

Police Arrest Youth After Speedy Chase

Fugitive Driver Wrecks Police Car, Faces Grave Charge

Patrolman Eugene Aalfs and Chris Money, special police officer, both escaped miraculously with only minor injuries incurred in the line of duty during a 100-mile chase of Don Peterson, 19, 410 Cecil Avenue, when the latter attempted to escape after running the red light at Front and Portage streets late Friday night.

Their injuries were received when Peterson rammed their car off the road and down a 40-foot embankment when the Buchanan police had joined with a state police car in an attempt to box the fugitive. The state police from the New Buffalo post caught Peterson a few minutes later.

Aalfs and Money saw Peterson, driving a green Buick, dive through the red light while speeding north on Portage street. The police car followed, in a zig-zag chase, west on Dewey to Main, south to Front, west to Moccasin, north to 3rd, west to Cayuga, waking the sleeping householders en route with the screech of brakes as they cut the corners. Peterson turned toward Front and fled out of the city via Tere Coupe. He cut south toward Bakertown, stopping his car within a few feet of a passing train at the Michigan Central crossing, and then on to M-60 and west, the pursued and the pursuers racing, west with speedometers reading 90 to 100, the larger car always summoning sufficient margin of get-away speed to escape being stopped.

As Peterson turned south at Galien toward New Carlisle, the police cut in behind and fired six shots over his car in an attempt to halt him. However, the fugitive raced on to the main business street of New Carlisle, driving onto a sidewalk and scattering a cluster of late-roving teen-agers, crowding the police car into a gas station. Money leapt from the police car and ran after Peterson, but the latter threw his car in reverse and raced back toward and into Galien.

Meantime the New Buffalo police car had arrived and joined the chase. Peterson went on north into Galien, where he was again stopped by a passing train. He turned west and after a zig-zag race escaped from being boxed by ramming the police car. He was stopped minutes later by the New Buffalo police car.

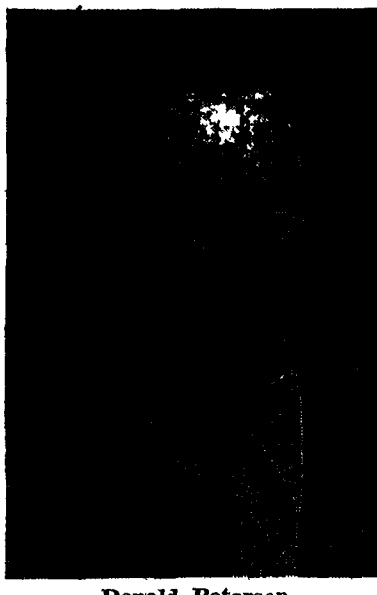
He was taken to the city jail and shortly afterward to Lamb's court, where he was charged with assault with intent to kill and with wilful and malicious destruction of property, toward the Buchanan police car, estimated damage \$1,700. Bonds of \$10,000 on the first charge and \$2,500 on the second charge were asked, but not furnished and Peterson was taken to the county jail, to await trial in the Berrien County circuit court.

It is believed by those conversant with the incident that the root of trouble lay in the grant of a driver's license to an unfit person. However, this made no difference in the nature of the charge. The Buchanan police are to be congratulated on their conduct in the line of duty, and on their narrow escape from severe injuries or worse.

College Club Head Gives Statistics On Student Loans

Plans for the Yuletide Ball on Dec. 22 were the chief business at the meeting of the Buchanan College club held Nov. 3 in the home of Mrs. George Bennett.

Mrs. Eitel Eberhardt, president, recited a brief history of the Scholarship Fund, which will be the beneficiary of the ball. She stated that a total of \$2,100 in loans is now outstanding, the sum being divided between five students now in college. During the 26 years since the founding of the project in 1928 the College Club has loaned over \$6,000 to twenty-one young men and women.

All of these loans have been repaid, excepting, of course, the five now outstanding. The size of the loans has ranged from \$50 to \$900 for a single student. The club has accomplished this amazing feat on a slender bank account. About \$1,660 has been raised by the major fund-raising projects, as style shows. Minor money-making projects and dues have made up the difference between that \$1,660 and the \$2,100 actually loaned out.

In addition to the scholarship the College Club has contributed \$225 to other causes in the past. This policy has been discontinued as the requests for loans have become more pressing.

The foregoing statistics lend real force to the words of Mrs. Alfred Hansen, chairman of the Yuletide ball, as she reminded the members that the success of the ball means a continuing assurance of financial help to young students "who need it when they need it."

Donald J. Smith To Teach in B. H. S. As Extern Teacher

Donald J. Smith, graduate from Buchanan high school in June, 1952, and now a junior in Central Michigan college, will enter the Buchanan schools as an extern in industrial arts and physical education, continuing the extern connection here until the Christmas holiday recess.

