#### Ralph Anderson Breaks Gym Record Again With 34 Points

It must have been a rabbit's foot 'er sumptin', but the Buchanan Bucks, led 17th in Michigan Class B teams, took the Three Rivers Wildcats (rated 10th) 70 to 46 Tuesday evening.

Playing the best form they have shown this year, the Bucks took the lead early and steadily pulled away from the Cats, with no second-half let-downs, as in the Niles game. Their shooting was deluxe, as they cashed in on 45% of their shots. A 33% average is considered excellent, states Coach Steffen, who does not seem unhappy about the whole thing. The scintillating star was Ralph Anderson, who again set an all-time gym record by making 34 points in a single game. He made the former gym record of 33 points last year. Gordie Smith netted 16 points and Joe Letter 11, the remaining 9 points being distributed among several players. Niles had been rated sixth best. There is reported to be some reshuffling going on after last night. Niles had an idle night and had a member scouting Three Rivers, whom they play Friday night.

Buchanan played one of its best games this season, and might have won had it not been for Pohlman's crazy hook shot from the foul line.

The Bucks got underway with a starting lead in the first quarter. With baskets by Smith and Letcher adding up, it seemed that they would have a very good night. But then a few breaks and baskets by Hagg, Tipton and Behlman erased the lead and tied up the game, the score standing 11-11 at the end of the period.

Buchanan got the tip at the start of the second quarter and the game became fast with the Indians taking the lead. Buchanan, playing just as well, hung close behind. Both teams were playing their best, with Varda leading St. Joseph with 9 points and Anderson-Lop for Buchanan with 7 points. The game ended the half with the Indians leading 26-21.

As the third quarter began Smith and Anderson were hitting and the Bucks caught up while the Buchanan fans were really whooping it up. It looked like a brand new ball game and the Indians called time out. When they resumed the Bucks and Indians played neck and neck, neither able to stay ahead. Anderson and Smith led Buchanan with 3 and 6 points, while Varda, Pohlman and Tipton headed the Indians with four points each. The third quarter ended with the score tied up, 33-33.

The Bucks went into the lead again as the fourth began. But the Indians snapped right back and the Bucks were slowed down by four fouls. The fourth ended 45-45.

The tip for the first overtime went to Buchanan and the Bucks started stalling, keeping complete control of the ball, but the buzzer sounded before they got a shot and the 45-45 tie stood. The second overtime was played as a "sudden death." Buchanan got the ball and missed a few shots and then the Indians got the ball and took the game 47-45.

Anderson was high man with 19 points. The Bucks won the reserve game 27-22. Nichols was high for Buchanan with 10. Dietrich was high for the Indians with 9.

#### 1953 December Holiday Mail At All-Time High

#### Postmaster Wesner Reports A Record Receipt Of \$82,233 In 1953

The Christmas holiday business during December at the Buchanan postoffice set another all-time high in total number of stamp cancellations, exceeding that of the previous record year of 1952 by 16,864. Comparative stamp cancellations for December in the two years were as follows: December, 1952, 212,378; December, 1953, 229,242.

These totals are arrived at through the automatic records of the stamp cancellation machines, which are used on first class letters, postals and greeting cards. This does not include such mail origination at the Clark Equipment, Electro-Voice, or Buchanan Co-ops, Inc., which have their own cancellation machines. Neither does it include such mail as parcel post, newspapers, and various other publications and broadcasts mailed with a permit. There is consequently no record of the total pieces in such classifications, although it is known that the growth has been large, especially in parcel post. In the event that a parcel is sent first class, the stamps are cancelled and enumerated by hand, and added to the automatic cancellation totals. No record is kept of incoming pieces of mail which underwent stamp cancellation of the office of origin.

The rapid annual growth in all classifications is indicated by the following total receipts for three years: 1951, \$67,287.42; 1952, \$75,317.48; 1953, \$82,233.05.

