## Let's Support Them

We're proud of the latest action by the city commissioners. They had nothing to do with the increase in tax assessments, but they've been taking the rap for them and have taken some positive action.

They are saying to the rest of the state that, rather than just mumble about an inequitable tax system, let's do something about it. They are rightly saying that the state's action in increasing the percentage to be assessed is in reality taxation without representation. This is, after all, what men in Boston protested against 200 years ago.

Now, it's up to the county and to the school district. If by the increased assessed valuations, these bodies will receive considerable more revenue, then they can be expected to lower their millage.

The city of Buchanan has been operated for the past three years without an increase in millage, yet it has been able to accomplish a great many projects costing large amount of funds. Wages have gone up among city employees, and the city is presently operating efficiently as well.

The city commissioners will make every effort to lower millage. The county and the school district and every other agency requiring part of our taxes can and should do the same.

As many employees can tell you now, the economic pinch is being felt everywhere. The major businesses in the area are having to tighten their belts as orders for their products are cut back. This would be a good time to instigate a local program of tax relief.



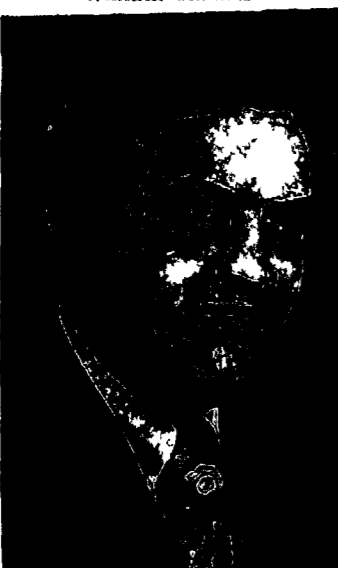

## Talk On Curbs and Gutters Continues

At their last meeting, the Buchanan city commission had felt that people in Liberty Heights would go for getting curbing and gutters repaired as long as the government was furnishing the labor, and the material costs wouldn't exceed \$3 a foot. But on Monday about 30 persons came to the commission meeting armed with a petition against new curbs and gutters. Some of them insisted that their curbing was still satisfactory.

After some discussion, the commission passed an acceptance resolution and decided to make a physical survey of the condition of the curbs in the area. The public hearing on the curbing will be May 12, although there will be more discussion at the April 28 meeting.

A formal application for community development funds had been prepared, and the commission passed a resolution to accompany the application for \$119,600 in funds.

The request of Ramon Sexton for exclusion from having to install sidewalks near the new middle school was denied on the basis that what's fair for one is fair for everybody.

Joseph Garbert Jr. wanted an increase in the fines for over-parking, and they were raised from \$1 to \$2 with the ex-

pectation of even harsher measures for second offenders.

Kenneth Mall was appointed to the plan commission to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Rex Porter.

Willie Brown appeared to discuss the fencing around Ravish Park and the difficulty in getting in there. He requested that the city provide parking on Fulton Street in the two lots owned by the city near the church. The problem of danger to the children going into the park was brought up, but the commission decided to study the matter.

The burning ordinance was adopted with Gene Wesner voting no. It was amended to grant the commission authority to grant special permits within the city limits.

Ordinances were introduced which would adopt uniform housing codes and uniform codes for the abatement of dangerous buildings. This would standardize demolition procedures and enforcement authorities.

The commission approved payment to Cole Associates of \$3,690.17 for work on Brookway Drive and \$1,458.29 to Cripps and Ohmann, consultants, for their work in preparing the application for federal funds. An invoice for \$7,835 for the new garbage packer was approved.

## City Commission Starts a Tax Revolt

The city commission of Buchanan has literally entered into a tax revolt. As individual citizens, they are as much upset about the increase in real estate and personal property taxes as any citizen. They are tired of taking the blame for the new formula for assessing taxes which was forced on them by the state.

When the deadline for delivering Buchanan's tax rolls to the county equalization board, they refused and kept them. If the county had come for them they would have had to issue a subpoena to get them.

Instead the city commission went to the County Board of Commissioners Tuesday and presented the tax rolls to them, indicating that they were doing so in protest.

Last week the Buchanan board of review supported the assessor in most of the cases which had come before that body. Several individuals had appealed to the board of review in protest of their current assessments, and in most cases the appeals were denied.

