We extend to the Galien people our congratulations for a real achievement. Both town and township have worked together in that plan.

The drive committee directing the finance campaign is confident that they can raise the money that will be required to translate the architect's drawing into brick, steel, and concrete. In fact, the progress which they already have made encourages that belief.

Nevertheless, their success will require a wide community support. And it will be much better for the future of the institution if it is achieved by a wide community support. Everyone who gives will have a stake, a reason for personal pride and interest. That's the healthy way to do such things. We don't want a few to give the entire amount. Let's all get into this picture.

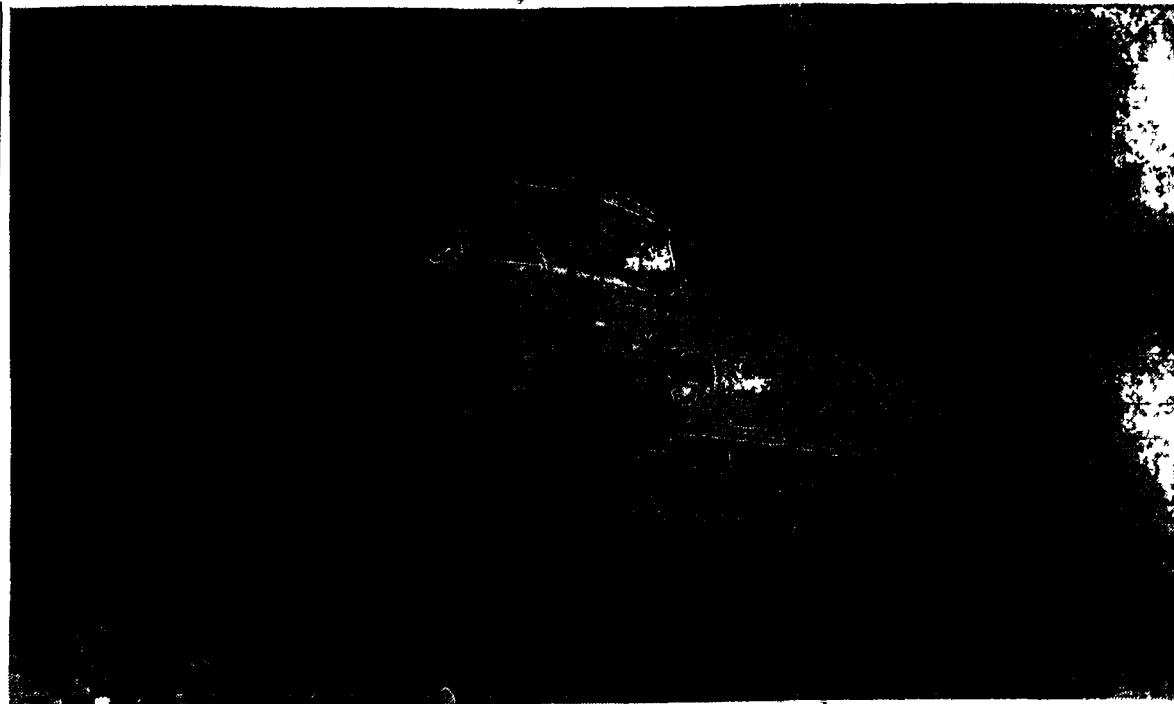

Her sister, Mrs. William Keller, entered Pawating, Sunday, for observation and medical care.

Case Of Mystery Car On Redbud Trail Solved

The Buchanan police received a call at 2:55 Wednesday, Aug. 4, stating that a car had run off the Red Bud Trail just below the sand hill north of Buchanan, lodging at the edge of the stream, with no owner or driver in sight.

The call was referred to the sheriff's department and the local deputies, Robert Rinker and Russell Dillavou, were sent to the scene.

They found a 1954 Chevrolet Tudor had run off the trail a short distance below the sandhill, down a steep pitch about 100 feet in length, finally coming to a halt with one front wheel in the water, the car practically undamaged.

The tire marks where the car left the trail made a direct turn off the pavement, with no skid marks, centered the space between the two guide posts as though driven purposely. At the water's edge the front wheels crumpled, stopping the car. Marks on the right front fender indicated that it possibly bumped a tree in progress.

There was no sign of the owner. His identity was finally determined by a check of engine numbers as the property of Gary T. Reeks of Benton Harbor. Nothing could be found of his whereabouts. Deputy Casserly brought a boat from the sheriff's office and Deputy Rinker furnished his own for dragging the river.

They ceased at 8 p.m. and at 8:30 p.m. a call was received that Reeks had turned up at his own home, apparently with no idea of what had happened.

130 Attend First Reunion Of The Thompson School

The first reunion of the Thompson school which was held Sunday in the Center Meeting House on the Morris Farm instead of on the school grounds as planned, was attended by 130 persons.

The teacher, Mrs. Everett Watson, Buchanan, was mistress of ceremonies, and made the presentation of gifts to the honored guests. The teacher who taught the school the longest time ago (more than 50 years ago) was Mrs. Nellie Hastings Richmond of South Bend.

Mrs. Clara Bowerman, age 83, of Niles, was the oldest pupil and Craig Villeneuve, age 6, was the youngest. Mrs. Mary Morrison, South Bend, was the teacher attending from the greatest distance. Mrs. Catherine Frank, Fremont, O., was the pupil attending from the greatest distance. Mrs. Belva R. Heath of Caracas, Venezuela, S. A., was a guest at the reunion.

Replacing the Bards quartet who were unable to attend, was the Bucaan-Aires quartet, comprising John Shanahan, Victor Vignasky, LeVonne Zelman and Lee Pierce of Buchanan, who entertained with songs, and novelty numbers. The history of the school prepared by Mrs. Imogene Hess was read by Mrs. Watson.

The present school building was built in 1861 to replace the log school. The frame structure was built at a cost of \$500 and the first paint job, including material and labor, cost \$4. The first teacher was paid \$16.25 for a three-month period, half in cash and half in coupons redeemable at a Niles store. The old school is being replaced by a new modern brick structure which is being built two miles east of Buchanan on the Niles road. It is expected that the new school will be completed before the fall term starts. The new school will be known as the Cedar Lane school, and is a three-room structure. There will be about 90 pupils enrolled in the kindergarten through the seventh grade.

City To Install Curb And Gutters On Days, Front

Approval was given by the city commission Monday evening to replace curb and gutter on the west side of Days avenue between Smith street and Jordan street, comprising 565 feet, and also to replace 1,110 feet of curb and gutter on the north side of East Front street from Moccasin to Detroit street.

