## SIDEWALK DAYS



The board of education reorganized at the Monday night meeting electing officers for the coming year. Seated are William Moon, vice president, David Hanson, president, Mrs. Mary Beth Larson and Mrs. Jeannette Mahan, secretary. ### David Hanson Re-elected School Board President

At their meeting Monday the Buchanan school board reorganized for the new year. David Hanson was re-elected president, William Moon, vice president, Jeannette Mahan secretary and Richard Rossow, treasurer.

Richard Rossow was appointed legislative representative, Bill DeVos will be the representative with the Intermediate School District, and William Moon and Mrs. Larson will be the curriculum council's representatives. Robert Luke will be Buchanan's representative on the Berrien-Cass School Board Association.

Thrun, Maatsch & Nordberg of Lansing and Frank William Kelley of Buchanan were re-appointed as the school attorneys. Inter-City Bank, Michigan National Bank of Battle Creek, First National Bank of Southwestern Michigan, Old Kent State Bank and LaSalle Federal Savings and Loan Association were designated as the school depositories.

The board recommended Mrs. John Karpinski as a member of a special education advisory committee to the Intermediate School District.

Resignations were accepted from Mrs. Robert Faulhaber from 3rd grade at Moccasin; Diane Brown, special education teacher at Moccasin; Jackie Grashius, middle school learning disabilities teacher, and Dona Marie Nelson, high school math teacher.

A petition containing 45 signatures was received from a group of Stark parents who would like to see the band program continued as it was during the 1974-75 year.

Following a study which began in 1972-73 with the formation of a Language Arts Study Commission two supplemental textbooks are being added to the basic text for 8th grade English classes to

put heavier emphasis on grammar and usage.

The board took action to secure bids for workmen's compensation. The board also passed a resolution expressing appreciation for his years of service to Gerald Moulds, who recently resigned from the board.

Progress on the middle school traffic situation was brought up and Superintendent Dougherty reported he had contacted the city manager, who will report back to him after checking with the committee. Concerning a request last month from Community School Advisory Council the board went on record as being in sympathy with the concept and approving further study. Its interest is not to be considered support at this time--it also stressed the need for proper supervision and for financial self support.

Reports were received on three IDEA projects conducted the past year. Mrs. Penn's Language Master, Mrs. Roti's Historical Film and Mr. Casey's Resident Camping Project. These reports were on past efforts, no funds have been allocated for any such projects the coming year in an effort to hold costs.

Action on a request concerning medication procedures received from school nurse Irma Seager was tabled until the next meeting.

New S.R.A. representative Chuck Dougherty was welcomed by the board.

### Weekend Fires

On Saturday at 1:45 a.m., patrolman Francis Morely saw smoke coming from the southeast corner of Sexton's Furniture. He alerted the fire department who were able to hold the damage to the roof.

Because of the amount of rain that night, the police are investigating the possibility of arson. The roof is easily accessible on the northwest side and young people have been caught drinking and smoking up there in the past.

Robert Holan advised police Sunday that the apartment of which he is manager at 308 1/2 Main Street was filled with smoke, but the fire was out. The fire was apparently started in the bathroom, and the entire apartment received heavy

smoke damage. The apartment is vacant and the electricity had been turned off. The rear door was unlocked.

### Apartment Fires

Mari Newsom, 607 N. Redbud, reported to the police that between 4:30 and 5 p.m. Monday someone had entered her apartment and had set the living room on fire using two candles. A radio-tape player was missing along with \$11 cash.

At 11:12 p.m. a neighbor of Mrs. Newsom reported another fire in the Newsom apartment. This time somebody entered through a bedroom window and ignited a bottle of liquid on the bed. The police are continuing to investigate.

### We've Got To Stop It

Our letter writer of last week calls us unfair and partisan and then goes on to place the blame for our economic difficulties on Nixon and Ford.

They go back long before these two presidents. First of all, there is the old law of supply and demand which is hard to break. Then there is the regular business cycle of up and down, and every time somebody tries to tamper with it, there's been trouble.

For years everybody blamed Hoover for the depression. But it was brought on by an inflationary spiral which nobody wanted to curb. What goes up must eventually come down, and it did with a bang.

Democrats and Republicans, labor and management have all fiddled with the economy to no avail. Liberals believe that the answer to everything is to spend more, and conservatives believe that a balanced budget brings stability.

