1954 Fireworks Really Were A Dinger

The sixth annual Independence Day fireworks celebration under Buchanan Business Association auspices has come and gone leaving behind a general impression that it was the most successful, the most enjoyable, and by far the best attended of the series to date.

At least estimated thousands of cars and several thousand people swarmed over Memorial Field, and many hundreds more who came in cars or walked were packed along the edges of the high school grounds on the hill above the field. If public response was any evidence the fireworks were the best ever. Even the Man in the Moon remained an extra half hour before dropping below the trees on the western side of the field.

The Buchanan police and representatives of the sheriff's office managed the traffic out of the field, while helpers enlisted from the Junior Chamber of Commerce the parking in the field.

Chairman Jack Wilson was in charge of discharging the aerial pieces, which were especially effective with reference to the audience as they loomed from the hill south of Smith street into the Russell pasture at the south end of Memorial Field. The angle of vision was effective display and easy on the eyes. Jack's helpers were Bob Ewers, Dale Florey and Arlie Boyer.

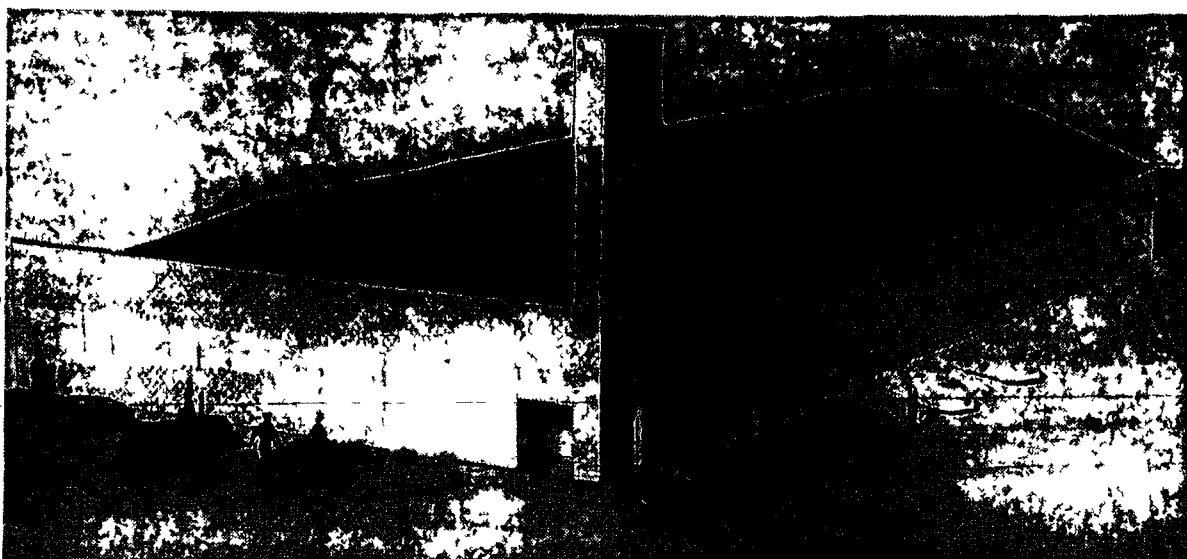
The field pieces were fired from the usual position on the hill back of and to the south of the football stadium, with Don Roti, Don Stubbs, Bela Woodworth and Joe Sexton in charge. The crowd was delighted particularly with the "surprise pieces", which burst into figured flames again and again. The vocal response in "ohs" and "ahs" and waves of hand-clapping exceeded anything of the sort in previous celebrations.

Elect Board For Community Hospital Here

Bela Woodworth Elected President Of The Board

At a meeting of the board of trustees of the Buchanan Community Hospital Friday evening in the campaign headquarters at 113 1/2 North Main street, Bela Woodworth, was elected president of the board.

Other officers elected were Dr. George O'Malley, Gahen, vice-president; Dr. Leslie L. Crosby, Buchanan secretary and administration; Mrs. Grace Weaver, Buchanan Township, treasurer. The building and finance committee includes Dr. A. F. Kull and Dr. F. A. Turfner, South Bend, Dr. Crosby, Mrs. Weaver and Mr. Woodworth. By-laws were adopted and plans made for the building and finance committee to make the necessary arrangements for the construction of the hospital. Because of complications the plans to erect the hospital on a three-acre plot of ground on West Fourth street, donated by Mrs. Esther Nelson, have been abandoned, and property has been acquired adjacent to the new Buchanan Township hall, about one-half mile north of Buchanan on the Main street road. At present nearly \$100,000 has been received or pledged for the new hospital and work will start as soon as bids are let. The hospital is to be a one-story building with a 33-bed capacity and will be a fire-proof structure.

Board, Committee Meet For Final Plans New Library

Wayne Castle, chairman of the Buchanan Library Building Fund, Inc., states that his organization has progressed in its fund-building capacity to the place where the possibility of a new library is reasonably assured.

As a consequence it has authorized the committee's architect, Roy Warren Associates of South Bend, to draw another set of plans which will include the suggestions agreed on at a joint meeting of the committee and board, with the purpose of arriving at agreements which will form the basis of the final plans for construction.

Chairman Castle reports that while money received thus far is far short of the estimated amount needed to build and equip a library, the total is nevertheless very encouraging and the committee is now confident that the project is an ultimate possibility. A considerable incentive has been created by the incorporation of the fund-raising committee which makes it possible to give money to the library-building project tax-free.

Falling Trees Black Out City Lights 2 Hours

Buildings Luckily Escape With No Major Damages Reported

The entire city of Buchanan, with the exception of the Clark Equipment plant area, was without power or lights for two hours, from 8:45 to 10:45 Tuesday evening, as the result of falling trees across wires during a heavy rain accompanied by wind.

A tree on the lot of Philip Hanlin at 313 West 4th street crashed down on main circuit lines and at the same time a heavy limb fell across main circuit wires at the Arthur Young home at 405 East Smith street, the combination blacking out the town until trees were removed. The result was a maximum of inconvenience but a minimum of disaster. No great number of trees or tree sections fell, and those that fell fortunately did no heavy residential damage. It was necessary for the I & M force to black out a limited section of the northwest part of Buchanan from about 2 a. m. to 6:45 a. m. until the offending trees were entirely out of the way.

A report from Niles after the storm stated that lights were off in the business section there following the storm but remained on in all residence and industrial sections.

At New Buffalo four trees fell across power wires on Mechanics Street, shutting off all electric service in that village.

Several local men who were watching the skies as the rain began said that boiling black clouds were racing west, while the wind was blowing east at the ground level.

