Dougherty Resigns to Accept MSU Position

Announcement that Richard Dougherty, assistant superintendent, had accepted a new position in education took the community by surprise Monday.

The announcement came Monday night when the school board accepted his resignation "with regret." The resignation is effective Dec. 31.

Dougherty told the board he had accepted a position as assistant professor with the college of education at Michigan State University in East Lansing. He will serve as co-ordinator of student teaching with the City of Detroit public schools. He will assume his new duties the first of January.

His duties will be similar to those of Dr. Henry Kennedy, 310 Harlan, who is co-ordinator of student teaching in this area.

Leaving With Regret
Dougherty said he feels this is a real professional opportunity. He added that "it is with regret that we are leaving Buchanan. Our association here has been very pleasant and rewarding."

Members of the school board, administrators and faculty also expressed regrets at Dougherty's decision.

Chester Wessendorf summed up the board's feeling when he said that "his work, particularly in the past year, has shown me something entirely different in school administration."

Supt. Pierre Bailey stated that "Dougherty has done the school and community a terrific service. He has been a personal friend and a good worker."

Here Since 1951

Dougherty has been in the Buchanan school system since Dec. 10, 1951, when he stated as a junior high social studies teacher. In September 1954 he was named as junior-senior high principal and served in that position until named assistant superintendent Aug. 29, 1961.

He is a 1950 graduate of South Dakota State college, where he earned his bachelor of science degree, and of Missouri university in 1951, where he was awarded a master of science degree in education. Dougherty came to Buchanan from South Dakota.

Dougherty is presently serving as president of Buchanan Lions club, is a member of St. Anthony's Roman Catholic church, member of the study

Church School Entered

Second in a Series

On Dec. 5 qualified voters in Berrien county will go to the polls to cast their votes on the question of establishment of a county community college. As a public service the Berrien County Record is presenting a series of articles related to the forthcoming vote, written by the editor.

When the Dec. 5 election to create a Berrien county community college district is mentioned, two questions are often asked:

"Why do we need a county college, when we already have the Benton Harbor Community college?"

"If we vote to have this, where are they going to build it?"

The first question is relatively simple to answer. There is a community college at Benton Harbor, but according to college personnel enrollment has reached the maximum.

The 1963 enrollment of 1,442 represents 792 full time and 650 part time students. These students are attending day and

Veterans Day is a legal holiday for federal and financial institutions. As result, Inter City Bank, the post office and Buchanan Federal Savings and Loan will be closed Monday.

Also affected by the legal holiday will be regular meetings of the city commission and Buchanan township board. The city commission will meet the following night, Nov. 12, and the township board meeting has been postponed one week, to Monday, Nov. 18, at 8 o'clock in the town hall.

School Board To Borrow Additional Funds

A resolution to borrow \$60,000 was approved by the school board Monday night at its regular meeting.

The money is to be used to meet November and December payrolls and bills. It is being borrowed against anticipated state aid funds.

In approving the resolution, the board voted to borrow the funds from Inter City Bank at 2 1/2 per cent interest, effective Nov. 15 and payable on or before Sept. 1, 1964.

In other business, the board deferred action on signing the deed to Riverside property, set the date for open house of the new facilities, and accepted the resignation of Richard Dougherty, assistant superintendent. Details of Dougherty's resignation are contained in a separate story.

Reject Deed

As presented, the deed for the Riverside property was to Mr. and Mrs. William Burkett and to Mr. and Mrs. Richard Dougherty. Board members questioned signing the deed to them, since the bid of Buchanan Realty had been accepted in September.

Phil Sexton, vice president of Buchanan Realty, had approved assigning the property to Dougherty and Burkett, but the board deferred signing until Robert Soucek, board president, and Dr. Russell Vestine, secretary, confer with Attorney B. R. Desenberg as to its legal obligation in refusing to sign the deed, as presented. Board members expressed the feeling that since the sale was handled at a bid opening, the land

Citizens Protest Zoning Request

Twenty-two interested citizens attended the regular meeting of the planning commission Monday evening at city hall. The citizens appeared to protest a re-zoning request by Attorney Frank Kelley, who was acting on behalf of a client.

