Here's The Proposition

M.D. Protests Name of Proposed Local Hospital

(The following article was written by Dr. J. Colin Elliott, M.D., vice president of the Berrien County Medical Association, pointing out that, in their belief, the name assumed by the promoters of the "Buchanan Community Hospital" is, in their opinion, inaccurate and misleading.)

The hospital project in this community is entirely an osteopathic project. Certainly the men who have spent unnumbered hours studying the features of such a project know that the M.D.'s in this area cannot use the facilities of an osteopathic hospital without jeopardizing their standing in their own institutions. They also must know that 150 new beds will be added to Memorial and St. Joseph hospitals in South Bend, and that St. Joseph and Benton Harbor have already added 150 new beds, and that there will be added 45 new beds in the new wing in Niles. It is then, the osteopaths who want the hospital, who will staff it and run it. It would better be called the Buchanan Osteopathic Hospital than the Buchanan Community Hospital.

When this project was first proposed, over a year ago, it was pointed out that the County Medical Society, and the M.D.'s in this area were not in favor of a hospital in Buchanan. That is the situation today. It was also pointed out that the specialists who would visit the hospital were all osteopaths, not M.D.'s. That situation still obtains. Serious consideration must still be given as to whether a hospital in this town could maintain itself. The osteopathic institution in St. Joseph couldn't.

Any gifts or support given to the osteopathic hospital project in Buchanan, should be given in the light of these additional facts, which up to now have not been clearly stated by those who are sponsoring this fund-raising campaign.

Scouts Seek Funds To Carry On Work

Robert Habicht, Buchanan, has announced that the local drive for funds for the Southwestern Michigan Boy Scout Council will kick off Oct. 1.

Mr. Habicht, in presenting the need for funds for the operation of Scouting in this area, points out that Scouting is facing the same type of problems as the school systems, that of an ever-increasing youth population. Sponsoring groups, trained leaders, activities, camping facilities, must be developed to take care of the boys who want to be in Scouting. National surveys indicate that 3 of every 4 boys want to be Scouts. At the present only 50% of the boys who want to be in the Scouting program are registered because of a lack of the items listed above: sponsoring groups, trained leaders, activities, and camping facilities.

A contribution to the local drive will help to continue to give the boys now in Scouting a worthwhile program, and at the same time extend this program to some of the boys who are not being benefited at the present time.

At the present time Buchanan has a Cub Scout pack (for boys 8, 9, and 10) of nearly 50 boys, and the Boy Scout troop (for boys 11 and over) is one of the outstanding troops in the Southwestern Michigan Council. Both of these fine units are sponsored by the Methodist church.

Organization of an Explorer Unit (for young men 14 and over) was started last spring, but organization has not been completed at this date.

A meeting is set for Sept. 22 to organize a Boy Scout troop at the First Presbyterian church.

Schools Set Up Patrols At 9 Intersections

The Buchanan schools have very materially increased their patrols, particularly at the street intersections adjacent to the high schools.

Patrols now in process of establishment are at the following locations in the high school traffic area: Terre Coupe and Chicago streets; North Cayuga and high school gymnasium, Clark and Chicago streets, Detroit and Front streets, Phelps and Chicago streets, Alexander and Phelps streets.

In the Moccasin grade school area patrols are being posted in the following places: Moccasin and 5th streets, Moccasin and 4th streets, Main and 5th streets, in front of Moccasin school. These patrols are being placed to guard foot traffic of school children at heavy points, and not to handle car traffic. The city has now posted guards at West Front and Moccasin and at the West Chicago and North Detroit intersection at the high school.

C. E. Kaye Attends Meet With Treasury Officials, St. Joe

C. E. Kaye, president of the Union State Bank, met with banking leaders of Berrien county at the Whitcomb Hotel, St. Joseph, to discuss with U. S. Treasury officials the importance to Michigan citizens of stepping up sales of U. S. bonds in peacetime, in the interests of sound money.

