Bakertown Boy Critically Ill In South Bend Hospital

George, Flanagan, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Flanagan, who live south of Baker town, is now reported to be seriously ill with spinal meningitis in the Epworth Memorial hospital at South Bend. He was first admitted there under diagnosis of polio, and his case was so listed.

That diagnosis has since been changed, but was not fully complete, according to reports from the hospital Tuesday afternoon. Thomas Capen of 208 North Portage, most recent of the local polio victims, is reported to be somewhat improved at Blodgett hospital, Grand Rapids. He was taken there a week ago Saturday, paralyzed from the neck down.

This past week-end, according to report, he was able to move one leg and one arm up to the elbow. Mrs. Capen went to the hospital Wednesday of last week and returned yesterday.

Robert Borst, Jr., little son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Borst, of the Orange Road, has recovered the use of his throat to the extent of swallowing broth. However, he continues to receive the liquid food formula he has been fed since he was taken to St. Mary's hospital, Grand Rapids. The only paralysis he suffered was in his throat. His limbs have not been affected. He is able to be up a little daily.

Dianne Sheeley, two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Sheeley, 405 Phelps street, is beginning to improve at St. Mary's hospital, Grand Rapids. Her neck and back are still stiff and she favors one leg in walking.

Manager Asks For More Care In Packing Rubbish

Co-operation On Part Of Public Cuts Costs, States Manager Gunn

The following statement of rules and regulations for the preparation of rubbish and other matter for handling by the city disposal trucks has been prepared by City Manager Gunn.

When the City provides any direct service at public expense, obligations are placed both on the City organization and the individual citizen. In order to provide maximum service at minimum expense, reasonable rules need to be made and enforced.

If any individual fails or refuses to cooperate, he is imposing on you, his neighbor. Your City organization wants to do the best job possible. To that end, the following rules and regulations have been adopted.

Any deviation from these regulations means higher costs to all.

All industrial waste shall be removed by the occupant of the premises wherein the same is located and no person shall permit any industrial waste to remain on any premises when the same shall become, or be liable to become, a nuisance.

It shall be the duty of every tenant, lessee or occupant of any building having garbage, rubbish or waste matter to provide and keep within said building or on the lot on which the same is situated, suitable containers of proper size to handle the accumulations of garbage, rubbish, or waste matter on the premises during the interval between collections.

All refuse shall be segregated and placed in the proper containers. A tenant, lessee or occupant of any building shall be responsible for maintaining the receptacles in good condition so as to avoid any unsanitary conditions, or littering on streets, alleys, or public or private property with refuse of any kind.

Containers for garbage shall be of metal or of construction approved by the Superintendent of Public Works and they shall be water-tight and equipped with tight-fitting covers, such as to prevent the disturbance of their contents by cats, dogs, or other animals of such type, and so maintained as to prevent the propagation of rats, flies and other insects or vermin. Metal containers shall have bails or handles for easy handling.

Containers for ashes shall be of metal of sturdy construction and must have adequate handles to prevent spillage.

Containers for rubbish may be of wood or metal or, if a rigid container is not desirable, large burlap, canvas or similar cloth bags may be used. Covers for rigid containers are desirable to prevent scattering of contents by the wind and to prevent containers becoming a breeding place for vermin. When the rubbish to be removed exceeds in volume the capacities of the containers regularly employed, it may be wrapped in bundles and securely tied, or, as in the case of discarded furniture, it shall be broken and reduced in volume so as to permit safe and speedy handling.

Yard wastes shall be placed in containers of wood, metal or paper to facilitate its handling. Branches shall be cut to four (4) foot lengths and tied securely and compactly into bundles.

The combined weight of any refuse container and its contents shall not exceed sixty (60) pounds.

No paper, lawn cuttings or rakings, leaves, weeds or any other refuse material shall be placed or swept into any street, gutter, intake, alley, vacant lot, lake, stream or other property whether public or private. It shall be the duty of every tenant, lessee or occupant of any building at all times to maintain said premises in a clean and orderly condition, permitting no deposit or accumulation of materials other than those ordinarily attendant upon the day to day use for which said premises are legally intended.