The cost of installation on Days avenue is estimated at \$1,695 and installation cost on West Front is estimated at \$3,950, for curb, gutter and catch-basin rebuilding and the small amount of widening necessary to attain a 37-foot-wide street. The commission voted to set aside the sum of \$5,645 for the improvements on Days avenue and West Front.

The city commission voted at the regular bi-monthly meeting Monday night to proceed with the installation of curb and gutter on West Chicago street between Detroit and Terre Coupe. This was the occasion for the last hearing and no objectors appeared. A total assessment roll of \$5,505.00 had been set up to cover the total cost.

Irvine Made Supervisor: Thomas Irvine, who has been serving as an alternate member of the board of supervisors representing Buchanan, was named to the post of regular supervisor, replacing E. B. Ross, resigned.

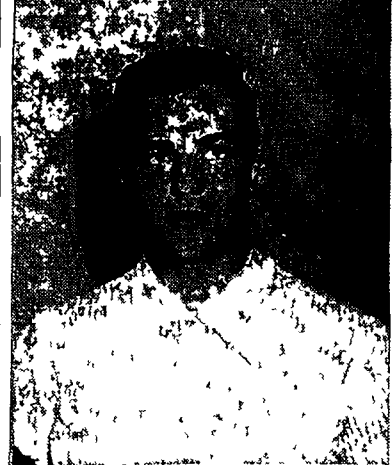

Another member who is a member of the guard force at Niles stated that he knew that large sums were dealt out to disabled veterans or their families in cases of need, including at one time a fire in this vicinity that destroyed a veterans' home.

City Commission Ask Applications For Post Of Fire Chief

- High school education.

 - Command experience and leadership ability.
- Residence in city of Buchanan. The appointee will be given full responsibility as fire department head and will be given full charge of all fire department operations. He will also be responsible for all fire prevention work and for observance of fire prevention requirements.

Commission Proceedings

Buchanan, Michigan August 9th, 1954. Regular meeting of the City Commission of the City of Buchanan, Michigan, held in the City Hall of said City on Monday, August 9th, 1954, at 7:30 p.m.

Meeting was called to order by Mayor Anderson. Roll call showed the following members present: Anderson, Hagley, Deming, Smith, City Manager, Clerk and Treasurer. Absent: Derflinger and City Attorney.

Commissioner Smith was called away as the meeting was called to order. Minutes of previous meeting were presented. Moved by Commissioner Hagley, seconded by Commissioner Deming, that the minutes be approved as printed and circulated. Motion carried on roll call.

In accordance with the action of the City Commission at their meeting on July 12th, 1954, that a hearing would be held on the Special Assessment Roll No. 84, for the construction of Curb, Gutter and Drainage on West Chicago Street between Detroit Street and Terre Coupe Road. No objectors being present. The following resolution was offered by Commissioner Deming, (Continued on Page 4)

Clark Equipment company earnings for the first six months of 1954 were lower than for the first six months of 1953—\$2.44 per share compared with \$2.71 per share a year ago. But second quarter earnings '54 were higher than the first quarter—\$1.35 for the second quarter and \$1.09 for the first quarter. And Clark management expects the final six months of '54 to be "as good or perhaps slightly better" than the first six months. (In 1953, Clark earnings aggregated \$4.55 per share.)

Sales figures followed a similar pattern. They're lower for the first six months of '54 than for the corresponding '53 period. But second quarter '54 sales are higher than the first quarter by 11%. (Second quarter earnings are up 23% over the first quarter.)

The decrease in sales during the past year has been primarily the result of reduced Government purchases of industrial trucks. A secondary factor has been curtailed automotive division sales—the decreased activity of farm tractor and motor truck manufacturers is the principal reason. But increased sales of Clark's new construction machinery division offset the decrease in automotive division sales—and at the same time helped absorb some of its capacity. (When the automotive division supplies components to either the industrial truck division or the construction machinery division, the transfer is not listed as a "sale." It is therefore possible for the automotive division to show decreased sales on increased production.)

One factor that accounts for the "cautious optimism" expressed by the Clark management for the balance of the year is the outlook for the construction machinery division. The second 6-months will be heavily weighted with CMD sales because shipments of Clark's newly developed tractor shovel started in May; consequently, the first and second quarter statements reflect relatively little volume on this new product. At the time the first deliveries were made, Clark had a backlog of approximately \$8 million on this item.

Another reason to support management's belief that the second half of '54 will produce sales and earnings comparable with the first half is the continued firm market for Clark's industrial trucks—fork lifts, straddle carriers, powered hand trucks, towing tractors and accessories. (In fact, sales to industrial concerns (which excludes the Government) are running ahead of last year.)

Grade School Band To Compete Aug. 30 At Riverview Park

The Buchanan grade school band has been selected as a competitor in the annual Riverview Park "Tournament of Music," and will appear at the world-famous amusement park in Chicago on August 30.

Directed by R. R. Robinson, the band will hold a featured position in the huge "Land of Enchantment" parade which will march on Riverview's 2-mile Midway as a daily highlight of Mardi Gras season at the park.

More than 75 uniformed units from the four-state area of Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, and Michigan will compete in the tournament, seeking championship awards in a variety of classes.

Riverview, the world's largest amusement park, will stage the tournament and the Mardi Gras celebration over a 23-day span from Aug. 21 through Sept. 12. Competing bands will be guests of the park management at many of the more than 100 rides and entertainment attractions in the 70-acre fun center.

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH, MICH.—A metropolitan daily frontpaged a cartoon this week in which a slouchy, corn-cob smoking character, obviously wise in the ways of hot-stove politics, declared, knowingly:

"Shucks, Name callin' don't mean a thing when you belong to the same political party!"

Berrien's court house was buzzin' this week as both major parties found themselves in that very "name callin'" situation.

New county chairmen emerged from both intra-party squabbles and both new county chairmen had their first job the task of welding the political pieces back together.

In the Republican ranks, the elephantine task fell upon the shoulders of Montgomery Shepard, whose full-time job is president of the Berrien county Abstract and Title Co., of St. Joseph. The job of binding up the wounded feelings of some Democrats who he hopes won't be too muley about it, fell to Al J. Schultz of Stevensville, Mich.

It is that time of the biennial when the county-level candidates on both political parties get together to reorganize the county committee. The procedure is required by law in Michigan and must be done between the time of the last tally of the primary election and the sound of the gavel of the county conventions.

Candidates of both parties were faced with a virtually complete reorganization of their respective committee leaderships. Neither job was accomplished without some bitter words and hurt feelings.