This is a species of practice teaching which Central Michigan College has been carrying on for several years. Donald had requested that his extern work might be done in the Buchanan high school. He is completing his second semester's work in directed teaching. He will work in the two chosen departments under the guidance of local high school faculty. The purpose of the plan is to provide him with a realistic experience somewhat similar to that of a first-year instructor.

Show Teen-Age Narcotic Film To P. T. A. Nov. 17

The November program of the Buchanan Parent-Teacher Association, to be held next Wednesday evening, Nov. 17, at 7:30 p. m. in the study hall of the high school building, will be a talk by Glenn Hammel of Kalamazoo, on "Juvenile Education and Narcotics As Associated With Law Enforcement and The Home." This event will be given under the auspices of the Odd Fellow lodge, and presented by Clayton Leiter, who was responsible for bringing Mr. Hammel to Buchanan.

Hammel, a Past Grand Master of the Odd Fellows of Michigan, is also Chief Deputy Sheriff in charge of the Crime Division of Kalamazoo county. He brings a message to parents, advising them to be alert to the dangers to which youth is now subject, and not to leave the whole responsibility for their moral safety to teachers and police authorities.

He will present a film, "The Story of a Teen-Age Drug Addict," the property of the Odd Fellow lodge of Michigan for use in their teen-age program. The purpose of the film is to dramatize a typical case history of a teen-age drug addict. The experience of the boy is told in reverse. He is in a hospital undergoing the terrible ordeal of "withdrawal," the term used for elimination of the drug and its effects from the system. The boy thinks over the steps that led him to the habit and the story is thus told as a "flash-back."

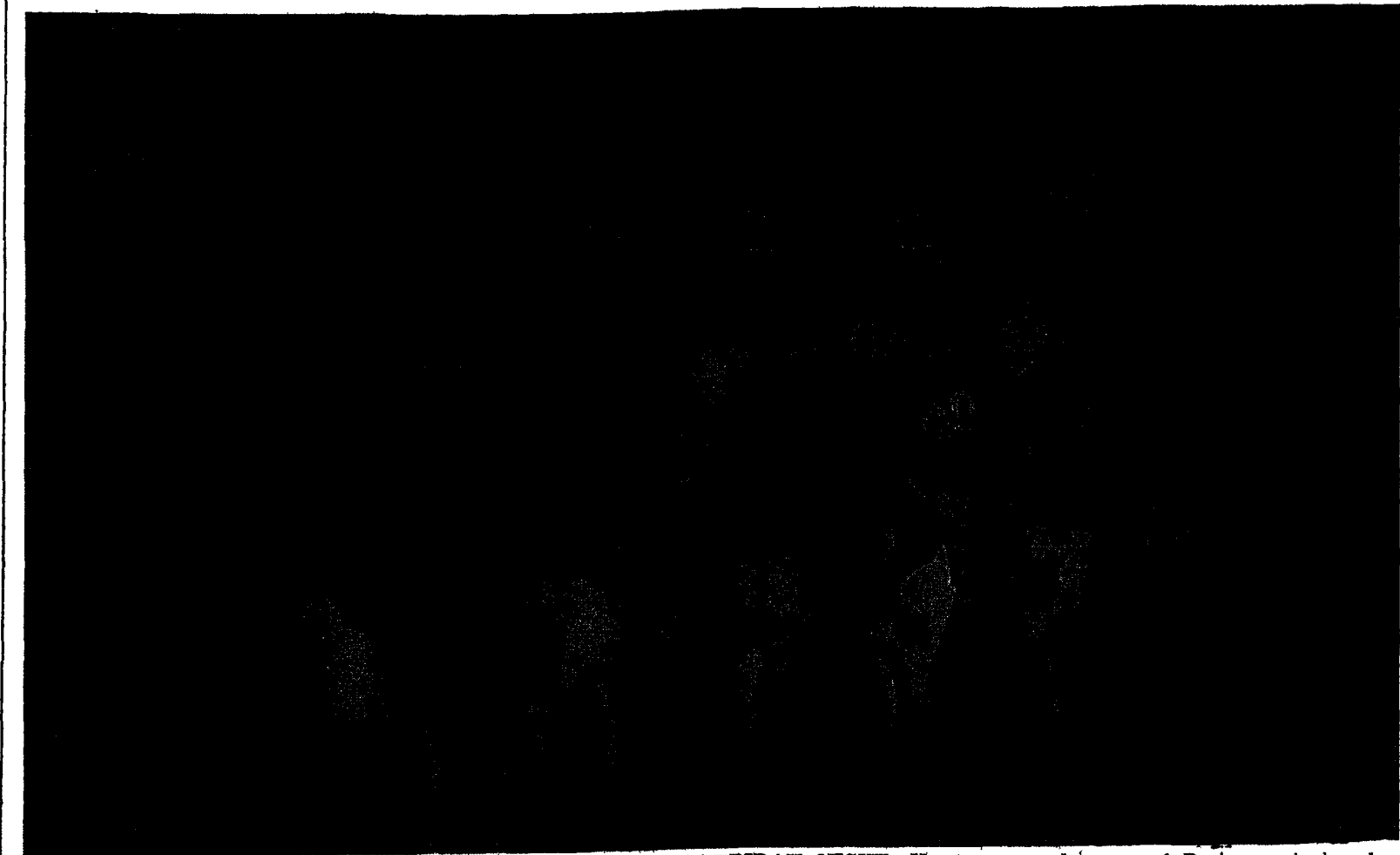
It is true that there have been no proven cases of teen-age addiction to narcotics in the Buchanan area, in recent years, at least. However there have been cases in recent years in Berrien county and in the South Bend area. Mr. Hammel's talk should be helpful in alerting both parents and teachers against the possibility of its invasion here. Almost invariably the prevalence of rings of narcotics addicts comes as an unforeseen shock to communities, after much damage has already been done.