All rubbish shall be set out in proper containers or properly banded on designated collection days prior to the time that the trucks pass. Refuse shall be set at such places on the premises or on the street or alley adjacent thereto as shall be specified by the Superintendent of Public Works. Refuse containers placed on streets or alleys shall be promptly removed therefrom by such tenant or occupant after the same shall have been emptied.

2 Deliveries Of Mail Daily Now Under Way

Business Houses Not Open By 9 A.M. Should Have Boxes

Two mail distributions daily began Tuesday in the residential and business district with Harold Mann, Richard Ferner and Dale Leiter as the regular carriers.

Morning trips will be completed before noon and an afternoon trip will be made. Routes and carriers are as follows: 1 Route 1 (Mann) From Portage to Lake north of Front, including Main and Moccasin north of 4th, and north half of business section.

Route 2 (Ferner) South half business section, south of Front and east of Oak, including Oak Routes 3 (Leiter) South of Front and west of Oak, and all of Front west of Oak. Also west of Lake street and north of Front.

The mail will be distributed in the business section between 8:30 and 9 a.m. Any of the business houses not open at that time should have a mail box.

Each mail carrier has an average of 300 mail boxes en route.

Martha LeFevre Is 98 Years Old

Mrs. Martha LeFevre celebrated her 98th birthday anniversary Wednesday in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Howard Barbour, River road, with whom she lives.

A tiny active woman, with a remarkable sense of humor, she enjoys excellent health and claims that her longevity is due to her lifelong practice of eating very lightly. She is an enthusiastic member of the Women's Benefit association and never misses a meeting, although she must climb two flights of stairs to attend. She is also a member of the Thursday Social Club.

Her great-great-grandfather, Adam Duffenbaugh came to America from The Palatinate (Bavaria) about 1725 and Mrs. LeFevre stands in the middle of nine generations in America. Last summer on a visit in Milwaukee, Wis., she held her great-great-grandson in her lap.

Mrs. LeFevre was born Aug. 31, 1851, the daughter of Jacob and Martha Duffenbaugh in a village called Willow Street in Lancaster county, Pa. Many battles of the Civil War were fought in that part of the country and she remembers many incidents of that struggle.

Most vivid of her memories is the one where she watched the Union army burn the bridge over the Susquehanna river between Columbia and Wrightsville, Pa., to defeat the enemy just before Gettysburg.

She was married to Adam LeFevre in 1868 and 1875 they moved to Sterling, Ill. Mr. LeFevre was a cabinet maker and in 1882 his work took him to Milwaukee, Wis. He died there in 1924. Mrs. LeFevre lived there most of the time until 1944 when she came here to make her permanent home. Of the six children, Addie Van Nostrand of Libertyville, Ill., are the only ones living. There are 11 grandchildren, 20 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

Sept. 9 Last Date For Payment Taxes

Attention of taxpayers on Buchanan property is called to the fact that, in accordance with the new city charter, the final date for payment of the taxes without penalty is Sept. 9, after which a penalty of 1% will be tacked on Sept. 10.

After the expiration of the first month from that date penalties of 1/2% monthly will be added until the taxes are paid. The payments up to Monday, Aug. 29, totalled \$72,997.21, or over 77% of the total tax roll of \$93,737.80.

Legion Will Help Veterans In Getting Life Ins. Dividends

The American Legion will assist all local veterans in applying for their National Service Life Insurance Dividends.

This was announced today by Miss Hazel Weed, commander of the Ralph Rumbaugh Post No. 51, of the American Legion of Buchanan.

"Our post will have the necessary applications which veterans will have to make to the VA to get their NSLI dividends," Commander Weed said. "Every veteran who held his NSLI policy for 90 days or more will have a refund coming to him. The VA expects to pay out approximately \$2,800,000,000 in these refunds. Payments per veteran are expected to average about \$175 according to the VA. Applications should be filed as quickly as possible because it will take weeks and months for a veteran to get his refund check."

Actually, Commander Weed explained, the American Legion will put on the biggest manhunt in history in trying to locate veterans who are eligible for the NSLI refunds.

"The VA estimates that some 16,000,000 veterans are entitled to NSLI refunds," Commander Weed said. "Actually, today the VA has the home address of only six million of eligible veterans. The American Legion will help it to locate 10 million others."

