

City Commission Faces Full Agenda for Tuesday

Liquor by the glass, rezoning and setting of public hearings will highlight the regular meeting of the City Commission. The meeting will be held Tuesday night at city hall, due to Monday being a legal holiday.

William Poorman's request for a liquor by the glass license will be up for further consideration. Poorman made his request at the Jan. 22 meeting, but the matter was tabled until Tuesday to allow the city attorney to study the alcoholic beverages ordinance as it relates to resort licenses. Poorman is seeking a license to sell spirits by the glass, in addition to his present resort license to sell beer and wine.

Final action is slated on three measures. The commission is expected to adopt an ordinance to allow school buses to use their flashing lights when stopping to load children within the city limits. This measure is to be given immediate effect.

Final action also is expected on Paul Marazita's request for rezoning of his property on North Portage, from R-1 residential to C-2 commercial, to permit construction and operation of a drive-in restaurant. Also included in the rezoning is adjacent property owned by Oscar Anderson.

An amendment to the city's sign ordinance also is up for final action. The amendment affects placement of real estate signs, permitting them to be placed in front of the set-back line but not closer to the street than 5 feet inside the property line.

To Set Public Hearings
The commission will be asked to set two public hearings of necessity to allow formation of special assessment districts.

A public hearing of necessity is expected to be set to determine whether a storm sewer should be constructed in the South Oak street area. The primary areas to come under such a special assessment district would be both sides of Berrien south to Marble, both sides of South Portage from Alexander to Smith, plus miscellaneous properties in that area.

The second public hearing to be set is one to determine necessity of constructing curb and gutter along South Portage from Alexander to the railroad, Berrien south to Marble, Alexander from Days to Berrien, Smith from Portage midway in the block between Sylvan and Berrien, and on Marble from Berrien to South Portage.

Other items on the agenda include:
—Cancelling of a public hearing on a rezoning request by Leo McCarty.

—Consideration of a traffic control order to install signs to prohibit parking within 20 feet of the intersections of Dewey and Oak, and Oak and Third streets.

—Consider a traffic order to establish a loading zone in front of F. S. Carbon on Days avenue. The proposal is to move the two parking spaces in front of the Record office south closer to the alley to allow enlarging of the parking space in front of Carbon's so it can be used as a parallel loading zone.

—Appoint members to the Board of Review to meet March 5-7.

In talking with Supervisor Frank Poorman, chairman of the county health board, I learned that the feasibility of flying ambulance service has been under study for about three months.

Poorman said no decisions had been reached but that at this time it appeared that a flying ambulance service would have to involve a larger area than Berrien county. Cost of helicopters was cited as the biggest factor, and he noted, speed of the flying ambulances would make it possible for them to service a larger area.

Poorman added that he feels flying ambulances are a thing of the future because of their speed and the increased volume of traffic on our highways, plus the availability of Vietnam veterans who could pilot the crafts.

Buchanan Adult Education Program Taking Shape

Encouraging response was reported by Dwight Rhodes, director of adult education, following publication of an article in last week's Record. A second session of adult education classes is being planned to start the week of Feb. 19, and Rhodes had asked for suggestions of possible offerings.

Two classes, beginning sewing and developmental reading, will be definite offerings, as will another 10 weeks of women's physical education.

Rhodes said interest also had been expressed in typing I and

business bookkeeping, but there is not yet enough interest to organize a class in either of these.

The beginning sewing class will start Tuesday, Feb. 20, and will be taught by Miss Gladys Harris. The course will include sewing machine use and care, pattern selection and fitting, and fabric selection and preparation.

Miss Harris said main project of the class will be to construct a simple dress thru the steps of layout, cutting, marking, staystitching, fitting, facing, interfacing, finishing, lapel, zipper, hems, and pressing techniques.

The developmental reading course is intended to help persons to read for efficiency, understanding and enrichment. Class members will meet as a group, but each will work individually at his own level and speed.

