The Manager submitted a budget control report for the first 3 months of the fiscal year, showing the expended amounts and the unexpended balances in the various accounts, also the receipts to the various accounts for the first three months. He also reported that \$50,000.00 invested in 90 day C I D's matured October 21st and \$25,000.00 would mature November 18th and recommended the full amounts be reinvested.

Moved by Commissioner Derflinger, seconded by Commissioner Hagley, that the City Treasurer be directed to invest \$80,000.00 in 90 day U. S. Government Certificates of deposit, as of October 21st, 1954.

The Manager reported that the county was planning some surfacing on Ryerson Road and Claremont Street could be done at this time at a very good price and recommended 1 1/2" surface.

Capital Improvement fund to account CA-32 subdivision surfacing.

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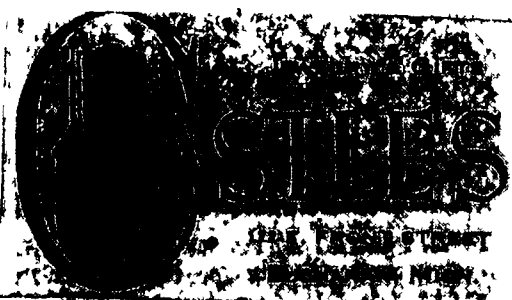
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Bucks Chalk-up Victory Despite 7-6 Loss to Niles

Buchanan high school's fighting "Bucks" dropped a 7-to-6 decision to a highly-touted Niles Viking squad Friday night at Niles. This was the first conference

game for both teams. They played like it meant the championship, which it probably did, as the Dowagiac Chiefs downed St. Joe 13 to 12.

The Bucks' score came in the second quarter. Irwin, back to punt on his own 15, was rushed by Letcher and Smith, Buck ends, and Letcher blocked the punt. The pigskin took a few crazy bounces, then bounced into Letcher's arms and he carried it over for the T.D. Steve Pendley tried the conversion, but the ball skidded off his foot.

The Niles score came just four minutes ahead of the Buchanan counter. Pendley's pass intended for Karpinski went astray and Hall for Niles intercepted, carrying to the Buck 27. Thomas made 8 yards, and Saratore 10. Then Thomas skirted the Buck right end for the T.D. Thomas' kick was good.

Outside of this series of plays Niles was held in check all evening. The vaunted power of the Vike attack stalled time after time. The Buck forward wall poured it on with bone-crushing tackles and rushing tactics.

Letcher, Bobbitt, Karpinski, Coonfield, Benak, Thompson, Rotzien, Phoenix, and Smith held the Vike attack to 113 yards rushing. Chris Schau, linebacker, and Dodge Karpinski were also in the fray time after time.

The Bucks were hurt by three 15-yard penalties, twice when they meant scoring opportunities. Several passes were dropped when it meant first downs in Niles territory. This however, was immaterial, as the team actually scored a great moral victory even in defeat.

Hall for Niles actually was the thorn in the Bucks' side, as he intercepted 2 passes and covered our receivers like a blanket.

I have established permanent plates for Drainage Districts, describing the part of the farm that is in a specified district for assessing purposes. The old method was to assess the whole farm in both districts. An illegal procedure of course.

I set up a method of bookkeeping for drains that was approved by the Auditor General of the State of Michigan and adopted State-wide. My thirty years of experience in government made it possible for me to make these improvements in the drain office.

I am now working on a drainage map consisting of eight parts, correcting 600 Drainage Districts in the County. The reason being that they overlap and this should be corrected. A farmer with five acres in a drainage district is charged on the total description he owns. It should describe the five acres in the Drainage District.

I have three grown children. I am a member of the Bridgman Lutheran church; a Farm Bureau member, an active Republican all my life and live on a farm in Lake Township.

However, it doesn't appear now that any tangible move towards employment of a controller can be brought about without a floor fight. County Clerk Frank X. Duerr, Jr., who has a steady following on the board, is openly against the plan.

Furthermore, McCormack emphasized that "I don't think we should even consider it unless the controller can be given the same stature as the department heads with whom he will be associated."

Meantime, while supervisors rallied like loyal subjects to the defense of their board chairman, Small wasn't about to let the audit issue drop. He issued a couple of statements this week that were packed with dynamite.

The audit singled out \$5,500 in purchases the county had made last year from the Twin Cities Boiler Works of Benton Harbor, a company partly owned by Small's wife, Carrie, and at one time managed by Small himself. The audit suggested that Prosecutor Joseph Killian might look into the purchases to see if a state law prohibiting dealings between the county and its individual supervisors had been violated.