Speaking in behalf of the city commission in front of the county commissioners, Joseph Bachman, presented the view that the local assessor in his preparation of the tax roll had actually gone by the book with correct assessment procedures. He said that by the very law in Michigan, taxpayers were about to experience a tax increase in 1975 on which they had no chance to vote.

"This is taxation without representation, and this year of the beginning of our Bicentennial celebration brings back memories of the reasons for the birth of this nation of free men", Bachman said.

After protesting the whole system of real and personal property assessment, Bachman suggested, "We the city commission of Buchanan unanimously re-

commend the following action by the Berrien County board of commissioners, the school districts of Berrien County and all cities of the county -- that they critically examine their budgets and reduce their millage requirements in proportion to their increased assessments. It is time that all units of government adopt austerity measures, thereby limiting their expenditures to the taxpayers' ability to pay."

Theoretically, since the assessed valuation was raised considerably in most cases, much greater revenues will be raised, and the governing bodies won't require as much millage. The members of the city commission are studying ways to lower the millage to compensate for the higher assessments.

But the city's millage is only a small part of the whole, and the school district's millage affects more people. The school administrators claim that it won't be easy for them to lower the required millage because state aid is based on the S.E.V. (state equalized valuation) of the district. State aid would go down proportionately to the increase in assessed valuation, requiring more of the school's needed funds to be raised locally.

After companies here were denied on their appeal to the board of review, their next recourse is to the state tribunal. Clark Equipment Company's inventories and properties were assessed so much higher that the amount of taxes in Buchanan increased over a half million dollars.

Spokesmen for the city of Buchanan say that they hope they can get co-operation from area companies and other municipalities in "going up to the top" in protesting what they consider to be an unfair method of taxing.

It's a story of a group of proud, hard working Russian Jews in 1905 on the eve of the revolution.

The story revolves around Tevye (David Habicht), a poor dairy farmer who is struggling to understand the changes in the world and the changes in his own family's structure, as his daughters grow up and start to marry. Together with his wife Golde (Cheryl McDonald) he is able to face the bitterest of times with a smile.

But it will not go away and it will haunt us for the next century if we are still a free United States. I am for continuing aid to South Vietnam and the rest of Indochina.

Volunteer Auxiliary ladies go to help each veteran select a gift for his or her family (at no cost to the veteran). Each item is gift wrapped and sent to the veteran's relative. They are grateful for so little. So won't you, the public, give a little for those who have given you so much?

I heard they don't get much pay. How do the big shots expect the little man to make a decent living in this time of high inflation?  
I say get those big shots off their bottom ends and negotiate with those guys, give them a decent wage. They work in all kinds of weather, and in the winter months, work constantly on the roads. I feel they do a darn good job. You big shots don't know what it's like to work long hard hours and get pennies for it. You get your bread sitting behind a desk, giving orders and having an 8 hour coffee break if you want it. Give in a little, you'll find it doesn't hurt all that bad. I have no family or any friends on the department, but I'm all for them.

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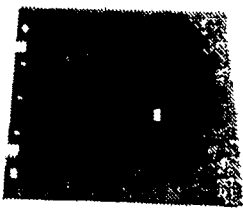


