

Galien Dress Limits: "Reasonable, Proper"

School dress in the Galien township schools must be "reasonable and proper" for the coming school year. The decision was reached by the Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The board made no change in the school dress policy that existed last year.

The dress policy was challenged during the last school year by Mrs. Robert Marshall when her daughter was asked to leave school, by the high school principal, Walter Schwarz, for wearing a minipant dress this spring. Mrs. Marshall's contention was that it was proper dress.

In a prepared release the Galien school board states "It is the feeling of this board of education that the administrators of Galien schools have the authority and responsibility to make policies and decisions concerning conduct and dress of students under their jurisdiction. However, we feel that these policies must be reasonable and based upon sound educational practices. Namely, that the process of arriving at decisions on such matters shall

contribute to the education of all concerned, students, teachers and parents, so that these decisions will be widely accepted and have the support of students, parents, teachers and members of the board of education.

"The board makes the following four recommendations for utilizing the efforts and good judgment of the groups involved:


"1 Students—Whenever possible allow them thru the school council and related classes of law and government to study and make recommendations.

"2 Teachers—Discuss the problems involved in faculty and department meetings and solicit solutions from them.

"3 Parents—Whenever circumstances permit, work with the PTA and or key parents, to promote acceptance and support of educational policies.

"4 Further, that all groups above mentioned be made aware before their participation is solicited of the responsibility of the board of education under the law."

As stated in the school handbook, school dress should be "reasonable and proper."

Forty Present At Boat Meet

Over 40 interested persons attended a hearing Friday held to discuss boating problems on Clear lake. The hearing was called by the Water section of the Department of Conservation and was arranged for by the Buchanan township board Supervisor Ivan Price presided at the meeting.

Victor Patrick from the Michigan, Department of Conservation, was present to discuss and make recommendations on some of the problems facing residents on the lake.

A committee, headed by Robert Sawyer and consisting of Goldwyn Smith and Don Brown, which was appointed by the Buchanan township board made the following recommendations:

- 1 Water skiing be permitted only between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6:30 p.m., all other times boats must proceed at no-wake speed.
 - 2 Maximum horsepower for boats on the lake not to exceed 75.
 - 3 Boats not to be equipped with over one motor.
 - 4 No person shall throw any bottle, tin, garbage, paper or other trash or obnoxious object on or in the water, on the beaches or shores or adjacent to public waters.

144 Animals Bring More Than \$27,500

More than \$27,500 was paid by county merchants, businessmen and individual buyers at the annual 4-H junior livestock auction, held Friday at the Berrien County 4-H Youth Fair. More than 140 steers, lambs and hogs were sold at an average price per pound of 38½ cents.

Tops '67 Price

The first animal off the block of auctioneer John Glassman of Eau Claire was the Grand Champion market lamb of JoAnn Busiek of Brownstown road. JoAnn's Sussex-Cross lamb brought \$195 a pound, more than 70 cents over the price per pound offered in 1967. Her 100 pound lamb cost the Harding Super Market of Stevensville \$195.

The reserve Champion lamb, owned by Sue Anstiss of Berrien Center, weighing 100 pounds, was bought by Mary Collins of Benton Harbor for \$100 a pound.

Forty-three other lambs were sold at an average price of 41 1/2 cents per pound, better than 15 cents over prices quoted by regional livestock markets last Friday.

Buyers in the lamb sale included the Buchanan Co-ops, represented by Lyman Clark and Earl Beck, the S & S Super Market of Buchanan-Bridgman, represented by Gordon Schneider and Claude Hubbard, and the First National Bank of Southwestern Michigan, Sam Creeden.

Steers Steady

David Versaw's Grand Champion market steer, an Angus, was purchased by the Paul Strepen Nursing home of Niles at \$110 per pound. This is three cents under last year's auction price. The animal weighed into the sale at 1030, bringing the Three Oaks youngster a total of \$1,133.