B. H. S. Seniors Say Adieus

Twelve varsity seniors will be making their last gridiron showing before home fans Friday night against Three Rivers. These boys have been at the heart of the Buchanan attack all through the year and coach Bill Billings has indicated his sorrow at the thought of losing them through graduation.

"However," said the cheery Billings, "we know that they will do well after high school and we can only hope that some of the things they have learned on the football team will aid them to success."

Prolific scorer Jim Conrad and stalwart of the line, Bill Karpinski, are among the vital losses coming up.

Conrad, a 5'8" fullback has been a constant threat in all ball games. He leads the Bucks in rushing and has started every game this year. Jim can pass as well as carry the pigskin. He made all-Big Four honors last year. In his three years to now, he has won nine varsity letters, three in football, including this year.

Karpinski, dubbed by one sports writer as the "watch charm" guard because of his diminutive size and the fact that he keeps going, is referred to by Billings as "the mainstay of our line." Bill starts at offensive guard, and plays at linebacker on defense. He has been known to kick an extra point in addition to his scrapping talents. Lettering three years in football up to this year, Bill has also earned three baseball letters.

Jim Bobbitt weighs 220 pounds and stands 5'8 1/2". A burly boy, he plays a key part in the Buck offense. Known as a smashing tackle, Jim lettered three years in baseball as well as twice in football.

Known as "Dinky," Dale Dellinger fills out the starting backfield on offense and defense. He is one of the three leading ground gainers and one of the faster men on the squad. Dale lettered in his junior year, and also twice in baseball.

One of the biggest and roughest boys on the team, Jim Letcher is a constant threat to block kicks and passes on opposing teams. Big Jim stands 6'2" and weighs 195 pounds, and knows how to throw his weight around. He lettered as a sophomore in football and got two basketball and one track award.

Lee Rotzien, who recently injured his knee and is lost to the Bucks for the year, played an important role in Billings' plans for offense and defense. The coach says that Rotzien, as much as anyone else on the team, will be missed this Friday. The 185-pound tackle has earned two letters in football, one in track.

Starting as linebacker on defense and guard on offense, Joe Benak is considered a real stone wall. Joe, weighing only slightly less than Karpinski at 160 pounds, has won varsity letters since his sophomore year. His coach thinks

highly of him.

Chris Schau helps out in many positions but starts as a defensive halfback. He leads the team in pass interceptions, but runs well in an offensive role. Chris has varsity letters in football since his sophomore year, and is a baseball like-wise.

Center Dick Coonfield has helped under a beating that might have sidelined an ordinary man. The steady pounding has not bothered the 153-pound boy and he is rated by Billings as the most improved player on the squad. He lettered last year.

Larry Phoenix, the other starting end, is always an offensive threat. He also does the Buchanan punting and can break a game up in any number of ways through his clever feints and booming kicks. Larry lettered in football and basketball as a junior.

Lee Fisher, the lightest man on the squad at 130 pounds, is a utility halfback and has filled out some important spots for Billings this year. He works at the halfback slot and looked well in several games this year.

Utility guard on offense and defense, Bob Groat, standing 5'10 1/2" and weighing 143, has been a great help on offense and defense. He lettered last year in football and also earned his monogram in track.

Rated as one of the best teams ever to come out of Three Rivers, the Wildcats will be looking for their first undefeated season in many years, and their first as a member of the Twin Valley Conference. The Cats have, of course, won the conference title, so this game will be window-dressing for them.