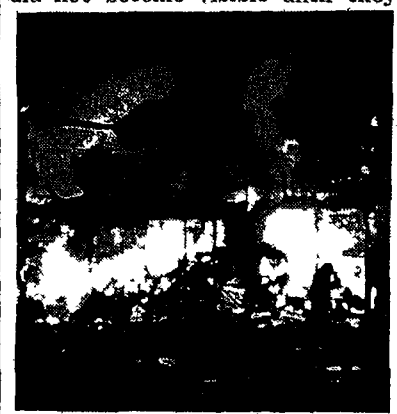

Barn Destroyed By Lightning On Kelsey Hill

A barn and all contents was destroyed by fire from a lightning bolt on the farm of Homer J. Postlewaite (Lansing, Ill.) farm a half mile west of the Range Line school on the Kelsey Hill during the heavy storm Tuesday evening. The fire was discovered by Mrs. Joseph Smith, wife of the tenant, about ten minutes after the bolt hit. The flames had started in some piled straw in the loft, in which there were no windows, and did not become visible until they



had burned through the front of the barn.

The Buchanan fire department was called and acting chief Earl Cramer and firemen went out in the township truck. The entire barn was ablaze when they arrived, but they saved another barn located about 15 feet from it. The only property saved from the barn was a truck load of hay on the first floor, which Smith had time to drive out. The loss included the straw and hay in the loft, a new milking machine and \$1,500 in tools and electric motors in Smith's workshop in the barn.

The barn was 30x40 feet in dimension, with a basement, a ground floor and a loft. A number of hogs which bedded down in the barn but had the run of a fenced yard left the building of their own accord when the fire started. No estimate had been made on the extent of the damage cost when the Record went to press.

Mrs. Smith stated it is apparent that some of the current entered the house through electric wires, damaging a kitchen range.

3.60 In. Rain In Week May Mean Soggy Wheat Crop

While the heavy wind which accompanied the Tuesday night storm flattened much of the oats and also considerable wheat straw, the chief damage of the storm to farmers of the Buchanan area was the heavy downpour of water, totaling 2.62 inches at the Buchanan Co-ops recording station. With previous recordings totalling .98 inches during the week-end, the week's total is 3.60 inches.

The wheat had been ripening rapidly with plenty of moisture available to mature the grain. Only a drought from now on until after the grain is combined will now save the wheat from being graded down because of moisture content, states Robert Koenigshof, manager of Buchanan Co-ops. Wheat which would have doubtless graded 60 pounds to the bushel, drawing the top market price, will now be more likely to grade 56 pounds to the bushel.

The rain will of course help some other crops, such as the hay fields that have been mown and pastures, and will extend the moisture supply of corn which is now more than waist high and beginning to tassel in some fields.

Wind and Rain Causes Some Fruit Drop

Fruit growers reported Tuesday morning that they had not fully examined total loss, but the wind had blown some off. Mrs. Glenn Kinney stated that the tops of a number of cherry trees had been broken out and that there had been quite a drop from the wind.

The sour and sweet cherry harvest was in full swing.

On Monday J. G. Boyle stated that he had a very fair Montmorency sour cherry crop which his son has contracted to the canneries at 14 cents a pound picked. The picking price is 3c a pound. A crop of less than 50% is estimated for Michigan, which produces on the average about 52% of the sour cherry crop of the United States.

Charles Wesner Elected As Buchanan Township Fire Chief

Volunteer Firemen Organized Into Neighborhood Groups For Fire Fighting

Organization of a Buchanan Township fire fighting force began Tuesday at a meeting of about 40 township residents, most of them in answer to advertisement calling for volunteers, held at the Buchanan Co-ops auditorium.

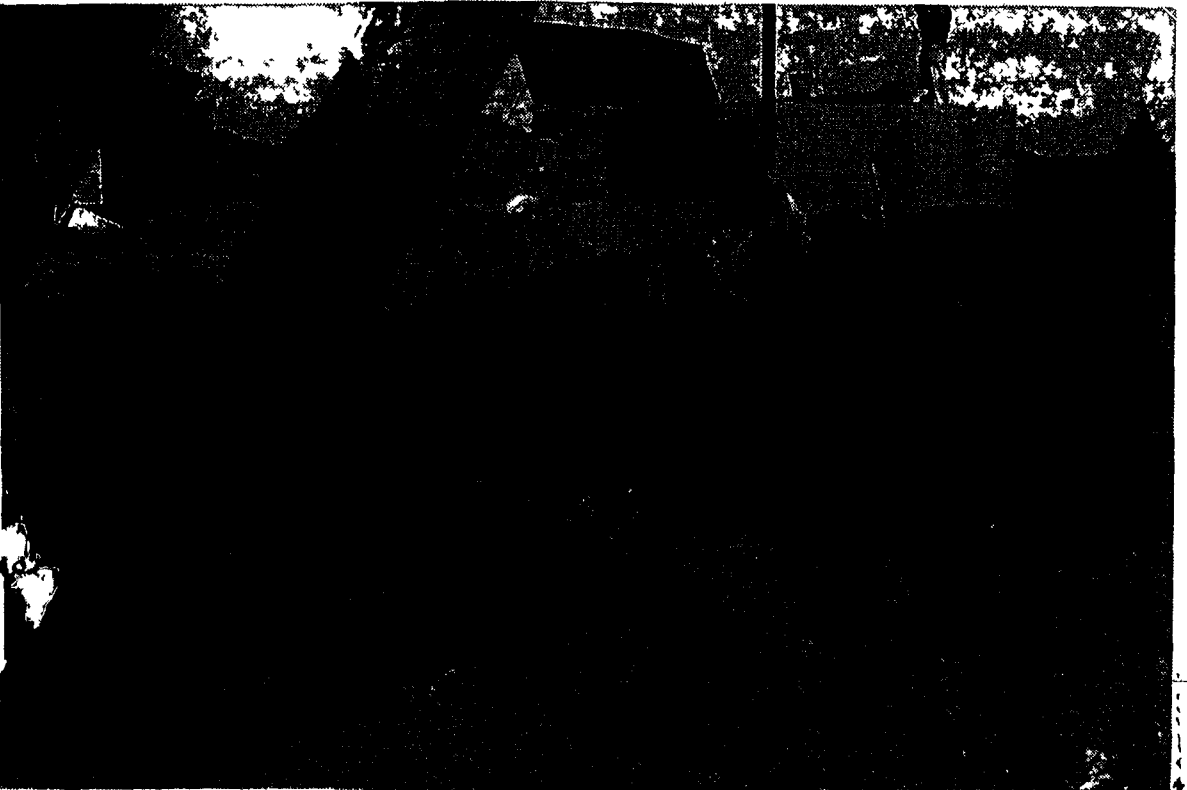
The first business was the election of Charles Wesner as fire chief. Wesner, Buchanan postmaster, is a resident of the township. He served as a volunteer fireman in Buchanan for twelve years, resigning in 1952.

Wesner stated the first step will be to organize the volunteers into groups of six to eight each, based on "nearness" of residence. Each of these groups will receive group training in handling the fire equipment, with the idea that the members of such groups will be the first called for fires in their own neighborhood—except of course in the case of those who will drive the fire truck.

The township located the hall and fire station very wisely on north Main street, where there are quite a number of young men interested in volunteer service. Ten young men live within a quarter of a mile of the station and several more live within a half mile.

Men from this group will be trained in driving and the preliminary work of fire defense, with the emphasis "doing first things first and doing them quickly," said Fire Chief Wesner.