The county GOP candidates were split before they ever went into session to pick a new chairman last Saturday night. A prematurely published report that Benton Harbor Atty. Dalton Seymour was "available" for the job apparently angered a faction which expected the Seymour supporters to try to bulldoze his appointment through.

"This usurps the candidates' right to pick a chairman as a group," they howled. The anti-Seymour bloc came up with the name of Atty. Keith Ball of Niles, as their choice.

Still another faction was against attorneys per se as county chairmen and came up with Shepard as a compromise candidate. The Ball faction rallied behind him and Shepard beat out Seymour in the official voting by 8 to 3.

Before the candidates had finished the job of picking the top leadership for the party for the

next two years, they had made Atty. Thomas Cam of Niles, the county secretary; David F. Upton, young St. Joseph industrialist, the county treasurer, and Mrs. Roy Dukeschere of Benton Harbor, the vice-chairman in charge of the women's division. They had also set up a 90-member county committee, from which a 41-member executive committee was named.

The candidates had also set a precedent. They voted to make themselves members also of that executive group on the theory that the candidates should have some voice in the preferment of patronage. And there are several postmasterships opening up this year, including the big one at Benton Harbor, which with the GOP in the White House will go to Republicans for a change.

Actually, the split in the Republican ranks was as inevitable as politics itself this year. The county party suddenly found itself holding resignations from all of the four top county officers.

That was unusual, because one of those officers was Ben H. Bittner, who had held the post of party secretary for the past 25 years. Bittner said his business responsibilities had increased and "besides, after 25 years, I'm just plain tired."

O. A. D. (Bun) Baldwin, Jr., of Bridgman, also turned thumbs down to the idea of taking another 2-year hitch as county chairman. His personal business also was taking too much of his time.

Then came William White of Niles, who wanted to escape the heavy duties of county treasurer, and Mrs. Mary Powell, Niles, who wanted relief of the duties of vice-chairman.

"There was nothing wrong in the party which caused all the resignations at the same time," a spokesman declared. "It was just a coincidence. Each person had a private reason for wanting out."

Anyway, it leaves Shepard, who was a destroyer commander during World War II, in command of the county GOP for the next two years and he's determined that there will be no further mutiny among the political crew.

"Our job is to get out the vote," Shepard explains. "Republicans in Berrien county must realize that they can't be slackers at the polls on election day just because they live in a heavily Republican district. We need big votes over here to offset the heavy Democratic vote in and around Detroit."

So tense was the division within the ranks of the Democratic county candidates that retiring county chairman Merle (Mike) Gorton of Niles, called them together secretly for the job of choosing a new chairman.

"We knew that if we let it out where and when we were meeting, Gorton explained, 'that we'd have a lot of people mulling around out in the corridors to put pressure on us'."

Seems the bulk of the candidates looked with favor upon Schultz, a longtime party worker in Stevensville. Schultz is probably best known as a past commander of the Berrien County Veterans Council.

However, Ben Rosenberg, a So. du area farmer, made no secret of the fact that he would like the job and ardently campaigned for it—at least, so the scuttlebutt has it.

Came the day of the secret meeting of the candidates and Rosenberg saw his campaign falling apart, so he immediately injected the name of another man he thought the party might rally behind.

That man was Frank Kinst, the Democrat supervisor from New Buffalo township. Kinst was known to be lukewarm to the idea at first, but he warmed up to it as the possibility of his selection loomed.

Came the voting however and

he was outpointed by Schultz in a resounding defeat for the Rosenberg faction.

Schultz, over the next two years, will have the help of Mrs. Loren Troost of St. Joseph, as vice-chairman, Mrs. E. Leon Ramsey of Benton Harbor, as secretary and Gorton as county treasurer.

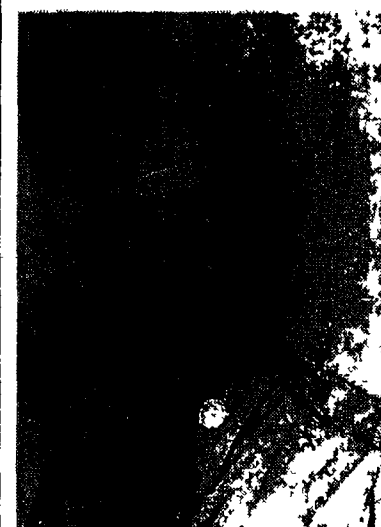

Galien To Dedicate New Library Building Sunday

An event occurs in Galien next Sunday, Aug. 15, that will be both an important occasion and a triumph for many people in that community — the dedication of their new library building.

The dedication service will start at 3 p. m. with the Rev. W. W. DesAutels of the Galien Methodist church giving the dedication speech. Other speakers will include those who headed up special aid, including the following: Mrs. Helen Hoinville, who will tell how the first start was made in 1939.

Morton Hampton, county supervisor, who will tell of the township support.

The structure that is to be dedicated is of brick construction, 36x48 feet in dimension, with a full basement underneath. There is a story connected with the full basement. It was the unfilled cellar left after the old school was burned in 1935. The library is built on the site of the old schoolhouse, and its entrance is exactly where the front steps of

the ancient structure were. Those interested most in the building decided that it would be just as well to have the full basement, since at least it would save hauling a lot of dirt to fill it.

