Asks City Water Users to Spray on Alternate Days

As a result of a recently growing shortage of water, arising from the greatly increased number of users, and becoming stringent during dry seasons when there is more than usual use for lawns, Mayor C. J. Bradley has announced the following restrictions on the use of water for sprinkling:

Odd-numbered homes, Monday, Wednesday, Friday Even-numbered homes, Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday

There will not be any restriction on the use of water for sprinkling on Sundays, Mr. Bradley stated, unless the amount of use for that purpose results in too great lowering of water pressure.

Mayor Bradley stated that the city is now working on means to mitigate the water shortage. In the event that continued rains reduce the amount of sprinkling of lawns the restrictions may be dropped entirely. However, the success of this arrangement under present conditions will require cooperation on the part of the public.

leave. His ship, a destroyer escort, had just docked in Brooklyn navy yards after a three month trip to Mediterranean waters and back. His ship has seen quite a bit of action, he reported. Their task force had patrolled the southern waters near France while invasion was going on. He returned Tuesday evening to New York to re-aid ship

John March writes from Rome a few years back but after the World War II had begun in Europe a frequent caller in the Record office to leave classified ads for the sale of pigs, calves and all that farmers have to sell was John March. Such times John used to tell us about his brother in the air corps

He was a student at the Buchanan high school, a member of the Future Farmers of America. The war in Europe seemed a long way from them. But time marched on and so did John March, and yesterday we read several letters written by him while testing in bivouac just outside of Rome at the 107 days of continuous combat from the first landing on the Anzio beachhead to the capture of Rome. Incidentally he is the son of Mr and Mrs Andrew March of Bakertown. He wrote in part:

Since June 12 we have been testing. It is good to be away from the booming of our own big guns and the screaming of incoming shells and the diving of planes. I've even seen a few movies but the darn things are all about war and for instance "A Guy Named Joe," "Sergeant York," etc. If you saw "Sergeant York" maybe you can remember the sound of the shells as they came screaming at you. Well, if I haven't heard a thousand or more I have not heard one. I had one land on my dugout and blow a large hole in the roof. The roof was all that saved me. But I am sure glad that is all over. At least for a while. I came near being transferred out of this regiment. But they know a good man when they see one and they kept me.

Every now and then we see some wrecked German guns and the ones that used to shoot at us—even the "Anzio Express" after seeing all these things, I can't understand how we ever survived the old Anzio beachhead. We've also seen the things our own air corps did and even the targets we used to shoot at. At one time we shot 150 tons of steel in a twenty-four hour day. That doesn't include the forty tons of powder it took to shoot at. Maybe that will give you an idea why we worked 24 hours a day.

The war has a great many scenes and sights that make you sick, but when you get to see places like Rome you seem to forget all those things. You can walk down a street in Rome that is just as modern as Chicago. Then you turn down a side street and find men making hand carved furniture with hammers and chisels. Then you run onto relics of ancient buildings that have crumbled until only the pillars and the corner stones stand. I am sure glad the Germans never made a stand at Rome for we would have wrecked it as we did Cisterno and other towns.

We are getting good food now and plenty of it. We are getting the news here also quite fast. A few of the boys have radios. I may get to see "This is The Army."

My time to remain here in the United States is short but I am enjoying the few weeks I have left here. Let me hear from you all. Ernest A Rauch

Finally I've reached a place where I can write I've seen a lot of ocean and a few islands—a tip which I consider priceless. On the boat coming over I really enjoyed myself. Believe it or not, I didn't get seasick.

The boat carried a beautiful collection of records, ballads, juke, and a very complete set of classics. They were played two hours a day over the ship's P. A. system, one hour of popular music and one hour of classics.

From daylight until dark, every day, we played hearts. Our chovy

was excellent, milk every morning, jam with every meal, fresh bread, pie, cake, oranges and very little "spam". I slept on deck every night. The second night however, it rained cats and dogs, forcing yours truly to retreat to the hold about 3 o'clock in the morning. The next night I made my sack waterproof—well, almost waterproof anyway.

To sum up the whole trip I slept, ate, played cards, thought a lot about home, and grew fat.

I'm with my outfit now—which I think I'm going to scuttlebutt our chovy and living are the best in the South Pacific. We live in half tent, half hut affairs—wood deck, tent top. Sack time is attained on cots under mosquito netting. No foolin', I actually like it here. I'd like to be home, but I'm having experiences that money couldn't buy. It's much easier to get bottled coke here than it is in the states. We also have Hershey chocolate bars and other kinds of candy. Cigarettes are only four bits a carton. For a while I could get only Camels, but now they have Chesterfields here. Our laundry is done for us weekly, gists. We have hot and cold running water and holes in the snow-caps that make it very impracticable to drop the soap. I've lost about two bars already. As for clothing we wear as little as possible—next to nothing.

Write often and I'll do the same.