It is expected that the building, including the fire station, will be completed in from six to eight weeks. In the meantime every effort will be made to train the fire-fighting force, perhaps by securing instruction classes through Fire Chief Shephardson of Benton Harbor, who has conducted a number of such schools, and by advice and aid of the Buchanan city department.

Court house round-up

St. Joseph, Mich.—Shades of the Kentucky Hills!

In the course of daily sessions, the Berrien County Circuit court this week that has no precedent in recent years—bootlegging.

But there was one before the court this week that has no precedent in recent years—bootlegging. The case dated back to June 9, 1953, when Berrien Sheriff's deputies—not the traditional "re-shooters"—arrested Charlie Lee Allen, 40, rt. 2, Berrien Springs, for selling two gallons of corn whiskey to another Berrien Springs man.

Allen later pleaded guilty and this week Circuit Judge Thomas M. Robinson, Sr. placed him on two years probation and assessed him \$240 in fine and costs, many times what Allen had netted from his own "laughin' water" concoction.

At least the confessed moon-shiner won't be viewing the moon-shine through the bars of a prison cell, though.

The four-sided race this fall for two Berrien county circuit judgeships has the Berrien Bar association in a quandry these days.

Traditionally, the organization has maintained a no political policy regarding candidates for judgeships—out of deference to each other, if nothing else.

But traditionally, only attorneys have ever tried to gain a seat on the highest bench in the county. That's the way Bar association thinks it should be, for who but an attorney is better qualified to preside over legal battles they say.

This year, one of the four candidates for circuit judge, however, is not an attorney either by degree or practice. He is Malcolm Hatfield, presently and for the past 22 years the Berrien county probate judge.

Hatfield thinks his long tenure and service as a probate judge qualifies him for the circuit bench. The Bar association is not sure it agrees, and if it doesn't agree, should it come out openly against Hatfield's candidacy?

That has its disadvantages too. For the attorneys who make up the bar association would still have to practice before the probate court if Hatfield was defeated as circuit judge.

The quandry led Atty. Philip A. Haddel, Sr., of Niles, another of the four candidates in the judgeship race, to resign his position as current president of the Bar Association.

The bar association went so far as to meet this week to discuss the situation.

Meanwhile, this much was made

clear this week about the race for circuit judge in Berrien county. There will be no August 3 primary.

With no more than two candidates in the field for each of the two bench posts, Secretary of State Owen J. Cleary ruled this week that no primary is necessary. The judge race will be decided quickly and finally in the November general election—on a nonpartisan ballot, of course.

The jury panel sat ready to be drawn. The judge sat ready to mount his bench. Plaintiffs and defendants sat ready to fight.

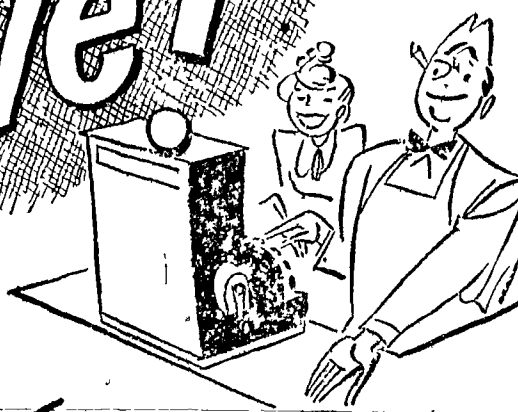
Hauch placed the \$100,000 valuation on his left leg, which he contended had to be amputated as a result of the crash. He charged that Cottrell was responsible for the crash alleging that the trucker had run a red light at the intersection.

Cottrell subsequently pleaded guilty to a felonious driving charge stemming from the crash. Attorneys for both sides refused to reveal the amount of the settlement. The jury went home without having a chance to decide how much a left leg is worth.

Wheat Growers Vote On Quota Program In Michigan July 23

July 23, 1954, is the date when Michigan wheat growers will vote on a referendum to determine whether or not the wheat marketing quota program will continue in operation for the 1955 wheat crop. This in effect is the decision which wheat growers will make in the coming wheat referendum, says Bruce Clothier, chairman of the Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Clothier points out in compliance with the law, Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has proclaimed marketing quotas for the 1955 wheat crop. The marketing quota program will be in effect if it is approved by at least two-thirds of the wheat growers voting in the July 23 referendum. If the quota program is approved, growers who plant within their 1955 acreage allotment will be eligible to market their 1955 wheat free of a marketing penalty.

Clothier also explains that if the vote in the referendum is favorable wheat growers who exceed their allotment will be subject to a 45 per-cent-of-parity penalty on their excess wheat. If the vote is unfavorable there will be no penalty.

To be eligible for price support on any crop produced on the farm in 1955 the producer must comply with all acreage allotments established for his farm for that year. On farms where the crop allotments call for a diverted acreage of more than 10 acres, a total acreage allotment will be established for the farm and, in that case, the farmer must stay within that total as well as individual crop allotments to be eligible for price support.

In making his allotment proclamation, Secretary Benson stated that "The long range interest of agriculture and the national economy will best be served when we can have less—and not more—government regulation and control." He added, however, that under present conditions "we have no immediate choice. With approximately a two-years' supply of wheat expected to be on hand when this year's crop is harvested, there is no question at all about the requirement for marketing quotas and the establishment of a national wheat acreage allotment at the level prescribed by law."

Referring to the "cross-compliance" requirement, making it necessary for the farmer to stay within all acreage allotments established for his farm to be eligible for price support, the Secretary said "Neither is there any question about the need to require cross-compliance with established acreage allotments. It does not make sense to encourage the building of new problems through the unwise shifting of acres from one surplus to another."

Chairman Clothier advises that conveniently located referendum polling places will be announced in advance of the referendum. In the referendum conducted a year ago, for the crops now being harvested, the vote was 390,221 to 57,536. By special act of congress the acreage allotment for the 1954 crop was set at 62 million acres. The allotment for the 1955 crop is 55 million, the minimum acreage permitted under the law.

Mrs. Blanche Fredrickson, better known to people of Buchanan as the widow of the late Dr. Harold C. Fredrickson, died in the Bundy Nursing Home in Bertrand at 7:30 a. m. Sunday, July 4, 1954, following a long illness. She was born Aug. 14, 1884, the daughter of Thomas and Clara McQuiston, at Elkhart, Ind. She married Harold Fredrickson in Chicago June 28, 1913. He died in 1948.

They came to Buchanan from Chicago in 1934. Mrs. Fredrickson had been in ill health for some years before the death of her husband. She was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star. Survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Etta Cramer of Bryan, O., and Mrs. Ruby Irvine of Buchanan, by

City Commences Landfill Method For Rubbish Disposal

Sanitary Landfill Program Begun For Garbage Disposal Last Fall

Quite soon the city of Buchanan should hold an "open house" to all residents of the municipality, at the city dump.

"Fine place for an open house!" you're saying. Just wait.

