In his withdrawal announcement, Heward said, in part, "Having had the benefit of several days of inquiry and consultation since the primary and thus being able to have made a thorough and detailed study and evaluation of the current situation, it is my decision to withdraw as a write-in candidate for sheriff on the Republican banner in the Nov 5, general election."

Heward had been criticized for his move from several quarters, including the leadership of the county Republican organization. Sheriff Griese and two other candidates were defeated in the August 6 primary by Forrest "Nick" Jewell.

Three Injured In 2-Car Crash

Three Chicago youths were injured in a two-car accident at the intersection of Cleveland and Warren Woods roads, north of Gallen Monday, shortly before 5:00 p.m.

The injuries took place, said Sheriff's Deputy Eugene Eklund, when a car driven by Gintaras B. Karaltis, 17, Union Pier, was struck by a car driven by Lawrence H. Varda, 31, South Bend, Ind.

Eklund reported Karaltis, east bound on Warren Woods road, said he stopped for the stop sign at Cleveland, did not see a car coming and pulled out into the intersection and the path of the Varda auto which was being driven south on Cleveland.

Injured in the crash were Dana Zukauskas, 15, Algis Puras, 13, and Danis Kaslys, 17, all of Chicago. All were taken to Michigan City's Memorial hospital where doctors reported Zukauskas had two broken collar bones, Puras has a possible concussion and had suffered a loss of memory and Kaslys had received lacerations and contusions.

Two other passengers in the Karaltis car sustained minor cuts and refused medical treatment.

Karaltis was issued a summons for failure to yield the right of way.

Sewer Public Hearing Set For September 23

A public hearing on the special assessment by the City of Buchanan against property owners on Victory street between Arctic and Elizabeth streets for a sanitary sewer, has been set for Monday, Sept 23, by the City Commission.

The action was taken by Commission at its regular bi-monthly meeting Monday evening in Commission chambers at City hall.

The body had previously taken action declaring the necessity of the sewer. The sewer improvement assessment for four parcels of land with 60 foot frontages is expected to be \$1055 per front foot.

Clayton Spaulding, Buchanan township clerk, reports the regular September meeting of the Buchanan township board will be held Tuesday, Sept 3, instead of Labor Day.

Volt Regulator Causes Blackout

A power outage occurred last Thursday night at about 11:58 when a voltage regulator failed at the Buchanan hydro station. All of Buchanan was without electricity for about 25 minutes while the bad regulator was removed from service. The main transformer was returned to service at 12:18 Friday morning.

The trouble was apparently due to lightning during the last storm which weakened the lightning arrester on the regulator. I&M crews worked until early Friday morning to install a new regulator.

In Urban Renewal

City Manager Robert Faulhaber announced the receipt of a Major Completion grant to the city for urban renewal. The grant reduces the city's urban renewal debt of \$153,771.90 by \$67,879.35 and the accrued interest of \$17,735.53 by \$10,259.65.

The grant, received from the government's Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) involved no transfers of monies but rather indicated a credit against monies owed HUD by the city, according to Raymond T. Suabedissen, city Clerk-Treasurer.

Seek Thru Street

Among visitors present for the evening session were four members of the Board of Trustees of the United Methodist church, 728 N. Detroit St. Joining the group was the church's pastor, Rev. Keith Laidler. John Kelley, speaking for the group, presented to the commission a petition calling for the development of N. Detroit street from Fourth street to the dead end southern tip of N. Detroit street in the Paden park subdivision.

Kelley, president of the church's trustee board, said the development would provide easier access to the area for emergency vehicles, deliveries, and, not incidentally, members of the church.

City Attorney B. R. DeSenberg pointed out to the Commission two methods by which the request could be carried out if the body deemed it should be done. One would be with the cooperation of the property owner and the alternative would be condemnation.

He added, however, recent cases in state courts have forced cities to not only indicate by allegation that the land is needed for the benefit of the city but also to prove the necessity of acquiring such land.

Commissioner Maurice Nelson, speaking as a private citizen, pointed out to the group that subdivisions are not generally using straight streets and future development of the property in question might see an extension of Cayuga street rather than Detroit St.

The property across which the street development would take place is owned by Mrs. Esther Nelson.

The Commission accepted the petition and indicated that discussion of the request would take place on a future agenda of the body.

Water Policy Set

Other visitors included Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Beard of 811 Terre Coupe Rd., who requested the Commission make city water available to them. The Beards do not live in the city, but their property five acres is located immediately south of the city cemetery.

Beard advised the Commission that a water line has already been run outside the city and comes with 69 feet of his eastern property line, serving two non-city dwellings. Mayor Kenneth Witt told Beard "No water without annexation has been our policy in the past."

