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Mrs. Mabel Mummey presented a check from Metea Court to Robert Powers, chairman of the Buchanan United Way drive. This represented the kick-off gift for the campaign.

## Kick Off United Way Drive

Tuesday's Perc Club was devoted to a kick-off of the Buchanan United Way drive. Chairman Robert Powers said that the goal of almost \$54,000 would be attainable only by increased participation in the community.

Mrs. Mabel Mummey, representing Metea Court, presented a check to represent the first gift. It was from money raised by the residents from a bazaar.

W. H. Keefe of the Berrien County Cancer Service explained that his organization provided service with specialized home nursing care, provided dressings and some financial assistance to cancer patients in the county. He said that the patient load increased from 210 in 1973 to 440 in 1975. Some 14 percent of the patients are from Buchanan.

The kick-off speaker was James Jurries from Holland, Michigan, who has been connected with that city's successful United Way efforts.

Barbara Price, representing the Red Cross blood program, said that the Bloodmobile will be in the Clark lot Thursday and Friday. She said 300 pints are needed in those two days.

Powers said that the hope was to blitz the community starting on Wednesday to keep up the momentum of the drive over a short space of time. He said that a great deal of work on the drive has already been accomplished by the chairmen within the local industries.

## City Talks About What To Do About Ambulance

The Buchanan city commission has been concerned with the problem of seeing that emergency ambulance service is available in Buchanan after November 17 and had met in special session to discuss the situation. The city manager attended a special meeting in Niles and reported that each municipality is requested to send a representative to future meetings on the subject. Both Joe Garbert and Gene Wesner volunteered.

On Monday the commission voted to join the county data processing system for their tax calculations. They had studied private plans but decided that this would be the best way to go.

Having been turned down for 701 funds to enable them to devise a new master plan for the city at a cost of about \$20,000, the commission decided to re-apply for possible funds next year.

The commission adopted two traffic control orders confirming earlier action to get rid of parking meters in the city lot and to extend parking limitations along Days Avenue.

Two firms were present and one gave a slide presentation on treating and caring for the city's trees. The commission tabled any action pending further information.

There was considerable discussion about a new policy requiring dry wall installation in paved parking areas. Junior Achievement has been wanting to improve their parking lot, but the dry wall installation is expensive. Finally, an ordinance was passed which threw the responsibility back to the local code enforcement officer. The ordinance was passed as an emergency measure to control any current paving of lots. The main point is to prevent anybody's lot from draining onto a neighbor's.

Five bids were received for construction of a new Charles Cook bridge. The low bid of Resco-Elkhart for \$25,070.88 was accepted.

Mrs. Don Ryman, chairman of Buchanan's Bicentennial committee was present to report that archeological diggings at the old mill site have as yet netted nothing and have been discontinued until October. She reported that there had been problems with vandalism at the site. She said her committee is contemplating publishing a book, putting on a parade next 4th of July and possibly having a pageant.

The final figure for the Schirmer Parkway was \$299,565.20.

## Let's Upgrade Our Education

We interviewed one of the officers in the admissions office at Michigan State University and were discouraged with what we were told.

According to this educator, colleges and universities have drastically reduced their requirements for admission and graduation. Some of this stems from the student riots of the sixties and some is from the fact that many of the colleges over-built during the war baby boom and are now trying to fill their facilities.

It was further reported that high schools have lowered their standards. The man interviewed said that in many cases, the senior year in high school is unproductive and wasteful, requiring much catch-up work during the freshman year in college.

The fact remains that the products being turned out of public schools have, in many cases, poor background in communications. They are ill-prepared for what they must eventually face on the outside.

In Buchanan's elementary, middle and high school faculties are many who are aware of the problem and are trying to do something to correct it. But in some cases, the high school teachers blame the middle school, who in turn blames the elementary, who in turn blames parents or television.

Companies and industries are going to be in the spot where they can be selective about the young people they hire. The young people from Buchanan and elsewhere are going to have to compete for the better positions. It would be better if they were taught to compete in math and English and physics and chemistry now to the same degree that they are taught to compete in volleyball, softball, basketball, and baseball.

