## Buchanan Twp.

Monday night the Buchanan Township Board appointed Dr. Kenneth Jones, area chiropractor, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of William Harrison. Dr. Jones has been in Buchanan five years and in the township since he completed his new clinic on West Front and purchased the house formerly owned by Dr. Jochems.

George Beach and Max Dretzler made another appeal for re-zoning of Beach's school property. The request had been turned down by the Township Planning Commission and the county planning commission had recommended denial of the request. The Board voted to deny the re-zoning because they felt that approval would open the door for several similar requests. Ivan Price said it was no longer legal to allow the zoning on a non-conforming provision. The main objection to this particular re-zoning was that it was spot zoning.

There were several visitors present. One said that there was a bulletin which recommended that part of revenue sharing funds be used for senior citizens, and Ivan Price said that the township's share had gone for roads and fire equipment.

A resident of Clear Lake cited a letter from the Department of Natural Resources pointing out that township boards were authorized to appropriate money for control of weeds in lakes. Price said he'd investigate.

There were the usual complaints about the roads. Price said that the county is supposed to grade Elm Valley Road this summer. He said that the Clear Lake Association couldn't expect any help from the county as far as their road was concerned.

## English Visitors Depart Thursday

Those who have been involved report that this year's group of English and German visitors to Buchanan have been interesting, stimulating and charming guests. They've managed to meet a great many persons and have had several new experiences.

As one guest put it, "It's more important to us to have a chance to observe the American way of life and to get to know the American people." Because they realize the vastness of this country, they expected to see only a small portion of it. Most of them were pleased with what they did get to see.

All agreed that the trip to Greenfield Village was a success. Most of them enjoyed the trip to Chicago where they got to see either the Museum of Science and Industry or the Monet exhibit at the Art Institute. Many were impressed with the beauty of Chicago because most of their information about this city went back to the Capone era, and much more is known by them of such cities as New York or San Francisco.

The largest difference many noted between the streets in American cities and those at home were the abundance of advertising signs which are generally not permitted in England. Several also commented on the friendliness of Buchanan's residents.

Individual families arranged extra activities for their guests. Fernwood was visited by some, and there were jaunts to the wineries. One visitor enjoyed a side trip to Amish country in Indiana. Another visitor herself a coffee drinker, was amazed at the large quantities of that beverage which Americans con-

sume. Another found the supermarkets of interest and noted that prices here compared closely with those in England. As they prepared to board a bus which would take them to Toronto for their flight home Thursday, many were busy exchanging names and addresses for further contact and were expressing the hope that many from Buchanan would be able to visit Cambridgeshire.

In many cases, Buchanans were successfully able to dispel any pre-conceptions about the "Ugly American."

## High-Speed Chase

It all started in Niles about 1:30 Tuesday morning when the Niles police chased a car around the city streets. The driver, 34 year old John Carlos Clark, eluded the police and fled to Buchanan. A high speed chase ensued through the streets of Buchanan. The Buchanan police and the county sheriff's deputies co-operated and attempted to head him off.

Finally Clark turned on Moccasin and eventually got on Dewey. At one point he hit the sheriff's car which was trying to block him. He went east on Dewey where he made the mistake of heading into the Clark Equipment parking lot where he made a wrong turn and trapped himself.

The Niles police said that the whole chase took about an hour and that it was a miracle that nobody was hurt seriously.

## Townships Conduct Their Annual Meetings

About thirty people came to the annual meeting at Buchanan Township Saturday night. Supervisor Ivan Price opened the meeting with a silent prayer for the late trustee, William Harrison.

Townships must present a proposed budget for a year ahead to the county allocation board to show the need for a one mill allocation to the township. The budget for 1976-77 was presented and approved. It showed no increase and remained at a total of \$111,000. The financial report for the year ending March 25, 1975, showed a cash balance of \$29,852.79 for the start of the year and a cash balance of \$20,368.50 at the end of the year.

The board voted a contribution of \$400 to the Buchanan Public Library and designated Inter-City Bank and First National Bank of Southwestern Michigan as depositories for township funds. They again designated their regular meetings for the first Monday of each month.

LaVern Soales had a question on the property taxes, and Price explained the state's method and formula for equalized valuation and the re-appraisal to reach the assessment figure.