Clark Equipment Earnings High 1st 3 Quarters 1954

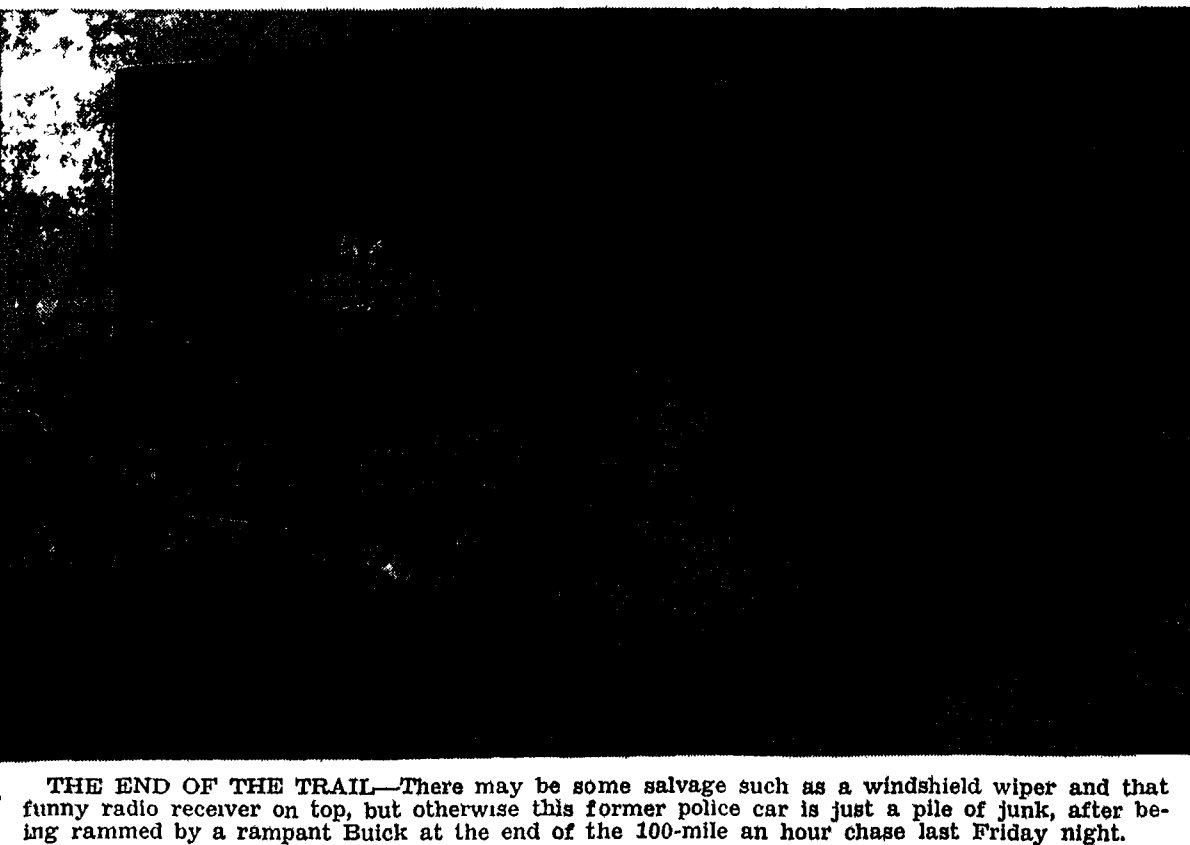

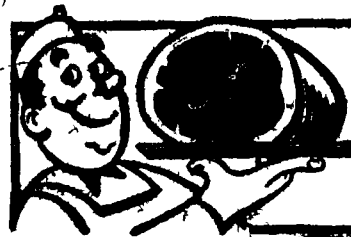

A. E. Houswerth, Portage Prairie Leader, Dies

Albert E. Houswerth, a resident of the Portage Prairie community practically all of his life and long a leading figure in that community, died Friday, Nov. 5, 1954, at the age of 81 years. He was born on the ancestral acres on Nov. 3, 1873, the son of Henry and Mary Houswerth. He married Nettie A. Diehl, who survives him, in the parsonage of the Portage Prairie Evangelical church on March 22, 1895. They made their home on the Houswerth farm except for a residence of a few months in Chicago, and a number of winters spent in California.

He was a very successful fruit farmer for many years, until he sold most of the farm excepting the home site, because of ill health. In addition he was long a valuable servant to his community, especially in public affairs and in his church. He represented Benton and township on the county board of supervisors for about 15 years, until he voluntarily retired about 1930.

He was a lifelong member of the church now known as the Portage Prairie Evangelical United Brethren and very active in it for many years, as Sunday school class teacher and superintendent and also as organizer and conductor of a large young people's orchestra until failing health obliged him to limit his activities.

He resigned from the board of directors of the Buchanan Co-ops, Inc., in November, 1953, after having served in that function for 33 years. He and Mrs. Houswerth had been spending winters in Los Angeles, Calif., since 1935, with the exception of one year. In 1946 he suffered a severe paralytic stroke which at first threatened to render him an invalid. However, he set out with optimistic courage and was soon able to drive a car again and resumed, the following winter, his annual trips to Los Angeles, which he greatly enjoyed and repeated until this winter.

