24 Will Be Tried For Life In P. T. A. Show

Committee Reports Varied Array of Talent Entries

With a total of 24 scintillating tantalizing entries on the docket for trial Friday evening, the P. T. A. 1954 Talent Show promises more than usual entertainment.

To Tell Story Of Germany In Film Narrative

Under Auspices College Club, H. S. Auditorium

Russell Wright who has traveled this wide world all over with a camera in one hand and a note book and pencil in the other, will show some of the choicest fruits of his gleanings at the Buchanan high school next Monday night, when he presents "Germany in the Shadow of the Iron Curtain," under the auspices of the Buchanan College club.



Just back from a year and a half in West Germany, Wright will show you the country and tell you the meaning of what you see. He will even lift a corner of the "Iron Curtain" here so that you may peer a moment into the murky darkness of Eastern Germany on the other side.

Wright is a veteran traveler and interpreter. During his more than 23 years abroad he has represented the Associated Press, the European Picture Service, The London Daily Telegraph, Universal News Reel and for a year and a half has been preparing this special film narrative for audience showings over the United States. Needless to say, he has seen things from the inside that no casual traveler would have caught or understood.

Of special interest will be his scenes in divided Berlin, split in half by the Iron Curtain. Wright will show the amazing city where the Iron Curtain shears directly through the former official government section, and cutting across Unter Den Linden, once one of the most famous official avenues in the world.

He will also show another section of Berlin, with its thousands of refugees struggling to live. He will also show "snack" pictures from the Russian side, with the communist black marketeers plying their trades. These shots were taken from a borderline third-floor apartment, also by some excursions across with German army veterans acting as his body guard.

Then there will be the less tragic scenes of lovely farm sections in Hanover, of the picturesque beauty of the German Alpine country, of the magic reconstruction of the Ruhr industries.

Come and see it for yourself at the High School auditorium Monday night beginning at 8 p. m. The tickets may be bought from any member of the faculty or at Riley's. The price is 75c for adults and 50c for students.

Issues Involved Promote Interest; Heavy Vote Cast

The voters of Buchanan demonstrated very clearly by the returns of the annual city election Monday that they wanted two things. 1. Continuation of the commission-manager form of government. 2. They did not wish to "swap horses" in the middle of the full tide of renovation and reorganization of city utilities now in progress.

A vote of an even 1,100 was returned, which included 21 spoiled ballots or a net of 1,079. Mayor Arthur L. Anderson led the victory procession with a total of 736. Second was Goldwyn Smith with a total of 589, and third was George Deming with a total of 411. Just outside the money was Carlton Money with a total of 352.

An analysis of the votes reveals that candidates who clearly expressed themselves in favor of the commission-manager form received an overall vote of 2,298 (each voter cast three votes for commissioners) or approximately 68%. Candidates who clearly expressed themselves against the present form totaled 472 votes or under 15% of the total vote.

While the hands of the present city government were strengthened by the victory they won, the opposition must be credited with arousing discussion that resulted in more civic education on both sides of the fence than local citizens ever had before. While the debate became heated at times, the election passed off quietly and there should be no hangover of ill feeling.

A by-product of the vote was an endorsement for a silent servant of the city, Manager Barkley Oman, whose able and conscientious work received approval.

The incumbent justices of the peace, Rex E. Lamb and George H. Batchelor, were both returned to office without contest, as was also Constable Fred Eldridge. The vote by precincts is given in an adjoining column.

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Legislative News Letter

Furnished by State Representative Don R. Pears (R-Buchanan)

The bottleneck we bumped into unexpectedly several days ago, which threatened to delay scheduled April 9 adjournment a week, cleared up when Civil Service Commission presented figures on the pay raise had ordered for State civil service employees. On receipt of the figures, the appropriating committee lost no time in adjusting the figures in the budget bills, and they started rolling on both sides so April 9 will see the windup of this session.

HB 440 providing an appropriation of \$7,386,489.00 for conservation, recreation, agriculture and advertising, passed the House without difficulty and is now in the Senate.

Advanced to Third Reading for a final vote are the following: HB 441 carrying an appropriation of \$7,133,322.00 for regulatory services.

HB 442 appropriating \$54,766.34 for state institutions, departments, commissions and boards related to education.

HB 450 with an appropriation of \$157,164,828.00 from restricted funds.

HB 452 provides \$15,334,276.00 for general government.

HB 453 carries a \$13,496,349.00 appropriation for State Police, public safety and defense.

A bill which has caused considerable interest throughout the State in the past few weeks is HB 436, which the House passed by a vote of 85 to 5. This bill appropriates \$330,000.00 to the State Board of Agriculture for agricultural marketing and research.

The Community College bill (HB 437) was approved by the House with a vote of 78 to 11 and given immediate effect. This bill appropriates one million dollars for the support of the junior colleges. The appropriation is made to the school district maintaining such an institution and is on a basis of full time membership as determined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

A series of three bills (HB 99, HB 101 and HB 102) were unanimously passed by the House, upping the State's share from \$3.50 to \$4.00 per day for indigent tuberculosis patients in State Sanatoriums and county hospitals.

