

The Public Library Is As American As Corn On The Cob

The special committee which was named for the purpose of raising funds for the erection of a separate building as a home for the Buchanan library met last week and completed its own organization for the special purpose of soliciting and accepting money for the library building fund. The new status of the committee enables it to assure potential donors that their gifts will be entirely tax-free.

The committee wishes to stress that the new library building will not be paid for out of taxes, but will be a gift to the city, through the generosity of those contributing. The committee which is in charge of raising the funds includes Wayne Castle (chairman), Arthur Anderson, Atty. Desenberg, Wayne Stubbs, Baidley Oman, Mrs. C. C. Snyder, A. H. Kahn. Their procedure is in keeping with the general pattern of library promotion in America. Public spirit and generosity will build the building, and give it to the city, which will thereafter maintain its services from taxes. The latter is what the city has been doing many years.

Other nations have older and sometimes larger libraries than those of America, because of longer periods of accumulation of materials, or greater munificence to single institutions. But the great library giver of all times was Andrew Carnegie who built 3,000 libraries in as many towns and cities of the United States, thus \$10,000,000 to libraries in Scotland and other donations over the world. And the universal library for all the people is built by private generosity and maintained by public taxes, is an achievement peculiar to America.

The American library is still the greatest instrument of "continuing" of adult education. It is distinctly "American" — as American as corn on the cob.

Car Gets Hot Takes a Dip in the St. Joe.

Three Buchanan boys narrowly escaped a damp death in the St. Joseph River at 3:50 p. m. Monday when the car in which they were northbound on a fishing trip went out of control at a curve about 1 1/2 miles northwest of the Indiana & Michigan hydro-electric plant and plunged down the river bank, where it was brought to an abrupt stop by a large tree.

The three boys involved were Louis Erwin, Jr., 16, and Donald Erwin, 10, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Erwin, Sr., of 314 Fulton street, and Edwin Waldo, Jr., 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Waldo, Sr., of 312 Fulton street. The car was a 1951 Ford belonging to Floyd Melton, route 2, Buchanan, and was loaned to the boys by his son, Clarence Melton, 18.

The state police from the Niles post were told that the car had just completed a curve when it went out of control. Louis Erwin, Jr., who was the driver, received a fracture of the left leg, possible broken rib, possible internal injuries and deep cuts on the right arm. Donald Erwin incurred a fractured left leg, fractured left arm, and a lacerated forehead. Edwin Waldo, Jr., in the back seat, received only a small head abrasion and was released from the Pawtong hospital after treatment. The two Erwin boys remained.

Here we have with us Elmer Adolph A. 1/c and his charming wife, Keiko and daughter, Mary Ann, just arrived from Japan and now guests at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Adolph, 805 Chippewa street.

Adolph is of course back home again, but everything is new to his wife, the former Keiko Ishibashi, whom he married in Japan July 7, 1953. Mrs. Adolph Jr., manages to smile a very charming smile, but it is evident that the impact of America is too great for her to report impressions immediately. She is impressed most outdoors by the many autos, one to every home. In Japan they ride bicycles—very few have cars.

Inside the home it is the modern appliances that take her eye—most of all the electric sweeper. In the Japanese home sweeping is a problem, as the floor is covered with small mats and the careful housewives sweep them often, after sprinkling them with tea leaves to gather the dust. Then there is the refrigerator, which she goes to again and again just to study its strange magic.

There is also the ironing board. In Japan they may have electric irons, but they iron on a board on the floor. The first time she ever used an ironing board mounted on legs and shaped to accommodate the garments was on shipboard coming across the Pacific.

Two months-old Mary Ann may have some impressions but she is saying nothing so far. The family will visit at the Adolph home here 45 days, leaving in early August for his post on Presque Isle, Maine, where he will be located with the Air Defense Command until Jan. 7, 1955 when he will be discharged after four years of service. He enlisted in the air force Jan. 8, 1951, and left for Japan June 21, 1951, serving there in airplane maintenance at an air base on Japanese soil.

Howard Gets Feet Back On Ground At Old Home Here

Lt. Col. Howard McClellan and his family arrived Wednesday, June 23, for a visit until the middle of July at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sam McClellan, Red Bud Trail, and of his wife's mother, Mrs. Martha Trapp and family.