Up until this present recession, industries were recording unprecedented profits. Their top management people were drawing fabulous salaries. Young doctors and lawyers thought nothing of expecting to make \$1000 a week. Laborers were making more money than they could have imagined ten years before. Everybody had been building homes, everybody had one or more cars. Then they began acquiring trailers and motorcycles and television sets. Then they began going on expensive vacations.

Any high school economics book would have predicted what happened. Finally, people slowed down their buying of automobiles and didn't trade in their television sets as quickly. The price of gas made them cut down their recreational travel. It all came to a halt, and factories stopped producing. This wasn't Kennedy's doing, or Nixon's or Johnson's, and certainly not Ford's.

We can prime the pump and spend money to artificially stimulate the economy. But the end result will be a dollar which buys less, higher prices, and ultimate bankruptcy.

The letter writer is a smart guy, and he certainly must know that the higher you go, the longer fall you'll have.

There will be hayrides for the kids. Buchanan Co-Ops will display some new equipment on Days Avenue. The Jaycees are cooking up a log splitting contest and a contest for two-man sawing teams for which there'll be prizes. In addition, they will have their famous barbecue on Main near Front. The Lions will have their popular concession stand, and the cotton candy will flow from it.

In this city-wide sale there will be plenty of parking and plenty to eat. Louie's Restaurant will start roasting their famous pig to be served starting early Friday afternoon, and on Saturday they plan to put some ham on the spit. There will be something for everybody at Buchanan Sidewalk Days as the stores cut down

on their summer inventories to get ready for fall.

The ladies of the Unity Hospital Guild are going to take this opportunity to publicize Buchanan's own hospital and will have a booth from which they will dispense information about the institution.

A climax will come on Friday when the city of Buchanan will have an official grand opening of Schirmer Parkway. All the city equipment will parade out there at 5 p.m. The ribbon will be cut at the half-way point between River Street and the Niles-Buchanan Road by Walter Schirmer.

Clark vice president Leo McKernan, David Howe and Richard McCormick have been invited as special guests of the city. After the ribbon cutting the Buchanan city commission will entertain the guest of honor, Mr. Schirmer, and his wife at dinner.

The weatherman is mumbling about fair weather by the weekend, so it should be a festive weekend in Buchanan.

### City Candidates Must File Before August 5

Anyone who wants to run for the city commission in November must file his petition on or before "20 days prior to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August." The city commission at the suggestion of the county clerk passed this emergency ordinance Monday. Thus people have until August 5 to file petitions.

The neighbors on Moravia Street petitioned to have the alley on the north end between Moravia and Michigan closed to traffic and to make Moravia a dead-end street. They said that the lack of visibility made it dangerous. The commission referred the matter to the planning commission.

A sub committee of the plan commission presented a letter outlining tentative goals of that body and a timetable for implementing them. The commission accepted the report favorably, but suggested more grass roots input and recommended that the plan commission publish their goals and ask for public opinion.

There are still nine property owners who haven't put in their sidewalks around the middle school area. Three contractors, Willie Brown, Richard Wilcox and Dual Builders all said they'd do the job for 80 cents a square foot. The city manager is to pick one of the contractors based on workmanship, and the commission confirmed the S.A.D. roll to complete the remaining sidewalks.

The commission accepted a contract with Les Cripps for \$15,500. He is a consultant who will work with code enforcement officers and with the city manager to advise and administer in connection with anticipated funds for community development for which the city has applied.

A request from the Three Oaks Spokes to erect signs on Main and Fourth and on Redbud and Fourth designating the bike

trails through the city was approved.

John Jerue of Claremont requested a temporary burning permit to get rid of some brush at the rear of his lot. Action on this was tabled pending a report from commissioner Richard Gault as to the need for the permit.

The city approved a budget not to exceed \$2,000 to Robert Little, archeologist, to excavate the old mill site on McCoy's Creek and possibly investigate another mill site farther down.

Mayor Bachman inquired if there was something that could be done for preventative maintenance of the streets. The city manager and the engineer are going to study the matter.

Cole Associates estimated that it will cost \$2,000 for them to inspect the rest of the bridges in town. There are 6 bridges or ducts across McCoy's Creek and 7 across the mill race. Cole is designing a new bridge for the one on Charles Court which failed.

One resident appeared to ask if he had any right to cross a property line to perform normal maintenance. His neighbor is building a fence which would make it impossible to paint his garage without putting his ladder on the neighbor's property. The commission told him this was a private matter between him and his neighbor.

Ben Jenson asked about the status of plans to make the Niles-Buchanan Road a five-lane highway when the 31 by-pass is completed. He couldn't see the need for such a wide highway, and the commissioners agreed. He is going to contact the state highway commission to inquire about it.