Speakers were Arnold Rauert, U. S. Treasury liaison officer, Delmar V. Cote, Michigan State Director of U. S. Savings Bonds, Miss Janet Kennedy, assistant supervisor of savings bonds for the Federal Reserve Bank of Detroit. The purchase of U. S. savings bonds is the most effective defense against inflation, stated Rauert. A total of 75% of the Series E bonds extended three years ago are being held by the original owners, stated Cote. In Michigan last year citizens bought \$57,000,000 more dollars' worth of savings bonds than were redeemed.

Long Pass Plays Score For Cubs

After leading State High of Kalamazoo for 53½ minutes last Friday evening, the Buchanan high school football team was shaken for two quick touchdowns and one extra point, which put the Bucks on the short end of a 13 to 7 score.

The Bucks rolled to a quick second period score, after a scoreless first period. Six plays were needed in the drive for the score. Good hard running on the part of Dodge Karpinski and Jim Conrad featured the march. Karpinski going over from the 6-yard line, Pendley converted for the Bucks' 7 points.

In the third period a disheartening clipping penalty and a referee's quick decision cost the Bucks dearly. Conrad, Pendley, Karpinski and Schau were on the move and reeling off good gains. Conrad broke off right guard for 22 yards to the State High 8. Clipping was called by the field judge on the State 12. The game referee marched the ball back to the 45-yard line, when it should have been placed on the 27, with first down and ten. After the setback the Bucks looked woefully tired and were never able to put together a sustained march.

In the fourth quarter State High went to the air for a long gain, then scored on a line buck. The conversion was blocked by the flying Dodge Karpinski. Score 7 to 6, Bucks' favor. After regaining the ball when the Bucks' attack bogged down on the Cubs 30, State High again lofted a beautiful pass good for 44 yards, in the air. They scored a moment later on another pass play, Miles to Parker. The conversion was another pass, Miles to Garfield. Dodge made 90 yards rushing while Jim rolled up 70.

Hospital Fund Drive Begins

WHATEVER IT IS, IT'S A NICE-LOOKING SHANTY—Whether the above is a press box, or, as others hold, just a radio booth and concession stand, you can now readily see by the picture above that it's going to be a dilly of a booth when it's done. This handsome structure, looming up in the rear of the stadium, is the project of the Buchanan Lions Club, aided by several other civic organizations. At the time the picture was taken it was not finished, the roof not being completed, and the windows, doors, and benches inside yet to be installed. The cost was \$2,500, with considerable labor donated. Dimensions are length, 32 feet; width, 8 feet; height, 15 feet. Materials are brickrete. Clyde Lomlaugh is chairman of the building committee. Tom Irvine donated the electrical work. The Clark Equipment company furnished some of the wire.

The campaign funds for the aim of the drive is to secure a 40-bed general hospital, with complete modern facilities for medical, surgical and obstetrical care. Dr. Crosby stated that the hospital was to create and maintain a fully-staffed laboratory and x-ray department. The drive is to cover two weeks. The drive captains are to contact canvassers, who in turn, are to make a complete canvass, inviting everyone to make cash, pledge or labor contributions. Dr. Crosby stated that the creation of the Buchanan Community Hospital would make available better service to the sections west and north of Buchanan, promoting community health in those areas. A series of radio programs has been carried on this week through the Benton Harbor radio station, explaining the drive objectives and acknowledging contributions.

John Hughes, Vet Of Royal Air Force, Is Taken By Death

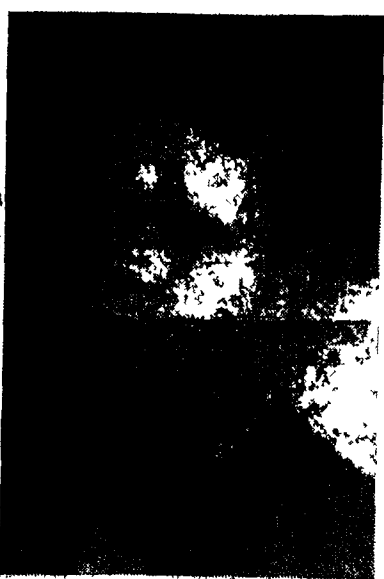
John Patrick Hughes died Tuesday, Sept. 21, at his home on Terre Coupe Road. He had been ill for some time.

