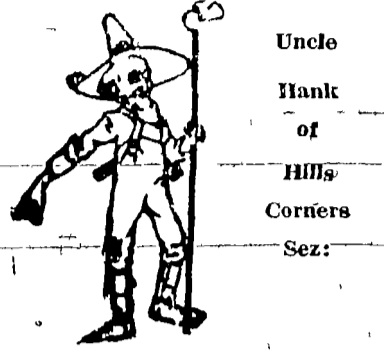


Now Here's the Proposition

Those Parking Meters This writer is among those that believe that if the city commission had dug into this parking meter business a bit deeper...

There is the city of Abercrombie, N. Y., where the population has a Scotch complexion

Then there is the town of Lot's Corner, Conn., where a horrible lapse of morals has followed meter installation

Most significant of all is the experience of Whiskey Gap, Wyoming

After a much sounder study than we had in Buchanan it was found that the greatest benefit accrued to the community when they took the parking meters off the street curb and placed them behind the chairs around the commissioners' table in the city hall

After the first hour, each commissioner was required to put a dollar in his parking meter every fifteen minutes

The result has been that no meeting ever lasts over an hour, with a tremendous saving in tax expenditures

Answering protests of a number of residents in the Terre Coupe and Hillview sections, relative to the maintenance of a poultry plant containing 4,000 chickens, the city commission voted at the special meeting Monday night to instruct Atty. G. H. Batchelor to write a new ordinance governing such situations, to be ready for the Sept 2 meeting

During the war the commission reduced the permissible distance of poultry plants from 300 to 80 feet, in order to permit citizens to raise poultry to offset the meat shortage

Answering a large delegation inquiring details on cost and construction of the proposed sewer extension to Colonial Gardens, the commission voted to advertise for bids, and to submit the project to property owners after definite costs are known

Edrell T. Richey Gets 60 Days For Molesting Women

Police Radio Station Is Now In Operation

Hooked Up With Police Car, State And City Police Departments

Buchanan now has a broadcasting station, Station WKWW, with headquarters at the police station in the city hall, and operating solely for police work

The equipment was sold to the city by the Electro-Voice, Inc. company here at a low price and then was sent to Chicago for required adjustments for local use

It was installed last week by Ed Zick, Buchanan county radio engineer from St. Joseph. He installed antennae on top of the Legion building extending 35 feet above the ground

The station is hooked up with the county-sheriff's department at St. Joseph, with police headquarters at Benton Harbor, Dowagiac, St. Joseph, Niles, and Kalamazoo, also with the district state police station at Paw Paw

Communications are regularly received from these offices. The station is also hooked up with the local police car while sitting in Chief Pugh's office

The writer heard him relay a complaint from the outskirts of town to the police car, also a message from the Kalamazoo police to the Benton Harbor police checking on the record of a suspect

She was a field nurse for the Chicago Visiting Nurse association from June, 1940, to March, 1942, when she joined the clinical staff of the United States Army nurse corps, serving four years, of which two were spent in the Pacific theatre in Australia, New Guinea and the Philippine Islands

Before coming to Berrien county she was head nurse of the department of neurology in the Cook County Hospital, Chicago

There were 140 deaths from cancer in Berrien county last year, and estimated present active cases in the county are between 400 and 500

Miss Wackler has her office in the headquarters of the Berrien County Red Cross in St. Joseph