He is survived by his wife, by a son, Carson, now living in the home place, by a sister, Mrs. Minerva Cauffman of Rt. 4, South Bend, by a step-sister, Mrs. Amanda Korn of Niles, by two grandchildren. He was preceded in death by two brothers, James of Chicago, and John of River Junction, Mich., also by two sisters, Mrs. Jane Beebe of Niles and Mrs. Maggie Swartz of Portage Prairie.

Funeral rites were held in the Portage Prairie Evangelical U. B. church at 2:30 p.m., Monday, with the Rev. Wayne Palmer of that church in charge. Burial was made in the Portage Prairie cemetery adjoining the church.

Get A Check On Your Heating Plant Says Burks

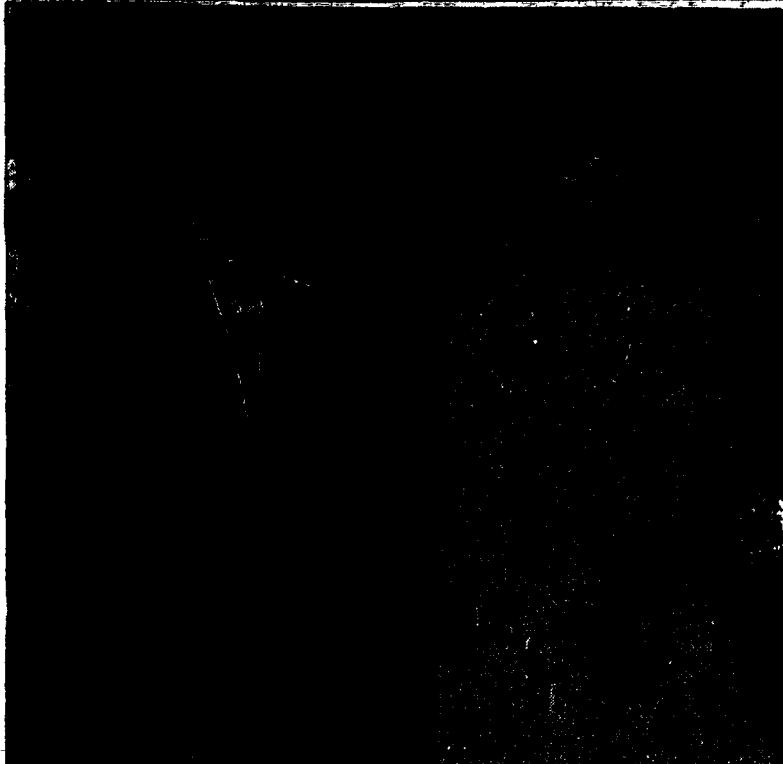
Here is a word of caution from Neal Burks, Buchanan fire chief, on the possible fire dangers in defective heating plants and flues.

The heavy heating season is now upon us, and, according to the National Fire Protection Association, the chap who has not checked his heating system may be the chap who will be calling up the fire department this winter to save his

home. One out of every four home fires in the United States is caused by failure to clean, inspect and repair heating plants and chimneys at least once per year.

There are an approximate 1,000 home fires every day in the United States, and more than half of them may be traced to: 1. Thoughtlessness with a cigarette or match; 2. Defective or overheated stoves, furnaces and chimneys.

The "No. 1 Fire Killer" is the defective or improperly operated oil or kerosene stove. The remedial procedures are: keep your stove clean at all times; repair leaks at once and trust only qualified mechanics to make repairs; always use clean fire-quality kerosene or No. 1 fuel oil; never turn

oil on and leave the stove unattended.

Rated as the "No. 6 Home Fire Bug" is the person who performs his trick with hot ashes and live coals, dumping them fresh from the stove or furnace into wooden or cardboard boxes, or piling them on the basement floor next to wooden walls, old newspapers or other inflammable rubbish, thus accounting for 1 out of 11 home fires.

There are over 600,000 building fires every year in the United States and fires in dwellings account for 397,000 of them. Apartments account for 42,000. In 1953 defective or overheated heating and cooking equipment caused 80,000 fires and a total of \$72,760,000 loss.

Defective or overheated chimneys caused 38,600 fires, with a total loss of \$29,600,000.

In October Buchanan had three fires, one of which was caused by a plugged chimney and one by an overheated stove.

3,500,000 Farmers To Receive Social Security After 1954

This is first of a series of three articles which will appear in the Berrien County Record. This is made possible as a public service feature of this newspaper.

Two of the most significant provisions in the 1954 amendments to the social security law are those relating to farmers.

