Scholarship In Engineering Is Now Available

Eugene Clark Memorial Fund Pays 2-Year Tuition Ill. Institute

A two-year scholarship in industrial engineering, valued at \$1,300 is available to a southwestern Michigan student about to enter his third year of college.

Details of the recently-established Eugene Clark scholarship were explained today by Clarence E. Deakins, dean of students at Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago.

The scholarship fund, established by Clark Equipment company of Buchanan, in memory of the company's founder, will pay all junior and senior tuition expenses for an industrial engineering student majoring in materials handling at Illinois Tech, Deakins said.

First preference will be given to employees or children of employees of Clark Equipment company or to qualified students from southwestern Michigan if no one in these groups receives the scholarship, it will be given to any qualified student. Candidates must meet entrance requirements at Illinois Tech.

Fighting Bucks Edge Out Bears In Last Quarter

Buchanan Remains On Top The League Pile With Niles A Game Behind

(The Bucks play Dowagiac on the Buchanan floor Friday night in what might be the decisive game in the still-crucial battle for the top spot in the Big Four League play. Reserve play starts at 7 p. m.)

The Buchanan Bucks have certainly demonstrated that they have emerged from their early-season addition to the last-half slump, and at no time has the demonstration been more emphatic than when they snatched Friday night's game from the St. Joe Bears in the last 45 seconds. Several successful pitches from the foul line and a basket by Gordon Smith turned the trick. The victory kept them in first place by winning a close one from Dowagiac. The Bucks now have a 4-0 record in the league, and a season record of 11-2.

The first frame began with the Bucks getting the ball and missing a shot, after which the Bears took possession and their Nate Duncan spotted the basket with a long one hander for a 2-0 lead for St. Joe. Gordie made three points while the Bears made 2. Then the Bears scored; the Bucks (Anderson) scored and so on to the quarter's end with the Bears leading 9-7, the period having been mainly distinguished by very good defensive play by both teams.

The Bears captured the ball at the start of the second but the alert Bucks intercepted and tied the score. Then the Bucks went into the lead, but the Bears again took the ball and ran up a one-point lead. But the neck-and-neck play ended the first half with a 23-23 tie. Anderson led the Bucks with 7, Ellis and Duncan each scored 7 for the Bears.

As the third quarter opened Sisson and Ellis gave St. Joe a 6-point lead. Buchanan did not stay far behind because Gordon Smith was fouled while shooting which gave him two free throws. He made the first but missed the second. Anderson tipped it in. St. Joe outscored Buchanan but didn't have a reliable lead. Letcher and Anderson each had four points in the third quarter leading Buchanan while Sisson had 6 for St. Joe. St. Joe took the lead 39-36 at the end of the third quarter.

With the final quarter coming up the Bucks took off and could not be stopped. With baskets by Jim Letcher and Gordon Smith the Bucks took the lead and still didn't stop. But St. Joe came back with two minutes left with a basket by Rantiss and took the lead. Then Gordon Smith tied it up with 50 seconds left. Finally the Bucks stopped St. Joe and took a two point lead. Then the Bucks got a rebound and started stalling. Duncan fouled G. Smith, knocking him down. Gordie made both free throws. Later with 7 seconds and 3 seconds left to play Phoenix was fouled by Rantiss and another St. Joe player and made one of each. The game ended with Bucks 50, Bears 44. Smith was high with 17 points.

The Bucks' reserves came pretty close at times but could not keep a lead and never did come close in the final quarter. The Bucks made a few mistakes that were costly but still they are doing a good job. The game ended Bears 47, Bucks 54. Buchanan field had 12 points for Buchanan.

All furniture, clothing and bed equipment were destroyed and the plaster and woodwork burned.

Wesley H. West Dies Suddenly At Age Of 42

Had Retired As Draftsman In September, 1953, On Account Of Health

Wesley Harter West, age 42, died at his home at 407 West Roe street Thursday, Feb. 4, 1954.

Mr. West had been ill several months and had retired from his work as draftsman at the Bendix Corporation plant at South Bend in September on that account. His illness became critical and arrangements were being made to take him to a South Bend hospital when he died suddenly, the immediate cause being heart failure.

