Unity Hospital Starts New Food Service For Patients

Unity Hospital has instigated its new food service for patients. Under the direction of Greyhound Corporation and with the direction of Armour Foods, the new service offers scientifically prepared pre-plate meals.

The meals have been scientifically frozen and are delivered daily to the hospital. It is possible for a patient to have a full choice of breakfasts or simply a continental breakfast if he prefers. The restaurant-style menu includes ten different entrees for the noon or evening meals plus a daily special. The patient selects his meals in the morning for the following day under the supervision of a trained dietician and a food service supervisor.

In addition there is an evening snack program where the patient can select a treat before he retires. There is also a V.I.P. (Very Important Patient) where

friends or relatives can purchase as a gift for the patient some special meal such as a filet mignon. The hospital will then prepare the steak or special dinner if it is within the patient's diet. This can serve as a suitable gift to the patient.

Ms. Anne Cartwright, food service supervisor, consults with patients and explains the menu to them beforehand. Meals include salads and soups and desserts as well as such entrees as turkey, ham, or beef. Specials include such items as pork chops, and it is possible for patients to get other meals if there is nothing which appeals to him on the regular menu.

Administrator Donald Ciulli said that it is the aim of the hospital to be able to provide the type of meal available in a good restaurant.

England Beckons To Buchanan Travelers

Tony Allen in Cambridgeshire says that February and March are great times to visit England and to get away from Buchanan's more severe weather. The people in Cambridge are inviting people from their sister city of Buchanan to visit them February 21-March 13. Students from here will be able to participate in school activities there, and the adults will be able to see a great deal of England as guests of their British friends.

Under the special airline tour rates, the fare will be at a minimum, and because the people of Cambridgeshire will open their homes to the folks from Buchanan, there won't be the costs for lodging and meals

It Can Be Cut

Let's take the case of a young man who graduated from Notre Dame in 1968. His father had been influential in getting the congressman elected. The congressman was aware of past favors and was perfectly willing to help get the man's son a job in Washington.

The young man went to work in a newly formed government bureau. He didn't replace anybody but was added to the staff. His starting salary was \$9,000 a pretty good wage for a young single man in 1968.

The young man did his job adequately although he was capable of doing more than he was required to do. In due course, his department was housed in larger quarters because staff requirements had grown. In due course he married a young woman in the department. They moved to Maryland. By 1971, he was making \$12,000 a year, and his wife was making \$9,500. Neither were doing any more work than they had done in 1968.

In 1972, Congress passed legislation which required the expansion of the young man's department. Because of this seniority of this person, he was put in charge of a new section. Salary \$15,000. This year he will make \$21,000.

Now President Ford has said that we should try and cut expenses of government. This young man, along with his congressman, is saying that it's impossible to cut the budget by \$28 billion. Yet his one department, accomplishing no more than it did in 1968, now employs four times as many people with a payroll 10 times as big as it was then.

Multiply this one department by the hundreds which have sprung up since the mad days when FDR ran his campaign based on cutting down the spending of Hoover. Add to them all the many bureaus and departments which should have been phased out after they had served their purpose. Then take all the wasteful fat out of the military budget.

This young man's congressman, instead of protesting over the impossibility of cutting the budget, should ponder his own contributions to the wild spending legislation to which he has given his blessing. He would see that a \$28 billion cut is entirely possible.

Ford isn't so far off base. If politicians would listen instead of orate, they might find the wisdom of what he's trying to say.

Motocross To Draw Thousands To Buchanan

Some 20,000 people are expected in the Buchanan area Sunday as the 1975 Trans AMA competition gets underway at Redbud Track and Trail. This international motocross event is the fourth in a 10 race series which will attract the world's best racers.

Bob Rutter of Benton Harbor is the only local rider to qualify so far for this event. Up to now, the sport has been dominated by Europeans, but, as it catches on in America, it's predicted that some day Americans will become expert in it.

There will be races in the 500cc International Class and the 250cc Support Class. Redbud Track and Trail is listed in the American Motorcycle Association's

official book as one of the main events. The next is in Omaha the following weekend. Competitors gather points when they win one of the ten events, and the points go toward their competition for national and international championship.

National champion is Jim Weinert from Mission Viejo, California, who had 4 national wins last year. Second ranked open class rider is Tony D'Este from Morrisville, Pennsylvania, with 2 national victories last year, and third ranked is Steve Stackable from Austin, Texas. They, plus most of the top riders from America and many from Europe, will be present Sunday.

