To Collect Tin Cans on May 8

City to Collect at Curb and Take Cans to Car at Niles

A method of disposal of salvaged tin cans has at last been announced for Buchanan, with a release by Edward Murdock, county commissioner of schools, stating that the week of May 3-8 has been named as collection period.

On this day the Buchanan street department trucks will canvass the town collecting cans which are to be prepared according to specifications and placed at the curb. Preparation includes thorough washing, removal of labels, cutting of ends sufficient so that they may be tucked inside the cans...

According to a letter received by the Record Wednesday morning from School Commissioner Murdock, the villages and cities of New Buffalo, Three Oaks, New Troy, Galien, Buchanan and Dowagiac may take the cans to Niles any day of the week of May 3-8. The cans may be dumped in the Babbitt company coal yards, and from there will be loaded on a railway car by shovel on Saturday, May 8.

In the rural areas people are requested to get their cans to their rural schools where they are to be placed near the highway for collection by trucks of the Berrien County Road Department which will haul them either to Niles or Benton Harbor.

Following the receipt of Murdock's letter, Mayor Wilson was contacted and he advised the Record to announce the general plan this week, stating that during the coming week he would see Street Commissioner Edward Mitchell and arrange a plan and date of collection for the city to be announced in the Record of April 29.

Kalamazoo, Mich.—Suzanne McKinnon of Buchanan is among a group of Western Michigan college students who are planning to devote much of their brief Easter week-end vacation, in enlisting the interest of high school seniors in their communities in preparing for professions, particularly the teaching profession.

They are doing this to contribute their full share to the solution of the present and post-war problem of shortage of men and women in the professions. In the teaching profession alone there is a shortage of 75,000 teachers in the public schools of the United States this year, which it is expected will be increased in succeeding years unless more young people prepare themselves to enter the teaching profession. A similar present and post-war shortage is predicted for other professions.

Miss McKinnon has planned to confer with local high school seniors at times which will not interfere with the regular schedule of high school classes, and has provided herself with accurate information concerning the opportunities for preparation for professions in which they are now needed for patriotic service and in which they may find the security of post-war careers.

It is expected that a short ceremony will be held at some point in that vicinity, in which Supt. H. C. Lurkins Asks Farmers to Aid in Getting Help

Offers Tips on Methods of Getting Out-State Labor

To Berrien County Farmers: Last year the shortage of production and harvesting labor in this area was very acute. Because of this fact, hundreds of thousands of pounds of badly needed food stuff was either not produced or went to waste after actually being grown.

The situation this year is almost sure to be even worse. While it is true that several federal, state, area and county agencies are doing what they can to recruit the necessary help, it is not at all likely that they will be able to do the job alone. They need your help!

Many of you have the names and addresses of migrant laborers who have worked for you in years past. If you now need or will need help, and have such names, sit down and write these people and try to induce them to work for you again this year. Tell them that there is a shortage of help in this area and ask them to bring their friends and neighbors along with them. If you have the names of more laborers than you will need, take or send the names and addresses to your county agent and he will see that the people are asked to come.

If you have out-of-state help working for you at the present time, ask them for the names and addresses of their friends and neighbors who might be interested in coming here to work. Either write them yourself, or give the names to your county agent.

By offering these people a job you make it possible, in most instances, for them to obtain the gasoline with which to make the trip. Few of them can get it in any other way. In writing out-of-state help you might explain that the written offer of a job (your letter) entitles them to sufficient gasoline to move to the new job. Tell them to take your letter to their local ration board.

No new labor pools are in sight. If we fail to induce those who have helped us in the past to do so again this year, the losses in food and money are going to be staggering. You who have the names, write today! Tomorrow may be too late.

Get all the help you can in this way—watch for other suggestions which will follow—read them carefully.
