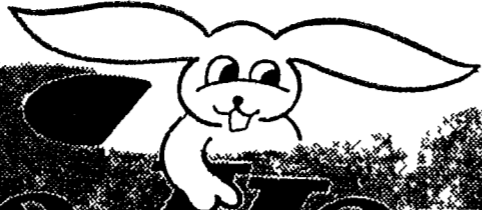

Metea Court Is Expanding

Donlen & Lofgren has broken ground on 24 more units for Metea Court. This complex already has 76 units which were opened in September, 1972. Named after an Indian chief, these apartments provide convenient living for senior citizens in either one or two bedroom units.

The new buildings will be constructed on the site of the old Barton or Redden house on Liberty between Front and Rynearson. The history of this property goes back to a land grant to Levi and David Sanford dated August 17, 1838. The Samuel Redden home was built in the 1880's, using brick from Blodgett's brick yard located on Main Street in Buchanan.

On August 1, 1932, the house was sold to Leslie Barton. Frequent visitors were radio's Amos and Andy. The property was sold to Frank Fabiano in 1945.

Mrs. Donlen said that efforts were made to restore the house instead of having to tear it down, but this was found to be impossible.

On hand for the groundbreaking were the Joseph Donlens, Al Orpurt, who will be a sub-contractor, George Sullivan, president of the non-profit corporation which started Metea Court and Fred Stout, Joseph Garbert Sr., and Louis Desenberg, members of the original board. Ruth Irvine, resident manager of Metea Court, invited the group to the community building for refreshments afterwards. Also present was John North, new manager of the Buchanan branch of Inter-City Bank.

Other members of the original board included Rex Porter, Robert Faulhaber, Harry Kennedy, Dan Smith and Rev. Keith Laidler. When the project was completed it was sold to Donlen and Lofgren on a limited partnership arrangement.

Let's Cut Down

It's not because they like the scenery that Clark Equipment has started plants in North Carolina. It isn't for any frivolous reason that much of Buchanan Steel's expansion has been in Havana, Illinois. Michigan is doing it to them.

Industries today are being forced to take a long look at their futures in this state. Not only are taxes soaring, but the whole matter of doing business in Michigan is getting more difficult.

No state has a more ridiculous policy for unemployment. Even the little companies are feeling the pinch. This little place with a fairly stable labor force has to pay 4.6 percent of its payroll to Michigan and another big hunk to federal unemployment. Multiply that by a Clark payroll!

The Michigan Labor Department sent a man in to this shop. Among other items which had to be done is to put chicken wire around the old linotype, which has been running for over 50 years without hurting anybody.

Companies and individuals have just been through the traumatic experience of getting their assessment on next year's taxes, enough to scare many more out of this area.

There's a way to counteract this. The school board, instead of just assuming that their budget is going to be increased 6.5 percent next year, could do some sharp pencil work on how to save money. The city could attempt to spread some of its proposed spending over a longer period of time. The county could take a more realistic look at some of its current spending. The employees of all these could take an objective look at their own finances to see if they could get by with less than their expected pay raises.

It's obvious that the state equalized valuation for the Buchanan area will be up considerably, judging by the assessments we've heard about. When the school administrators and the city officials learn that they'll have a bigger tax base to work with, that doesn't mean they must seek ways to spend it. As a matter of fact, with some shrewd planning, slight cuts in the tax levies are possible at several levels.

This year a city commissioner and two school board members will be up for re-election. The candidates who promise to make a positive effort to economize and to save the taxpayers some money will have our unqualified support.

In other words, existing businesses here need all the help they can get right now.

Registration for the training sessions should be made as soon as possible by calling Mrs. Rosemarie Conn at 695-6073, coordinator for Homemaker Service in the south county area.

Fernwood Season Opens

For those who need any excuse to get out-of-doors on an April day, spring flowers have begun, the bird migration brings waves of colorful songbirds to Fernwood and the 1975 program of classes can provide many excuses.

Activities begin on April 1 with a Wilderness Camping class Tuesday evening at 7:30. Openings are still available for this class to individuals or outdoor families who like to spend part of their leisure time camping and traveling or to scout and group leaders. Although the class will be a bit more current than Thoreau at Walden Pond, its instructor, Lou Awodey, has been past director of the Canadian Wilderness program and a naturalist at Sarett Nature Center. Awoday will discuss equipment needed for wilderness trips such as for backpacking and canoeing, and will demonstrate techniques used in successful camp set-up and living.