Right now there is a sanitary revolution in progress in methods of disposing of city garbage and rubbish. The city of Buchanan started last fall to use the sanitary landfill system for garbage disposal. This is primarily the disposal of garbage by the use of modern dirt-moving equipment. Use of landfills, incinerators and other methods have been hastened by the rash of new state laws prohibiting the feeding of raw garbage to hogs. The reason for the enactment of the laws is the recent discovery that the incidence of trichinosis is several times greater, in hogs fed raw garbage than in those that are not.

Buchanan's landfill garbage disposal is being done immediately east and across the marsh from the city dump. The city hired a crane to dig a trench 20 feet wide, 200 feet long and about seven feet deep. The city garbage trucks then made its daily haul there, starting the dumping process at the north end of the trench, next to the entrance road.

The garbage was leveled to around three feet, after which a loader walled back and forth over it, flattening and compacting it. Then the city front-end loader dumped about two feet of dirt on top of it and again the loader went to work packing the dirt hard, so that rodents were not likely to burrow through. This resulted in a layer of garbage and dirt about 3½ to 4 feet thick.

This was continued until the first layer was spread the full extent of the 20x200 foot area. Then another layer the same depth was started at the north end of the strip next to the entrance road and has continued almost to the south end. Anyone not familiar with what is going on might very well think that the strip was the dirt base of a new avenue.

The buying of the rubbish by landfill was delayed, because though very unsightly, it does not present any great menace to health. Failure to thoroughly rinse clean the tin fruit and vegetable cans will attract a certain amount of flies and vermin but this is no basis of large infection.

Considering the extent of twenty years of dumping, it will take a large amount of dirt, and the city waits until it has a problem of dirt removal which this will solve. Last week the city began making a cut to lower the grade of the hill on Ryerson street east of Liberty street, and is hauling the dirt from this source to the rubbish dump, where bulldozers will push it over the edges.

The slope of the dump has been leveled and cleaned off and an immense improvement in appearance has already been made. The landfill is considered one of the most sanitary and economical methods of disposing of garbage. The hard-packed layers of dirt above the buried garbage eliminate the rat and fly nuisances and prevent the occasional fires with dense clouds of smoke that frequently happened in the old days. Also the landfill can be made in or near the municipality if land is available. It is much cheaper

than disposal by burning in huge incinerators, if sufficient land is available nearby. Landfill becomes expensive when it is made several miles from town, so that trucks must travel there, consuming the time of paid workmen in addition to the additional mileage and truck wear. Larger towns using the system buy extra larger trucks, into which the loads of the collecting garbage trucks are shifted for the long hauls. However many larger cities in Michigan are compelled to use incinerators, as the high cost of land, plus the distance of the haul, makes landfill impossible. Instances of extreme expedients

have occurred in Los Angeles where the housewives were induced to buy small garbage grinders and then to dispose of the ground result by way of the sewers. Housewives were reported to have made a large response, but the ground garbage nearly doubled the load of the city sewage disposal plants, at a huge expense in extra plant and processing.

sery of Niles to lay it out and do the planting. Huntzinger came and planted it in various ways by means of stakes and string, until Joe finally bought a plan. The nursery then planted the garden, which Joe has varied to suit his taste since.

In front remain the two beautiful blue spruce, now 15 feet high and flanking each side of the walk. They were planted by Ernest Hoffman. Practically all of the remainder is new planting.

The largest section is on the south side of the house where 78 flowering shrubs, including Michigan dogwood, are planted along the south fence and on the south side of the house, mixed so that new blooms are coming on through the summer. Between the lawn and shrubbery in graceful curves are borders of perennials coming the season long. In all sections of the gardens there are about 150 flowering shrubs and dwarf trees.

A small plot for a vegetable and herb garden is set off by shrubs in the northeast corner. There are plantings of both common and rare herbs for salads, including two varieties of Italian zucchini, which are shaped like cucumbers but are mellow in taste. Lusciously tender lettuce stands 6 to 8 inches high, and a row of delicate basil edges the west side.

Joe is the garden's sole caretaker, doctor and nurse. Last year he tried chemicals to kill out crabgrass. The dust got some of his flowers. So he spent his spare time the remainder of the summer digging it out by hand. There's not a blade of crabgrass this summer. He tried using a power mower. The blade gouged his lawn a little. Now he has a push mower. It's not hard work if you keep the mower sharp and the grass short.

Creating a garden like the one Joe has requires plenty of time—and a green hand. Joe has both. He does not go to the store Tuesdays and Thursdays, and every other weekday he works at least two hours in the evening, if rain or some other uncontrollable factor does not prevent.

Grass Clippings Best Left On Lawn Says Expert

Allow the grass clippings when you mow the lawn to fall back upon the lawn, was the advice on this controversial question. But Ferris, superintendent of the grounds department, MSC, said the grass clippings will act as a mulch, and will return plant foods and organic matter to the soil. In general the best time to seed lawns in the lower peninsula is between Aug. 15 and Sept. 1.

Four simple steps to assure a good lawn are: use good seed and proper fertilizer, then water it constantly and keep it clipped.

Mr. Ferris advised the use of a 12-6-6 fertilizer combination, to be applied through two or three light applications in the early spring, and then to follow with two or three light applications in the late fall.

society of Buchanan in the 1870's had an undercurrent of lawlessness against which men defended themselves and their homes pretty much without benefit of police.

