Ambulance Authority Meets Monday Deadline

The deadline for Buchanan and the other municipalities to arrange for adequate emergency ambulance service was Monday. At 10 a.m. Monday the new ambulance service started. Joe Garbert Jr., representing Buchanan and Dr. K.R. Jones, representing Buchanan township, said that the cooperation among the six municipalities had been tremendous.

Last week the Southwest Community Ambulance Service was formed into an authority. Joe Garbert Jr. was elected chairman, Dr. Jones vice chairman, Anthony Caranci secretary, Tom Kennedy treasurer and Murray Campbell legal council.

Caranci represents Niles, Kennedy represents Howard Township, John McDonald represents Niles Township, and Brayton Yaw represents Bertrand Township. A great deal of help in getting organized and meeting the November 17 deadline was given by Jane Davis, administrator of Pawating Hospital, and by the Niles Chamber of Commerce. Pawating and Unity hospitals are ex-officio members of the authority.

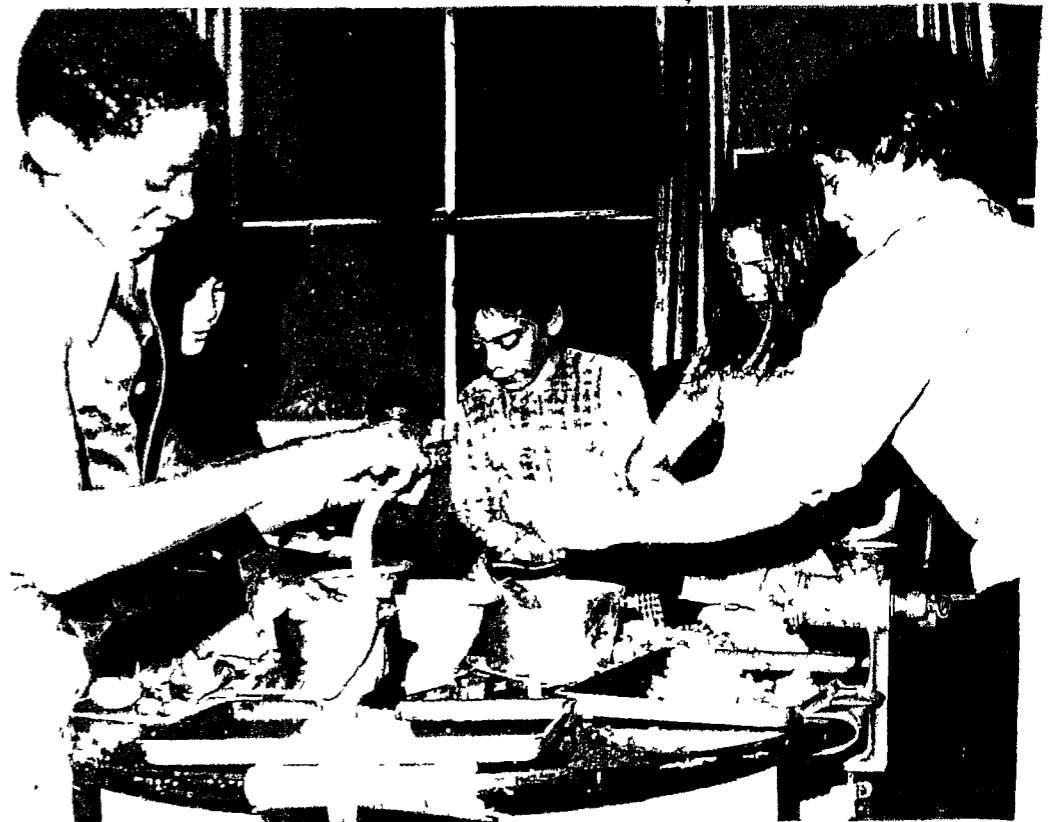
The authority accepted the bid

of Stat Ambulance Service and agreed to guarantee this company \$945 a week less the receipts they collect. They are presently investigating headquarters at the hospital for handling the billing. A phone number has been established for area residents to call for ambulance service. It is 684-6811. The ambulance will be on duty 24 hours a day.

A second back-up ambulance unit is planned and would be manned by volunteer emergency medical technicians. These volunteers will have the opportunity to ride with the present ambulance to gain further training.