4 Galien-Buchanan 4-H Youth Compete In Michigan Finals

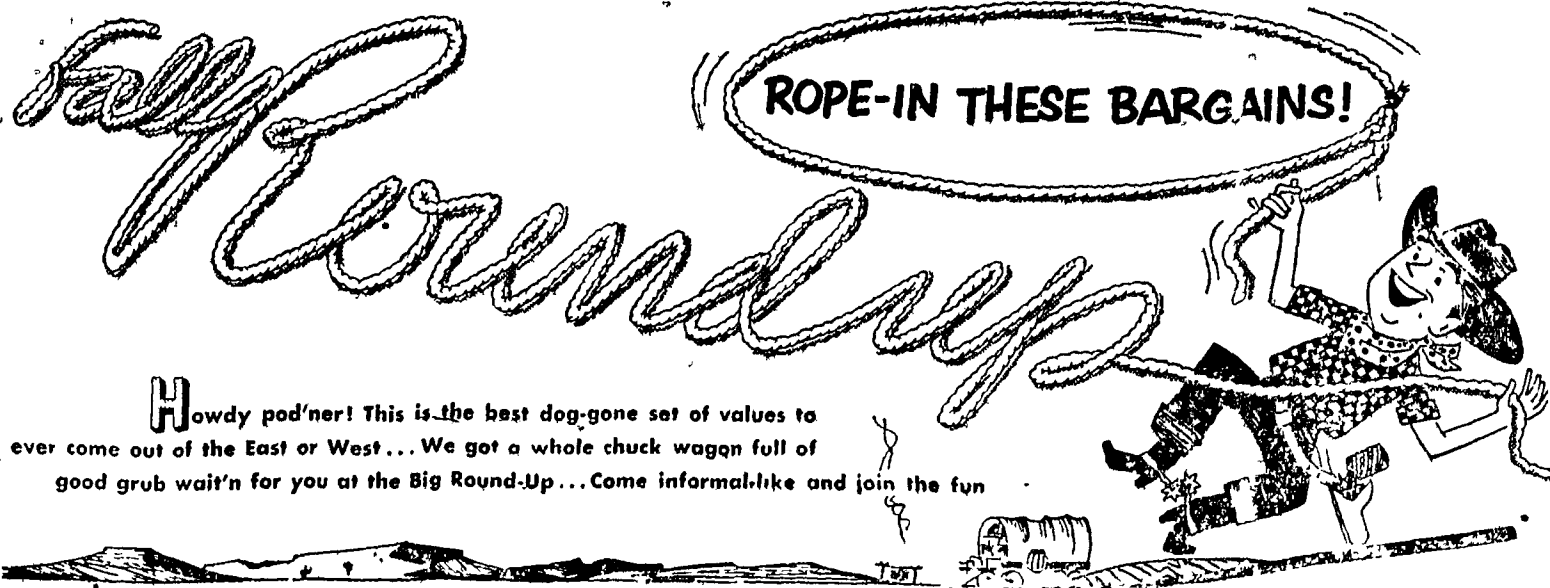

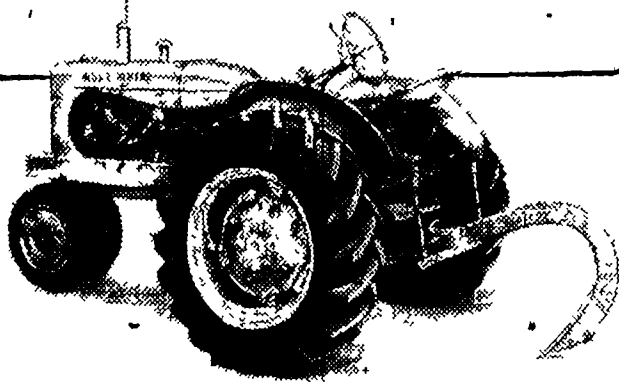

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Corn Field Day Tues., Sept. 28, L. Babcock Farm

All is set for "Corn Field Day", to be held next Tuesday, Sept. 28, under the auspices of Michi-

gan State College on the 20 to 25 acres of experimental plots grown this year by the college on the Leonard Babcock farm, 2 miles north of Gallen on Cleveland Avenue.