There was some discussion about the fire department. Don Cronin suggested that the firemen should have a chain saw for clearing away broken limbs from a tree during bad storms.

Chief Charles Wesner said that no request had been made for such equipment, and that the firemen were equipped for such emergencies and had all the hand tools they needed. The fire department is, it was explained,

also considering a monitor system for notifying firemen when there is a fire.

At the Bertrand Township meeting only 11 persons came although the time had been changed from afternoon to evening.

Supervisor Brayton Yaw opened the meeting and treasurer William Vite gave the annual financial report which showed a balance of \$28,668.21. The \$8,846 received from federal revenue sharing was spent on road improvements.

The proposed budget for the county was approved for \$91,065, an increase of \$8,700. Most of the increase will go for road improvement and construction.

Mrs. Lawrence Mitchell and Wilmer Baker were re-appointed to the township hall board. Donations of \$150 each to the Niles and the Buchanan libraries and \$50 to Galien were approved.

At Niles Township, a raise from \$8,000 to \$10,500 was voted for supervisor John McDonald, although he had earlier requested a raise of \$4,000 to also handle the tax assessor's duties.

The proposed budget was indicated to be \$750,979. McDonald explained that about \$180,000 of this is for employees hired under Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) which will be reimbursed by the federal government. Actually, the budget shows an increase of \$44,000.

It was voted to have the township meetings moved from the township hall to other areas. There was considerable discussion about the acquisition of land for parks, particularly in the northern part of the township.

## Two Men Charged With Red Bud Inn Arson

Last Thursday night two men were arrested by the county sheriff's deputies at Galien and charged with arson in connection with the fire on Easter morning of the Redbud Inn. They were Roger Gray and John Britton.

These two men had been living above the tavern before the first fire at Redbud Inn on February 15. They escaped from that blaze which was apparently caused by a furnace explosion.

Owner Jim Gideon said that the building had been in the process of being remodeled from the first fire. He estimated that the loss in the first fire had been \$40,000 and the loss from the second fire was \$80,000 to \$85,000 and that the building was insured for \$60,000.

The two men were arraigned and demanded examination and were released on \$1000 bonds. Also in connection with Redbud Inn, three men have been arrested in connection with an attempted theft of beer from that tavern.

John Brookins of Eau Claire was arrested on a warrant charging him with conspiracy to

commit larceny, and Jackie McCord of Eau Claire and Daniel Haltom of Buchanan had been previously arrested and charged with attempted larceny.

A motorist had allegedly observed someone in the building and had notified police. Two men had fled as the deputies got there and were later caught. There were 19 six-packs of beer stacked near the outside of the door, and Brookins was charged with being the driver of the truck with which the three planned to haul away the beer.

## Not A Bad Idea

Senator Buch Bayh and this week's letter writer, Lem Barker, seem to miss the point. Nobody wants to see people without jobs, and certainly in this country everybody should have plenty to eat. But there are right and wrong ways to go about it.

The fiscal policies of the thirties were a disaster. So much bad legislation was issued in haste, and only the Supreme Court was able to over-ride some of the worst of it. The country faced a serious economic collapse in 1937, and only the preparation for World War II saved it.

There are, unfortunately, laws of supply and demand. The automobile industry is a good example. During the period of great prosperity everybody was buying cars. Then as the prices of them soared, people stopped buying. Labor as well as management must share the blame for the prices of those cars and the steel that goes into them.

If prices continue to soar and the inflation is allowed to go unchecked, it won't matter if any of us are working. If the costs of cats, refrigerators, meat or sugar keep going up, food stamps aren't going to help us one bit. Inflation will result in higher interest rates. Then nobody will be able to build a home, and the construction industry will be added to the unemployed.

What we advocate is strict attention to thrift and economy at a local and at a national level. Let's not become dependent on welfare or unemployment compensation to the destruction of incentive to work.

Mr. Barker has a good suggestion. The father and son of this company are officers of the corporation. If each were to fire the other, we could live a long time on tax-free unemployment checks, and we'd have only a half a block to walk for our food stamps. Financially, we might be better off, but in taking this approach, we'd automatically put seven other people out of work.

Thousands of 4-H'ers took part in the 1975 Spring 4-H Achievement Show last week at Lakeshore High School with close to 7,000 people attending over the three days of the event.

Jeff Nitz of Baroda received one of the All-Achievement awards in wood working.