### Install Bell In New Tower

The congregation of Faith United Methodist Church at 728 N. Detroit Street has erected a new Bell Tower in the church yard, made possible through Memorial Funds of the Church, and special gift donations by organizations and individuals of the church family. The tower was constructed by Wilcox Construction Company, under the guidance of the Board of Trustees with Wesley Strong as chairman.

The bell installed into the tower came from the belfry of the former Evangelical United Brethren Church on Oak Street, now the Masonic Temple. In 1968, the Evangelical United Brethren Church merged with the Methodist Church. The congregation is now known as Faith

United Methodist Church, with Rev. Kenneth L. Snow as the pastor.

The bell was used in the former church from November 11, 1888, until the congregation built the present edifice in 1961. The church purchased the bell from the Masonic Lodge and it was installed in the new tower last Saturday. Assisting with the installation were Dick Wilcox, of the Wilcox Construction Company, Wes Strong, Carl Ervin, John Kelly and Jim Strong. Upon completion of the tower the church plans a Dedication Service under the leadership of the pastor.

Included in the tower will be a lighted bulletin board made possible by the B and B Class of the Church School.

How to Play Russian Roulette Without Even Living

Aspirin boric acid dishwashers, micro-wave ovens, open kettles, ovens and commercial containers. What's the relationship? These are the perennial recommendations of misinformed individuals to homemakers undertaking home food preservation projects.

Do not use aspirin or boric acid to prevent spoilage to give satisfactory products in canning. They are condemned because of their toxicity and prohibited by Federal Food Laws. The lack of heat treatment will result in the absence of a vacuum seal which will accelerate deterioration.

A dishwasher is simply that -- a dishwasher. It is not sold as a canner or a food processor.

Canning in a micro-wave oven is not recommended. Lids would have to be left off and the chances of food contamination are very high.

In open kettle canning food is cooked in an ordinary kettle then packed into hot jars and sealed without processing. This is not a recommended canning procedure because spoilage bacteria may get in when the food is transferred from kettle to jar. Also the temperature obtained in open-kettle canning are not high enough to destroy all the spoilage organisms that may be in vegetables.

Oven canning is a no-no and no again! It is dangerous. Jars may explode. Food temperature inside the jars is not high enough to be safe.

One-trip jars in which commercial food is sold (mayonnaise, peanut butter, coffee, etc.) are not recommended. During World War II this type jar due to necessity, was tempered for consumers to reuse.

Today the commercial jars are made of thinner glass for use on high speed packing machines and with caps developed especially for the product being packed. The jars have been subjected to tilting line contact, abuse at retail outlets and possible abuse at home. These neck scratches or slight imperfections can cause them to break especially in a pressure canner. The standard canning jars are tempered for use in steam pressure (a must method for low-acid vegetables and meats). Also the finish on the containers is not a normal home canning finish. The mouth may not be accurate in width, the sealing edge may not be level -- it has dips. The lids for standard canning jars seemingly to the eye fit the jar but there is a difference in size even though the band will screw on.

Commercial lids are designed for a single use only (and may not seal on second use) or for use on a dry product. Some have treated paper gaskets which are not intended to be airtight. Also if used for home canning foods may have an off-odor or color from the previous product -- or proper venting may not occur, possibly causing darkening, off-flavor or breakage.

Other classes offered include Sporting, Hounds, Working, Terriers, Toys, Non-sporting, Litters, Obedience, Miscellaneous and Senior Showmanship. Admission is 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children 8 to 13.

## Proposal Beaten

Niles township voters overwhelmingly defeated a proposition to levy 15 mills for acquiring, maintaining and developing parks and recreation. The vote Monday was in a ratio of about 700 to 200 against the proposition. Township supervisor John McDonald registered disappointment over the defeat and surprise at the large amount of persons who voted no. He said that anticipated revenues in the general fund hadn't been enough to take care of the current recreational budget.

## The Lid Is On Home Canning For This Year

Buchanan women have the same problem which is facing women all over the country. The vegetables are ready for canning and there are no canning lids. The three grocery stores in Buchanan order them constantly but they are never shipped from the wholesaler.

This reporter called Ball Corporation in Muncie, Indiana, leading manufacturer of canning lids. There is a special man who does nothing but answer such calls. He had just hung up from a call from the office of Senator Stohr from Florida.

