### Record Peach Crop, Bonanza For Growers, Pickers, Draws to End

#### 1945's Record Peach Harvest Draws To Close

Pickers Make High Wages At 15-, 17-, 20-Cents Bushel

The 1945 peach harvest will be practically over in Berrien county and in Michigan by the end of this week, with both grower and labor receiving record returns. Picking peaches is reported to have been a big money proposition on some local orchards. On one young orchard where low trees bore a heavy crop, pickers are reported to have received as much as \$24 or more daily. Picking for the most part from the ground, fast operators gathered as many as 120 bushels between 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. daily, receiving 15, 17 and 20 cents according to the care needed. The average day's take was lower, but many workers picked from 80 to 110 bushels daily, making from \$12 to \$20 in eight hours. The state crop is variously reported as being a "record breaker" and again as being "second only to the record crop of 1941." Whichever it was it was a bumper one of 3,690,000 bushels, 90,000 bushels above last year's production and sixty per cent above the 2,305,000 bushel production of the past ten years.

The Benton Harbor market reports that it expects a total of 1,500,000 bushels of peaches by the end of this week. State authorities say that Berrien County normally produces 75% of the peach crop of the state. Not all of it goes to the Benton Harbor market, as scores of interstate truckers go direct to the orchards and buy loads or entire crops. Workers Follow Fruit A large part of the pickers here were secured through the Benton Harbor labor office, consisting of migrant labor following fruit and truck harvests over the country. One team, a father and his sixteen-year-old son, said that they had come here from the northern Michigan harvest, and would go to the southern cotton harvest and from there to the Texas and Arizona truck fields and grapefruit orchards. A number of local colored men also picked. One local negro who was working regularly on a night shift picked his 100-bushels daily from 8 to 5 p. m.

#### File Complaint Vs. Employment Of L. R. Bradley

City Officials Charge Misrepresentation In Charges Of Plaintiff

Elective members of the city administration of Buchanan received an introduction to a suit for injunction Saturday, in the form of writs served on them individually by Deputy Sheriff John Sticks, summoning them to appear in the circuit court Oct. 8 to show cause why L. R. Bradley should not be restrained from further employment in the sewage disposal plant during such time as his brother, C. J. Bradley, holds city office. The bill of complaint, filed by Ralph D. Skinner, with Casper R. Grahwohl as attorney, cites Section 18, Chapter 6 of the city charter, as follows: "Relatives by blood or marriage of any commissioner within the second degree of consanguinity or affinity are hereby disqualified from holding any appointive office or any employment during the term for which said commissioner was elected." It further states: "That Ralph R. Bradley, brother of defendant C. J. Bradley, is employed by the city of Buchanan in the capacity of superintendent of said city's sewage disposal plant and receives as salary from said city in excess of the sum of \$300 per month, that said Ralph R. Bradley is a blood brother of defendant C. J. Bradley, and the employment of said Ralph R. Bradley is illegal and an unlawful violation of the terms and provisions of said charter." It is requested that the plaintiff or his representative, to the name "Ralph R. Bradley," from the telephone directory, in which a Chicago attorney of that name is listed as living on Terre Coupe Road. He resided at Twelve Pines. Mayor C. J. Bradley stated that the employment of his brother had been discussed a number of times by successive administrations of the city commission. He stated that L. R. Bradley is not and never has been "superintendent" of the sewage disposal plant, that office having been held first by George Deming, and more recently by Archibald Moley, as chairman of the sewer and waterworks committee. He stated that while L. R. Bradley had accepted the job when the former operator, Robert (Spot) Dempsey entered army service, because of the fact that no other operator could be secured who was above draft age. He stated that alternatives had been suggested, including again by-passing the sewage into the open creek, but that the state Board of Health had objected. He stated that a number of eligible operators above draft age had been approached but that they refused to accept because of the rate of pay. While the operator does not work full time and is required only to operate the plant satisfactorily without regard to hours, there is nevertheless one requirement as to time. He must report immediately at the plant any time during the day or night when there is an electrical storm in progress during which a bolt might stop the operation of the disposal machinery. This ruling applies 365 days and nights a year. Mayor Bradley stated except during an annual vacation of one week. L. R. Bradley stated that he was not hired at the special intercession of his brother, that he had always worked merely as an "operator" and not as superintendent, that he replaced Robert Dempsey during the time he was in service and that Dempsey is now on his way home from the Asiatic theatre of operations. At a meeting of the city commission Tuesday evening the members voted to instruct the city attorney to handle the case for them. L. R. #### PROCLAMATION

