### Individual Water Tap, Meter, to be Required for Each Building Unit

### Buys 1,800 Feet From H. Kujawa And M. Wideman

### Entire Area To Be Divided Into Parking Spaces And Regulated By City

### Applies To All Buildings Now Or To Be Built

Apartment Buildings Not In Classification Of Multiple Units

Action was taken by the city commission at the July meeting Monday evening requiring that every separate building unit in Buchanan whether for public, semi-public, industrial, business or residential uses, will in the future have to have its individual water tap and meter.

At the present time persons owning adjacent buildings have, in some cases, only one water tap and meter, from which their several buildings are served by pipe extensions. It was the opinion of the city commission that the amendment, to Ordinance 74 (known as the water ordinance) requiring individual water taps and meters in each building is in the interest of the owners themselves, inasmuch as under the conditions existing up until this time, if the water had to be shut off in the building where the water tap and meter is located, the other structures dependent on that tap for water supply are all shut off too, lacking both water supply for ordinary purposes and also for fire protection.

This amendment is to apply to all buildings heretofore or hereafter erected except in cases where the water committee sees fit to recommend exceptions for valid reasons which the city commission will approve.

The amendment does not apply to apartment houses, where the apartment house is actually one building. The ruling of the city commission in all such cases is to be final.

After leaving Buchanan they located in Berkeley, Cal., where they have a large jewelry and gift shop business. Their sons, Norman and Ashton, operated the store while they were in California.

Mrs. Tauch and Mrs. Battam are sisters and are nieces of Mrs. W. F. Runner. Among friends whom they visited while here were Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Pangborn.

### Calls Education Of Returned Vet Immense Success

The section of the G. I. "bill of rights" which arranges grants for education is the most piece of legislation ever created in behalf of returned veterans in the opinion of Francis Hiller, former Buchananite, who has played a vital part in veteran guidance as a member of the College of Arts and Sciences of the University of Houston at Houston, Texas.

Hiller left Monday evening on his return to Houston after a visit with his mother, Mrs. A. H. Hiller. It is a far more practical reward for service than any "bonus hand-out" could possibly be, states Hiller, and as a piece of social legislation it has none of the dangers attendant on forms of outright cash payment.

Not only is it very practical value to nearly all veterans, but it is also serving as a brilliant expedient to cushion the shock of unemployment in industry posed to America. Had industry been required to absorb the entire returned military personnel, it would have caused acute displacement and would have shoved hundreds of thousands of non-veteran workers out of industry, with resultant hardships.

Business in general has profited by the diversion of a large number of veterans into schools and colleges on terms highly beneficial to the veterans themselves. Not only is the education of the veteran at government expense has now progressed far enough to demonstrate the soundness of the idea. The average veteran who has gone to school, whether just embarking on, taking up, or has left off making a success of it. Some are not making good, Hiller stated, but they are averaging above the run of civilian students. It should be remembered that only a minority of civilian students complete their college courses.

Especially successful are the men who had undertaken a college course before they entered service and have returned to school to complete it. Few of these men have any difficulty in readjusting themselves to study. The fact is, said Hiller, that they are generally doing better after their return than they did before they left.

### 3 Buchanan Boys Named To Office Wolverine State

Three Buchanan boys, one of them a double winner, were elected to office following the city, county and state political campaigns staged by 800 delegates to the 9th annual Wolverine Boys' State, sponsored by the American Legion June 13-21 at East Lansing.

In addition to setting up their mythical 49th state the Boys' Staters organized 16 cities, named for U. S. presidents and other counties, bearing names of Michigan governors. The Buchanan boys holding elective offices were:

Jack Ross, Parsons county clerk and Tyler city supervisor; Spencer Gibbs state representative for Bingham county; and Don Hartman, VanBuren supervisor.

"It would be wise to punish the parents—let them pay the fine or serve the jail sentence—than to penalize a juvenile delinquent."

"Boys of 15 were deemed old enough to fight and die for their country. We believe that they are also old enough to vote."

"Replace the diplomats around the conference table with veterans who saw active service in the late war, and peace will soon be made."

Those were some of the opinions expressed by a group of 15 to 18-year-old boys heard in a program over a Michigan radio station Sunday, June 23. The youthful delegates visited the state capitol East Lansing where for eight days they had taken part with 800 other young men in the 9th annual Wolverine Boys' State, sponsored by the American Legion.

"During their stay at East Lansing the boys organized 16 cities, eight counties and a mythical 49th state. They passed their own laws, administered their own government and gained practical knowledge of democratic principles just before disbanding the entire group visited the state capitol building where the Boys' State officers and legislative and judicial groups assumed their chairs of office."

### Migrating Loon Found At Beck Farm North Of Buchanan

Earl Beck found an unusual wild waterfowl, known as a loon, on his farm northwest of Buchanan last week. The loon, which had evidently been migrating from the Florida Everglades where it wintered to the feeding grounds in Northern Canada, had both wings broken and lived only a day after it was found. Apparently stuck at night the huge bird had struck the wires on the electric line crossing the Beck farm.

A habitat of northern Canada, the loon has never been known to stop in this district while migrating and this was the first ever seen here.