He was born Aug. 2, 1911, at Aurora, Ill., the son of Thomas and Helen West. He married Orice Clark in Chicago Feb. 12, 1942. The family moved to Buchanan a year ago last July from Green Bay, Wis.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Buchanan and of the Theodore Roosevelt Lodge No. 322 F. & A. M. of Green Bay.

Survivors are his wife, a daughter, Sandra Lee, a son, Thomas Wesley Clark; two sisters, Mrs. William Robbie, Sr., of Aurora, Ill., and Mrs. Steve Petram, of West Chicago, Ill.

Funeral rites were held at the Swem Funeral Home at 2 p. m. Saturday, with the Rev. H. Carlisle Carson in charge. Burial was made in Oak Ridge cemetery. Graveside services were held by the local Masonic Lodge No. 68 F. & A. M. The pallbearers were Masons.

Install Basket Trucks in P. O. For Parcel Post

Fleet of Eight Hand-Pushed Trucks Add To Ease And Speed of Handling

The addition of some mechanical mobility in distributing parcel post mail at the local post office will eliminate one motion in the handling of that part of the distribution and also add much to the speed and convenience of operation, states Charles Wesner, Postmaster.

This mechanical mobility, just now going into service here, consists of a fleet of eight basket trucks, made of canvass suspended from a metal frame, with a metal and wood base, the trucks moving on rubber wheels. The trucks are the product of industries carried on by inmates of the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga.

Until the present the incoming parcel post has been distributed and stacked on fixed metal shelves at some distance from the door leading out on the platform in the rear. The carriers, consisting of the driver of the city parcel post truck and the two rural route carriers have had to take their parcel post off the shelves and carry it by hand to their vehicles at the loading platform.

Henceforth the postal workers will distribute the parcel post according to destination in the eight trucks. Four will hold the parcel post for the residence section of the city, two the business section parcels and two the rural route parcels. In the interval between distribution and loading before delivery, three trucks may be wheeled anywhere where they are out of the road. When the three carriers come for their mail freight, they wheel the portion allowed them to their trucks at the loading platform, at a saving of considerable time, energy and lost motion.

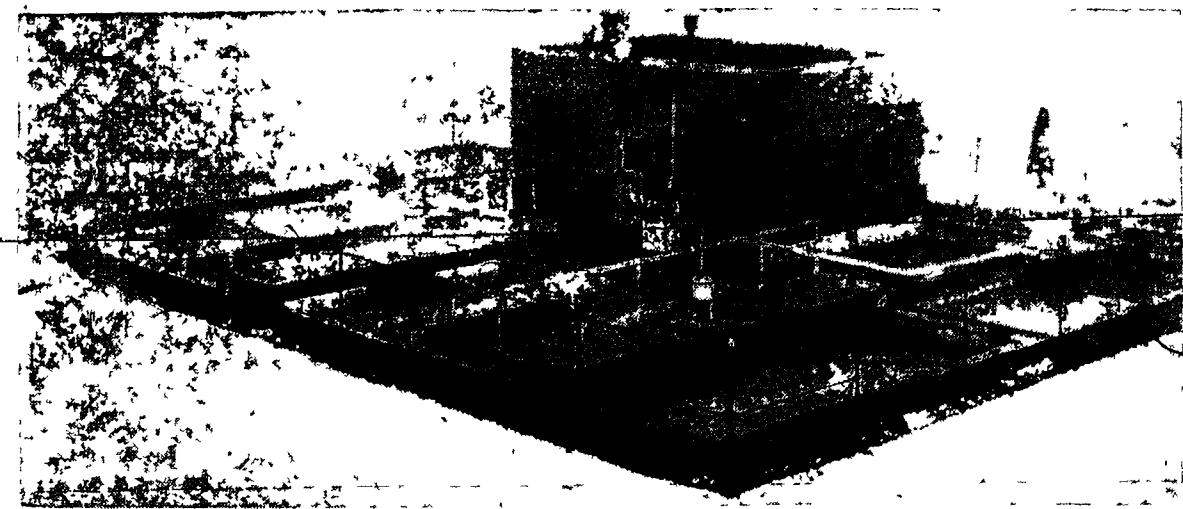

Illustrating City Provisions For Public Health

The picture at the top illustrates Buchanan's sewage disposal plant, one of the very first sewage treatment plants erected on the St. Joseph river, and one of a very few at present having the activated sludge or complete treatment. Elkhardt and Mishawaka, Ind., have primary plants affording only partial treatment. South Bend has recently floated \$7,000,000 in bonds to erect a complete treatment plant.