A leading analysis of the individual will indicate what areas need attention. Then with the aid of reading power kits, vocabulary and word recognition exercises and other aids, the leader is led to achieve higher levels.

Miss Jean Brown, developmental reading teacher, will conduct the course.

I&M Seeks Vote on Franchise in Township

A franchise agreement between the Indiana & Michigan Electric company and the Township of Buchanan was considered by the township board at its regular meeting Monday night.

Indiana & Michigan Electric is seeking to renew a 30 year agreement with the township that was originally signed Dec. 19, 1938. The franchise gives the utility the right to acquire,

construct and maintain transmission lines in streets, alleys and other public places within the township.

Public to Vote
Andrew Mollison of Niles, attorney for I&M, explained the need for the franchise, and procedure to the township board. "The franchise agreement is needed to obtain a better financial rating", Mollison stated.

"I&M will bear all the costs of a special election so that the voters of the township will determine the outcome", said Mollison.

The township board tabled the proposal and it is anticipated that the board will act favorably on recommendation of the franchise at the March 4 meeting.

Buchanan township is the first of 12 townships in Berrien county in which I&M will seek new franchises in 1968.

Also representing I&M, before the board, was Rex Porter, manager of the Buchanan area. Supervisor Ivan Price announced that he had requested the Berrien County Road Commission to seek new bids for Miller road construction. Price stated, "In view of the condition of some of our county roads, I doubt that the road commission will be able to attempt any new construction this year if they are able to complete road construction, already requested in 1967, they will be lucky."

It was also announced that meeting dates for the Board of Review have been set for March 11 and 12.

Seek Director Of Recreation

Hiring of a new recreation director and possible expansion of the summer recreation program were discussed during the monthly meeting of the Park and Recreation Board Thursday night.

The board is seeking a replacement for Doug Borgert, who has served as recreation director for the past two years. Borgert has said he does not want to continue after his present contract expires.

As a means of obtaining a qualified person and making better use of funds expended for recreation purposes, the board discussed expanding the summer program and paying the full \$1,200 to a summer director. Under the present program the board pays \$1,200 per year for a recreation director for the summer program plus one night a week winter program of men's recreation.

With a fulltime summer director, board members expressed the feeling that the program could be expanded thruout the vacation season and the additional pay might be attractive to some college student interested in this field.

If such a program is adopted, members expressed the desire to continue the winter program. Also discussed were public toilet facilities at Smith park and Memorial field. City Manager Dayl Tammen was instructed to investigate types of facilities available.

Park Crews Plant 17 Trees

Some 17 trees were planted and 28 were removed during the last six months of 1967, reported Frank Hickok, superintendent of cemetery and parks department, in his six-months report to the City Commission. Hickok also reported that the city had 230 trees on hand to use in planting. Removal and replacement of trees required 657 man hours.

Interments and maintenance of the cemetery required a major portion of the department's efforts. The 47 interments required 940 man hours and maintenance required 3,151 man hours.

Park maintenance required 772 man hours, including 66 hours on ice skating rinks, Memorial field and Kathryn park came in for the most maintenance.

Another 357 man hours were spent on miscellaneous maintenance, with a total of 5,877 man hours worked for the six months.

Brandywine Favored In League Mat Tournery

Buchanan will host the annual Blossomland conference wrestling tournament Saturday and for the first time in six years the Bucks are not favored to win Buchanan has reigned over the league for the past five years, but this year Brandywine comes into the tourney as the favorite.

Until this year Buchanan had not lost to a conference opponent, but Brandywine has twice defeated the Bucks by the convincing scores of 39-16 and 36-8. The Bobcats have always been the Bucks' strongest league opponent, but this year they have the best team in history. Brandywine boasts a 12-1 season record and has twice defeated Dowagiac, winner of the Coldwater Invitational tourney in which Brandywine placed third.