Whereas, we have been proud to greet many of our young men and women returned from distant military campaigns, Whereas, we want our community to appear as far to those now happily returned at it seemed when they were far away, Whereas, our churches and homes have a heavy responsibility in creating and maintaining that religious devotion without which our city will surely fail to achieve its own highest ideals, Whereas, religious faith will prove such a permanent foundation only as it is passed on from one person to another by patient and conscientious teaching in families, schools, and churches; Whereas, many persons in our community have been fulfilling in a quiet manner in unnoticed groups, this great responsibility of teaching resting upon us all, Now, therefore, I, Chas. J. Bradley, Mayor of the City of Buchanan, Mich., hereby proclaim the period beginning Sunday, Sept. 30, and continuing through Sunday, Oct. 7, 1945, as the Fifteenth Annual Religious Education Week. During these days I hope we may give deserved honor to those who are engaged in the religious education of our people, young and old alike. I trust our churches, schools, homes and civic groups will discuss plans by which we may strengthen the forces of religion in our midst. Supervisor Maude Slate Tells Of Changes In Schedule

The Youth Council recreation room opened Monday, Sept. 17, for the fall and winter season, under the supervision of Miss Maude Slate. A good attendance was out the first night. Miss Slate stated that this year she would permit children and young people without regard to age limits to use the room from 3:30 p. m. until 5:30 p. m. This permits high school young people from the country to come in for a short time after school, whereas they were unable to use the place at all previously when it was reserved for grade school children only in the afternoon. The place will be open from 3:30 to 5:30 p. m. school days for all ages of youth, from 7 to 10 p. m. the first four nights of the week for youth of the 8th grade and above, from 7 to 10 p. m. Friday and Saturday nights for youth of 7th grade and above, on Saturday afternoon from 1:30 to 5:30 p. m. for young people of all ages. He is survived by the parents, by three brothers, William in the Marines, and James and Jack at home, by two sisters, Eva and Helen, both on the west coast.

#### Frank J. Burger Appointed Pastor Of St. Anthony's

Rev. Father Frank J. Burger has been appointed pastor of St. Anthony's Roman Catholic Church by Bishop Joseph H. Albers, D.D., of the Lansing diocese to succeed Rev. Father W. A. Cogley, who has been transferred to Decatur, Mich. Father Burger comes here from Battle Creek where he served three years as chaplain at Lelee Hospital conducted by the Sisters of Mercy. While there he also served as Catholic chaplain for Veterans' Facilities 100 at Fort Custer, and chaplain at the American Legion hospital and the National Catholic Community Service of West Michigan U. S. O. He was the first auxiliary army chaplain serving at Fort Custer during World War II. He studied for the priesthood at St. Mary's Seminary, at Norwood, Ohio, and was ordained in Lansing in May, 1938. His first appointment was as assistant pastor of St. Mary's church at Niles. He left Niles in February, 1941, to serve as assistant pastor at St. Philips church, Battle Creek until October, 1942.

Sgt. Eleanor Couchman was released from service with the Women's Auxiliary Corps (WAC's) at Fort Sheridan last week after two and one-half years in service. She went from San Francisco to Fort Sheridan, Ill., where she was discharged. She arrived Friday evening at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Aden Couchman, Niles, Route 4. Her brother, Randall Couchman, is a member of the crew of the battleship Pennsylvania, which was hit by a torpedo from a suicide Japanese plane off Japan on Aug. 12, two days before the close of the war.

#### Robert Swartz Is Reported Killed

Died Sept. 10 On Arthur Is. In Pacific, Says War Department Wire

A telegram was received Monday by Mr. and Mrs. James Swartz, Sr., 705 South Portage, informing of the death of their son Robert, on Arthur Island in the Pacific on Sept. 10 from wounds received in action. Robert Swartz, S. 2/C, enlisted for Seabee service in January, 1945, at the age of seventeen and received basic training at Sampson, N. Y. His parents had received a letter from him on Aug. 25, stating that he was all right at that time. They had received no later information that he was wounded and his delayed death from wounds nearly four weeks after the war had ended is not understood.

#### Cold Wet Weather Increases The Frost Peril For Crops

Mercury readings touching frost and only one day of warm weather during the past week are weather conditions that are none too good for a tardy corn crop. Perhaps ten per cent of the corn is now beyond frost damage, according to Robert Koenigsdorf. It will not only take two weeks to bring the rest through—it will take some warm dry weather during that time. Farmers are starting to thresh clover seed, with indications that the crop will not be over average, perhaps below. The cool and wet summer has been fine for hay growth but not favorable for seed production.

#### Reith-Riley Co. Gets Contract On Street Work Here

Yerrington, First Contractor, Tied Up By Large Contracts

Contract was let to the Reith-Riley Construction company, South Bend, for completion of the repair and surfacing of Buchanan streets at a special meeting of the city commission Thursday evening. The work consists almost entirely of repairs, much of it where the streets had been torn up for water main installation. Only one block on Fourth Street from Portage to Short is new paving. There the paving was held up to await installation of a water main. There will be patching on Fourth from Short to Main and on Oak from Dewey to Third. More or less extensive surfacing and repairs will be made on the following streets: Clark from Roe to Front, Roe from Oak to Clark, Portage north of River street, South Cayuga, Chicago to Roe, Fourth from Main street west, Lake street north of Third, from 110 Lake north to Third, Moccasin avenue from Fourth to Front; Detroit from Front street south, Maple street from center of block to south end. The Reith-Riley representative promised that his firm would start Tuesday of this week if weather permitted. The work had been contracted last year by John Yerrington of Benton Harbor, but his firm has been tied up since by large contracts on US-112 and other large highways.