The Reserve Champion market steer was a Hereford owned by Judy Jannett of Eau Claire which weighed in at 980 pounds. The Auto Specialty company of St Joseph paid 70 cents a pound or \$686 for the animal.

Ted Shunkwiler of Berrien Springs offered his 1,280 pound Grand Champion Charolais steer to the bloc. It went at 60 cents a pound for a total of \$768, purchased by the Shrader Super Market of Berrien Springs.

The first place Shorthorn, owned by Bill McCarthy of Eau Claire, weighed in at 935 pounds and was purchased for 50 cents a pound (\$467.50) by the Eau Claire branch, Inter-City bank.

The Reserve Champion Angus, owned by Diane Versaw, Three Oaks, brought 43 for the 945 pound animal, or a total of \$406.35. It was purchased by Schraders Super Market of Three Oaks.

School Classes Get Underway Sept. 3rd

Students in Buchanan and Galien school districts are counting the days until school is in session for the 1968-69 school year. For Buchanan young people, classes begin Tuesday, Sept. 3, while Galien students will begin regular class hours on Thursday, Sept. 5.

Grades 9-12 in Buchanan will report to the gymnasium at 8 a.m. on Sept. 3, according to Donald B. Trull, high school principal. Grades 7 and 8 will report to the high school gym at 1 p.m. that same day while grades kindergarten thru 6 will report to their classrooms at the same afternoon hour.

Transitional and special education classes will report to their classrooms at the Buchanan school at 1 p.m. that Tuesday. All students begin a full day of school on Wednesday, Sept. 4 in Buchanan.

At Galien
On Tuesday, Sept. 3, a faculty orientation will begin at 8 a.m. at the Galien township schools with grades K-6 registering and paying fees at 1:00 p.m. On Wednesday, Sept. 4, distribution of textbooks to grades K-12 will take place from 9:00 to 11:15 a.m. School begins in regular session for Galien at 8:15 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 5.

Galien township school buses will begin picking up students at 12:00 noon on Tuesday, Sept. 3. Parents or students having questions or who need information on either classes, registering, paying of fees or transportation, should contact the school office at 545-3364.

Buchanan Buses
On Sept. 3 buses in the Buchanan district will pick up students in grades 9-12 at the same time and place as last year, reports Paul Spaulding, transportation manager. Students picked up on the morning run will be returned at noon.

Students in Buchanan grades K-8 will be picked up as the other students and returned home and will arrive at school just before 1 p.m. Buses will return them as soon as their sessions are dismissed.

Beginning Wednesday, Sept. 4, the bus schedule will be the same as last year except for minor changes which were not elaborated on by Spaulding.

Thirty-nine hogs moved across the auctioneer's block with the Grand Champion market hog, owned by Toney Adent of Berrien Springs weighing in at 205 pounds. The animal brought \$140 a pound, off 15c from last year's price. It was purchased by Harding's Market of Watervliet. Toney received \$287 for the hog.

Erich Norris of Berrien Center showed the Reserve Champion hog at a weight of 220 pounds. The auction price was 60 cents, paid by the Peoples State Bank of St. Joseph. The total \$132.00.

The remaining 37 hogs were sold at an average price per pound of 36 cents, some 15 1/2 to 16 cents over the price being paid by regional livestock markets on the day of the sale.

Buyers in the hog auction included Rossow Feed Mill of Buchanan, DeLos Proseus of Buchanan, the Buchanan Co-ops, Louie's Restaurant and Catering of Buchanan, the Buchanan Farmers Credit Union, the Buchanan branch of the Inter-City Bank, and the First National Bank of Southwestern Michigan.

"chief of detectives", "firm, impartial discipline" (this would suggest we have not had this during Joe's tenure as undersheriff), and "review of all jail policies".

Now, that's a horse of another color. The spectacle will consist of Joe trying to ride these two horses, which are galloping in completely different directions — without falling flat on his face!

