


Camelback Mountain, located a few miles northeast of Phoenix, Ariz., takes its name from the fact that it closely resembles a giant camel lying prone on the desert. The Indians also have a legend about it. Once, shortly before the Civil war, the government imported a band of camels from the Middle East for travel across the forbidding southwestern desert. The camels became scattered and wandered aimlessly over the desert. One of the last survivors defied the gods of thunder and lightning and, according to Indian legend, was turned to stone.





Letter From Russ Zone in Germany Is Received Here

Addressed To Heirs Of German Who Came Here In 1868

A voice out of another world reached Buchanan about two weeks ago in the form of a letter written by George and Carl Berner from the little town of Bad Salungen, located in the Russian zone of Germany.

The letter was addressed "An Die Nachkommer der Familie Hr Meffert," which in English is "To the descendants of Mr. Meffert." It was delivered by the local postal force to Earl Beck, stepson of the late Martin Meffert. The

address proved correct. The writer stated that during the invasion by Russia, they had found in some way an old letter from their grandfather, Christian Meffert, who had come to America. The letter had been sent at a date unspecified. However, Christian Meffert came to Buchanan about 1868. There was no definite message in the letter or any request. Apparently they wished to relieve the tedium of their lives by getting word from America. They wrote "Through the war, which we lost, our lives under the conditions that prevailed in Germany were very wretched. We are old and do not have much hope for anything better. But for our children and grandchildren it is sad, for they had no future. We hope that this letter finds you with more hope and happiness than we enjoy, and that right soon we may receive an answer from you. Sincerely yours. We clasp your hand. George Berner, Carl Berner."

Bad Salungen is a small town southwest of Leipzig.

Safe Santa Fe Trail
Danger from Indians was not great along the Santa Fe trail the first 25 years after Capt. William Becknell opened it to American trade. The caravans were well organized and not easy to surprise, and few of the Indians at that time had good rifles. Some of the traders were married to women of the tribes along the trail and so were on friendly terms with the Redskins. It was not until the Mexican war that any great difficulty with Indians occurred in American territory along the Santa Fe trail.


