

## UP ESTIMATES FRUIT DAMAGE HERE

### Civilian Defense Film, "Pattern of Survival", Is Exhibited Here

### Peaches, Grapes Hardest Hit On Buchanan Farms

#### Local Orchardists Do Not Think Apple Crop Gone; Small Fruit Is Not Damaged

Estimates of anticipated fruit crops in the Buchanan district as well as in the huge fruit industry of all southwest Michigan have become increasingly somber, as more and more growers examine the fruit buds and report their findings.

Apparently temperatures in the district immediately around Buchanan never reached what is ordinarily the danger mark during the Nov. 24 cold snap that did the damage. Mercury readings from nearby farms averaged about 7 below, whereas there were authentic reports of 15 below through the upper part of the county and points north.

It is now becoming apparent, however, that the combination of the 7 degrees minus and the heat wave that set in about Oct. 15 and extended into the first week in November has resulted in more loss than was anticipated. Temperatures reached 80 degrees above during the long warm period, which started, the sap up throughout the branches and stimulated both leaf and fruit buds. Robert Hall reported that at that time he had some apple trees cut in his orchard and the workers reported that the fallen trees were "boiling with life."

This combination of circumstances has resulted in the following estimates: peaches, few or none, apples, plums, cherries, "operation questionable"; grapes, few or none, small fruit, probably not hurt.

Glenn Kunney reported that he had tested branches of Elbertas and South Haves and found the buds all dead. He is now testing Hale Haves, but is not optimistic. One fruit grower in the North Buchanan district is reported as saying that he had tested his trees and expected at least a scattering crop of Rochester. Lynn Robbins reported that his examinations revealed that not only the fruit buds were killed, but also that the cambium layer of wood in the new fruit spur branches, which carries the sap flow, turns brown under test, indicating it has been killed.

Clarence Dunbar reports that on his fruit farm a mile west of Buchanan the results of tests indicate that he will not have any grape crop worth mentioning. He took over a dozen grape branches about 18 inches long to the Buchanan Floral where Charles Falkenstein tested them. Falkenstein first cut into the fruit buds and found them green. But after being subjected a short time to the even, moderate temperature of the greenhouse, they all turned brown. Falkenstein stated that the secondary buds, which are Nature's reserve provision in the event of damage to the primary buds, might develop and produce a fractional grape crop.

At a grape pruning demonstration held recently on a farm three miles southwest of Berrien, state experts there reported that the whole grape crop of southwestern Michigan, including the large vineyards of the Lawton and Paw Paw areas had been very seriously damaged, but that there might be some vines that produce from one-third to one-half crops. They advised that in tests made through-out the grape district they found some vineyards where only a part of the bud-bearing branches were damaged.

Recently reports of damage have been coming in from apple orchards, the gloomiest, however, coming from the north end of the county, where some apple crops are reported some.

Robert Hall, of Hall's Apple Farm, stated that he had not been able to examine his orchard thoroughly but did not believe that conditions warranted writing off the apple crop here. The 8 degrees below here would not normally hurt apples. However the question mark is: To what extent did the warm weather preceding the Nov. 24 freeze stimulate the apple buds out of the dormant stage? Apple buds are not so responsive to warm spells as peach buds. The sap-filled trees cut in his orchard were in a section that had been heavily fertilized and consequently were more quickly stimulated than others. Possibility of damage depends on a number of factors, such as air drainage, shelter, extent of dormancy, which may differ under different conditions so that it is not possible to make accurate estimates now.

Ira Newlander reported that he examined his apple buds Tuesday of this week and found them compact, green and apparently (Continued on page six)

### Now Here's the Proposition

An Echo of the Civil War

When this writer came to Buchanan almost 23 years ago there were six Civil War veterans living in Buchanan, three of them at least quite lively.

In the summer it was quite usual to see the Three Old Musketeers, Sam Bunker, John Dick and George Hanley, sauntering down the front street sidewalk, or seated on the old stone balustrade that used to hem in the entrance to what is now the Donley tavern. John Dick, then a justice of the peace and an insurance man, was the dandy of the three. He lives plainly yet in many memories, neat sailor straw hat, and a cane carried rather for looks than for necessity, chin whiskers drawn neatly to a point.

They are all gone now, and probably not one in a thousand in Buchanan remember the Civil War, that snook Buchanan far more deeply than any war before or since with its heavy draft of men, one out of eight of Michigan's total census that ratio, applied to our national population, that would mean a military force of 18,875,000 men in this emergency which we will not attain.

