Schirmer Parkway To Be Open On July 18

The new Schirmer Parkway connecting the Niles-Buchanan Road with River Street will open on Friday, July 18. Last minute work is progressing on schedule. The city commission had unanimously voted to name the road in honor of Walter Schirmer, chairman of the board of Clark Equipment Company. He was instrumental in letting the city acquire enough land for a right-of-way for the by-pass. Buchanan had attempted to annex enough adjacent land so that the right of way would be in the city and the state boundaries commission upheld their request. However, Buchanan township is fighting the annexation in the courts as the author-

ity of the boundaries commission is being challenged. The city was able to go ahead with the by-pass because it owned the land, but it will not be able to go through with the original plans to provide sewer and water facilities to any of the area. The by-pass will enable automobiles to cut over to the other roads in leaving town without having to travel to Redbud Trail. The traffic consultants predict that this will result in less traffic congestion from those going to and from work at Clark Equipment. The city commission will make arrangements for the opening at their next meeting on Monday.

Large Crowd At Fireworks

Fourth of July was climaxed in Buchanan by an old fashioned fireworks display. With a clear night and a sky full of stars, the setting was perfect as a large crowd gathered at Memorial Field. Since there were no fireworks at Niles this year, many from that city came to Buchanan. They sat in the stands, along the banks near the football field and in their cars. Traffic was heavy but well organized by the Buchanan police and reserves. The displays themselves were spectacular. The color and the noise drew hearty approval from the spectators. At one point there was a rocket which almost exploded on the launching pad, causing temporary concern as it spread sparks over the truck containing the fireworks. Some of the ground displays puzzled people, but everybody was appreciative of their efforts. The Lions had a concession stand and sold as much cotton candy as they could make. The families who celebrated this old fashioned fourth were complimentary over Buchanan's contribution to the day. The Chamber of Commerce committee headed by Ron Moses said it was tough and go whether they'd raise enough money to pay for the fireworks, but last minute efforts to sell more tickets on the quarters of beef by such stalwarts as Bob and Keith Welsh paid off. The winners in the drawing were Laura Babcock of 4th Street, first prize, and Robert Thompson of Liberty Street, second prize. The fireworks were judged to be a success. They lasted an hour. Several persons from out of town expressed their gratitude to Buchanan for providing them.

He said that the open house was well received in all offices. Designate Trails For Bike Riders

Three Oaks Spokes Bicycle Club has been working on an ambitious project which is nearing completion. They have set up a series of six backroads bicycle trails in the southern part of Berrien County varying from 17 to 60 miles in length. The routes are chosen for scenic interest and on secondary roads. Pamphlets showing how to follow the routes have been distributed to bike shops all over the area. Although the trails are planned from a Three Oaks starting point, any may be picked up and started from any point on the route. ReflectORIZED bike route signs have been purchased from the state from funds raised by contributions and members have been setting them up along the trails with the job now nearly finished except for a very few

Drug Arrests

On July 2, two 22 year old Niles men were arrested for violation of the controlled substance act after they were observed hitch hiking on S Redbud Trail and suspected marijuana and amphetamines were located on their persons. On July 3 two Benton Harbor men, Thomas Goety and Joseph Connell were arrested after an open quart of malt liquor was observed in their car. Further search turned up suspected marijuana. On Saturday at 10 p.m. Buchanan police observed a car parked on Days Avenue with two men in it. Upon seeing the police, the men appeared to place something under the front seat. The police smelled a strong odor of burning marijuana and arrested Ronald Birdsong of Buchanan and Harold Johnson of South Bend. They confiscated slightly less than two ounces of marijuana.

Can't Anyone Help ?

A little guy appeared in Buchanan. He was broke. He was out of a job. He was hungry. For the past two nights he'd been sleeping in a cemetery in Niles. He was trying to get back home. His story may not have been authentic, but it was a sad one. He went to the police station for help. The police weren't sure what to do. Calls were made to churches here. No answer at four of them. One minister finally answered but offered no help. Then calls were made to the Young Men's Christian Association. They said to call the Salvation Army. No answer there. A call to a certain church in Niles. Sorry, but they can't help people from Buchanan. Okay, call the Red Cross. A woman answered. It was after five, and nobody could help. A call to another church here. Did this man have a prison record? Who knows? So a little guy miles away from home was alone. He needed help. He needed a friend. He was hungry. Finally money was given to the police so that the man got a good meal at Boosters. Nobody knows where he spent the night. Can't Buchanan do better than that? Isn't this what our churches and organizations are all about? Does the small town have no more heart than the big city? We can't believe that Buchanan doesn't have some way to help somebody in trouble. It all boils down to our original suggestion, which wasn't greeted warmly. There should be some central spot where somebody in charge could act quickly. Everybody may love his neighbor, but the neighbor can't always wait around until his credentials are approved by the right group of Christians.

