### George Spatta Retires

## Clark Elects Schirmer Chairman of Board

Walter E. Schirmer was elected chairman of the board of Clark Equipment company at the annual meeting of shareholders held here Friday.

Schirmer, who had been president of Clark since 1963, succeeds George Spatta who retired and assumed the title of honorary chairman. Spatta served as president and chief executive of Clark from 1945 until his election to the chairmanship in 1963. Schirmer now holds the dual title of chairman and president of Clark Equipment.

In other action, three new directors were elected to the Clark board. Clowdis Baker, vice chairman of the board of Sears, Roebuck & Company, B. E. Ellis, vice president administration of Clark, and Richard McCormack, vice president and general counsel of Clark.

The new directors fill vacancies created by the retirement of Spatta and Walter H. Parkin, former chairman of the board of National-Standard company and a Clark director since 1944. The third vacancy was created by the death on Feb. 3, of A. Newell Rumpf, president of Harris Trust and Savings Bank and a Clark director since 1962.

**Law Graduate**  
Schirmer was born May 27, 1910 in Chicago. He holds a bachelor of science degree in engineering from Illinois Institute of Technology and a law degree from John Marshall Law School, Chicago.

In 1934 he joined the Chicago law firm of Brown, Jackson, Boettcher and Diener as a patent attorney. Schirmer joined Clark Equipment company in 1937 as patent counsel. He moved subsequently into operating management assignments and was elected a vice president in 1947.

## City Lets N.E. Sewer Contract

Members of the Buchanan city commission took the first step Tuesday toward the completion of the northeast area sanitary sewer project by awarding the job contract, according to Daryl D. Tammen, city manager. The commission met in special session at city hall.

Low bidder of three companies submitting was the L. W. Lamb company of Holland, which was awarded the contract. They expect to complete the project at a cost of \$116,559. Yerington and Harris of Benton Harbor were the next highest bidders at \$127,090 and Getman Brothers of South Haven came in high at \$166,558.

Bids for the sanitary sewer were opened Wednesday, April 24.

The commission also voted to purchase pipe for the project from the Armo Steel corporation of Middletown, Ohio, at a bid of \$1.15 per foot. See CITY, Page 6.

### Park Program Meeting Topic

A joint meeting of the Buchanan city commission and the Buchanan school board was held Monday evening to discuss the park and recreation program for the community. School board president Bernard Ellis presided during the meeting.

At the present time all city parks are under the jurisdiction of the Park and Recreation board. This board is made up of three members appointed by the city commission, three appointed by the school board, the city manager, the superintendent of schools and one member appointed by the mayor of the city. The park board's authority to operate is governed by ordinance 100 of the city of Buchanan.

Funds to operate the park and recreation program are allocated by each governing body equally. At the present time, each body is appropriating \$9,450 for the program.

Many problems were discussed during the session, but no conclusions were reached.

### Voters Approve I&M Easements

Buchanan township voters last Thursday approved the action of their supervisors in the granting of a franchise to Indiana & Michigan Electric Company.

The franchise grants to the company easements on public property within Buchanan township and the right to conduct business within the township's limits. The franchise is to be granted for a 30-year period.

Voters in Bertrand township will go to the polls today (Thursday) to confirm similar action of their supervisors on the same question.

Clayton Spaulding, Buchanan township clerk, reported a total vote of 61. Of that number, 59 affirmative votes were counted and two ballots were spoiled.

## Clark Reports Earnings Steady While Sales Slip

First quarter earnings of Clark Equipment company were on a par with 1967 results, despite sales volume that slipped 5 per cent lower than in the year earlier quarter, the company reported to shareholders at the annual meeting here Friday.

Earnings for the first three months of 1968 amounted to \$5,625,000, equal to 50c per share, compared to \$5,650,000, or 50c a share, in the first 1967 period.

Sales declined to \$117,064,000 in the first 1968 quarter compared to \$123,023,000 in the first three months of last year.

Walter E. Schirmer, president,

said the improvement in profitability stemmed primarily from increased operating efficiencies and from a pickup in diverse operations. The company's return on sales amounted to 4.8 per cent in the quarter just ended compared to a profitability rate of 4.6 per cent in the first 1967 quarter.

Despite the slight decline in sales for the quarter, Schirmer said, the rate of incoming orders was up substantially over the first quarter of 1967. The difference in volume, he pointed out, was due to the fact that a year ago the company was working off an unusually high backlog, much of it for government orders.