Best and Reserve Best of Show ribbons were awarded for excellence in project skill by age division with the following young people receiving them:

In the creative crafts division Best of Show in the senior division went to Sandy Harrington in electric. Buchanan youth took the major share of the awards with Craig Sumerix getting Reserve in the young division. Best of Show and Reserve in junior division going to Dale Jury and Dennis Jury respectively. Senior division electric winners were Dolly Clark, Best of Show, and Wayne Sumerix, Reserve.

In horse science Buchanan also had a large portion of honors -- in the young division Sue Shreve and Cheryl Sherman brought home Best of Show and Kris Letcher and Steve Shreve, Reserve. In the senior division Reserve went to Michelle Johnson of Buchanan.

Home design classification had a Reserve winner from here in the junior division, Susan Boelke.

Leathercraft again had a familiar family name among the winners. In the young division Best of Show went to Russell Wregglesworth, and in senior Best of Show to Mike Wregglesworth.

Dress revue ribbon winners in the young miss division included Cheryl Jury and Mildred Walters of Chit and Chatter 4-H both for sewing. Senior miss had some style revue winners too with Glenda Jury of Chit and Chatter and Cheryl Sherman of Colvin Sew and Grow and Paula Germinder of Galien each earning hers for sewing projects.

Excellence Award Winners, now to be called Everhart Excellence Awards after Mrs. Eileen Everhart, a 27-year 4-H clothing leader, included two local sewers -- Cheryl Jury in young miss and Glenda Jury in senior miss.

## Letters to the Editor

Dear Sir  
Your letter "Dear Sir" which was sent to several Senators had some merit but lacked much to be desired.

First of all you are about eight months behind the time. The No. 1 economic problem today is not inflation, it is unemployment.

In October of 1974 President Ford in his obsession to curb inflation proposed a 5 percent surtax on income tax paid. By late November only two months later Mr. Ford had reversed his position and was talking about a tax rebate to spur the economy and curb unemployment.

I cannot agree the economy is in its present status because too many Senators are playing politics or listening to the labor unions. The economy is in distress because of the economic policies of the Nixon and Ford administrations, which you voted for.

The economy started downward when ex-President Nixon by executive order put wage and price controls into effect. If you recall that was Phase 1. With each new phase the economy got worse.

During phase 1, 2 and 3 wages were effectively controlled but prices were not because there was no means to monitor and control prices. Subsequently in 1974 productivity decreased, wages increased 5.1 percent, but prices increased 12.5 percent.

Inflation will not be brought under control until we get an administration in the White House that is willing to put an end to price fixing and profiteering, as John F. Kennedy did when the steel industry announced a 10 percent increase in the price of steel in 1961.

The part of your letter with which I can agree concerns the Federal deficit, because we are already paying over 25 billion dollars interest a year on the present national debt.

In closing I might point out that as a little businessman you could be in trouble if the economy does not take a turn to the better. At least since the food stamps are distributed on your block you won't have far to go to join the flock.

Congratulations on your fine letter to several senators, you said it very well. I also share your concern about the mounting deficit as a matter of fact, I have been concerned for many years.

It just does not make sense to continue operating the biggest corporation in the United States at a loss. Our Chief Executive is both President and Chairman of the Board, our congress is the Board of Directors. You and I are stockholders. The question is how long are we, the stockholders, going to continue with poor management?

So be it, increase the tax to twenty dollars a barrel, if this is what it takes to reduce imported crude, but don't let the top management in Washington get their hands on this tax money. This money should be used to reduce our national debt, nothing else! I feel that if we "the stockholders" let it be known, that this is just not another bonanza for the top management and the Board of Directors to squander, we will have started the long and tough road to fiscal solvency. **A Minute With Mary**

These Are The Symptoms Of Family Budget Blues  
There's a bug going around. It's not the familiar flu bug -- you might call it the budget blues

bug It's been a familiar if unwanted houseguest in some Michigan homes for a long time. But because of worsening economic conditions, it's biting some people now for the first time. If your family finances are showing the following symptoms, you may have the budget blues  
--There's too much month left at the end of the money. That old joke about "living in the style to which you'd like to become accustomed" isn't all that funny, is it?  
--Your money disappears but you're not happy with what you have to show for it. A good dose of planning may be just what the doctor ordered.