If the Senate takes favorable action on House Joint Resolution "A" passed by the House with a vote of 78 to 5, the people will have the opportunity this Fall to say whether or not Section 16 of Article 2 of the State Constitution

tution will be amended to provide for removal from office of any public officer who, on the grounds of self incrimination, refuses, in any investigation under authority of law, to answer relevant questions concerning performance of his official duties.

Considerable feeling was expressed during consideration of S B 1102, amending the Revenue Bond Act to permit municipalities under 100,000 population to issue revenue bonds for expansion of municipally owned light and power plants without a vote of the people. This legislation will benefit about 47 cities and villages scattered throughout the state. It passed the House with a vote of 66 to 24, and was given immediate effect.

The House approved by a vote of 77 to 9, S B 1038, permitting the blanket bonding of deputy sheriffs.

By a vote of 89 to 2, the House passed S B 352, allowing the State Water Resources Commission and municipalities to enter into contracts for surveys of water supplies. An appropriation of \$25,000 is included to defray the State's costs on any contracts which may be entered into pursuant to the act.

An unsuccessful move was made to force the P.E.P.C. bill from our State Affairs Committee and debate became very heated. Legislative processes throughout the years have revolved around the committee system and it is almost impossible to take a bill away from a committee. Regardless of personal feelings about any particular bill in any specific committee, a majority of the membership feel a reluctance to take such a drastic step.

After some debate, the House passed SB 1042 extending the full benefits of the unemployment compensation act to seamen on the Great Lakes.

Of course, the big news of the week was the unanimous passage of H. B. 63—the Hermann-Orin bill on Unemployment Compensation. The bill as passed is a vastly different one from the bill passed by the Senate and junked by the House.

HB 63 provides an increase in weekly benefits for single people from the current maximum of \$27 to \$30, and for a married man with four children, from \$35 to \$43. It also extends the benefit period from 20 to 26 weeks and carries a merit rating provision to benefit the employer with a good employment record.

There are many other benefits

in the law too, and some are such provisions as allowing a person who is laid off to draw compensation regardless of whether or not he received severance pay, bonus or back pay. In the event he is drawing a pension, he would be able to draw unemployment compensation equal to the difference between the two if the pension was not greater.

The bill has been sent to the Senate, and in all probability the Senate will balk on many features of the bill so it's a safe bet the bill will be amended and be forced into conference to iron out the differences.

The Dangers of Tepp

I have been asked by several people to comment upon the two recent articles in local papers regarding the death or serious illness of three children who, thru carelessness, came into contact with TEPP, a very poisonous spray used by fruit and vegetable growers across the nation.

This material has been used in Southwestern Michigan for the past four or five years with no reported serious injury to anyone. This material has been used extensively in this area to control aphids on fruits and vegetables because it kills instantly when it comes into contact with an insect.

As TEPP comes from the bottle, it is very potent. It is very poisonous to man, beast or insects and that is why the word "poison" is written in bold print on the label along with pictures of the skull and crossbones and directions for safe using.

The technical name of TEPP is Tetraethyl Phosphosphate. It is also sold under the trade names of Vapaton and Killex and when used at the rate of 1-3 pints in 100 gallons of water, it will kill an insect on contact. The killing power of this material is very rapidly dissipated as it is mixed with water and a very few hours after the material has been sprayed on a plant, its poisonous effect is gone. This makes it possible for grower to spray this material on their crops a day or two before they are harvested with no danger of a poisonous residue on the fruit or vegetable crop. This material should NOT be used by the home gardener where the sprays are applied by a hand operated sprayer because of the danger of getting the spray back in the face where it may be absorbed through the skin of the face, inhaled or swallowed. This material should be used only where a power sprayer is used as there is far less danger of the spray blowing back onto the operator.

As stated before, this material (TEPP) is very poisonous and should be kept out of the reach of children at all times. When the last of the bottle of TEPP has been dumped into the spray tank, the bottle should be thoroughly flushed out with water and then

the bottle disposed of. When properly handled, there is but little more danger in handling TEPP than many of the other poisonous spray materials that fruit and vegetable growers use throughout the season.

