The Indians Sell Their Heritage

When Isaac McCoy came to this region in 1822 to redeem and regenerate the Indians he came too late, as he was soon to realize.

The Potawatomi had been long demoralized by defeat and an increasing weakness for the white man's whiskey. For three or four years the Carey Mission seemed to make some headway, but as they called briefly around the mission, the whiskey traders closed in a ring around them and the contest was soon over. After 1826 McCoy himself had given up hope and set himself to find another home in the west, far from the white settlements. After 1828 he quit his endeavors here, and the missionaries who had worked with him soon followed him.

In 1828 arrangements were made for the abandonment of Carey's mission in September of 1833 the Indians were called to Chicago to sign over the last of their reservations, including that on the Buchanan area. What happened at that meeting in Chicago illustrates the progressive demoralization of the red men, as described in R. C. Buley's "The Old Northwest."
