A Minute With Mary

Organizing Closets and Drawers
 Getting organized. That's probably one of the most popular New Year's resolutions. If it was yours -- or if it should have been yours -- why don't you start with organizing your closets and drawers?

Cluttered closets and disarrayed dresser drawers make it hard to find what you want -- or even know what you own. If you spend time cleaning and organizing, you feel in control again and save time in the long run.

Begin by trying on garments that haven't been worn recently. Would they be wearable again with minor alterations or modifications? Would a bright new accessory make a garment enjoyable again?

Be honest with yourself. If you'll never wear something again, get rid of it. It will make more room for what's left and help keep the garments you wear from getting crowded and crushed.

Sort through your things frequently. This way you can give your extras away while they are still fashionable and can be worn by others -- an energy-saving measure since it takes energy to make fabrics and garments.

As you sort, look for new combinations -- a sweater that you might wear under an old dress or an accessory to update a treasure from past decades.

Suggestions for organizing closets and drawers
 Hang a shoe bag with clear plastic pockets on your coat closet door to hold gloves, scarves, and hats in plain view.
 Hang a similar shoe bag in your clothes closet for hosiery.
 Put each pair in a plastic sandwich bag and sort according to color and type. Then put each sorted pile into a plastic pocket.

Line a dresser drawer with thin foam rubber and arrange jewelry with similar items together. The foam rubber will keep the jewelry in place.
 Hang scarves over cardboard-covered pants hangers.
 Hang belts from inexpensive towel rods from the dime store.
 Hang pendants and necklaces from towel racks or cup hooks applied to a closet door. Using thumb tacks, apply wide elastic below the hooks. Then slip the

Wilt's will hold the current shelf price and guarantee that price through February 15, 1975 unless there is a cost decline in which case the base price will be reduced. Advertised items will be changed back to base price when the ad expires.
 Gary DeMond, President of Wilt's said that the price hold-down is in response to requests by many customers and to his knowledge 'is the only price freeze in the area announced by an independently owned and operated food chain.  "Not only did he present materials stimulating thought about the future of both the individual and mankind," DeWitt stated, "but his instructional style was patterned much like what I am exposed to in my college studies rather than as a typical high school course."
 DeWitt, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Duane E. DeWitt of 144 Clark St., Buchanan, attributed much of his academic success for which the Adrian College scholarship was awarded to his parents. He described his parents as people who encouraged freedom of thought and adhered to the philosophy that, in enjoying such a freedom, one must exercise responsibility for himself and others.

 Patton exhibited a great deal of warmth and humor, especially when writing to his beloved wife, Beatrice. He was vain, often petty, and with decided opinions.
 His opinions on Dwight Eisenhower vary. Often he describes Ike as a great man. Then he'll become annoyed with his commander and will say so.
 Much of the time, Patton was in hot water with the press. His inclination to talk too much kept him in trouble. He indicated great regret over the slapping incidents (there were two) although his regret was more because of the adverse publicity which arose.
 Patton was a lover of war. He registered great disappointment when the war was coming to a halt. Often he said that people who thought there could ever be

a long period of peace were damn fools.
 He was profane and at the same time deeply religious. But he said that, although he would like to be God, he was afraid that he'd discover that somebody outranked God.

An invoice in the amount of \$3,225.00 to Orpurs, Inc. was approved for installation of a heating system at the Teen Center.

