

Western Electric Appoints Manager For New Plant

Illinois he served as an elected official on the Itasca Board of Education. The material management center is well into the general construction phase. The structural steel frame is complete, and pouring of the concrete for the floor slab and roof is approximately 75 per cent finished. Walls now enclose about half the building. The 13 acre warehouse and office is expected to be completed by the fall of this year and to be operational by January 1, 1976.

The center will stock material made by Western Electric at its 23 major manufacturing locations and purchased from some 50,000 other suppliers throughout the country. It will supply telephones and related equipment to Michigan Bell, Indiana Bell, Illinois Bell, the Wisconsin Telephone Company and associated units of AT&T Long Lines, as well as supply material required by the Western Electric employees who install central office and transmission equipment for the Bell Telephone companies throughout the four states comprising the company's central region.

Niles Township Calls Special Meeting

When John McDonald was formerly supervisor in Niles Township, he also qualified as a Class III assessor. When he was defeated for office it became necessary for the new administration to hire a qualified assessor. This was done at \$9,285 a year.

When McDonald sought reelection as Niles Township supervisor, he campaigned on the promise that he could save the township money by again acting as assessor as well as supervisor.

The present assessor, Tony Caranci, has left, and the township needs an assessor. McDonald has proposed that he receive a \$4500 increase over and above his supervisor salary of \$8,000, for which he will perform the duties of assessor.

Since this matter cannot be settled by a vote of the township board, and since apparently it can't wait until the annual meeting, a special meeting has been called at the township hall this Saturday at 2 p.m. to allow the voters in the township to decide. At the last annual meeting last April, McDonald had unsuccessfully tried to get the supervisor's salary increased providing the supervisor do the assessing. At that time Jerald Sanders was still supervisor.

Clark Equipment Again Posts Records For 1974

After 24 consecutive months of increased backlog level, Mr. Phillips said the order backlog dropped and incoming orders declined in the fourth quarter. "Our backlog remained high, however," he said, "amounting to \$846 million at December 31, 1974, compared to \$935 million at the end of the third-quarter of 1974, and \$568 million at year-end in 1973."

Net income for 1974 was \$50.1 million, or \$3.68 per share, which includes a gain of \$6.6 million, or 49 cents per share from the sale of Clark's 17.1 percent interest in Toyo Umpanki, Co., Ltd. of Osaka, Japan. In 1973 net income was \$55.1 million or \$4.06 a share. The decline in 1974 net and per share figures results from Clark switching its method of pricing domestic inventories from the first-in, first-out (FIFO) basis to last-in, first-out (LIFO).

The effect of the change was to decrease 1974 income before taxes by \$54.8 million, decrease income taxes by \$28.2 million and decrease net income by \$26.6 million or \$1.96 per share.

For the fourth quarter of 1974, Clark reported sales of \$366.6 million, net income of \$10.8 million, and 79 cents per share. According to B. E. Phillips, president and chief executive officer, "the effect of the change to LIFO was to reduce fourth quarter net income by \$13.9 million or \$1.03 per share. In the fourth quarter of 1973 sales were \$301.2 million and net income on the first-in, first-out basis was \$15.2 million or \$1.12 per share."

Fourth quarter 1974 income of 79 cents per share was better than third quarter operating income of 61 cents per share, both results being reported on the LIFO basis. Interest expense continued to be very high but material shortages began to ease in the fourth quarter, and our selling price increases kept ahead of cost increases," he said.

Mr. Phillips, in explaining Clark's switch on inventory pricing, said, "the LIFO method is preferable in periods of high inflation such as we experienced in 1974 because it more nearly matches current costs with current revenues."

"And, although LIFO had the effect of reducing reported earnings, the cash flow of the company is increased by the tax saving. This is an important source of funds to carry out our expansion plans. As long as inflation continues, this method will be beneficial to us in its impact on our taxes and cash flow," he said.

In reporting on 1974 results, Mr. Phillips indicated that slightly more than one-half of the 21 percent sales gain resulted from increased shipment levels, while the balance came from higher product prices.