First, Small declared that the audit apparently was a "smear" effort directed at him and said he had persons working to find out "just what really is behind this thing."

Then Small fired again, this time hinting that while singling out the deals with the Twin Cities Boiler Works, the audit had overlooked "others."

"And mine is not a drop in the bucket compared to some of the others," Small declared. Small also took issue with information in the audit pertaining to his retirement from the firm. The audit put the date in July, 1952. Small put it in October, 1951.

McCormack and Poorman, the two supervisors who are spearheading the controller-hiring move on the board, were among the first to jump to Small's defense.

"There was nothing wrong with those purchases," Poorman said. "Small was only trying to save the county money, and anytime a man will go out of his way to do that he should be commended, not condemned."

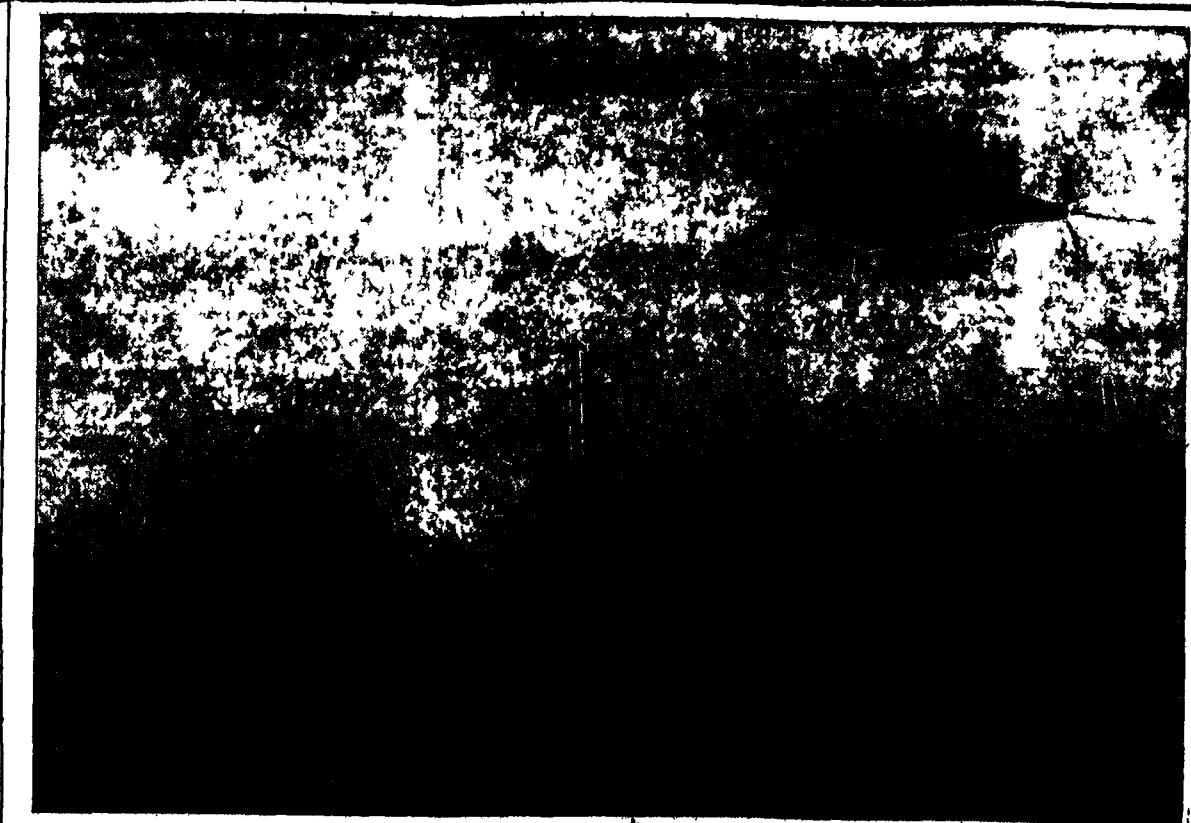

Legion Announces Addition 120-Bed Unit to Hospital

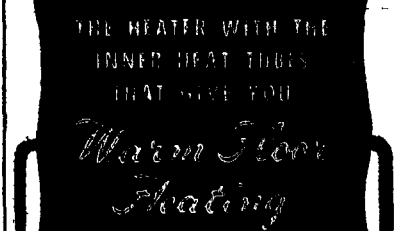
The American Legion reports the completion of a new 120-bed addition to their hospital at Battle Creek, announcing the following facilities and conditions of entry:

1. Veterans, members of their family, or other dependents who have tuberculosis may be hospitalized here. It is not necessary to be a veteran.