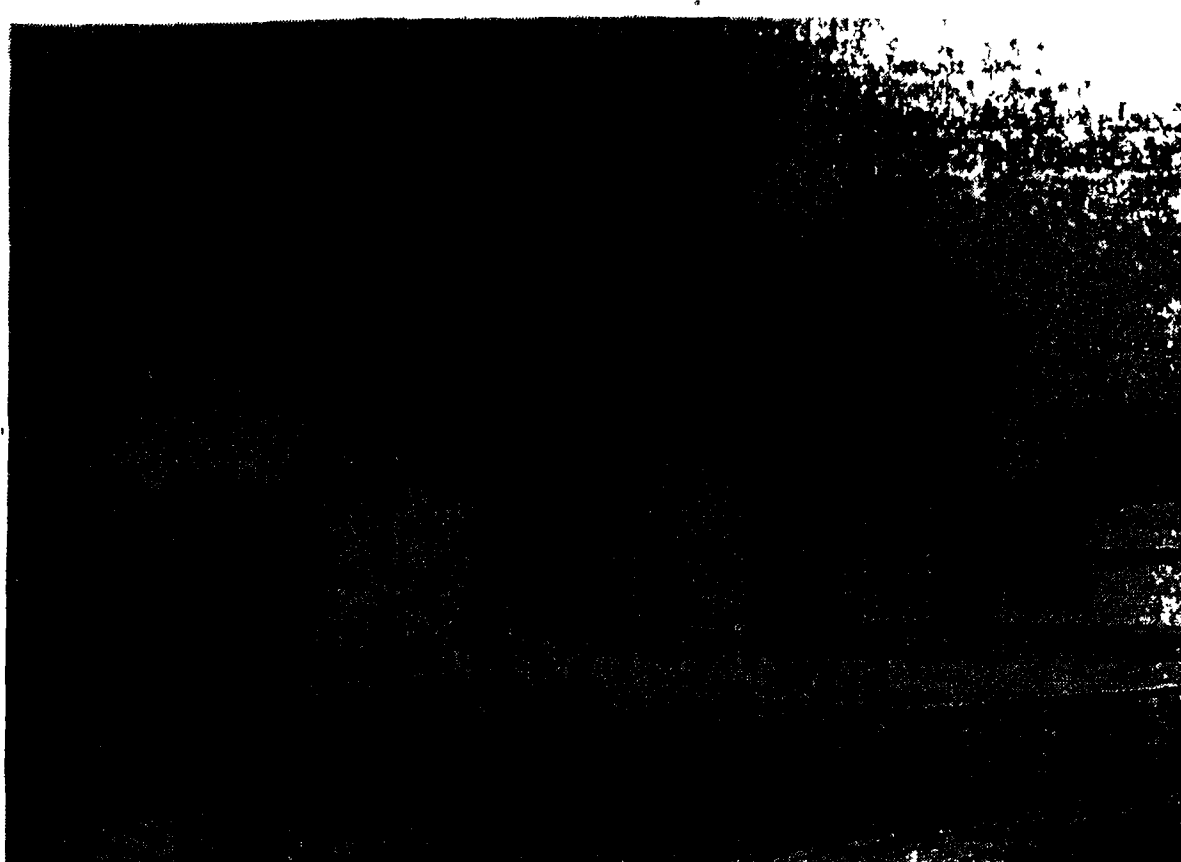
The cost of the building was estimated at \$16,000, although the final cost when all is complete may be a bit higher. The money was all from personal donations, except for \$1,000 of which the township and village gave \$500 each. The school board gave the three lots which had been the old school site. The village government only recently built the new sidewalks on the two street fronts. Graydon Bauer, electrician, donated all of his labor in wiring the building.

Birth Of The Library Idea

The first move toward the library was the appearance of W. P. A. officials before the Galien Culture Club, telling them that if they would start a library the W. P. A. would provide free help to operate it. This was in the first week in August of 1939.

Mrs. Helen Hoinville, then of Galien, now of Cassopolis, was president of the club. She named the following committee: Mrs. Philip Keen, chairman, Mrs. Clarence Glover, Miss Viola Green.

Mrs. Philip Keen from then on was the moving spirit of the campaign, although she had some able assistants. They approached the township board. Morton Hampton, supervisor then as now gave them the use of a small sub-basement room in the back of the town hall. This room was left-over from the years when commercial plays, etc., were given in the hall on an elevator stage, and the half-basement room underneath that served as a dressing room. Since the committee began with practically nothing in the form of books the room was ample in the beginning. The township furnished the lumber and labor for building the shelves, and gave \$100 for books and furnishings. This remained the library until 1945 when the town board meeting voted to give

the library room in the front of the town hall.

All this time the human dynamo in the form of a retired lady teacher, Mrs. Philip Keen, had been carrying on. In 1942 the state library board made a ruling that libraries organized before that time could retain right to state aid and the librarians might keep their jobs. Those started later would have to conform to stricter regulations. Since that time the township board has paid the librarian's salary. During nearly all of the time since Mrs. Keen has been the librarian, with Mrs. Joe Mordock and Mrs. Philip Roberts taking over for periods when illness in the family prevented Mrs. Keen from serving.

MSC Gets Ready For Big Party On 100th Birthday

One of the world's most elaborate birthday parties is being planned to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Michigan State College.

"Centennial fever" is a common disease affecting faculty, students and staff. For nearly a year a special office has been laying the groundwork for the impressive program which will last from February to December in 1955.

"If the education world doesn't become more conscious of Michigan State as an outstanding university, it will be because they are unable to observe the quality of work being done here in teaching, research and extension," says James H. Demson, chairman of the Centennial committee.

And if everyone in the state doesn't hear about Michigan State College next year, it will be because reams of newspapers, hour of radio time, stacks of letters, and millions of words never reach an audience. "We expect about a half-million people more than usual to visit the campus during the celebration,"

state Alvie Smith, Centennial director.

There will be ample opportunity for both public and academic figures to become more familiar with the college. Nationally prominent people will be on hand to take part in various programs and conferences.

There is reason to believe that President Eisenhower will be the speaker at one of the most impressive attractions of the year. He is expected to be the honored guest at the October Convocation when college authorities are planning for 50,000 visitors.

President Theodore Roosevelt visited MSC back in 1905, when the institution was celebrating its 50th birthday, and college authorities would like to see the President come for the 100th birthday.

Along cultural lines, 10 symposiums are scheduled, one for each branch of the college. "Symposium" is a more formal name for an organized bull session.

Special efforts have been made to attract leaders in each field so that significant discussions can take place. Subjects for the symposiums are: Agriculture, Engineering, Business and Public Service, Home Economics, Science and Arts, Veterinary Medicine and Experiments, Education, Communications, Continuing Edu-

cation and Basic College.

Biggest attraction will be the Centennial of Farm Mechanization. This event, which takes place in August, is expected to bring more than 200,000 people to the East Lansing campus.

Basic ingredients for the show are a gigantic display of modern farm machinery; demonstrations of important farm operations, exhibits, pageants and tours showing progress of the century in the farm world.

An industrial exposition of significant scale will be held in May. Major manufacturers in many fields plan to exhibit their products.

Included will be automobiles of the future and the latest railroad trains. Chemical companies will demonstrate the newest wonders they have developed.

Numerous other programs in arts and sciences are scheduled during the year.

Six home football games in 1954 took several years' arranging. In 1954, only four games will be played in East Lansing. The Centennial year will see games with Notre Dame, Stanford, Illinois, Purdue, Minnesota, and one opponent yet to be arranged.

A concentrated effort was made to secure the U of M game for East Lansing by MSC

The event at Evanston will be opened by the "Festival of Faith" pageant, which will be transferred to Soldier's Field, Chicago, because of the size of the spectacle. It will be held Sunday evening, Aug. 15, starting at 5 p.m. Three thousand people will take part in the pageant. A number of Buchanan people have made arrangements to attend. All seats in the 80,000-capacity stadium have been sold out a week in advance.