On April 2 and 3 two morning sessions, 9:30 to noon, will inspire gardeners on "Planting an Annual Garden" and "Planting a Perennial Garden." Stan Beikmann, Fernwood Director, will help individuals incorporate flower borders into their landscape design and talk about

planning for continuous bloom and color in the garden. Slides showing flower borders and varieties of plants, and a discussion on their culture and care will be included. A few more registrants for either class can be taken.

The first of four evening workshops on "Ways with Art" will be Tuesday, April 8. Appealing to all who want to create with art, from the housewife to the parent, scout leader or teacher, it promises to be a class of fun and versatility, open for anyone. Areas to be explored are collages, modeling, casting, threads and fibers and other creative learning experiences of your own interests. Four very reputable teachers team up to offer a session each - These are Kathryn Willard, Buchanan, Marie Remington, Niles, Louise Kohring, Niles and Phyllis Hokanson, Three Oaks.

Fernwood classes are only a part of the experience of its scenic 90 acres on Range Line Road northeast of Buchanan. In April thousands of wildflowers become a prelude of more to come and are a delight to those taking a walk along the trails and swift streams of Fernwood. Bird walks with an experienced "watcher" are scheduled for every Saturday and Sunday morning in April at 7 a.m. Anyone who would like to learn is invited.

Clark Sees Long-Range Growth

Clark Equipment Company expects an improved first quarter and good long-range growth -- despite a recent slowdown of new orders -- said Bert E. Phillips, president and chief executive officer, in an address before the New York Society of Security Analysts.

"First quarter 1975 sales should be about 10 percent ahead of last year," he said, pointing out that a backlog of \$730 million at the end of February should help cushion the impact of a recent drop in new orders. The softening of demand, however,

makes the company's second half appear "difficult to forecast."

"The bright spot for us is that this general softening of demand can aid us in conserving our cash by enabling us to reduce inventory," he said. "For the first time in quite a while the severe shortage of certain materials has eased, and we have been able to achieve a much better inventory balance. If business were to level off, we could increase production efficiency and reduce costs."

He also pointed out that de-

mand has remained steady for the company's heavy construction machinery and agricultural-related products.

"We are very confident of the long range trend but we are still waiting to see what tomorrow brings to the short-range picture," he concluded.

Clark Equipment Company produces a broad range of material handling equipment, construction machinery, axes and transmissions and commercial refrigeration equipment. Sales in 1974 totaled \$1.371 billion, an increase of 21 percent over the previous year.

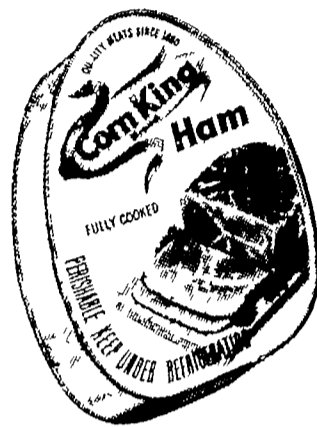

Area Landfill Is Nearing Completion

As the Southeast Berrien County Landfill Authority completes work on the 135 acres on Chamberlain Road which it is buying, the area will own a landfill which is estimated to last for 25 to 30 years. The exact time of the opening of this facility is still in doubt because there's still much earth to be moved as the frost leaves the ground.

Bertrand Township, Buchanan Township, Niles Township and the cities of Niles and Buchanan share this landfill. The Authority board is made up of two people from each municipality.

Ivan Price from Buchanan Township is president, DeLos Proseus, representing Buchanan, is vice president, Dale Nelson from Buchanan Township is treasurer, and Arthur Reed from Niles is secretary. Brayton Yaw and Lawrence Mitchell represent Bertrand, Charles Kopek is the other Niles member, John McDonald and Robert Jones represent Niles Township, and Mrs. Mildred Anderson is the other Buchanan member.