2,455 Students Expected On Opening Day Of School

More than 2,450 students are expected to enroll at Buchanan schools next Tuesday. The figure, which includes the kindergarten thru the twelfth grade, is slightly above last year's anticipated figure of 2,408.

Among the largest increases is the senior class which is 35 more than were graduated last June. Donald B. Trull, high school principal, pointed out, however, that last year's graduating class was a "small" class thus accentuating the increase in anticipated enrollment for the Class of '69.

Superintendent Richard Dougherty, who released the figures, said additional enrollments are being received daily and more are anticipated from people new in the district who have not previously made their presence known.

Public Hearing Set In Clear Lake Action

Property owners at Clear lake will have their opportunity to react to recommendations made by the Department of Conservation regarding boating and water safety on the lake at a public hearing set for Tuesday, Sept 3.

The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Buchanan township hall, according to Clayton Spaulding, township clerk.

The recommendation of the department reads:

"On the waters of Clear lake, Buchanan township, Berrien county, State of Michigan, no operator of any motor boat, during the period from 6:30 p.m. to 10:00 a.m. of the following day, shall:

"a) operate such motor boat at high speed, which means a

speed at or above which the boat reaches a planing condition, or

"b) have in tow or otherwise assist in the propulsion of a person on water skis, water sled, surf boat or other similar contrivances."

The recommendations by the department are an outgrowth of a meeting held Aug 16 at the township hall to seek comments from citizens and to discuss possible recommendations for the proper usage of the lake.

According to Act 303, P.A. 1967, the department has the power to restrict the use of vessels, regulate speed, regulate use of water skis or similar contrivances, regulate hours of use, regulate areas or prescribe

any other regulation relating to the use or operation of vessels or contrivances which will protect the public safety.

With the Conservation department's recommendation now before them, the Buchanan trustee and Supervisor Ivan Price have three alternatives. They may approve, disapprove or table the recommendation.

Should they approve or table action, the recommendation automatically becomes law. Disapproval of the recommendation would require another public hearing for the benefit of the department and should no hearing be held, the recommendation would also become law.

The department reported it had conducted an investigation of water uses of Clear lake prior to the Aug 16 meeting.


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Major Burkett Wins Top Level Citations

Air Force Major William M Burkett now assigned as a staff engineer under the Deputy Chief of Staff for Civil Engineering at the headquarters of the Aerospace Defense Command, Colorado Springs, Colo., returned from duty in Vietnam in October of 1967.

For his outstanding duty accomplishments in Southeast Asia the Air Force awarded him the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star and the Air Medal. Accompanying the Air Medal were thirteen oak leaf clusters which indicate the Major was the winner of the coveted award on thirteen separate occasions.

Burkett is the son of Mr and Mrs. William J. Burkett, 607 W Third St.

The citation accompanying the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross, one of the Air Force's highest awards, pointed out that Burkett "distinguished himself by extraordinary achievement while participating in an aerial flight as a Forward Air Controller in support of 'Operation Junction City' in Vietnam on Feb 26, 1967.

The citation continues "On that date, Major Burkett directed two immediate strikes into a heavily fortified Vietcong automatic weapons position. Friendly forces had already sustained numerous casualties as their attempt to assault the position prior to requesting air support.

"Major Burkett accurately directed low drag, high release point ordnance into a very narrow hostile corridor between two friendly elements despite increasingly poor target area visibility and intense automatic weapons ground fire."

The citation goes on to explain that Burkett "positioned himself so as to insure that each piece of ordnance was placed exactly on target, thus reducing the hazard to friendly ground troops and increasing the effectiveness of each strike.

"In so doing, he fearlessly subjected himself to continuous heavy automatic weapons fire throughout the two strikes he controlled," the citation points out.

Major Burkett won the Bronze Star in southeast Asia between October 20, 1966 and September 9, 1967.

In his stateside headquarters position, Major Burkett is often called upon to brief various individuals concerning development within the Aerospace Defense Command. As a staff engineer he is responsible for researching and posting and projecting of manning statistics dealing with the command.

Married to the former Charlotte A. Batchelor, daughter of Mr and Mrs Wyman Batchelor, 114 W Fourth St, the Major, his wife and two children, Jeanne, 15 and Billy, 10, reside in Colorado Springs.

Major Burkett has a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from the University of New Mexico and a master of science degree from the University of Missouri.

Ent Air Force base, at which the Major is stationed, is located within the city of Colorado Springs and serves as the nerve center for aerospace defense of the north American continent. It is from Ent that this international system of aerospace defense is planned and controlled.

