

## Tuesday Deluge Causes Chaos; 4.8 Inches Marked

Road washouts, factory shut-downs, a high volume of injury auto accidents, flooded basements and at least one death were attributed to the storm which dumped five inches of water on the Buchanan Niles area Tuesday.

Eleven-year-old Randy Williams, son of Mr and Mrs. Ronald F. Williams, 1114 Weesaw Rd., Niles, drowned Tuesday afternoon as he played along a creek near Chicago Road and Sassafras Lane on Niles' south-west side.

According to Niles police, Randy lost his footing near the swollen creek, fell in and was washed through a culvert under the roadway. Firemen recovered the body more than half a mile away, near the end of Topinabee road, where the creek empties into the St. Joseph river.

The creek current was reported so swift that searchers were required to tie ropes to themselves, held by helpers at shore. Berrien County Medical Examiner John R. Bruni pronounced the Williams youth dead on arrival at Niles' Pawating hospital. Funeral services are pending at the Pifer Funeral Home in Niles.

**Buchanan Steel Hit**  
Buchanan Steel Products was hard hit Tuesday, as water from McCoy's creek raced through the company's plant and offices on W. Smith Street. A company spokesman said workers were

sent home, work in the offices was disrupted and first shift workers Wednesday were told not to report to work to allow for clean-up of debris, following the flash flood.

The spokesman said company officials were spending Wednesday going through the various departments to accurately determine the extent of damage.

**Roads Give Way**  
Southeast Berrien County was hardest hit with road washouts, reported Heath Calvin, manager of the Berrien County Road Commission.

He said the area from Eau Claire, south to the Niles-Buchanan region was the scene of numerous washouts and several reports of flooding were received in his office.

Five major roadside slides were reported on Red Bud trail north of Buchanan and some roads in Bertrand township were impassable. Calvin reported trying to drive east on Bertrand road, near the South Bend road. "The water was at least two feet deep and I just couldn't go on," he said. He also said suburban housing areas south and east of Niles were hard hit with flooding.

**Water Settles**  
Basements throughout the city of Buchanan were flooded. Among the hardest hit was the Koeninghof Locker on E. Alexander. Confusion reigned as clean-up got underway near

midnight Tuesday. Fire Chief Neal Burks who paid an informal visit to the firm, said water was more than two feet deep in the firm's basement.

City Manager Daryl Tammen said the city received "about a dozen" calls about water in the streets and flooding of basements and property. He said the low volume was "probably because people knew we couldn't do much to help them."

**Accidents Up**  
State police at the Niles and New Buffalo posts and the Sheriff's office in St. Joseph said the accident volume for the day was higher than normal with the state officers reporting an increase in property damage accidents. The Sheriff's dispatcher told the Record that the additional calls Tuesday were "generally reported as personal injury accidents." None of the accidents, however, took place in the Buchanan area.

Buchanan disposal workers said more than 134 million gallons of waste went through the plant Tuesday. This is well above the average waste volume of 85 to 92 million gallons.

McCoy's creek and the Mill Race, which normally flow at a depth of about 12 1/4 inches were swollen by the sustained rainfall to more than 20 inches in both instances. Waters began to subside slowly Wednesday and a running depth of about 15-16 inches was observed early Wednesday morning.

## BUSINESSMAN BLOWS WHISTLE

# 5 County Men Nabbed; Bad Checks Hit City

Alertness on the part of a Buchanan businessman and sleeves-rolled up investigative work on the part of Buchanan police resulted in the arrest Monday and arraignment Tuesday of five men suspected of passing two bogus money orders totaling \$300.

It was their attempt to pass a third check for \$150 that caused Phil J. Sexton to contact city police Monday.

Arrested Monday and arraigned before Maurice A. Weber, St. Joseph municipal judge, Tuesday, were

### Demand Exam

In their appearance before Judge Weber, the five were charged with uttering and publishing (passing a bogus check) in the amount of \$150. All the suspects demanded examination on the charge which was set for Friday, July 5. Bond was set at \$5,000 per person and was not furnished. All five men were placed in the custody of Sheriff's deputies and remanded to the county jail.

On Wednesday, Hitchcock posted bond before Judge Weber and was released pending his

appearance at the pre-trial examination.

### "Didn't Look Right"

Police were put on the quintet after two members walked into Sexton's TV and Appliance store shortly after noon, and asked to buy a fan. Salesman Terry L. Loughmough showed them a floor sample which they turned down in favor of a model setting in the window. The cost of the fan, \$29.95.

In payment, he said, they proffered a money order for \$150 drawn on the Cosmo Currency Exchange of Chicago, Ill. According to Loughmough the money order was already made out and signed when it was given

in payment. He turned it over to Sexton who asked for identification.