Howard and family are en route from the Naval War College at Newport, R. I., where he had been stationed three years, to his new base at San Bernardino, Calif. His family consists of his wife and six children, Bill, Jim, Tom, Maryann, Daniel and Patricia. Mrs. McClellan is the former Shirley Trapp of Buchanan.

"I'm back home again at a half-way point in my life," said Howard. "I spent 18 years here before I left home and I've spent 18 years away, nearly all in the air. Shortly after graduation Howard went to Texas and within a few weeks he had entered commercial plane service.

He joined the air force in World War II and flew transport planes across the Atlantic from 1941 to 1944. In 1945 he flew on bombing expeditions into Japan until the surrender of that nation.

He was in the occupation air force in Germany from 1946 through 1949, helping fly the airlift into Berlin when the Russians tried to seal off that city.

At his new base he will be given administrative duties in the Flying Research Section of the Inspector General's office. This will be the national clearing house for evaluating causes of all accidents in the U. S. Air force. They will receive reports of all mishaps, large and small, and will attempt to find patterns of plane behavior and other factors that may lead to elimination of accident causes.

With over thirteen years behind him in army air force service, Howard expects to spend his life in it. "There is something about getting up there in the wild blue yonder that gets into a man's veins," said McClellan. "I love it and will make it my life career."

Assessment Requirements Eased By City

The proposed Ordinance 120 completed the gauntlet of hearings and became a part of the law of the city as a result of the action of the city commission Monday night. The ordinance deals with the easing of special assessment requirements.

It provides that a discount shall be allowed on special assessments if they are paid in full before the date due.

It eliminates a penalty on delinquent special payments and provides that such payments shall be transferred to the tax roll.

It provides for refunds on special assessment payments if the amount raised exceeds the amount actually required by 5% or more. It also provides for an extra assessment if the cost of the project exceeds the cost charged in the assessment by more than 5%.

Provision is made that notices be sent by registered mail to the property owners affected prior to construction of sidewalks, at the property owners expense.

Approve Sanitary Sewers On Arctic, Fulton, Elizabeth

The assessment roll was confirmed for the construction of 12-inch sanitary sewers on Arctic and Fulton streets and an 8-inch sanitary sewer on Elizabeth st. The city treasurer has been authorized to send out the first bills. Construction work will be done in the spring or summer of 1955.

State Police Warn Of Heaviest July 4th Rush

With the heaviest Fourth of July traffic in history expected this weekend, State Police operations have been geared to concentrate patrol coverage in the areas of congestion and high accident rates and pass days of all officers have been canceled to provide maximum enforcement strength.

"But even with the best efforts of every enforcement agency, we can still expect a heavy accident toll unless drivers cooperate by doing the very best job they know how at the wheel," said Commissioner Joseph A. Childs. "Traffic will be heavy and driving will be much more hazardous."

"Our Memorial holiday record indicated improvement and showed that when they wanted to drivers can do better," Childs stated. "It is our hope they make an even greater effort this weekend to stay alive."

Childs urged drivers to plan their trips so that they do not have to rush, use extreme care in passing and "watch out for the other driver, because he can cause an accident, too."

"The only way to avoid an accident," he said, "is by driving as if your life depended upon it, because it does."

All State Police enlisted personnel, including detectives and others on special assignment, will be on duty, which will mean a 20% increase in patrol strength over the weekend.

For Your Safety Obey Traffic Rules

Chief Jack Krugh states that parking in Memorial Field for the July 4th fireworks will start at 5 p. m., and that any cars found parking in any part of the field prior to that hour will be driven out by the owners or towed out by the police. The reason is that all parking for the evening program must be done systematically and under the direction of the police and their helpers.

The greater part of the parking will be done in the large level section. All cars parking in this lower section will enter through the gate at the intersection of Chicago and Terre Coupe.

West Chicago street opposite the park will be a one-way street after 5 p. m. with all traffic headed east, after that hour, and parking allowed only on the south side. Smith street will be blocked off at Phelps and Chicago and will be used for parking after 5 p. m., with all traffic headed east after that hour, and parking allowed only on the south side.

Parking in the upper section in the northeast section of the field west of the gymnasium will be permitted after 5 p. m., with the only entrance from Chicago street.