Nearly 3 1/2 million farm operators will be earning social security credits under the Federal insurance program for the first time after 1954. In addition over two million more farm employees will begin earning this protection for themselves and their families beginning Jan. 1, 1955.

Farm families have long been faced with the problem of loss of income because of old age and death of the head of the household. Social Security or as it is known by its more complete name—old age and survivors insurance—is a program whereby the working person earns and pays for his own as well as his family's future financial protection. Today over 6 million retired workers and their survivors are receiving monthly benefits under this program. These payments are made as matter of right to insured individuals. Benefits to retired individuals range from a minimum of \$30 a month to a maximum of \$98.50, and benefits to survivors range from \$30 to \$200 per month.

Next week we will tell you how you can qualify as an insured individual entitled to monthly benefit payments and how these payments are figured.

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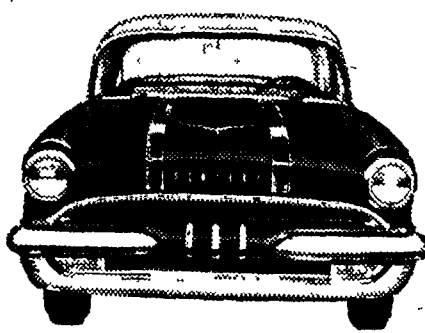

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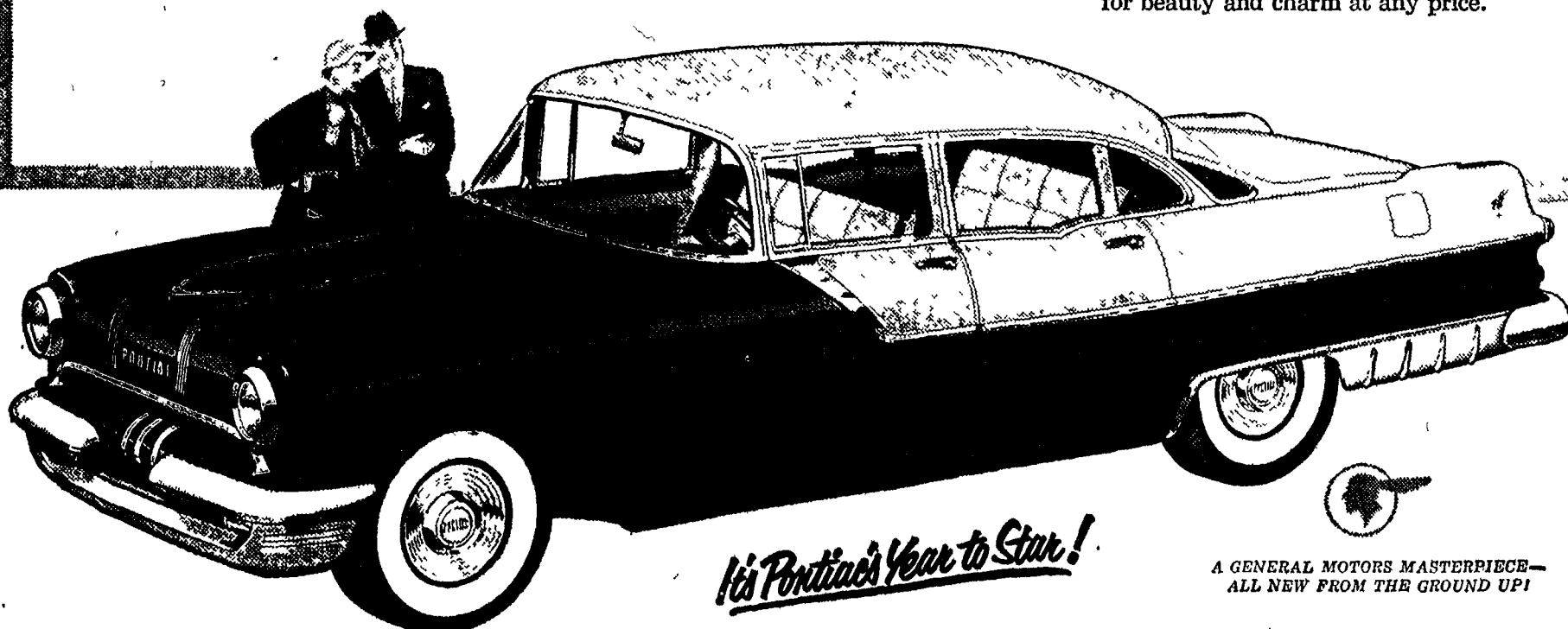