The Corn Field Day to be held here is one of four held in Michigan. Last year the Southwest Michigan Corn Field Day was held at Three Rivers. The South Berrien area is most fortunate in

drawing the event this year, as the range of experiments to determine the best methods of corn culture far surpasses what any individual could accomplish in self-education. This area is especially fortunate that the event was staged here in a year marked by nearly ideal conditions both in point of heat and moisture.

In each experiment the ranges are set to include both extremes and the golden mean in corn culture. In one experimental set-up five varieties of corn are planted at the rate of 26,000, 16,000, 13,000 and 8,000 plants per acre. The intent was to plant too many and too few, as well as to determine the practical number. The plot rows with 26,000 per acre bear only nubbins because of overplanting.

The entire four will have been harvested before Corn Field Day and the returns of each in corn figured.

In one plot the corn is planted by the new "tilt-planter" in clover sod, without plowing. In another plot the corn is planted in rows 80 inches apart instead of the usual 40 inches apart and seedlings of alfalfa, broom grass and other hay seedlings made between the rows. The corn is planted at the rate of 8,000, 12,000 and 16,000 per acre, the whole intent being to determine whether farmers cannot get more combined values in both grain and hay and forage grass stands by sowing between corn rows than by sowing in oats.

The corn pictured above was grown on a plot which the experimenters "gave the works" in order to demonstrate top production. The corn in which Leonard Babcock is standing was sown in clover sod and was fertilized with the following foods per acre: 500 pounds of 0-20-20, 100 pounds of nitrogen planted at root depth in solution with 120 pounds of anhydrous ammonia, 300 pounds of 5-20-20 per acre (or part of it) planted as side-dressing to rows at the rate of 100 pounds per acre.

With the aid of ideal weather this attempt to secure maximum yield by arranging the most favorable conditions seems to be paying off, states County Agent Hoekzema, who worked with Michigan State College in the project. A minimum of 100 cars are expected at the event if weather conditions are fair. Mr. Babcock completed harvesting 20 acres of hay from ground which will be

used as a parking lot for visiting farmers from all parts of southwestern Michigan and northwestern Indiana.

According to M.S.C. plans groups will start every 15 minutes from 9:30 a.m. until 11 a.m. and again from 1-2 p.m. There will be 10 stops with extension specialists at each stop to discuss the different experiments. It will take 2½ hours to make the complete circuit and get the various explanations of the different things that are tried.

Farmers Haul '52-'53 Corn Crop To Government Bins

Buchanan farmers who had 1953 corn crops sealed in their bins at home are hauling the grain to the U. S. storage bins west of Buchanan on the request of the Department of Agriculture. Last week they completed transferring their 1952 corn crops from home bins to the government bins.

About 30,000 bushels of 1952 corn was transferred and it is estimated that a considerably larger amount of 1953 corn is being moved this week. It is estimated that about 100,000 bushels of corn were stored in federal bins by the first of this week. A large amount of the 1953 crop is being rejected for storage because it contains over the 13½% minimum of moisture. It is consequently being sold on the present market.

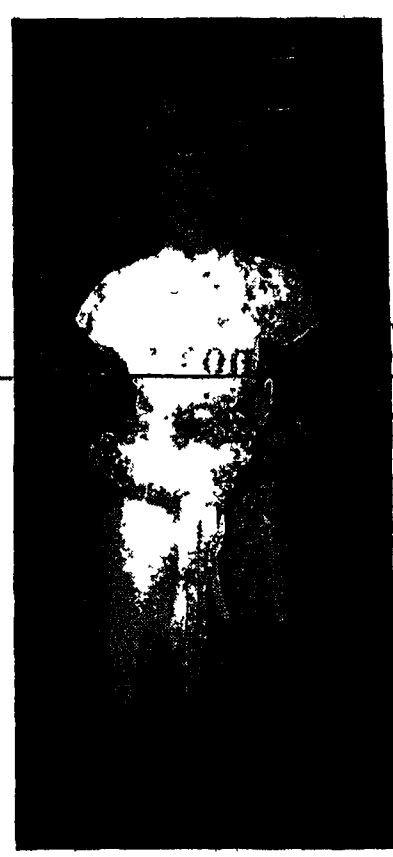

Battle on Credit For State Surplus

Too much money in government can be quite a bother.

