## Commission Sets Date For Budget Hearings

Buchanan's proposed 1968-69 budget, totaling \$482,550, will be the subject of a public hearing Monday, May 27, at 7:30 in city commission chambers.

City Commissioners set the public hearing at their regular meeting, Monday.

The new budget shows an increase of \$76,365, or 16 per cent over last year's budget but, is based on the same 12 mill levy.

Buchanan experienced a large increase in assessed valuation for the second year, totaling \$2,790,800 primarily because of a large increase in personal property. The increase in assessed valuation will yield approximately \$32,650 at 97.5 per cent collection and accounts for the lack of millage increase.

In his report to commissioners, City Manager Daryl Tammen pointed out that no tax levy is required in 1968-69 for debt retirement. "The city," he said, "will have paid all of the outstanding special assessment debt and general obligation debt by December 1, 1968." He added that funds remain in the debt retirement account to pay the remaining debt.

### Sidewalk Program Continues

Commissioners accepted the recommendation of Tammen and instructed George Burgoyne, city code enforcement officer, to complete a survey of sidewalks in the city and to notify property owners who have not yet taken action to improve public sidewalks adjacent to their property which are hazardous and need repair. The commission set a deadline of September 1 for these improvements. Property owners

who have not made arrangements for sidewalk improvement by that date will be included in a special assessment district to force needed repairs. Preliminary plans call for 30-day payment for work which will be done by special assessment with the entire payment due at that time. No special financing will be available in the special districts.

### Reduce Northeast Assessment

The commission voted to decrease the Northeast Area Sanitary sewer assessment district roll from \$123,572 to \$106,884.45 because of the deletion of a portion of the sanitary sewer which was to have been installed on West Bluff Street.

### New Lights Set

Additional mercury vapor street light purchases were approved Monday night to fill out the street light improvement project which began in 1967. The city manager will move to purchase 34 20,000 lumen lights which will be installed in the

periphery of the downtown area and on West Front street. The city will also install 26 50,000 lumen lights to replace existing lights in the city parking lot and the remaining lights on East Front street.

The cost of the proposed street lights will be an additional \$230 per month over the present street light cost. However, the city will be receiving twice the lighting effectiveness now received under the present arrangement.

### Additional Business

In other action, the Commission

heard the first reading of an ordinance to rezone property at 513 West Front street, under option by Robert S. Malone, from R-1, single family residential, to R-3, multi family residential.

denied the request of Steve Rudoni, 102 S. Portage St., to purchase an L-shaped parcel of land located at the rear of his. See CITY, Page 3.

## Bertrand Board Closes Door For Rezoning Request Study

Members of the Bertrand township zoning board will meet in executive session Friday at 7:30 p.m. to study a rezoning request by Richard L. Hurd which has brought strong protests from residents of Bertrand and neighboring Buchanan township.

Heiman M. Hoekstra, chairman of the zoning board, said the committee would study the request of Richard L. Hurd that 83.78 acres situated on the south side of Chamberlain road and west of the railroad viaduct be rezoned from residential-agricultural to commercial. The request was made to permit use as a private recreation area.

The closed session follows a public hearing by the zoning board held Thursday, May 9, in the township hall. At this meeting, a petition signed by more than 60 Bertrand residents opposing the request was presented. Buchanan township residents living on the border road were also present.

### Other Opposition

At their last meeting, the Buchanan township board approved a letter of recommendation to the Bertrand zoning board also opposing the rezoning request on the basis that all of the property in the township which borders Bertrand on Chamberlain road is zoned residential and to deviate from this zoning would create problems.

Since the Bertrand public hearing, Buchanan zoning board chairman Ken Huston has petitioned for a joint meeting of the two township zoning groups to discuss the request.

### Recommendations to Come

Hoekstra said the Bertrand zoning board would study the rezoning request and communications from Buchanan township and would make recommendations to township supervisor Brayton Yaw following the closed door session.

Representing Hurd as counsel is Frank William Kelley, Buchanan attorney Phillip A. Hadsell, Jr., Niles, is attorney for John Dale who owns property west of Hurd and who represents the initial opposition to the request for rezoning. Both attorneys were present at the open hearing.

Incumbent school board members LeRoy Williams and Doughten have chosen not to seek re-election. Williams has served one-four year term and Doughten finishes nine years which is made up of two four-year terms and a portion of an unexpired term to which he was appointed.

Mr and Mrs Nelson opened one of the first self-service laundries in the county in 1918 in Berrien Springs where it is still operated in the same location. Mr Nelson is also responsible for the laundry services in dormitories at Andrews university.

Mrs. Orval G. Newport and her late husband formerly owned the laundromat.



## Weather Warms Crop Prospects

With temperatures beginning to moderate, Buchanan area growers are holding out hope of better crop yields than anticipated in the wake of the hard frost of May 6.

Normal or near normal readings prevailed over the southwestern section of the state during the last week. Precipitation was confined to a few sprinkles at mid week and again late in the week. Precipitation totals have averaged from one-third to one-half of the normally expected amounts resulting in quite dry top soil conditions throughout most of this area.

### Losses Checked

Losses from the May 6 frost were heaviest in the Berrien county area and relatively light in other areas of the state. For apples, the red delicious variety suffered the most damage while Spies appear to have come through with a fair to good crop prospect.

Peach damage was light on good sites in the Berrien county area. Most of the state's crop is produced here. See CROPE, Page 3

Tart cherry prospects are poor in the county but continue to look good in the important northwestern Michigan area. The Berrien-Van Buren area cherry yield will probably be below last year's. But crop sweet cherries were hurt more than tart with few left except on the best sites. Prospects in the important northwestern counties remain good except on poor sites.

Pear and plum prospects are poor in Berrien and Van Buren counties.

**Growth Noted**  
Fruits are described by the Michigan Crop Reporting service as being in the petal fall to shuck split stage in the southwestern counties.

Growers in the Buchanan area are reporting most tree fruits are about equal to calendar dates. Strawberries may still be about one week ahead. If a warming trend should take place, growers may get a May 25 start on strawberries.

Muskegon county agriculture reporters say strawberries were extremely hard hit by frost with some fields entirely gone. Some fruit trees in the northern county are 50 per cent damaged including prunes and cherries. Apples suffered only partial damage.



## Pony Leaguers Set Projects



## Steffen Lists Eleven Points For Top Teams

"The attitude and morale of a town," he said, "can well determine the success of a school's team." He pointed out that he felt a team could be successful without being victorious. "Each team," he added, "has a potential. If they play to that potential they are successful."

In closing, Steffen paid tribute to William Burkett, Lawrence "Shorty" Decker and former Buck basketball coach Ray Berry for their help while he was a coach in Buchanan.