The Authority has a building. It's a pole building built by Buchanan Co-Ops which measures 40 by 64 feet. They have been buying the land a parcel at

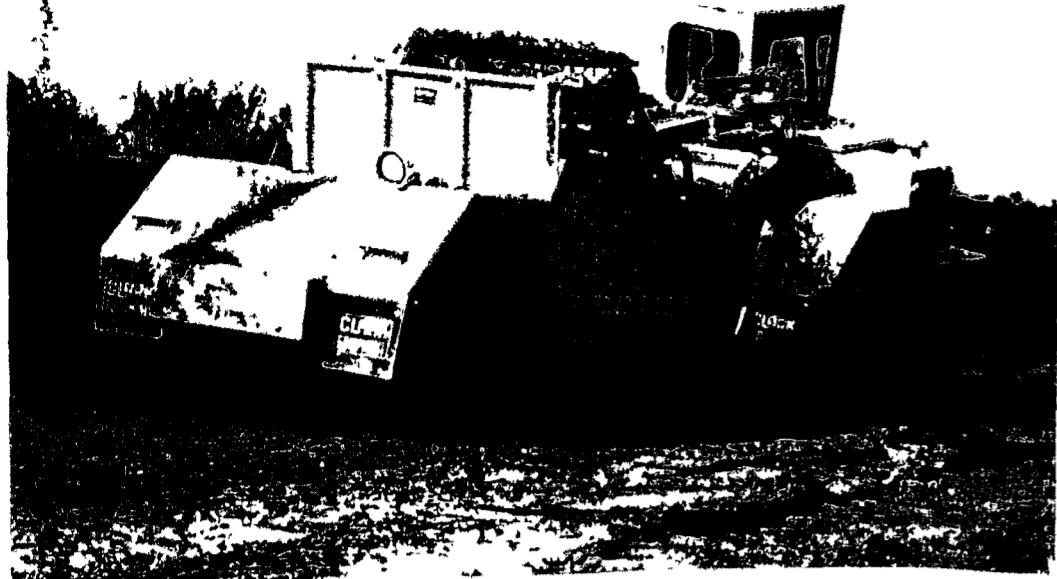
a time and now own two-thirds of it. A high fence contains the land along Chamberlain.

The two main pieces of equipment are a Clark Michigan scraper which holds 9 cubic yards, and a Caterpillar compactor which weighs 40,000 pounds. The compactor is capable of reducing a refrigerator to a relatively small package.

DeLos Proseus has been doing much of the work in getting things done. He arranged for office space in the building, considerable storage space and another room which can be used for meetings. The building is heated by electricity. There is adequate space in which to store the heavy equipment, and there are two overhead doors which are automatically operated.

Immediate plans call for adequate roads for access in and out of the landfill. Proseus said that he is now investigating proper landscaping along the fence.

So, after years of negotiations, litigation and planning, the southeast corner of the county will have a landfill which will take care of their needs for years to come. It would appear now that this will happen some time after May 1.

Michigan Bell Wants To Charge For Information

Michigan Bell has proposed a charge for heavy use of Information under a plan which would help hold down future telephone rates

The telephone company estimated that only about one out of every 20 customers -- the heavy users of Information -- would be affected by the charge in any given month

The vast majority of customers seldom or never call Information and would avoid the charge while benefiting from the savings that would result from the plan

Under the Michigan Bell proposal, there would be no charge for the first three calls a month to Information, with a 20-cent charge for each call above that

Persons with visual, physical or mental limitations who have difficulties using the telephone directory would be exempt from the charge. Also exempt would be calls from coin phones, mobile phones, hospitals, hotels and motels, and calls for numbers outside the "home" calling area

Michigan Bell asked for approval of the plan in an application filed with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Lansing

Lloyd Haynes, Michigan Bell vice president, explained that the proposed charge was not designed to increase company profits -- but simply to redistribute Information costs in such a way that the heavy users of the service pay their fair share, and that the moderate or infrequent users pay little or nothing

Under the telephone company's plan, Haynes said, savings in operating expenses -- along with revenues gained from the charge -- would be used to set rates below what they otherwise would be

Haynes said about \$10 million annually would be realized from the proposed charging plan -- about \$2 million in increased revenues from the charge and the balance in savings from lowered expenses. The plan would make it possible to hold basic residence rates about \$4 less per year

"Information is not a 'free' service," Haynes said. "The costs of providing it are built into every customer's monthly bill regardless of whether he uses the service a little, a lot or not at all"