The other day Thomas Newitt came into the Record office and displayed a copper "token" coin that had been issued by a Buchanan mercantile firm, Weaver and Fox, who had a hardware store in the first floor of the present Buchanan Hotel building, then newly built.

The small cent-piece, rather smaller than the current penny, bore the name of the store, and the nature of business Mr. Newitt had ploughed it out while cultivating his garden at his farm 2 1/2 miles south and 2 1/2 miles east of Gallen. These business tokens were issued by merchants to their customers in change, good only in their store or perhaps in other Buchanan stores which would honor them.

They were doubtless as reliable for local use as the national currency which then rated 40 cents on the dollar in the payment of debts which required the equivalent of payment in gold. The hardware store on the third floor of the hotel building was the office of the weekly newspaper, the Buchanan Record. The old sample issue that this writer saw, dated in the late summer or fall of 1864, while the armies of Grant and Lee were locked in deadly combat, told its subscribers that the paper had received the casualty lists for this district and had them posted on the wall, where anyone interested might come and see them. They were too long for reproduction by the old handset press. One can imagine the tragic procession that wended its way up and down the stairs of the hotel building.

Leave Guide Dogs Alone

The story we ran last week in this column about Jimmy Sarver's dog, Dinky, aroused a lot of interest and comment, and also brought to our attention an editorial in the December issue of "The Lion," a magazine for members of Lions clubs. The editorial deals with public attitude towards a "guide dog" leading a blind person. In many part it follows:

"How often do you see people touch or pet a guide dog, whistle or speak to a leader?"

"Lions clubs, who are known for their many activities in behalf of the blind, well realize that the task of educating the public to help a blind person in his adjustment, or readjustment, to life, is endless. And one important aspect concerns teaching people to regard a guide dog as the eyes of a blind person first and a dog second."

### Defense Against A Bomb Show

Film Shows What To Do And What Not, If And When In Mile And Half-Mile Radius

A small audience of Buchananites plus a few attendants from outside communities witnessed a "Michigan First" in the way of film releases in the presentation of the Civilian Defense educational picture, "Pattern of Survival," filmed with the intent of instructing people what to do and when to do it in the event of the detonation of an atomic bomb when they happened to be anywhere near the radius of danger.

The picture was secured by W. S. Manspeaker, safety director of the Clark Equipment company, who secured it from Col. A. D. Howe, deputy director of Civilian Defense in Michigan. Manspeaker secured it first with the intention of showing it to the supervisory forces of the Clark Equipment plant in Buchanan. It was the first time the film had been shown in Michigan.

The film began with a short graphic exposition of the mechanics of atom bomb explosion. Then it pictured the effect of such explosion on a distant city, which resembled a simplified skyline of New York City, showing the effects on buildings within a half mile radius, and within a mile radius. Then followed a simple pictorial demonstration of what to do and what not to do in offices home in the event that a siren warning came heralding danger. Following shots showed what to do and what not to do in offices if the atomic flash came without warning. In brief the instructions were to get to a prepared shelter in the home basement, get close to a substantial wall, lay flat with hands over eyes, do not raise head to look for fear of effect of gamma rays on vision, etc.

The importance of the time element in survival was stressed. In the deadly radius of a half mile, the force of the shock blast resulting from mere explosion will reach the outside boundary of the mile-wide circle. Immediately following will be the wave of violent heat, and within a space of ten seconds will come the atomic rays with their atom-contamination. Of course, the nearer a person is to the center of that circle, the quicker the deadly triple succession arrives, until escape is demonstrably impossible near the point of "ground zero" under the bomb, which would explode two miles in the air to secure utmost destructive efficiency.

The last shots showed throngs of people running for a bomb shelter in the streets of a great city at the siren warning given where presence of a hostile plane had been detected.

The film doubtless left an impression of horror and shock with many in the audience, who watched the pictured apparent "devil take the hindmost" rush for the shelter. One noted that the stampede in itself seemed fraught with danger, and also that the rate with which men and women were running would be beyond the capacity of the streets and the more able-bodied middle-aged. One wondered where the very young of the old and infirm and ill had been left.

The scene became more logical however when after thought revealed that this is about how it would be, since proper defense precaution would probably remove a great city all such of the more helpless elements to places of comparative safety. Then the apparent rush became more logical. One of the lessons of the film was, the most dangerous place to be in the event of an atomic explosion would be the open streets, where walls would come tumbling outward. Presupposing a time space of warning permitted getting into basements or better yet into adequately prepared shelters, this would be the first caution. If caught in the open the best place to fall would be at the base of a solid wall sheltering one from the direction of the explosion.