Two public hearings for everybody in the area are planned. The first will be in Niles on December 3 and the second in Buchanan on December 10, tentatively scheduled for 7:40 at Buchanan High School. This will enable anyone in the area to ask questions and to get information on the new ambulance service.

Both Garbert and Jones praised everybody involved in the constructive meetings which led up to the formation of the authority.

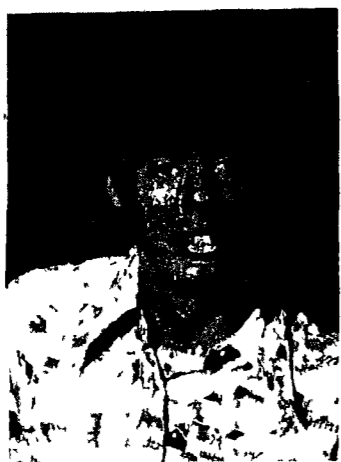

Two From Here Tops In Math Exams

Two Buchanan High School students finished in the top four percent on Part I of the Nineteenth Annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition and are among 1,000 students in Michigan to compete in the final examination on Wednesday, December 3. Tom Trull, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Trull, and Walter Vanderbush, son of Dr. and Mrs. Walter Vanderbush, will represent Buchanan in that competition.

It is sponsored by the Michigan section of the Mathematical Association of America and is designed to foster a wider interest in mathematics, to focus attention on the necessity for mathematical training in most

professions and trades and to identify and provide scholarships for capable math students in Michigan.

The hundred winners of the competition will be honored at the awards program sponsored by Michigan Bell Telephone Company at Western Michigan University on February 21 with forty of the winners receiving a total of approximately \$7,000 in college scholarships. Contributors to the scholarship fund include Burroughs Corporation, Kuhlman Corporation, and the Michigan Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

David Kellam has served as high school supervisor for the students who competed in the examination.

West Wind Community Building Nearing Completion

Construction of the new community clubhouse at West Wind apartments is nearing completion. The facility will be for the exclusive use of West Wind residents.

A three-story building features a large indoor heated swimming pool. On that floor is a sauna, exercise room and locker and shower rooms.

On the second floor is a large social area overlooking the pool. It contains a fireplace and comfortable living room furniture. In one corner is a wet bar and kitchen which overlooks the outdoor tennis courts. In another area there is an arts and crafts room in which both adults and children will be able to work on

their hobbies. The third floor contains a room suitable for banquets or private parties.

A new building of apartment units is also nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy on December 15. Most of the units have already been rented.

Attitude's Important

We don't happen to agree with Dave Shoemaker that there should be more emphasis on football in the lower grades, but we certainly agree with him that part of Buchanan's problems in athletics can be traced to attitude.

When a football team has as few members to draw on as Buchanan did, there has to be a lot of extra drive to aid them in winning games. There has to be desire to win, loyalty to the coach and the team, and the ability to try harder. The team members must get themselves in top physical shape and stay that way.

Part of this loyalty has to be generated by the coach himself. A great deal of it can be encouraged by the student body and by the parents of the team members.

In the past few years, there's been a change in standards. Training rules are not rigidly followed. Young men used to spend all summer getting into shape for fall practice, but they don't seem to bother now.

Cigarettes, liquor and late hours were never tolerated in athletics in years past, but standards have been lowered considerably. Now the new ingredient of marijuana has been added, and it can do no good for anybody.

Students on a high school football team used to share a certain amount of prestige. Their only real reward for their hours of work and the physical punishment they had to take was to be regarded with some kind of respect and honor. Their varsity letter in football meant a great deal. Coaches were able to develop a personal relationship with the young men, and many of them had a lasting influence for good on a boy's development.

One of the practical reasons for staying in good shape and obeying strict training rules is to prevent many injuries. That is the main reason why so many training exercises stress the development of ankles and arms and shoulders as well as legs.

If the new football coach, whoever he may be, is to come up with a winning team, he's going to need lots more support from the team, the student body, the fans and especially the parents. It might be a wise idea if all of us would make determined efforts to get to know him, to understand his problems and to offer him the personal help and support he will need.