The Bucks are 6-5 in dual competition. They lost to Dowagiac in their first meeting and are scheduled to host the Chieftains tonight (Thursday).

Three Champions
Coach Doug Borgert will send three individual champions into the tourney in Ron Marbeiter, Ozzie Brown and David Handley. Marbeiter was 95-lb champion, Brown was 138-lb champ, and Handley was 127-lb champion.

This year Marbeiter is competing at 112 pounds and has compiled a 7-1 record in conference and is 9-4 for the season.

Brown is appearing in action this week for the first time this season, after being ineligible the first semester. He was pinned by Al Poczlik of Brandywine Monday night. Brown is competing at 133 pounds.

Handley is a two-time conference champion. This year he boasts a 7-0 mark in the conference and 14-2 for the season. He is a strong favorite to win



Know YOUR MICHIGAN LAW

A charitable trust is a large amount of money set aside for the benefit of the general public and public purposes.

It can be created by will or some other legal device, which in effect establishes a fund. The income and sometimes a portion of the principal of the fund is dedicated for the relief of the aged and poor people; needy, crippled or handicapped children; scholarships; medical and scientific research; schools, libraries; religious purposes, to erect hospitals and homes for the aged, and as it has been stated for any purpose "beneficial to mankind and the community."

The problem is that for the most part, the individuals of the general public for whose benefit the charitable trust was established and who would qualify for such benefits, seldom know of its existence or the identity of the persons to contact in order to secure consideration for possible benefits.

Since Sept. 8, 1961, when the supervision of trusts for Charitable Purposes Act of the State of Michigan became effective, 2,830 charitable trusts have been registered with the office of the Attorney General, having a combined asset total of upwards of five billion dollars.

The Attorney General is vested by the Act with broad investigative and enforcement power, and is authorized to take any appropriate court action that may be required to make certain that the interests of the public are protected.

Through investigations and litigation, inactive trusts are revived and set in motion, questionable investments are resolved, excessive fees and expenses curtailed, all of which results in an ever-increasing flow of benefits to the general public and worthy projects in the State.

This serves not only to aid individuals and groups of the general public but also to add fresh money to the economy of the state, thus further benefiting its citizens and relieving the burden upon the tax dollar.

Tantalizing Aroma Signals Amish Cookie Time Again

The tantalizing aroma of warm spicy cookies fresh from the oven was an indication of the work in progress, Tuesday morning in the kitchen of First Methodist church. Ten members of Friendship circle had joined forces to bake Amish cookies for "fun and profit."

This is the third year that members of the circle have baked these cookies to sell. Last year they had more requests than they could fill.

Members involved in the mixing, rolling, cutting, glazing, and baking were Mrs. Virgil Miller, Mrs. Tom Hassen, Mrs. Lyman Clark, Mrs. Larry Jesswein, Mrs. Dean Swem, Mrs. Milton Vigansky, Mrs. Robert Voss, Mrs. Carl Ward, Mrs. Robert Carson, and Mrs. Herman Jacques.

To bake 100 dozen cookies they used 18 lbs flour, 15 lbs sugar, 7 1/2 lbs lard, 6 lbs rolled oats, 6 lbs raisins, 3 lbs jumbo peanuts, 1 1/2 cups baking soda, 1 1/2 cups nutmeg and salt, 3/4 cup cinnamon, 3 quarts of buttermilk, 3 bottles of molasses, and almost 4 dozen eggs. The recipe the women used belongs to Mrs. Miller, and she agreed to share it with Record readers.

She warns those who wish to try it to get some assistance in the baking, as well as the eating, since this recipe makes 25 to 30 dozen cookies depending on the size.