Unable to provide it, the pair were asked to go to the Inter-City bank to make sure of the validity of the check.

While enroute to the bank, the pair walked to their car, parked on Main street, near the Coast to Coast Hardware. Sexton followed.

When he arrived at the car, Sexton was told by the pair they had decided not to buy the fan. At this point, Sexton returned to his store and the Buchanan police were called.

The pair were reported to have previously tried the same ruse at the Coast to Coast Hardware and Gambles. In each instance trying to purchase a fan, and in each instance being turned down.

Said Sexton, "It was one of those situations when you instinctively know something is not right." He received praise from Police Chief David Shilbinski for his alertness and his quick call to the local department.

**Stopped On Portage**  
Shilbinski and Department Investigator Dan Moore stopped the car and its five occupants on North Portage Street near Third and after checking its registration with the Secretary of State's office in Lansing, brought all five men to the city jail.

They were held on an open charge, pending investigation by the officers.

After a hurried conference with the County Prosecutor John Hammond in his office in St. Joseph, Shilbinski and Moore obtained a warrant from the court of Justice of the Peace Harold Jackson, allowing them to search the automobile for additional bogus money orders or possible false identification used in passing the checks.

For three hours, the two officers, in shirt-sleeves, carried out a minute search of the car in the city garage and found evidence, they said, linking the group of men with a money order which had been passed earlier in the day at Inter-City bank.

With this evidence, and after another lengthy conference with the prosecutor, charges were filed and the arraignment in the north end of the county took place.

### Possible Riot Booty

The money orders in the possession of the men and the two orders passed through the Inter-City bank Monday and on Wednesday of last week, are believed to be part of a bundle of 40,000 similar money orders stolen from the Cosmo firm in Chicago during recent civil disorders.

The money order passed last week through Inter-City bank was returned this week marked "stolen blank," police said.

Shilbinski noted that the bogus money orders dropped in the city were made out for \$150. "At that rate, if all 40,000 were

## City Defers Action On Exclusive Ambulance Right

At their regular Monday meeting, members of the City Commission voted to defer action on a request by owners of the Tri-County Ambulance service for a license which would, in effect, grant exclusive running rights to the Niles based company.

The firm had sought a license in the city of Niles recently and action there, too, was deferred by the city's Council.

Glen Carlson, Main Street, a co-owner of the ambulance company, told Commission members that establishment of a second ambulance firm in Niles had forced them to seek such a license. The Gold Crown Ambulance service was formed two months ago.

Present at the evening session were Mayor Kenneth Witt, Commissioners Joseph Bachman, Maurice A. Nelson, Trent Hall and Herbert Henderson. Also attending were City Manager Daryl Tammen, Vera Cline, acting city clerk and B. R. Desenberg, city attorney.

The Commission also deferred action on a petition from residents of Chippewa Street who requested the intersection of Chippewa and Third streets be made a four-way stop. Deferral action was taken pending a report from the city's traffic

consultant, Adrian Koert, on the feasibility of such a move in that area of the city.

At the close of the meeting, Mayor Kenneth Witt presented a resolution commending Tammen for his work as city manager for the last five years. Tammen will leave July 1 to accept a similar position in Grand Haven.

The resolution pointed out that during Tammen's tenure as city manager, "the city government has expanded and improved public facilities and has continued and extended its services to the end that the citizens of Buchanan may more fully benefit from and enjoy their residence in this city."

The resolution also commended Tammen for "performing the duty of city manager with exceptional diligence, ability, distinction and good spirits." A certified copy of the resolution, adopted unanimously by the Commission, was given Tammen following the meeting.

In other action, the Commission: —Issued a 90-day order to demolish property at 706 South Oak St., owned by Theodore Czap. In the 90-days prior to the demolition date, the owner will have the opportunity to de-

## 4 Hurt In M-60 Crash; Driver Still "Poor"

Four persons were injured, one critically, shortly before noon, Sunday, in a head-on collision on M-60 near Bakertown road.

Trooper Jerry Plotrowski of the Niles post of the Michigan State Police, said a foreign compact car, driven by Richard Allen Hoffman, 22, of 211 E. Marion St., Mishawaka, was struck head-on by an auto driven by 75-year-old Grant Salyers, 121 S. Erie St., Three Rivers, when Salyers apparently pulled out of his lane of traffic to pass another auto.

Hoffman was taken to St. Joseph hospital, South Bend, suffering from fractures of both legs, a crushed chest, collapsed lung, a possible broken back and miscellaneous lacerations. Following several hours of surgery, he was placed in the hospital's intensive care unit where his condition Wednesday morning was described as "poor" by a spokesman.