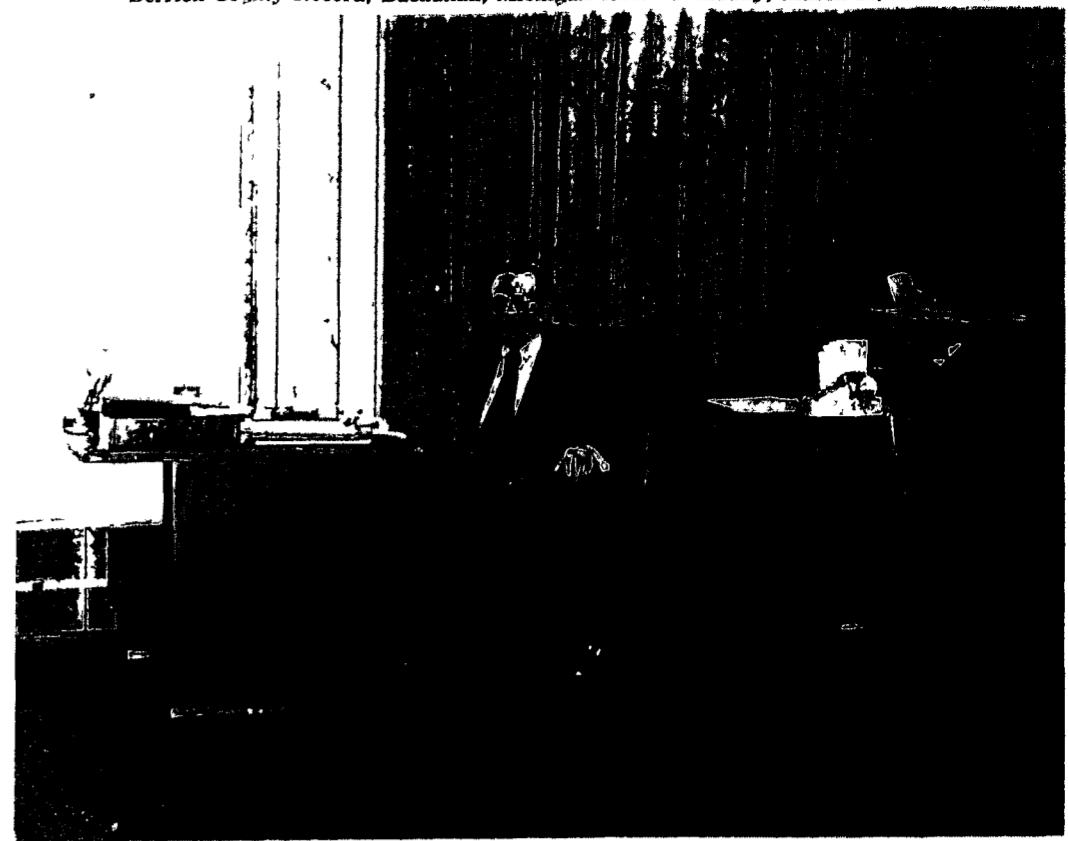
As it now stands, Haynes said, Michigan Bell customers collectively share in the \$22 million a year cost of providing Information service that handles 600,000 calls on the average business day. In most cases, the

numbers asked for are readily available in customer directories. Only about 10 percent of Michigan Bell customers make nearly 60 percent of the calls to Information.

"The three-call allowance is intended to more than take care of those times when a customer must call Information, such as for a number not yet in the directory," Haynes said

"We are not trying to eliminate Information," Haynes emphasized. "It has been and will continue to be available for customers who want to make use of it. But, those who use it the most should pay their fair share of the costs"

Under Michigan Bell's proposal, exemptions from the charge for people with physical, visual or mental limitations would be obtained by filing with the company a simple confidential exemption form