As educational standards seem to decline elsewhere, it is hoped that they will be raised in Buchanan. This can be done, but it needs the help, support and concern of parents as well as the dedicated teachers. Buchanan has both the plant and the personnel to turn out well trained students at every level. If we don't produce a top level education for our young people, we have nobody to blame but ourselves.

## The Buchanan Middle School Has Come A Long Way In Six Months

Last year was a rough one for middle school. The new building was not finished on time, and the moving process was traumatic. The concept of open class areas was a new one for both students and teachers.

By the end of last year, several persons including some of the middle school teachers had great doubts about the whole place. They felt that, in the interest of saving money on the new building, there had been too many corners cut, and not enough space had been given to certain areas.

In rooms where partitions still hadn't arrived, classes next to each other seemed to compete. Teachers unaccustomed to this type of building seemed to have to shout to be heard. There seemed to be constant distractions. Whenever anybody would walk through the building, every head seemed to turn.

As teachers would try to settle their classes down for a short period of study, the intercom would announce last night's volleyball tournament results. A cheer would come up from another part of the building. Some concerned parents started calling it "Fun City." One observer said that the middle school was nothing but a big play pen.

The informality in many cases was interpreted as lack of discipline. Teachers in high school wondered just what kind of products would eventually arrive as freshmen. This fall some of the high school faculty reported individual problems with the new students, but most admitted no more than the usual amount of difficulty.

This writer kept studying it and listening to the comments. In an effort to be fair, a great many interviews took place. Richard Proud, middle school principal, said that there were many difficulties, but he urged patience. "Many of the problems are already working out," he predicted. He has been in constant communication with his faculty, and there has been

## Buchanan Police Have Busy Week

In addition to the raid at 308 Main Street and the foiled robbery attempt at Kwik Serv, the Buchanan police have had a busier-than-normal week and weekend.

Last Wednesday somebody damaged two tractors belonging to the high school. They broke the throttle linkage on both of them and turned the lights on so that the batteries were run down. They removed spark plug wires from one of the tractors.

Last Thursday morning they arrested Claude Abbott from Benton Harbor on a warrant for assault and battery on May Bybee.

John Bittle, an employee of Schaller Construction Co., reported that air conditioning equipment awaiting installation was stolen from the West Wind apartments. It was valued at \$1253.

On Saturday afternoon Gene Barker, Niles, was arrested on a warrant charging him with failure to appear for trial. He had

originally been charged with driving on a revoked license.

Julius Hearington, Buchanan, was also arrested for failure to appear at his trial. He had been charged with reckless driving.

Harland Haines, Vandalia, and Donald Matthews of Cassopolis were arrested and charged with carrying concealed weapons after a loaded 22 caliber pistol was found under the front seat of their car.

Police arrested James Lewellan of Niles on a charge of driving under the influence of liquor early Sunday morning after his car went through a red light at Front and Redbud.

While serving a search warrant on an unrelated matter, police smelled burning marijuana in an apartment at 126 W. Alexander. Arrested for violation of the controlled substance act was Lloyd Thompson, 19, after a small amount of marijuana was revealed. The suspect was released on \$100 bond.

## Robbery Attempt Is Foiled

An armed robbery at Kwik Serv grocery store failed Friday night, foiled by Buchanan police officers, the Michigan State Police, the Metro Crime unit and the Metro Narcotics department. They had been watching the store and arrested an armed man who attempted to hold up a detective who had been posing as a clerk.

The police received a tip that the store was going to be robbed. Lt. Jack Drach of the narcotics squad posed as a clerk and left the store with a bag of money about 12:20 a.m. He was confronted by Leathbert Jones of Niles who pointed a gun and asked for the money. Immediately a large number of police officers came out of hiding and arrested the alleged holdup man. No shots were fired. A .25 caliber hand gun was confiscated.

In signing the proclamation, President Ford said, "I urge all Americans to join with outdoor sportsmen in the wise use of our natural resources and in insuring their proper management for the benefit of future generations."