Dr. C. O. Shaffer Leaves To Pursue 2-Yr. Scholarship

Dr. C. O. Shaffer, until recently engaged in the practice of osteopathy here, is now taking a two-year course at Los Angeles College for Physicians and Surgeons, in the Department of Urology. He received a scholarship for special study there covering a two-year period. Only two of these scholarships are awarded annually.

He had practiced osteopathy here for a year and a half.

Week-End Rain Brings Needed Relief To Crops

Shelling—Marketing Of 100,000 Bushels Of '48 Corn Starts Soon

Rainfall over this district over the week-end was doubtless exactly what the doctor ordered but not all that he ordered for the corn, hay, pasture, and late potato crops.

A precipitation of 40 inches of moisture was recorded at the local Indiana & Michigan hydro-electric plant, bringing the total for the month up to 1.92 inches as compared with a normal of 2.37 inches for August.

The corn crop which is now rapidly approaching maturity got a large lift, and much of it is now beyond hurt from dry weather. The bulk of the acreage needs another two weeks of frostless weather, but will be out of the way of danger by Sept. 15.

It is estimated that in addition to the new crop coming on, there is now 100,000 bushels of 1948 corn stored on Berrien county farms which will be bought by the government this fall for the support price of \$1.45 per bushel for No. 2 grade, which will cover the bulk of local offerings.

This corn was held over on the government loan and purchased agreement, and is stored on the local farms, on barn floors, and in permanent or temporary granaries and bins. The farmers are now very anxious to get rid of it before the new crop is harvested.

The Buchanan Co-op has now a portable corn sheller, with a capacity for shelling 1,000 bushels per hour at the farm, under average conditions. This is the only portable outfit in this county or this district, and was bought to simplify the problem of moving this 100,000 bushels of old corn. There has been a rush of orders from farmers, who would otherwise have had to haul their corn to town, and haul the cobs back. The Co-ops is now waiting for government shipping orders, indicating the receiving terminal to which the corn will be shipped. It is believed, states Robert Koenigsfot, Colop manager, that the government will restore the corn in terminal elevators. The farmer will pay for the charges of shelling and hauling to the shipping point.

The rain also made it possible for the farmers to sow their late summer alfalfa seeding, and also helped the seedings of last spring. Considerable alfalfa seed is now being planted. Seed is apparently plentiful but high priced. Clover seed, on the other hand is almost a minus quantity.

She has four children, Clem of Galien, Samuel of Buchanan, Mrs. Edward Stevens of Niles, and Mrs. Clarence Ender of Galien, also ten grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

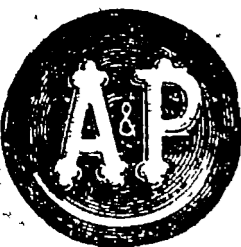

2 Buddies Boat 'Round Lake Mich. In 12-Ft. Craft

Walter Keller, 206 W. 4th street, and Lemuel Baker, 405 River street, two buddies on the Machine Finish Line in the new housing building, are among the relatively few people who really make use of their vacations to do the things they dream about. For the past three years the two men have been messing around with boats. Keller now has a 12-foot plywood boat, weight about 125 pounds, with a 16 hp. Johnson outboard installed, with which he had been cruising up and down the St. Joe and occasionally taking the 60-mile run across from St. Joe or Bridgman to South Chicago and back.

They had their vacations at the same time, starting Aug. 14, and they figured they'd get their sea legs and would really take off so that Sunday morning they hauled the boat down to New Buffalo, and loaded it with an extra 10 hp. Johnson outboard, a small tent, blankets, extra clothing, some flares for emergencies, two life jackets (which they wore most of the time throughout the trip), a GI Coleman 1-burner gasoline stove, and of course, a compass, binoculars, a periscope (such as was used in the world war to look out of a trench, etc.) Altogether, Keller estimated that they carried a 700-pound cargo, including their own weights. The extra Johnson outboard was an experimental assem-

bly loaned to them by Nell Patterson of the Berrien County Boat Appliances of Berrien Springs, to try out.

The first morning, from 9:50 a. m. to a little after noon, they made the run from New Buffalo to Indiana Harbor, Ind. On this first leg of the trip they were bothered by high winds. At Indiana Harbor, they were washed onto the breakwater and laid over until Tuesday waiting for calmer water.