He said that production is such that every man, woman and child in this country ought to now own six lids. He said that Ball's production is now 2.8 million lids a day. Employees are now working forty two days straight to keep up production and then the machinery has to be closed down for a day for overhauling.

His name is withheld because he was extremely critical of the wholesalers. He said that they should be allocating lids to the local retailer on quotas based on the last two years. He said that if Thompson's S&S and Wilt's are not getting at least the usual amount of lids, they are being treated unfairly by the brokers.

This representative said that there is no excuse for there to be such a shortage. He said that if women are hoarding them, as suspected they have in their basements many more lids than they would ever use in a lifetime. If wholesalers are hoarding them, he predicted that they will ultimately be stuck with them as new methods of production are finally achieved.

Ball is currently installing new sophisticated machinery which will completely do away with any shortage. But they will be in operation too late to do anybody any good this year.

Ball also makes a line of zinc lids. These are more expensive but they have an advantage in that they can be used again. In most parts of the country there are zinc lids available because most women who do their own canning have a definite prejudice against them.

Then this reporter got in touch with a grocery wholesaler who said that all of the above was silly. He said he has been trying to get lids since January. He indicated that the government ought to investigate the whole problem to find out where these lids are.

Another source claimed that it was the large producers of canned goods who don't want the housewife to do her own canning.

In the meantime the strawberry season, cherry picking time and raspberry harvest will be gone. Beans are now at their best, and corn is tassing. All of this does no good for the home canner who has been told to raise her own food.

There are plenty of lids to be had on the black market. It has been possible to get them in South Bend if a buyer is willing to pay twice the normal price. This all adds to the puzzle of why there is a shortage.



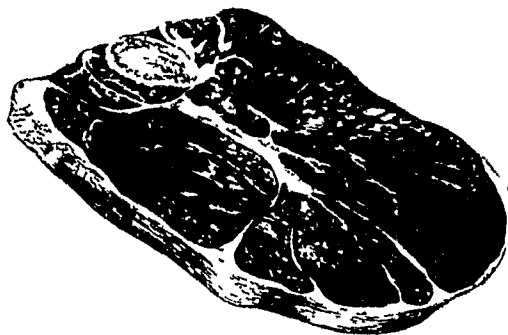

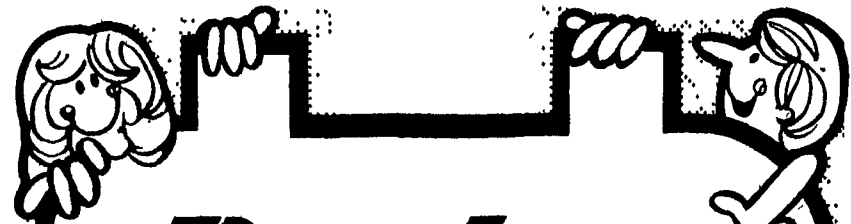

What's the penalty for sending bombs through the mail in this country? You read so much about this kind of terrorism taking place that I hope the authorities are cracking down.

—T. M., Zeeland

Federal Law imposes penalties of up to 20 years' imprisonment and/or \$10,000 in fines for sending bombs through the mail. If the mail bomb results in a death, the offender could be subject to the death penalty or life imprisonment.

According to the U.S. Postal Service, there have been 15 bomb mailings or bomb hoaxes reported in fiscal year 1975—four more than the previous year. The Postal Service says that stiff sentences are being dealt.

If Congress isn't going to do anything about the energy crisis, I think that we citizens should. I'm a schoolteacher, and I'd like to alert my students to the growing energy problem. Where can I get some good material to help me?