Cars parked in the lower part of the field and along Smith street will not be able to leave these areas until after the fireworks. However emergency vehicles will be available in the event that anyone in the crowd has an urgent summons to leave.

The police request that all motorists take pains to observe and obey all orders issued by the traffic officers in charge. It is expected that the police will receive assistance from members of service clubs.

Politicians Again Eye Mich. As Key To National Elections

Michigan is a key state this year in the nation's political picture.

Campaigns for the fall election will be watched with considerable interest by the country's political dopesters in hope they can predict national trends from what happens in the Wolverine state.

Much is at stake. If Michigan stays in the Republican camp or goes Democratic it will have great national significance. Huge sums of money will be spent by both parties. More delicate maneuvering will be planned, harder fighting can be expected.

Big danger for both sides is a possible split in party ranks.

Republicans are sure that controversy between GOP candidates in previous primaries produced wounds too deep to heal by general election time. They attri-

bute William's victories in past campaigns to such intra-party fights.

They are taking great pains this year that candidates campaign against the Democrats in the primary — not each other.

While GOP leaders hold their breaths hoping that their candidates will stick to what they call "an understanding" not to fight among themselves, Democrat leaders are holding their heads in fear that James Hoffa will lead a rebellion against the Williams leadership.

Hoffa, Detroit AFL labor leader who is described as being unhappy with what he considers CIO domination of the Democratic party, has taken some positive steps that worry the Williams administration more than a little.

The challenge to leadership of the Williams faction leaves the governor's group wondering what manner of "enemy" they have within their ranks — and how far he will go to have his way. Williams is reported to feel that the appearance of George S. Fitzgerald, former national committeeman and affiliate of Hoffa, is an attempt by the teamster leader to "establish a crown prince of his own" in what might be a Democratic year. Fitzgerald filed petitions as Democratic candidate for Lt. Governor.

Republicans will make what happy use they can out of this discord. They can be expected to remind voters of the "AFL-CIO fight for control of the Democratic party."

John Feikens, GOP State Central committee chairman, has already announced that he recalls Fitzgerald's remarks after a Democratic county convention — he had "just seen socialism, using Communism's methods, take over Michigan Democratic party." This refers to an old intra-party fight. It also shows that hard feeling has existed for a long time.

"Fourth terms" is an expression that's apt to pop up in the campaign. It will be used, in the words of Feikens, "to stress the fact that Williams is seeking the same position too often for the interests of good government."

Other Republican campaign arguments will favor a "tremendous highway program, intelligently planned and financed," improved aid for schools; general tax revision.

Michigan taxpayers spend one billion dollars a year for state and local taxes," says Feikens. "We want to see that taxes are collected on a fair basis and that the money is spent with maximum efficiency."

Democrats have a few weapons of their own. They hope to hit hard with several points.

The present economic condition will be described as an "overall loss of prosperity" — and it will be blamed on Republican policies.

They will refer to their highway building program as "Tomorrow's Road Today" and are expected to make hay over recent scandals involving Highway Department funds.

Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler will become a target of marked importance. Democratic spokesmen have often charged that Ziegler runs the Highway Department "like a kingdom unto itself." They point to Route 43, "a road supposed to extend from Lansing to Grand Rapids, which dies in a cornfield." "This road is being built so slowly," they claim, "that the Lansing end will be worn out before the Grand Rapids end is paved."

"Is this," they intend to ask, "an example of Republican intelligent road programming?"

Both parties will claim credit for popular legislation, blame the rest upon the opposition. There is always some justification for this since, in the final analysis, both Legislature and Governor must agree if bills become law with the chief executive's signature.

When the significance of the August 3 primary is studied by party officials, and the state conventions, held soon after, are adjourned, the chips will be down for the big battle of the general election in November.

Regardless of the outcome, it will be a fascinating contest to anyone who wants to watch it develop.

100,000 Churches Will Be Needed In Next 21 Years

"The United States will need more than 100,000 new churches at a cost of nearly \$8 billion within the next 21 years," according to Warren J. Taussig, a director of Church-Industry Relations for the National Association of Manufacturers.

Experts in the U.S. Census Bureau anticipate a 40 million increase in our national population by 1975. NAM's Research department estimated this population boom will bring with it a 28-million increase in church enrollment.