### Civilian Backlog Increases

The year-to-year drop in the consolidated backlog was sizeable with the total dropping to \$91,100,000 at March 31 compared to \$128,500,000 a year earlier. The total decline, however, was accounted for by a decrease in the military backlog which fell to \$7,200,000 from \$48,700,000 a year ago. The civilian backlog, meanwhile, rose to \$83,900,000 from \$79,800,000 at the end of March, 1967.

"We regard this as significant," Schirmer said, "because it underscores the comeback of the commercial segment of our business. The sales decline also is attributable to a drop in military sales. In the first-1967 quarter, we recorded \$11,400,000 in sales of earthmoving equipment for use in Vietnam. In the first quarter of this year, we sold none of these units to the government. While our government business in 1967 was profitable, it was less profitable than most civilian business," he said.

Schirmer pointed out that sales of the Construction Machinery division declined from the year-earlier level because of the absence of military orders but stressed the fact that the division's civilian sales were 15 per cent higher than in the comparable 1967 period.

Sales of the Industrial Truck division showed significant improvement over the prior year, he said. Total sales of that division were 6 per cent higher in the first 1968 quarter than in the comparable 1967 period.

### Overseas Operations Stronger

"Particularly encouraging as the major improvement in our overseas operations," Schirmer said. "Our European manufacturing operations exerted a drag on overall profitability throughout most of 1967, but this situation has completely turned around in the first quarter. Sales are up substantially and profitability is far better than in the last half of 1967."

"There was a large influx of orders for our British and German subsidiaries in March," he said, "and the overseas backlog is stronger now than it has ever been. We look for continued improvement overseas throughout the year."

Schirmer said earnings for the full year should exceed the \$2.07 per share recorded in 1967 "barring work stoppages in connection with renegotiation of labor union contracts at our major domestic plants." He said the outlook for a peaceful settlement of contract issues is "favorable at the moment" but added that "it's still too early to forecast the outcome."

Sales for the year probably will be "slightly below" the \$489,508,000 recorded in 1967, Schirmer said.

## School Custodians Win Pay Hike, Increased Benefits

Contract negotiations were finally settled Monday between the Buchanan Public Schools and the Building Service Employees International Union (maintenance and custodians).

A four year agreement includes retroactive pay to July 1, 1967, with a cash settlement of \$260 for every employee on the payroll at that time. Employees who were not on the payroll at that time will receive retroactive pay in the amount of \$26 for each month worked from July 1, 1967, thru April 30, 1968.

Additional monetary benefits negotiated were a 6 per cent raise per year, which amounts to a maximum of 17c per hour depending upon classification of the worker.

Negotiations have been in process since September 7, 1967, when maintenance personnel voted to affiliate with the Building Service union. Previous to this time the personnel had been working under an agreement formulated by the Maintenance, Custodian Organization of Buchanan (a local body).

### Cost to District

Richard Dougherty, assistant superintendent, estimated the cost of the new salary schedule to the school district at \$4,812.34 for 1967-68, \$3,515.20 for 1968-69, \$5,782.40 for 1969-70 and \$5,262.40 for 1970-71. This schedule is based on 15 cm employees.

### Additional Benefits

Additional benefits included in the package were:

—7½ paid holidays per year

—Time off for the death of a close relative

—A schedule of vacation with up to a maximum of 15 days off for 10 years of service, with no vacations while school is in session.

—Sick leave days, for an employee who is sick or injured, with a maximum of 12 days per year accumulative to 84.

—Compulsory arbitration on grievances.



## 18c Package Won for Local Clark Workers

A three-year pact with economic benefits averaging 18 cents an hour for Clark workers was ratified by members of UAW Local 468, AFL-CIO, Sunday at the Buchanan high school gym.

The agreement, reached by union and management negotiators early Sunday, April 21, averted a walk-out by workers. The strike deadline, originally set for Sunday, April 14, had been extended a week.

The new contract which will be in effect until April 15, 1971, provides a 12 cent an hour increase for production workers and a 42 cent an hour raise for skilled trades workers.

Other benefits won by the union include an increase in cost of living support over the life of the contract, two additional paid holidays, changes in active employee and survivor income insurance and insurance for retirees.

The union also won changes in short term military leave provisions, elimination of the voluntary layoff provisions of the former contract and changes in normal retirement pensions.