United Way At 72 Percent

There will be a report luncheon of the division captains of Buchanan United Way on Friday at noon at the Chamber of Commerce office. At this time chairman Robert Powers hopes to have enough information to wind up this year's campaign.

On Monday, the United Way thermometer stood at almost \$39,000, which is 72 percent of the goal. Some increases were noted. Indiana and Michigan Electric employees are up from last year at \$644.80 and Unity Hospital employees are up to \$491. Still incomplete are the advanced gifts, Electro-Voice employees, Clark Equipment employees, and some from the business division.

A large gain has been registered by the educational division, chaired by Corbin Deigen. These gifts now stand at \$2210 as against \$1582 last year.

The number of layoffs in Buchanan has been the prime factor why the goal isn't met. Corporate gifts with only a few more to be heard from are as high or higher than last year, and business and professional gifts are comparable.

Need Data For Community Calendar

The Buchanan area Chamber of Commerce is attempting to begin a community calendar to benefit organizations who are making plans for special events. Such a calendar would help to avoid conflicts of special activities and to help in the scheduling of events.

All churches and clubs are asked to let the committee know of definite dates already planned for 1976. In this way such conflicts as two bake sales or two rummage sales on the same weekend could be avoided. The calendar when completed, will be available to everybody for use in future planning. It will include special dates involving the school, the retail promotions planned in Buchanan and any club events already scheduled.

Church and club secretaries are asked to send known dates to the Berrien County Record for their inclusion in the calendar.

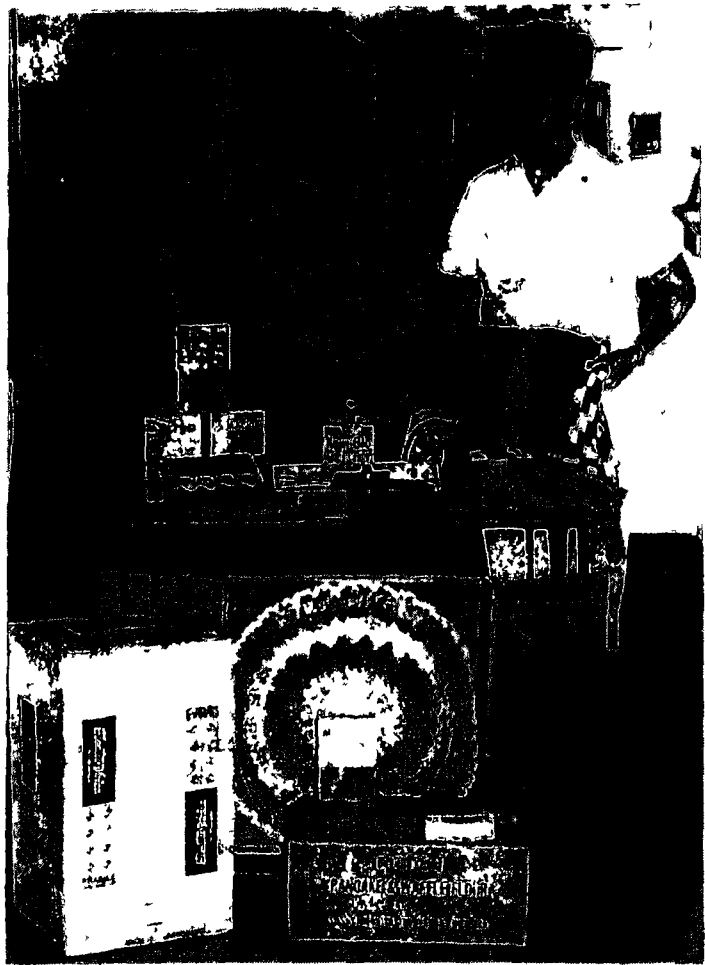
The former Norene Fuller and Mr Wregglesworth were married October 7, 1950 in the Buchanan Church of Christ by Rev Greenwood

Offer Free Screening For Infant Hearing Loss

Berrien County Day Program for Hearing Impaired Children is offering as a new service this year, free infant hearing screening. This service is offered as a means of detecting hearing losses at the earliest possible age.

