Shepherd Found 18 Hours After Hurt Is Incurred

Howard Shepherd, 39, resident of Bakerstown and an employee as yard man at the metal salvage yard of Philip Frank on Oak street, was found helpless in his car in the Newton Woods by Sheriff Edgard Probst of Cass county about 10 a.m. Sunday, having been there helpless with a rifle bullet shot through the body for over 18 hours.

Shepherd is now under treatment in Lee Memorial hospital, Dowagiac, where he is reported to be in good condition. His injury is a wound through the flesh on the left side of the body in the region of the abdomen. The .22 rifle ball entered his body under the left ribs, but above the hip. It traversed a considerable extent of flesh but did not touch any vital organ.

Shepherd went out at once, accompanied by aid and a stretcher. He had placed a call for ambulance aid before starting. Shepherd was weak from exposure and loss of blood but after he had been helped from the car he was able to walk to the stretcher.

Probst said that Shepherd told him he had been seated in his car by the side of the road in the woods shooting crows. Between 7 and 8 p.m. Saturday evening he stated that he had decided to quit and was putting his gun under the seat when it was accidentally discharged. Sheriff Probst stated that the angle at which the bullet traversed his body made accident seem doubtful. The bullet emerged from his back at the same height that it entered the front, and lodged in the cushion of the car at about the same height, indicating that the ball had been fired from a gun level with the man's body and nearly horizontal, Probst stated.

Shepherd made his home in one of the tourist cabins at Bakerstown. He was a single man and lived alone. He had worked for Philip Frank twelve years. His mother, Mrs. Maggie Shepherd, lives in Buchanan, as do also three brothers, Gene, Jim and Chester, the latter a former member of the Buchanan police.

Emory J. Rough, Son of Pioneers Dies at Age of 75

Emory J. Rough, a son of the pioneers and a resident of the Buchanan district during his entire lifetime, died at 1:30 p.m. Thursday at his home at 208 Moccasin avenue, after an illness of several months.

He was born Dec. 7, 1872 on Portage Prairie, the son of George W. and Malinda Broseus. Rough's birthplace was the Rough homestead, four miles southwest of Niles on the old Chicago Road. It is now the home of Mr and Mrs Maynard Polley.

He attended Womer school and the Niles school. He married Nettie Wynne on Feb. 1, 1906. He bought the farm adjoining the homestead on the east and they lived there several years. Later he bought the old Charles Howe farm, two miles south of Buchanan on the Portage Road and operated that place for forty years. He came to town for a seven-year interval, building and occupying the home at 104 Lake St., now owned by Walter Hackling.

In October, 1946, Mr. Rough sold the farm and bought the residence at 208 Moccasin from Miss Mary King, and had lived there since. At that time growing ill, he had obliged him to ease up in the hard work of the farm. However, the energetic habits of a lifetime were hard to break off and he was still assisting the work of handling the fruit crop last summer. He was a very successful fruit grower, to which he devoted most of his life.


"Who is this man?"