The planning commission concurred with the request of the citizens, altho no formal vote was taken at the meeting. After the discussion and protests Kelley withdrew the request.

In question was re-zoning of property at the corner of Ottawa and Third streets, from Class A residential to Class B. The matter was referred to the planning commission last week by the city commission.

What aroused area residents is that Class B residential zoning permits multiple family housing, whereas Class A restricts dwellings to two family housing.

It was explained by Atty. Kelley that his clients planned to construct four-family apartment units, complete with parking and other facilities.

After the request was withdrawn, the commission learned that Kelley's clients were Mr. and Mrs. William Burkett and Mr. and Mrs. Richard Dougherty.

Zoning change for Riverside school property was also discussed Monday night, but it was determined that nothing could be done until after the zoning code is amended.

Phil Sexton had requested a change in zoning, from public to Class B residential, but no action could be taken, as such a change is not covered in the code.

Chiefs to Host Bucks In Game of Season

The date: Friday, Nov. 8.
The time: 7:30 p.m.

The place: Dowagiac football field.

The event: The climax of the 1963 football season, which will pit the Buchanan Bucks against the Dowagiac Chieftans.

The setting for this year's contest is much the same as last year, when the Bucks were champions of the Blossomland conference and the Chiefs were champs of the Big Five Buchanan won last year, 7-0.

The difference this year is that the Chiefs are title contenders, with the outcome of the Niles-Portage game to decide the Big Five title. If Niles wins, the Vikings will also capture the Big Five crown.

Strong Rivalry
The annual rivalry between the Bucks and Chiefs is as strong as that between the Bucks and the Vikings or Bears. A win by either team is a high point of the season, regardless of the outcome of other games.

Victory this year would be especially sweet, since the Chiefs were ranked ninth in the state last week, and this week are still ranked above the Bucks even after being upset by Niles.

The game will feature a contest between two of the most evenly matched teams to meet on the gridiron this season. Dowagiac was undefeated until last week, and now boasts of a 6-1 record. The Bucks, after losing the opening game and tying St. Joe, have easily won over all comers.

Friday night should really be the test for both teams. That the contest will be something to watch is evident by the lack of comment by either head coach. Coach Bill Karpinski simply is not talking, and all Dowagiac Coach Jack McAvoy would say is that it will be a game worth watching.

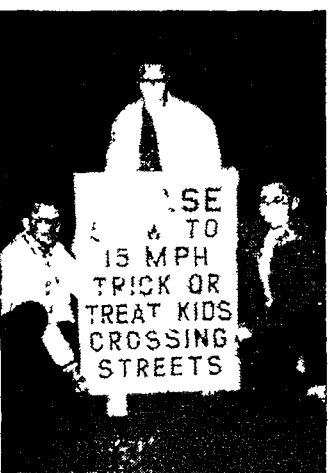

A regular meeting of the City Commission was called to order by Mayor Mitchell at the City Hall on Monday, October 28, 1963 at 7:30 p.m.

Roll call showed all Commissioners, City Manager, City Treasurer, City Attorney and City Clerk present.

Elmer Suttles Killed In Car-Truck Crash

Funeral services were held Sunday for Elmer Dale Suttles, who was fatally injured in a car-truck accident Thursday afternoon, Oct. 31. Services were conducted from Swem Funeral home by Rev. M. J. Michael of Trinity Lutheran church in Glendora. Interment was at Oak Ridge cemetery.

The fatal accident occurred about 3:35 p.m. on Red Bud Trail, at the curve just north of the city limits, on the ranslicked blacktop paving.

Deputies Charles Tiefenbach and Officer George Albrecht reported that Suttles was driving north when his auto apparently skidded out of control and into the path of a bread truck, driven by George Nussbatt of South Bend. The truck driver reportedly told the officers he was rounding the curve when the car went into a skid and crashed almost head-on into the truck.

The auto was declared a total wreck and the left front portion of the truck was crushed.

Suttles was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. Joseph F. Colligan, deputy medical examiner, as result of a basal skull fracture.