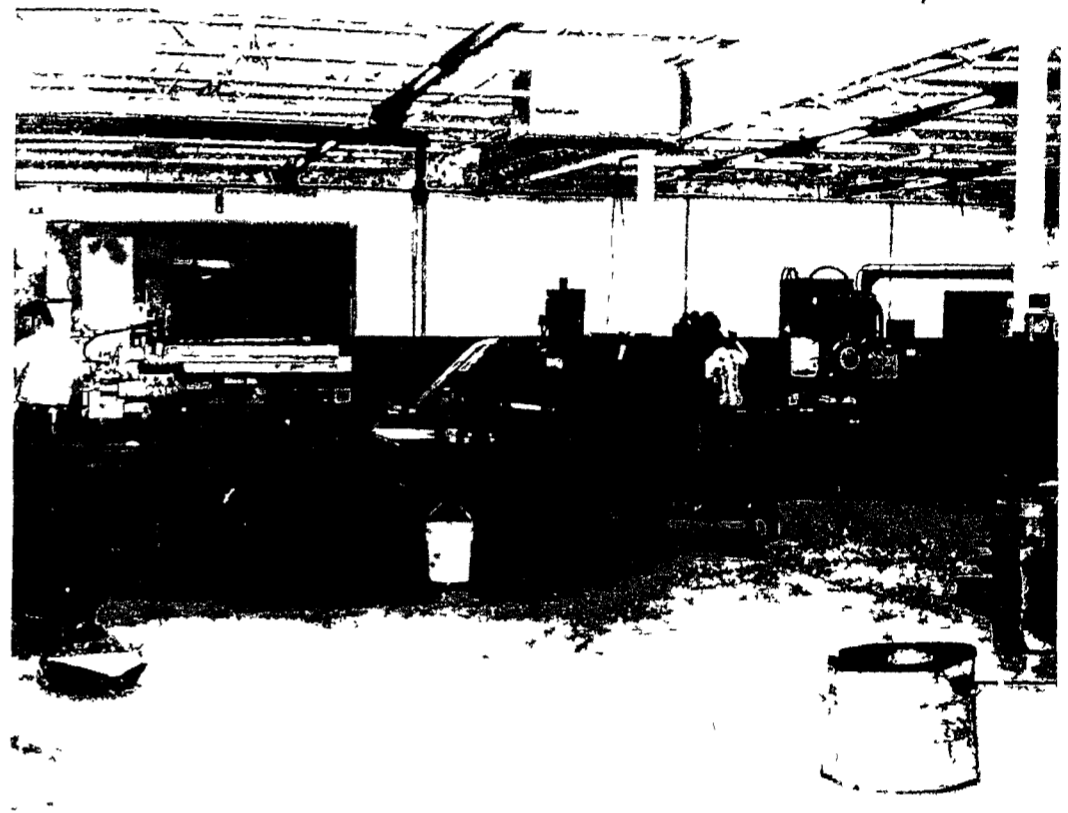

Speaker Warns of Federal Spending Disaster

Dave Stockman, executive director of the Republican Conference in Washington, was the speaker at Perc Club Tuesday morning.

Stockman predicted that the House and Senate would compromise on a tax cut of about \$25 billion. He said that the conference between the two houses is currently deadlocked on the oil depletion allowance.

Stockman said that the impact of the tax bill could stimulate the economy and get it moving in the right direction, but he said that the federal spending programs now in the works could have the opposite effect.

He said that the Democratic leadership is now on an emergency legislation binge, turning

out bad legislation too fast. He said that these measures could raise the federal deficit from \$52 billion to \$85 billion and ultimately to \$100 billion.

Stockman agreed that the unemployed should be helped, but that presently in many states the unemployment insurance check is close to 85 percent of the take-home pay and could be almost 100 percent. This, he said, would not only bankrupt the country but will bankrupt its moral vitality by removing incentive.

Stockman said that President Ford will probably veto many of these emergency bills, but he couldn't predict whether Congress could override those vetoes.

City To Fix Curbs in Liberty Heights

The city commission had been informed that labor would be available here under C.E.T.A. funding, and they thought that these people could be put to work repairing curbs and gutters in the Liberty Heights area. They had a public hearing on the subject at the middle school Monday, and about 43 property owners showed up. Some of them felt that drainage in the area was more of a problem, and some wondered why some had been forced to put in sidewalks while others hadn't.

When they were told that the labor for the job would be provided at no cost to them, the atmosphere of the meeting changed. It was estimated that the cement would cost \$2 a foot, and the commission decided to go ahead, limiting the cost to \$3 a foot. The visitors present were polled, and the vote was 27 to 8 for the project.

Word was received from HUD that Buchanan's pre-

application for funds of \$119,600 for community development had been tentatively approved. The application must now be submitted in more detail.

A representative from the Department of Natural Resources was present. He said that his department felt that adequate staffing of the wastewater treatment plant meant a minimum of 16 hours a day for seven days a week. The commission and the city manager said that they couldn't understand, as long as the wastewater plant was now performing adequately, why it was necessary to man it for twice the time. They've been told that the system has an adequate alarm system when personnel isn't present, and that the labor force now working there is sufficient. The representative from the government indicated that he'd have to discuss the matter with his superiors to see if Buchanan could be forced to take on a bigger staff.