Sidewalk Days Are Coming

On Friday and Saturday July 18 and 19, Buchanan Sidewalk Days will bring people to town. The businessmen plan special sales events with much of their merchandise displayed outdoors. The only sector which will be blocked off to traffic will be the portion on Front between Oak and Days. The Jaycees plan their annual chicken barbecue in the center of activities, and the Lions will have their concession stands. The Unity Hospital Guild plans a booth. The Buchanan Co-Ops will have a display of machinery. Paul Nonn, chairman of Sidewalk Days, predicts that there will be plenty of excitement for everybody. As extra attractions, the Jaycees are organizing a sawing contest and are looking for two-man teams to enter. There will also be a log splitting contest, and first, second and third prizes will be awarded. The Co-Ops plan hayrides for the children. All clubs and organizations wishing to participate in Sidewalk Days are asked to apply at the Chamber of Commerce office. A nominal fee will be requested for booth space. The participating clubs are asked to make arrangements for thorough clean-up on Saturday night so that Buchanan will look clean on Sunday morning. The Record will carry the advertisements of most of the Sidewalk Day bargains in next week's issue.

Buchanan Township Board Has Many Visitors

There were several visitors at the Buchanan township board meeting Monday. The usual complaint about Elm Valley Road was expressed, and the board could give no assurance that anything would be done about it. Neighbors also complained about Redbud Track and Trail. They objected to the noise and the dust and the fact that people were cutting across their property to avoid paying entrance fees at the track. Supervisor Price said that he'd have a talk with the owners. Another group of neighbors complained about conditions on East River Road. Some people had been camping along the river and had been asked to leave. They were then apparently invited to use the property of Fred Hankins, whom some of the neighbors have classed as a nuisance. The board didn't give the neighbors much hope of remedying the situation although the county board of health has been investigating. The neighbors from Clear Lake who are anxious to control the weeds on the lake presented a petition asking for the formation of a lake board to govern such matters. As outlined by a state law the board would include a representative from the Department of Natural Resources, the drain commissioner and the township supervisor. There were 77 signers of the petition which the board accepted. The residents were reminded that anything which would be done would have to be paid for by a special assessment among the residents. Ivan Price explained the new Southeast Berrien County Landfill which is shared by Buchanan, Buchanan township, Niles and Niles township and Bertrand township. He said it would be open Mondays through Fridays from 8 to 5 and Saturdays from 8 to noon. He reviewed the board's stand against annexation of land for Schirmer Parkway. He predicted that when the parkway is opened there would be a traffic problem. The city of Buchanan has petitioned to intervene in the present suit involving the township and the boundaries commission over the annexation, and Price said he didn't feel it would be to the township's advantage to let the city in the suit. The matter will be discussed at the July 15 meeting. The board approved a request by the Red Cross to have the bloodmobile at the township hall from noon to 6 p.m. on Thursday, July 24.

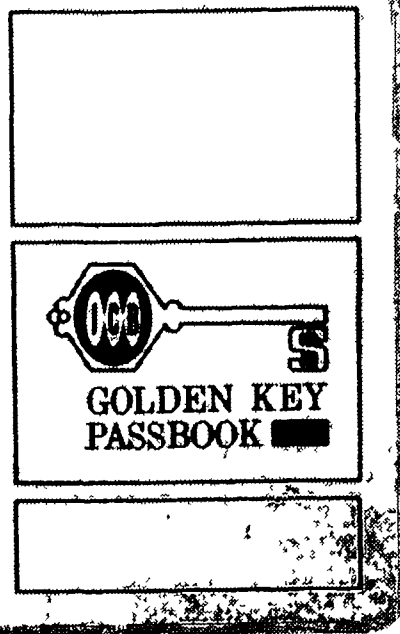
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Anyone Can Garden In Containers

Eliminate that barren look in your home or apartment with a container garden. suggests Will Carlson, Extension horticulturist at Michigan State University

Both vegetables and flowers can be grown in containers," he points out. "Even the apartment dweller can have colorful flowers and fresh produce"

As an example of what you can do he says, you can grow four stalked tomato plants in a 2x2x2 foot box that may easily yield 25 pounds of fruit each during the growing season

Vegetables suited to container gardening include peppers, par-

snip and other herbs cabbage, lettuce and tomatoes Flower favorites for containers include pansies petunias French marigolds wax begonias coleus impatiens and geraniums