The truck driver was treated at Pawating hospital for fractured ribs and a puncture wound and fracture of his right leg. He was later transferred to Memorial hospital in South Bend.

Mr. Suttles was born Feb. 22, 1940, in Griffithville, Ark., the son of Clarence R. and Edna Suttles. He married Diane Laverne Freeling June 7, 1963, in Dowagiac and at the time of the accident resided at 405 North Portage St. He is survived by his wife and parents, who reside at the Portage street address.

Site of County College A Question With Voters

On Dec. 5 qualified voters in Berrien county will go to the polls to cast their votes on the question of establishment of a county community college. As a public service the Berrien County Record is presenting a series of articles related to the forthcoming vote, written by the editor.

When the Dec. 5 election to create a Berrien county community college district is mentioned, two questions are often asked:

"Why do we need a county college, when we already have the Benton Harbor Community college?"

"If we vote to have this, where are they going to build it?"

The first question is relatively simple to answer. There is a community college at Benton Harbor, but according to college personnel enrollment has reached the maximum.

The 1963 enrollment of 1,442 represents 792 full time and 650 part time students. These students are attending day and

night classes in a building designed and built to accommodate 640 students, according to Henry H. Brown.

Brown predicts that because of a limited tax base Benton Harbor will be unable to expand present facilities, resulting in a limiting of future enrollment.

At present about 85 per cent of students are not residents of the district, and these students would be hit first in any narrowing of the service area, he stated at a recent meeting.

Impossible to Answer
The second question—location of a county college—is impossible to answer at this time.

Under provisions for establishing a county community college, such matters as policy and location are entrusted to a board of trustees. This board, consisting of six members, will be elected at the Dec. 5 special election.

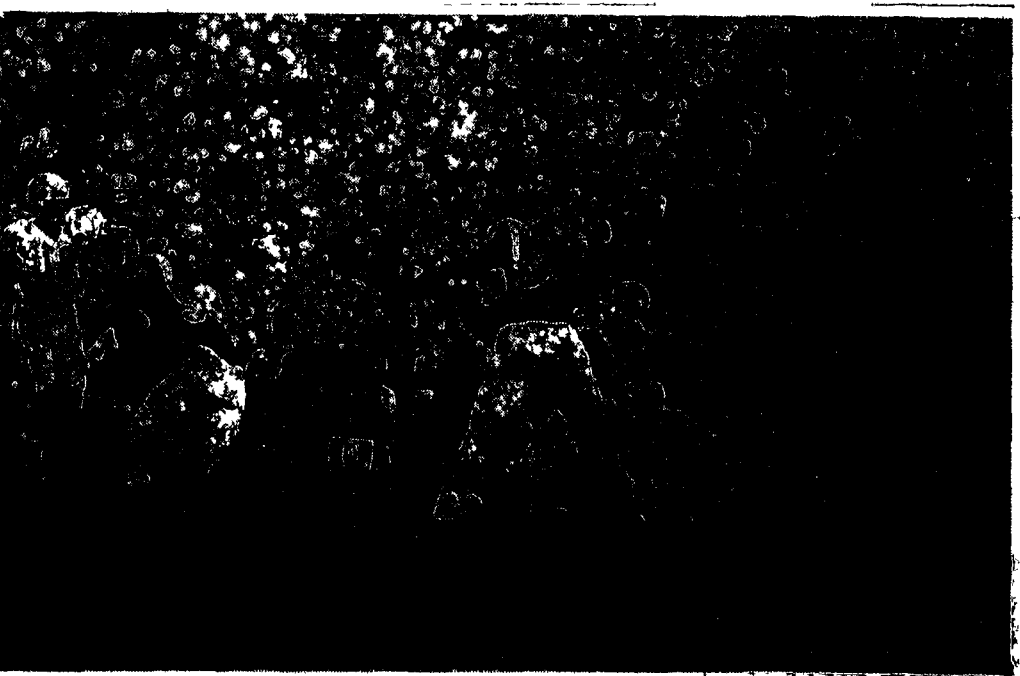
Trustees are to be elected at large from throughout the county, and will serve a term of one year.