Taussig analyzes the scope of the challenge in these terms:

(1) The need by churches of all faiths to build and equip more than 100,000 more structures.

(2) The need to train approximately 75,000 more clergymen.

Taussig said, "the problem posed by record population growth is common to all phases of the national picture, particularly churches, schools and industry."

The Michigan-Ohio region has one of the highest per capita church populations of any comparable region in America.

Although the problem of providing church buildings is great, Taussig points out, one of the most important elements of a national church program is the availability of trained clergymen and staff to expanded facilities.

He estimated that by 1975 it will be necessary to have 260,000 active clergymen, 75,000 more than 1952.

Using statistics furnished by the NAM Research department, Taussig explained that our current population boom is adding one million persons a year to our labor force. By 1975 the number of employables will have risen from 66 million in 1952 to 88.6 million.

The Story of Buchanan



Work, Wages, and Life in Buchanan In 1870's, 1880's

The Buchanan area may have been bursting from its seams with opportunities during that golden era of furniture-making in Buchanan from 1865 to shortly after 1880. The Galien Woods, a marvelously rich source of the finest hardwoods, seemed at first a veritable Comstock Lode of materials for woodworking industry. High wheat prices during and following the Civil War built many a substantial farm fortune.

But underneath this veneer of well-being there was a living mass of hardship that would seem unbearable slavery today. As steam power became increasingly common, the units of industry grew larger, and as a result the law of averages decreed fewer employers and more employed. The pay of laborers was meager, gagged in what the average wage will buy today. "The good old days" are in that sense a fairy tale. Common labor received a dollar a day during the slackier parts of the 1870's, and there were in-

terminable and unexplainable layoffs. John Holmes noted in the Record of May 3, 1877, that wages for common labor were \$1 per day, while flour sold at \$12 a barrel (196 pounds).

Kerosene, the almost universal source of illumination both in homes and street lamps, cost 30¢ a gallon. It can be bought in Buchanan today for 23 cents a gallon.

The price of labor went up and down like other prices, according to supply and demand. At times it seemed that labor was one of the commodities that fared worst on the market. For years after the Civil War a bushel of wheat bought a man's labor for a day, and even more when wheat prices were up to \$3 and over per bushel. These were bonanza days for the farmers, who built the palatial brick homes of the more prosperous, and later came to town as the capitalists and promoters of enterprise of their times.

The Record noted in the issue of June 11, 1874, that the employees of the Buchanan Manufacturing Company had voted the previous Monday to refuse to accept a cut of 10% in wages. Predominating wages in the plant were \$1.50 and \$1.75 per day. They met again Tuesday night and organized a Mechanics' and

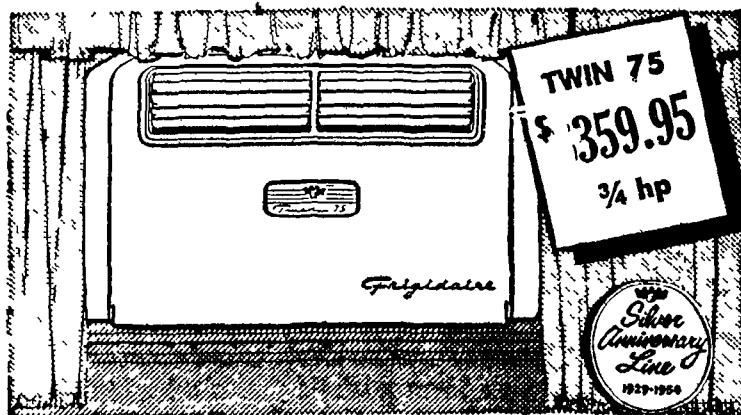

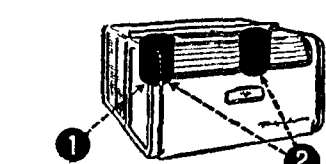

Work in the stores was even more confining and exhausting. The Record noted in the issue of August 5, 1873, that the Niles merchants advertised they were closing their stores at 8 p.m. except on Saturdays (when they stayed open longer). Editor Kinyery commented: "This should be initiated everywhere, and thus give merchants and clerks a little time away from business affairs."