Though a simple clay pot on the patio may come to mind when you think of container gardening window boxes hanging baskets ornamental urns and strawberry pots are other variations on the container theme

Didn't get that garden in this year as planned? Well, don't give up yet According to Michigan State University Extension horticulturist Jim Motes, July

isn't too late to plant for a fall harvest

Snap beans, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, Chinese cabbage, sweet corn, kale, kohlrabi, lettuce, radishes, spinach and turnips may be seeded in the garden now, he says

Many of these crops need cool weather to mature, Motes explains Some will not only tolerate a light frost, but may actually taste better afterwards

Planting for a fall harvest is a good way to get maximum use of your garden space, Motes observes You can clear out early maturing crops, plant fall vegetables and get two harvests out of the same piece of ground

When choosing varieties for fall gardening, pick quick maturing varieties recommended for growing in Michigan, Motes advises Otherwise crops may not have time to mature before the beginning of cold weather

Plant according to package directions and water in the seed to speed germination Then to the proper spacing

Fertilizing may not be necessary if you fertilized well in the spring If it is needed, use a commercial fertilizer such as 5-10-10 at the rate of 1/2 cup for every 25 feet of row Apply as a sidedressing after the seedlings are rapidly growing

Immunizations for measles, rubella, mumps, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and oral polio, as well as TB tests, will be given at no charge to the patient. According to Michigan Law children should be immunized against measles, rubella, polio, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough in order to enter school for the first time. Immunization for mumps is not required but is highly desirable, as is TB testing.

Michigan Admitted to the Union

Washington, D.C. (January 26, 1837) Michigan Territory achieved statehood today, becoming the 26th state in the Union and restoring the national balance between free and slave states.

The formal admission of Michigan to the Union followed overwhelming approval of the Bill of Admission by the House of Representatives. The vote was 132-43. The Bill passed the Senate by a 25-10 vote three weeks ago.

President Andrew Jackson, after meeting with the jubilant Michigan Congressional delegation declared that "no territory has shown such eagerness and initiative in its desire to be admitted to the Union" and he termed the House vote "a well-deserved action."

"I am especially pleased that much of the controversy which surrounded Michigan's petition to join the Union has been dissipated and that both the sovereign State of Ohio and the new State of Michigan are pleased with the compromise that led to the decision," the President said.

Michigan's price of admission was agreement to cede the 468 square-mile Toledo Strip to Ohio in exchange for more than 9,000 square miles of frigid wilderness in the Upper Peninsula north of the Straits of Mackinac.

Former President John Quincy Adams, who spoke for three hours on the House floor last year defending Michigan's rights to the Toledo Strip, said the compromise should not have been necessary.

"Right was clearly on the side of Michigan in its boundary dispute with Ohio," the former President asserted. "Unfortunately, Congress does not always

pay attention to what is right. In this case, Ohio's vote power with support from Indiana and Illinois caused Michigan to get the dirty end of the stick."

Lucius Lyon, sworn in today as one of Michigan's two U.S. Senators, said he couldn't agree more with President Adams.

"Since we could not vote in Congress, we had little voice in the final outcome," said Senator Lyon. "The northern territory we wound up with can only furnish us with Indian blankets and bear meat, while Ohio got a strip of land that is vital to Michigan's economic development."

However, Senator Lyon conceded that not much was known about the Upper Peninsula and he speculated that it might be much more valuable than anyone now imagines.

Governor Stevens T. Mason, who engineered approval of the compromise at the so-called Frost-Bitten Convention last month in Ann Arbor, said he was "very pleased" at the outcome of the whole matter.

"I guess you could say I'm disappointed we did not receive the land that goes over to Ohio," said the 25-year-old governor, "but all in all everything has worked out for the best interests of the people of Michigan. Now we must move forward."