A Fine Force

Many people in Buchanan don't realize what a good police department we have. The ones who don't think so are the ones who are ticketed for speeding by the eager officers with exceptional and fool-proof radar equipment.

Most of the present policemen are family men. Several are conscientious church members. Never has Buchanan had a force of men so well trained or well qualified for their jobs.

Probably most towns the size of Buchanan don't hire as large a force. But Buchanan is currently getting its money's worth. Each member of the force makes personal effort to continue his education and training, and all that makes each man increasingly valuable to the city.

State, township and county law enforcement people always commend Buchanan for their help and cooperation with other departments. The Buchanan police maintain a good relationship with their neighbors and, in turn, get a great deal of help from them.

We are told by the people connected with the courts that Buchanan police rank high in their ability to compile evidence and testimony necessary to bring about proper prosecution of a case brought to trial. Their handling of cases is considered to be professional and well constructed.

There is much behind the scenes. Often, when a crime is committed, the investigation of it takes long hours of careful work. The solution of one break-in or larceny often produces information about another. When young people are involved, the investigators use a great deal of understanding and wisdom. The aim is often to determine what course to follow to rehabilitate a young person rather than to merely punish him.

The weekly police log is filled with information about what the men do. In the routine course of duty, the local men confront just about every kind of a situation.

On a few occasions, the publisher of this paper had been aroused at 4 a.m. and notified that one of the doors at the plant isn't properly secured. At the time it's annoying to have to come down to lock the door, but it's a good, safe feeling to know that the Buchanan police are regularly checking.

Auto Licenses

It will be possible for Buchanan residents to obtain their new automobile licenses in Buchanan on Saturday, February 15. Personnel from the license branch will be at the Buchanan city hall from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. All that is needed are the prepared applications sent by the state. If an applicant doesn't have one, he should bring his latest automobile registration and proof of insurance.

The project is to eventually create a movie on the history of Buchanan. The class has already made drawings of several buildings in Buchanan which are currently on display at Roti Roti Shoe Store and many of which will be used in the film project.

Mrs. Roti's class is seeking old photographs of Buchanan. These they would like to borrow for further art work for the project. In addition, she said that many of Buchanan's citizens may expect a call for information pertinent to the history of the area.

Working on the project are Brian Steinke, teacher, and Joe Johnson, pastor, both of whom possess considerable knowledge of photography. Mrs. Roti said that they are aiming for the bi-centennial celebration with the hopes of making a permanent contribution to the city's cultural and historical background.

Another project under way in Mrs. Roti's art classes is to paint murals on areas downtown which need to be beautified.

Murals and their artists will be selected competitively from sketches and plans.

Citizens to Help Apply For Federal Funds For City

Only 25 persons including members of the plan commission and the park and recreation board came to the hearing Monday to help decide what to do with possible federal funds the city may get.

Leslie Cripps and Miriam Hinman from the consulting firm which has been hired to help with preparing the application for funds were on hand to explain the program. They indicated that citizen participation in these deliberations was important.

Funds are available for elimination of slums or blight, conservation and preservation of buildings, expansion of community services and elimination of conditions which might be detrimental to health or safety. Acquisition of property which is deteriorating or acquisition of public works are also possibilities.

The awards of funds seem to be heavily weighted toward code enforcement and rehabilitation. The city was advised to plan for one year and for a period of five years and it was indicated that an application could contain a number of projects.

Some of those in attendance had specific ideas. A volunteer scout unit was suggested, and consultants said that a building for such a project could be included in an application. It was also stated that the funds could be used to attract indus-

trial development. Other ideas included the improvement of Hill Street, the expansion of parks and the creation of access area to the river for fishermen. The creation of a water wheel on the creek was suggested and beautification of the area along the creek was mentioned. A general cleanup of the environment was another.

The consultants indicated that Buchanan had a good chance to get some funds and said that Buchanan's record of past accomplishment was a positive factor. Apparently the maximum could be as high as \$250,000 a year for five years.

The first step will be to file a pre-application which must be done within the month. It was pointed out that money used on some of the projects for which the city already has set priorities might then free other money for some of the suggested projects.