Tuesday the weather fared off and the water got quiet so they took off again and made it to a point north of Milwaukee in a morning run. From there on they found that the mornings were usually quiet, the winds turning up and roughing the water shortly after noon. On days when they had a fan morning they could make a 200-mile run on quiet water they would tune up the Johnson outboard to 35 miles an hour but when the water got rough they were lucky to make 8 to 10 miles an hour.

They learned to hunt the smooth water. Sometimes the best water was close in, sometimes they went four to five miles out for it. Sand reefs played the deuce when the wind was up, making whitecaps parallel to the shore. They couldn't run parallel with them, for the whitecaps would break over into the boat, or the waves might roll them over. They had to either head in or out and run through them at right angles. They slept on the ground out doors every night, either in their tent, or, if the wind was too high they would turn the boat bottom-

side up, hang the canvass over it and sleep under it. Keller took two wool shirts, a sweater and other heavy stuff, and at times he wore them all. Twice they were driven on shore between towns and had to walk four or five miles for groceries. When the rough water drove them in they would beach and dry their boat and fish until they could clear again.

Up past Sheboygan, Manitowoc, Kewaunee and the other famous old lake ports, they putt-putted, sometimes running in the channels and getting groceries or gas at the Marine stations. It became more beautiful all the time, as they went north along the string of islands between the Door Peninsula and Point Detour, and on along the top of the lake.

The weather was not too bad along the west side of the lake, but when they started along the north end heavy northwest winds began to bother them. They wore their life jackets all the time, once or twice they were ready to bail out. Keller didn't notice seasickness but a couple of times, when they couldn't make headway and were practically standing still, tossed by big waves.

When at last they reached Pt. Patterson, perhaps from 30 to 40 miles west of the Straits, they decided to shorten the trip by crosscutting to Beaver Island, over about 15 miles of open water. The northwest winds were heavy, and when they reached St. James on the north tip of the island they laid over and took the ferry to Charlevoix. From there they took to water again

and skirted about 200 miles down the coast to Pentwater. But they were being delayed so much by rough water that Keller telephoned from Pentwater for some one to come after his boat. It was getting close to the week-end and they had to be back on the line at the Clark Equipment company Monday morning.

Altogether they boated considerably over half of the 1,000 mile trip around the lake, using up 58 gallons of gas and 13 quarts of oil.

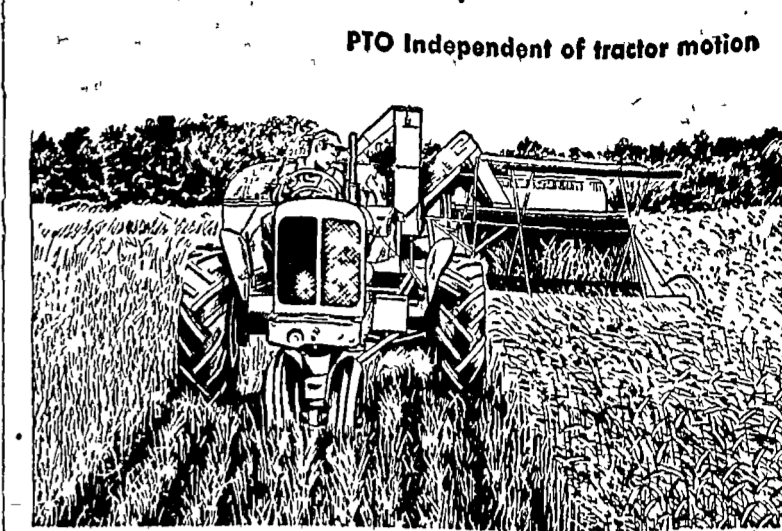

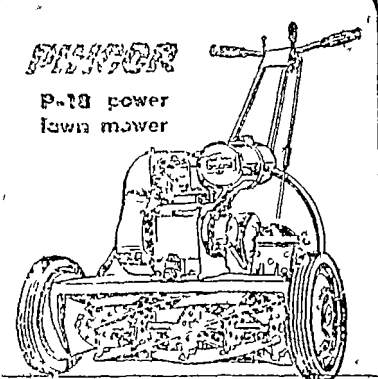

No call-backs will be made to collect rubbish set out after the trucks have passed.
Any business or industrial establishment which by the nature of its operations creates an unusual amount of waste material shall arrange for the removal and disposition of same. The City will not remove construction refuse, dead animals from veterinary hospitals, manure, or industrial wastes.
1. When any animal weighing over fifty (50) pounds shall die within the City the owner or person in possession of the premises where such animal is found shall, within twelve hours thereafter, cause the carcass to be removed and properly disposed of. Dead animals weighing less than fifty (50) pounds will be picked up and disposed of by the Department of Public Works, but in no event shall a person having such dead animal allow it to remain undisposed of for a period longer than twelve hours.