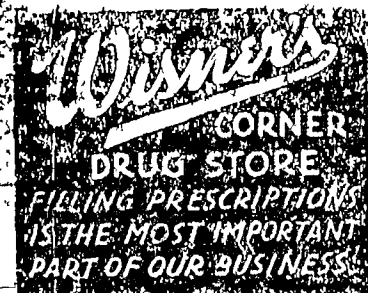

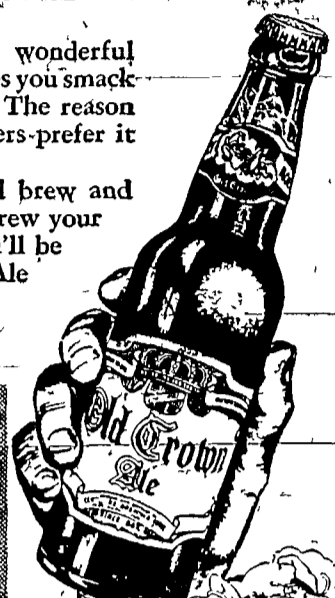

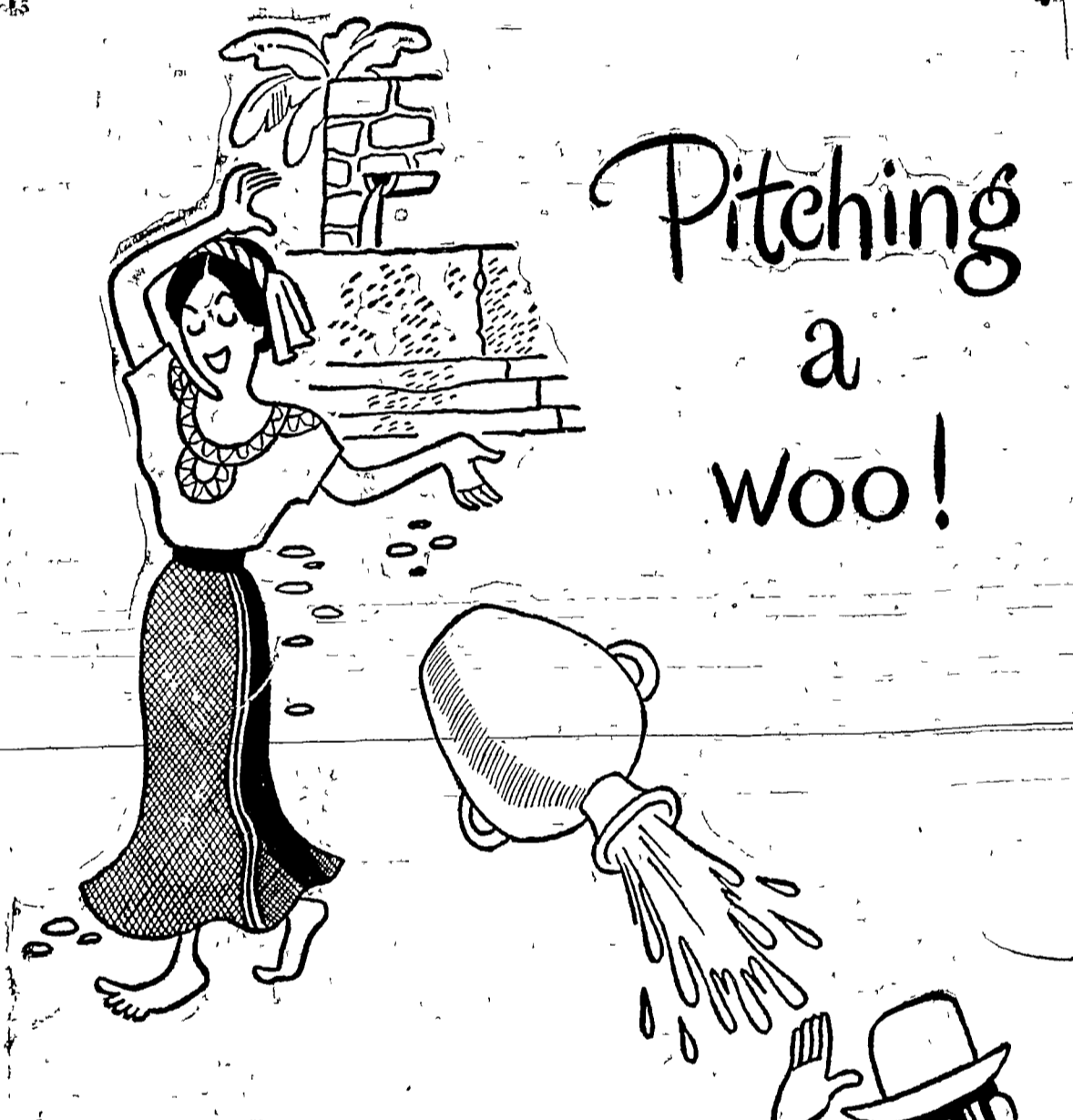

ORDINANCE NO. 86 Relating to traffic in certain congested areas in the City of Buchanan, defining and regulating the parking of vehicles in certain areas of the City of Buchanan providing for the designation of individual parking spaces, and for the use of mechanical parking time indicators in conjunction therewith

WHEREAS, because of the width of the streets in certain sections of the City of Buchanan, the free moving traffic in the downtown business district is impeded, and

WHEREAS, previous attempts to regulate the parking in the aforesaid areas have not been successful as is desirable because of the small number of traffic policemen available therefor and the size of the aforesaid area, and

WHEREAS, because of the habit of numerous operators of motor vehicles by which they take advantage of the above mentioned situation by parking for unreasonable long periods of time in close proximity to other motor vehicles so parked on the most congested parts of the city's busiest streets tend to further impede traffic and, in addition thereto, is unfair to other motorists and constitutes a danger to the life and property of motorists and pedestrians, and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the City Commission that the best way by which the above mentioned conditions may be remedied is by the designation of individual parking spaces in the said area, by providing for the use of mechanical parking time indicators in conjunction therewith, by restricting parking in said area to reasonable intervals of time and by compelling the operators of vehicles who enjoy the use of parking space so designated, pay a portion of the cost of establishing and maintaining the same. Now, therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Buchanan, State of Michigan Section 1 As used in this ordinance, the following words shall be defined as follows: "Vehicle" Any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported upon a public highway, except such as are used exclusively by human power. "Parking" The standing of a vehicle upon a street whether such vehicle is occupied or not and whether such vehicle be accompanied or not by an operator for a period of time in excess of two minutes. "Mechanical Parking Time Indicator" or "Parking Meters" A device or devices which shall indicate the length of time during which a vehicle may be parked in