Among administrators to appreciate this fact was former Gov. Harry F. Kelly. His point was that the instant a state treasury shows a surplus, everyone starts devising ways to spend the unappropriated money. So long as there is a deficit, officials have a sound argument to use when approached by people with ideas that cost money.

The surplus proved a pitfall for Gov. G. Mennen Williams in an entirely different way. And he is still digging his way out of the rubble.

In a recent press release the governor said something to the effect that "We have now eliminated the deficit and will have a surplus."

The statement made a wonderful target for his opponents. Several newspapers, as well, were quick to inquire about the "we"

Columnists and editorials pointed out that the governor should be careful about claiming credit for the surplus. Republicans stated that the surplus resulted "not because of 'soapy', but in spite of him."

Facts were on their side. Two major accomplishments are considered responsible for the fact that Michigan finally beat its financial problem.

One is the Business Receipts Tax. This law is responsible for an increase of some \$30 million per year. When it passed through the legislature in the final hectic days of the 1953 session and with the masterful, if high pressure, maneuvering of Sen. George Higgins, the governor refused to sign it.

Williams wanted a plain corporations profits tax and would settle for nothing less. But he couldn't veto the proposed tax without forcing a special session

of the legislature which might override him anyway. So he made sure people knew he didn't like it; permitted it to become law without his name.

Second reason the budget balances is that appropriations were greatly reduced from what the governor requested in his message.

Now that the surplus exists, Republicans, who passed the tax and reduced his recommendations, ask, "How come Soapy is claiming credit for this?"

In an effort to calm the storm, the governor was quick to explain that his reference to "we" was meant in the sense "we the people of Michigan," not "we the Democratic party." He was ready and willing, he said "to give credit to administration heads who affected economies in state operation and to legislators who worked out the program."

But the governor said that he felt that he too had played an integral part in the activity and is responsible for some of the credit for the accomplishment.

A knotty problem for the Highway Department is developing as a by-product of the Straits Bridge. It's the matter of a four-lane north-south highway to enable people to drive to Mackinac with less difficulty.

Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler has little quarrel with the idea if someone could figure out a way to finance it without disrupting long range plans his department has painstakingly worked out.

Root of the trouble lies in the fact that alert communities see the super highway as a future project that will come sooner or later. They are anxious to have it come sooner — and in their own vicinity.

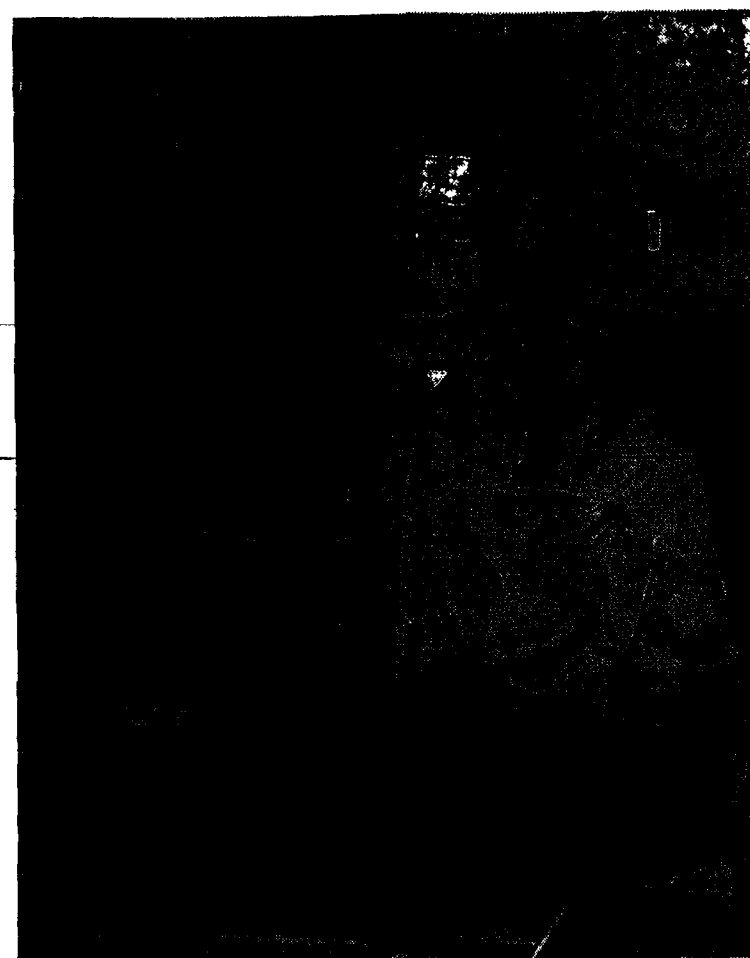
Proposed routes receiving support at present are US 131, running through Grand Rapids, Cadillac and Kalkaska, US 27 from Coldwater through Marshall, Charlotte, Lansing, St. Johns and straight north; one running north from Battle Creek to M 66, one from Detroit, along much of US 23 through Dearborn, Pontiac, Flint and Saginaw.