Electro-Voice Now Leads Field In Mike-Making

Local Plant Produces 70 Models For Varied Field

(The following article is the result of a visit made at the Electro-Voice Inc. plant last Thursday evening in company with the Buchanan Lions Club, which were guests of the plant at a conducted tour that evening.)
That even the best of human memories does not retain anything after the lapse of three years except the most fundamental and impressive facts of life is a truth that the comic stripsters and the journalistic jokers take advantage of by dusting the old ones off when they can't think of anything new.

It was September, 1946, when Electro-Voice blew into town, and this paper attempted comprehensive mention. So it may be time to say at least some of it again, with such additions as the years will warrant.
From that point of local pride it is certainly worth while for a Buchananite to know that Electro-Voice is a Big Name among the manufacturers of acoustic projects (which for the purposes of this article means, not "hearing aids" but microphones and phonograph pick-ups).

The Electro-Voice "broadcasting mike" is the standard microphone used by two of America's leading radio networks, the Columbia Broadcasting system and the American Broadcasting company. Station WBBM of Chicago recently bought 30 Electro-Voice microphones. Their mikes have their foot in the door of television and all New York programs, coming through Channel 7, come through Electro-Voice microphones. On the receiving end Zenith and Motorola radios are using the E-V phonographic cartridges. It sells for \$150, the highest-priced Electro-Voice microphone. At the opposite pole of price range is the "Century" model, selling for \$10. This little mike is the leading seller in the home recording field, in connection with wire tape, and disc recordings, representing about 90% of the total production of all makes.

And in the intervening area are some 68 other microphone models with nearly as many uses. There are the un-directional mikes that may be spoken into from only one side with satisfactory results. Then there's the bi-directional mike, which responds to sound from two opposite sides, or from both front and back, and so is practical for "broadcasting" use where two big minds are sitting opposite each other and taking a subject apart. Lastly there's the non-directional mike, which responds to sound from any side, making it useful in one of these battle royals of wit and wisdom known as a "round table".

That's one mike classification. There are others, but if you're curious about them you may go to the Electro-Voice tycoons themselves and get the dope pure and unadulterated.

People are funny about sound, says Tom Mitchell, Electro-Voice plant manager. They want to hear sound, not see it, and they don't like to hear it. The Electro-Voice microphones can be adjusted to give it to them either way. The broadcasting studios are meticulous about getting perfect renditions of sound. They know that the radios that will pick them products up and retail it to the ultimate consumer have gadgets with which they can doctor it to suit them. It's the preference of the average human to hear the human voice a bit on the bass side. That's why even the female torch singer sing low and throaty. And if they want help, they can get it from Electro-Voice, which can assemble a mike that will "respond more to the lower frequencies" producing that menacing jungle growl that the night clubbers crave.

When Electro-Voice came to Buchanan in the fall of 1946 the plant occupied only a little over half of the two buildings they took over from Dry-Zero. Now, with the exception of some storage space at the extreme south end of the plant, the entire 32,000 square feet of floor space is in use for production.

Further, the company has followed the postwar industrial policy of consolidating all basic processes on one product in one plant. Now, practically every production step from the material to the finished product stage is done under one roof. Last of the processes to be incorporated in the local plant is electro-plating installed since January, 1949, in the southwest room of the plant.
Top mike production at the local plant to date was about 1,000 per day, at a time when the phonograph pick-up business was heaviest. Because of inroads of television and the effect of the recession on a luxury market this business has fallen off in the past year. However, because of small additions of business in many fields, the dollar gross of the company's business is only from 2 to 3 per cent under that of last year.

Only Electro-Voice microphones are used in U. S. government control towers wherever American airlines touch all over the world.