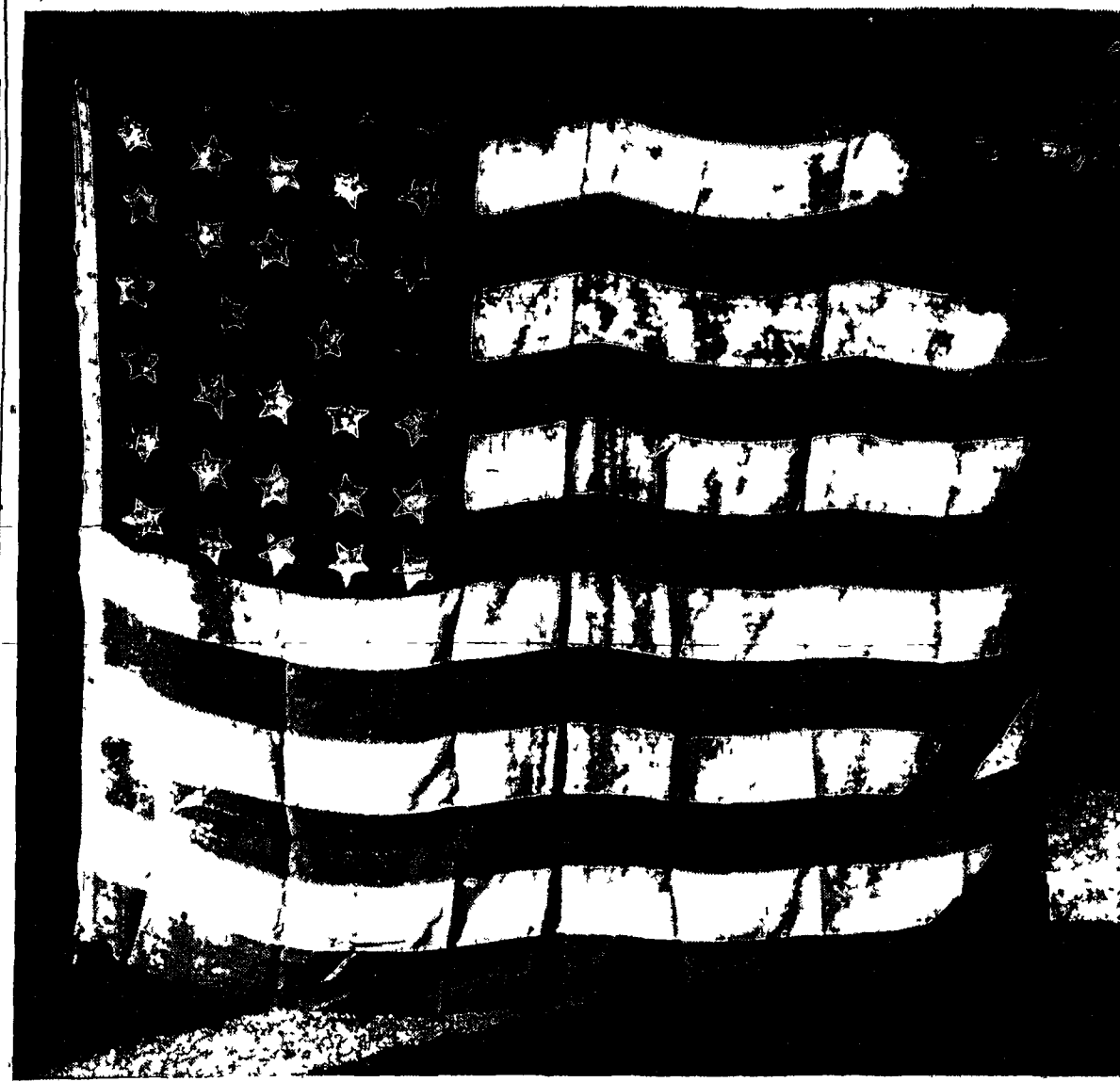
This reflected the hard times during periods of stagnant industry but it was also to an extent a hangover from frontier attitudes when there were no police and man's only defense from public 'holdup' or 'household' burglary was a loaded gun where he could reach it.

"Desperadoes are staging hold-ups on the roads at night in all parts of the county," wrote John Holmes in the Record of Nov. 1, 1877. In the issue of July 26, 1877, he had noted "It seems that nearly every other house in Buchanan has been entered by burglars in the past week." There would be fewer break-ins," added Holmes, if everyone kept a loaded gun within reach as he did.

The members of the village council met to discuss the situation from the standpoint of whether the money taken by the burglars would have paid the salary of a night watchman, who probably could not prevent all of them anyway.

There was no hysterical reaction from the public—no demands as to "what are our police doing?" The grown generation of that day remembered when this region was on the frontier, where lawlessness was taken for granted and outraged citizens settled their scores personally without benefit of police. The careless man who hung his trousers containing his pocketbook and other valuables on the bedpost where the burglar could reach through and get them was the joke of the town. If a man's home were indeed his castle, then it was his obligation to defend it.

The joke of the election campaign of 1878 was the case of the Honorable Henry Chamberlain, one of the founders of Three Oaks, and the Democratic candidate for governor of Michigan in 1874. In the latter 1870's Chamberlain's sympathies for the "underdog" had impelled him to swing leftward in the Greenback party ranks. He had demonstrated his sympathy in his own business by advertising that he would pay for produce at his Luree Oaks store in gold or silver instead of depreciated paper money.



CIVIL WAR BATTLEFLAG OF CO. K OF BUCHANAN.—Most illustrious of all momentos of the past in Buchanan is the flag earned by Company K, 25th Infantry, recruited in Buchanan. The flag was given by the soldiers of Co. K to Miss Scott Whitman, following the Civil War, and is now the property of her granddaughter, Mrs. O. C. Snyder, 307 W. Front St.

During the campaign of 1858 Mr. Chamberlain went to New Buffalo to speak at a Greenback party rally. He spent the night before the rally at the home of a friend in New Buffalo, where he was honored with a bed in the "front room." A burglar interested in the money question himself entered the room and departed with Chamberlain's coat and trousers, containing a gold watch and chain, a wallet containing \$35 in currency and \$25 in bills, plus several one-dollar gold pieces.

Good living and public prominence had apparently increased Chamberlain's girth, as a result of which fact there were no breeches available in New Buffalo that he could get into.

The telephone was still some years in the future, but the Michigan Central railway had a telegraph line and another suit of clothes was brought to New Buffalo in time for his speech. On this was the way John Holmes related the event. Holmes was undoubtedly a journalist before a Republican, but he doubtless did not minimize Chamberlain's predicament.

In the Record of Aug. 26 he wrote: "The burglars who were about town Monday night, visited the homes of J. J. Roe, Mrs. Ellen Glover, G. W. Noble, George Niles, Mrs. Dumbolt, Sumner, Black, P. N. Weaver, and Mr. Peterquin. If they go fooling around some people's homes at night they are likely to get severely hurt."

The first high school classes in Buchanan consisted mainly of girls. Boys were expected to go to work at that age. A certain degree of rowdiness was also expected and overlooked, as long as they took it out on each other. Action was taken by a temporary night watchman, according to the Record of Jan. 3, 1877. Several young store clerks had rented an upstairs room as a club headquarters and were amusing themselves by shooting out the window with a revolver. One bullet narrowly missed the watchman, who came

up their way immediately. The Record reported a discussion whether they should be tried before a justice court or merely have their names in the paper. What actually was done was not reported.

There were no juvenile delinquency officers — in fact that term was unknown. It seemed regular procedure that public dances should end in a general fight. According to the Record of June 14, 1877, a berry picker's dance was held at Stevensville. Two large "gangs" of boys at-

tended, about 50 from Buchanan and the same number from Michigan City, Ind. The Indiana crew, according to the Record, were prepared for a fight, carrying slingshots, knives, fence pickets, and the like. Strangely enough the Buchanan boys were similarly armed and all set for the melee which would close the dance.

One Buchanan boy was severely clubbed across the shoulders, another was hit in the head by a stone from a slingshot and had to be carried home. Two New Troy boys were badly slashed with knives. "Michigan City fared worse" was the Record's brief summary. No arrests, everyone satisfied as long as no one was murdered or disabled for life.

A new era of social entertainment in Buchanan began when the Rough Brothers, William, Solomon and George, bought the Collins & Weaver hall building at the corner of Front and Oak streets for \$7,000. The building, a 3-story brick, was erected by Collins and Weaver during the Civil War. It is still standing, the lower floor occupied by the Koenigshof Dry Goods store.

Science Gunning To Cut Costs, Waste Of Foods

Scientists at Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station are turning their guns on anything that wastes food — on the farm, in storage, in transport, in display and in sales.