Troop 317 believes this is the only glass recycling station in the county.

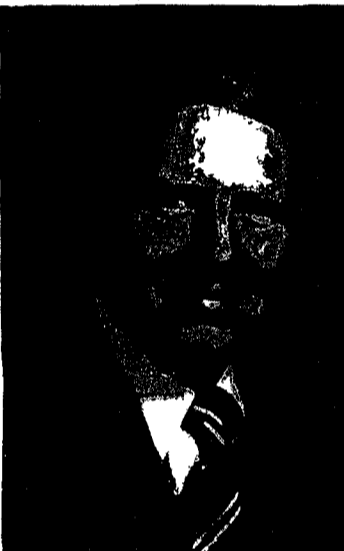

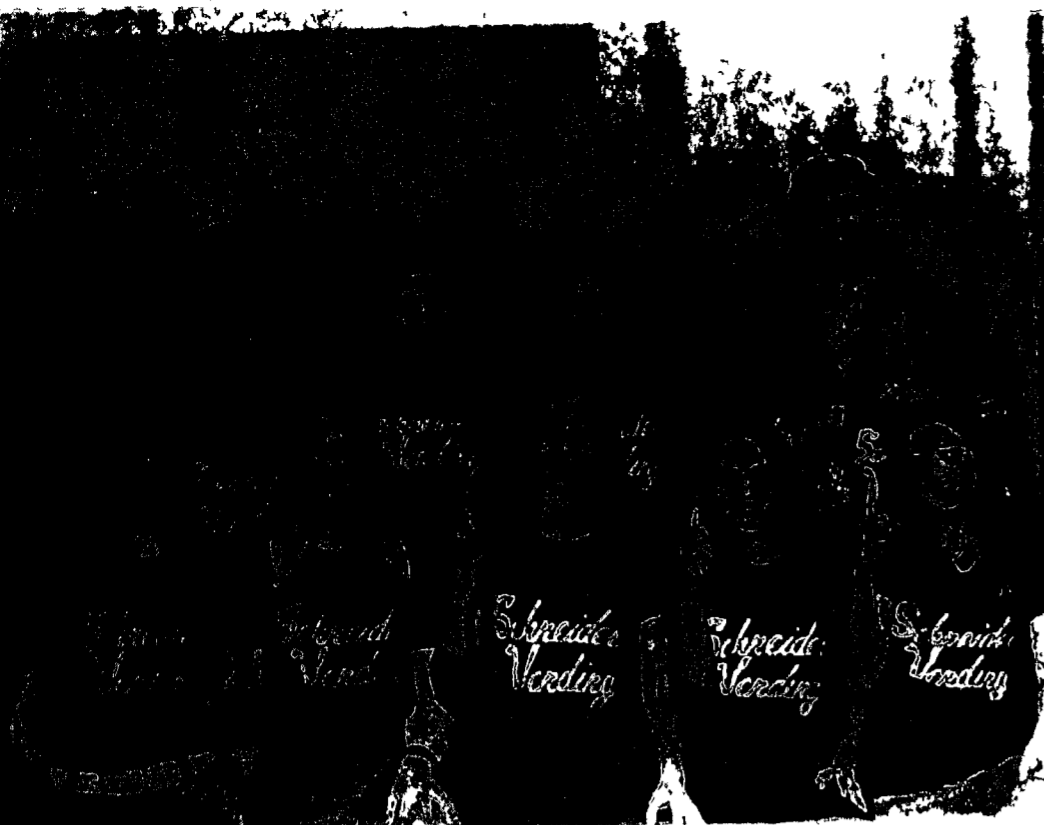

Featured were more than 100 educational sessions - over 125 speakers - scores of MSU departmental displays and a virtual fair of commercial exhibits.

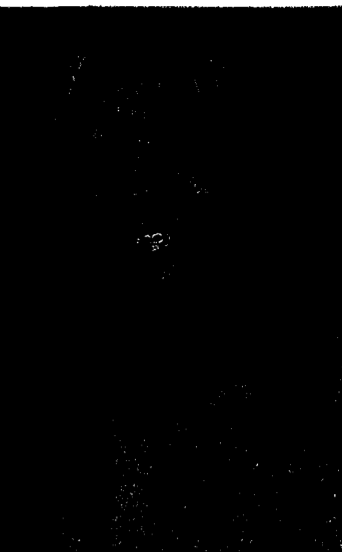