Your long-range goals seem to be getting farther away. Ask yourself why. Are impulse purchases now acting as obstacles to saving for something you hope to buy later? Were your goals unrealistic to start with?  
--You wish you knew how to change some of these costly purchases to less costly ones. If you've never had to be a penny-wise shopper, now may be the time to sharpen your skills and look for alternative buys. Your old buying habits may not fit your new financial situation.  
--You just can't stay ahead of the credit bills. Taking time to examine how you're used to using credit may point out how you could use it more wisely.

These trouble signs are the nagging little pains that signal it's time for a checkup to find out what the real deep down problem is. It may be a minor problem or a whopping big one. Unless you know you can rely on rising income or the addition of a second income to banish your budget blues, a family budget checkup is a must.

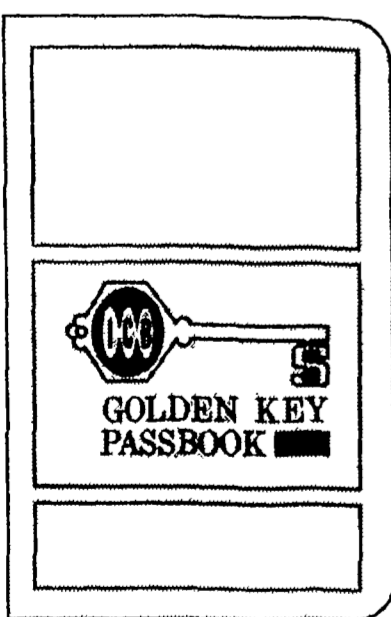

## Midget Ball Gets Under Way With Registration

The 1975 Buchanan Midget Baseball Program is now underway. This baseball program for youth nine through twelve years of age is surpassed by no other similar midget program in the area.

People of Buchanan may take great pride in the fact that every youth going out for baseball will make a team. The system is a "no cut" program. Thus, every player receives a uniform and will "play" baseball this summer.

To accomplish this playing of every team member, each of the ten teams has an "A" and a "B" squad. The league assures that the most talented youths, who are usually the 11 and 12 year olds, will be "frozen" to "A" ball and are not allowed to participate in "B" level competition. A "B" level ballplayer may play "A" level ball if the need and ability exists. No promise is made, however, that in a given season any "B" level player must play "A" level ball. One main reason being that every effort is made to keep the older youths playing with those of similar size, age and ability.

To maintain a system such as we have in Buchanan is quite expensive. Due to the two squad concept, this budget is as much as 40 percent greater than the surrounding communities.

This season our ballplayers, approximately 200 boys, will be dressed in completely new uniforms, consisting of a different color jersey for each of the five teams in a division, white pants, socks, hat, and this year each player will have an undershirt as part of his uniform.

A new electric scoreboard will also be on display this summer. Safety is always number one and this year the Buchanan league is introducing the catching "cap" to be worn by all catchers.

The only cost to a participant is a \$2 fee per youth, used for insurance. Each ballplayer is insured from the start of practice until the end of the season with Hanlin-Rifenberg in Buchanan.

The income for the program comes from five sources: Buchanan Area Recreation Department, sponsors' fees, patrons' fees (signs), the concession stand and yearly candy sale.

The concession stand is completely maintained by the Ladies Auxiliary. The candy sale this year will be in May. On order are 2,500 fewer boxes of candy than sold last year, meaning each youth will be issued to sell approximately half the boxes of candy he had last year. The main reason is the candy will cost \$1.50 per box this year. In defense of the price, however, the value received is that of a \$2.00 or more purchase at the retail level.

The Buchanan Area Recreation Department supplies the land on which the boys play, has insured the concession stand, maintains the field, supplies the game balls and helps with payment toward the scorekeepers.

Registration for Buchanan Midget League will be held at the Teen Center this Friday, April 11 from 4:30 to 8 p.m. and Saturday, April 12 from 10 to 4 p.m.

To be eligible a youth must be at least nine years old by May 31, 1975 and no more than twelve years old by May 31, 1975.

Every youth must register accompanied by a parent or guardian and pay his insurance fee of \$2.00 whether or not he participated last year.

Sunday, April 24, at 1 p.m., all youth who did not play last year are to take part in the tryouts at Smith Field.

All new ballplayers will be notified on what team they will play by the end of that week.