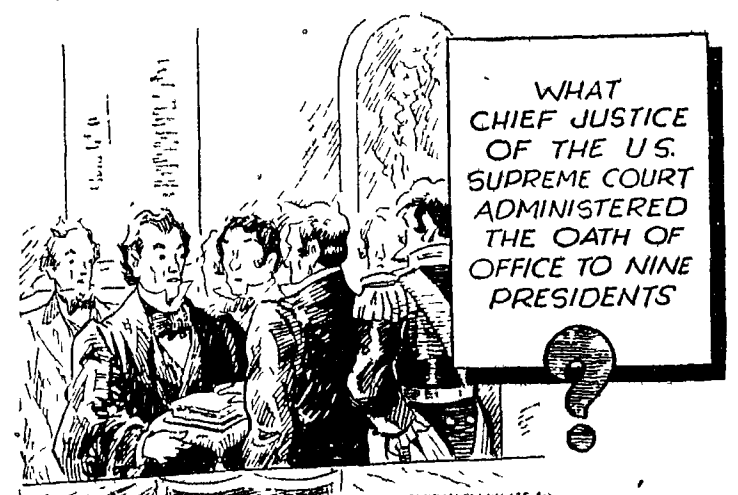

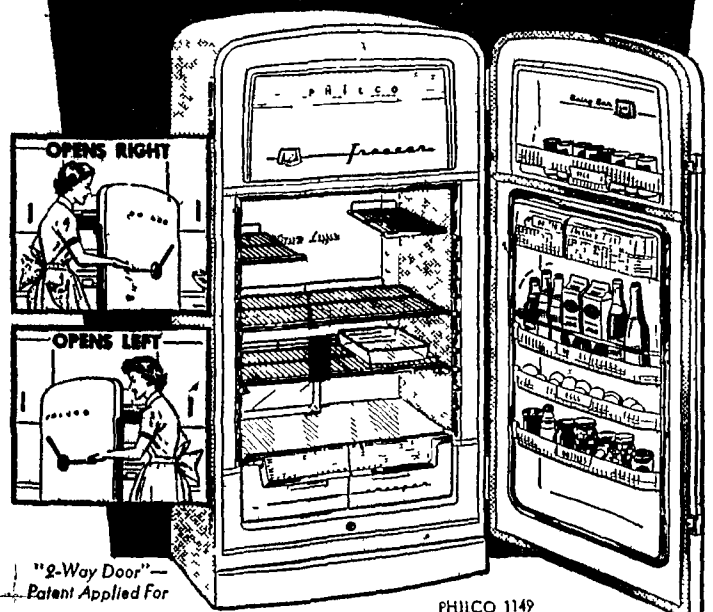

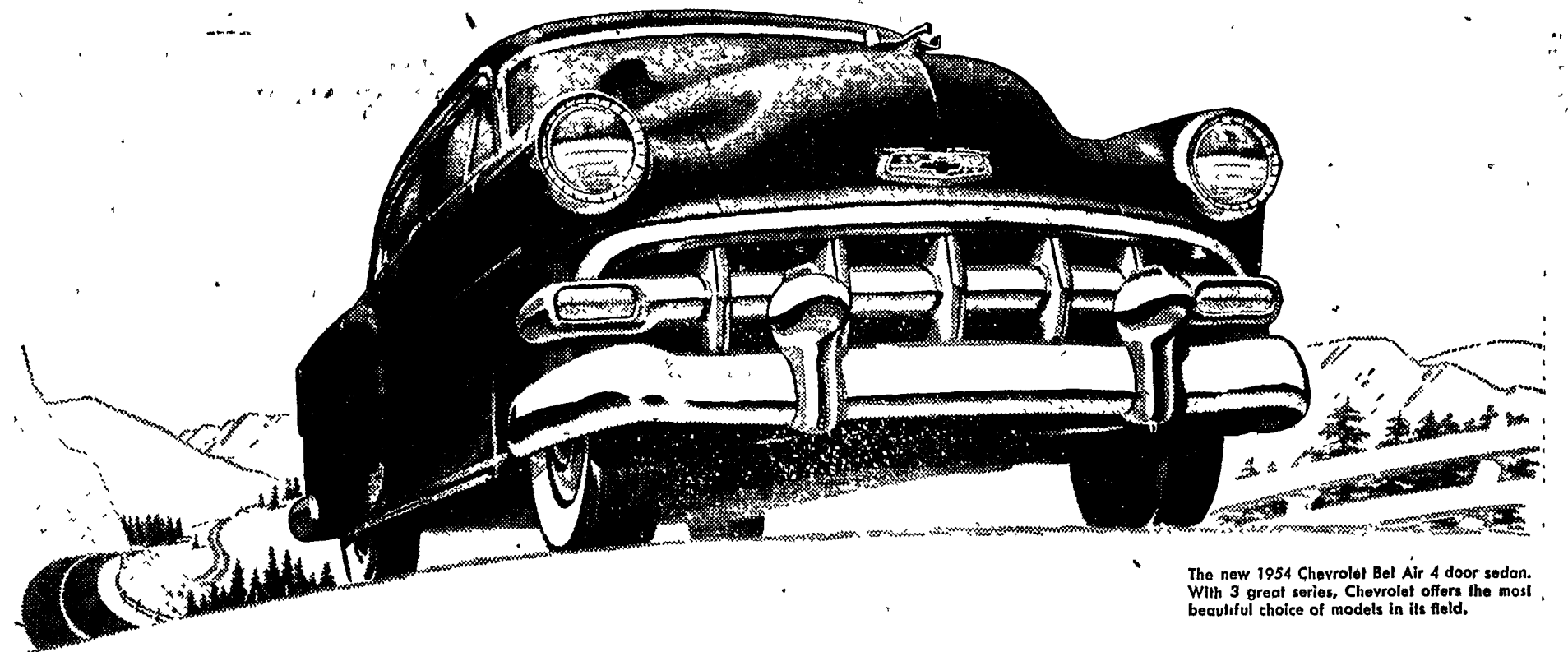
We have enough wheat on hand to meet the bread and cereal needs of 160 million Americans for a full year, if we did not raise another bushel.