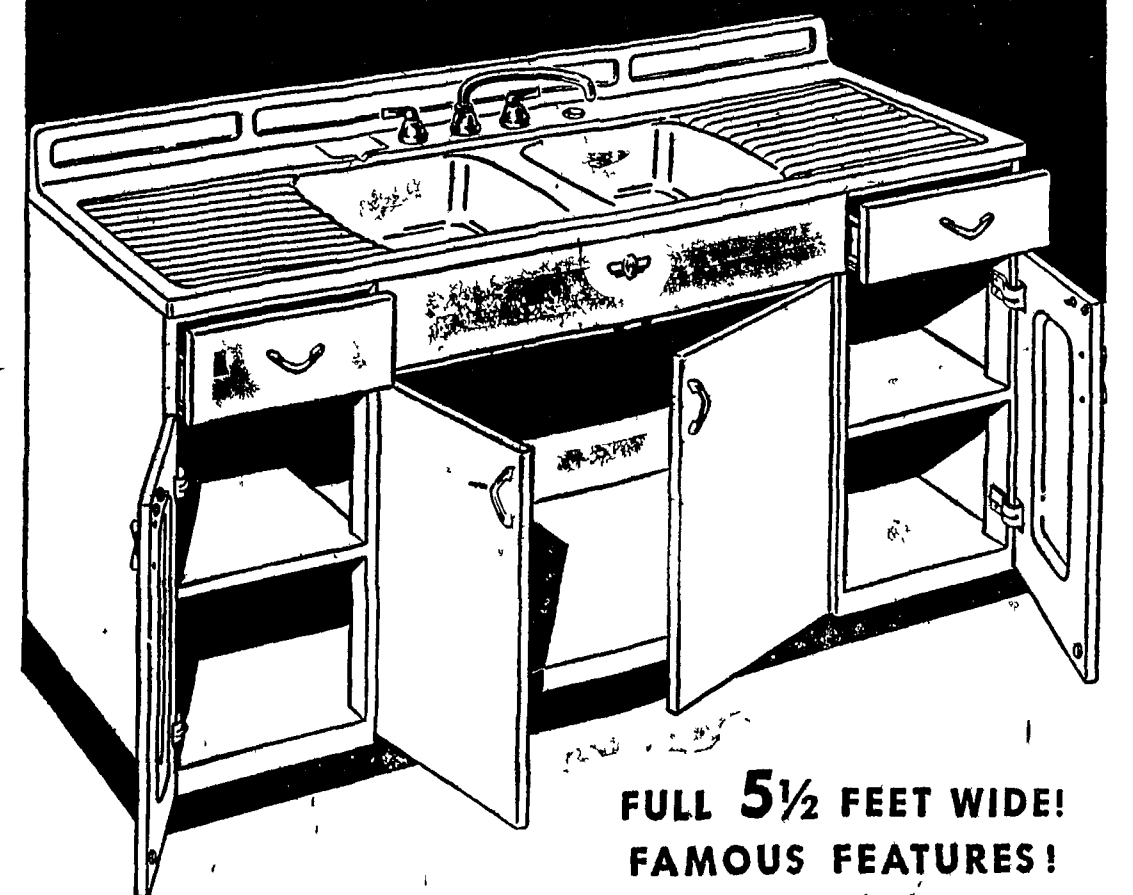

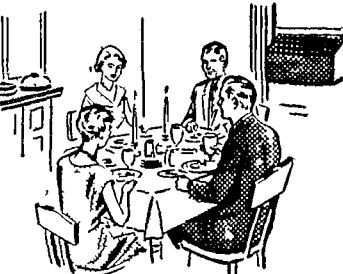

Local Tax Limits Go Up If Courts OK Ruling

Berrien county owners of visible and concrete assets may be blanketed by a 10.3% increase in their property tax limitations for county, school, and township purposes if the state courts will string along with a recent opinion by Frank G. Millard on property tax limitations. It should be said that there is nothing political in nature in Millard's opinion — it is his interpretation of Michigan law.

His opinion is that the taxing district of a county transcends county lines because of the existence of inter-county fractional districts. It is necessary that state equalized valuations be used for all tax purposes, including cities, townships, and districts lying wholly within the county so long as some districts transcend county lines. In simpler English it means that if there is one single school district whose boundaries overlap into two counties, then both of those counties get their tax bases lifted from county to state equalized valuations.

Millard justifies his opinion on the grounds that the constitution says property taxes should be "uniform" and property should be assessed at its cash value. If his ruling is valid it will result in increased tax liability in 67 of Michigan's 83 counties.

The 67 incur liability because they have one or more taxing districts (usually a school district) which overlaps county boundaries.

County Fortunate
After all Eucharis is fortunate among the 67 liable counties, in that the state equalization is only 10.3% greater than the county equalizations which have been previously and are now used as assessment bases for county, township, and school district levies. The greatest increase of valuation under this ruling would be in the case of Roscommon county where the rise would be 155.4%. The opinion came too late to be in effect in 1954 but in 1955 the impact will be wide spread if the state courts sustain Millard's opinion.

Property assessments for tax purposes in Michigan will be increased from a present total of about \$12,485,000,000 to over \$16,267,000,000, an increase of nearly \$4,000,000,000 or nearly 1/3rd.

This contrasts with the present practice in Michigan, making the county equalized valuations the base of levy for county, township and school purposes.

If Millard's opinion is upheld it will also affect the separate tax rate limitations of cities and villages, and the bonded debt limits of all local governmental units.

MSC Will Hold Small Business Clinic October 16-17

Michigan men or women who need help in starting or operating their own small businesses will be given assistance in the 6th annual Small Business Clinic to be held at Michigan State College on Oct. 16 and 17.

The clinic, originated and sponsored by the Michigan Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, is slanted toward the business which employs from 1 to 50 persons. The clinic last year attracted 190 persons.

The Michigan Department of Economic Development, the Federal Small Business Administration and the Continuing Education Service of Michigan State College assist in the clinic.

Information on the conference and registration blanks may be obtained from the Continuing Education Service, Michigan State College, East Lansing.

Building Boom Will Continue

This year a million houses will be built, and it looks as if next year will be another housing hum-dinger. This is also the biggest year yet for the construction of new school buildings. A total of one billion, 800 million dollars is being spent on the public schools. And more than a half billion will be spent on churches this year.