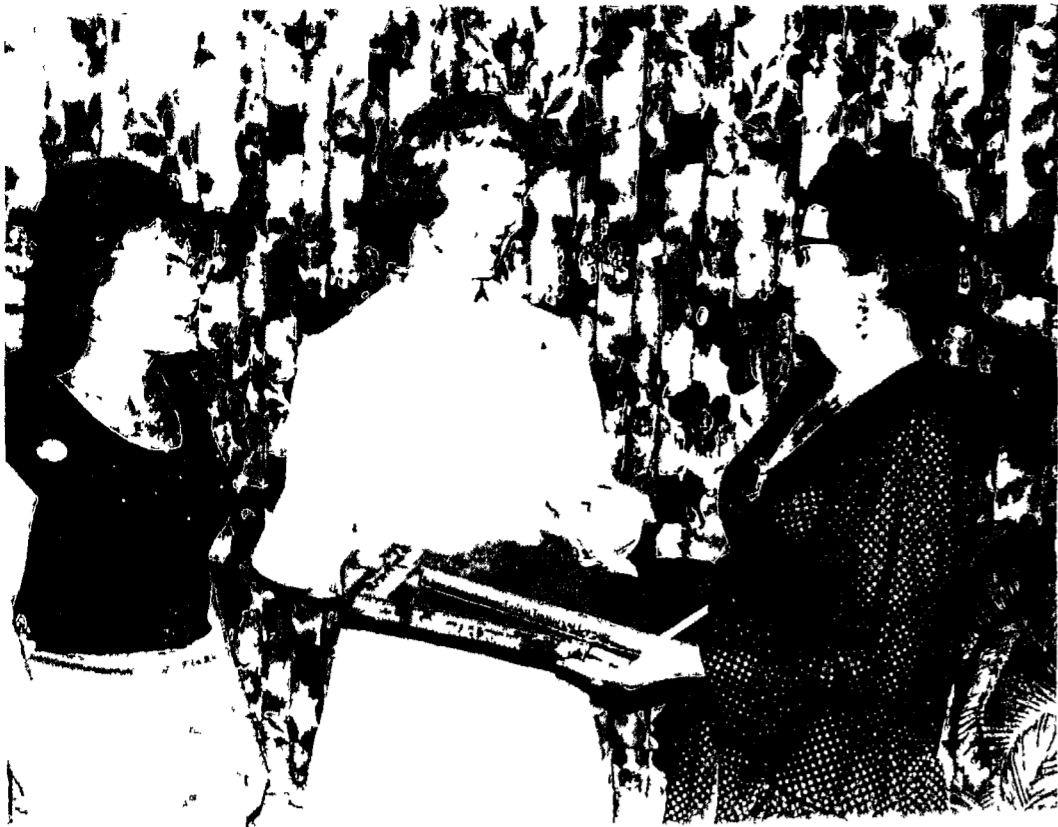

**Bloodmobile To Visit July 24**

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be at the Buchanan Township Hall from 12 noon to 6 p m July 24

Buchanan is one of several communities being asked to help the Berrien County Blood Program this summer. This is an added date to the regular schedule for Buchanan held at Clark Equipment Company. Anyone who donated blood this spring or plans to donate this fall may still give this summer and be within the 56 day waiting period between donations.

The Berrien County Chapter of the American Red Cross Blood Program last year collected 4,781 pints of blood, a far cry from the quota of 6,000 pints established from 4 1/2 percent of the total population of Berrien County.

Because of the low collection, Berrien County has been placed on probation for one year starting July 1, 1975. This probation stipulates that if after one year Berrien County still does not meet its quota, blood will be disbursed from Lansing on a "you give, you get" basis. There will be blood in the hospitals, but when a patient uses it he must replace it or pay for it.

If the patient or his family participates in the Blood Program, the blood will be replaced by Lansing Free Blood Center with only the cost of the hospital participation fee, \$21, to the patient. However, the patient or his family who is not covered with either have to replace 2 pints of blood for 1 pint used or pay from \$60 to \$100 for each pint of blood.

The advantages of the Red Cross Blood Program are:  
1. Everyone in Berrien County is totally covered whether or not he or she has donated.  
2. Their blood needs will be replaced any where in the United States by contacting the Berrien County Red Cross.

There is no charge for the blood itself, only for processing, crossmatching, administration, (which in the Lansing Region costs \$21 per pint)

When residents leave the region, their blood needs will be met for one year, if they've been a donor.

"Total Coverage" stipulates immediate families of residents including spouse, children under 18 years in the home, parents, parents-in-law, grandparents, grand-parents-in-law wherever they live, if not covered under the Red Cross Blood Program.

## This Week At Fernwood

Area quilters are in for a special treat at Fernwood Beginning Monday, July 21 at 9:30 a.m. a class in quilting will be taught by Marie Wierzbicki, a well known Chicago area quilter, teacher and lecturer. Mrs. Wierzbicki is currently an instructor for adult education with Triton College, River Forest, Illinois, and is widely consulted in the preparation of articles and magazines on quilting. Her talents have also been mentioned in Newsweek Readers Digest, Quilter's Newsletter, Nimble Needles Treasures, and on ABC television. She organized the first chapter of the Illinois Prairie Quilters and began a new chapter of the National Quilting Association. Fernwood is proud to have her among its 1975 teachers.