The Michigan State scientists incorporated "tagged atoms" or radioactive isotopes into soluble fertilizers. They soaked cotton gauze in the solutions and tied the strips around branches of fruit trees. Within a few hours, the material was detected within the branches and several inches from the point of application. Entry occurred easiest if the bark was scraped and the fertilizer held in place in the form of a plaster or paste.

The scientists are careful to point out that roots are still the principal nutrient absorbing organ of plants. Nevertheless, the fact that nutrients may enter plants through the bark as well as the leaves means several nutritional troubles, such as zinc and magnesium deficiencies, can be corrected. Also, winter-injured and undernourished trees can be given prompt supplies of needed nutrients.

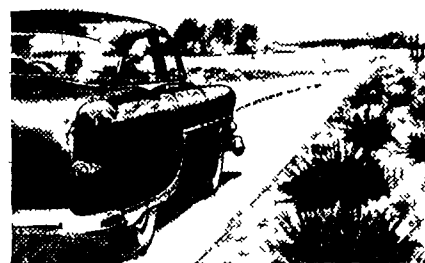

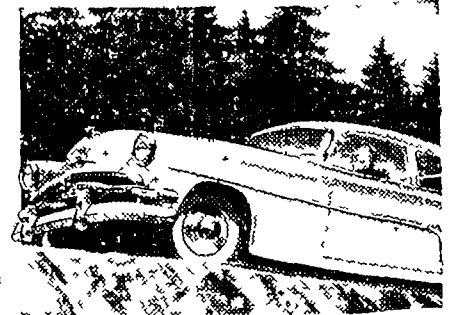

City Plans 100 m.p.h. Monorail Train

The city of Los Angeles has received approval from the California legislature to build an overhead monorail system to San Fernando, 44 miles away. With the bottoms of its cars hanging at least 16 feet above street level, the electric train will whisk passengers from downtown Los Angeles to Van Nuys in 28 minutes, allowing for nine station stops en route. Although Van Nuys is only 15 miles away, heavily populated suburbs lie between it and the big city. Busses require 63 minutes for the trip.
The Los Angeles monorail is to be patterned after its German predecessor, the 52-year-old overhead railway that shuttles between Elberfeld and Barmen in the Ruhr district. It has carried 310 million passengers without a single fatality traceable to its design.
Plans for the Los Angeles system call for a top train speed of 100 miles an hour. Each car in the train will seat 60 and provide standing room for 40.