Stores, office buildings, highways — the boom continues. But not as many new factories are being built. Still factory construction will continue to be high for the foreseeable future — a bright sign for a healthy economy ahead. —Changing Times

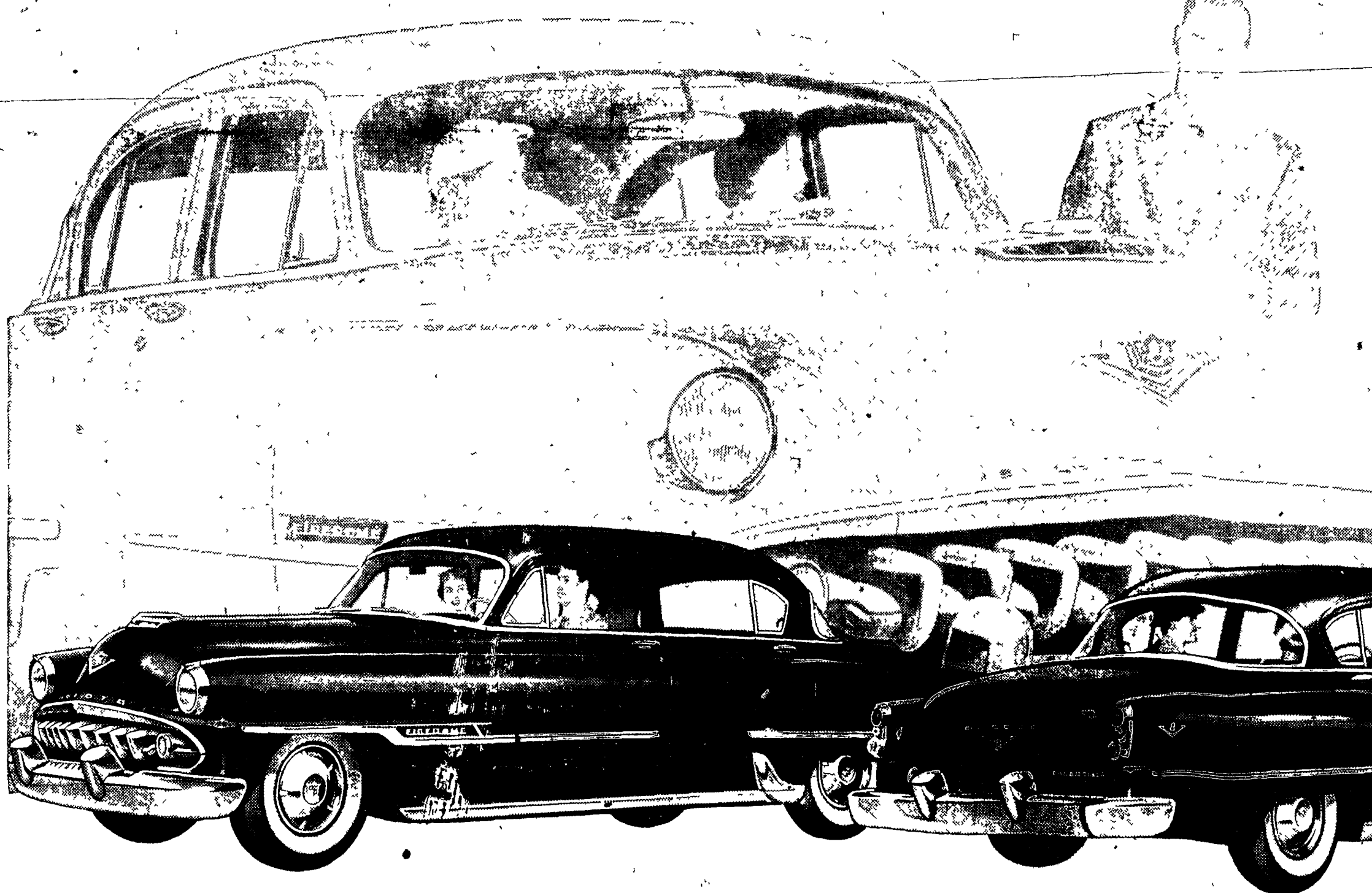

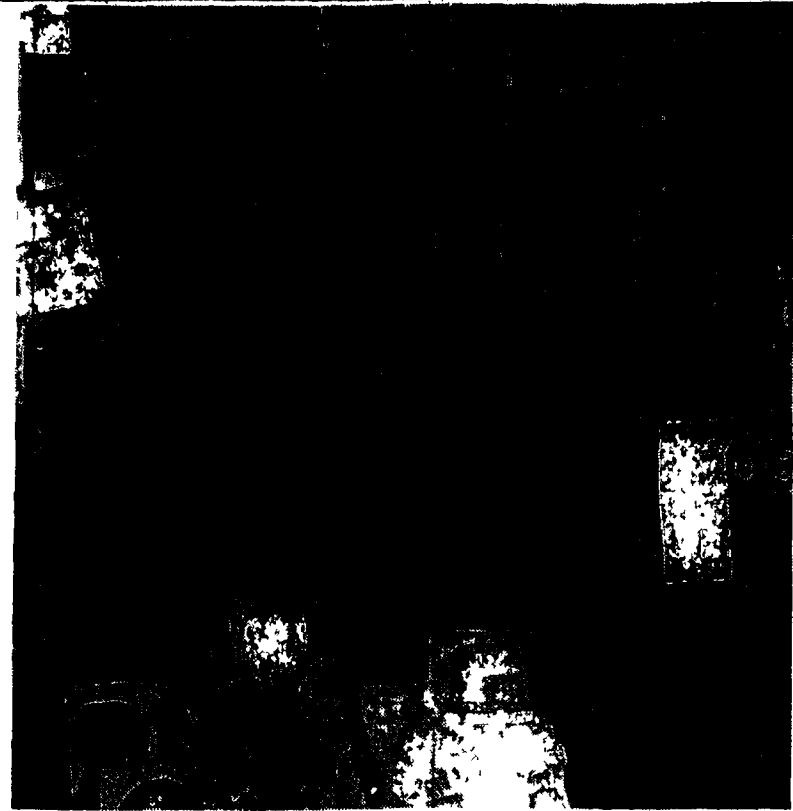

Lightning Aids Growth, Maturity Of Corn Crops

An element in the thriving condition of the 1954 corn crop in the Buchanan district has not only been the regular recurrence of welcome rains, but the less-welcome accompaniment of heavy lightning, states Paul Deer, farm representative of the Indiana & Michigan Electric company in this district.

A reasonably heavy thunderstorm will release from 20 to 30 pounds of nitrogen per acre in the form of readily and quickly absorbable nutrients by the corn, states Deer. The hot weather which ordinarily accompanies thunderstorms is also very favorable. The 140 degrees represent-

ing the total overrun of June temperatures above the average, did very much for the corn. Believe it or not, plenty of fairly distributed rain, heat and lightning spells good corn crops and also very materially hastens their maturing.