Hunters and fishermen have paid over \$5 billion for conservation. They were responsible for establishing all 50 state fish and game departments, as well as many federal agencies. Whenever a fish or wildlife game species has become truly scarce, it has been the hunter and fisherman who demanded protection and provided funds to be used for wildlife research management and environmental improvement.

By financing land acquisition and refuges, the sportsman helps insure the welfare of over 1,700 species of wildlife of which only 110 are considered game. Sportsmen were also directly responsible for the tax on their sports equipment being directed to the states for wildlife and fish restoration, hunter safety programs and range construction. The Bend of the River NHF Day observance is one of over 3,000 being held Saturday nationwide. There will be something for everyone, and admission is free. Participants will have an opportunity to shoot a bow and arrow, trap shoot for prizes, or watch the film "A Question of Hunting." A Corn

and Sausage Roast will begin at 1:00, followed by a raffle, with a square stern canoe as first prize. Raffle tickets are available from the program chairman, Roy Jordan, Gambles in Buchanan, Thompson's Archery, Hulley's Bait & Tackle, Niles. 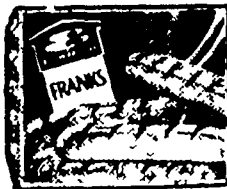

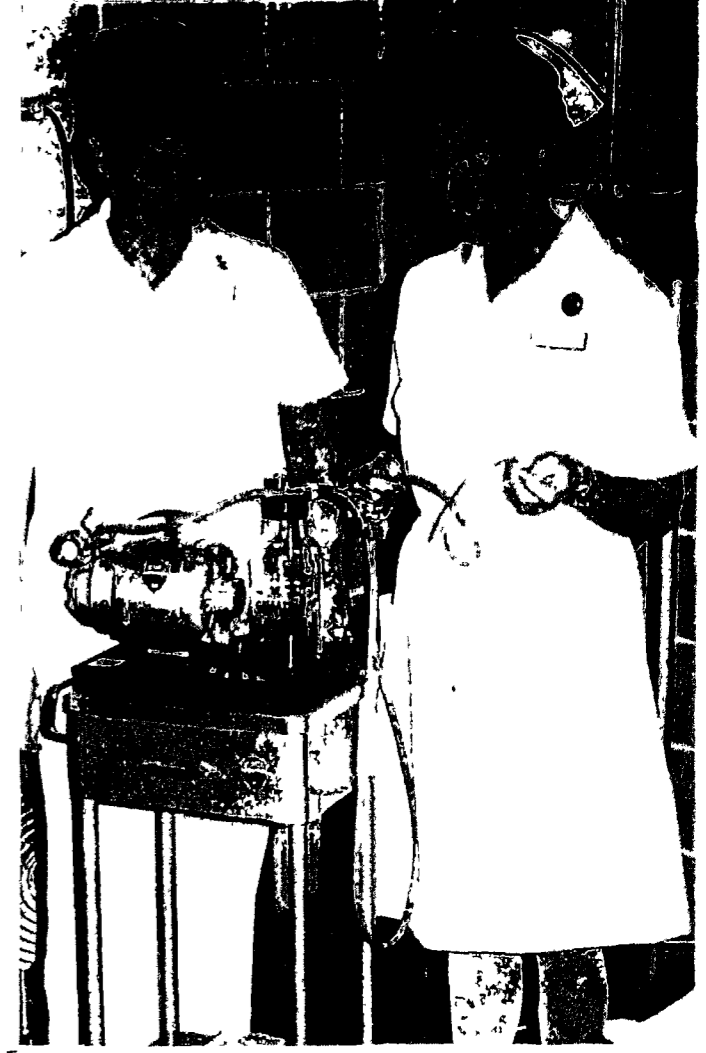

## Buchanan Co-Ops Pays Out \$26,000

Manager Otto Juy announced  
that the Board of Directors of  
Buchanan Co Ops, Inc approved  
the redemption of over \$26,000  
in Allocated Credit Certificates  
issued in 1961.

Juy said the cash was being  
issued at the main office this  
week. The money represents the  
allocated credit portion of the  
patronage dividend issued to  
stockholders who had done busi-  
ness with the Co-Ops in 1961.