All Things Bright and Beautiful  
By James Herriot

This author gained many fans with his first book, All Creatures Great and Small, which dealt with his experiences as an English veterinarian. This is a continuation of his life.

Told with great charm, the story deals mostly with various animals who were his patients and, most important, with the people with whom he came in contact. There are some touching parts and many which are amusing.

Herriot writes with great warmth and understanding. He's never poking fun at people, but he describes them with great clarity.

The vet's associate and the associate's brother Tristram are great characters, but so are ones like the large lady who takes care of hundreds of cats and the old lady who had an old dog who died.

The reader is introduced to problems having to do with lambing, a cow with a tipped uterus, and a neglected dog, among other situations. One shares the joy of the author when the patient recovers and the disappointment when it doesn't make it.

It's a nice story. It's nice to read about nice people.

Put Up Prices  
Ever drive by a gas station, see a good-looking price and drive in, only to find that the posted price is for some type of gasoline other than the one you wanted?

A pair of bills introduced in the House recently by Rep. Sal Rocca, D-Sterling Heights, is aimed at reducing such motorist frustration.

One of Rocca's proposals would require all stations to post the price of their gasoline -- and the grade of gas offered at that price -- in a conspicuous place that can be seen easily by passing motorists.

The second proposal, an alternative answer to the problem, would not require posting of prices. But it would call for those stations posting prices to also show the grade of gas offered at

that price, in letters at least half the size of the price.

Rocca says adoption of either one of his bills "would at least let people know what they are getting for their money before they pull into the stations."

## The Michigan Mirror

By Elmer E. White  
Try Another Brand? Some Michiganders may feel less of a pinch in their pocket-books when they step up to the pharmacist's window starting this month.

That's because the new "generic drug law" is in effect. The law allows pharmacists, on request of the prescription bearer, to select the brand of drug to be dispensed when more than one brand of the same drug is available and has been prescribed by a doctor.

Put another way, if your doctor prescribes 50 tablets of "Brand X," and you ask the pharmacist to substitute a "generic equivalent," he can do so. And you might wind up paying less for the 50 tablets of "Brand Y."

Tom Walenta of Petoskey, president of the Michigan Pharmaceutical Association, says the new law could mean "possible consumer savings initially of about \$8 million annually."

"Under the new generic drug law, the role of the pharmacist is shifted from that of a middleman for the pharmaceutical manufacturers to a patient or consumer advocate," Walenta says. "He now is able to use his experience and knowledge on behalf of the customer-patient."

Not all prescription bearers will benefit from the new law, because there are no substitutes

available for a good portion of the pharmaceutical products used in all prescriptions.  
Walenta says there is more than one manufacturer for products used in about 15-25 per cent of the approximately 31.5 million prescriptions dispensed in Michigan each year.  
In other cases, the products are produced by one manufacturer or protected by patent laws and therefore, "price competition is practically non-existent," he says.  
Walenta predicts, however, that the new law will stimulate competition at the manufacturing level -- and that could mean more savings for the consumers.

Saving Open Space  
Urban sprawl has sucked up some of Michigan's best farmlands in years past, the experts say. But there may be hope for what's left.

Michigan is gearing up for a new program allowing tax relief to farmers who will pledge to maintain their land -- not sell for commercial development -- for at least 10 years.

Applications will soon be available for participation in the new open space plan authorized by the Legislature last year. And it's reported that some 1,600 Michigan farmers are waiting to sign up.

Under the plan, a participating farmer would receive a credit for state property tax, and could be exempt from special assessment for sanitary sewers, water, lights and non-farm drainage.