At present there are no plans in the Highway Department for a four-lane highway along any of these routes all the way to the Straits. Indications are that Commissioner Ziegler will continue his previous policy of spreading uniformly highway improvements with an eye to emergent needs caused by congested traffic conditions.

The problem of how to spend the money is not any easy one Ziegler considers that it is better to attempt to improve roads in the many areas that supply the financing than it is to build enormous highways at great expense that will benefit a limited number of drivers.

Despite the dramatic appeal of the north-south highway, routine car counts show that there are many places in the state that are in much more serious need of attention. These include areas in central and southern Michigan.

Meet Your Merchant



Here's A Very Happy Birthday To J. Hattenbach

The selection of the subject for "Meet Your Merchant" is always accomplished the same way. Miss Allene Arney, the office manager at the Woodworth Insurance & Real Estate, reaches a lily-white hand (quarter please) in an envelope in the office safe and draws out a name of a business firm.

This week on Friday, Sept. 17, she drew the Hattenbach Coal Company. Sept. 18 is the birthday of both the Hattenbach Coal company and of its youthful manager, John Hattenbach. Both the coal company and John Hattenbach were born on Sept. 18, 1916.

There's a couple of daisies for you! In the way of commemoration we mean Mr. Herman Hattenbach probably took one look at his son and heir and said, "I sure got to get busy now!" So he celebrated the event by starting a coal company.

Cost of county government has increased \$2 per person in the state. John Martin, Jr., auditor-general, said that it costs the "average" individual \$26.78 for county services in 1953, compared with \$24.97 in 1952.

Martin said there is a wide range of costs when counties are considered separately. It costs \$19.91 to service a resident of Bay County, compared to \$90.01 in Keweenaw. If costs of operating parks were deducted from the total, the cost there would be only \$68.96 per person.

In the beginning it was the Hattenbach Coal & Ice company, before the days of refrigeration. The ice business drew to its close in the late 1940's when the last customers, mainly in the Moccasin Court Housing project, replaced their ice boxes by refrigerators after the end of World War II. Within the memory of the present manager, John, the company used to deliver as much as 2,000 to 2,500 pounds of ice a week in summer to large "coolers" in stores and meat markets.

Meanwhile John was growing up. He attended the local schools, playing on the Bucks' football team two years, on the basketball team three years, and running the quarter mile on the track team. He was graduated in 1936. He married Marjorie McMullen of St. Joseph on March 14, 1942. He entered the U-S Army Air Corps and held headquarters positions in several southern air corps camps in the United States.

Then he returned home in 1946 and took over the management of the Hattenbach Coal company. On Nov. 4 he received appointment from the Michigan Department of State as branch manager in charge of auto license sales for the Buchanan area.

On Sept. 13, 1954, he received the following letter from Michigan Department of State, Lansing, Michigan: Dear John:

"In going over the accounting sections of records on branch office operations so far this year, I find that the branch you manage has operated with exceptional efficiency and with a minimum of errors in details."