The pioneer store hours were 14 hours a day. The case of Thomas Wallin, son of Buchanan's first doctor, Charles Wallin, is typical. He was employed at the age of 14 as a clerk in the Stevens & Landon store, in Berrien Springs in 1847 and 1848. He slept in the store and was expected to have it warmed, swept and ready for business at 7 a.m. He remained in the store until 9 p.m. before closing. He received \$8 per month and board. He began his second year with a raise to \$10 a month, but his health broke soon afterwards and he went to work on a farm, where he regained it.

No laws, state or national, took any cognizance of wages or conditions of labor. Many children and young people were broken in health or killed by these conditions, but that was only a part of pioneer life. The fatalities were greatest among the young women. This was fate and its story is told mostly on the pioneer tombstones.

For men there was still the semblance of a frontier, up until about 1890. Meanwhile the men worked 12 to 12 1/2 hours a day in the factories and 14 hours daily in the shop and 14 hours in the stores, while their wives probably averaged nearer 16 hours daily, plus work on Sunday.

The Sunday usual program for the Buchanan family those days, according to the Record of June 25, 1874, was: church in the morning, heavy Sunday dinner afterwards, walk to the river in the afternoon. There were three paths to the river. One was by Main Street Road and then down the hill just past the Montague farm (now Sult Red Apple farm). Another was to walk out Main street to the point where it turns sharply northwest, and thence north along the fence line of what is now the Dr. Gamble farm. The last and doubtless most popular was a path on the north side of River street leading northeast to the river bridge. Out this path on pleasant summer days the men and women, lads and lassies, used to walk. There was no program of weed mowing and the heads of the ragweed, goldenrod and other weeds met each other across the path, powdering the skirts of the ladies with their dust, with a swishing sound, while they set the more susceptible sneezing.

There and back, supper, and perhaps evening church service—so went the "day of rest." Deadly dull, according to a present day viewpoint. But it is not unlikely that people had more inside their heads than now.