Buchanan School District Sells Howe School

On Monday night at their regular meeting, the Buchanan board of education accepted the resignation of Jannette Braakman, who has been teaching the string instruments to the students here. This brought several parents and students who urged that a replacement be found and the instruction be continued. It was explained that an adequate replacement may be hard to find, and there are budget problems in the whole school system.

Dan Cronin, president of the Buchanan Jaycees said that his organization wanted to make as its project the renovation of the public address system at Memorial Field. He said the Jaycees will work with school personnel and people from Electro-Voice to determine what is needed.

Cronin also inquired about the reason why some 40 acres of the school farm, which was not used by the FFA, couldn't be leased on a bid basis to interested farmers. He was told that it was just an oversight, and that this could be arranged.

The winning bidder for the Howe School property was Carl Koengshof. He got it for \$25,655.

There were four bidders.

A request of Tony Robards for a waiver of attendance requirements for graduation was given to the superintendent for study. The board certified the graduation of Lawrence Frampton.

A report from the community education advisory board indicated that there wasn't much interest in establishing an activities bus. Out of 1850 questionnaires sent out on the subject, only 9 replies were received, and they were mostly negative.

Some \$6,000 had been budgeted for the purchase of a new truck to be used for trash hauling and snow removal. A lengthy discussion resulted in a request for more information about whether it would be more economical to purchase or lease a truck or to get a new motor for the old truck already in use.

Principal Richard Proud gave a report on the middle school. He said that there are now 575 students and 36 teachers, some of whom are shared with other schools. He praised the work of Dennis Iler who is director of student activities along with teaching two science classes. Proud said that Iler is hard working, fair, efficient and firm.

Some of the planned programs for the middle school have had to be cut back for budget reasons, but Proud outlined all the various activities going on.

A leave of absence was granted to Mrs. Carol Seif.

Santa Coming November 29

Santa Claus will arrive in Buchanan on Saturday, November 29 to officially open the Christmas season. He will come by helicopter and land in the Inter-City Bank lot at 2 p.m. His headquarters will be announced next week.

Jim Hocker will be on hand to take pictures of children with Santa on Friday evenings and Saturday mornings. There will be a minimum charge for this service.

Starting December 1, the Buchanan police will maintain continuous foot patrol in the business district. On December 12 the stores will begin Christmas store hours and most of them will be open Sunday afternoon on December 14 and 21.

On Tuesday, December 2 there will be a Christmas party for small businesses at the Moose Hall.

Earlier Deadline

Bucks Look Forward To Successful Season

"We have to mold a new team," stated Varsity Basketball Coach, Bill Wilson, "as we go into the season". Wilson, coming off a 19 and 6 record, conference and district championships, for last year, is hard at work with his young men as they prepare for the 75-76 season. "We have to forget about the past. It's not important now," said Wilson.

With seven returning lettermen and five of last year's j.v.s. moved up on the varsity squad, the team looks promising. "The attitude is good, with a positive approach to the game," commented Wilson, adding "and we are trying to improve and work on the weak spots." Practice as a team started November 3 with the fall sportsmen joining after the completion of their activities.

The major factors being stressed in this year's practice schedule are fundamentals. Both Wilson and j.v. coach Pat Sexton feel that strong fundamentals playing game. The coaches are stressing details such as positioning against the dribble, foot movement, stance, eye positioning, hand positioning, dribbling, and beating the offensive man to his position. "If we stress the little things, the big things improve," said Wilson. "We don't

want to get ahead of ourselves, just build on the foundation or the little things."

The Buck's head coach says there will be no change in the offense or defense of the team. Some things will be different because two of last year's starters have graduated, and the people who will replace them naturally will play differently. "When one season ends, you must go back to the beginning and hit all points, major and minor, to have a well coordinated team that plays both offense and defense with a good bench to back them," stated Wilson.

Looking forward to the first game and over-all season, the Buck coach commented, "A successful season is if the players can play to their maximum. Our first goal is 1-0, but one game doesn't make a season. We're going to try to improve after each game." The opening game and traditional rival, Niles will be played here this year, but for now it's hard work, training and building skills.

The members of this year's varsity team are Mike Busby, Willie Brown, Ken Garrett, Don Holmes, Gary Jones, Walt Vanderbush, Bryan Virgil, Gerald Busby, Greg Frazier, Joe Kyles, Ed Smith and Kevin Vanderbush.