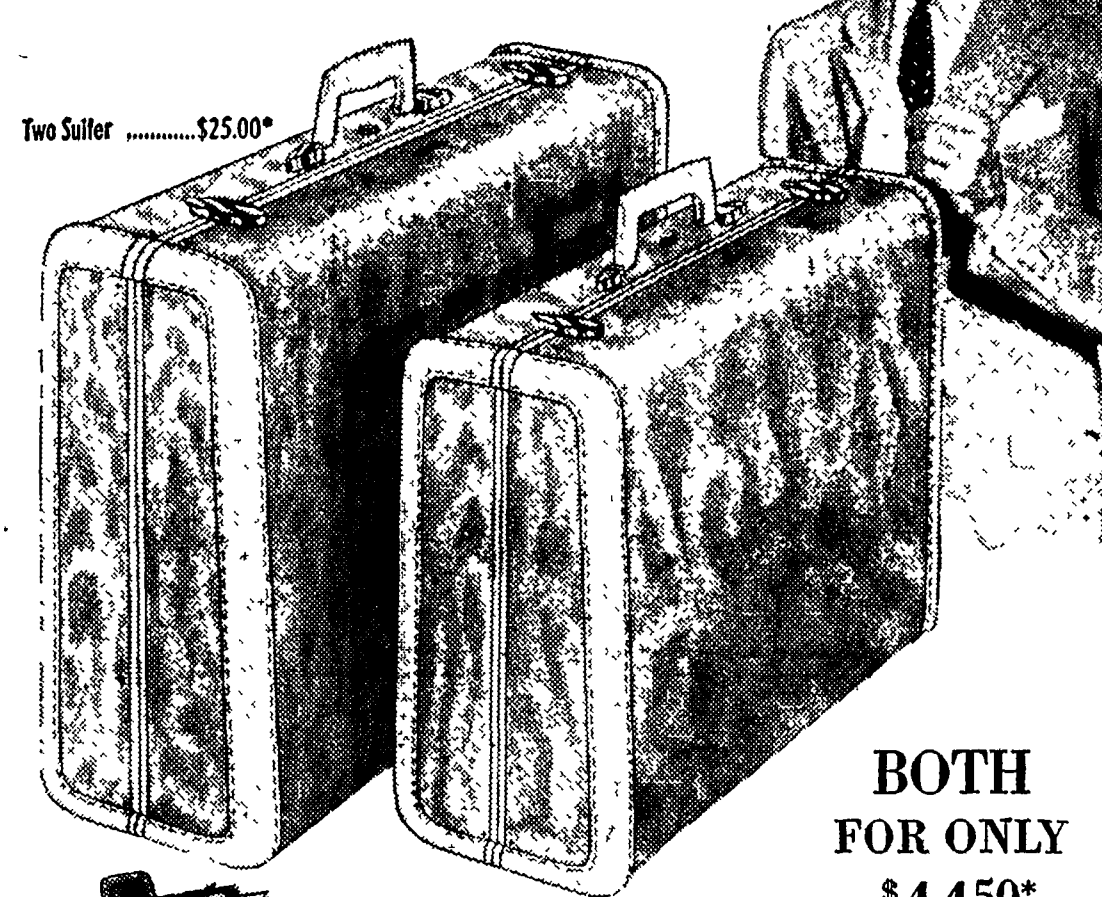

Strive To Help Small Businesses



The Buchanan Business Association is now promoting an Economic Development Committee designed to attract new industry here, and, better yet, to aid and encourage "infant industries" right in our town which demonstrate they have a product that is catching on.

It has been recognized that men who have the ability and initiative to create opportunities for themselves by the development of products which have proved they have a potential market are also creating opportunities for the town in increased employment and added property values. The proposed procedure is to create an organization which will interest itself in providing adequate quarters in convention locations, and in underwriting loans by financial institutions for funds that are usually needed in the first stages of development.

The accompanying pictures and the stories below describe two such infant industries with already proven products which are experiencing their first "growing pains."

The G & F Tackle Company

The G & F Tackle company is the official label for a new enterprise in Buchanan. The owners and active heads are Bill Gardner and Art Funk. Their product is a very small item but it promises to have a large future. In a country as large as the United States "little things" can add up to big business, if the "little things" happen to be items which will interest a large percentage of the public. Mr. Wrigley demonstrated that.

The G & F product is a crawler harness by which a "crawler" may be baited on three hooks stung about an inch apart on stainless steel wire. The important element in the device is that Gardner and Funk were the first to discover a process whereby the steel hooks may be soldered onto stainless steel. This has been tried many times, but never before has anyone been able to solder steel onto the glass-like surface of stainless steel. G & F lines are seven tiny strands

of stainless steel braided into one line.

Hitherto nylon and gut have been nearly universally used instead of steel, with the hooks tied onto the lines. The G & F process makes possible a much stronger crawler assembly than the old nylon and gut types. For stainless steel is many times as strong, and multiplies the pulling power of the line. The fishermen see at one quick look what this means. The "big ones" are not so likely to get away.

The G & F company's first important product is a crawler assembly tailored for panfish—bluegills, wall-eyed pike, northern pike and others. Only three months ago they went into commercial production with three employees. Now they employ 17. They sell only to wholesalers. One wholesale firm has ordered 20,000, another 10,000. In all about 50,000 have been made. They are on sale in sport shops which carry anything like a complete stock, in Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, and Wisconsin.

This is indeed a flying start. You may buy the product in Buchanan at Gambles, Allens, High Grade, Coast-To-Coast, Poplar's Oil station, Smitty's Bait shop. This is spectacular progress in so short a period. The reason is that a fisherman can see the value of the item with one quick look. And the fish can see the double lure of a combination of metal and live bait at one quick look. And if they grab the bait they stay there.

The possibilities of other applications in fishing tackle and elsewhere are almost unlimited.

Seed Lawn Soon Use Right Grass

Make your lawn seeding as early as possible this spring. Seedings made after May 1 are apt to be poor because the weather may be hot and dry and annual weeds will cause trouble.

That's a suggestion from C. M. Harrison of Michigan State College's farm crops department. Harrison says that Kentucky blue grass grows best on soils that are high in organic matter and fertility and located in sunny areas. But if you have sandy or clay soil low in organic matter, red fescues may be the best bet, especially if the lawn is shaded.

Using the recommended turf grass seed on your lawn may try your patience for the first couple of months, admits Harrison, but the result will be better than you will get from using the so-called nurse grasses like redtop and ryegrass.

The M. S. C. specialist advises grading the lawn carefully before seeding with the best soil on top made into a fine, firm seedbed. A high nitrogen fertilizer like 12-6-6, 10-6-4 or 10-10-10 at 10 pounds per 1,000 square feet should be spread just prior to seeding.

He also suggests that one to two pounds per 1,000 square feet is enough. If you don't use a seeder, he says, it's a good idea to hand sow half of the seed while walking in one direction, then sowing the other half in the opposite direction. You also can get better distribution by two-direction seeding with a seeder. The same thing can be done with the fertilizer. After seeding, the ground should be raked lightly or rolled to cover the seed.