The Buchanan plant was erected in 1937, with partial federal aid and relatively low construction costs. The bond issue for erecting the plant was retired in 1948. Because of that fact the sewage disposal charges which we are now paying are the lowest paid by any city on the river.

In the middle picture Jake Dies, water department service man, is taking a test of primary purity of the water at the point where it enters the city mains. This test is taken at the source of supply at intervals, as required by the Michigan Department of Health.

In the lower picture Clyde Weaver, superintendent of the Buchanan City sewage disposal plant, is running a test for volatile solids in the final digester tank, to determine whether the solid content is low enough so that it will not harm fish in the creek and river. The solid content must be drawn down to 2 parts per million, the remainder pure water.

City Accepts New Sub-Division Of Paden Park No. 1

Tables Improvement Alex- ander Street Until 75% Owners Sign Petition

A plat of a new city subdivision Paden Park No. 1, consisting of 11 lots lying north of Harlan avenue, was presented to the city commission at the Monday evening meeting by Philip Sexton. The commission voted to accept the plat with minor alterations, contingent on the provision of a performance bond by the subdivision to cover improvements required by the city. These requirements include surfaced streets comparable to the original Paden Park plat, water main and sidewalks.

The city commission voted to withhold consideration of planned improvements on West Alexander street from Oak to Phelps until such time as a petition is submitted signed by 75 per cent of the property owners. The proposed improvements included curb, gutter and storm drainage. The commission gave as their reasons that improvements had been requested and that some expense in engineering had been entailed, whereas the property owners had rejected the project after determination of costs had been presented. The final estimate of expense to property owners had been \$297 a front foot.

Scouts Present Exhibition at I. & M. Lot and The Nelson Lot; Cubs In Haberle Window

National Boy Scout Week, Feb. 7-13, is being observed in Buchanan by the two local units, Boy Scout Troop 41 and Cub Scout Troop 41.

The Boy Scouts will put on an all-day exhibition Saturday at two locations, the Indiana & Michigan Electric company lot north of its headquarters building and on the Nelson Transfer lot at the intersection of Charles Court and Oak street. (The exhibition at the former place depends on the ground being frozen at the time.)

Relays of Scouts will begin successive programs at 9 a. m. Saturday morning. A Scout detachment will set up complete campsites, including tents and fire-places, and will conduct exhibitions which will include first aid, knot-tying, signaling and other branches of Scout-craft, which of course also includes the methods of setting up and taking down camps. Another relay of Scouts will then take over, set up the camp and proceed with demonstrations, and so on during the day until 4 p. m.

talk on "South American Countries."

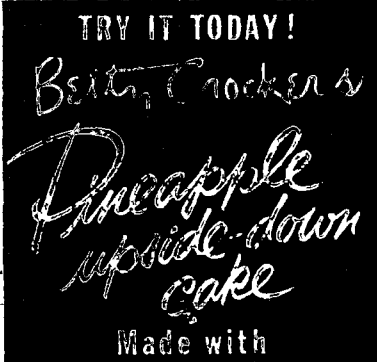

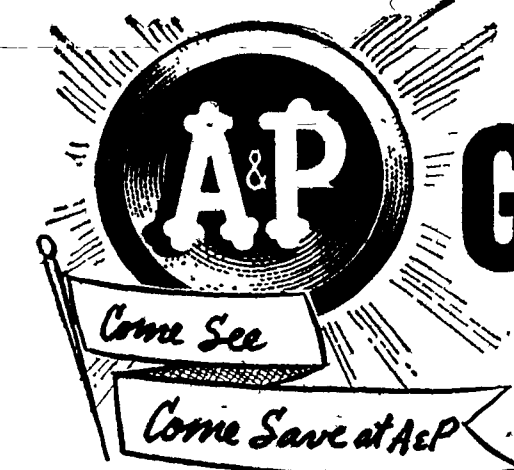

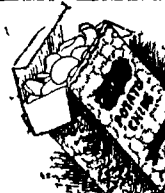

Judge Robinson Orders Regional Quotas For Juries

More of Berrien county's average citizens may be called for jury duty in the future. This became apparent after Circuit Judge Thomas N. Robinson appeared before the Berrien County Board of Supervisors in St. Joseph Monday morning.