Amish Cookies—
6 lbs. regular flour
5 lbs. sugar
2 1/2 lbs lard (shortening just is not the same)
8 Tablespoons baking soda
8 Tablespoons baking powder
2 Tablespoons nutmeg
4 Tablespoons cinnamon
2 Tablespoons salt

2 lbs. old fashioned rolled oats (not the quick type)
2 lbs raisins
1 lb. jumbo peanuts

1 small bottle of Bee Rabbit dark molasses
1 dozen eggs
1 quart buttermilk

In large bowl combine flour, sugar, and spices. Cut in lard until mixture looks like coarse meal.

Grind together raisins and peanuts and then add oats. Beat eggs, add buttermilk and molasses.

Combine raisin and milk mixtures. Then add to dry ingredients and mix until dry ingredients are thoroughly moistened.

Roll out dough to about 1/4 inch thickness and cut in large rounds (Mrs. Miller said she likes to use a canning jar lid as her cookie cutter).

Place cookies on ungreased cookie sheets (allowing for spread) and glaze cookies with mixture of 3 eggs beaten with 3 tablespoons water, about 1/4 teaspoon of glaze per cookie. Bake at 375 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes.

"This recipe is supposed to make cookies that will keep up to six months," remarked Mrs. Miller, "but I've never been able to keep them that long because my family likes them so well."

The recipe is reported to have come from around the Topeka and Middlebury, Ind. area and has been a favorite of the Miller family for many years.

The 10 women finished the day-tired but happy in the knowledge that they had "whipped up" a nice sum for the circle's treasury.



Bucks Roll Over Eddies For 10th Straight Win

Coach Ray Berry's Bucks were in firm command Friday night as they rolled to their 10th consecutive victory. The Bucks beat Edwardsburg 65-48 to keep their undefeated record unblemished.

The victory gave Buchanan a perfect 10-0 season mark and an 8-0 Blossomland conference record as the Bucks remain in first place. Going into Friday night's game Buchanan was rated the No. 6 Class B team in the state by the Associated Press and the No. 12th by United Press International.

Defense was the name of the game as the Bucks controlled both boards, often getting two and three shots on offense.

The two squads played a scoreless first 2 minutes before Glenn Emenaker broke the ice for Edwardsburg with a two-pointer from under the basket. Kurt Waters followed with a free throw to give the Eddies a 3-0 lead.

The Bucks came back with seven straight points to take the lead which they never relinquished. Bill Rauch hit from under the bucket, Chet Hankerson drove in for a layup and a free throw and Hankerson sank a long jump shot to put the Bucks in front 7-3. Three buckets by Pat Sexton and another two pointer by Hankerson made it 15-8 at the end of the period.

The second quarter was a repeat of the first, except the Eddies went scoreless for the first half while Buchanan scored three points to take an 18-8 lead. By halftime Berry's boys had opened a 13-point gap, 28-15.

Things begin to pick up in the third period with the Eddies

almost matching the Bucks in scoring. Third and fourth personal fouls also begin to rear their heads.

Going into the final 8 minutes Buchanan was riding a 43-28 lead, aided by a last second shot by Paul Falkenstein that swished the net as the final buzzer sounded.

It looked as though Edwardsburg might close the gap in the final period as the Eddies sank two quick buckets, but the Bucks came back with a pair of free throws by Rauch and a two-pointer by Hayward Miller to widen the gap again.

Paul Catto hit for the Eddies and Hankerson countered with a two-pointer and free throw. As the Bucks continued to draw away, Bruce Leiter, Sexton, Francis Brown, Miller, Ron Dockery and Willie Francis all got into the scoring act.

The Bucks hit a solid 42 per cent from the floor, sinking 25 of 59 shots, and 52 per cent from the free throw line, sinking 15 of 29 shots. The Eddies hit on only 17 of 67 shots for 25 per cent from the floor, and on 14 of 24 free throws for 58 per cent.

Hankerson paced the Bucks with 21 points, followed by Sexton with 12 and Rauch with 10. Catto was high for the Eddies with 13 points.

For the night the Bucks committed 10 ball control errors. Jayvees Win Easily.

