Buchanan Teachers Granted \$100 Year Advance, in Salary

Will Also Share \$4,000 Payment Extra State Aid

District Receives \$12,861 In Regular State Aid

At a meeting held Tuesday evening the board of Buchanan Fractional school district No 1 voted to advance wages of all teachers \$100 per year for their 1946-47 contracts.

In addition it was voted that the extra \$4,000 in state aid which the district will receive as its share of the \$30,000 appropriation voted in the special session of the Michigan legislature will be divided among the teachers, as a payment in addition to their contractual pay.

The teachers will participate in this extra aid this year and also next year, when another \$4,000 payment will be made to Buchanan.

This action is in accordance with general advances granted throughout Michigan and over the country in general, in consideration of the advance in practically all living costs.

Michigan Crippled Children's Commission To Pay All Expenses

A clinic for the crippled children of Berrien county has been scheduled to be held in the gymnasium of the St. Joseph high school Tuesday, April 16, beginning at 9 a. m.

The Michigan Crippled Children's Commission is co-operating in the drive. A specialist in diseases and deformities of the bones and muscles will be in charge. There will be no charge, as the clinic is financed by the Michigan Crippled Children's Commission.

The clinic attendance will include crippled children between the ages of birth and 21 years of age. The services of the clinic will be extended both to those already known cases that have been notified, and new cases that have recently occurred or entered the county. Parents or family physicians should make arrangements for appointments for the new cases by notifying Mary Hanley, R.N., field worker for the Berrien County Society for Crippled Children, at Tel. 3398, St. Joseph, or the Berrien County Probate Court at Tel. 3141, St. Joseph.

Safety Board Ask Observance Of Bicycle Law

Ask Attention To City Rules On Licensing, Riding On Sidewalks

As the result of complaints brought recently before the Buchanan Safety Board, that organization of the public be called to the attention of the ordinance on bicycle operation, which went into effect May 16, 1941.

Contrary to general belief, this ordinance does not prohibit riding bicycles on the sidewalks in residential districts, but does require that all riders be equipped with a bell or other warning devices, that they must adequately warn all vehicles, animals, or pedestrians which they meet, whether approaching from the front or the rear, and that they slow down to a safe rate of speed while passing sidewalks riding in the business district is definitely forbidden.

The ordinance prohibits more than one rider per bicycle, unless that vehicle is constructed for more than one rider, and each rider must ride on a seat made for such passenger. No rider must attach his bicycle to any other vehicle, or hang onto it and follow in the rear.

The ordinance provides for the annual registration of bicycles with the police, and that police must inspect each vehicle as to its mechanical condition and the operation of brakes, bells, and any other safety device thereon. On payment of 50 cents, the rider is to receive from the police a metallic license plate, stamped with the registration number, the year, and any other necessary data necessary for identification.

City officials state that bicycles are now required to be licensed, but that the city does not require riders of new bicycles to get a license for a few weeks before registration date on May 1. All riders must have white light lamps in operating condition, and visible not less than 300 feet in advance, also a red reflex mirror or lamp on the rear. Riders of bicycles must observe all traffic signals and requirements applicable to any vehicle.

Poorman Holds Lead 5 Votes After Recount

"No" Vote On Mill Tax Gains 51 Votes; "Yes" Vote Retains Lead Of 63.7 Pct.

Both Frank Poorman, successful candidate for supervisor from Precinct 2, and the one-mill tax proposal emerged with reduced but still adequate majorities from a recount held by city commission at the meeting held Thursday evening to canvass the vote.

Poorman retained his 344 vote intact, but his opponent, Arthur Wray, Sr., gained one vote advancing his count from 338 to 339, five in arrears.

The recount on the one-mill tax was decided on when it was found the count in Precinct 1 shorted the "no" vote. A recount advanced the number of negative votes on that issue from the 163 reported after the election to 214, a gain for the negative of 51 votes. The Precinct 2 vote was checked and found correct. The correct total for the mill tax vote was found to be 792 "yes" and 451 "no". This left the affirmative with 63.7% of the total of a margin of 3.7% over the required majority of 60%.