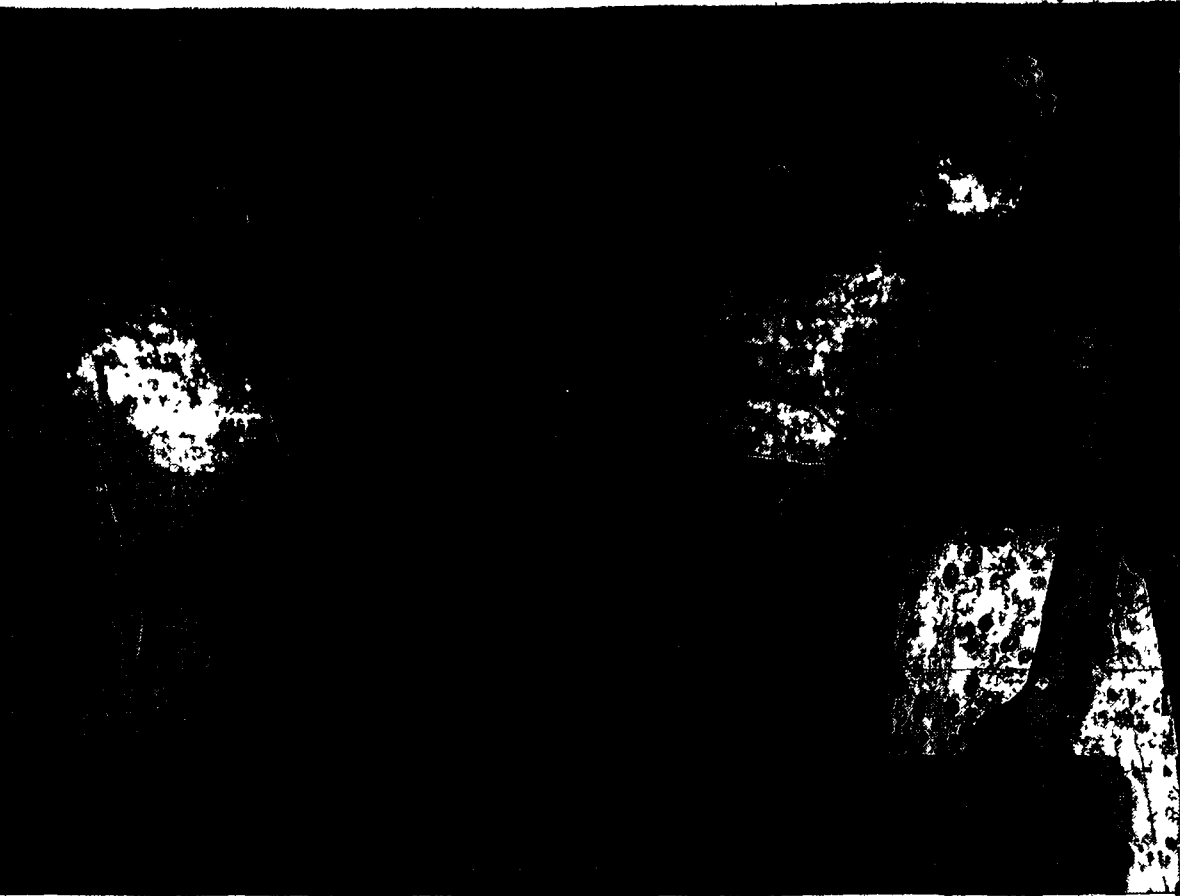

This Bulletin is to Acquaint You With the New Law in Michigan Requiring Directional Signals on Motor Vehicles.

Effective August 14, 1954

Every commercial vehicle, BOTH INTERSTATE and INTRASTATE (even those owner or operated by the United States Government, any state, or county, city, town, district or political subdivision of the State), in use on the highway, must be equipped with, and required turn signals must be given by, a signal lamp or lamps or other mechanical device when

(a) the distance from the center of the top of the steering post to the left outside limit of the body, cab, or load of such commercial exceeds 24 inches

OR

(b) the distance from the center of the top of the steering post to the rear limit of the body or load thereof exceeds 14 feet. The latter measurement shall apply to any single vehicle, also to any combination of vehicles

This is the cornerstone . . . the foundation of all our other beliefs in a person's right to live his own life, to speak for himself, to choose and change his leaders.

From it comes our hatred of those "isms" under which the individual has no value or importance as a person, but is only one of many unimportant people who have to live the way their leaders tell them to.

Coming directly from that first principle are two others that are also part of the foundation of Americanism.

2. We Believe that All Men should Enjoy Personal Freedom.

3. We Believe that All Men are Created Equal.

It is worth noting that the Declaration of Independence expressed the belief that "all men are *created equal*." It did not state or imply a belief that men *develop* equally or have equal *ability*, or that they should ever be forced to an exact equality of thought, speech or material possessions.

That would be equality without *freedom*. Americans have always believed the two should go together.

In our Constitution, and in other laws of our land, there are set down principles to protect the rights and freedoms and equality of individuals.

4. The Right to Freedom of Speech.

This includes freedom of the press, of radio, of motion pictures, of every means by which man may express his thoughts.

5. The Right to Freedom of Assembly.

As we believe in the right of individual action, so we believe that individuals should be free to act together.



6. The Right to Freedom of Worship.

Not only is the individual free to worship as he will, but religious themselves are free and equal.

7. The Right to Security of Person and Property.

Not just one, but three Amendments to the Constitution (4th, 5th and 14th) protect against illegal search and seizure, or loss of life, liberty, or property, without "due process of law."

8. The Right to Equal Protection before the Law.

As individuals are equally important, so laws must apply equally to all, without special privileges for any group.

9. The Right to Freedom from Slavery.

This includes "the right to quit," for no individual may be forced to work for another.

10. The Right to Petition the Government.

The right of the individual to "petition the government for redress of grievances" is evidence of the American belief that government is the servant, not the master, of the people.

11. The Right to Vote for people of your choice.

This is the individual's most potent weapon in the protection of his rights and freedoms . . . a weapon that to be effective must be constantly and wisely used.



Other Principles hold that every man has . . .

12. The Right to a Good Education.

13. The Right to Live where he pleases.

14. The Right to Work where he wants to.

15. The Right to Belong to an Organization.

16. The Right to Own Property.

17. The Right to Start his Own Business.

18. The Right to Manage his Own Affairs.

19. The Right to Make a Profit or to Fail, depending on his Own Ability.

There are other, similar rights of individual action which are Principles of America, but all of these individual rights may be combined in these two broad principles . . .

20. Every Man is entitled to Freedom and Equality of Opportunity.

21. Every Man may Earn his Living When, Where, and How he wants to.

There are also Limiting Principles . . .