A passenger in the Hoffman auto, Michael Papai, 23, of 2115 N. Elmer, South Bend, was taken to Buchanan Community hospital with a broken left leg and shoulder and facial injuries. His condition, Wednesday, was described as "fairly good."

Salyers and his wife, Callie, 74, were taken to Pawating hospital in Niles with facial lacerations and internal injuries. Both

were said to be in "fairly good" condition Wednesday by hospital officials.

Plotrowski said his investigation of the accident has been hampered by the extent of injuries to the involved parties. A summons was issued, however, to Salyers for improper passing.

State police are continuing the investigation of the crash.





**Kelley Opinion Okays Sunday Registration**

With the recent passing of the state law providing for continuous registration of voters, Attorney Frank Kelley ruled recently that qualified persons can be registered for voting on Sundays, if they can find a city or township clerk who will voluntarily open the office.

The opinion was written in answer to a query from Rep. James Del Rio (D-Detroit). Del Rio had planned a massive voter registration drive in Detroit for Sunday, June 23. Reports from the auto capital show that between 75-125 persons showed up for the march which took place in front of the city-county building.

Gallen, Bertrand and Buchanan township clerks announced today the hours their offices or residences would be open for registrations. Clayton Spaulding, Buchanan township clerk and Trella Rough, clerk for Bertrand township, indicated in their announcements they would be available at any time, by appointment.

Record readers should review registration notices in this week's edition for time and places of registration for their respective townships.

Kelley held, however, that voter registration on Sunday is not a right and that legislative intent appears to have made Sunday registration a discretionary matter with clerks.

Said Kelley, "I am of the opinion that there is no legal means by which a person otherwise qualified to vote can compel a city or township clerk to accept his registration on a Sunday."

To qualify as a voter, a person must be 21, a US citizen, a resident of Michigan for six months, the precinct for 30 days and must be registered.

passed for the same amount, the public would be billed out of more than six million dollars," the chief said.

Abraham Rovner, manager of the exchange in Chicago, told the Record that looters in the April 5th riots broke into the exchange, ransacked the building, stole the checks and attempted to set fire to the establishment. The currency house was one of 18 which were singled out in the civil disorder.

As a result of the massive theft, Rovner said the firm has changed its name to the Sixteenth and Central Park Currency Exchange and changed the size of its paper. The firm sells the money orders only in their own office and has a volume of about 1500 per week.

Rovner explained the large number of stolen checks were part of a new shipment of printed money orders received just days before the early April rioting.

Berrien County Prosecutor John T. Hammond expressed his praise for the city's merchants and its police department Wednesday morning in a phone call to the Record. "In all the cases of these bogus money orders, the only arrests were made in Buchanan," he said, "I have only praise for the alertness of your merchants and the work of your police department in this matter."

# Chief Outlines Changes In Motorcycle Statutes

While Michigan's amended motorcycle helmet law does not require the wearing of helmets by riders, it does require that helmets be a part of the motorcycle equipment and that helmets meet standards previously set. David Shibinski, Buchanan police chief, has emphasized to clear up any misunderstanding among area cycle enthusiasts, Shibinski said.

"Under the new law which has been given immediate effect, each motorcycle must be equipped with a number of crash helmets equal to the number of occupants on the vehicle. While the wearing of these helmets is now left to the discretion of the riders, we intend to enforce the law requiring them as equipment."

Shibinski further pointed out that the amendatory statute does not change the previous requirements on helmet specifications.

"Even though we now have an amended law to deal with, it does not mean that we plan to allow just any sort of headgear. The Nazi-type, World War II helmet and other such novelties won't do. Only approved helmets, meeting Michigan State Police specifications will be legal," Shibinski emphasized.

**Must Leave Cycle, Shibinski**

He pointed out that cyclists stopped by Buchanan officers for failure to have helmets as a part of bike equipment must leave the cycle at the point where stopped until the required number of helmets are made a part of the cycle equipment.

"If necessary," he said, "the motorcycle will be taken to the city hall area where the driver and rider can pick it up when they have the necessary equipment required by the new law."

A recent decision by the Michigan Court of Appeals ruled that the law requiring mandatory wearing of crash helmets by cyclists was unconstitutional.

This ruling has been criticized by safety enforcement officials and medical authorities on the basis of records which indicate the leading cause of death in motorcycle accidents is injury to the head.





Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating both old and new address and date he moved, or applying in person for a transfer. If such elector moves to a different precinct within Township, the Clerk is to transfer such registration to proper Precinct.

### TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC 507.