Here is a man who has, in fact, been privy to top policy decisions within the department over the last ten years. He has, in fact, been instrumental in the innovation of some of the practices and procedures now in force in the department. He has, in fact, at times had to administer these policies because of an inability of the Sheriff, for one reason or another, to carry out the functions of his office.

Now he comes forth with a platform that denies his ten years of service as undersheriff. A platform which says may be things aren't all "hunky-dory" at the jail — as opposed to his statements during the primary campaign.

And, all of this with the Sheriff's blessings — his endorsement — which arrived at the Record office Saturday morning, reproduced on what appears to be the same paper used in the department's copy machine and in an envelope printed by the county for the department.

I'd like to know, Sheriff, why were candidates for the nomination as Sheriff asked to resign from their positions with the department — and Joe remains at his post, using county time to campaign, using county car for transportation, and using the office he seeks as a sounding board for his transparent scheme to continue the same inefficiencies he has been a party to over the years?

While there may be no legal grounds for the request, we feel there is a strong moral argument in favor of the Sheriff asking for Mr. Heward's resignation. Failing that, perhaps the county Board of Supervisors will continue their diligence so ably demonstrated Monday.

a lot of excitement over a relatively few California-grown table grapes, but the issues are much more deep.

Involved is an effort by union leaders to unionize California farm workers, with major efforts aimed at the grape growing areas where hand labor is a "must" and where a few large growers have been the special target. However, the total boycott affects the small family farms as well as the larger producer.

Falling in direct (and sometimes drastic) efforts to unionize the farm workers, the United Farm Workers Organizing Committee headed by Cesar Chavez and sponsored by the AFL-CIO — has called for a total boycott of California grapes in major markets.

Originally aimed at New York, the idea has spread to Detroit with the public approval of Mayor Cavanagh, who urged enforcement of the table-grape ban.

Recently, a number of unions engaged in the distribution and retail sale of California grapes in the greater New York area invited brokers, jobbers and chain-store representatives to a meeting, in which they were told that stores selling California grapes would be picketed. The Meat Cutters have said they would not cross such picket lines.

With this ultimatum, the flow of California grapes into the greater New York area has dropped to practically zero, and in the process it appears there has been a clear-cut violation of a major section of the Taft-Hartley Labor act, relating to secondary boycotts and "hot cargo" practices.

What does this mean to Michigan farmers and city consumers? Obviously, there is much more at stake than final disposition of a few tons of grapes. It is clear that labor is attempting to set a pattern for total organizing of all farm workers, and eventually, a take-over of America's farm productive ability, for if a small group of organizers in California can cut such a huge city as New York

off from a grape supply, it could obviously happen to your total food supply, your milk, meat, or bread.

Lifted Tomes At MSU Bring Slight Charge

Students at Michigan State University will literally "Get a charge" out of their library books come this fall.

A new electronic system being installed which will enable students to leave through several turnstiles without showing or checking possession with anyone.

The new system, consisting of "energized" books, involves metal plates laminated in book covers. The plates bear a small and harmless electric charge until the book is properly checked out at the circulation desk.

If not checked out and energized, the plates activate sensing columns that electronically lock turnstiles and sound an alarm as the volume is taken out of the library.

The system is designed, says the university, to speed the flow of patrons from the library, and prevent loss of books necessary to students.

Financing Topic For Galien Board Meet

Financing arrangements took the attention of the Galien township board of education at its regular meeting Monday night. Bids on bus fleet insurance, interest rate on a \$70,000 loan, against state aid, and a financing interest rate for two new buses and a station wagon were received.

Fleet Insurance
The low bidder on the bus fleet insurance was ISC (agent, Larry O'Neil) of Galien with a bid of \$818.25. Other bidders were Farm Bureau, \$1,100.00 and State Farm, \$1,241.90. The bid of O'Neil was accepted.