Principles of individual *freedom* sometimes clash with those of individual *equality*. Therefore our rights as individuals must be limited, and those limitations are themselves *principles*.

22. The Rights of any Individual shall not Interfere with those of Other Individuals.

Your right to swing your arms stops where the other fellow's nose starts.

23. The Rights of any Individual shall not Interfere with the Welfare of the People.

Freedom of speech does not give the individual the right to shout "fire" in a crowded theatre.

24. Every Individual owes Obedience to the Laws under which he Lives.

The individual has the right to talk against a law, to work and vote to change that law, but NOT to disobey that law.

Principles that are Patterns of Behavior . . .

Many of our principles of individual freedom and equality are guaranteed to us by law. But we have other beliefs, other general rules of action and conduct that have grown to the status of principles. And these too, are foundations of Americanism.

25. A Man shall be Judged by his Own Record.

A man's family background, his race or his religion, is not as important as what that man himself can do, for Americans believe a man must stand on his own feet.

26. A Man is Free to Achieve as much as he can.

We believe that where any boy may become President, where any man may achieve greatness, there is the greatest incentive for every man to do his best.

27. To Achieve anything, a Man should be Willing to Work.

Americans have always known that "you don't get something for nothing," that to get anything takes a willingness to work.

28. Achievement also Depends upon the Ability to do a Good Job.

Add to "willingness to work" the ability to produce results and the combination is the basis for most individual achievement in our country.

29. Every Man has the Right to a Fair Share of the Results of his Work and his Ability.

Because of this belief, America has not only produced more goods, but they have been more fairly and more widely shared by more people than in any other country.

30. Security is the Ability of a Man to Provide for himself.

The only true security for any individual is the opportunity, the ability, and the determination to work and plan and save for his own present and future. Self-reliance is vital to individual independence and personal freedom. No man can be "proud and free" who depends on others for his security.

31. When an Individual cannot Provide his own Security, the Responsibility should be Assumed by Others.

We believe that no one should starve, or be without adequate clothing and shelter, so those who have more than their basic needs share the responsibility of providing the essentials of security for those who need help.

32. Each Individual must Deal Fairly with others.

Honesty, fairness, and personal integrity are virtues that help free and independent individuals get along with each other without losing their independence.

33. Fair and Free Competition is a Good Thing.

Americans have always believed that competition among individuals or groups encourages greater effort which in turn brings greater benefits to all.

34. Cooperation among Individuals is Vital.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER has said "The freedom to compete vigorously accompanied by a readiness to cooperate wholeheartedly for the performance of community and national functions, together make our system the most productive on earth."

Principles of Individual Responsibility . . .

Freedom for individuals carries with it an equal responsibility to use that freedom wisely. If we wish to remain free, we must faithfully fulfill this responsibility.

35. The Individual is Responsible for himself and his Family.

He must protect them and provide for their present and future well-being.

36. The Individual has Responsibilities to the Groups of which he is a Part.

He must give of his best to his community, his church, his employer, his union, and to every group in which individuals cooperate for their mutual benefit.

37. The Individual has Responsibilities to his Country.

He must be an active citizen, interesting himself in local, state, and national government, voting wisely, thinking and speaking and acting to preserve and strengthen freedom, equality and opportunity for every individual.

38. The Individual has Responsibilities to the World.

Man's horizons have expanded. What happens in the world affects him, and his actions can affect the world. Today, therefore, each man has a responsibility to act—and to encourage his country to act—so that freedom and cooperation will be encouraged among the people and the nations of the world.

For America's Future

Most of us have faith in our country's ability to move forward, to improve, to grow, to provide more and more individuals with more and more of everything they want and need in life . . .

If we, the people of the United States, want to have more material benefits, we must believe in and follow these two principles.

39. The only way we can Have More is to Produce More; and

40. As we Produce More, we must make it possible for More and More People to Enjoy that which we Produce.

If we, the people of the United States, want to have a better life, spiritually as well as materially . . .

41. We must stand firmly for our Beliefs, our Rights, our Principles.

There are those who would chip away our confidence so that their special brand of tyranny might creep into America. They must not succeed. So, let us ask of every plan, of act, or idea . . .

Is it With or Against the Principles of America?

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