The sooner a hearing loss is detected and an educational program started, the better the chance of success for the child. Anyone living in Berrien, Van Buren, and Cass counties may take advantage of this screening program.

Any child falling under one of the seven high risk categories listed here should be screened for hearing loss as a precaution.

Any child having traits of hearing loss in the family.

Any child who has chronic ear infections or chronic upper respiratory difficulties.

Any child whose mother had an abnormal pregnancy or contacted rubella or acute viral infection during first four months.

All premature children.

Any child that has been on Streptomycin or Kanamycin for a prolonged period of time.

Any child who has had spinal meningitis or encephalitis.

Any child who has had a high fever 104 degrees - 105 degrees for a prolonged period of time.

Danger signs to look for that might indicate a hearing loss include:

Not jumping or crying at loud unexpected noises at 0-3 months of age.

Not turning head to seek sound after 3 months or when child is sitting alone and neck muscles are mature.

If babbling (non-sense syllables) starts but stops completely, if a child doesn't respond when called or spoken to at 12 months to 2 years and if a child doesn't have definite words at 2 years.

If one or more of these danger signs are noted, the child should be screened.

Detroit (1837) Thousands of settlers continue to pour into Michigan from the east. In spite of reports of poor land and lack of good roads in the area, people continue to gather in Detroit for the move into the interior regions.

Earlier descriptions of the State were less than flattering. Surveyor General Edward Tiffin, in 1815, said of Michigan in part, "There would not be more than one acre out of a hundred, if there would be one out of a thousand, that would in any case admit to cultivation."

Morse's Geography, which is the standard in many schools around the country, has these words written over the interior of Michigan: "Interminable Swamp."

But the negative reports have not kept the people from coming to see for themselves. In 1820, there were fewer than 9,000 in the Michigan territory. By 1830 the number had grown to about 32,000.

Four years later, the population had tripled to near 90,000. Now in 1837, there are almost 175,000 inhabitants in our new State. Hundreds here are coming in daily.

John Gordon, a recent visitor and investor in Michigan land from Baltimore, Maryland, had these remarks when asked about the commercial prospects for Michigan: "It has natural channels of commerce radiating as from a common center, and commanding the Atlantic through the Canadas, and the southwestern states through the tributaries of the Mississippi," he said.

"The surface of the country is so level that railroads may be constructed with but little cost of graduation", Gordon added.

The new cemetery rates were adopted. They will be higher for sales of lots and for interments, and the non-residents of the city will be even higher. A lot will now cost \$150 for residents and \$220 for people out of the city and interments are \$150. Since the cemetery runs at a deficit each year, it's hoped that the new rates will make up some of the difference.

The city passed a resolution by which it plans in some way to continue emergency ambulance service for the city, either by contracting with a private firm or entering into an ambulance authority with other governmental units.

An ordinance was passed, effective immediately, on proper drainage and surfacing of parking areas. The main intent is to assure that neighboring property isn't affected by improper drainage.

The commission received the quarterly police report which showed that there have been 1,420 complaints to date this year with 297 criminal arrests and 1,457 traffic arrests. Of the traffic arrests, 47 were for driving under the influence of alcohol, higher than the whole year last year.

