Bring Out Flavor Of Meat In Cooking

Now that meat is more plentiful, the housewife may wish to devote more attention to careful preparation that will bring out the best flavor in the meat being served. Robert Hensley, extension nutrition specialist at Michigan State college, offers these suggestions for preparing various kinds of meat.

Beekkeeping Needs To Be Safeguarded

Reduction in the number of wild beneficial insects in Michigan and the increase in the crops requiring pollination in recent years are multiplying the demand for honey bees in the state, says R. H. Kelly, beekkeeping specialist of Michigan State College.

Mr. Kelly thinks that if beekkeeping should become a major industry, it is necessary to have a subsidy for the keeping of bees. He believes also that steps should be taken to conserve our native pollinating insects and to safeguard against indiscriminate use of insecticides such as DDT which might unintentionally destroy beneficial insects while controlling harmful ones.

Detroit Living Off Financial Wartime Fat

First quarter reports of Detroit pairs-companies, whose fiscal years ended last summer show that the city is living off wartime fat. Detroit's so-called population committee, made up of business leaders and city officials, estimates that the city proper has recorded a net loss of only 50,000 people since V-E Day and the metropolitan area only 75,000.

Sgt. Robert Heney arrived home Thursday from Fort Sheridan, Ill. where he received his discharge from the army. He had 70 points. He entered the army Dec. 7, 1942, and went overseas in August, 1943, where he served with the 37th division of the field artillery in the South Pacific for 29 months.

While unemployment payments have been falling off slightly in recent weeks, as the end of some payment periods arrived, the load on the Detroit Welfare Department has increased. As of December 21, some 5,624 families were receiving relief, compared with 5,944 on August 15.

Judge Advocates Reorganization Michigan Courts

Says Slow Operation of Courts Affects Prestige - Reorganization of Michigan's system of lower courts is imperative as the answer to the usurpation of judicial power by administrative agencies through their legislative probate Judge Stephen H. Correct Liming Shown At Rural Progress Caravan

It's a waste of labor to apply lime where it isn't needed, and it can do harm. Also, it's a waste of power, labor and good seed to prepare the seedbed and plant a crop on soil that is in need of lime.

How to know when and where to lime will be explained in an exhibit by the soil science department of Michigan State college as part of the Rural Progress Caravan that will visit at the Berrien County Highway Garage in Berrien, Mich. Jan. 14, 1946.

On the other hand, many of the failures of alfalfa, sweet clover and red clover are caused by lack of lime. Fields that were limed some years ago have lost that lime and the soil is acid again.

To make sure whether you should lime, take a sample of soil to the office of the county agricultural agent or send it to the soil science department at Michigan State college. A report will be returned telling the soil reaction, whether lime is needed, and if so, how much.

Industry Buying More Efficient Machine Tools

Would Offset Higher Wages By Using New Machinery

Industry is buying more highly productive machine tools in an effort to offset higher wage costs. This was revealed in a survey of district managers and field sales engineers at the Monarch Machine Tool Co.'s annual sales conference at Sidney, Ohio.

This trend is especially true, company officials pointed out, in the Chicago, Cleveland and Pittsburgh areas where companies are particularly concerned over increased labor costs.

In Detroit, new machine tool purchases are prompted largely by the desire of the automobile manufacturers to get new cars into production.

A shift in production by some concerns to wholly new products is advanced as another reason behind the present buying of new lathes to be added to existing equipment.

The East and Middle West, re-

flected in reports from Monarch's Newark, N. J., and Indianapolis territories, appear to be concerned principally with what the new lathes can do to speed the shift to production of new products.

Expanded production of redesigned products, as distinguished from new ones, has added to the orders being received almost daily for new lathes which, as far as can be ascertained, will supplement rather than replace machine tools already on the job.

Where new lathes are being purchased to replace those already installed in a plant, the controlling reasons appear to be, according to the survey, that the older machines are either worn out or regarded as too inefficient for modern production. Then too, it was pointed out, older equipment cannot provide the higher speeds and feeds desired in machining plastics and other materials with which many manufacturers are now working or experimenting.

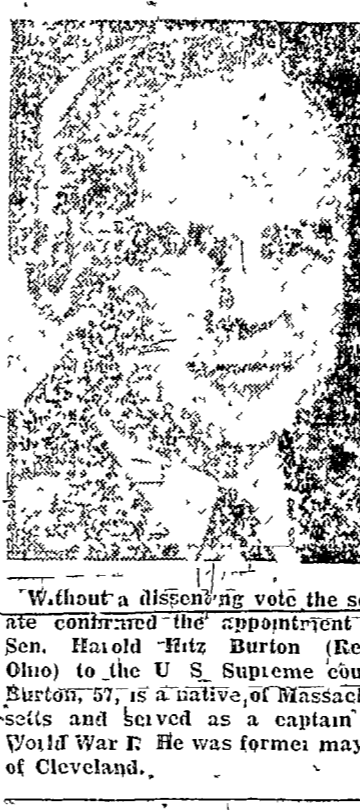
The 340-lineal feet of displays, models and equipment will be set up at the Berrien County Highway Garage, Baroda, and will be on display from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. Several specialists from the college will be on hand to demonstrate and explain models and displays.