Juy went on to explain that as a  
cooperative all of the profit  
derived from purchase of grain  
and sale of supplies to stock-  
holders of Buchanan Co-Op is  
returned to the stockholders.

The amount of patronage divi-  
dend is proportionate to the  
dollar business that each stock  
holder did with his Co Op. Every  
year a portion of the patronage  
dividend is issued in cash and the  
rest in allocated credits. These  
allocated credits are retained by  
the Co-Op for a period of time to  
build facilities and expand ser-  
vices. The allocated credits are  
the stockholder users invest-  
ment in his business. As the  
facilities that these allocated

credits were used for are amor-  
tized the allocated credits are  
redeemed and cash is issued to  
the stockholder.

Juy noted the \$26,000.00 being  
paid out this week brings the  
total amount of allocated credits  
redeemed in the last five years  
to over \$60,000.00.

## Michigan Bell Wants To Charge For Excessive Information Calls

Hearings into Michigan Bell's request to charge for heavy use of information service were concluded before the Michigan Public Service Commission in Lansing last week.

During the hearings, the professional staff of the Commission supported charging for information but recommended a plan that provides a more liberal calling allowance than the telephone company proposed.

Either plan would save telephone customers about \$10 million annually in basic rates.

The company estimated that, under either plan, only about 5 percent of its customers would incur any charge at all for information calls in any given month.

The plan advocated by the MPSC staff would allow customers four free calls to information monthly and also would give each residence customer a monthly credit on his bill.

Like Michigan Bell's plan, calls above the allowance would be charged 20 cents each. Michigan Bell had proposed to limit the monthly allowance to three calls.

The Commission staff agreed with Michigan Bell that exemp-

tions from the 20-cent charge should be granted to persons with visual, physical or mental limitations who have difficulties using the telephone directory.

In testimony before the Commission, Donald M. Lambe, the company's assistant vice president-revenues, stressed that Michigan Bell's proposal is not designed to increase profits.

It is simply intended, he said, to redistribute information costs in such a way that the heavy users of the service pay their fair share while moderate or infrequent users pay little or nothing.

Under cross-examination, Lambe reemphasized that Michigan Bell does not plan to lay off operators.

The company said that it would be sometime in 1977 before information charging could begin and, by that time, the operator force would be adjusted through attrition without layoffs.

Based on its five-year growth forecast, Michigan Bell said that even with the information charging plan the company will require as many operators in 1980 as it has today.

Generally, calls to information have been rising at a rate twice as fast as the overall increase in telephones, Lambe

said. And the costs of providing the service continue to escalate at an even faster rate.

It will cost Michigan Bell a record \$25 million to provide information service this year and, if calling volumes and wages continue to go up as they have in the past decade, the annual cost will soar to \$50 million within the next 10 years, he predicted.

"Information isn't a free service," Lambe said. "Every customer helps pay for it whether he or she ever calls information. What we want to do is charge those who call it a lot and take the burden off those who don't."

## Urge M/D Patients To Get Flu Shots

The Southwest Michigan Chapter of Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America releases its annual message to area dystrophy patients to consult their physicians on the advisability of being immunized against influenza.

Robert L. Hichman, president of the chapter, says the cost of inoculation will be defrayed by the chapter services program and requested doctors treating the dystrophy patients to send bills for these shots directly to the chapter office at 2011 Sunset Drive, St. Joseph.

Hickman called attention to extensive outbreaks of Asian flu in the last few years and warned that victims of dystrophy and other muscular disorders served by the association are more susceptible to respiratory diseases and should not hesitate to contact their doctors for shots.