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Seed Treating Found Profitable

Now that it's necessary to cut cost of crop production to the bone, seed treating is almost a must, says J. P. Hoekzema, the county agricultural agent for the county of Berrien.

Seed treatment disinfects the seed while it's being stored and when the seed is planted the chemical used protects it from harmful soil organisms.

Research at Michigan State College and nationwide tests show that these chemicals are effective as seed treatments for oats, Ceresan M, Panogen, Agrox and Mycon. For wheat and barley, those recommended are Ceresan M, Panogen, Aagran and Marcuran. M. S. C. specialists point out that one of these chemicals should be used because there are chemicals being sold in Michigan that are not effective in controlling smut and other diseases. The chemicals can be applied as a dust in a grain treator or drum mixer.

The specialists advise, however, that the treating should be done in the open where there is a draft of air. The grain can be cleaned and treated any time prior to planting time.

The grain, they say, should be soaked and tagged immediately to be sure that any of the treated grain will not be used for livestock feed.

Results of treating oats, wheat and barley this way are better stands, healthier plants and higher yields. And, the Michigan State College specialists remind, the cost is very small.

Dwarf Apple Trees Nearer To Michigan Fruit Growers.

The American apple growers' quest for dwarf fruit trees that can be sprayed, thinned, pruned and harvested economically is nearer realization.

That's the report of Dr. H. B. Tukey and Dr. R. F. Carlson of Michigan State College's horticultural department. Their report is based on 8 years of dwarf tree performance in Michigan.

There have been numerous inquiries by Berrien county apple growers, according to Clifford Conrad, Berrien county's horticultural agent, about the advisability of planting dwarf trees instead of the regular or standard trees. The unprofitableness in growing apples for a number of years have made those interested in growing apples, cost conscious and the only way to make a profit from growing apples is to grow them more economically. The pruning, spraying, thinning and harvesting of fruit from big

trees are four of the most expensive operations of growing apples. If these operations can be cut down and made more economical through the use of dwarf trees then more apple growers will be interested in staying in the business.

An apple tree is dwarfed by growing it upon a special dwarfing root system. Some of the dwarfing roots have been used for a long time in Europe and have proved successful there. Only recently was attention given to them in the United States. But now, because of high costs of labor and the demand of consumers for even higher quality fruit, the grower wants smaller trees.

The Michigan tests show that certain European rootstocks, such as the Malling II and Malling VII types, can be used in the United States. They have proved adapted to the American climate and American varieties of apples when grown upon them. And the dwarf trees have borne fruit at 2 to 3 years of age. That's much earlier than for standard trees. The dwarfs also

have borne 3 to 5 bushels per tree from the fourth to eighth year they have been under trial. The limiting thing in the use of dwarfing roots now, says Drs. Tukey and Carlson, is their scarcity. Nurserymen are taking steps to supply the growing demand, according to the researchers.

Fishing With A Vacuum Cleaner

A new method of fishing with a vacuum cleaner is permitting Maine's commercial fishermen to spend more time at sea and less at docks. Nathan's Business reports. The apparatus, developed by B. F. Doodrich, uses a 6-inch, soft-rubber-lined hose and a suction pump.

When the fish-filled nets are pulled alongside the boat, the machine goes to work. Sardines become flying fish as they are sucked aboard.

Once loaded, the vessel returns to port where similar equipment unloads it.

A Little Industry Heads Into Future

The rapidly-expanding business of fabricating small parts for industries and manufacturers has a promising entry in the Buchanan area, the Industrial Machine Works organized by Lee Pierce and Herbert Henderson on Sept. 1, 1953.

Lee Pierce started the manufacture in the basement of his home. It soon outgrew the space. Pierce then entered partnership with Henderson and they moved to larger quarters in Glendora. There they have their machine operations installed in a 30x40-foot room, with a space of 100 feet in an adjoining room for storage. During the seven months since their organization they have had a rapidly expanding market, requiring addition of machine facilities and the employment of seven men.

For some time they have been doing experimental work on water pressure nozzles for Clarence Fletcher of the Hydro-Silica company. They are now producing parts for the nozzles, popularly known as "guns."

Both partners had wide training and experience in engineering design and production before they

entered the small parts field. Pierce was an apprentice for four years in the local Clark Equipment plant. Later he received a degree in mechanical engineering at Tri-State College at Angola, Ind., and was afterwards engineering consultant two years for the South Bend Lathe Works.

Herb Henderson was an apprentice four years at the Bellevue Company plant at Bellevue, Ohio. He then worked in several tool and die shops in South Bend and was last employed as a tool and die maker at the local Electro-Voice, Inc., before entering in partnership with Pierce.