Exhibits of ideas and equipment for the farm and home include models and full-size machines that will be carried from county to county in trucks and trailers. Typical of the devices to be shown is an actual working model of the circular gutter cleaner, which cleans dairy barns in a few minutes. Another is a model of a haying nest for the poultry house that serves two to three hundred laying hens.

The caravan starts on its 3,000-mile itinerary early in January for showings in 50 counties over a 3-month period.

An additional feature of the show will be an exhibition of locally-developed devices used by Berrien county farmers to help solve the labor shortages. Wm. H. Colburn Is Employed At St. Joe Conservation District

William H. Colburn, soil scientist, has recently been appointed soil surveyor for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service. He will be located in the Benton Harbor office of the St. Joe River Soil Conservation District.

He was recently discharged from the Army after serving four years as weather observer in the U. S. Army Air Forces. Prior to his induction he was employed by the Soil Conservation Service as soil surveyor in Knox County, Indiana.

Colburn's home is in Ypsilanti, Mich., and he received his training in soils and geography at the University of Michigan and Michigan State College.

His work in southwestern Michigan will be mapping the farms of the growers who have requested the assistance of the Soil Conservation Districts in establishing soil and water conservation practices. The districts Mr. Colburn will be working in are the St. Joe River, Van Buren, Cass county, Allegan and East Allegan Soil Conservation Districts. The purpose of the soil survey is to determine the various soil types, slope and degree of erosion on the farm as an aid to working out a conservation program.

Bounty Is Failure In Coyote Control

As a means of reasonable control of the spread of timber wolves and coyotes in Michigan our bounty payment system can well be considered a failure. One of the first laws enacted when Michigan became a State in 1835 was a bounty on wolves, and it has continued ever since. Yet each year an average of 50 of these animals are taken by trappers.

When most of our virgin timber disappeared the coyote migrated into the State from the west. Since then they have shown a steady increase in face of bounty payments of \$15 for males and \$20 for females until today they are considered at the peak of their population and have spread even to some southern counties. Yet each year we have paid out almost \$350,000 in coyote bounties alone, and from all appearances the fiscal year of 1945-46 may hit \$100,000 for coyotes.

The Legislature appropriated \$40,000 for bounty payments to run from July 1, 1945, through to June 30, 1946. The first three months of the fiscal year found payments totaling \$42,805 and there are still nine months to go with no funds unless the State Administrative Board makes an emergency appropriation of a special session of the Legislature grants extra funds. In October it cost the taxpayers \$11,615 to bounty 666 coyotes and the animals are still going strong throughout the northern covers.

There doesn't appear to be any fraud in connection with bounties, as there was prior to 1921 when thousands of imported coyote pelts from the west were bountied in Michigan. They cost the fraudulent operators as little as 75 cents and were bountied for \$15, a nice profit while it lasted.

It would seem we would be far better off if the State maintained a corps of a dozen or more trappers who would devote all their time running down these predators, and encouraged hunters to stage coyote hunts as a means of saving large and small game animals upon which the coyotes subsist. A pelt of this nature would cost us less money and no doubt bring far better results. Albert Stoll, Jr., m., Detroit News.

Dallas Builds Fine Secondary Schools For Racial Groups

One of the most interesting public schools in this city is named for a Mexican patriot—Benito Juarez. This elementary school only a few years ago was very small and located in a Mexican section of West Dallas. With the growth of Mexican population in the city, the Board of Education determined on an enlargement of the exclusive school for students of the Latin races. Now one of the finest elementary schools in the Southwest is replacing the former frame building and it still will be known as the Benito Juarez Elementary School. About 400 Mexican children will attend the enlarged school.

There is no race discrimination in Texas between Anglo-Saxons and persons of Spanish ancestry. Mexican children often head the scholarship clubs in the big high schools, but it happened that the Benito Juarez school is being built in an area that has been populated by Mexican families for decades.

Only a short time ago the new Abraham Lincoln high school was opened in Dallas for Negroes. It is one of the finest high schools in the Southwest. In Texas whites and blacks attend separate schools. The vast school expansion for rapidly developing Dallas calls for the building of another large Negro high school and several elementary schools and a system of Negro junior high schools. Under the new system of public schools and compulsory attendance laws, Negroes in Texas are reputed to have a higher standard of education than in most southern states.