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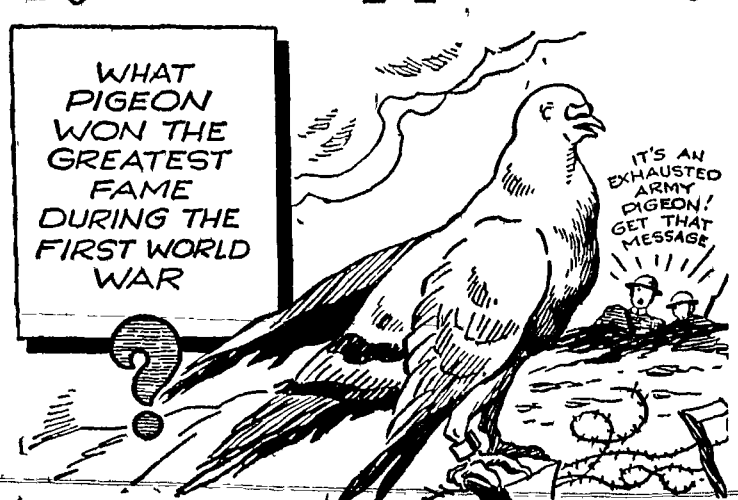

Bucks Take St. Joe By 26 to 6 Count

Buchanan won its fifth game of the season and its third in a row as the Bucks mowed down the St. Joseph Bears 26-6 to finish the Big Four conference play in second place.

The three touchdown margin of

victory does not tell the story of repeated Buck thrusts that were repelled by St. Joe. Throughout the first half, the Bears were forced on the defensive as the running and passing of Jim Conrad, Dodge Karpinski and Steve Pendley spearheaded Buchanan pushes.

Conrad came out of the game as high scorer with two touchdowns while Karpinski and Chris Schau got one each. Buchanan won the statistical battle as well as the final scoring by piling up 351 yards to the Bears' 97 and 11 first downs to St. Joe's two. The Bucks ripped to 162 yards on the ground and floated on their expert passers' arm for another 189.

The passing average was exceptional Friday as 11 out of 24 flips hit their mark for a 457 mark, almost one out of two clicking.

Bill Karpinski, power-in-a-small-package guard, and ends Jim Letcher and Larry Phoenix, choked off offensive hopes of the Bears by dragging runners to the turf time after time.

Only three times did the Bears have possession of the ball over the mid-field stripe, and the first time didn't come until midway in the third quarter.

The loss tagged St. Joseph with its first loss to Buchanan since 1947 when the Bucks won 13-6. It also added to the misery of the Bears' final standings as they finished in the cellar of the Big Four, and ended their over-all season with a 2-6 record.

After a Buchanan drive had been repelled in the second quarter, Jim Gersonde, punting for the Bears, booted one out to the 27. The Bucks picked up a little momentum but before they could score, Bob Gusse intercepted a Steve Pendley pass and St. Joe had the ball. Following an exchange of fumbles, Pendley threw to Jim Letcher twice on plays

covering a total of 37 yards. With 30 seconds remaining in the half, Karpinski swept right end from the eight yard line.

Early in the third quarter, Letcher blocked a Gersonde punt, recovering on the St. Joe 33. Eleven plays later, Conrad burrowed across from the three Pendley kicked the extra point and the score was 13-0.

In the final period, Pendley, firing hot, hit end Dick Smith with a delayed pass that netted 25 yards. After losing ground on two plays, Pendley pitched to Karpinski and Schau for a first down on the St. Joe five, Schau being grabbed just before he could step across the goal line. On the next play, Chris darted over through the middle.

The lone St. Joe score came after Sinn intercepted a Karpinski pass on the 39. After losing six yards, Sinn threw a jump pass to Jason Harness, who caught the ball on the 38 and lateraled to Pete Watt before being tackled. Watt raced the remaining yards for a touchdown. Two plays after the kickoff, the Bucks, enraged at having their goal line crossed in such sudden fashion, struck for their final score.

Conrad, on the draw play, broke through the middle, cut to the outside, and went 45 yards to score standing up. Pendley's conversion was good, and the final score was on the board with 3:57 to play.

St. Joe's coach, Dick Higgs, rated the play of the Buchanan line above that of Niles, the powerhouse—of—southwestern Michigan.

Annual 4-H Fall Achievement Day Saturday, Nov. 13

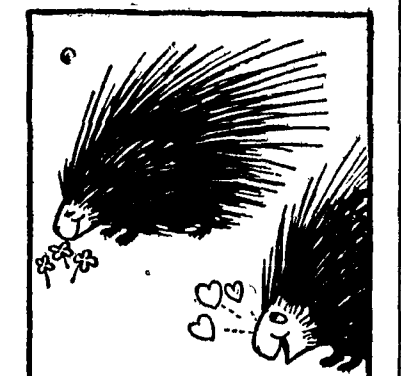

This time the subject of the "Meet Your Merchant" feature is Frosty Blood, agent for Standard Oil products in the Buchanan area.