#### Lions To Sell, Install Plates Sat. Afternoon

#### Leonine Salesmen Prowl The Streets To Fine Lions Without Plates

The Lions club members will take over the streets of Buchanan Saturday afternoon for the sale of "Michigan Booster" license plates, to be placed on the front of cars.

These plates do not bear license numbers, but advertise the "Water Wonderland of Michigan", with the name of Buchanan across the bottom. The plates will be in the same colors, with gold lettering and a blue background. The plates also bear in gold outline a map of the recreation area of the state, consisting of the upper part of the Lower Peninsula and all of the Upper Peninsula.

The charge for these plates is \$1.25. They will also sell the brackets for attachment secured from local auto dealers. The price will be 50c. Each of the obliging Lions will be equipped with a screwdriver and a pocket full of bolts and nuts and will install the plates for you at a charge of 25c.

Additional revenue is now in course of receipt at any time one Lion finds the auto of another Lion without the "booster plate" installed. This means a fine of 25c. This is not all—extra fines may be charged when other Lions detect the absence of the plate before the delinquent Lion gets it on. This ruling went into effect Monday.

In charge of the preceding will be Joe Sexton, chairman, assisted by Francis Mitch and Charles Trapp. A careless Lion would be a large source of income. The Lions will turn \$150 of the receipts to the Jerry Lauver Fund.

#### B. R. Woodworth Elected BBA Head

#### Association Discusses Sign Ordinance: Decide To Send Questionnaire To Merchants

The Buchanan Business Association held a dinner meeting and the annual election at the American Legion Hall, Tuesday night. The following were elected:

President, B. R. Woodworth, vice-president, Bob Koenigshof, secretary, John Folks, treasurer, Frances Elliott, board of directors, Esther Hamilton, Arthur Anderson, H. E. Batcher, Walter Hawes.

They discussed several topics briefly, including the proposed changes in the city sign ordinance. They decided to have a questionnaire drawn up and circulated among the merchants.

Changes which the city commission has contemplated are:

1. Addition of a fee for inspection, possibly \$2 yearly.
2. Additional requirement of a license fee from installers.
3. Liberalization of a clause stipulating extent of projection from the building over the sidewalk, now limited to one foot. It was suggested that the only requirement as to horizontal extension from the building front be that the sign must not extend within four feet from the curb, to obviate possible damage from the overhang of trucks. The ordinance now requires that the bottom of the sign must be not less than 10 feet above the sidewalk.

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### Irate But Anonymous Taxpayer Charges Pupils Barred In Storm

#### School Seeks Headache Cure By Television Programs In The Auditorium During The Noon Hour To Forestall Galloping Brigades In Halls

The Record received a letter during the past week from a Buchanan resident stating that he-or-she had passed the high school building on a very stormy day, and noted a large number of pupils standing outside the building. On question, they replied that they were not allowed to enter until a certain time. Says our informant: "I know that some of them are not attending school today as they have colds from that exposure."

The letter begins "I hope that the Record is a free paper and will print this." This letter was not signed with the writer's name. It is one of the unwritten laws in journalism that responsible papers require a like responsibility from letter writers. They may sign it "Taxpayer," or "Friend of The Schools," or what they please, but somewhere on the letter must be the name and address of the writer.

The name will not be divulged—except in those rare but sometimes real cases when statements are found to be untrue and, verging on libel. At least any complainant who asks the newspaper to demonstrate its courage and "freedom" should accept the same responsibilities himself. If he knows what he says is true, and is in the public interest, then he need have no fear. Sign your name to your letter if you are sure it is such. It will in such case be the obligation of the paper not to reveal your identity.

However, the writer's complaint falls in the classification of "in the public interest." So we will comment.

Our first comment is 1. It is good policy to go first to the authority which is directly responsible. In so doing you may really be doing a service to the head of the schools. You will find the superintendent willing to listen, to inform you of some angles in the problem you may not be aware of, and he will also be willing to receive and consider whatever you can tell him that he does not know. "This is always a course which achieves best community relations and which gets the best and most direct results."