A research and education program in farm marketing with a grant of \$150,000 authorized for

marketing research will be lined up with existing projects at MSC to add to the results. The hope is to give Michigan better diets at lower costs and give fairer returns all down the line for farmers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers.

The aims leaner meat for your table, better flowers for the centerpiece from the florists; good fruits in the spring from Michigan instead of a glut at market-time, less shipping and save backaches of handling evergreens for your yard; tender, frozen blueberries, lower-priced beans and grains because of less waste, better potatoes; dairy products that keep longer.

Partial Eclipse

A partial eclipse of the moon heads the list of astronomical attractions for July. Prof. Losh, associate professor of astronomy at the U. of M., points out that on the evening of July 15, two-fifths of the moon's diameter will be immersed in the earth's shadow.

The lunar eclipse will begin at 6:09 p.m., July 15, before the moon rises over the horizon. It will end at 8:31 p.m., so the last half-hour may be seen.

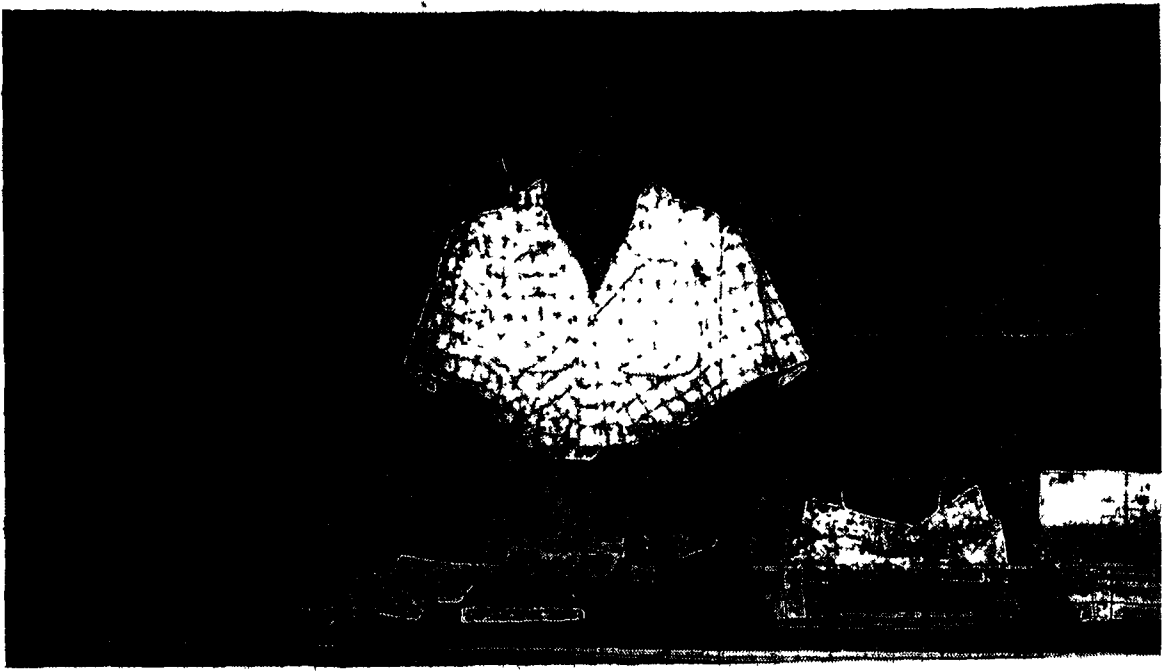

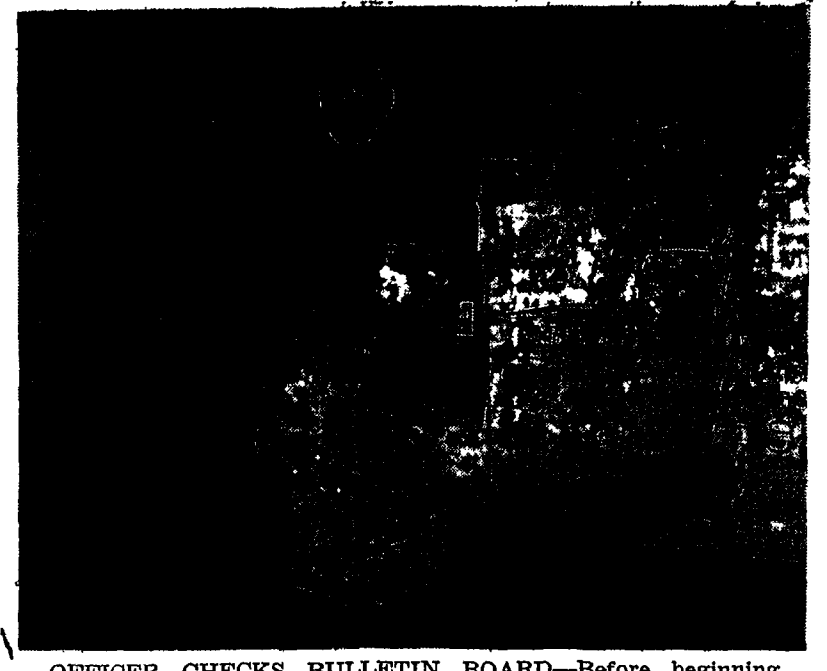

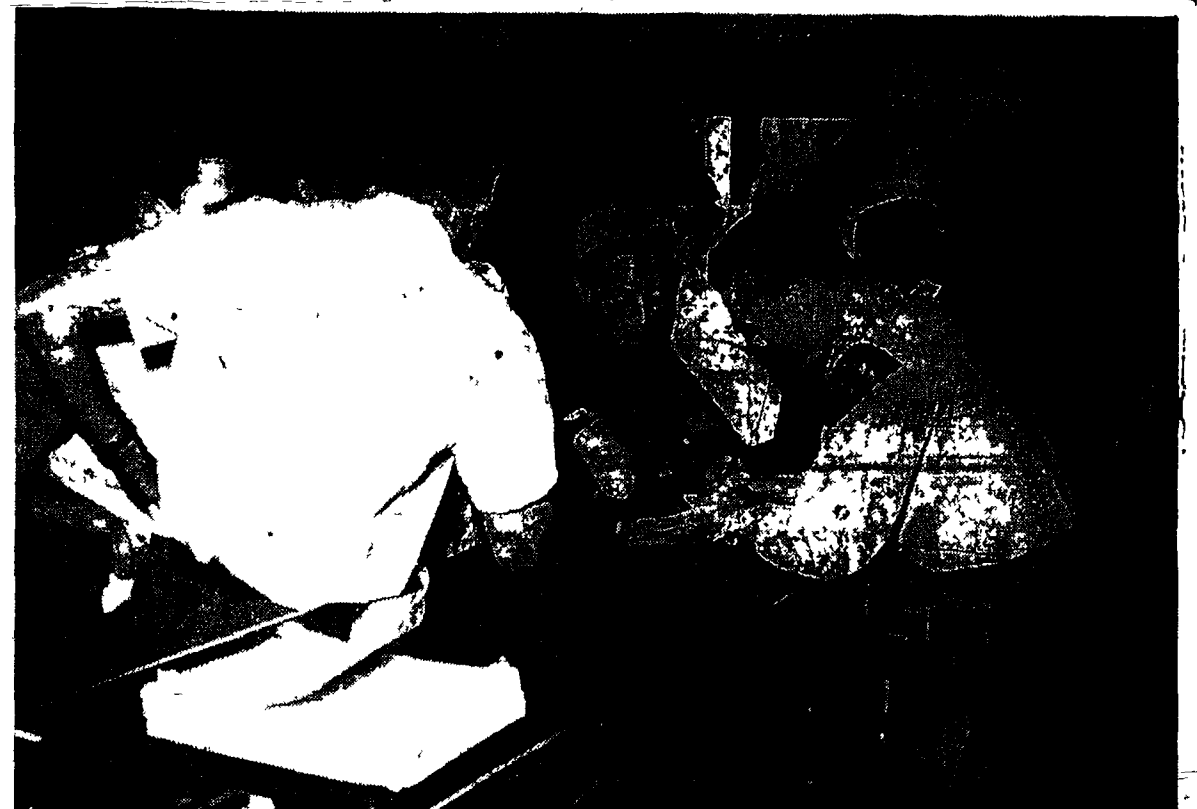

Pity The Cop — He Gets 175 Kinds Of Squawk

The records of the Buchanan police department totalled 1,388 complaints for the last fiscal year of the city.

"What is a 'complaint' in the language of the police?" It is simply everything that the police receive a request to act on. It might be assault with a deadly weapon, but it's more likely to be a lost child, a kitten up a tree, a lost dog. While we were checking on its meaning at the police station a "complaint" came in by telephone. Patrolman Aalfs, in charge at the time, received the complaint.

"Want a ride?" he asked, "5-year-old boy went with his brother to Kathryn park before the supervised hours. He's shipped away. Blue overalls, red tricycle."

Aalfs circled half the blocks in the northwest part of Buchanan when a 2-way radio call came in. "He went home." That was one of many scores of answers to the most frequent complaint, not listed on the police complaint sheet — "What are the police doing anyway?"