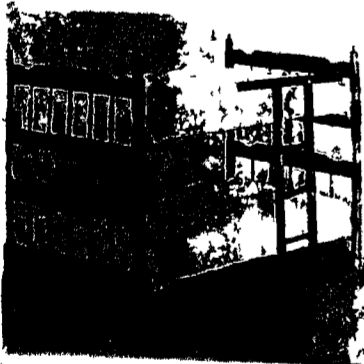

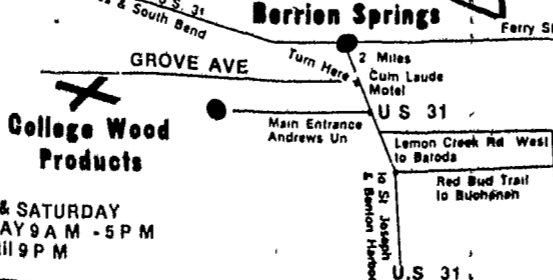

## Buck Efforts Are Thwarted In 8 to 7 Loss

Buchanan coach Dave Shoemaker and his players have to be wondering what it takes to register a win after Friday night's loss to River Valley, the Bucks, who are just three points away from an undefeated 2-0 record, have to settle for an 0-2 mark.

The Bucks misfortunes continued as the Mustangs, by virtue of a two-point extra point edged Buchanan 8-7 on the River Valley field.

Again last week, the tough Buchanan defense held their opponents to a single touchdown for four quarters of action. However, the Buck offense was also held to one touchdown for the second consecutive week.

The Bucks were the first to score, putting seven points on the board with just 1:19 gone in the first quarter. After an attempted on side kick by the Mustangs had been covered by Steve Rufenberg on the 48 yard line it took the Bucks only three plays to cross the goal line. Two carries by fullback Eddie "Junebug" Smith gave Buchanan a first down on the River Valley 41 yard line. It was Willie Brown the rest of the way after breaking through the line, the senior running back raced untouched through the secondary for his longest run from scrimmage of the year. Bryan Virgil kicked the extra point and Buchanan had an early 7-0 lead.

There was no more scoring in the first quarter, and neither team threatened until the Mustangs covered a Willie Brown fumble late in the second quarter. After recovering the fumble near the midfield stripe, the Mustangs put together a 57 yard drive, climaxing by a 20 yard pass from Jeff Schmidt to Dave North. The Mustangs, who were helped along the way by a 15

yard personal foul penalty, moved the ball down the field with their passing attack. After scoring, the Mustangs elected to go for the two point conversion and the lead. A missed assignment in the defensive backfield left North open for another Schmidt pass and an 8-7 lead at halftime.

The second half was a defensive battle all the way. Neither team was able to score, even though a River Valley fumble gave Buchanan a first and goal on the Mustang six yard line. Three Buchanan plays netted four yards, leaving the Buck coaches with a tough decision on fourth down and two yards for a touchdown. The Bucks called a time-out so that Shoemaker could talk over the choices with his quarterback and field goal kicker, Bryan Virgil. The decision was to go for the touchdown. If the Bucks had gone for the field goal and made it, they would have had just a two point lead with the entire fourth quarter still to be played. Unfortunately Willie Brown was thrown for a four yard loss, and River Valley took over the ball. Buchanan was unable to mount a threat the rest of the game.

Coach Shoemaker was again very proud of his defense. "We've only allowed one touchdown each game. With that kind of defensive performance we should be winning," he commented. "It was the mistake on offense that killed us. You can't win too many games when you turn the ball over five times," he added.

Special praise on defense has to go to Richard Sanford and Larry Granger who led the team in tackles with 17 and 16 apiece. Barry Manley played a very good game also, constantly rushing the passer while making

four solo tackles, Robert Luke and Eddie Smith each added 13 tackles and assists while Kevin Vanderbush came up with his second interception in two games.

This Friday the Bucks will host defending Blossomland champion Coloma. The Comets with All-Conference running back John Bertuca, and the "league's best passer" in Ron Cooper will be a big challenge for Buchanan. Game time is again 7:30.

President Hanson reported that the Middle School traffic study is still in progress. Supt. Dougherty reported that the City Commission and the Township Board are meeting with the County Road Commission to try and resolve the Rynearsen Road traffic problem.

Motion by Member Moon, seconded by Member Rossow, that the Board approve the contract with the Buchanan Association of Educational Secretaries for 1975-76. AYES: Members Luke, DeVos, Moon, Hanson, Larson, Rossow and Mahan. NAYS: None. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Mahan, seconded by Member Luke, that the eight-semester graduation requirement be waived for Gail Bush at the recommendation of Dr. Vanderbush, High School Principal. Unanimously carried.