Coach Don Rennhack's junior varsity took an easy 76-48 decision over Edwardsburg reserve unit. The victory gave the jayvees a 7-3 season mark. The game was really decided in the first period as Buchanan scored 19 points to 3 for Ed-

Proponents of Berrien county's ambulance service plan can do without another vote like the one which pushed extension of the program through the Board of Supervisors in January.

Had just four more supervisors joined the opposition, the program would have been at least delayed if not shelved permanently. As it was, the plan squeaked through on the key vote 20 to 13. The actual approval of a contract with two firms carried 28 to 6 in a decision which followed the first vote immediately.

Involved in the crucial vote was a drive to refer the proposed contract back to the Board's special committee on ambulance service.

Edward Grieger, New Buffalo supervisor, lauded the effort because he feels each area is able to provide its own service and because the New Buffalo City Council instructed him to do so. Under the New Buffalo charter, supervisors are required to carry out directives of the council.

"To my understanding," Grieger commented, "The referendum means the proposal would die in committee. But the county should get out of the business altogether."

Support for the referral came from New Buffalo. Twp super-

visor Raymond Valvoda, Coloma Supervisor Gust Anton, Bridgman supervisor August Plehl and Niles supervisor A. Sheridan Cook as well as others.

The quality of service, the fairness to other firms in the county, and the need for action were all attacked by the forces promoting the death referral. At one point, Cook rapped the wording in the proposed extension contract which left the service tied to the firms' ability to field an ambulance.

Joining the five in voting were supervisors James Boothby, St. Joseph, Ralph Chase, Galien, Alfred Hellenga, Three Oaks twp, Edward Huda, New Buffalo city, Frank Poorman, Buchanan city, Ben Rosenberg, Sodus twp, Larry Smith, Bainbridge twp, and Marvin K. Taylor, Coloma.

St. Joseph Twp Supervisor Orval Benson, chairman of the special committee, doubted that the key vote would have been as close if more of the supervisors had been present. At least nine had been unable to stay until the voting around 4 p.m. Four others had been absent from the entire session.

Two of the supervisors who were present abstained from the key balloting. They were Benton Harbor Supervisor Walter Miller and St. Joseph Supervisor W. Hudson Mitchell.

Legislature Faces Vital Issues in Months Ahead

This year and last have seen the Michigan Legislature called upon to consider a number of vital issues unmatched in state history. Lower court reorganization has top priority because the Constitution abolishes the Justice of the Peace courts by the end of the year. If another suitable system of courts is not approved, existing courts, already belabored by over-crowded dockets, will have to pick up the cases left by the Justices of the Peace.

Of prime importance this year will be the consideration

Benson pushed for adoption of the measure because not all of the individual areas in the county were being serviced and because the obligation had been thrust on the county by the private undertakers. One footnote to the fracas is that the Berrien Ambulance firm did go out of business despite the owners' assertions that they would stay with or without the county pact.

of crime controls and housing legislation, on parallel paths for the betterment and protection of all Michigan citizens.

Members hail the call for a budget that allows for major increases in critical areas, but also cautions that we must live within the level proposed, and not spend beyond our means. It is my personal belief that as legislators all of us should make every effort to see that the taxpayer gets a dollar earned for a dollar spent.

Other important areas that will require attention and action in this 1968 session include an amendment to the Public Employment Act to provide better means of settling disputes between employers and employees, the increase of veterans' property tax exemptions, support to education, and assurance that our valuable natural resources are protected.

Bill Action

Bill introduction activity is moving at an even faster clip this year than in 1967. Through last week, a total of 168 bills had been officially submitted, 119 in the House and 49 in the Senate. At the same time last year, 78 House bills and 32 Senate bills had been introduced. Additional bills are being submitted each day, with the introduction deadline of Feb. 25 still three weeks away.