2. A patient may enter a tuberculosis hospital of his choice, providing there is a bed available there. Have all Service Officers point this out to the veterans that they contact. (The American Legion hospital now has 70 vacant beds.)

3. There is no cost to the county for a veteran's hospitalization, due to the fact that he is considered a State-at-Large patient. The patient must have a K-64 (Admission Authorization) from the County Health Officer. This is important.

4. Admission may be made only by the local health officer from the county in which the patient lives. When his personal physician makes diagnosis or suspects that he might have tuberculosis, this information is given to the local health department, who in turn, through the health officer, will make admission application for the patient.

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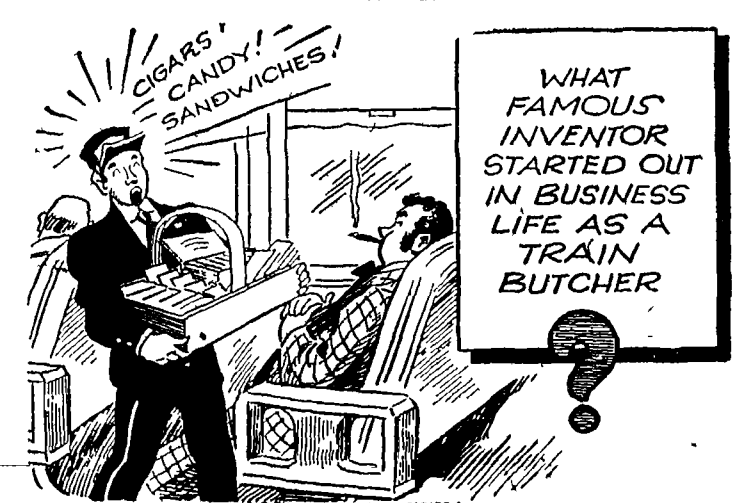

corps of about 1,000 men, would start up the steep mountain cliffs, each man carrying a rifle and with a number of machine guns in the detachment. As they scaled the mountain for the frontal attack, the regular infantry deployed in two divisions on each side of the mountain and attempted to encircle it and come up from the rear.

Dinolfo served with the Alpine troops for 17 months. Then one day an extra large hand grenade lit in the center of a group of troops badly marring both of Dinolfo's hands and blowing arms and legs off his comrades. Dinolfo had wounds all over his body in addition to the hand wounds. He spent five months in a hospital and was then placed in a guard detachment back of the front lines.

After the war ended he left his native Italy for the United States in 1921, going to Chicago, and then to Oakland, Calif., where he was in partnership with a brother in buying and selling grapes by the car load. He returned to Chicago in 1928, spending 14 months in a factory. Then in 1929 he returned to Sicily to visit his parents, remaining there eight months.

When he came back to America he found his brother, who had been operating a repair shop at Harrison and Crawford streets in Chicago, in trouble with an eye disease. Philip, like his brother, had learned the trade of repairing shoes in his father's shop in Sicily. The brother had moved to Niles for treatment by Dr. Bonine. In 1938 they closed the shop in Chicago and Philip went to Niles, spending five months with his brother. Then he visited in Italy from June to September, 1938. While there he married. Returning to the United States, he bought the shoe repair business of John Skavari, where he is now in May 1939.

His wife had remained in Sicily, where their first son was born in July, 1939. Before she could bring her son to America World War II had broken out in Italy. So Philip did not see her or the son, Guy, until December of 1946, when they finally secured passage and landed in New York City Dec. 21. Philip met her and the son, then over seven years of age. They visited with relatives in New York City and in Cleveland where they spent Christmas.

The Dinolfo family are now living happily in quarters in the rear of his shop here. His famed consists of his wife, whom he married as Benvenuta Vento in Sicily. They have two sons, the oldest, Guy, age 15, born in Italy, and the youngest Matteo, age 7, born in America.

H. Crittenden Is Severely Hurt In Freak Explosion

Harry Crittenden received painful injuries about 4:13 p. m. Friday when a wine keg which had been filled with water and a mixture of soda blew up.

Crittenden's young nephew, Butch Morrissey, came to the door several minutes after the explosion and found Crittenden lying on the floor, painfully hurt and shocked. He told the boy to run to the home of his mother, Mrs. Margaret McFarlin, whose home is on the Main street front of the same lot. She called a physician at once.