Judge Robinson said that the Circuit Court intends to abide by the statute which directs that each county supervisor must turn in a specified number of names to the county clerk for jury duty. Quotas in each township or city are based on population.

Previously, supervisors handed in their jury lists without regard to population. Under this system some supervisors failed to turn in lists, or in some cases unduly small lists. Numbers are now being computed for each township and city and each supervisor will receive a notification of the number of jurors he is supposed to name.

County Clerk Frank X. Duerr, who handles the jury list, explained that 600 jurors will be selected throughout the county. Of these, 200 will act as grand jurors and 400 as petit jurors. The grand jurors will be called only in case of a grand jury.

The board of supervisors ordered the finance committee to study a resolution brought in by Welfare Director Leslie Speese, for the construction of a 200-bed county convalescent home to be located near the Berrien County Infirmary at Berrien Center.

Completion of the full three weeks of the session Wednesday, Feb. 3, set into operation the first of a series of deadlines which will continue until the curtain rings down on the final chapter of this 1954 session with adjournment April 9.

Casualties of the Feb. 3 deadline when bills failed to clear committees and for which an extension of time was not requested by their respective committees for further study or hearings included such controversial measures as FEPC, reduction in small loan rates, and such Little Hoover Committee recommended bills as creation of an Office of Health Affairs and the creation of a State Exhibition Board.

An amended speed limit bill, setting speed limits of 65 mph on daytime and 55 mph at night, was tabled when it came out of committee without recommendation. A majority vote will be required to take it from the table if and when proponents enlist enough support.

The House passed a bill prohibiting discarding of refrigerators, ice boxes, etc., without first removing the doors or locks. There were no dissenting votes on this safety measure when it came to a vote on its passage.

A Senate bill increasing from 17 to 18 years, the age limit that a court may have jurisdiction as to the custody and support of children of divorced parents, received House approval and has been returned to the Senate for enrollment.

After considerable debate, during which tempers flared, the House passed a bill to abolish the Michigan Naval Militia. Passage of this legislation was recommended by the Little Hoover Committee. Both the Committee and proponents of the bill charge the Naval Militia has deteriorated to the point that it is now only a costly skeleton organization, serving no useful purpose.

Korean War veterans will profit by a House Bill which has now gone to the Senate for action by that body. The bill would extend veterans' institute programs for 7 years.

Opponents of a bill to require County Clerks to accept Notary Public bonds by mail, waged an unsuccessful fight to return the bill to committee, and the House passed it by a vote of 73 to 10.

If the Senate takes favorable action on a bill passed by the House, Boards of Education in counties of more than 390,000 population, may ask for a vote on special taxes to finance programs for handicapped children. The House also took favorable action on and transmitted to the Senate a bill allowing the chairman of a county board of supervisors to call special meetings in case of emergency.

A bill to permit appointment of fence viewers by the township board was passed by the House. Also passed were bills allowing regular procedure for the transmitting of property owned by a deceased adopted child, requiring trucks to be equipped with power driven windshield wipers and heated air defrosters; increasing registration fee for nurses, allow the Civil Service Commission to issue subpoenas in matters before it.

After being out on the floor a couple of days, the House voted to return to committee a bill making it illegal to obstruct traffic by driving too slowly on state trunklines.

Killed in the House by a 47 to 45 vote was a bill which would have authorized County Board of Supervisors to grant additional funds to county law libraries.

Smouldering resentment over the large number of congratulatory resolutions each session, threatened to bring to an end the time-honored custom when SCR 22 eulogizing Ralph Young, retired Athletic Director of Michigan State College, came up for adoption, and following a lengthy discussion of the waste of time on such resolutions when there were more important issues to be studied, debated and decided, the resolution went back to committee. Subsequently, the action was reconsidered, and the resolution adopted. However, it is generally thought this discussion will put a damper on introduction of other congratulatory resolutions in the future.