Short of a tornado or of the St. Joe river getting out of its banks, all that can stop the maturing of a banner corn crop here is an early September freeze. In the majority of fields the corn should be developed beyond frost hurt by Sept. 20.

fluorides would be thought of. There have been proposals, for example, that fluorides be incorporated in milk rather than water.

Dr. Shalom Pearlman, has said such a move actually is unnecessary in view of the effectiveness and simplicity of the water fluoridation program. Since water is used locally in processed foods as well as in cooking and drinking, fluorides are universally consumed. If they were available only in dairy milk, many infants would receive little or none in the first weeks of life. Other children would receive varying amounts, depending on their liking of milk.

In addition, there is no conclusive evidence that fluoridated milk, tablets, table salt, chewing gums, toothpastes and mouth washes are effective or practical.

Plans for another gigantic LaPorte County Fair this year are moving steadily forward, Robert M. Morse, fair secretary, said today, with both open class and 4-H exhibitor entries pouring in daily.

This year's fair again will open with "Preview Night" at 5 o'clock Monday night, Aug. 16. The Gary Horace Mann high school band, favorite musical organization with many people, will also be a feature of free grandstand entertainment at Preview Night. No admission is charged for entrance to the grounds on Monday night.

One Reason For Prison Outbreaks

"This week five magistrates are investigating the recent upheaval in Wandsworth Prison. Whatever they decide can have little relevance to the problem of the prisons. Since 1928 the prison population has multiplied by two-and-a-half and now stands around 25,000. No new prisons have been built since then. There are some thousands of prisoners living three in a cell and the lack of sufficient prison officers results in their being kept in cells for as much as 14 hours out of the 24. Under these conditions outbreaks such as that at Wandsworth are practically inevitable."

"We must either have fewer prisoners or more prisons. The Treasury will not find the money for the latter nor sanction a pay-scale for prison officers which would attract the necessary number of the right type of men. What then? The only alternative would appear to be to devise forms of punishment which do not involve imprisonment, or would abbreviate the length of sentences. It is not easy to think of such forms. But the dilemma of the prisons is as stated—Decisions on policy are called for at the highest level. Failing them, we shall, it is to be feared, see many more Wandsworths. As for the prison officers, nothing can make their lives pleasant, but at least they should be freed from pecuniary anxiety. Their lives within the prisons become more and more dangerous. Their lives outside at least should be made tolerable."

This clipping is taken from an English weekly magazine—Time and Tide—for June 12, 1954. Incidentally, Michigan's prison population at the time of the Jackson riot (April, 1952) was 9,402. This was held to be dangerously high and the resultant overcrowding was a contributory cause of the riot. On July 9, 1954, the prison population reached a new high—8,458.

Fixes Grade Limits For Price Supports

The U. S. Department of Agriculture will make price support available on the 1954 crop wheat grading "Sample" because of test weight only, down to as low as 40 pounds test weight per bushel, provided all other factors grade No. 3 or better, stated Mr. Clark, chairman of the Berrien County ASC committee.

He explained that prior to this year, price support eligibility for 1954 crop wheat required that the wheat grade No. 3 or better, except for test weight which could be as low as 51 pounds per bushel, which is the minimum for No. 5 grade. Mr. Clark added that the discount per bushel (test weight only) will be four cents for each pound by which the test weight falls below the minimum test for No. 5 (51 pounds). This discount will be in addition to other discounts provided under the program. For example, there is a four cent discount for all soft wheat and a nine cent discount for wheat grading No. 5. To these discounts would be added the discount for low test weight of four cents per pound. Many areas in

the state have been reporting low test weight wheat according to reports received by Mr. Bruce Clothier from the State ASC office at Lansing, Mich.