#### Church Of Nazarene Starts Building At 4th And Moccasin

Excavations have been completed by the Bennett Excavation company of Eau Claire for the basement of the building to be constructed for the Church of the Nazarene congregation at the corner of Fourth and Moccasin opposite Kathryn Park. The building will be started in about two weeks. It will have block walls and an asphalt roof. The dimensions of the main auditorium will be 52x32 feet, with the longest dimension east and west. It will front on Moccasin with a fourth structure about fourteen feet square will form the entrance at the southeast corner of the building. There will be a choir loft on the rear or west end 8x17 feet in dimension. It will have a modern and unique fluorescent light installation. The lot was bought from Edward Gast, owner and operator of the Baroda Hardware. The congregation will continue their meetings in the Coleman building at 205 East Dewey until their own church is ready. They hope they can occupy by Jan. 1, 1946.

In instance, if you wished to try out for radio, as a singer, announcer or in any other capacity, it would not be necessary to go to the broadcasting studio. You could have a recording made on a 16-inch transcription disk and send it instead. 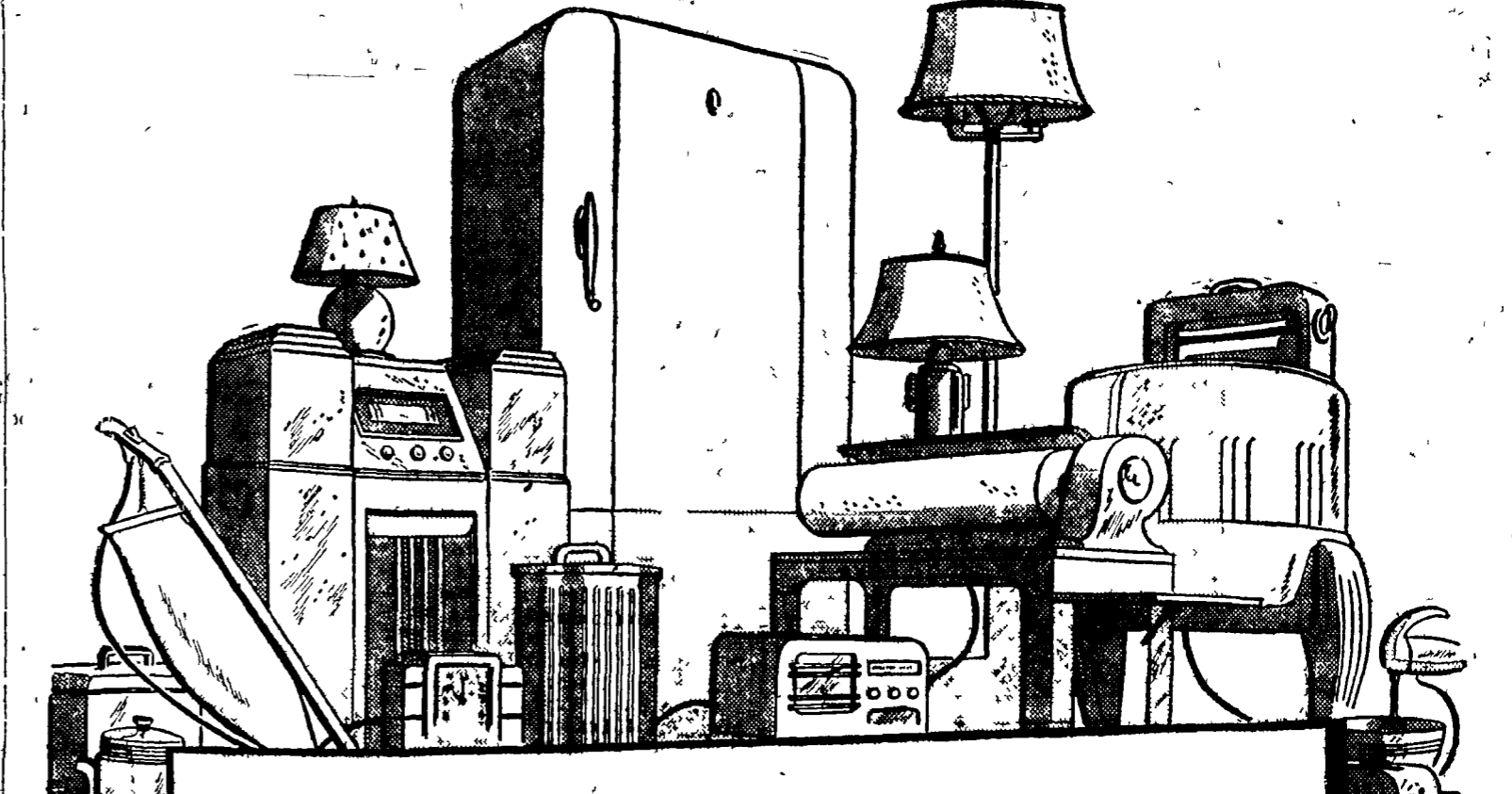