Although the FTFC bill introduced early in the session automatically died in committee, as stated previously in this news letter, the issue is still alive, because another such bill was previously introduced, as well as a "Right-to-Work" bill. The FEPC bill creates a State Conciliation Commission to which discrimination in employment cases would be referred, whereas the Right-to-Work bill gives an aggrieved person the right to sue in the courts for damages.

The bill proposing to change the name of Michigan State College to Michigan State University, considered dead a few days ago, will take a new lease on life if the House grants, as it undoubtedly will, the Committee's request for an extension of time for a hearing.

New bills introduced include abolishing the Basic Science Law, permit sale of milk in bulk from dispensers, increasing drivers license fees to set up a state fund which would pay damages to drivers unable to collect from a person what was at fault in an auto accident, a State Employees Suggestion System, minimum wage bill and one making it a misdemeanor for any person to knowingly present false claim for gas tax refund.

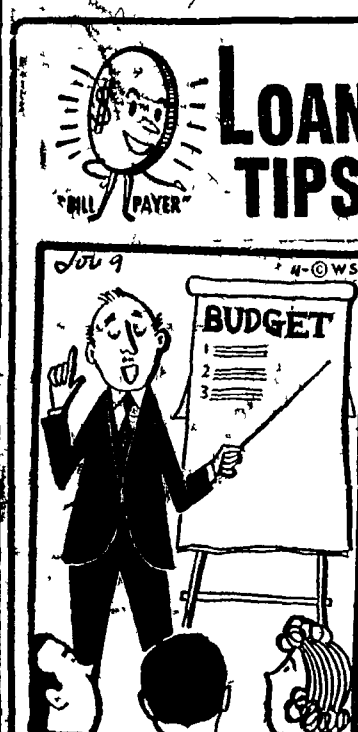

Police Foil Cash Register Robbery at Sausman's

Study Missing Link Between Booty And Boots

Police Following Hot Trail Recover Sausman Plant Loot And Burglar's Rubber Boots

Have you lost within the past week a pair of men's high over-shoes, about number 8? If so the Buchanan police have a pair of that description at headquarters and they are very anxious to find the owner. You may call at any hour of the day or night and try them on. The police will be glad to help you. The cops are always very helpful that way, but in this case you will get more than ordinary attention.

The said over-shoes were found by the police while they were following a seemingly quite warm trail left by someone who had just broken into the Sausman Cleaners plant at 1004 North Portage street not long before 4 a.m. The aforesaid trail consisted of tracks from the area of the plant northeastward to the bluff and to a yard at the water's edge of the St. Joseph river. Just a wee bit more shove and the police would be doing a bit more guessing than they have to now.

Here's the story: Chief Jack Krugh and Officer George Albrecht were patrolling North Portage checking the doors as they went at 4 a.m. Friday. Everything had been hunkydory at 2 a.m. But at 4 a.m., the glass in the rear door had been smashed and someone had reached through the opening and released the lock inside. As it afterward transpired, the thief had left taking the cash register with him. He had also left some very distinct tracks as mentioned above.

Apparently he had no implements wherewith to pry open the cash register. As the police reconstruct it, he had attempted to smash the machine by taking it to the top of a steep pitch in the river bluff and tossing it down the bank. Then he followed it down but, while it had been damaged, the fastening locking the cash drawer still held fast.

So the thief made some more tracks up the bank, to get some gimmick that he could pry open

the door with. The trail disappeared at the paving at Fulton and Portage.

Later in the morning the police returned to make some plaster casts of the footprints. But at Elizabeth and Portage they found a pair of nearly new rubber boots (or overshoes) which fitted the

tracks exactly. They surmise that when the thief was returning he saw the officers, and shook off the telltale boots.

He got \$2 out of a small coin box in the machine, but left behind \$35 in bills locked in the cash register.

The Story of Buchanan



Staple Needs Of Pioneers Were Boards And Bread

Fundamental Needs First Provided By Small Local Mills

While development of the area around Buchanan stood still until it was released for settlement by the terms of the Chicago treaty between the Potawatomi and the federal government in 1836, that traveling line of extreme westward settlement, the American Frontier, had swept westward in seven-league boots to Central Iowa.