Service Council Reports On Work For Wounded Vets

The Veterans Hospital Service Council during the monthly meeting Tuesday evening in the city hall, completed plans for the purchasing of 23 bed lamps for Percy Jones General Hospital this month.

Mrs. Elmon Starr, president, and a report of the Red Cross meeting in Battle Creek April 3, was presented by Mrs. Warren L. Willard. During the past year this district Red Cross Council had supplied 1,000 canes, 20,000 Christmas boxes, 10,000 high seas boxes, \$30,000 in the wheel chair fund for servicemen and veterans and is paying \$30 per week for a band which provides weekly programs at the Percy Jones hospital. Besides this the district council has supplied many articles needed for the hospitals, prisoner of war camp personnel and the Pine Lake Veterans Vocational school.

The local council sent the following to the Red Cross center last month: 90 dozen cookies, one dozen flour sacks, 12 metal bed lamps, four scatter rugs, 12 birthday gifts, 1 small game prizes and 35 pounds of pop-corn. The list of articles requested for this month includes 1,000 comic books, pieces of brightly colored rayon for purse linings, scraps of bright yarns and felts, flour and feed sacks (washed), pop-corn, 1,000 heavy glass or metal ash trays, bed lamps, assorted flower seeds, gladiolus bulbs, sheet music, both popular and sacred numbers, records, birthday gifts and small prizes. Money is needed for the green house fund for Fort Custer Veterans' Facilities and for the gift wrappings fund. All members of the Council are asked to furnish cookies or colored eggs for the special Easter project for the Percy Jones hospital. These are to be taken to the Harry Banker shop before noon Tuesday, April 16.

Dr. Errol T. Elliott, National Leader, Editor Of Quakers, To Speak

Stores, Business Houses Asked To Close For Good Friday Service From 1 To 3 P. M.

With Dr. Errol T. Elliott, executive secretary of the national organization of the Friends church (better known as Quakers) and editor of their national organ, "The American Friend", as speaker for the Holy Week program in Buchanan this year, an unusually interesting series of programs is expected.

The selection of speaker was made by Rev. Malcolm McNeal, pastor of the First Presbyterian church and chairman of the Holy Week Arrangement Committee. Rev. McNeal had been acquainted with Dr. Elliott when the latter was pastor of the large First Friends church of Indianapolis, Ind., and recognized as one of the outstanding religious leaders and pulpit speakers of that city. Since that time Dr. Elliott has retired from pulpit speaking, to enter executive and editorial work.

Many will doubtless be drawn to hear Dr. Elliott because of the wide interest in the work of the Friends church in both world wars and in the World War I and World War II; and also because of their anti-war crusading.

The services will be held this year in the First Evangelical church from April 14 to April 19 inclusive. All services will begin at 7:30 p. m. except that on Good Friday, which will begin at 1:15 p. m. The program is sponsored by the Buchanan Council of Churches which is asking that as many stores and other business houses as possible close from 1 to 3 p. m. for the Good Friday service.

The general theme of Dr. Elliott's series will be "The Ageless Gospel For A Troubled Age—Christ, God's Answer To Men". The daily topics will be as follows: Sunday Night "The Dangerous Opportunity of the Church—Christ, The Pioneer"; Monday Night "Foundations for a Secure World—Christ, The Truth"; Tuesday Night "The New Man for The New World—Christ, The Life"; Wednesday Night "On The Frontiers of Good Will—Christ, The Way"; Thursday Night "The Church and The Judgment of Men—Christ, The Light"; Good Friday Afternoon "Unconditional Love—God's Answer to Evil—Christ, The Saviour".

Pastors of the cooperating churches will act as chairman and the individual churches will furnish the music each evening as follows: Sunday night, Rev. Kretzschmer, chairman, music by Evangelical church; Monday night, Rev. McNeal, chairman, music by Presbyterian church; Tuesday night, Rev. Pohly, chairman, music by Methodist church; Wednesday night, George Seymour, chairman, music by L. D. S. church. Announcement of later chairman and music will be given in the Record next week.