Buchanan Chief of Police David H. Shubinski announced Monday the resignation of Patrolman James Kasa. The resignation is effective Friday.

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

Calving Points Way To Better Milk Production

Most Michigan dairymen can obtain greater profits by shortening the calving intervals of cows in their herds.

Clare M. Musgrove, Berrien County extension agricultural agent, says a twelve-month calving interval, a 55-day period, with a 305 day lactation period is ideal for maximum milk production.

Studies show delays in calving interval past 12 months cost dairymen about 70 cents per cow per day, says Musgrove. Therefore, a dairyman with a 50-cow herd with an average delay of one month per cow in calving, is losing \$20 a cow or \$1,000 a year in lost milk production.

The extension agent suggests dairymen have good breeding records and production testing to achieve greater profits. He also recommends (1) waiting at least 60 days after calving before rebreeding, (2) observing cows closely at least twice daily for estrus and (3) having cows with more than three services checked by a veterinarian.

Migrant Labor On Earning Par With Farmers

Average migrant earnings in 1967 exceeded the average for people living on farms according to M. J. Buschlen of the Michigan Agricultural Service association. Appearing before the Michigan Civil Rights commission in Grand Rapids, Buschlen stated that data by the federal government and the state of Michigan show migrants average \$1,700 yearly while farmers average less than \$1,700.

Buschlen, a farm labor placement specialist of long experience, pointed to the continuing decline of yearly farm income now at its lowest point since the depression of the early 1930's.

Noting the need for improved income for both producer and migrant he said, "The consumer is most sensitive to the cost of food which is purchased. Any increase in the cost of production (to complete loops, etc.) and absorbed by the producer and will be extremely difficult to pass on to consumers. In other words, farmers and farm workers are caught in the same economic dilemma."

Referring to the fact that 40% or more of the production cost of fruit and vegetables is labor, he expressed the opinion that low farm prices for this production would not allow all the desired improvements.

He also expressed the opinion that there is need to improve the "mechanism" of the job market for seasonal workers to assure them continuous employment. At the same time, he said that a guaranteed seasonal wage is not only impractical, it would eliminate many present job opportunities. With advancement of farm mechanization, he said that displaced workers have no alternative except to migrate to the already over-crowded cities.



Vet of Khe Sanh Returns Home

Maine Lance Corporal John E. Matlock has returned from 18 months combat duty in South Vietnam, where he was under

fire in the February massive enemy attack against Phu Bai, near Hue, and earlier had been among the Maine companies surrounded and cut off in the defense and siege of Khe Sanh.

A security guard with the 26th Marines, Third Marine Division, Matlock served at Khe Sanh from November, 1967, through January. Only two hours after he had been airlifted out of the isolated stronghold, his former quarters were completely destroyed by enemy heavy artillery, and he was one of the many individual Marines who received a Presidential Unit citation following the Khe Sanh offensive. The citation states in part:

"For extraordinary heroism in action against the North Vietnamese army forces during the battle for Khe Sanh . . . The enemy, deployed to take advantage of short lines of communication, rugged mountainous terrain, jungle, and adverse weather conditions, was determined to destroy the Khe Sanh Combat Base. The enemy forces were denied the military and psychological victory they so desperately sought. By their gallant fighting spirit and their countless individual acts of heroism, the men of the 26th Marines established a record of illustrious courage and determination in keeping with the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and the United States Naval Service."

In Phu Bai, the fortunate Marine corporal survived with only a finger wound an enemy barrage that saw two officers at his side killed outright, and he received a naval citation for action in that battle. Earlier Matlock, guarding a convoy, had just passed a point on the road to Hue where a bus, loaded with Vietnamese, hit a ground mine a few minutes later, killing all aboard.

Convinced that American forces are needed and are morally justified in being in South Vietnam, Matlock originally signed up to return to that country after his present leave, but because the papers were apparently misplaced at the overseas headquarters, he has been reassigned instead to Camp Lejeune, N.C. to serve his final seven months of Marine duty.

Matlock is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Hollingsworth of 124 West Alexander St.

A former student at Buchanan high school, John is the son of Mrs. John Campbell, now of Yellville, Ark. He is married to the former Audrey Nobles of this city, and after visiting in Buchanan, the couple and their daughter Tracy will leave for North Carolina Sept. 18.

State Departments Making Plans For Labor Day Rush

Anticipating unusually heavy traffic over the Labor Day weekend, the Michigan State Police and the Department of State Highways are making special preparations.

Sgt. Marvin Teshka, commander of the Niles Post of the State Police, reports the department will operate special highway patrols from noon, Friday, to midnight, Monday.