2. Our second comment is that we are taking our own advice by referring to the school heads, who are the only persons to deal responsibly with the matter in question.

The game was a hard battle with plenty of thrills to give the crowd a rowdy night. The game started off like a new ball through in as the doors opened at 6 p.m.

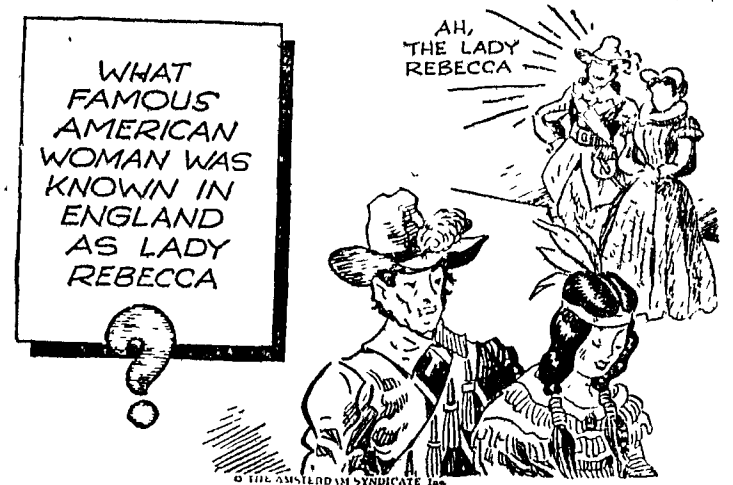

## Will Consider Protest Versus Extension Limit

Some Merchants Protest That Buchanan Requirement Does Not Conform To Common Practice

A leading item for consideration of the city commission at their January meeting next Monday evening will be the advisability of modifying the city sign ordinance enacted in December, 1951.

This was first called to the attention of the commission when the operator of a new business asked permission to erect a sign extending farther from the building than the one foot stipulated by the present ordinance. The problem is complicated by the fact that non-conforming advertising signs had been erected since the enactment of the ordinance, in which cases the owners had not asked city permission and the city had not noted the violations. Owners of these signs have since been asked to remove them and to replace with conforming signs. However, the commission has agreed on request to reconsider the present ordinance with a view to the feasibility of modifications. The question raised by operators

in the business district is confined to the distance which the sign may extend at a right angle over the sidewalk, so that it will attract more attention from street traffic. It was suggested by one city official that any modification of this distance should be limited by requirement that signs should not extend to within four feet from the edge of the sidewalk. Since Buchanan had no sign ordinance previous to December 1951, most of the signs in the city had been erected before and are consequently not subject to the one-foot length requirement. The city law cannot be retroactive, and consequently those signs may be retained, subject only to proper maintenance requirements. If any possessor would remove one of the old signs, he would have to conform to the ordinance in replacement.

## German Farmer Gets Heifer From Church Brethren

34 Given Through Heifer Project, Inc., To Build Herds

Tomorrow, Jan. 15, 1954, a heifer owned by Church of the Brethren in Buchanan, Mich., was given to a refugee German farmer at Lehrte near Hanover, Germany. He and thirty-three others who are starting life anew in the freedom of Western Germany will receive cattle distributed by Heifer Project, Inc., New Windsor, Maryland. These animals, given as an expression of good will and understanding of the American people, are often the first livestock the German farmers have owned since leaving their homes and herds on the other side of the Iron Curtain.

Charles H. Hill, supervisor development manager for the New Products Corp., of Benton Harbor, will be the speaker of the evening at the next meeting of the Buchanan Junior Chamber of Commerce Tuesday, Jan. 23, at 8 p.m. Mr. Hill will speak from the theme, "Leads To Leadership." He comes with a reputation as a very competent speaker. Visitors who may wish to hear Mr. Hill will be welcome at this meeting, which will be held at the Moccasin school gymnasium.