So this area did not experience the entire gamut of civilized machine progress which marked the development of Niles and Niles township, just across the St. Joseph river. Meanwhile the product of the water-powered sawmills from Niles to Three Rivers were floating past us down the river. In 1832 rafts of whitewood lumber from the mill of Albert W. Driggs at Constantine, Branch county, were floated past the mouth of McCoy's creek, bound for St. Joseph and reloading onto schooners there for the Chicago market. This shipment consisted of 100,000 feet of board lumber loaded on an unknown number of rafts.

At St. Joseph Driggs chartered a schooner and loaded it with 20,000 feet of lumber, reputed to be the first sold in Chicago.

Driggs found difficulty in selling the lumber after its arrival. About the same time lumber was arriving at Chicago by wagons from the Ohio river country in Ohio and there is a traditional dispute which boards reached Chicago first.

Once raft shipping on the St. Joseph was established it displaced the wagon shipments by primitive roads that were little more than trails.

In "The Story of Lumbering in Wisconsin" by Robert DeFries there is a description of how the rafts were fashioned. Most of the lumber was sawn in 16-foot length with occasional shorter 14-foot and 12-foot length when necessary to make more economical use of the log lengths. The raft-maker first took two 16-foot planks for a foundation and bored holes in each end and in the center. Through these holes he drove hardwood "grub pins" three or more feet long. Then boards were laid at right angles across the foundation planks. Across these boards another layer was placed until from 12 to 20 layers were crisscrossed. Over the last layer binding planks were laid with holes drilled to correspond with those in the foundation planks. The "grub pins" were then drawn up and tightened above the binding planks. In this way "cribs" of lumber were fashioned 16x16 feet in dimensions, or in some cases 12x16 feet.

Then a string of six or more cribs would be fastened end to end, forming a "rapids string" which could easily be separated for running more dangerous stretches such as the 1½-mile Moccasin Shoals just opposite the

present site of Buchanan. These rafts were guided down the river by 30-foot sweeps, or with rude steering gears fore and aft.

The lumber industry of southern Michigan was carried on through most of its history by small sawmills which processed the trees in the near vicinity into board lumber and then sent the product by raft, keelboat, or steamer to shipping points on the Great Lakes. This was in marked contrast to the tremendous lumber industries in the pine belt of central and northern sections of the Lower Peninsula, which did not start until a great market had grown up in Chicago, especially following the Chicago fire of 1872.

The southern line of the Michigan pine belt crossed the Lower Peninsula as follows from the north line of Lake St. Clair, on west through the center of Macomb and Oakland counties, angling across the southwest quarter of Genesee county, then west across the approximate centers of Shiawassee, Clinton, Ionia and Kent counties to the east line of Ottawa county. There it dipped southwest through Ottawa and Allegan counties, and thence west through VanBuren county to Lake Michigan.

In the hardwood district to the south of that line an altogether

different lumber industry grew up. To the north in the pine district the trees were cut and floated in the log to great sawmills either on the Great Lakes or on large rivers such as the Grand, where it was processed into boards and shipped with Chicago for a principal market. Such large centers were at Muskegon, Bay City, Saginaw and Grand Rapids.

An industrial census of Michigan in 1837 listed 433 small sawmills in the hardwood district of the Lower Peninsula. This list doubtless included the McCoy's creek mills operated by Russell and Hiram Wray, John Hatfield and a Mr. Atkins, and the shingle mill operated by Charles Cowles. The pioneers who poured into the "Indian reserve" lands about the present site of Buchanan as

soon as they were released for settlement in 1836 already had the fundamental needs of lumber and flour supplied by mills at Niles, six miles away. But they were at once supplied here, by the sawmills listed above and by the grist mill which was installed by Dr. Charles Wallin, who converted the water power of the former Cowles shingle mill to that use. Dr. Wallin thus supplied corn meal and graham flour which were much better than the product of corn pounded by stone pestles and wheat ground in coffee mills, which were the settlers' first resort.

In 1952, out of some 25 billion letters, more than 22 million ended up in the U. S. postoffice's "dead letter office."