The 1975-76 tuition rates were tabled to the October meeting.

Motion by Member Larson, seconded by Member DeVos,

that the Board accept the following resolution.

WHEREAS Buchanan Community Schools, Berrien County, Michigan is as a result of acquisitions the owner of the real estate and school building of the former district known as Howe; and

WHEREAS The school building of said former district is presently not in use for normal school purposes and will not be in the foreseeable future; and

WHEREAS The building and property of said district is a source of expense for maintenance; and

WHEREAS It is the opinion of this Board that said property and building should be sold if reasonable prices can be obtained therefrom; and

WHEREAS Act 269 of the Public Acts of 1955, known and edited as "The School Code of 1955" and Act 208 of the Public Acts of 1963, give this Board authority "to sell any property of the district which is no longer required thereby for school purposes, and to give proper deeds passing title to the same."

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that all property, hereinafter described more in detail, be put up for bids on a cash basis, with the right reserved by this District to refuse to accept any and all bids submitted, the legal description of said property being as follows:

Whereas by proceedings of the Berrien County Board of Education under paragraph 340.1, section 3 of the "School Code of 1955" this district became the owner of the premises described as:

"Commencing 361 feet West of the Southeast corner of Section 2, Township 8 South, Range 18 West, thence West 274.9 feet, thence North 665 feet, thence East 253.2 feet to a point 332.8 feet West of the East line of said section 2, thence South 1 degree 52' East 666.35 feet to the place of beginning, containing 4 acres,

Further, be it resolved that all bids shall be accompanied by a certified check payable to this district for 10 percent of the bid, such payments by unsuccessful bidders to be returned within ten days of opening of requested bids, and

Be it further resolved, that bids be submitted to the Secretary of this Board not later than 7:30 p.m. November 10, 1975, with closing within forty-five calendar days of acceptance.

AYES: Members Rossow, Larson, Hanson, Moon, DeVos, Luke and Mahan.

NAYS: None. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Moon, seconded by Member Mahan, that certain inactive Activity Funds, as outlined by the Business Manager, be closed and the deficit amount absorbed in the General Fund. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Larson, seconded by Member Rossow, that the local Board of Education affiliate with the National School Board Association and pay the annual dues of \$250. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Member Mahan, seconded by Member Larson, that the teaching staff for 1975-76, as outlined by Supt. Dougherty, be ratified by the Board. Unanimously carried.

Summer school reports were presented for elementary school by Mr. Fischer, and for Special Education by Mr. May (Reports attached to official minutes).

Mr. Robert Beckfort, certified public accountant who audited the Buchanan Community Schools accounts, presented the official audit. Copies of the audit will be placed in the public library, the high school library, and the school business office. Motion by Member Moon, seconded by Member Rossow, that the Board accept the auditor's report for the 1974-75 school year as presented by Mr. Beckfort. Unanimously carried.