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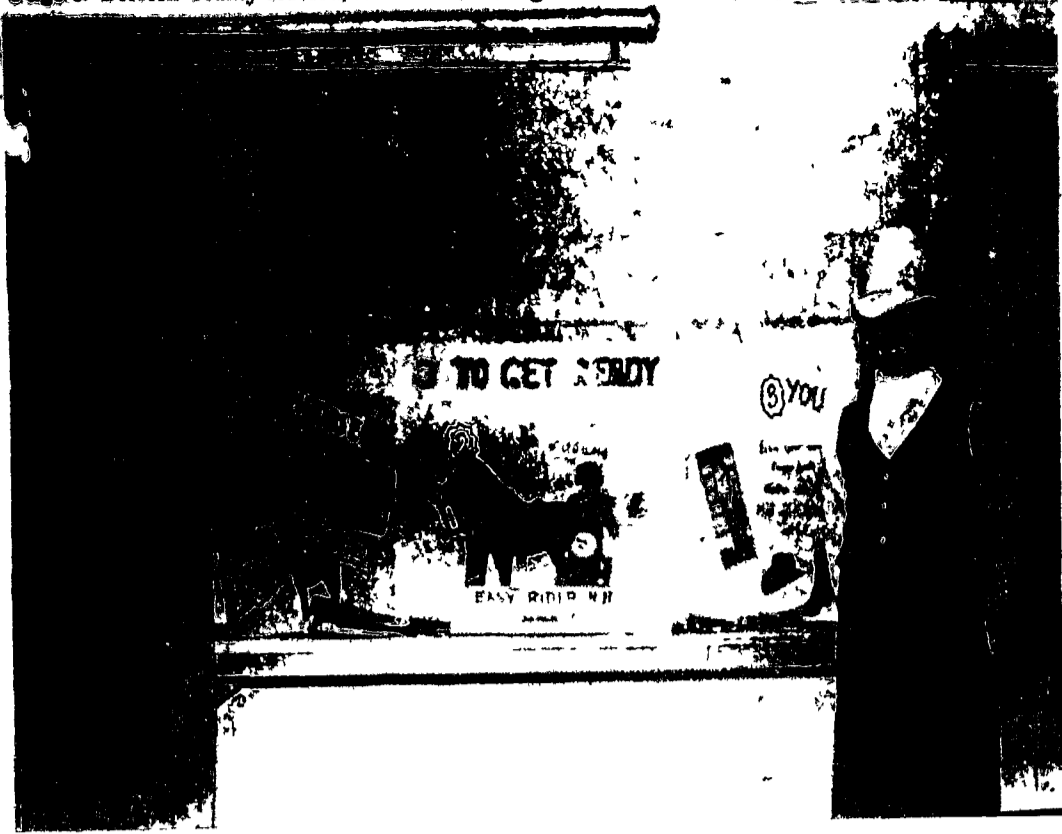

**Give Your Budget a Checkup**  
So your family has the budget blues. Maybe you know just where it hurts, maybe you know only that something's not right. Before you take the shotgun approach to curing your financial woes, give your budget a checkup and find out where it's ailing. Curing any problem is easier if you know what to treat!

Start by examining your family goals, both short-range and long-range. Short range goals may include anything from tennis shoes for the kids to paying off an item you bought on your revolving charge account within the no-service-charge period. Long range goals may include a house, a vacation in Nova Scotia, a new car or security for your retirement years.

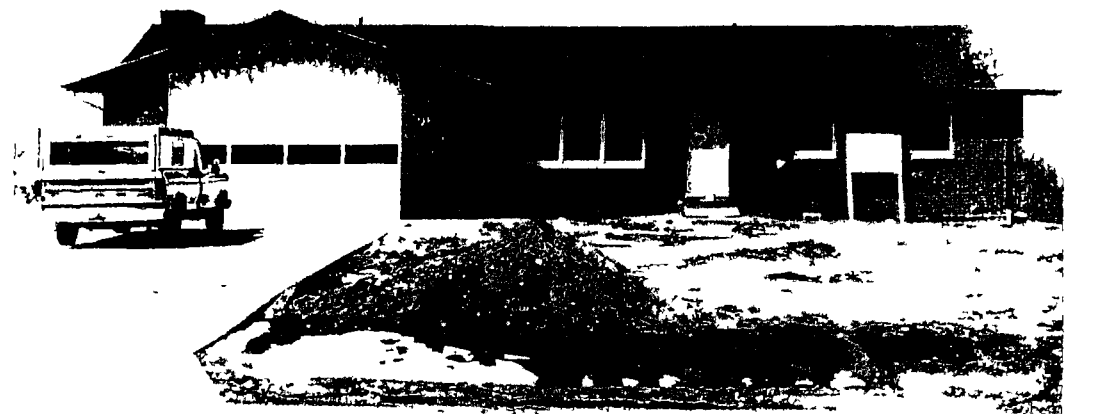
In view of the resources you have to work with, are your goals realistic? Can you honestly hope to have a home, two cars, a cottage on a lake, a boat, two snowmobiles and Christmas in Florida as well as secure retirement and college for the kids? If you had to set priorities, what would you be willing to do without? Are you already in over your ears trying to accomplish goals that you really can't afford?

Setting goals requires answering the question, "Where do I want to go?" For an answer to "How am I going to get there?" you must take a close look at your family finances.

Estimate your total income for the coming year. Be realistic. If a year-end bonus is "iffy" don't count on it. Exclude overtime, which may or may not be available, and include a raise only if