Other benefits provide incentive increases, a tuition refund program for active employees and a moving allowance between Clark plants.

In the general agreement between union and management, changes were made in grievance procedures allowing the company the right of presenting their grievances alternately with the union. Revision of language in the overtime clause of the general agreement was also made.

Many of the concessions won by the Buchanan local were patterned after demands won by the UAW at the Ford Motor bargaining table last fall in Detroit.

Both representatives of Clark Company and Local 468 stated they feel the new pact is good.

Lemuel Barker, president of the local said, "The bargaining committee and officers of the local feel the negotiations were conducted with the best of faith by both parties." Barker had recommended ratification of the contract to local members at the Sunday meeting.

## House Destroyed; Sheriff Seeks Area Arson Suspects

Buchanan and Bertrand fire departments were called to separate fires Sunday which are being investigated by officers of the Berrien County Sheriff's department.

Shortly after 7 p.m. Bertrand firemen were called to extinguish a grass fire along the railroad tracks southwest of


Buchanan, near Bakertown. The Buchanan township department also answered the call.

Bertrand Chief Adam Kuntz told sheriff's officers that as his trucks arrived at the scene a man and woman riding a chrome motorbike were seen speeding away. Chief Kuntz discounted the theory a train had set the fires since none were scheduled in that area. No damage to buildings, or railroad property was reported. Sheriff's officers are continuing their investigation.

Buchanan township Chief Charles Wesner told Sheriff's officers that his department was called shortly after 8:30 Sunday evening to a vacant, two-story house on Boyle Lake road, south of Glendora road.

Because of inaccurate reporting of the location of the fire to township firemen, the house was engulfed by flames when the trucks arrived. Witnesses told Chief Wesner they had seen an old model auto at the house before the fire. They added the car had been observed in the area before the fire and was seen speeding away only minutes before the fire-fighters arrived. Sheriff's officers are attempting to locate the car and a number of male occupants.

The house, owned by the Berrien Realty of St. Joseph was completely destroyed by flames. No estimate was made of the damage.



EDITORIAL

No Rule or Rhyme

Francis Carlin wrote in "That which is in disorder has neither rule nor rhyme". Berrien County, as it fumbles through the time quarrel, is in disorder and certainly most county residents will agree there is no rule nor rhyme to our present situation.

Through it all, the RECORD feels there can be little justification for the confusion and for the energies expended that could better have been directed to our school dilemma, prevention of deaths on our highways or social betterment within our county. Charges that the "power structure" is forcing "fast time" on county citizens is poppycock.

The statutes are explicit in their demands on the body politic. The Uniform Time act, public law 387 of the 89th Congress, leaves only one area for citizen judgment on time and in Michigan that time will come in referendum next November.

On Friday, 16 of the county's 49 supervisors voted for "fast time" and compliance with definitive federal and state laws. Four of Buchanan's five supervisors voted "yes" for the proposal. O. D. Proseus did not vote because of his rank as chairman of the board.

The RECORD applauds those who voted in the affirmative and calls upon those who continue to resist lawful time to reconsider their position when next the board meets.

## Haight Gives Ad Pointers

"We are too small and too poor to waste our advertising dollars", were the words of a J. L. Hudson Company vice president reiterated for local merchants attending the Buchanan Chamber of Commerce Ad Clinic Monday.

Professor William Haight of the school of Journalism at Michigan State University, who conducted the clinic, pointed out that this attitude on the part of the multi-million dollar, Detroit based department store only makes more vivid the necessity for smaller merchants to wisely plan and carry out their advertising programs.

"Merchants are not in competition with one another," Haight said, "but are in competition for the disposable dollar." He added that advertising should be an important part of this competition and planned campaigns should be a sustained 12-month effort without the peaks and depressions indicative of poorly planned ad programs.

"Buchanan merchants have an important advertising advantage," Haight suggested. "Weekly newspapers are unique because people save and refer to them for a full week." He pointed out that daily papers generally are disposed of within 24 hours of their arrival in the home.

The professor counseled those merchants present on why retail advertising should be planned in advance, how to determine a realistic budget for retail stores, how advertising budgets should be allocated, determining specific ad content, how advertising copy and layout can be improved, and how to follow up to assure success of an ad.

The three hour session was sponsored by the retail division of the Chamber of Commerce. Leon Clark is chairman of the committee.