The final date for requesting bills to be drafted in the Legislative Service Bureau passed last week, and a total of more than 1,700 requests had been received. Total requests ran less than last year, because some 1,000 measures were carried over from 1967, eliminating the need for re-introduction. Therefore, a total of about 2,700 pieces of legislation will be available this year for consideration by committees and the full legislature.

Among the bills introduced last week were measures incorporating the Governor's 1968 budget of some \$1.3 billion. The Appropriations Committees of the House and Senate began immediate deliberation of the budget bills which will receive extensive study and possible alteration before being reported to the legislative chambers.

Republican sponsored bills introduced last week included

—Repeal of Michigan's Intangibles Tax. The sponsor of the measure (HB 3375) contended the levy constitutes "double taxation" since many retired persons receive their only income from dividends and land contract interest. This situation means that they not only pay the 2.6 percent state income tax, but also the 3.5 percent intangibles tax on the same income. This amounts to paying a 6.1 percent income tax, supporters of the bill say.

—Administrative costs of charitable organizations would be limited to 20 percent of total donations under provisions of HB 3358 introduced last week. The bill would prohibit licensing of charitable groups which spend more than the 20 percent maximum for administration. Passage of the legislation would give donors assurance that at least 80 percent of their contributions would be used for programs, rather than overhead.

—Consistency in school bus unloading regulations is promoted by another new House Bill (HB 3322). The measure would establish a statewide policy of requiring cars to stop when a school bus does within city limits. Present state law provides such stopping regulations only outside city boundaries. Municipalities are left the power to set up their own regulations inside their limits. Some cities have adopted a

stopping ordinance, others have not. This creates a great deal of confusion, say supporters of the bill, and poses a serious hazard to the safety of school children. The bill also provides regulations for safety features to be included on all busses.

The new bill on stopping for school busses carries forward the consistency principle which led to the passage of the legislature last year of a bill requiring school busses to stop at railroad crossings, whether loaded or unloaded. Prior law had required stopping at railroad tracks only when children were in the bus. Drivers following the bus could not always be sure if there were children on the bus, and therefore could not know whether the bus would stop.

To Toughen Penal Code

The continuing legislative concern over riots and other violent criminal activities was again expressed last week, as a 10-bill package designed to toughen Michigan's Penal Code was introduced.

The Penal Code amendments would stiffen laws dealing with advocacy of riots, failure to disperse and resisting an officer in time of riot, and molestation during a riot.

The bills would also deal more severely with assault, robbery attempts and other violent acts.

Michigan is by no means the only state working to provide greater protection of the public from rioters and criminals. A number of states, including Michigan, have recognized the gravity of the problem and are seizing the initiative.

Several states have been taking action recently to outlaw the possession of "Molotov Cocktails", as well as their use, to widen the powers of police officers to detain and search suspects, and provide severe penalties for interfering with policemen and firemen in their work. Proposals dealing with all of these areas, and many more, have been put before the Michigan Legislature this year. As stated earlier, I am co-sponsor of this measure.

Minimum Wage

Legislators are reminding the citizenry and business community that the new federal minimum wage regulations went into effect Feb. 1. The latest increase of 20 cents per hour raises the minimum for some 7.2 million employees to \$1.60. One year ago the rate jumped from \$1.25 to \$1.40 per hour.

An additional 9.1 million employees, covered last February for the first time, had their federal minimum wage increased from \$1 to \$1.15 last week. Most of the newly covered jobs are in the service trades.

Last week, along with 16 other House members, I voted against Senate Bill 32. This was a bill to establish a state commission on the status of women, consisting of 15 members to be appointed by the governor to such commission. The bill passed by a vote of 86 to 17. My reasons for voting against such a bill were because it proposed the establishment of a brand new state commission which will require annual expenditures of thousands of dollars, coming at a time when the state is finding it necessary to cut back on appropriations requested in the fields of education and other areas. To me it

seems as if we have long ago reached the point where we should look for ways of saving the taxpayer's money instead of looking for ways of spending additional thousands, worthy though the proposal for such a commission might be.