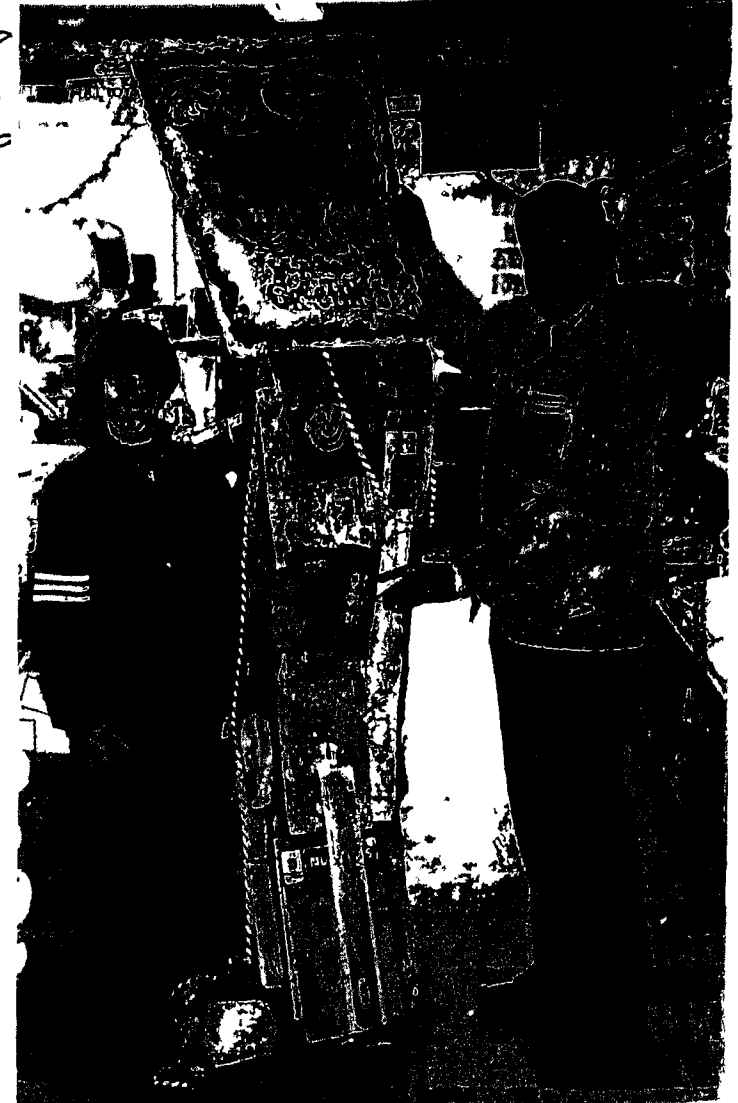
Ordinance No. 217, providing unemployment compensation for city employees, was adopted.

Jobs for Tomorrow

Does anyone care about the future of Michigan and its communities? That's the question asked by Dr. Daniel Kruger, professor of industrial relations at Michigan State University.

"America's love affair with the automobile seems to be in drastic revision," says Kruger. "And if the auto industry is not so vibrant as it has been, what else do we do?"

Kruger believes communities should take a hard look at where they stand today, where they want to go tomorrow and how they can get there.

With newspapers and other leaders as a conscience to stimulate interest, committees should delve into those questions, he suggests.

"We should look at what we have now - the businesses in a community and their problems," Kruger says. "We should see if there are any growth possibilities within the existing base."

A look at zoning regulations, for example, might show that a business would not be able to relocate within a community if it so desired. There just might not be any place it could go - without leaving the city boundaries.

And there's the problem of electrical power, as just one more example. Kruger mentions the prospects of businesses moving elsewhere if they cannot be guaranteed adequate power to carry out their operations.

Communities must be rallied to consider these problems and ask themselves what they want from the future, Kruger says.

Berrien County Action opened its Niles-Buchanan area community service center Monday in Niles Township Hall, 320 Bell Road, Niles. The community service center, in the basement of Niles Township Hall, will be open five days a week from 8:30 to 5. The office has a staff of trained outreach workers, who will work in the southeastern area of the county, "helping to break the poverty cycle," according to staff members.

Its mission is to help low income persons to help themselves. Outreach workers include Cleeta Wade of Buchanan, Bernard Bacon and Suzy Edwards, both of Niles, the latter acting as supervisor.

Berrien County Action, an anti-poverty agency of the Michigan Department of Labor, its funding agency, is designed to help area residents and low income families who have special needs. It is actively involved in community planning and will help encourage local leaders, clubs, agencies and institutions along with the poor themselves to become involved in "breaking the cycle of poverty," working with other agencies to do so.

Action will study area needs, and then build a program around those needs, rather than proceed with a predetermined program. Possible programs will perhaps include counseling about unemployment, food, health, housing and fuel problems and will offer an emergency food source for families in need before regular assistance begins. Action has just received funding for a winterizing program in which homes of the poor are winterized by using unemployed to do it - a two-way benefit.