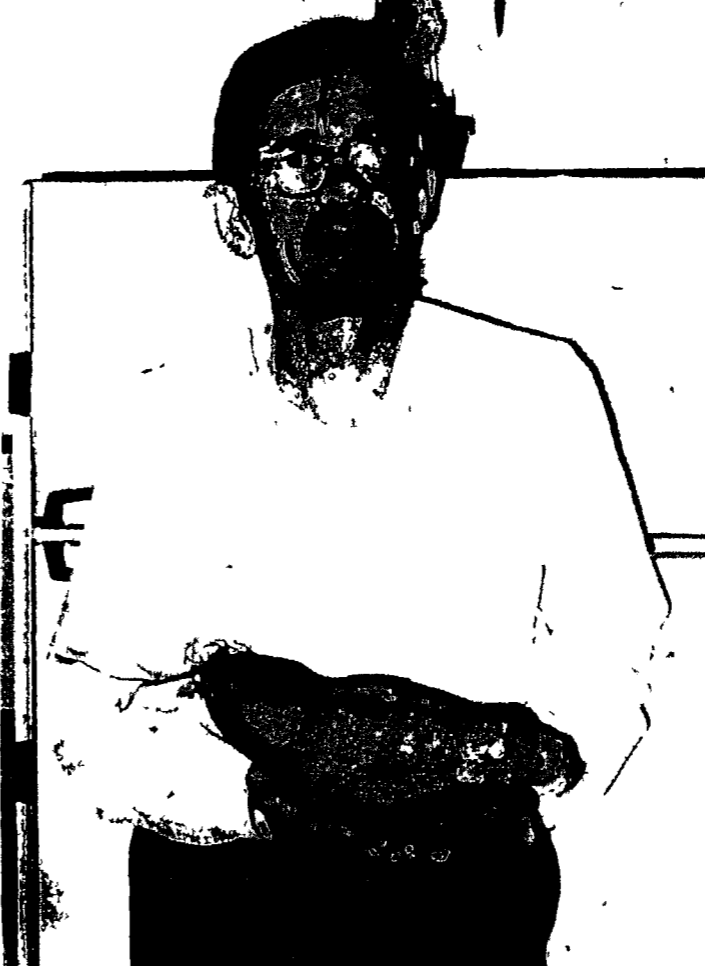

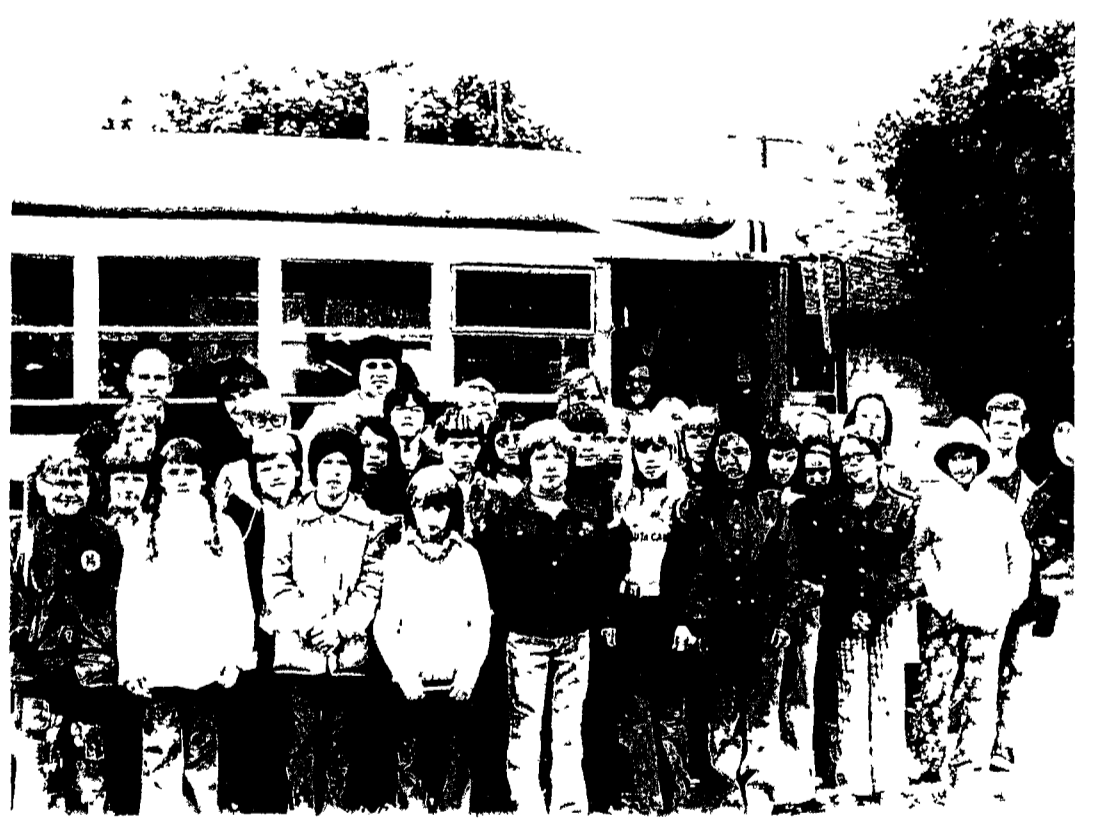