a particular place which shall have as a part thereof a receptacle or chamber for receiving and storing coins of the United States money, a slot or place in which said coin may be deposited, a timing mechanism to indicate the passage of the interval of time during which parking is permitted, and which shall also display an appropriate signal when the aforesaid interval of time shall have elapsed, also brief instructions as to their operation. "Individual Parking Space" A portion of the paved surface of the street of sufficient length and depth from the sidewalk curb to accommodate a vehicle to be parked, as shall be specified and marked off by the Police Department of said City

Section 2 Congested Area For the purpose of this ordinance the "congested traffic area" is hereby declared to be on Front Street from the West line of the Post Office property on both sides of the street to the West line of Portage Street - On North Oak Street from the North line of Front Street, North 150 feet to the South line of alley on both sides of the street. On South Oak Street from the South line of Front Street to the North line of Charles Court Main Street from the South line of Front Street to the South line of Day's Avenue on both sides of the street. Day's Avenue from the South line of Front Street to the North line of Roe Street, on both sides of the street, and the City Commission hereby determines that because of the flow of traffic on the streets or portions of the streets within such area that parking therein shall be subject to the provisions of this ordinance

Section 3 Designation of Individual Parking Spaces The Police Department may, by authorized and directed to designate and mark off such individual parking spaces as he deems proper along the streets in the Congested traffic area for the parking of vehicles At each place where individual parking spaces are so marked off, each vehicle shall be parked entirely within an individual parking space

Section 4 Parking Meters to be Installed by the Police Department It is hereby ordered and directed to place, install, and remove parking meters upon the curb side or in the immediate vicinity of individual parking spaces designated and marked off in the congested area where parking is restricted All such parking meters shall comply with the conditions set forth in the third (3rd) paragraph of Section 1 of this ordinance and said meters shall be under the management, supervision, and control of the City Police Department