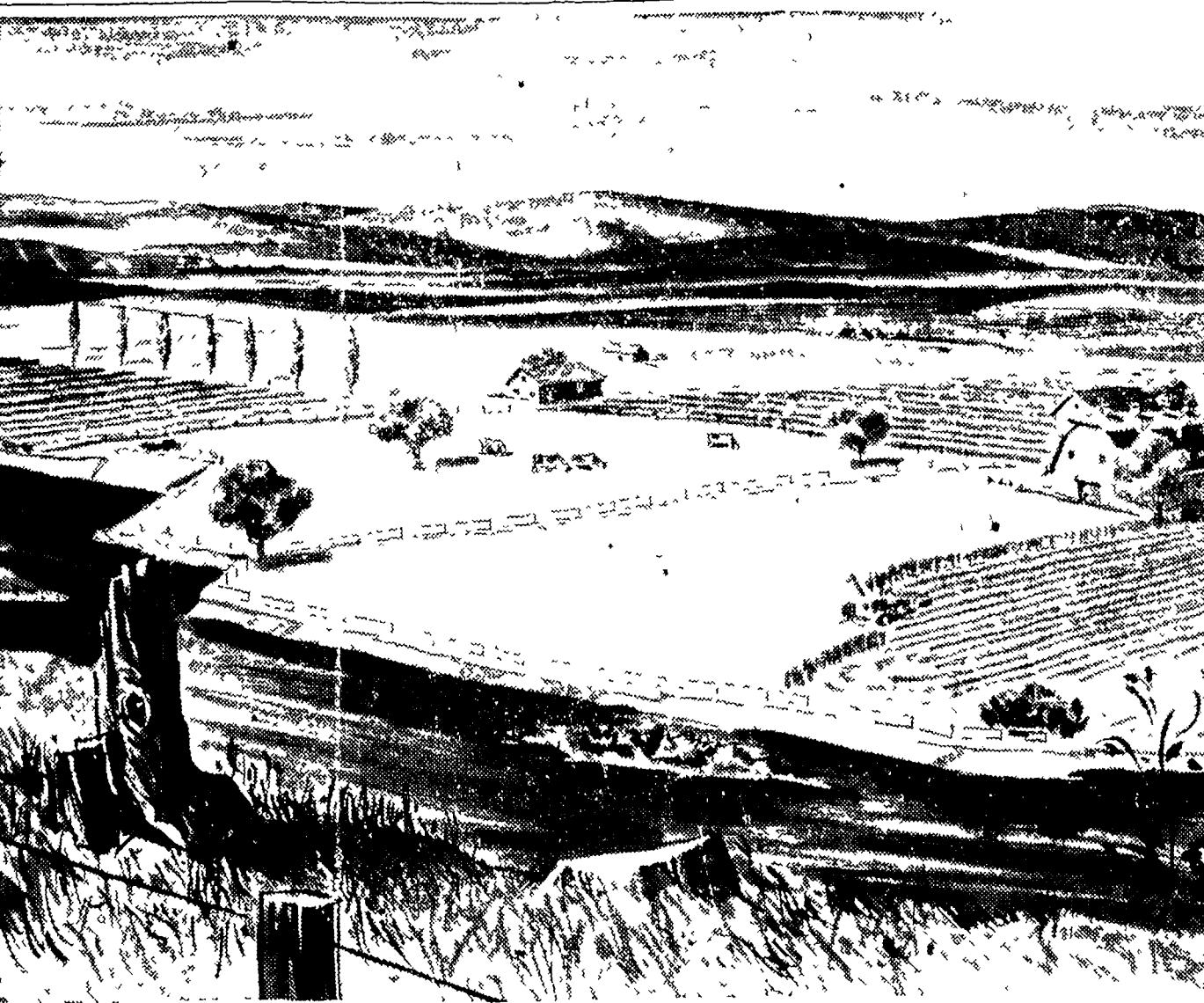

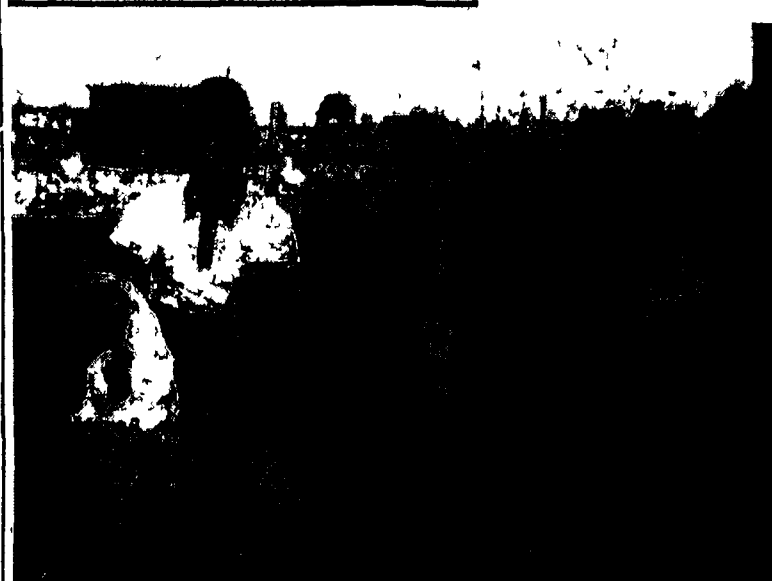

The Story of Buchanan



How Civil War Tore Buchanan And U. S. Apart

In the last issue of this series the writer treated of the flare of rather phony prosperity that was responsible for the erection of the

three-story business blocks and most of the large brick houses along West Front street during and following the Civil War. Following the war came the era of the farmer-capitalists such as James Reynolds, Burton Jarvis and David Rough, who loaned more money than the banks in this area. This was of course only one and not an important effect of the war in Buchanan. Leading up to it was the struggle be-

tween the new Republican party and the Democrats for control of the nation. Whatever the mixtures of prejudice, self-interest and hatred may have led to the war, its two chief issues were the abolition of slavery and the continuance of a united nation. The issues were joined in the pre-war political conflict. It is only fair to say that very many of the Democrats of the Buchanan area were not in favor of slavery, but they were influenced mainly by the fear of the national division which they expected a Republican triumph to bring. The vote on the issue was close. In Berrien county eight townships went Democratic and 9 townships went Republican, with a tie in Chickaming township. Buchanan plumped into the Republican column when that party entered the national field with the

nomination of General Fremont in 1860. In 1860 it was a main center of Republican strength in Berrien county. The only county election results we find available are those given in the Niles Republican of Nov. 10, 1860, as follows:

The Republicans had a balance of 412 in Berrien county which was small enough in one of the strongest Republican states. In the evening following receipt of the election returns, there was a jubilee for the Republicans of this section, reported in the Niles Republican as follows:

"On Thursday night the Republicans had a jubilee. The negroes in the illuminated streets wore Wide-Awake capes and were satisfied they would be voters in a short time. Many of the Republicans were insulting in the extreme, full of hate toward the Democrats. At midnight they paraded in front of our dwelling and sent up exultant shouts, like so many drunken demons."

It should be understood that the Niles Republican was a Democrat paper, published by Darius Cook, ancestor of the Niles newspaper and political Cooks, so named when the party division was between the Democrats and the Whigs, before the Republican party was formed.

It is fair to assume that the majority of the Republicans and the Democrats in Buchanan and elsewhere were quiet and sincere people who spent that fateful Thursday night at home in serious thought rather than in insulting their neighbors. The nation as well as nearly every community in the nation had been torn in two and the torn edges of life were raw and bleeding.

During the year 1939 this writer canvassed all of Buchanan survivors who remembered the Civil War. Said one elderly woman: "People can't realize and next to nobody knows any more what a terrible commotion there was in Buchanan during the Civil War. Everybody was mad or scared to death, even the children went around crying, what about they scarcely knew, except that their folks were scared and their brothers were going to the Civil War to be killed. There was hard, bitter feeling between people and we were afraid to go along the country roads at night for fear somebody might shoot." The most prevalent name given by the Republicans to the northern Democrats, here and elsewhere, was "Copperhead." The Democrats called the Republicans "nigger lovers" and "Black Republicans."

In succeeding issues we will cover as briefly as possible the reactions of the "War of the Brothers" in Buchanan.

Keep Poultry Cool; Boost Water Supply

When the weather's not is the time to keep poultry cool. The best way to do that is to keep plenty of cool fresh water before chicks and laying hens, advises J. M. Moore, Michigan State College poultryman.

Moore adds that a bird consumes two pounds of water for each pound of grain. That means 100 laying hens need five gallons of

water a day. They may need even more in hot weather because chickens can't cool off by sweating like humans.

Birds on range should have shade nearby and there should be a good watering system. Water is the cheapest weather conditioner there is for chickens.

The soil is the foundation of the farm family's living. How well it yields will depend on how well you treat it.

The James Stone family, living

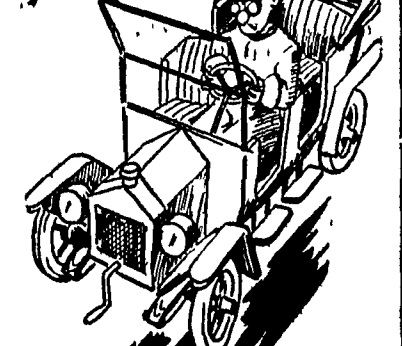
east of the church, have recently returned home after several days vacation visiting relatives here and there.