Dr. Hassen examined him and advised that he be taken to the Niles hospital. There his injuries were found to include severe multiple lacerations of the head, face and right leg, and multiple abrasions of the body. Chief Krugh and Fire Chief Burks talked with him. He told them that he did not know what caused the explosion. He had been sitting on a couch watching television. He heard a noise at the east door and thought it might be his nephew trying to get in. As he started to walk to the door, he stated the explosion occurred.

Krugh and Burks went to the shop. They found pieces of barrel staves over the room, some of them sticking in the plaster-board ceiling, some an inch and a half into the walls. Pieces of

a small watch and a leather band were found scattered over the floor.

They found a pool of blood on the floor where Crittenden had fallen and very near it the rim of the keg mark in the dust, where a keg had set. Immediately above it was a hole in the plaster-board ceiling. Two electric clocks had stopped at 4:13 p. m., indicating that was the time of the explosion.

Krugh and Burks then returned to Crittenden at the hospital and asked him if there had been a keg there. He stated that there was one, which had some wine in it that had been leaking. He filled it up with water to swell the staves so it would not leak again. About two hours later he had poured about a half box of baking soda into the keg. He did not believe that he had plugged the bung hole. Krugh stated that the hole must have been plugged or closed in some other way. There must have been enough acid from the wine left in the keg to form the gas that exploded the keg. The formation of the gas, said Krugh, was on the same recipe as that of the drink called "vinegar-fizz" or "vinegar sling" from a mixture of vinegar, baking soda and water.

Arthur Mayhew and others in the neighborhood had heard the noise of the explosion but none had been able to tell the direction the sound came from.

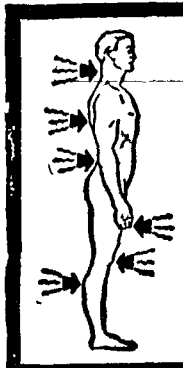

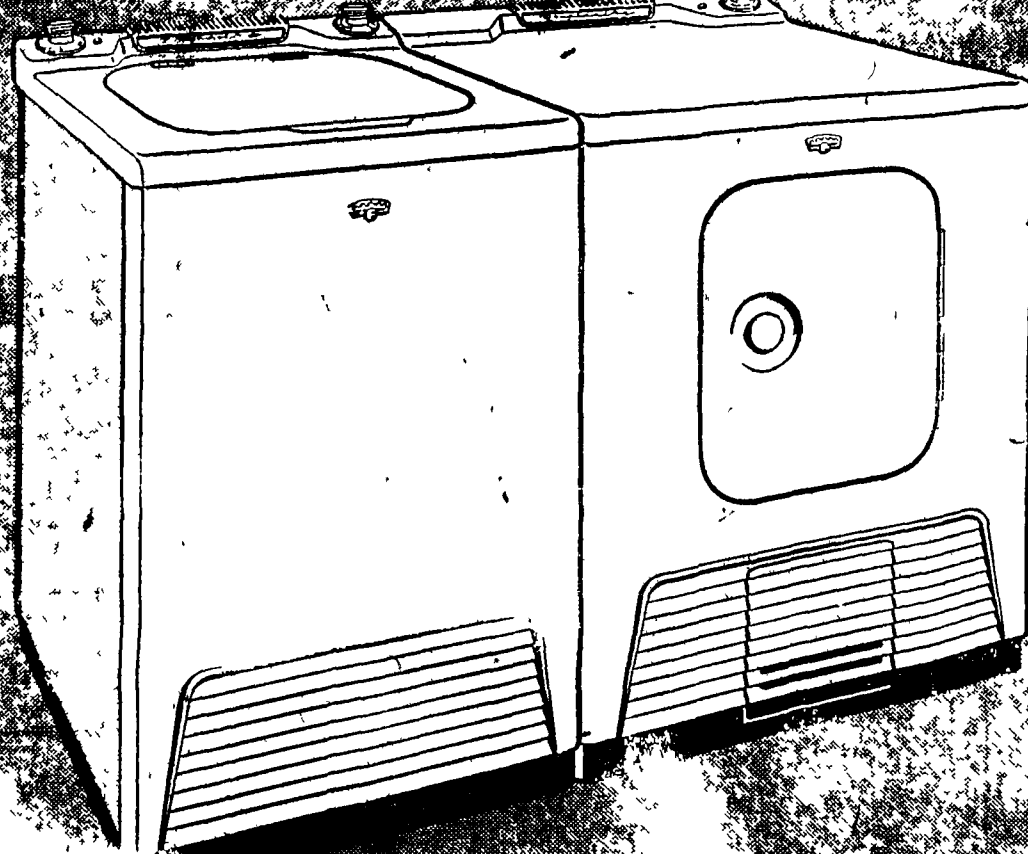