The question of location will be one of the key matters to be decided by the trustees. The board will be faced with the decision of purchasing present Benton Harbor Community facilities, and adjacent facilities and land for enlargement, or whether to purchase land at a new site.

While trustees will not be obligated to follow recommendations on location, submitted by a citizens' study committee, they will be expected to study the proposals. It is these recommendations by the study committee that are causing some concern by interested residents outside the Benton Harbor area.

In the final report by the study committee, recommendations on location all favored expansion of the present site without giving much information on what would be involved in establishing a county college at a new site. While opponents of

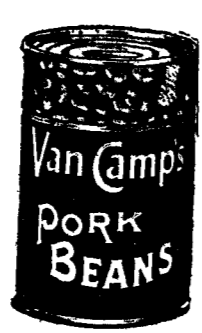

Trapp Urges Flying of Flag on Veterans Day

A plea to have an American flag flying at every home and business or industrial firm in Buchanan on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, was voiced Wednesday by Commander Marne Trapp of Ralph Rumbaugh Post No. 51 of the American Legion here.

"In the interest of showing the rest of the world the unity of the American people, every home, every business firm, every industrial plant thruout the land should display an American flag on Veterans Day," Commander Trapp said.

The local Legion leader explained that the eyes of the world, and particularly those of the forces of world communism, are constantly watching for any signs of internal weakness which might forecast the downfall of the United States.

"Here in Buchanan, we can do our share toward the discouragement of any such thoughts about a weak, apathetic, dispirited American citizenry by flying the Star-Spangled Banner on this patriotic holiday," Commander Trapp declared.

Show of Appreciation

"With the American flag displayed in front of every home and business address, we can make this year's observance of Veterans Day — Nov. 11 — an unforgettable demonstration of Americanism, and at the same time show our community's measure of appreciation for all who answered our country's call to arms for the preservation of our priceless heritage."

He also reminded, "No American flag is ever obsolete, even if it may bear fewer than 50 stars in the field of blue. Regardless of its age, as long as it is in good condition, the flag may and should be displayed on all appropriate occasions."

He further urged homes which do not have a flag to obtain one, not only for display on Veterans Day, but also on all patriotic holidays and other appropriate occasions.

The win over Cass also marked the second straight year in which the Bucks have remained undefeated in league play. Going into the final game of the season Friday night as they travel to Dowagiac, the Bucks now boast a 6-1-1 season tally. The Chieftains were ranked ninth in the state and were undefeated until being upset by Niles last Friday.

Altho Buchanan won the championship, players, coaches and fans were a bit disappointed in the outcome. The six points scored by the Rangers were the first scored against Buchanan by a conference team this season, and the first scored against Buchanan in the last six games. The 21 points by the Bucks also represented the lowest score by which the Bucks have won this season.

The six points by the Rangers was earned in the first period as Rick Snyder passed to Paul Kelley, who was all alone in the end zone.

Snow Made Ball Slippery

The low score by Buchanan was a combination of a determined Ranger team and the weather, primarily the weather. With the temperature near freezing and snow making the turf wet, the Bucks had trouble hanging onto the ball in the first half as they fumbled three times and lost control all three times. The first fumble came with the Bucks knocking on the Rangers' door.

Coach Bill Karpinski explained after the game why Buchanan fumbled in the first half and not the second. The Bucks were using the regular rubber ball in the first half, which became slippery from the snow and wet grass. Karpinski said that in the second half he switched to a leather ball, the same as Cass was using.

Lamb Leading Teammates

A standout in the contest Friday night was fullback Larry Lamb, who was playing against his former classmates. Altho Lamb did not score, he carried the ball 12 times for 124 yards to lead the Bucks in rushing, and also led in tackles, with nine. On three of the 12 carries, Lamb picked up 23, 47 and 26 yards, and on at least one of the runs all that kept him from scoring was a missed down-field block.

Also in the rushing department, David Shoemaker ran six times, for 85 yards, Willie Sam Warren ran seven times for 48, and sophomore fullback Jerry Withers carried twice for 23 yards.

Bucks Score Early

After putting the ball into play on their 20, the Bucks needed only three plays and 58 seconds to hit pay dirt.