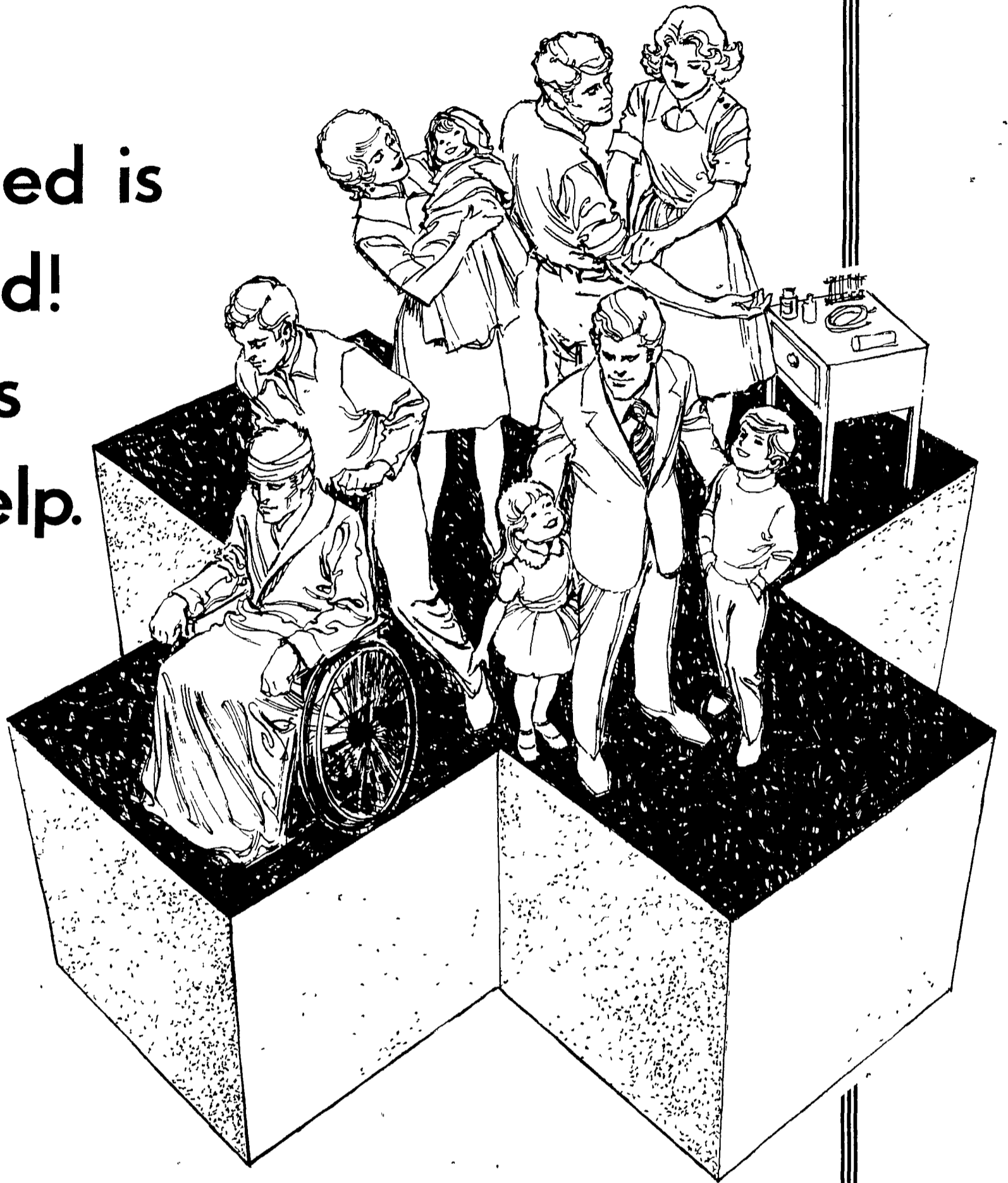

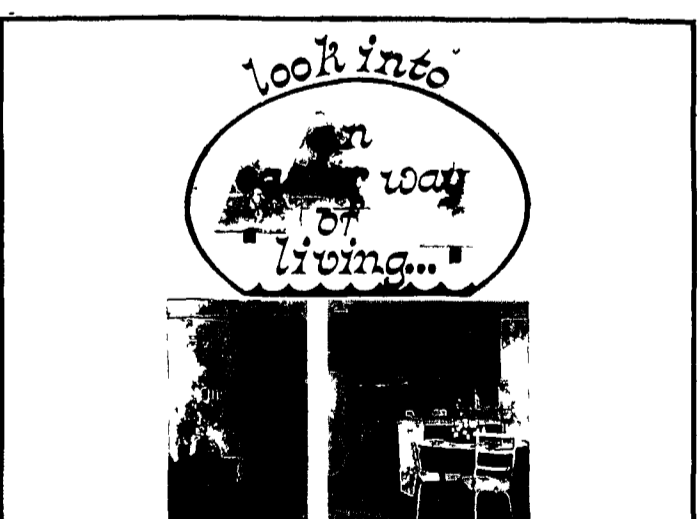