Somebody came up with a census statistic that there were 32 homes in Buchanan without plumbing. The consultants said that their present job would be to study all the needs and to assist the plan commission and the city commission on deciding what types of programs to include in the final application.

A citizens advisory committee will be formed for further study. At a request for volunteers, Joe White stated that he would like to serve on it.

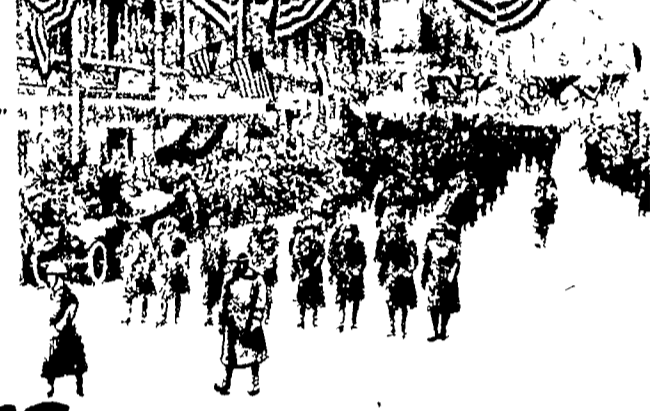

Facts On Vietnam Bonus

Q. Who is eligible for the Vietnam Era Veterans' Bonus?
A. To be eligible for benefits under Proposal B, the Vietnam Era Veterans' Bonus, you must:
- have completed at least 180 days of honorable service or died between January 1, 1961 and September 1, 1973.
- have been a resident of Michigan for at least 6 months prior to entering the service.
- have not applied for and received similar benefits from another state.
- have not been dishonorably discharged.
Q. How are the Bonus awards determined?
A. Combat veterans will receive \$600. Non-combat veterans will receive \$15.00 for each month served, up to a maximum of \$450.00. In the case of deceased veterans, their beneficiaries will receive their benefits.
Q. What requirements determine combat and non-combat veterans?
A. "Combat" zone bonuses are those who are eligible to wear the Vietnam Service Medal or the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal. Veterans eligible for combat zone bonuses are those who served in the Vietnam area, Berlin, Lebanon, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Qyomoy, Matur, Taiwan, the Congo, and since Oct. 1, 1966, in Korea.
Non-combat veterans or other than the area mentioned will get \$15 each per month of service up to a \$450 ceiling.
Q. Will the bonuses be taxed?
A. No. The benefits received would not be construed as payment for services and would not be subject to Federal, state or city income tax.
Q. Who will supervise and regulate the program?
A. The Department of Military Affairs will be given the responsibility to organize and administer the program. This department has had experience in coordinating this type of program for the Korean and WWII veterans.
Q. Where will the veteran obtain applications?
A. The primary source for obtaining applications will be at American Legion posts.
Q. What will applications be like?
A. The applications will be simple forms to be accompanied by a certified copy of the veterans report of discharge--form DD-214 and will have to be notarized by a notary public. Applications will also include a self addressed return envelope.
Q. How long will it take for the veteran to receive his bonus?
A. Approximately 30 days.

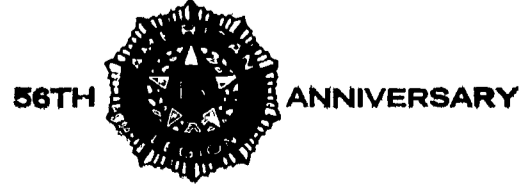

Mothers Will Help In Schools

Bucket Brigade -- Buchanan style -- got off to a start Monday morning at Ottawa, Stark and Moccasin schools. Bucket Brigade, a program used with good results in many schools across the country, enlists mothers to help teachers with those children who need extra attention for one reason or another.

THE SPINAL COLUMN

What makes man alive is, in many ways, similar to what makes a light bulb light up. Its electromagnetic energy. In man we call it Nature, Innate Intelligence, Life Force, Power, Energy, Vitality, etc. We don't fully understand all there is to know about it, any more than we fully understand about electricity. We do know that when it is absent, either in man or in a light bulb, that there is no life - we say that man is dead or that the light bulb has burned out.