On a new play Warren took the ball directly from center and ran it to the 34. From there Lamb took a hand-off from Jack Jesse, broke thru a hole in the center of the line and ran 23 yards, to the Rangers' 43. On the next play Shoemaker took the ball from Jesse and scampered around left end for the touchdown.

The conversion attempt by Shoemaker was off to the right, and with the game only 58 seconds old, the Bucks were out in front, 6-0.

Buchanan's mighty defense dug in and Cass was forced to punt after picking up one first down. After that the Bucks had difficulties, both with a slippery ball and penalties.

On the first play from scrimmage a 15-yard clipping penalty set the Bucks back and they were forced to punt on fourth down. On the first play from

As the second period opened, Buchanan put the ball into play on Cass' 16. Two 15-yard penalties and three plays later the Bucks were back to Cass' 42. Jesse then attempted his first pass of the game and it was intercepted by Marvin Bufkin on the 26.

Cass marched to Buchanan's 26 before losing the ball on downs. The Bucks had the ball for two plays, when a fumble nullified a 26-yard run by Lamb. The fumble was recovered by Bufkin.

For the remainder of the half, neither team was effective, as each lost the ball on fumbles, and the Bucks had another pass intercepted. The fumble by Cass was recovered by tackle Jack Webb.

Halftime score was 6-6.

Score Early in Third

To open the second half the Bucks kicked off to the Rangers. Four plays later the Rangers punted and Buchanan took over on Cass' 35.

Lamb hit the line for four yards, and on the second play Shoemaker ran thru a hole over center and went 29 yards for the TD. His kick for the conversion was wide to the right, and with the clock showing 9:12, the Bucks held a 12-6 lead.

Two minutes later the Rangers lined up for a punt from their own 28. A high pass from center sailed over Ray's head and the ball rolled into the end zone where it was downed by end Lyle Davidson, for a two-point safety.

Cass kicked off to Buchanan and then recovered a free ball on their own 43, after the ball had been touched by several Bucks. They were forced to punt and the Bucks controlled the ball through the remainder of the period.

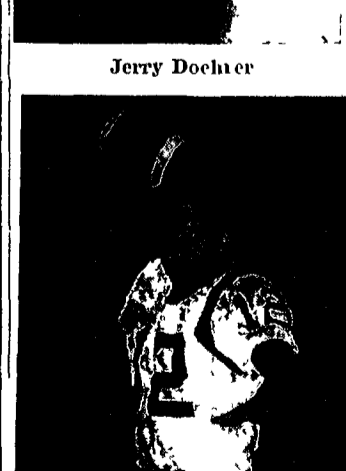

Education means many things to many people. We are all familiar with our local problems of education which feature increased enrollment - more need for classrooms in all local districts. The students are already with us - these facts we cannot overlook - some schools are overcrowded - running half day sessions. The need for consolidation is also with us to eliminate high costs and spread the base over a larger area.

Going along a little further with the need for education - all of us realize that we need to keep up with the fast pace of changing technology. Farmers need continued knowledge and information to make the decisions regarding their farm operations - where they get their information - from whom - dealers, fieldmen, magazines, county agents or other farmers. All of this each farmer must decide for himself.

County College
What Berrien county must decide is are the public educational opportunities they provide for young men and women after they leave high school adequate. We must provide technical training or a formal college education. Colleges and universities are crowded - costs for education are high - a student can get a good start toward 4 year college education in community or county college. More students are present than colleges can take care of. Where will our students who want an education get a chance to enroll?

Should we have our students selected only on math or science ability or should students who are average have an opportunity to get a college education, too? The county college will afford our students who want to go, the opportunity. It may be a way of insuring future students an opportunity to get formal education while at home.

Costs of Education Compared

A practical way to take a look at the cost of education in our district is to compare our costs with that of others. "School Management" a national journal of excellent background and reputation provides that opportunity with a statistical study of hundreds of the nation's schools according to size and area. Observations and figures stated below are from the completed study of the 1962-63 school year. Our schools are compared here with other schools of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan area.