Department aircraft, weather permitting, and motor vehicle inspection personnel will participate in the holiday police patrols.

Henry E. Stafseth, State highway director, has issued instructions to district and project engineers to halt all road construction projects by 5 p.m. Friday. The orders include instructions to eliminate all one-way traffic bottlenecks and to inspect temporary routes, signs and barricades where work is in progress.

Predictions Grim

Technicians of the Highway Department's Traffic and Safety section estimate that motorists will travel a total of 512 million miles over Michigan's city streets and rural highways between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight, Monday, an increase of eight per cent over the same period last year. Nearly 152 million miles of that total will be driven on Monday, an increase of 10 per cent over the total mileage driven on Labor Day of 1967.

According to their predictions, all main routes to the north will carry heavy to extremely heavy traffic from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Friday.

They also predict that all main routes in the western part of the state will carry heavy concentrations of travel trailer and boat trailer traffic northbound

on Friday afternoon and evening and southbound on Monday from noon to 10 p.m.

The current boom in Coho salmon fishing from Ludington, Manistee, Frankfort and other Lake Michigan ports will contribute to the concentration of boat trailers on state highways leading to the area.

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For a pair of Buchanan men, the spring and summer have been filled with the smell of gasoline and the sound of tires screeching against the asphalt of drag tracks in the Midwest.

The focal point of all this action is a little Chevy II, the size of which belies the equipment with which it has been modified.

Jerry Donley son of Mr and Mrs Howard "Pete" Donley, and Steve Couchman, son of Mr and Mrs Randall Couchman, 908 Teite Coupe, have been working with the little Chevy for the last year and now have their sights on the 14th National Drag Racing championships taking place since yesterday thru Saturday at Raceway park in Indianapolis. The national finals are set from Saturday thru Labor day.

Donley is a Junior at Ferris State university and is in his third year of study in automotive trade technology. Couchman, too, has spent three years at Ferris following a similar course of study.

They will race in the "B" class for modified production cars.

The Chevy II was literally torn apart after being purchased on July 1, 1967, and back together it is a pot pourri of components aimed at 0-115 mph for a quarter mile in 11.5 seconds.

Special Conversion

Topping the stock 327 cu in Chevrolet engine are dual 650 cfm Holly carbs. Filling out the power train is a Muncie 4 speed transmission with a gear ratio of 5.14 to 1 and a Ford Mustang rear axle.

All of this set in a modified frame which replaces the Chevy's less practical unitized frame.

The converted deuce will run on 9.00-15 racing slicks with a 7 inch road/tire surface, made by the M&H Tire company, and mounted on Cragar wheels equipped with special police brakes for high speed stops. Says Couchman, who serves as the head mechanic, "the lining is as hard as the drum on these wheels."

Donley and Couchman use a 40-weight Valvoline racing oil and the "327" is fueled with a standard premium gasoline.

Called "The Deuce on the

Loose," the little Chevy II is "sharp" with reconditioning that includes a new interior complete with a new package of instrumentation.

A Mark—No Record

The team, complemented by their pit crew of Larry Money, Pete Masten and Mack Myers, have not set their mark completely out of reach. At the Indianapolis meeting, the crew is looking to 0-115 mph in about 11.6 or 7 seconds. Their best to date is about 11.9 seconds for the dash. An 11.4 second mark won the meet last year.

One reason given for the inability to hit the low mark in time, they say, is the lack of the correct racing tires and a series of small failures—shifting problems, and fan belts that would not stay on. However, the crew feels these problems are under control now and is enthusiastic on his chances in the Hoosier capital.

Their enthusiasm will be put to the test because they will have one car of an estimated

1,500 to 2,000 cars attempting to qualify for all classes. But the experience they have gained by being out every weekend, racing since April, they feel will put them in the run for cash prizes.

At the Light

When the "Deuce on the Loose" faces the "Christmas tree" at the starting line (the tree is a vertical bank of lights used by dragsters to get the race underway), it has already been pushed to within 30-40 yards of that line. Donley has cleaned the tires by "laying down" a short patch of rubber, by spinning his tires and letting the rough asphalt clean them, and is keeping his tachometer "revving" at about 3,000 rpm by lightly pumping the accelerator.

As the lights on the "tree" make their descent and hit the bottom, the cars scream from the starting blocks, with the "Deuce" "revving" up to 7,000 rpm and shifting gears at 7,200. Donley has found that the "Deuce" responds best at 7,000 rpm. A dynamometer and track experience have helped lead to the decision.

Whatever the outcome in Indianapolis, there is a "Deuce on the Loose" and Buchananites with a particular interest in drag racing activity will have an eye peeled for its accomplishments.


