The letter reads: "The work of your Red Cross chapter in making garments for American Red Cross Civilian Relief has been so vital a factor in our relief work here in Vienna that I want to tell you at first hand what it meant to cold and undernourished Austrians."

R. Hayden Named Fellow Of National Research Council

When at the beginning of winter it was decided by the American Red Cross to include American civilians in clothing distributions a generous allotment was made to Vienna. Over 90,000 garments produced by chapters such as yours have been brought here...

and skill generously contributed by women in America.

"Due publicity was given in local newspapers to the clothing distribution in progress and at the same time representative garments were attractively displayed, together with pertinent poster information relative thereto, in one of the shops situated at one of the most widely traversed intersections of Vienna's business area.

"We joined the U. S. Forces in making Christmas memorials for the Viennese, by arranging parties in each of the children's hospitals and orphanages. Each child got a garment, two chocolate bars, a roll of Life Savers, a toy and a Christmas card from the Red Cross.

"In addition we work with the U. S. Military Government Public Health, Public Welfare, and Displaced Persons Sections on civilian problems. But the garments you made are the means by which we help strengthen Austrian agencies and help teach them cooperative democratic work so that they can better help their own people."

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18 Passengers Have Miraculous Escape With Life

Cause Accident Uncertain; Driver Shows Skill In Minimizing Damages

The High Grade Oil Company's filling station structure at the intersection of South Portage and Railway streets was struck by a runaway Chicago-Detroit Greyhound bus about 7:30 p. m. Sunday. The impact demolishing the north end of the structure and twisting the remainder of the structure so badly that it will have to be rebuilt.

The cause of the accident is not clear, as the Sunday night storm, were rather discredited Monday morning by the report of the coast party service men on the water level in good condition after the wreck.

Ava Schumaker, gate-keeper at the Michigan Central crossing on the 4-12 shift, stated that he saw the accident and that it was evident to him that the bus was traveling at a fairly high rate of speed while rounding the Chamberlain hill from the south.

Shearing off the most northerly of the two oil pumps the bus hit the northeast corner of the building, the impact leaving off about 10 feet of the north end of the structure, which was used as a stock warehouse. The bus was slowed down by the impact of tires, oil pump and building, and came to a stop about thirty feet beyond.

Whatever errors the driver may have made at the start of the accident, it was agreed by all witnesses that he did a superb job of driving after he left the crossing, and that his skill in steering the vehicle was very likely responsible for the saving of lives and costly injuries. The bus had a load of eighteen passengers in addition to the driver.

Schumaker, the railway-gatekeeper, said that as the bus approached the crossing it was apparent that Hamblin had control, except for checking the speed, and that he was fighting hard to save his bus and passengers. However, the crossing is uneven, and the grade drops off sharply immediately to the north, making it impossible to control a vehicle under the circumstances.

As the bus hit and tore off the north end of the building, the left wheels went over the cement floor raised about a foot above the ground. As it took the eighteen inch drop at the end of the building the passengers on the rear of the bus was torn off. The right front corner of the bus was badly mangled in by the impact on the tree at the right side. However, this is why the bus steps are and there was no one there at that spot to be injured. The remainder of the interior was hardly damaged.

When the eighteen passengers were checked over it was found that three of the passengers had received slight abrasions. They were treated by a local physician and immediately released. They were Velma Schumaker of LaPorte, Ind., and Helen Snavely of Hammond, Ind., both bound for college at Spring Harbor, Mich., and Mrs. Carey Housney of Hammond, Ind.

On the following morning a building contractor looked over the building. It was found that the frames of the windows at the opposite or south end of the building were so badly wrenched that the screws had been pulled out of the window locks and all of the building wrenched out of shape.

As the bus moved away from the north end it overturned eight high-bos filled with 300 gallons of oil spilling the oil. The cooler for the oil drum was tilted and the battery-charger and the air compressor.





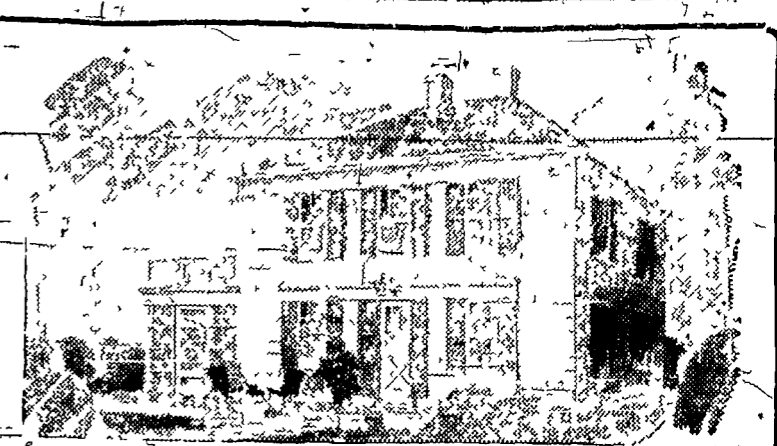