These are costs of operation only. A future time will be used to compare Buchanan with others in the area of debt retirement costs.

The averages listed below are Column 1 average for all schools, Column 2 average of the top 25 per cent, Column 3 average of the top 10 per cent and Column 4 the Buchanan cost for 1962-63.

You will note that Buchanan ranks close to average in all nine categories. We are not in the low cost areas nor are we in the upper 25 or 10 per cent of schools paying higher amounts per pupil. Buchanan ranked average in a similar study by School Management in 1959-60. This comparison was made on the same categories listed above. Costs in all areas rose approximately 15 per cent from 1959-60 to 1962-63.

Education Critic Asks; "Are Schools Wrong"

A bad attitude may not be entirely to blame for a youth's decision to drop out of high school before he completes the four years.

This is the conclusion of Ken T. Bement, Burroughs Corp., vice president. Bement notes that a youth who concludes that the school will not adequately use his potential to prepare him for the next half century of his working life may be right.

"Our schools, reflecting the wishes of parents, emphasize academic subjects, glorify the undisputed virtues of higher education, and under-staff, under-finance, under-program, and under-value vocational training," he said.

Bement has expressed his view on the dropout problem to educators on a number of occasions so it is not being thrown to the wind as criticism without construction.

"We have been and still are victimized by the fixed idea that our schools are intended to produce college students," he says. He urges that "equal time" be

devoted for vocational training of the 70 per cent of high school students who do not go on to college.

Bement contends that unlike the "old days when a wood shop and metal working shop would suffice," today schools need a dozen or more highly specialized, up-to-date shops to train needed technicians and specialists.

Realistically, Bement admits the cost of adequate vocational training facilities is beyond the means of the vast majority of schools even with federal aid.

He said one alternative to this problem could be the creation of "area schools" equipped and staffed to offer specialist training and technician training for a large geographic unit.

"Man must keep pace with his invention," said Bement. "We can neither afford nor can we tolerate a tomorrow in which a skilled elite dominates a technologically illiterate mass."

"Our only assurance that future generations will live as free men in a peaceful, abundant society is our ability to teach and to train this and future

generations in the technical skills and sciences that make man the master of his creation."

The Big Drink
Liquor is a big business in Michigan, especially during the forthcoming year-end holiday period.

The Liquor Control Commission has ordered more than \$26 million worth of alcoholic beverages for the annual holiday sales spurt. Commission Chairman Don S. Leonard said the purchases recommended for the holidays totaled 878,425 cases. This was about 23,000 cases more than were sold in the last two months of 1962.

Justification for the increased purchases this year probably can be seen in Commission report which showed that late-summer sales this year were up more than 7 per cent over the same period of 1962.

Child Killers
Vaccines are available for most of the childhood diseases today, but the leading killer of children goes unabated, according to Dr. Goldie B. Corneliuson of the State Health Department. "Immunizations have reduced childhood diseases to the lowest point in history, but accidents are continuing to take a needless toll of life."

In the age group of 1-15 years, accidents last year killed 472 Michigan children. This represented more than one third of the deaths from all causes in this age group.

"We know that accidents don't just happen," the Health Department spokesman said. "They are the results of sequence of events a chain reaction. If we are aware of the factors that lead up to accidents we can do a great deal to prevent their occurrence simply by eliminating one or two of the links in this chain."

For example, Dr. Corneliuson noted that most childhood accidents occur in the late afternoon, when children are apt to be tired and hungry, and a

mother's attention is on preparing a dinner. The stress present to the mother daily is also great at this period. She may be hungry, tired, or in a hurry.

"Half the battle in preventing childhood accidents is knowing the danger signals, and taking extra precautions during critical times," she said.

The Benton Harbor site are concerned with the committee recommending a course of action rather than just presenting factual information, they join proponents in endorsing the principle and need for a county college in Berrien.

In presenting its report the study committee on locations used accepted evaluation criteria on which to base its recommendation that the present site be expanded, but did not furnish a future board of trustees information necessary to apply the same criteria in considering a new location.

List Criteria
Presented here is the criteria used, and conclusion arrived at by the committee. Also presented here is information compiled by a member of the county college action committee.