The front monicker, Frosty, is, as you have suspected, a nickname. However, there is no insinuation that Mr. Blood is a cold-blooded operator, and it is certainly no reflection on the heating quality of the fuel oil he sells. Frosty says that he got the name when he was a mere youngster, when his playmates in a festive mood, twisted his real name, Forest, into Frosty. Mr. Blood said it was all right with him — he never liked his front name anyway.

Frosty has been associated with the Standard Oil Co. in one way or another nearly all his adult

life. Back in the days when Standard Oil owned and directly operated all of their stations, Frosty got a job as assistant manager of a Standard station in Sturgis, Mich. He got the job June 7, 1935. A few months later Standard Oil changed to its present policy, retaining the ownership of the stations but leasing them to the operators. Frosty put in his bid and got a Sturgis station. That was on April 7, 1935. Two years later he put in another bid and got a partner for life. That was when he married Charlene Shane in May, in 1937. Frosty did not remember the wedding date. 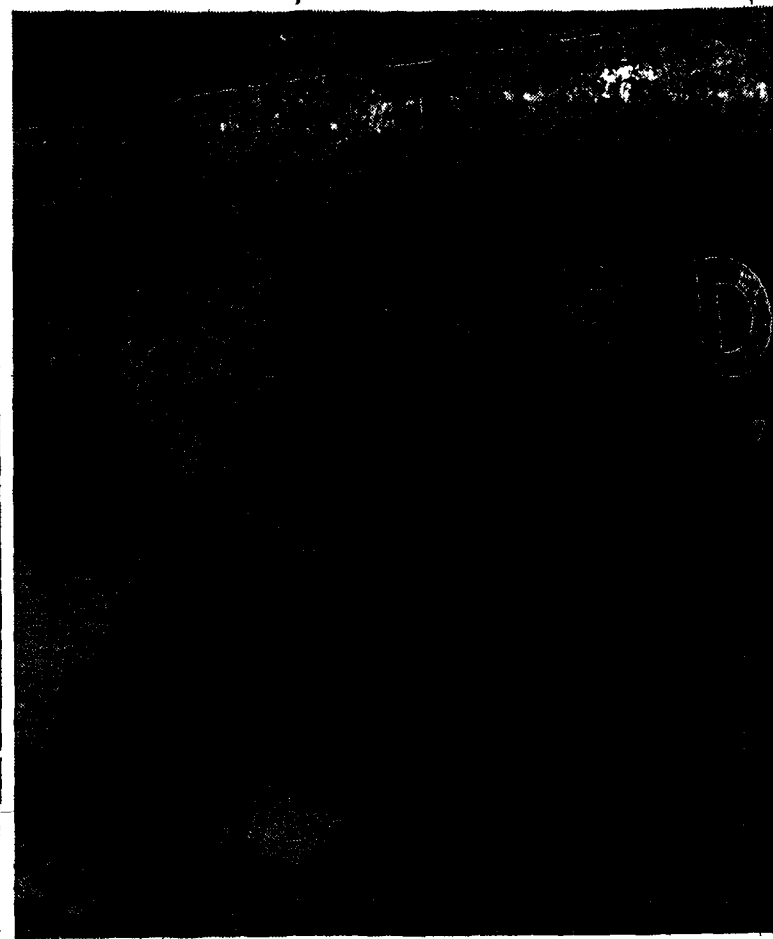

neighborhood life of Buchanan. Mr. Blood took over the business from John Nelson, who had been agent for three years. Previous to that Glen Swaim had been the agent for 13 years. Mr. Blood started operating, as had the others, with his home as his office.

However, the business grew rapidly in volume following World War II. His was due to the changeovers in two fields, the rapid completion of the change from horse to motor power on the farms, and growing conversion to automatic heat in homes, business places and factories. Ten years ago when Blood came here horses were still numerous and a partial source of motive power on many farms. Now there are only a few on the smallest farms.

The big increase in town and city necessitated more equipment. Blood has one 600-gallon tank truck when he came here. Now he operates three 1,000-gallon trucks. He has two assistants, Earl Derfingier and Barney Fay. He also installed an office near the tanks at 707 Days avenue. A short time ago he placed an automatic answering machine, the product of the Bell Telephone company, in the office, which records all incoming orders automatically day or night. His was the first oil station in the state to install this device, but now more are using them.

coming in to justify a clerk in charge. This is because nearly all of Blood's business is done through regular route checks and supplying heating oil in particular on a "keep-filled" basis. "Watch the top of that fuel tank and keep the top half full," is the usual order of the customer. All the farm customers are served by routes, and most of the city users are handled the same. The truck driver fills each tank and makes a routine check on operating controls. Many of these homes are so served year in and year out without Blood or his assistants seeing the customers.

In addition to the mentioned outlets, Blood supplies four Standard Oil stations, three in Buchanan and one in Bakertown. He also supplies the local industries with their petroleum products.