The loon was about the size of a large goose, but unlike the goose, had a sharp bird-like bill. It had pink eyes and webbed feet and the black feathers had tight poll dots on them.

### City Commission Increases Size Business Dist.

The official boundaries of the business district of the city of Buchanan as defined in Ordinance 47 were enlarged by an amendment adopted at the July meeting of the commission Monday evening.

The enlargement of the district conforms with the boundaries of the five district, the extension being to the east, where the limits are to extend to the railway switch track extending from the main line of the Michigan Central railway to the Clark plant, instead of merely 100 feet east of Postage street as hitherto.

The definition of the business district now reads: Commencing at a point 100 feet north and 100 feet west of the intersection of the center lines of Dewey avenue and Oak Street, thence east to the west line of the Michigan Central railroad company's right of way of its side track from the main line to the Clark equipment company plant; thence southwest, eily along the said westerly line of the said railroad right of way to a point 100 feet south of the center line of Chicago street, thence west to a point 100 feet west of the center line of Oak street, thence north to the place of beginning.

### New Boundaries Are Made To Conform With Fire Dist.

The city of Buchanan is acquiring approximately 1800 square feet of additional space for its parking lot in the rear of the lot on East Front and Main street, by virtue of the action of the city commission at the July meeting Monday evening.

The purchase consisted of approximately 900 feet from Heiman Kujawa in the rear of his lawn property and about the same area from Meall Wideman in the rear of the D's Cafe and Kelling properties. The price paid was \$900 to each owner, or approximately \$1.80 per square foot. The city already owned about the same amount of space, the new acquisitions doubling the area belonging to the municipality. The space had been acquired back in the early thirties when the city took over tracts of land from Mr. McGahey, the William Biemer estate and Charles Boyle. The McGahey property was acquired after the former owner had bought the space to build a laundry, and had secured some and from the city. When he was unable to build the laundry the site was turned over to the city in reimbursement of advances.

The space bought from the Biemer estate consisted of the site of the former Rough pool hall, which was torn down by the city to make way for the present alley from Front street between the Treat Grocery and the Kujawa tavern. The space extended in the rear north of the building. The space bought from Charles Boyle consisted of the Evans' store, and extended back east to the strip bought from the Bremer estate.

The city engineer, Clyde Williams, reported at the Monday night meeting that the space then owned by the city would properly accommodate not more than 25 cars, allowing for proper parking so that cars could conveniently enter and leave at all times. The doubled area now owned by the city will be surveyed and charted into parking spaces and parking will be hereafter regulated by city.

### Bill Desenberg Is Delegate Democrat State Convention

The Democratic county convention for the purpose of naming delegates to the state convention was held Wednesday evening at Niles, with Dean Moiley of New Trop as chairman.

The main address was given by Harvey Hope Jarvis, Benton Harbor, congressional candidate. Jarvis declared that the state Republican party is hopelessly split by dissension, and that the Democratic state ticket never had a better chance to win than it has now under the leadership of Murray D. Van Wagener, candidate for governor.

Candidates introduced in addition to Jarvis were Ben Rosenberg, St. Joseph, candidate for representative from the second district; Glover Hobart, Niles, candidate for sheriff; Warren Damon, candidate for register of deeds.

State convention delegates from Buchanan and nearby districts were Buchanan and Buchanan township, William Desenberg, delegate; Agnes Bennett, alternate; Niles, Bertrand and Galien townships, Guyver Hobart, delegate; Con Allen, alternate.

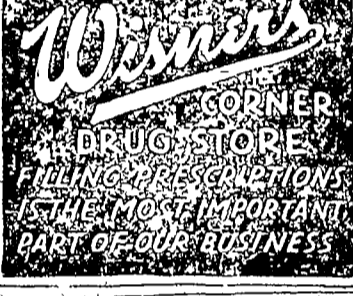

Call G. I. Education Immense Success

(Continued from page 1) acting to such leadership and such wealth of mechanical production with a high degree of competence and alertness. The war was practically won by high school and college boys plus the immense numbers of 'natural mechanics' among the tanks of our personnel... Of all those factors, the degree of literacy and of trained skills in learning of the high school graduates and college men was the greatest asset. For no other army and navy in this or any other war of human history ever possessed such a highly trained level of competence... It was demonstrated by an experiment tried at the University of Houston. That institution was called on to organize a unit of electrical engineers for military service. The heads of the institution decided to disregard all previous training in electrical work and to select the unit from the men in the highest bracket in scholastic rating, whether they knew a volt from an ampere. The experiment proved a brilliant success. What the men lacked in knowledge at the beginning they more than made up in their ability to learn... Of course the general level of success of the young men of America was raised by the fact that our youth for decades back have been born 'gadgets', American youth gadget-crazy in peace. And World War II was a war of gadgets. Thrown into the immense collection of gadgets that is modern military equipment, the American boy was more at home than the boys of any other country. He was sturdily in his native element... We suffered considerably, however, by cutting short the highest training of an immense number of young men. For scientific progress is distinctly a 'follow-through' proposition, which requires large bodies of youth flowing into research at all times, providing the follow-up for the work of the top men. Effective research in peace or war requires an ever recruited army of youth or the efforts of the leaders in research are in the position of a fowler that has been 'left off at the foot'.