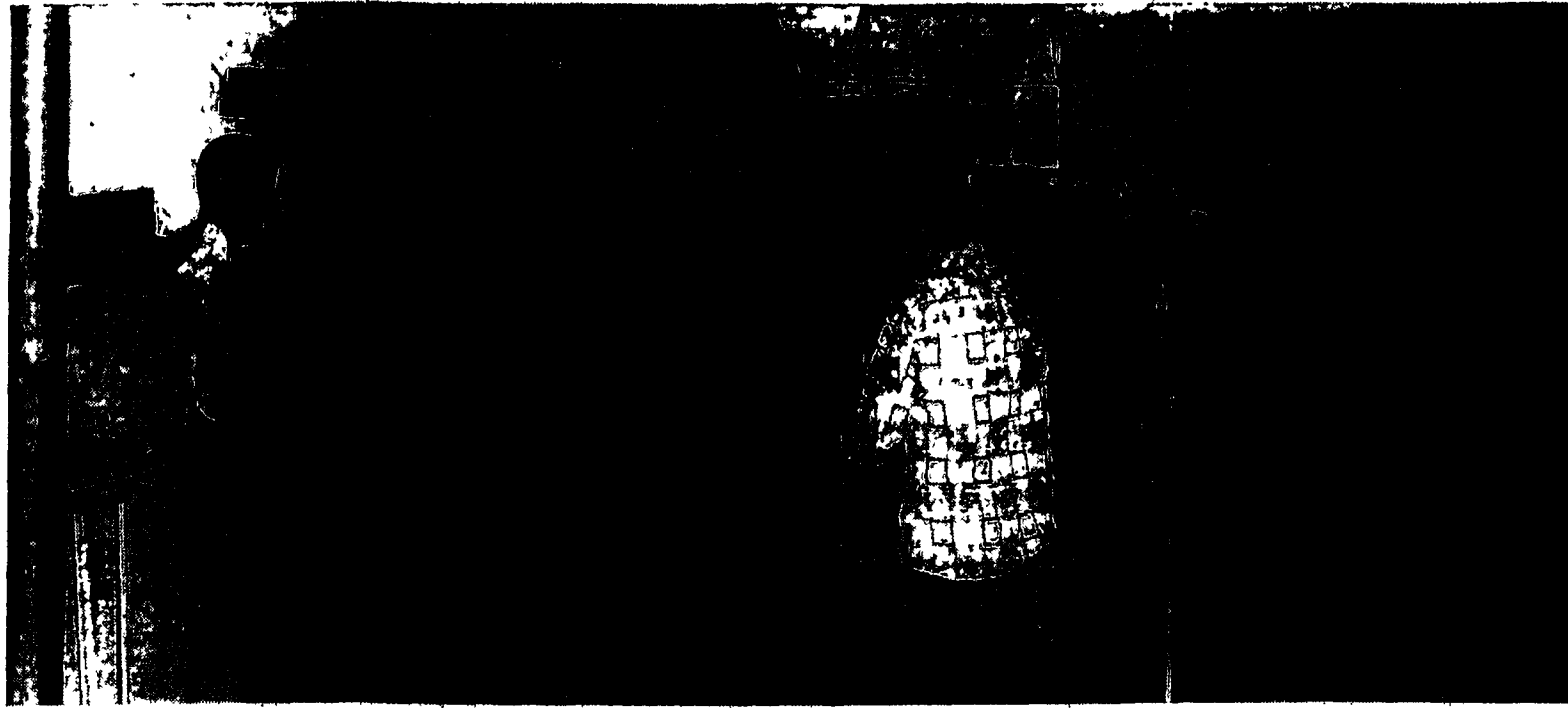
Their varied education and experience qualified them as experts in the field of small parts production. Their expansion within a few months is indication that they will grow to larger proportions in a growing field.

From The Water Wheel To Dynamo During 120 Years

Analysis Of Manufacturing Changes In Material Method And Scope In Buchanan

The story of the development of manufacturing in Buchanan may be resolved into four elements. 1. Sources and appliance of power; 2. Sources and processing of materials; 3. Means and avenues of transportation; 4. Direction and scope of adequate markets.

The developments in these four respects determined what and how much the workers of Buchanan would make to meet the needs of the continually widening and continually changing world they would serve. Of course all of these factors are so closely interrelated in their development that this analysis cannot govern the arrangement of the story we have to tell.

Rather, like a Roman chorister, the writer must drive four steeds abreast, with the aim of steadily progressing from the past to the present without falling under the chariot wheels as he goes. We will briefly analyze the four above-named factors, and then, to shift the simile, we will start at the beginning again to braid the various threads in the development of the working life of a community so that we will finally reproduce the fabric of life today, which will be different tomorrow.

The progressive changes of power went through three periods of differing source and method. 1. Water power from the start in 1835 to the latter 1870's,

2. Steam, initiated in use here about 1870 and reaching predominance about 1880, 3. Electricity, available unusually early in Buchanan in 1894 through the vision of John Holmes, publisher of the Berrien County Record from 1876 to 1895, and predominant until today. The first power dam was finished by John Holmes and Peter English in 1893. The first industrial use of power generated by the waters of the St. Joseph river was the printing of the issue of Feb. 15, 1894, of the Berrien County Record. Mr. Holmes then owned the Record, subject to mortgage for funds to build his dam. He lost the paper in 1895, because his brave venture happened to coincide with the panic of 1893 and later. The creation of the dam was the result of a continuing campaign he had undertaken 13 years before, when the only lighting in the business district was by five kerosene lamps installed by individual merchants.