Of course not - you know full well that the problem is in the switch - there is interference. The light bulb is all right - The Power Company needs no help, just no interference. The same is true with the human body. Your Power Company is the brain and Nature in your body needs no help - just a little cooperation, and no interference!

well," Sexton continued. "They played defense well, hustled, and were confident out there. They played well together and our press is getting away from fouls."

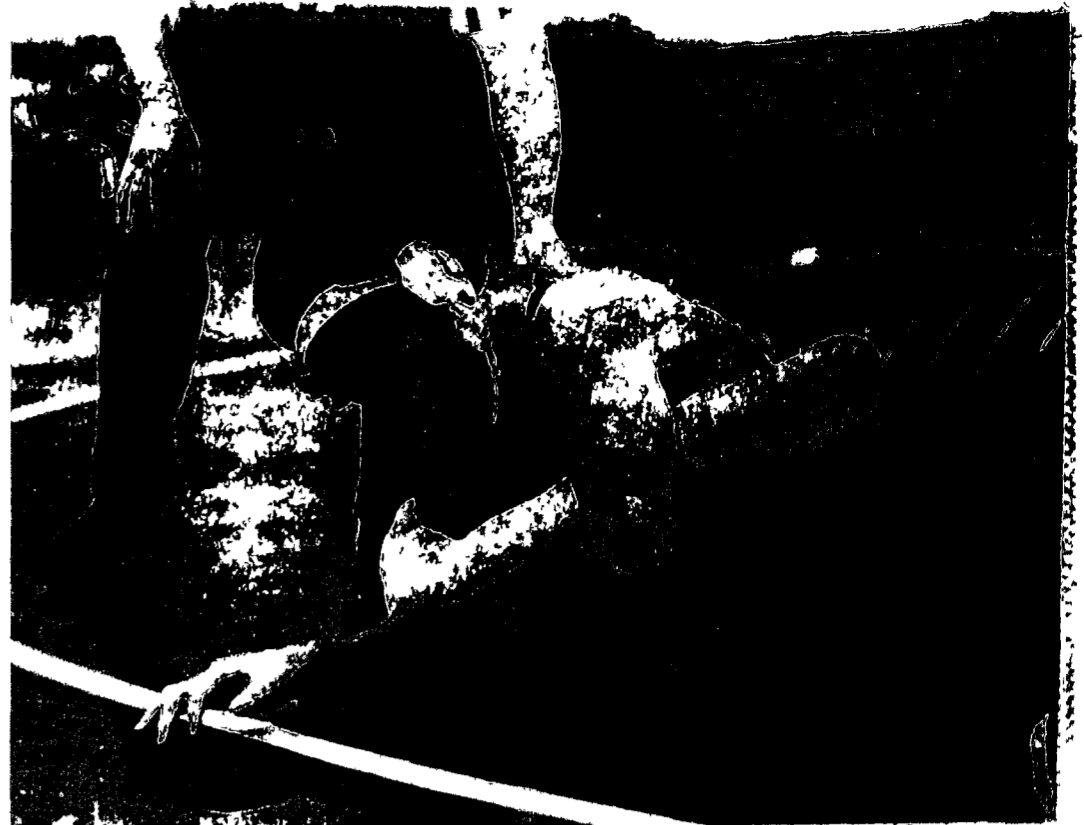

Bucks Win

Buchanan extended its winning streak to 6 last Tuesday as they beat Bronson 72-71 in an overtime thriller. The game was the first competition between the two schools in their history.

Buchanan took the first quarter 19-15 with the help of a 38 foot shot by senior guard Mike "Rip Van" McGurt. However, 13 first half points by Viking forward, Ken Belote brought the half margin tighter, Bucks by one, 32-31.

The third quarter Bronson hit from the floor one more time than the Bucks, and going into the final stanza led 50-49.

Both teams kept with each other throughout the fourth. Bronson's tough zone press was a big factor in the Vikings keeping with the Bucks. Bronson called time out with 1:33 left, leading 64-63.