Section 5 Regulation of Parking in Individual Parking Spaces Whenever a vehicle shall be parked in an individual parking space, where a parking meter has been installed, the person parking such vehicle shall deposit one cent coins - or a five cent coin of United States money in said parking meter, if such meter displays the signal showing that legal parking is only permitted on such deposit

The City of Buchanan under this ordinance, rule or regulation restricting or prohibiting parking, independent of time limits, shall in no manner be affected by this ordinance or any of the provisions thereof. The purpose of this ordinance is to assist in the regulation of overtime parking by the use of parking meters, and it shall be so construed

Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as prohibiting the City of Buchanan from providing for free parking space for loading and unloading, for taxicabs, and for other matters of similar nature

Section 15 A traffic violation Bureau is hereby established which shall consist of the Police Department staffed by the Chief of Police and collect the fines for overtime parking as provided in Section 11 of this ordinance

Section 16: All sections of this ordinance shall be deemed to be separate and independent and the invalidity of any one or provisions hereof shall not affect the remaining sections

Section 17 All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed

Section 18 That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law

Section 7 It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to cause, allow, permit, or suffer any vehicle registered in the name of, or operated by, such person to be parked overtime or beyond the period of legal parking time established for any parking meter zone as herein described

Section 8 It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to permit a vehicle to remain or be placed in any parking space adjacent to any parking meter while said meter is displaying a signal indicating that the vehicle occupying such parking space has already been parked beyond the period of time prescribed for such parking space

Section 9 It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance for any person to deface, injure, tamper with, open or willfully break, destroy, or impair the usefulness of any parking meter installed under the provisions of this ordinance

Section 10 It shall be unlawful and a violation of the provisions of this ordinance to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter, any slug, device or metallic substance, or any other substitute for a 5c. or 1c coin of the United States

Section 11 It shall be the duty of the police officers of the City of Buchanan, acting in accordance with instructions issued by the City Commission, to report to the

(d) The number of each parking meter which indicates that the vehicle occupying the parking space adjacent to such parking meter is or has been parking in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance

(e) The time during which such vehicle is parking in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance

(f) Any other facts, a knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violation

Such Police officer shall also attach to such vehicle a notice to the owner or operator thereof that such vehicle has been parked in violation of a provision of this ordinance and instructing such owner or operator to report at the City of Buchanan, Michigan, in regard to such violation Each such owner or operator, may, within 24 hours of the time when such notice was attached to such vehicle, pay to the division of Police as a penalty for and in full satisfaction of such violation, the sum of One Dollar The failure of such owner or operator to make such payment within said 24 hours shall render such owner or operator subject to the penalties hereinafter provided for violation of the provisions of this ordinance

Section 12 - Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance and any person who aids, abets, or assists therein, shall upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of any amount not exceeding \$100.00 and costs of prosecution or 90 days in the County Jail or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court

Section 13. The Chief of Police Department shall designate some member or members of the Police Department to collect the coins deposited in parking meters. In collecting such coins, the person or persons so designated, shall remove the sealed coin chamber or compartment from such parking meter and deliver the same with seals unbroken to the City Treasurer of the City of Buchanan, Michigan The Treasurer of said City shall collect the coins so delivered and deposit the same in the credit of said City of Buchanan

Section 14 This ordinance shall be construed as a supplement to the general traffic ordinance and all other ordinances of the City of Buchanan regulating the traffic, parking, and use of streets, which shall be in force and effect in the congested area, except insofar as modified by the provisions hereinafter set forth Any authority heretofore or heretofore exercised by the City of Buchanan under any ordinance, rule or regulation restricting or prohibiting parking, independent of time limits, shall in no manner be affected by this ordinance or any of the provisions thereof. The purpose of this ordinance is to assist in the regulation of overtime parking by the use of parking meters, and it shall be so construed

Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as prohibiting the City of Buchanan from providing for free parking space for loading and unloading, for taxicabs, and for other matters of similar nature