I know that in the past two years a great deal of work has

been added to your operation by reason of legislative change, and your performance as a representative of the Department of State is very gratifying to me.

Please accept my personal congratulations on the type of service you are providing the public. With kindest regards, I am

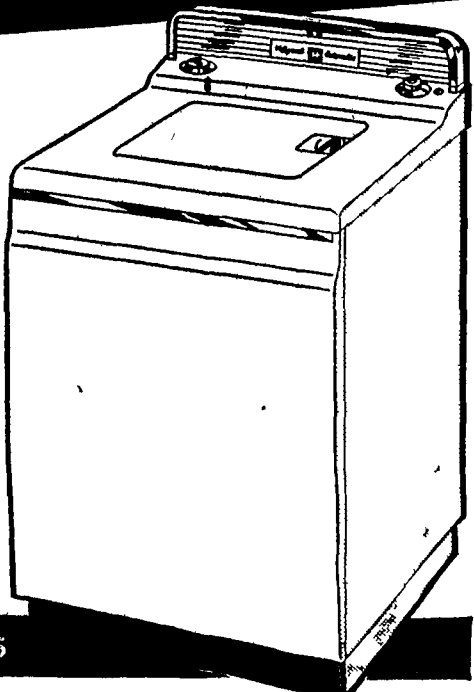

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH, Mich.—It never rains but what it pours! Berrien county probate judge, Malcolm Hatfield is this week's best witness to the validity of that time-worn expression.

Troubles were piling up like autumn leaves for the erstwhile probate judge who would like nothing better now than to become Michigan's only non-lawyer circuit judge. Only they weren't so easy to take away.

Three on one, political run—For his trouble No. 1, Judge Hatfield was learning this week that professional ties are stronger than mere party ties. The three men, all attorneys, who are also in the running for the two circuit court vacancies to be filled at the polls come Nov. 2 were ganging up on him campaign-wise this week.

Incumbent Judge Thomas N. Robinson, Sr., like Hatfield, is a democrat. Aspirants Karl Zick of Benton Harbor and Philip Hadsell, St. Niles, are republicans. But when they chose up sides this week for the campaign, Hatfield found himself standing all alone and bearing the brunt of the Robinson-Zick-Hadsell cam-

paign to insure the election of only attorneys to the important circuit court bench.

Sweet Decision, Bitter Taste—Judge Hatfield found trouble No. 2 engulfing him from the very confines of the court he envisions himself presiding over after Nov. 2.

Visiting Judge Lucien Sweet of Kalamazoo, has spent the last several months studying Hatfield's records of the commitment of a young Benton Harbor attorney to the Kalamazoo State Hospital for the mentally ill four years ago.

The attorney, Edward J. Kenney, Jr., got out of the state hospital two years ago on a convalescent status and has devoted every minute of his time since to removing the "mentally ill" stigma from his name. He filed suit against Hatfield, charging that he had been wrongly committed and asked the court to set aside the commitment, issue a permanent injunction against any possible recommitment under it, and assess Hatfield the costs of the proceedings.

Judge Sweet was so dissatisfied

with the Probate Court's handling of the Kenney case that he grasped everything the young attorney requested. The original opinion was handed down last May, but a decree awaited another hearing this week.

The latest hearing resulted in a stinging rebuke of Hatfield's handling of the case.

"Not in my experience have I examined a file in a commitment proceedings that failed to meet the terms of the statute as this Probate Court failed to meet the requirements of the statute," declared Judge Sweet.

He had scored Hatfield last May, when the original opinion was handed down, for allegedly failing to follow the step-by-step order of commitment as outlined by statute and also for his alleged failure to keep proper records of the proceedings.

"I don't know whether Judge Hatfield was constrained to sign the order of commitment by reason of his ignorance of the requirements of the law, his lack of experience or something else, but I cannot escape the conclusion that in any event the plaintiff (Kenney) should be entitled to his costs in this matter and I think these costs should be paid by the defendant, Hatfield," the judge added.

Judge Sweet thus did what he admitted was "distasteful"—assess another public official, in particular another judge, the costs of a litigation in which the other public official became involved through the discharge of his public duties.