Quilting, known by the Egyptians since 4,000 B.C. was brought to Europe by the Crusaders, who found quilted material was perfect under heavy, uncomfortable armor. Royalty liked it, too, and it wasn't long before quilting was a popular form of stitchery among all the social classes. Even today handmade quilts and hangings are considered family treasures. Mrs. Wierzbicki has her own collection of just such treasures which she uses as examples in her classes. Quilting will meet at the Fernwood Meeting House from 9:30 a.m. until 3 p.m. this Monday and Tuesday and again Tuesday and Wednesday, July 29 and 30. Students will learn the various techniques of basic patchwork, applique, trapunto, crazy patch, biscuit and "yo-yo" quilting. Class time will also be spent working on design, and learning to add on and bind off. If time permits, lessons in the "cathedral window" design will also be given.

Also on Monday, 9 and 10 year olds will meet with Don Harker and Connie Myers at 9:30 a.m. at the Office Building for a full schedule of Day Camp activities. Interesting and exciting projects, hikes, and slide lectures in keeping with the outdoor nature theme and age of the participating children have been planned for the week.

ned. Bring a lunch, dress for the weather, and be ready for a week of fun.

On Wednesday and Thursday, July 23 and 24, a well known instructor and friend of Fernwood will be on hand at the Meeting House to teach the art of spinning. Doloros Meisterheim will teach two all day sessions to beginners and experienced area spinners.

Doloros and her husband, Richard, are well versed in the art of spinning. Owners of their own spinning wheel repair business, they repair, build and recondition all types and sizes of spinning wheels. They also have their own collection of antique and ethnic wheels, all in working condition. Doloros is especially interested in home processing of wool and the development of spun wool into wearable clothing, including dyeing, weaving and sewing.

Doloros' students will start at the beginning with raw wool. They will learn sorting, teasing, carding and plying - all necessary preparation for spinning. Beginners will begin spinning with a drop spindle and will graduate to several different types of wheels with emphasis on their own personal wheels.

On Friday, July 25, an all day reunion for spinners will be held, with past class members and area spinners invited to attend. "Show-and-tell" and demonstrations are planned, so pass the word and bring a project to show with the others. And be sure your spinning wheel is in good order and ready to go.

Parents will have a chance to get together with their children on Sunday, July 27 for another of Fernwood's special weekend family classes. At 1 p.m. Don Harker will explore "Honeybees" with a lecture, film and demonstration of the social organization and handling of honeybees. Don is well known as Fernwood's Naturalist and Environmental Education Coordinator. This is the third family experience which has been well received on Sundays.

## The Spinal Column

Your spinal column participates in all major movements of the body - reaching, stooping, bending (whether bending to one side, backward or forward). In movements of the arms and legs the spinal column is involved, because muscles which aid in moving the limbs attach to the spinal column.

Your spinal column is a great body balancing mechanism. For example, when you bend the shoulders down to the right, the flexibility of the spinal column permits the pelvis to shift to the left to maintain body balance. Try that right bend with the fingers of your left hand on the vertebrae of the lower spine. Note how those vertebrae shift as you bend.

Your spinal column shares the shock of all great impacts to the body, whether at work or play, whether in falls, collisions or other accidents.

# THE MICHIGAN BIG STORY

Battle Creek (1870) Sojourner Truth, former slave and political activist returned here today in the midst of her latest campaign.

The purpose of her most recent drive is to convince Congress to set aside farm land in the western United States for the slaves freed during and after the recent war between the states.

Mrs. Frances Titus, a long time friend summed up the life's work of this former slave. "This woman has been an advocate against the evils of slavery first of Black people, then of women," she said.

Truth said that she became involved in helping the slaves because "no one did anything to help them. They (the former slaves) were forced to live in poverty and filth. I want the majority in this country, who always get what they want, to tell Congress to give the Negro what he deserves. Give them land at the outset. Give them teachers and learn them to read," she added.

Truth is expected to continue her petition drive which has already taken her to many states around the country. She is home today, resting, but will soon resume her speaking engagements that will one day, end in Washington.

Truth commented on what the public can do. "Send petitions to Washington to get for the Colored people what this country owes them," she said.

## The Michigan Mirror

By Elmer E. White

**Row, Row, Row**  
Everything from cabin cruisers to canoes and kayaks are crowding Michigan waterways these days.

Record numbers of watercraft are expected this season, according to Secretary of State Richard H. Austin.

Austin, whose department handles boat registrations, says the number of motor-powered boats in Michigan zoomed up about 50,000 between 1971 and 1974, with a year-end total of more than 534,000. Another 75,000 or more non-motorized boats were in use last year.