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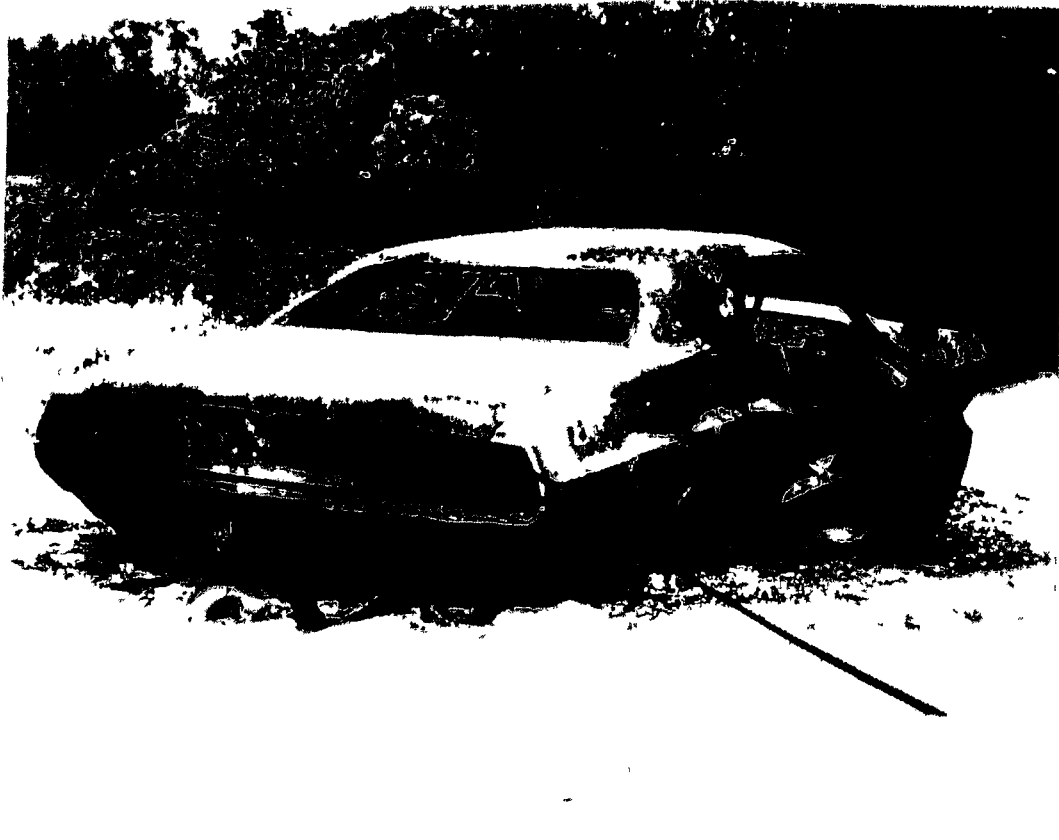

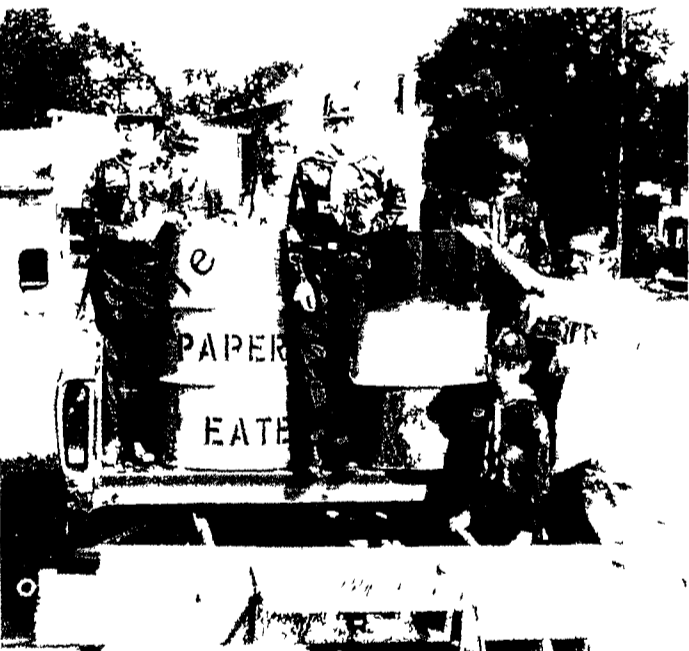

A Minute With Mary

Con-games, tomatoes, and dog food. What a mix! Read on for some tips on these subjects.

Con-Games

Everyone is always looking for a bargain, especially in times when money's tight.

Beware of the "con-game artists" who seem to come out of the woodwork when money's in short supply. They're here now. You may see many "food deals" (on freezer plans and food supply plans) especially, but be cautious, aware and question those trying to sell. Be on guard when you hear phrases like "something for nothing", "saves you \$200 a month on your food bill", "will supply you all the food you need for a year", "this opportunity won't be here tomorrow" etc. Know how much you spend on food, know how much you buy and what, question the folks that are trying to sell you, get all the details from them, as well as from other sources before you buy, try or sign up for any deal.