With a little more than a minute left, McGurt put the Bucks in front, but Scott German answered back and Bronson led again 66-65. Ron Post fouled Ken Garrett with 29 seconds left, and the junior forward connected with one to tie it at 66. Garrett later salvaged the regulation tie as Belote let go with a set shot, to have it blocked back by the Buck stand-out.

In the overtime, Bronson hit a pair of field goals and a free throw, but Garrett produced four clutch freethrows and a court shot to give the Bucks a 72-71 victory. It was the third one point victory for the Bucks this season. All three came in the current winning streak.

One more factor in the Bucks victory was their free throws. Buchanan hit 20 for 24 at the charity line for an 83 percent average for the night.

Coach Bill Zabonick of Bronson said "Buchanan has superb ball handlers and a good aggressive team." The Bucks now stand at 12-3 on the season.

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MICHIGAN POWER COMPANY NOTICE TO NATURAL GAS CUSTOMERS IN THE LOWER PENINSULA

On November 12, 1974, Michigan Power Company filed an application with supporting testimony and exhibits with the Michigan Public Service Commission (Case No. U-4698) requesting authority to amend its gas rate schedules so as to increase its rates for the sale of natural gas, including its customers in the Lower Peninsula of Michigan.

Michigan Power Company's present rates and charges for the sale of natural gas are those approved by the Commission in its Opinion and Order dated May 21, 1973, in Case No. U-4092. In its Order of May 21, 1973, the Commission adopted a test year consisting of the twelve months ending December 31, 1971. It is the position of Michigan Power Company that these rates are insufficient to permit it to meet its increased expenses and to earn a reasonable and adequate return on its property devoted to providing its natural gas service.

Since its present rates and charges were established based upon 1971 levels of costs, Michigan Power Company alleges that its operation and maintenance expenses, wages, materials and supplies, and taxes have increased substantially and its cost of capital, especially interest, have increased materially. The actual results of its gas operations indicate that Michigan Power Company's overall rate of return on net original cost of its property used and useful in its natural gas operations is 5.31 per cent. Michigan Power Company further states that its realized rate of return from its Lower Peninsula operations is 5.43 per cent and from its Upper Peninsula operations is 5.08 per cent. It is the position of Michigan Power Company that unless adequate rate relief is granted, its earnings and its realized rate of return will continue to decline. It is the position of Michigan Power Company that its present rates are inadequate, unjust, unreasonable and confiscatory and have reduced its return below a safe, proper and reasonable level. Michigan Power Company proposes to adopt the twelve months ending June 30, 1974 as its test year for use in this proceeding.

Michigan Power Company also proposes to modify and amend its Rules and Regulations Governing the Sale of Gas to provide a more reasonable and equitable policy for the extension of mains and services for new natural gas customers within its service areas.

Michigan Power Company, therefore, proposes to increase its rates for the sale of natural gas to customers in the Lower Peninsula of Michigan so as to produce additional annual gas revenues of at least \$1,215,537.

Following is a summary of the proposed rate increases by classes of service and the percent increase upon the various classes of service offered by Michigan Power Company in the Lower Peninsula of Michigan.

Baked Goods for Less
"My family loves baked goods during the winter. How can I make them with sugar prices being so high?"

One practical solution is to fabricate baked goods from mixes which have risen in price but not as fast or as much as sugar.

Cake mixes make good cookies. Many mixes have the directions right on the package. In fact, mixes can be used for everything from biscuits to coffee cakes, cobbler, waffles, and nut breads.

If the package doesn't have the directions for these extra delights, write directly to the manufacturing company for their recipe folders and ideas. You'll save both time and money.

Tips
1. Handle with care! Always fold sour cream carefully as over-stirring may thin it. If the sour cream does thin, refrigerate it, the original consistency will return.

2. Double or nothing! Properly whipped whipping cream will double in volume. The secret is to have a cold bowl, beaters and cold whipping cream, and to whip the cream before adding sugar and flavorings. Confectioners' sugar helps to hold the whip.

3. Leftover or broken cookies can be crushed and used as an ice cream topping.