Thus the "water wonderland" can expect over 600,000 watercraft on its lakes and streams during many weekends this summer. And that's not counting the new boats that people are buying.

Along with the numbers then, comes the reminder from Austin to watch it when boating.

"Too often we find boat operators who either do not know or do not understand the importance of basic rules for safe boating," he says. "The result can mean severe injury -- or death -- to a swimmer, water skier, skindiver or boat occupant."

The Department of Natural Resources, meanwhile, is offering to inspect marine vessels at selected state parks this summer.

The Department's Mobile

Marine Safety Program will be established at Wilderness State Park July 18-20, at Hayes State Park July 22-24, at Waterloo Recreation Area July 25-27, at South Higgins Lake State Park August 12-14, and at Interlochen State Park August 15-17.

Program workers also will offer pleasure boating instruction sessions aimed at helping young people obtain the boating safety certificates required for operating certain small craft.

**No So Fast**  
Those four-year driver licenses mentioned in a recent column won't be in your wallets quite as quickly as was reported earlier.

Secretary of State Austin says renewal licenses will be shifted from the present three-year basis to a four-year cycle on a staggered basis during the next three years.

That means most drivers probably won't get a four-year license when they renew within the next 12 months.

Each year, the percentage of four-year renewals will grow larger, Austin says, until eventually all drivers -- except those with unsatisfactory driving records -- will be on the new longer renewal cycle.

Problem drivers will be required to renew their licenses every two years, which provides the state with a more frequent evaluation and re-examination of the driver's status.

**Pleas to Farmers**  
Don't mow by the roadside unless it's absolutely necessary. That's the request to farmers from the Department of Natural Resources. If you can, put off roadside mowing until after the end of July, the department urges.

Why? It's nesting season, and pheasants and some other wildlife build their nests on the ground.

Hen pheasants, especially, often will not leave their nests now, and may be killed by low cutting bars. Vic Janson, wildlife division biologist, says that where mowing can't be postponed, farmers should elevate their cutting bars at least six inches off the ground to avoid killing or maiming the hen pheasants.

The problem is especially acute in the Thumb area, Janson says, where there are indications of an upswing in the breeding population in several counties.

**Bookmobiles Away!**  
Bookmobiles brimming with English and Spanish language study materials for young people will visit spots like Reese, Eau Claire, Bangor and Stockbridge this summer.

The aim -- help children of migrant farm workers keep up with their studies. John Porter, state superintendent of public instruction, notes that some migrant children aren't able to finish a full year of school in one place. ### Remove Old Flowers

Home flower growers can learn a lesson from Alice's adventures in Wonderland.

No, it's not to paint the white roses red, as the Red Queen's gardeners did, but to put into practice the queen's favorite threat "Off with their heads!"

As the queen's gardeners probably knew, and as the horticulturists at Michigan State University recommend, removing the old flowers and the seed heads of many annual flowers will prolong flowering.

This is especially important for pansies, zinnias, cosmos, snapdragons and the larger marigolds, the experts note. Petunias, moss roses, verbena, annual phlox and dianthus, on the other hand, will flower all summer without your help, though pruning long, ungainly stems will keep the plants looking tidier.

Wax begonia, ageratum and alyssum will also benefit from an occasional snipping back, the horticulturists add.

Letting annuals go to seed this year won't save you the cost of seed or new plants next spring, the MSU experts advise. Many popular annual varieties are hybrids and their seed will not produce plants like the parent plants.

Perennial flowers, such as garden lilies and sweet peas, bloom only once a season, but it's a good idea to remove old flowers from them, too. This allows the plants to concentrate on storing up food in their roots for next year's growth rather than making seeds.