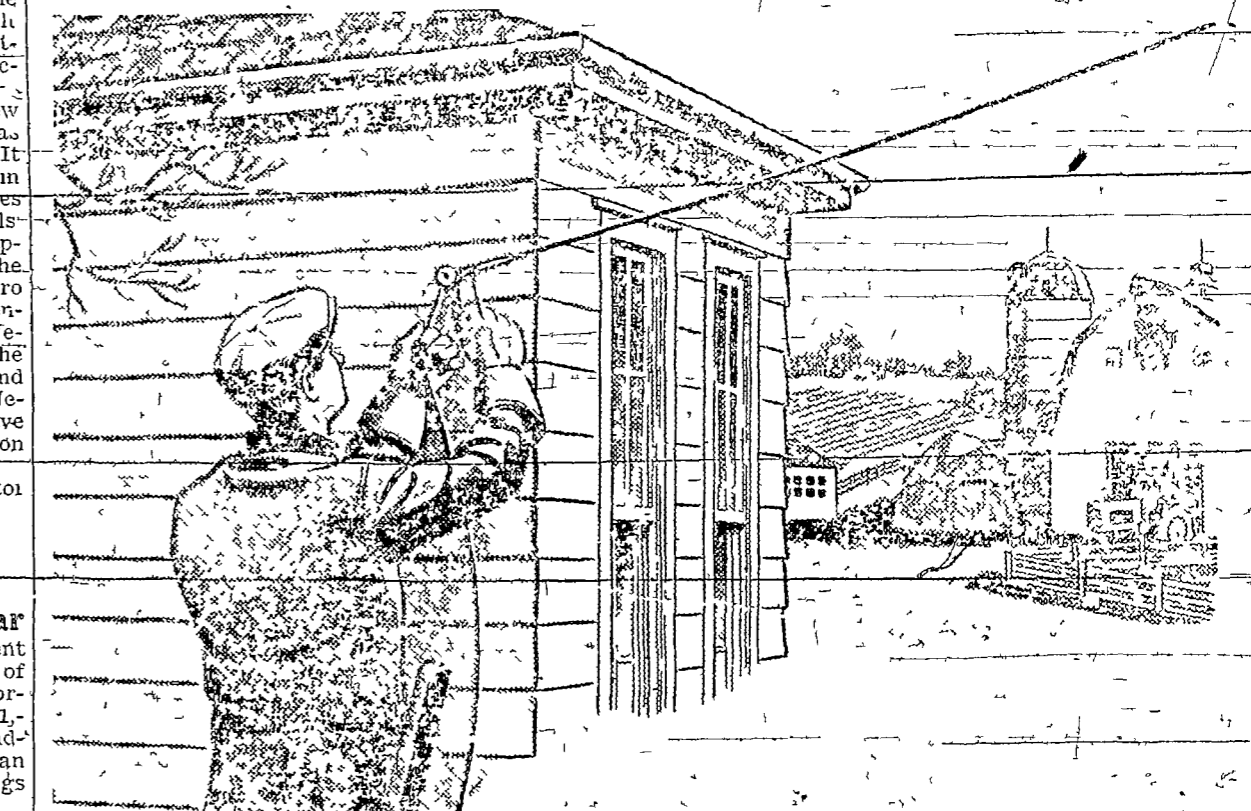
Carnegie Grants Total \$1,002,500 During Past Year

Deverent C. Josephs, president of the Carnegie Corporation of New York, said yesterday the organization had made grants of \$1,002,500 during the fiscal year ended Sept. 30 and that more than half had gone to undertakings connected with the war effort.

The Carnegie Corporation was established by Andrew Carnegie in 1911 for the advancement and diffusion of knowledge and understanding among the people of the United States and the British Dominions and Colonies.

Among the recipients of emergency grants—totaling \$567,000—were the American Red Cross, \$225,000; National War Fund, \$150,000; and National Japanese-American Student Relocation Council, \$10,000. The gifts brought to \$2,771,867 the amount given during the past five years to national emergency organizations.

Mr. Josephs said in his annual report: "For the welfare and education of Negroes the United Negro College Fund received \$25,000; National Urban League, \$5,000 and Boy Scouts of America \$25,000. Minor grants and allocations for research totaled \$9,000. Sets of music study material were allocated to Cambridge, Gantford, Hampden-Sydney, Iowa Wesleyan, Newberry, and Wesleyan (Georgia) Colleges under an arrangement whereby each college bore half the cost of a set."
