,000 volts, which is the highest voltage that has ever been imposed on an actual transmission line in the history of the world.

The mammoth "outdoor laboratory" stretching for a mile and a half, and using full scale equipment, was built as a joint undertaking by the companies in the Central System of the American Gas and Electric Company, which include Indiana & Michigan Electric Co. Participating in the project, and aiding in the design of equipment are a group of cooperating manufacturing companies including the Westinghouse Electric Corporation, American Bridge Company, Ohio Brass Company, Locke-Insulator Corporation, Aluminum Company of America, General Cable Company, Anaconda Wire & Cable Company, and General Electric Company. These companies supplied the apparatus, cable, towers, and measuring instruments necessary to carry out a long-range research program.

Test Program Objectives

Engineers of the American Gas and Electric Service Corporation will carry out the actual tests with the assistance of the participating companies' engineers. The results will become immediately available to all companies cooperating in the program, and as soon as possible thereafter to all industry.

Describing the objectives of the program, Mr. Sporn said: "Higher transmission voltages will permit greater interchange of power between systems, will result in greater economies and will reduce the number of generators that the interconnected systems must keep in reserve.

"To transmit the larger blocks of power which expansion in use makes necessary will require higher voltages, electrical pressure this might be anything up to 500,000 volts. Nothing like that has ever been tried in this country and, up to now, we have suffered from a definite lack of technical knowledge on the subject.

"With our new test facilities we expect to get this information. We expect it will be enough to enable us to design and build higher voltage lines precisely enough, to transmit electric power more economically to fill our rapidly expanding industrial and residential needs."

Power for the test lines is supplied by the Ohio Power Company's nearby Tadd Station and is raised to the necessary high voltage by a bank of three huge transformers at the test site. For the tests, the voltage can be varied in 24 steps from 264,500 to 500,000 volts.

The actual laboratory includes three test lines. Two are a mile and a half long and the third is 800 feet. The two long lines will be used for long duration "corona" tests and the other for preliminary tests on characteristics of various kinds of conductors.

Instruments mounted in aluminum boxes atop the porcelain transformer bushings at eye level from the observation booth will record the progress of the tests. The instruments can be read directly, with the aid of a high-power telescope and can record results over a long period of time by writing automatically with a mechanical pen on a constantly moving sheet of graph paper. The slowly moving motors permit studies over days or weeks.

Companies Pooled Resources

The new test line and the entire project is a splendid example of cooperation between the constituent companies of one of the country's large and privately owned integrated power systems on the one hand and a group of progressive privately owned manufacturers on the other. By pooling resources it has been possible to set up unparalleled research facilities at the least possible cost to any one company. Eventually the public will benefit from any transmission improvements discovered.

Up to now the highest voltage used in this country was 287,500 volts. Until relatively recently engineers have felt that this is the limit that could be economically used.

Believe Higher Voltages Practical

It is now believed, however, that higher voltages—somewhere between 287,000 and 450,000—are economically practical. If the tests prove that they are then larger amounts of power can be sent from generating sites into the cities and industrial areas without too much loss along the way.

Specifically, the problem boils down not so much to the amount of power that can be transmitted or the distance that it can be sent but to the reliability of transmission and the cost of construction and operation of a superhigh-voltage line designed along new ideas in conductors spacing and insulation. Here, for the first time, an opportunity is provided for studying such a line in full-scale operation under all sorts of atmospheric conditions including rain, fog, sleet, hail, and snow. Important results for the electric power industry are expected from this research program, which it is estimated will extend over a period of at least three years.