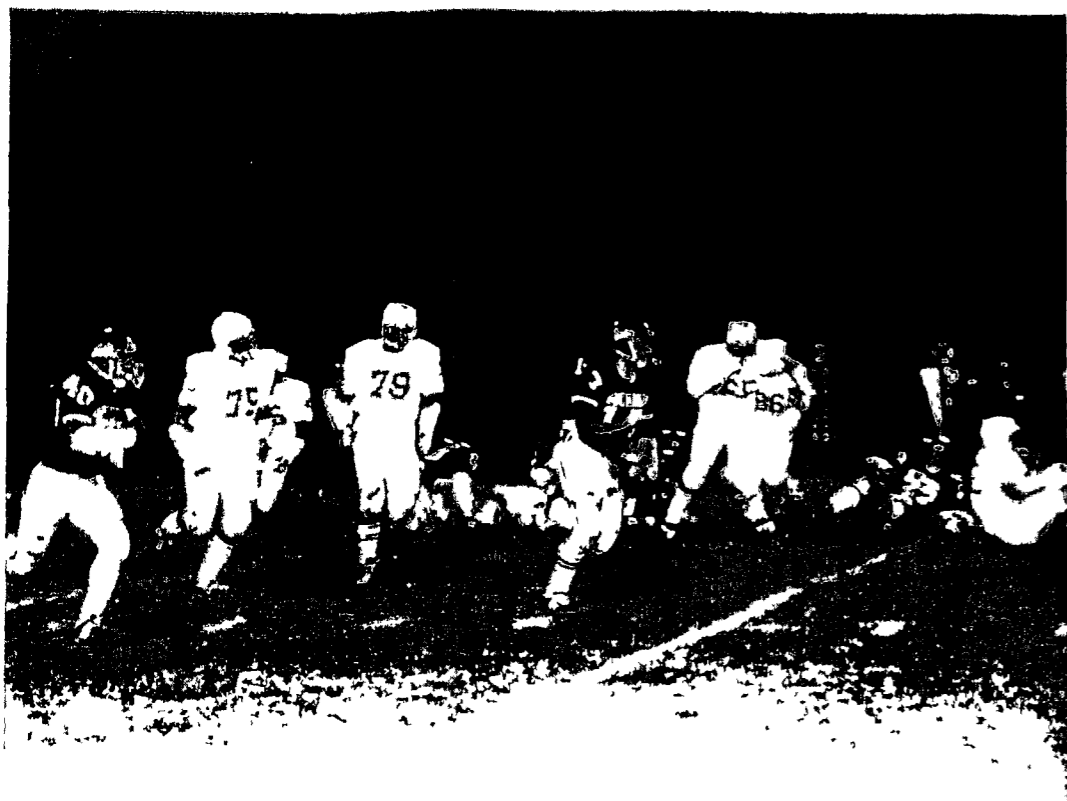

Bucks Lose To Cass

Cassopolis 6, Lakeshore 0
Lakeshore 41, Buchanan 3
Those were the scores that made Cass the overwhelmingly favorite in Friday night's homecoming football game. Cassopolis 22, Buchanan 20. That was how close the Bucks came to a major upset of the once beaten Rangers.

For the third consecutive year a Buchanan lead was erased in the final minute of action by a Cassopolis score. Two years ago it took the only field goal Preston Bennet ever kicked to drop the Bucks 23-22. Last year it was a last-minute touchdown pass by the Rangers to edge Buchanan 14-10. This year, Dennis Lawson teamed up with George Hawthorne with just 24 seconds remaining, for a 9 yard touchdown pass that gave Cass their 22-20 win.

The Bucks didn't give up then, even though they were faced with the nearly impossible feat of scoring in just 24 seconds. The Cass kickoff went to Kent Cooper, who returned it to the 35 yard line with just 19 to go. On the next play a 30 yard pass from Bryan Virgil to Kevin Vanderbush, put the ball on the Cass 35 yard line with 09 remaining. A Buck timeout stopped the clock. Coach Shoemaker called a running play, hoping to gain about five yards while moving the ball to the center of the field. Bryan Virgil was then to be called upon to attempt a game winning field goal. It wasn't to be though. Robert Luke's fumble was recovered by Cass, ending the Buck hopes.

The blocking of the offensive line, the running of Willie Brown, and the kicking of Bryan Virgil allowed the Bucks to control the first 24 minutes and take a 20-7 lead into the locker room at halftime. Brown, who gained 178 yards on the ground during the first half, scored both of the Bucks' touchdowns on break-away runs of 65 and 82 yards. Virgil booted first half field goals of 34 and 37 yards, and added the extra points to both of Willie's touchdowns, an impressive soccer-style kicks.

Cassopolis' defense re-grouped at halftime and held the Bucks scoreless throughout the second half. The Rangers scored their second touchdown of the evening on a pass from Lawson to Kevin Loder late in the third quarter to make the score 20-15, setting the stage for their final touchdown. The first half Cass touchdown had also come on a Lawson to Loder pass.

The Buck defensive standout had to be Larry Granger, who, especially during the first half, came up repeatedly with key tackles. Kevin Vanderbush added his fourth interception of the year, temporarily stopping Cass in the fourth quarter.

The improved Buck offense, which scored more points Friday than it had in all of the previous four games combined, will get its next chance against pre-season Blossomland conference favorite Dowagiac. The Chiefs, 3-2 overall, hold down second place with a 3-1 record in their first year of Blossomland competition.

