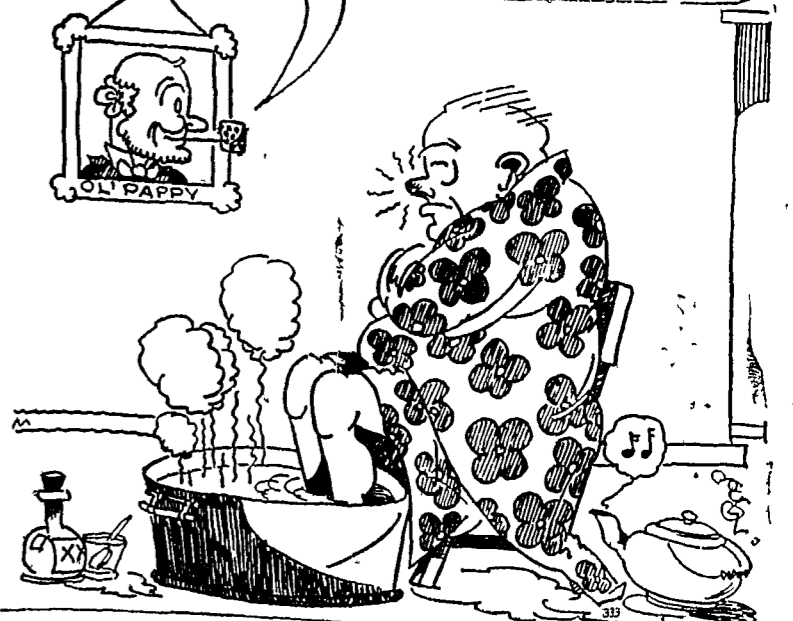

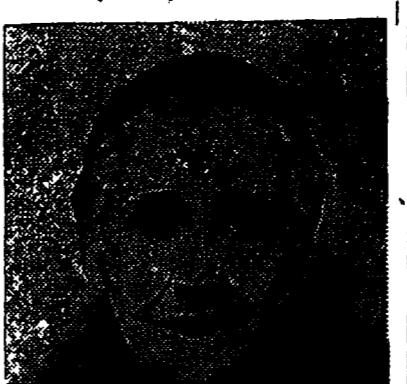

of the Frazer car has already been frozen although that of the lighter and less expensive Kaiser car is still in the development stage. In order to finance the proposed operations, Kaiser-Frazer Corporation expects to offer 1,700,000 shares of stock to the public at \$10 a share through a group of underwriters. The Kaiser interests and Graham-Paige have each purchased 250,000 shares, representing a total of \$5,000,000 invested in the new company, from the underwriting syndicate, which consists of Cus & Company, of Cleveland, the First of California Company, of San Francisco, and Allen & Company, of New York. Under the statement filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission the new firm has an authorized capitalization of 5,000,000 shares of common stock at \$1 par value, of which 2,200,000 shares will be issued presently, the remaining shares to remain authorized but unissued. Thus the Kaiser-Frazer Corporation may be expected to start manufacturing operations with capital and surplus of approximately \$20,000,000. And, it might be added, with a veteran automobile management, engineering and production staff. Although no date has been set for the start of production, it is expected that manufacture of the Kaiser car will start early next year. As to production of the Frazer car and the farm equipment line, it is pointed out that the government has not yet cleared the Willow Run plant of equipment and that it will take about two months to install the automobile production lines.

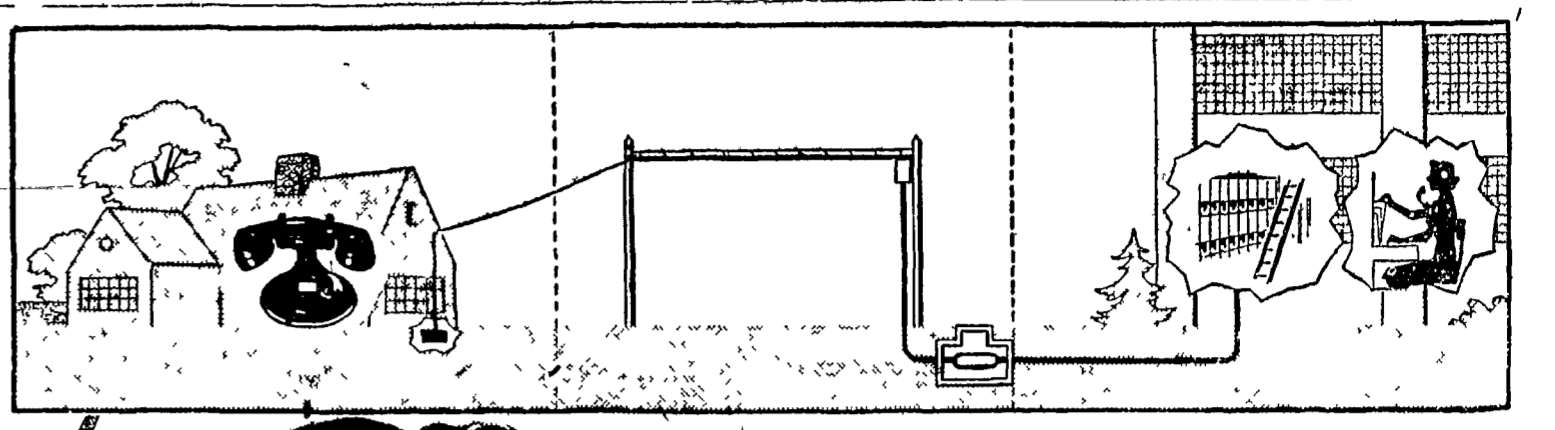