Of the 1,388 complaints listed only 265 involved criminal arrests. Of the entire 265, 230 were on misdemeanor charges and only 25 were for crimes classified as felonies.

Listed in the non-criminal department of complaints were the 168 auto accidents which the

police were called out for within the city. Of these, 153 were property damage accidents and only 15 were personal injury accidents.

Traffic violations not involving accidents totalled 412. Cases of being caught in front of a parking meter with no "time" showing totalled 2,161. Business places left open at night totalled 160. Vacation checks on private homes totalled 51.

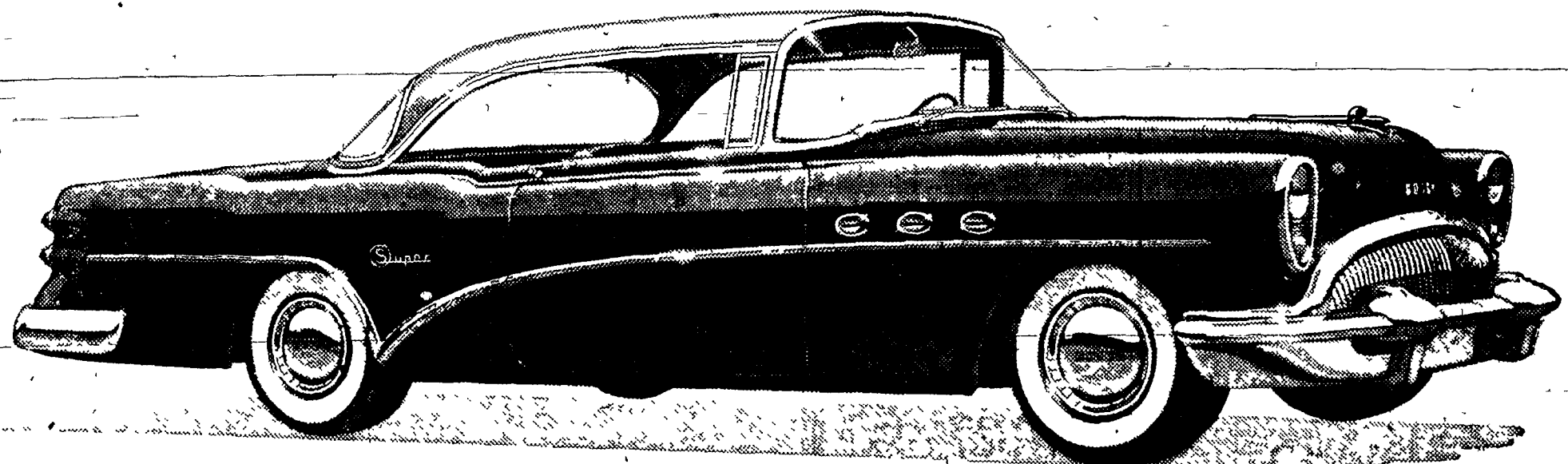
The police cars totalled 50,624 miles for the year, or twice the distance around the world, if the police had been going that way.

The records of the Buchanan police department are thorough and very excellent throughout. Chief Jack Krugh, formerly of the Berrien county sheriff's department, had had considerable experience in that department before he accepted the helm of the Buchanan department on July 1, 1950.

Lee Mathie and M. C. Lattrell alternate as radio operators. Lattrell also doubling as parking meter repair man. George Buigoyne, the senior patrolman on the force, has charge of checking fluoridation and minor maintenance of the water pumps.

Vic Canfield has been appointed to the police force, replacing Russell Dillavou, who left the department Thursday, July 1, to work as a patrolman in the Berrien county sheriff's department. The other patrolmen are Gene Aalfs, Neal Burks, and George Albrecht. All members of the force serve nine hours a day and are subject to call at all times in the event of emergencies.

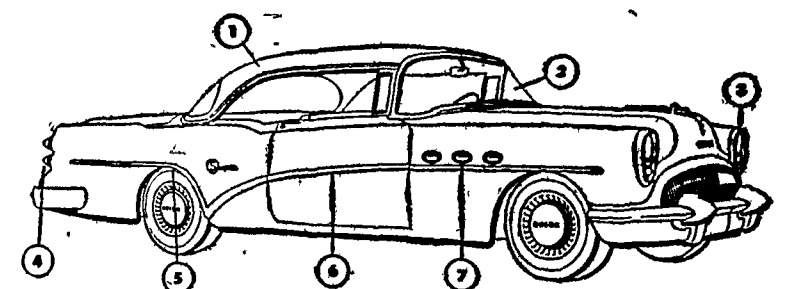

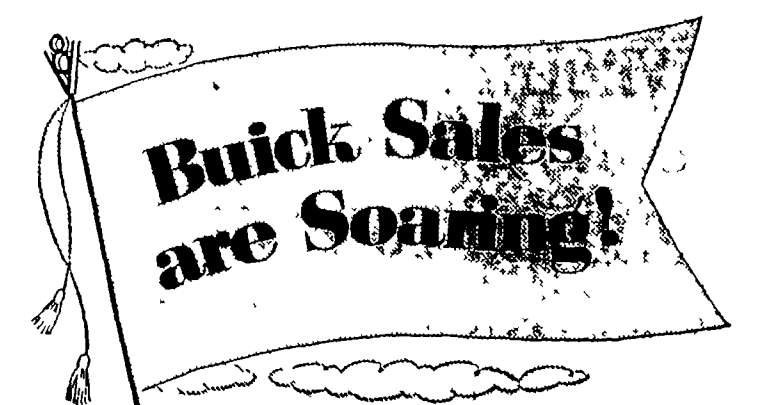

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Michigan Bnsiness Stands To Gain By Seaway Project

Michigan citizens will see engineers and businessmen do what chemists have tried to accomplish for many years: make gold out of seawater.