Letters TO THE EDITOR

Dear Mr. Nichols
You are to be sincerely congratulated for your courage and concern in two areas of Buchanan life.
First you are to be commended for your forthrightness in filing a complaint in the marijuana case. Without going into the injustice of some of the laws pertaining to marijuana you showed plenty of courage. Mr. Nichols.

I gather from some of your comments that you have a few critics and detractors. Don't let them bother you. I think that they secretly envy your fine display of civic responsibility.

And, secondly, let me be one of the first to tell you how much I admire you for publishing that rather repugnant letter of mine which you published in the November 6th Record. I wrote that letter wondering, as an aside, whether you would have the courage to print it. You did -- and congratulations for so doing.

I see that you still respect "freedom of expression", not only by others but, just as importantly, by yourself. In this year of "The Bicentennial-Minus-One", you may or may not be surprised to know that there are some who are inclined to deny that most important heritage and right of every U.S. citizen.

And that is too bad. I won't mention any names, I might be accused of a "personal vendetta".

And now, Mr. Nichols, I must give some consideration to your front page editorial of November 13th entitled "In Defense of the Doc". (As a friend of his, which you apparently are, I again sincerely commend you for "sticking up" for him.)

But your "Freudian-slips" are showing, Mr. Nichols!

Roasting A Turkey Is As Simple As 1, 2, 3!

Today's oven-ready turkey has been dressed, rinsed, inspected, bagged, and fresh-frozen. Once it has left the processing plant, no hands touch it until time of kitchen preparation.

It is not necessary to stuff turkey. Many cooks find it convenient to bake dressing on the side, flavored with broth from cooked neck and giblets.

A roast-meat thermometer, if properly inserted, eliminates guesswork about doneness. When the thermometer in thigh registers 180-185 degrees F, the turkey is done.

Since turkey is one of the best meat buys, it is an excellent budget stretcher. Follow label instructions for roasting turkey, or use these simple directions to obtain a beautiful golden-brown, ready-to-serve-and-eat turkey.

1 To thaw. Leave turkey in original bag and use one of the following three methods:

a No hurry -- place on tray in refrigerator 3-4 days

b Faster -- place on tray at room temperature in a closed grocery bag (bag prevents skin of turkey from becoming too warm) 1 hour per pound of turkey

c Fastest -- cover with cold water, changing water occasionally one-half hour per pound of turkey. Refrigerate or cook turkey as soon as thawed. If you plan to stuff turkey, do so just before roasting.

Follow instructions on bag for commercially stuffed turkeys. Refreezing uncooked turkey is not recommended.

2 To prepare for oven:

a Remove plastic bag, remove neck and giblets, from cavities. Rinse turkey and pat dry. Cook neck and giblets for flavoring dressing and for giblet gravy.

b Follow your favorite dressing recipe if you wish to stuff the turkey, or bake stuffing in a casserole. Because stuffing expands during roasting, turkey body and neck cavity should be stuffed loosely -- approximately 3/4 cup stuffing per pound oven-ready weight. If not stuffed, rub salt generously in cavities, and, if desired, insert pieces of carrots, celery, onion and/or parsley for added flavor. Neck skin should be skewered to back and wings fastened down legs by tying or tucking under skin band. Do not fasten down legs for faster cooking.

3 To roast. Place turkey breast-up on rack in shallow roasting pan. If a roast-meat thermometer is used, insert into the thick part of the thigh. Bulb must not touch bone. Roast in preheated 325 degrees F oven. Time chart below is your guide to length of roasting time. When the thermometer registers 180-185 degrees F, the

turkey is done, if you have inserted the thermometer correctly. To check, move thermometer slightly toward the center of the bird. If it then registers less than 180 degrees F, more cooking is required. A "tent" of foil placed loosely over turkey will delay browning until about the last half hour when the tent can be removed to allow a final browning. Turkey may be basted regularly, if desired, with melted butter.

4 Turkey is done when:

a Roast-meat thermometer inserted in thigh registers 180-185 degrees F

b Thick part of drumstick feels soft when pressed with thumb and forefinger, or

c Drumstick and thigh move easily