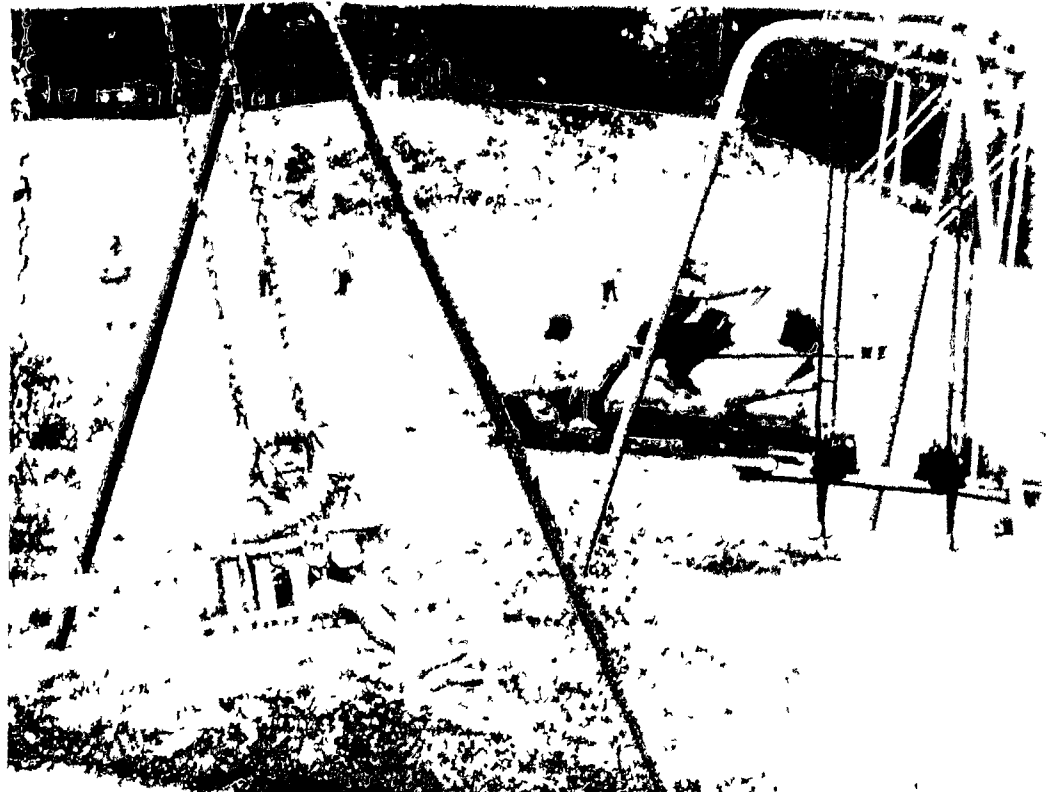

Tina Groves won the powder puff event, and Sarah Cornwell was second.

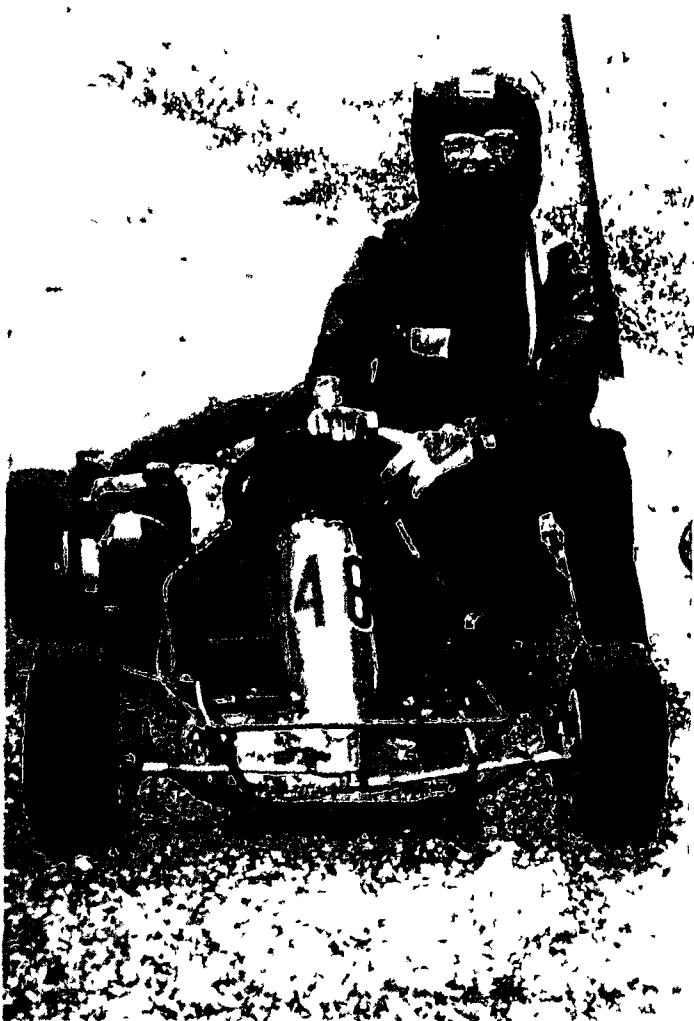
In the Reed Open, Don Wooley was first, and Frank Rebac second.