In a talk following the showing of the film Mr. Manspeaker explained that there had been no thought of selection or exclusion in assembling the audience of from 150 to 200 present, as the film had come rather unexpectedly when he requested educational material for plant supervisors as a part of the safety program. When the picture was sent, the invitations were widened to include representatives from other industries, then city officials and then business and professional people. No notice had been given. (Continued on page six)

### Cats Claw Bucks By 55-38 Score

Green Bucks Weaken After Stiff Fight During First Half

Last Friday night the Buchanan boys saw a vastly improved Buck quintet drop their fifth consecutive Big Seven start to the Three Rivers Wildcats 55-38.

For three quarters the Bucks were breathing down the neck of the Cats, a team rated third in the state by the Detroit Free Press.

The home town crowd had something to cheer about as the Buck five, led by Lowell Gamble's seven-point spurge, fought their way to a 11-10 first quarter lead.

But the Cats were not to be out-scraped and as the second period got under way their speed and accuracy began to show results.

With only a few seconds left in the half the Three Rivers club took a slight two-point margin, 25-23. Dick Verhulst counted with a two-hand push shot just as the buzzer sounded ending the first half to give the Wild Cats a 27-23 advantage.

The worn-out Buck five held on in the third quarter, trying to hold down the scoring but Three Rivers kept rolling, and by the end of the third period were possessed of a 39-31 lead.

Hitting an ever pace the Cats began to pour it on with consistency, pounding the nets for 16 points in the final stanza while holding Buchanan down to seven. Final score gave Three Rivers 55, Buchanan 38.

Verhulst led the night's scoring with six buckets and an equal number of free throws, giving him 18 points. The Bucks held down the high scoring Jerry Mitchell to two baskets. Dick Beattie led the Bucks' attack with 15 points.

The reserves lost the preliminary game to the Three Rivers J. V. 53-31.

The Buchanan yearlings traveled to Dowanac last Friday and the Chiefs licked us on three contests.

The seventh grade, coached by D. Hull, went down to a close 16-14 defeat as Chuck Ditto rang up 6 points for the locals. This pushed the season record for the seventh to 1-1.

Hull's eighth grade, after leading by 10 points in the first quarter, weakened in the remainder of the game and lost 30-22. Danny Ebers, brother of the lad who is burning up the hardwood out in South Dakota, hit for 15 points. The eighth grade record also stands at 1-1.

Wm. Burkett's ninth grade five took one on the chin by a 29-23 count. The freshmen's record now stands at 0-2. Andy Anderson hit 24 points for the locals.

Mrs. Kenneth Blake, 48 1/2 Days avenue, received a letter last week from Etc. John VanDeusen, part of which we reproduce:

24 December, '50  
7 1/2 Miles North of Masan, S. Korea  
Dear Aunt Peg—

As you can see, I'm still around and just as stubborn a Dutchman as ever. If anyone in Buchanan thought I was stubborn, they should ask some of the Chinese Communists. I don't think they like us, ya know?

We are now in reserve, or a sort of "plumber outfit", we plug holes in the army lines. As far as my liking for the army goes, it's still nil. But the air forces—that's a host of a different color—Don't (Hartman) 51's, the Navy and Marine Corps F4D's and F4F's, plus the Army's F5's really played a leading role in our withdrawal from the Chosen reservoir area. Yep, my hat's off to the air units.

When I do get home I'll have quite a tale to spin. What'll we do with the Mediterranean cruise under my belt and a bit of a scrap here in Korea? Two—never quite a number of funny things happen. Of course they were anything but funny when they happened. Now they serve as a good story. And I get a heck of a laugh out of some of my experiences.

As far as weather goes, we've had it! Twenty below, snow and lots of wind. Thank God, we had clothing to combat it. As it was I had a nice case of frost-bitten feet. They are slowly getting back to normal, and once again I'm my energetic self (this is debatable). As for the Irishman, (Don Hartman) the closest I came to being near him was when we moved through Inchon by Kimpoo airstrip to cross the Han river.

I've run into the Fuller guy, who is a navy medical attaché to the 3rd Battalion, 2nd Marines (Artillery). We had quite a talk about Buchanan while at Pusan.

Between you and Mom (and me too) I think God's quite well informed about what I'm up to. It seemed like I was pretty close to joining him a number of times. He didn't want me for active duty and I'm still in His Reserve Army. Well, I'm ready, and when He does call up my number I'll be ready.

He learned to love his adopted home, and in past years used to write long letters to this paper, describing life and new developments there. He became widely known through the entire area.

In addition to the Buchanan relatives mentioned above he is survived by his wife. The funeral services were held in St. Andrew's United Church in Quesnal on Jan. 3.