Perhaps the comparison is a trifle figurative. The feat will be achieved with dredges, barges and construction equipment; not elaborate chemical apparatus.

Approval of the St. Lawrence waterway by Congress this year ended a 40-year battle with interests which argued that such a project would mean financial ruin for them. Waterway supporters by no means agreed that these gloomy predictions would come to pass for opponents. But they are

sure that the channel will do much to develop this part of the nation.

How much will Michigan benefit from the seaway? Several people have made predictions on this subject. One of the best qualified is John Beukema, chairman of the Transportation Advisory Committee of the Michigan Economic Development Commission. Beukema was for years the secretary of the Muskegon Chamber of Commerce. He knows the seaway subject extremely well since Muskegon, as a port city, has an intense natural interest in seeing the channel become a reality.

"The seaway will have as great an effect on Michigan's economy as the invention of the automobile, but it will take time," Beukema told Economic Development Commission members at a recent meeting. "What we must look for is an evolution rather than a revolution."

Beukema dwelled on the time factor. He pointed out that it will take about 6 years before the seaway is finished. Industries now using railroads and trucks will not change overnight to using ships, he remarked. "It takes time to build up a commerce — and the shipper has to be sold on the benefits of water travel."

Major benefits were divided in two groups by Beukema, commercial and industrial. He predicted that Chicago and Milwaukee will gain most because they are natural supply points for foreign trade to the entire area from water's edge to the Rockies.

Detroit, Saginaw and Muskegon, he predicted, will be "sharply competitive" to supply Michigan. Michigan people, Beukema thinks, have a limited appreciation of foreign trade, even though it means much to the state even now.

A Detroit Board of Commerce survey shows more than 900 leading industries and establishments in Michigan engaged in import or export trade. Most of this, according to Beukema, moves by rail to New York or some eastern seaport. "Shippers are often surprised," he stated, "to find that the rail rate to New York is as high or higher than the ocean rate to north European ports. They don't realize that much of this cost is due to expense of rail-to-ship transfer at the harbor."

Importance of commerce to a city can be well illustrated by the late Mayor LaGuardia, who once stated that New York's greatness depended on three things: its port and waterborne commerce, its 300,000 visitors and the trade they produced; its manufacturers. He listed them in that order. And he further said that without the port, New York would be a second class city.

Intercoastal shipping is even more important than foreign, says Beukema. "What is going to mean to the Michigan manufacturer when he can save a third of this freight cost by shipping direct waterhaul through the Panama Canal to warehouses in Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Seattle?"

Prices on bananas, pineapple and other tropical products should also drop sharply for Michigan consumers when these things can be shipped in by water. Michigan's industrial supremacy has faced a threat for some time, according to Beukema's views. The trend has been, he says, for steel producing factories to move east — where they can take advantage of low priced Labrador, African and South American ores.

The seaway reduces this factor and will permit diversification of industry. Many products that are made near seacoasts because of their dependence on raw materials can be attracted to this part of the country. The chemical industry, in particular, is expected to grow even more rapidly than it has.

This development may take as long as a generation, though the wait seems worth while. In the meantime improvement of port facilities by cities is a must for any area hoping to reap benefits of shipping.

Improved docks are needed almost everywhere, "fast around lake traffic between Detroit and ports of Lakes Erie, Huron and Michigan is predicted. The St. Lawrence will be open only about 7 1/2 months a year.

If conclusions of Beukema, who has studied for years the significance of the seaway, turn out to be accurate, Michigan will develop into an even more prosperous state.

Farmers Caught In 2-Way Squeeze By Grain Quotas

Marketing quotas are on their way for wheat again next year and farmers are caught in a 2-way pinchers this time.

This year it was relatively easy to divert acres from wheat to other crops. But next year there will be acreage allotments on corn — and possibly on oats, barley and soybeans.

There is a good chance that a "cross compliance" rule also will apply. This means that unless you follow acreage allotments in all covered crops you will get no supports, even for wheat within quotas.

Farmers are warned not to let the higher support price hide the fact that drastic acreage cuts almost always follow high supports because of surpluses.

Any farmer advertising — even by roadside sign — that he sells his products at retail needs a Michigan sales tax license. This applies even though his volume is below the tax figure.

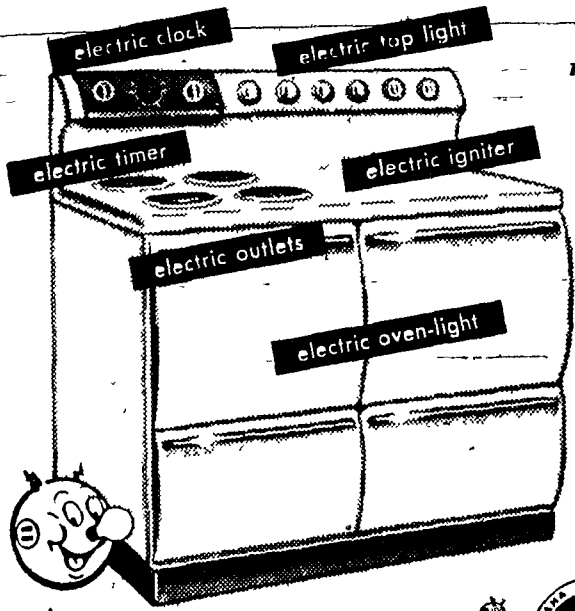

SPECIAL BULLETIN Michigan Now Requires DIRECTIONAL SIGNALS

This Bulletin is to Acquaint You With the New Law in Michigan Requiring Directional Signals on Motor Vehicles.

Effective August 14, 1954

Every commercial vehicle, BOTH INTERSTATE and INTRASTATE (even those owner or operated by the United States Government, any state, or county, city, town, district or political subdivision of the State), in use on the highway, must be equipped with, and required turn signals must be given by, a signal lamp or lamps or other mechanical device when:

(a) the distance from the center of the top of the steering post to the left outside limit of the body, cab, or load of such commercial vehicle exceeds 24 inches —

— OR —

(b) the distance from the center of the top of the steering post to the rear limit of the body or load thereof exceeds 14 feet. The latter measurement shall apply to any single vehicle, also to any combination of vehicles.

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