On Jan. 17, 1894, a huge crowd of people from far and near jammed the streets of Buchanan to witness the miracle of the first illumination of the business district with arc lights. The harnessing of the St. Joseph to produce electricity for lights and power was one of the first such projects in Michigan. In fact it followed only a few months the installation at Niagara Falls of the first dam in the United States for the purpose of generating and transmitting electric power. Full credit to Holmes as both prophet and pioneer will be accorded later in this series. As a result the town was rescued from the slump which followed the exhaustion of the local forests which had supplied materials for Buchanan's woodworking factories for 60 years.

In 1895 the Lee & Porter Axle Works were brought here from Dowagiac with electric power from the river dam as the lure, for the production of steel axles for wagons, carriages, stage coaches and the like, and of wire wheels for lighter vehicles.

Thus was Buchanan introduced to its Iron Age. Later, in December of 1904, the George R. Rich Manufacturing company, forerunner of the Clark Equipment company, moved here from Chicago because of the availability of electric power and other considerations of economical operation. All this will be told in some detail later.

In respect to the use of materials Buchanan passed through its Wooden Age from 1835 to the 1890's, when the forests were exhausted as any important source of materials for factories. Their passing coincided very fortunately with the building of the power dam and the consequent coming of the steel-fabricating firms previously noted, with a few years of doldrums in the interim.

Buchanan has had three main eras in transportation. 1. Water transportation via the St. Joseph river when wagon roads and equipment were too primitive for economical long-range haulage, 2. Coming of the Michigan Central railway in 1848, the routing

of this pioneer Chicago-Detroit rail route was of great significance to the development of Buchanan manufacturing; 3. The combination of increasing automotive transport and paved roads, which attained large proportions in the 1920's and have since surpassed railroads for convenience in direct factory-to-customer outlets.

The industrial production of Buchanan was limited in the first years to the fundamental needs of the original settlers, which were lumber and flour. In the second decade production became more diversified and specialized, but still served local needs almost entirely. The market horizons widened tremendously with the arrival of its railroad in April, 1849, but expansion of industry here waited for the creation of the markets by the westward-reaching railways, and also for the development of methods and capital

locally.

Following the Civil War which had absorbed the services of a large part of the able-bodied men, there was a sudden surge of expansion in the timber and wood-consuming industries, which attained their peak in the late 1870's and early 1880's, after which the supply of local timber rapidly diminished. During the peak and declining years manufacturers found their best markets in the shipment of wagons and cheap furniture to the rapidly expanding farm areas of Kansas, Nebraska, and neighboring areas.

Toll Roads Gain Favor

equipped with modern dairy machinery.

How is the dairy business? Well, it's certainly not a declining business, said Anderson. It's been changing fast in both markets and technique — in fact it has been revolutionized in a few years.

Here's the picture. Anderson was getting all of his milk six years ago from 35 dairy herds, all within an 8-mile radius of Buchanan. Now he's getting more milk from 22 herds, within the same radius. His milk intake volume last year from this area was 2,500,000 pounds.

During that time a stiff state law governing care and processing of milk at the source was passed by the Michigan legislature. The law made necessary a much larger capital base for the individual dairy. If a farmer sold whole milk for bottling he had to have a milk house equipped with hot and cold water, a two-compartment wash tank for separate washing and rinsing; metal racks for all utensils, and a mechanical milk cooler with the requirement that the fluid be kept at a temperature that would enable the farmer to deliver it at the dairy at a temperature of 60 degrees or cooler.

Scare stories went around that dairymen were selling out because of the requirements. So they were — to their neighbors. The farmer with too few cows to justify the capital outlay had a sale, the larger dairymen bought his cows.

The dairymen remaining in the business culled their herds more rigidly. The "boarders" went to the block, replaced by higher producers. All the dairies had their herds regularly tested, either by the county testing association, or at the fully equipped testing laboratory at the Anderson dairy. Mr. Anderson has a Michigan Milk Tester's license.

Paul Bycroft of the Bycroft Laboratories at Niles spends two whole days a month at the dairy, testing every can that comes in for purity. He never comes on the same days, and what is more he is likely to drop in any day and pick up a sample or so. So the product is steadily improving.

As butter consumption has spiraled, whole milk consumption has zoomed. A steady-selling product of the dairy is the Wilson Brand creamed cottage cheese. This product, from a recipe originated by the former owner, C. J. Wilson, has had a wide market for many years, and Anderson still produces it under the Wilson name. He sells 160,000 pounds annually, with a considerable margin in South Bend, Galesburg, Three Oaks and Berrien Springs.

Anderson and his father, William Anderson, 204 Days Avenue, have a combined business in milk vending at the local Clark Equipment plant. The elder Anderson owns nine vending coolers at the plant and his son processes and delivers the products, which include chocolate milk, homogenized milk, buttermilk and orange drink.