Criteria 1: Located in proximity to the area of greatest population density and as near as possible to the geographical center of the area to be served.

The committee's evaluation was that "the site is approximately 6 1/2 miles from the population center of Berrien county."

The committee did not include in its evaluation that land was also available at the population center, one mile south of Buckhorn.

Criteria 2: Large enough to permit construction and development of adequate cultural, educational and necessary auxiliary facilities to provide programs and services for the maximum numbers of youth and adults anticipated in the foreseeable future.

Evaluation: "The estimated size of the initial site is 65 acres and future acquisition of additional acres is possible."

Acres at the present site is only 16 acres. At a recent public meeting Jules Wagnan, member of site committee, reported that the site could be expanded to 65 acres. Recommended minimum site size for a county college is 100 acres.

Criteria 3: Free from obnoxious odors and disturbing noises, such as those resulting from heavy truck, automobile, railway, and aircraft traffic and by fire sirens and factory whistles.

Evaluation: "Reasonably so, complete survey not made."

The present site, and proposed expanded site borders Britain avenue and is adjacent to the New York Central Railroad, and is located in an area proposed for urban renewal.

Criteria 4: Located a sufficient distance from elementary high school sites to avoid heavy motor vehicle traffic usually generated in those areas.

Evaluation: "If McCord school and site is made available and relocated, this site would meet this criteria."

If located in a new area, particularly at the population center, there would be no problem.

Criteria 5: Free from haz-

ards and natural barriers which affect the accessibility of the school or generate potential danger to life and limb.

Evaluation: "Reasonably so." The evaluation does not consider the heavy Britain avenue traffic nor the railroad.

Criteria 6: Accessible to the service area without the necessity of crossing expressways or other heavy traffic

lines and by several transportation routes, but away from major thru highways.

Evaluation: "Away from major highways, but careful campus planning would need to be done because of Britain avenue and Fan avenue that would have to be crossed."

A new site at the population center would also meet this criteria, being located approxi-

mately one mile off US 31.

Criteria 7: Contains a reasonably and regularly proportioned contiguous area of land desirable for construction purposes.

Evaluation: "Study not made, but assumed that it is reasonably compact because of present facilities located on the various parcels. Some peat bog reported."

Here, again, the evaluation does not consider any site other than the present community college location.

Criteria 8: Located so all available public service facilities such as water, gas, sewers, fire protection and electricity can be utilized.

Evaluation: "Yes"

A subcommittee report on availability of land near Buckhorn, but not included in the draft of the site committee's recommendations, pointed out that these services would be available at such a new site.

Criteria 9: Attractive and in surroundings pleasing to the eye so that a feeling of pride, happiness and contentment will tend to be created.

Evaluation: "Yes, if urban renewal treatment is applied."

This evaluation is based solely on urban renewal for this area being approved and accepted in Benton Harbor. It also indicates that the present site is located adjacent to an area not compatible with the criteria.

Criteria 10: Available at a reasonable original cost and require a minimum of development for suitable use.

Evaluation: "In applying this criteria to the present site and

facilities of the Benton Harbor community college as herein described, certain facts are known at this time and certain assumptions must be made by the committee, as follows:

The report then includes 4 1/2 pages on various factors affecting cost of acquiring and expanding the present site. However, it does not include any firm figure, or even an estimate of cost of purchasing and expanding the present site. What figures are presented on expansion of site area are based on the supposition that urban renewal will be approved. Likewise, no figures are given on locating a county college at a new site.

Further information concerning cost and financing will be contained in future articles.

One of Key Decisions

The criteria and evaluations included in this article were not presented for the purpose of discrediting Benton Harbor Community college or the committee's recommendation that that be the site of a county college. Rather, the information was included to point up one of the key decisions which will face a board of trustees, and to point up information compiled for use by such a board and the criteria for site selection.

The matter of a site for the proposed county college was also presented here to illustrate to the electorate the tremendous job facing a board and necessity of learning the qualifications of the various candidates.

In addition to electing a board of trustees, county electors will vote on whether to form a county community college district, and on levying of 10 mill for financing operation and construction.