Friday's loss dropped the Bucks to 0-5 on the season while raising the Cass record to 4-1. The Buck forces were impressive enough in losing for Cassopolis coach Cal Titus to comment that they were the best winless team in the country. The hope here is that another effort like the one last week against Dowagiac this week, will put the Bucks into the win column.

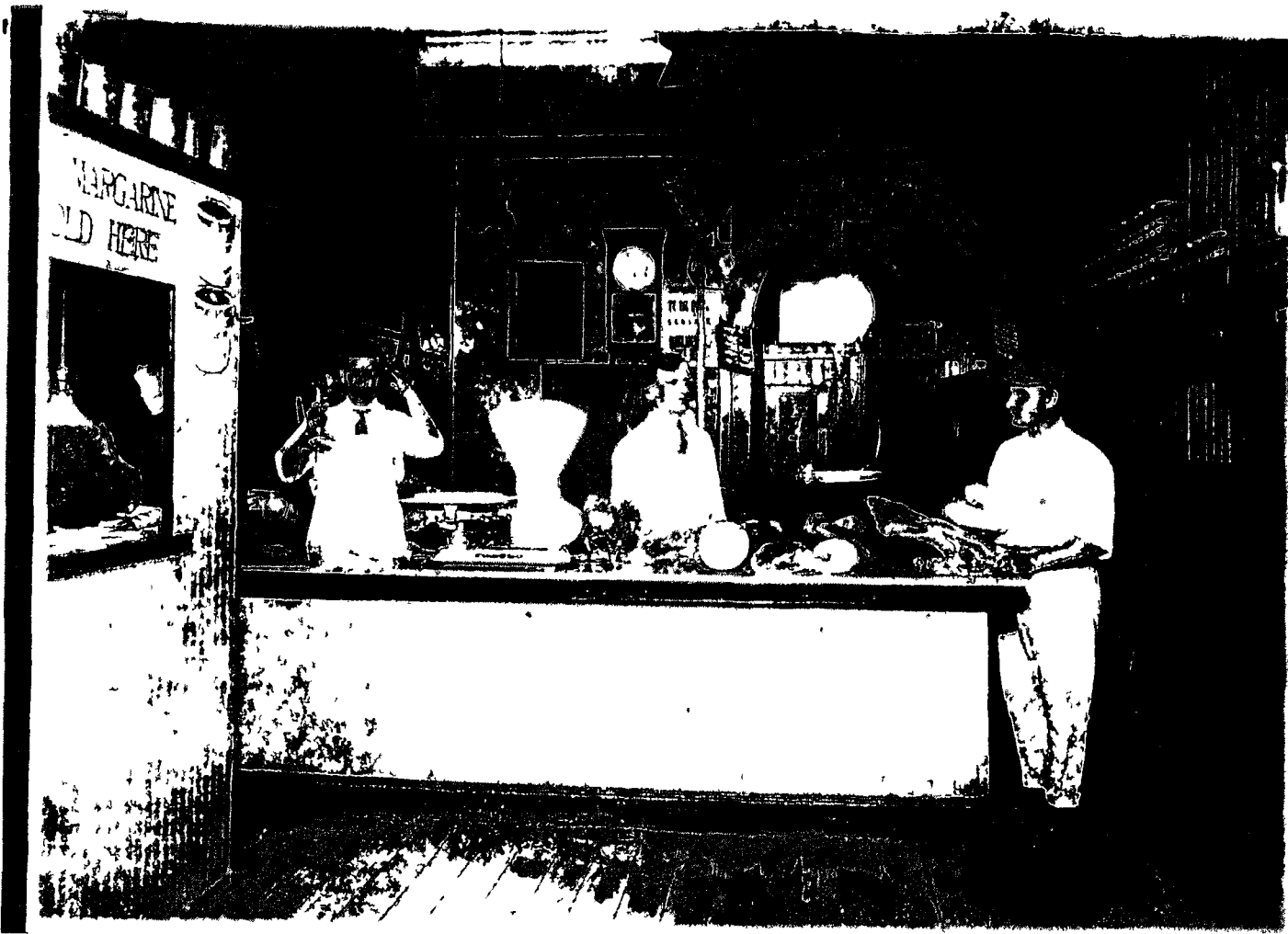

This Program to aid elderly and low-income homeowners is part of a Community Development Program in which the Federal Government has awarded \$116,600 to Buchanan for this assistance to their qualifying citizens