Kitchen-Ripened Tomatoes
When you buy tomatoes at the supermarket, they're usually not

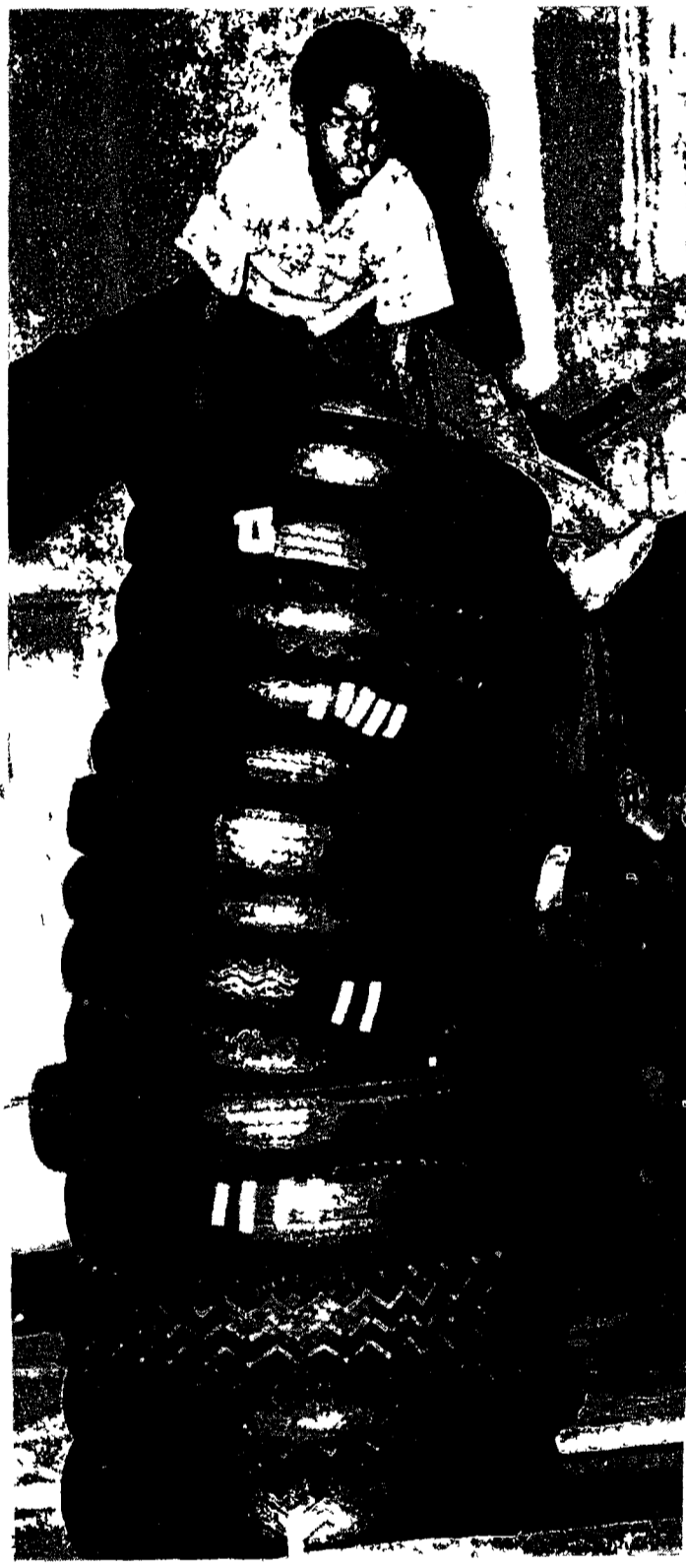
really ripe and ready to eat that same day. Give tomatoes several days of comfortable kitchen warmth to bring them to complete red ripeness. Then refrigerate them until needed. Tomatoes won't ripen in the refrigerator, however, so forget that method. If you buy them today and put them immediately into the refrigerator they'll simply stay as is or become watery and off-flavored. When ready to use the kitchen ripened tomatoes (that you've refrigerated after ripening) remove them about an hour before serving them. Surprising as it may seem, this makes them sweeter and more tender.

Dog Days

When you choose an all meat product, enriched with calcium, for your dog, your dog may be overnourished. Overnutrition is harmful to growing dogs, and researchers have found that too much protein and calcium can cause severe skeletal disease. They advise pet owners to buy dry, pelleted dog food to keep your young dog healthier. It costs less, too.

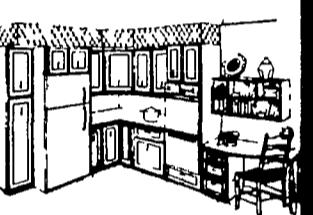

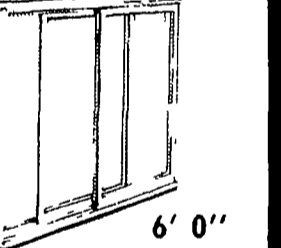
