The annual Junior play will be given this Friday night in the high school auditorium. The play is a three-act comedy by William Davidson entitled "A Little Honey."

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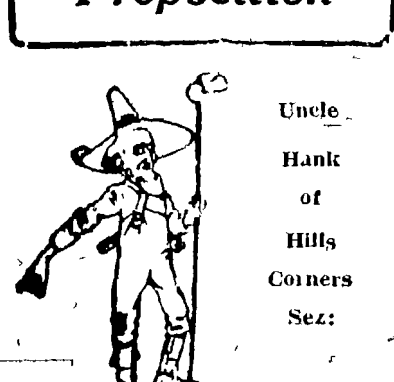

U. Of Michigan Studies Sanitation In Washing Dishes

Not all scientists are engaged in atomic research — some of them are concerned with dishwashing. Located at the University of Michigan, the National Sanitation Foundation is seeking to determine some of the essential factors of sanitary dishwashing, whether it be by machine or by hand, in the home kitchen, or hotels, restaurants and other eating places. The research is concerned with determining the time and temperature necessary to eliminate all public health hazards from eating utensils, the mechanics of washing and rinsing, how effectively a cleansing agent will remove soil from utensils under actual washing conditions and the possibilities of "cold sterilization" of utensils. The non-profit Michigan incorporated foundation hopes results of its studies may help to unify dishwashing codes throughout the country and aid manufacturers in developing more efficient dishwashing machines. The code of the U. S. Public Health Service recommends a rinse period of two minutes at 170 degrees Fahrenheit for hand washing of utensils. The same communities and even states deviate markedly from this requirement. Dr. Henry F. Vaughan, dean of the University's School of Public Health and Foundation president, says, "Ten dishwashing machines are

being tested in the Foundation's investigation of time and temperature dishwashing standards being carried out at Michigan State College under the direction of Dr. W. L. Mallmann. Montana State College is doing research in the best way to rate cleansing agents.

Research on "cold sterilization" of utensils is under the direction of Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., head of the Department of Epidemiology at the University of Michigan. By this method, utensils are cleaned by rinsing in chemically treated water at a temperature lower than 170 degrees.

Another important phase of the many-sided study is an effort to determine the effects of the various cleaning agents on the skin of the dishwasher and on the person who uses the utensils which may contain traces of the agent used.

"The purpose of the Foundation is as broad as the whole field of sanitation," Dr. Vaughan says. "It is an organization supported by gifts, grants and bequests, where public health workers, industry and business combine their efforts to solve common problems. While the problems are extremely varied the solutions have a single objective: the improvement of environmental health in the United States."

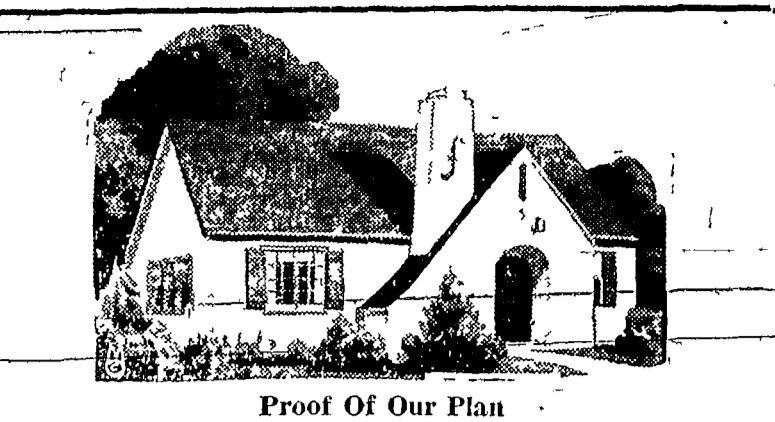

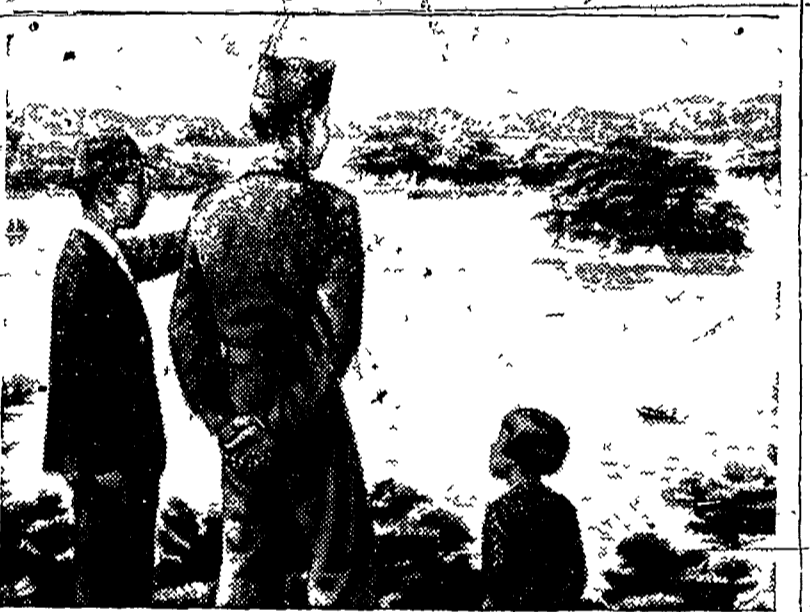