Loan Bids
The board accepted the bid of Inter City bank for a 3.75% interest rate on the borrowing of \$70,000, against state aid, for operating expenses. Other bidders were Michigan National bank of Battle Creek, 3.8%, and Farmers & Merchants bank of Benton Harbor, 4.0%. Last year Farmers & Merchants was the low bidder on a \$50,000 loan with a 3% interest rate.

The financing bid of 4% interest change, of the Michigan National bank of Battle Creek, was accepted. Other bids were:

by Farmers & Merchants National bank, 4% and Inter City bank, 4.50%. To be financed were two new buses at \$18,257.52 apiece on a five year contract, and a new Ford 12-passenger Chalet wagon at \$2,932, on a three year contract.

The board authorized change orders on the school remodeling program in the amount of \$5,325.40. The changes ordered by the Health department were for the septic tanks and dry wells at the South building.

Other Board Action
In other actions the board —Approved the hiring of Miss Lois Steen as high school home economics teacher.

—Hired Leslie Smith as bus driver.
—Hired Clovis Colburn, Sr as night custodian at an annual salary of \$4,700.

—Approved textbook rental fees. The only increase is for band, 50c, and Reader's Digest, 50c.

—Approved an increase of 5c for the hot lunch program. New prices for the hot lunch program will be, 1 to 6th grade, 35c, 7 thru 12, 40c and adults, 45c. Mrs. Rosemary Smith was hired as head cook, at a salary of \$220, per month.

—Approved certification of millage to the township clerks. This year's levy will be 24.40 mills as against last year's levy of 24.95 mills.


—Approved rules and regulations for bus drivers with no change over last year.

Midland Judge Prods Passing Sign Program

Dragging its feet would be an improvement over present movements of the Michigan State Highway department in erecting "no passing zone" signs on the left side of highways. This is the opinion of Midland Municipal Judge Henry Hart who has begun a one-man campaign to improve the warning system for motorists.

Judge Hart points out that the present do-not pass signs do not provide sufficient visibility for the motorist. Vision may be obstructed by vehicles ahead. Motorists, when passing, must look to the left lane. Snow plows throw snow to the right. He maintains that the only

"logical" place for the signs is on the left side of the highway. Studies conducted by the highway department, as well as those in other states, agree with his logic. The trouble is, no one except Judge Hart does anything about it.

Two test locations in Michigan proved that driver attention to the no passing zones was improved with special pennant-shaped signs mounted on the left.

The improved signs have been used in Iowa for some time, and other states are ready to adopt the system. Judge Hart wonders out loud why Michigan drivers do not receive the same service. Highway department officials agree the signs are effective,

but they question whether accidents on hills and curves are reduced by their use. Harold Cooper, director of the traffic division, doesn't think so.

Officials also feared loss of federal highway funds since left side erection was "non-conforming" Iowa, which did not wait for federal approval and just installed the signs, did not lose funds.

State police favor the new signs and cite traffic violations as well as accident reductions as influencing factors. Sgt. Donald Calcaterra, traffic analyst, said that state police records for 1967 show 617 accidents occurred on curves and 1,769 occurred on hills. Improper passing violations were recorded as causing 9,275 accidents in 1967. Reports of other law enforcement agencies are not included in the totals.

Sgt. Calcaterra recalls earlier service at the Gaylord post, which wrote more tickets for passing violations than any other post in the state. In 1960-61, the new system was installed on old US 27. "Our citations fell to practically nothing," Sgt. Calcaterra stated.

Cost of implementing the system state-wide has been estimated at \$175,000 to \$250,000. Cooper states that if the system were adopted, installation would occur only at "selected locations," not throughout the entire state.

What is needed, the judge maintains, is enough people demanding the change to force the highway department to get off its present position and begin installation.


Charges Dismissed






OUT OF THE PAST


These should all be interesting meetings to hear first hand of the missionary work done in these two countries with highlights of the way these people live, their customs and their problems
