CIVIC HOUSEKEEPING IDEA

A long-time local citizen of the community button-holed us in the past week and propositioned us as follows.

"I've got an idea that I think would help—and could be done without raising the tax mill rate. It's just an idea in civic housekeeping. The best way to get people to do things that ought to be done is to channel things that it is possible for them to do them—and furthermore, make them just as easy and convenient as possible.

"Now if you were standing on the street corner downtown and had a cigarette package or a crackerjack box in your hand, what would you do with it, other than throw it in the gutter?" "I think that there could be waste receptacles at convenient places in Buchanan without any great cost. A much smaller town than Buchanan and not far away has solved the problem very simply and economically. They have taken old iron oil barrels, cut out the tops, rolled in the rums, painted them with aluminum paint, and labeled them appropriately, placing them where they will do the most good.

"These improvised receptacles, so treated, look neat and adequate. Or anyway they look better than a litter of waste paper and odd debris on the pavement. I think a good place for one would be to suspend it to the west side of the iron railing between the Hotel Buchanan and the I & M. Very likely it would be a good thing to have one at each filling station. Wherever people buy packaged things and are likely to want to throw away containers, there should be one of these receptacles handy.

Indications of a growing change in the basis of school support, with implications in the basis of control, are seen in the fact that approximately 60 per cent of the income of the Buchanan schools during the past year came from state and federal sources, according to the report of William Morgenthau, treasurer, read at the annual school meeting at the high school Monday evening.

Total of receipts from sources other than local were \$72,092.44, as compared with only \$46,792.24 paid directly by local taxpayers. A few small details of miscellaneous income such as resale of books and paper, interest received etc., have not been tabulated.

A change of one in the personnel of the board resulted from the election, Mrs. Eunice Miller Imhoff winning a seat on the board by a close victory over John F. Russell, incumbent. The vote of the four candidates (two elected) was as follows: William Morgenthau, 261; Mrs. Imhoff, 239; John Russell, 226; Lee Marsh, 80.

The details of the report by Morgenthau were as follows: Balance on hand as of July 1, 1943, \$36,637.25, itemized as follows: general fund, \$27,252.60; Debt Service, \$2,384.65; Building & Site Fund, \$7,000.

Holsteins From Doan Straub Herd Make High Records

Two registered Holstein-Friesian cows in the dairy herd of Doan Straub, Galien, have recently completed official production record of more than 500 pounds of butterfat. The Holstein-Friesian Association of America announces.

The higher producer of the two was Man-O-War Ormsby Lady Belle with a record of 603 pounds of butterfat and 14,634 pounds of milk. This is nearly 3 1/2 times the production of the average dairy cow in this nation. The record was made in 329 days on twice a day milking and at the age of 6 years and two months.

The other high producer was Crestlyn Maple Crest Johanna with 510 pounds of butterfat and 13,789 pounds of milk, made in 287 days on twice a day milking and at the age of 14 years and 1 month.

Testing was supervised by the Michigan State College of Agriculture in co-operation with The Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

City to Offer Use of Asphalt Oil to Lay Dust

Residents on unpaved streets of Buchanan who would be interested in availing themselves of a chance of surfacing with cutback asphalt may do so by getting owners of 51 per cent or more of the front footage on their respective blocks to sign petitions, requesting such surfacing, according to a resolution adopted by the city commission Monday evening.

This sort of surface was tested out three years ago on Roe street, and the street has stood up for three years. In addition to providing a cheap but negotiable surface, the oil forms an excellent dust layer. The cutback asphalt is different in nature from the road oil, which was spread in Buchanan streets as a dust layer about six years ago without any too satisfactory results. However, much of the trouble with that project was due to the fact that the oil was spread in rainy weather. On a limited stretch of Roe street it proved highly satisfactory. It is estimated that the cost will be about 10 cents per running foot.

On street sections where the required number of signers are secured, streets will be scarified and graded into shape by Superintendent Mitchell, and prime and seal coats will be successively applied by Contractor John Yerrington, after which they will be rolled. It is desirable that this treatment be applied as early in the summer as possible.

The charge of ten cents per running foot will be equivalent to the price of the cutback asphalt oil, according to Mayor Bradley, and will represent about half of the cost of the treatment.

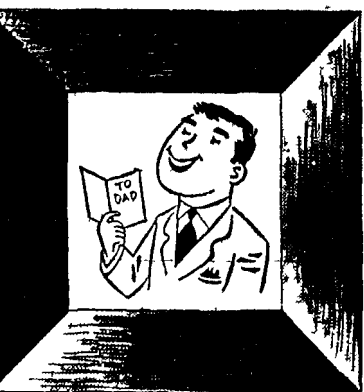
Jimmy Martin Wins In Scout Stalking