## National Standard Declares Dividend

cloths, nail clippers, combs, mailing size voice tapes, small tins of mints or nuts (vacuum packed), small snap hot holders, small baggies, wipe and shine shoe polishers, pocket games (small enough to fit in pocket), pocket size calendars, wash and dry packets.

Unfilled bags are also needed for hospitalized servicemen. When a man is injured or becomes ill in the field, he goes directly to a hospital and does not have any of his personal belongings with him. The Red Cross at the hospital gives him a bag filled with comfort items.

The little silver plane wiggled in greeting overhead, and then streaked toward the horizon in saucy, catch-me-if-you-can exuberance.

An hour, and a half-dozen traffic lights later, I did catch the sleek Beechcraft Bonanza, briefly grounded at the Niles airport . . . its pilot and proud new owner wiping some imagined sky dust from the windshield.

"She isn't new," grinned Richard Lentz. "She was formerly owned by a little old lady who only took her out on Sunday afternoons."

The high odds against a college student owning and piloting his own airplane became no odds at all in Richard's case, upon receipt of a modest inheritance. Thrilling acquisition as it is, however, to former local teachers and friends who know him well, an airplane can be no more than "one leg up" on "Rick" Lentz's way to the moon!

A son of Mr and Mrs Howard Lentz of Niles-Buchanan road, "Rick" began at a very early age to plot his destiny, with only "Flash Gordon" and "Buck Rogers" in on the plot. By the time he entered Buchanan high school, he'd left the other boys and their similar dreams behind with the launching of his first real, solid-fuel rocket . . . made from an old Electro-Voice microphone stand. The plot became an obsession.

Three or four more rockets were launched during his high school years, each successfully streaking into the stratosphere to an unknown fate . . . each more intricately designed and more sophisticated in its technology.

"Rick" built a special launcher in the high school shop, and by tenth grade had begun work on a multiple-engine, controlled thrust rocket, designing his own guidance system for this larger "bird" and switching to a liquid fuel, formerly used as a chemical in the making of plastics and for ripening bananas, of all things (ethylene oxide).

Upon graduation in 1963 (and receipt of local science award), Rick entered the University of Michigan and has since simultaneously worked toward two degrees, in electrical engineering and also aero-space engineering. Meanwhile, he earned his pilot's license and continued work on his special high school research project, the design and development of a range-finding radio circuit for determining speed and altitude of a rocket at any time and to restart and control the engines . . . object soft landings. Similar development was underway simultaneously in the aero-space industry, and the technique is now in actual use in the Surveyor moon program.

More recently, Lentz was one of a team of 15 seniors who successfully designed a high-altitude meteorological and missile satellite with solar panels and new communications gear for the study of high-altitude phenomena. The student-designed satellite is now being developed for use by N.A.S.A., with a target launching date of 1970.

If your boat has cable and pulley steering, lubricate the pulleys and see that they turn freely. Be sure they are anchored securely. If you have mechanical steering, check its operation and lubricate according to instructions.



Mr. and Mrs. Homer Taylor of Clear Lake would like to share with Record readers an excerpt from a letter received from their son, Sp 4 Hollie Taylor, who is stationed in Vietnam at Gia Leombat base. The letter written, April 8, was prompted by a clipping he received from a friend of a poem written by a soldier who was killed in Viet Cong machine gun crossfire while on patrol.

"I hope that you will put this clipping in your scrapbook and everytime that you hear somebody talk against this war here in Vietnam you will get this clipping out and show it to them. A person that hasn't the guts, the patriotism, to come in the service, any branch, to defend his country doesn't deserve to be a US citizen or to even live for that matter. There are far too many guys in the States who are sitting back there and doing anything that

they can't keep from going in the service.

have or to make enemies with anyone because he may be the only man close to you when you get shot or if you step on a mine and your life may depend upon the quick action of this man.

"Our men are over here fighting the spread of Communism and yet there is trouble back in our own country. People don't realize it but 9 times out of 10 the riots and what not there in the States are Communist inspired. The Communists can not be conquered if our own people can be swayed so easily as to turn against each other. Why can't people see this? Why are they so blind in this respect? Communism must be stopped at all cost. I would just as soon die fighting Communism rather than to have my children grow up under Communist rule. I have seen what Communism does to people and believe me it isn't very pretty to see."