Judge Hatfield, who was also taken to task in this week's hearing for appearing in the circuit court room in his shirtsleeves, stepped to the bench upon the conclusion of the hearing and wrote a check covering Kenney's court costs and attorney fees. The check was for \$359.75.

More Hatfield Blues: Kenney Sues—Judge Hatfield isn't one to take stinging derision parked on his posterior. He snapped back with a prepared statement explaining his side of the Kenney case and thereby came Trouble No. 3 for the Judge this week. Kenney sued him for libel.

Moreover, Kenney asked \$75,000 damages, making a total damage claim of \$198,000 he now has against the judge. He has a \$123,000 law suit against Hatfield pending in federal court in Grand Rapids under a federal statute protecting individual rights.

Hatfield innocently said he would normally appeal such a decision as Sweet handed down assessing him the costs in the Kenney case, but that the heavy case load existing in the Probate Court precluded his having the time to do it. He branded the decision "another slap" at his candidacy for circuit judge.

But Hatfield also made certain statements about Kenney's mental ability at the time of his original commitment back in 1950 which Kenney couldn't quite gulp down. Hence the libel action.

Named co-defendants with the Probate Judge in the libel suit was the Palladium Publishing Co., publishers of the News-Palladium, a daily paper in Benton Harbor, and two of its executives. The Palladium published Hatfield's statement as a paid advertisement.

There you have them—the three latest chapters in the Hatfield story, a story which won't be completed until Nov. 2 decides the fate of the circuit court election—a story which likely won't even be completed then. As long as Malcolm Hatfield is Malcolm Hatfield, he'll find ways of keeping his name before the public.

Berrien ASC Head Gives Details Of Wheat Allotments
According to Arthur Lee, new chairman of the Berrien ASC, it is important that farmers know more about this program as it is their program and it is to their advantage to know the different rules and regulations.

Already some difficulties have been found and there may be cases where producers feel that they have not had a fair deal. Many changes have been made in the new program. For instance, if a farmer does not feel that he received a fair allotment the members of the County Committee do not act on this but have an appeal committee to decide the amount that should be allotted.

Many misunderstandings have been developed. Any grower who does not have a wheat allotment may grow up to 15 acres of wheat next year and receive a wheat marketing card. However, any wheat producer who exceeds his wheat allotment will not be eligible for wheat loans. Nearly all farmers are affected whether they voted or not, as this is a national program passed by Congress.

Cross-compliance is a new feature and more information will be available in the near future. At present it means that farmers who receive wheat loans and stay within their wheat allotments must stay within their corn allotments to be eligible to receive either wheat or corn loans.

Mr. Lee states that it is the duty of the new committee to formulate office policies and to supervise the overall program but not to do the detail work. Farmers are asked to contact either the office or the county committee for more information.

Other members of the county committee are: Hugh Martell, Three Oaks; John Walter, Coloma; and J. P. Hoekzema, county agricultural agent.

Study Michigan Limestone Sinks

The first known scientific study of animal and plant life in and around Michigan's picturesque "sink holes" has recently been completed by a group of Cranbrook Institute of Science specialists.

Long objects of tourist attention, these limestone sinks are naturally formed pits varying in depth from a few feet to well over a hundred feet.

Temperatures at the bottom of the deeper holes were found to be 20 degrees lower than at the surface, with very little variation from night to day. This temperature difference, along with other factors, was found to have a marked effect on the types of life in the pits, particularly plants.

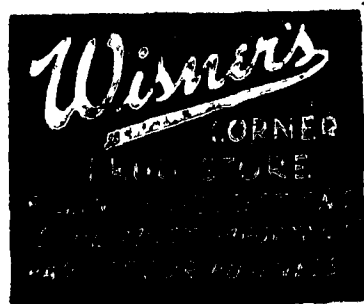

Fertilizers, different hybrids, rate of planting, speed of planting, wide-rows and seedings, weed control and many other demonstrations will be seen.

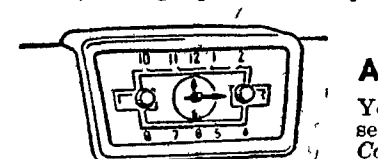