The naming of the third supervisor was a necessity arising from the passing of the amendments which provided for three wards, the supervisors to represent the wards rather than the voting precincts. The commission voted that the supervisors elected by Precincts 1 and 2 should represent the first and second wards.

The city has had three supervisors in the past, the assessor being a supervisor ex-officio. It was stated by the city attorney that the city had actually been entitled to the fourth commissioner on the basis of population since the census of 1940, the law authorizing one supervisor for each 1,000 of population.

The appointment of Leo Boyce to the new position will doubtless meet with local approval. Boyce has considerable experience, having served as assistant treasurer in the office of the county treasurer at St. Joseph several years before entering the army. He served several years in the army, rising to the rank of captain. Boyce is the third of that family county board, his brother Harold, previously represented the city, and his father, the late Harry Boyce, served several terms.

Newer Methods Add Interest To Language Study

Bring Foreign Language Closer And Dead Language Alive

If you still believe that "modern methods" in education are just so much fluff, you should follow the procedure in the language department at the Buchanan high school for a while.

Thanks to audio-visual helps that bring the sight, the sound, everything but the smell—of foreign lands to the classroom, and also to a number of aids to instruction such as linguaphone language records, improved conversational technique, foreign word spell-downs and the like, even the dead languages are not dead any more for high school students.

Of course, the increasing interest in foreign languages because of the growing internationalization of "one-world" consciousness resulting from the recent world war and the present agitation for international friendliness doubtless adds to that interest. Anyway the Buchanan high school student of today flock to Latin classes until management has been forced to give "prognostic" tests to the eighth grade with the idea of determining the capacity of the students for language instruction. At that, 56 students tried to gain entrance last fall to a language class with a maximum limit of 35 seating capacity. That's a lot different from the way dad and ma used to duck Latin as too hard a nut to crack for them.

One of the many ways in which Latin may be made to come alive to students 1,500 years after it died as a living speech may be attained by the trip which the members of the Latin 10 and Spanish 11 and 12 classes made to Notre Dame University Monday. There, in the beautiful sacristy of the Catholic cathedral on the campus they will go back ages and ages through time as Brother Boniface tells them the story of the golden robes and gold miters, the chalices (wine goblets used for the sacrament of the Lord's Supper), and other beautiful gifts of religious paraphernalia given to the university by Louis Napoleon Bonaparte. There and in the old log chapel which served pioneer students as the cathedral does now, boys and girls of 1946 could read and translate the simple Latin inscriptions. And when they returned to their study halls, the pages of their Latin books were somewhat more vivid and significant than before.

The Latin and Spanish clubs and their monthly programs help, as you would very well realize if you had seen that vivid program of songs and conversation given by Spanish students in costume before the high school assembly a few weeks ago. Each Spanish class has a club known as the "Muchos Amigos" (Good Friends), in two sections, for both the Spanish 11 and Spanish 12 classes. Charlotte Smith is president of the Spanish 12 club and Billie Lou Lamb of the Spanish 11 club.

The Latin club, Legio Decima, Joan Renbarger president, is held only in connection with Latin 10. All programs are held during the class hour in the class room, as is also the case with the Spanish classes. An additional language device for Latin is the posting of bulletins by the instructor in the Latin language.

Mrs. Leah Weaver is the instructor. She taught French several years before it was dropped for Spanish three years ago. Mrs. Weaver believes that the change is for the better. The Buchanan high school changed over when the wave of change swept the high schools of the Middle West as a result of agitation in connection with the "Good Neighbor Policy" between the United States and Latin America. Increased interest in Spanish is promoted by the growing number of programs in Spanish heard over the radio. Mrs. Weaver will study advanced Spanish during the coming summer at the University of Mexico.

The language curriculum at the Buchanan high school is as follows: Latin 9 (Freshmen), Latin 10 (Sophomores), Spanish 11 (Juniors), Spanish 12 (Seniors). There are a total of 76 pupils in Latin and 81 in Spanish.
