## Future of Howe School Is Again in Doubt

In its fifth year is the pre-school program which has been conducted at the old Howe School on Buffalo Road. It has currently been serving about 32 children in the district who have been tested and found that they will have learning problems when they go to kindergarten. The program along with a home-school coordination program has been federally funded under Title I of the Aid to Education Act. Some \$31,000 is expected for use in the two programs.

The Howe school program ran about \$2,000 short of funds this year and had to close the school three weeks earlier.

The school administration claims that they intend to continue the program but are contemplating closing Howe School (and possibly selling the property). They say that approximately \$4,000 could be saved in transportation and another \$1,500 could be saved in maintaining the Howe School Building. They suggest that the pre-school program could be conducted at one of the elementary schools or at the high school.

The pre-schoolers have been picked up at their homes by bus and taken to Howe School. Parents of the children object to the new arrangement which

would mean that their small children would either have to walk to school or take one of the shuttle buses to the new location.

Mrs. Ruth Lamb, who directs the program at Howe, said that she fears it would be more difficult to sell parents on sending their children to a pre-school program if they knew that transportation would be more difficult. She said there is a great advantage in segregating the children in the relatively peaceful and cheerful surroundings of Howe. Gail Ketchum is president and Sue Baber is vice-president of the Howe Pre-School Advisory Council. They called a meeting of interested persons Friday to see if there was any way to get the school administration to reconsider their intended closing of the school.

William Fischer, principal at Starke School, met with the parents and explained the school's intention of trying to save money. Some of the parents felt that the priorities of needs at the school were often mixed up.

It was decided that representatives of the advisory council will attend the next school board meeting, at which time the whole tentative budget is expected to be discussed.

## City Decides to Shelve Repair of the Curbs

In observance of Student Government Day, various elected students sat with their counterparts at the city commission Monday. They'd take a vote first before the official vote, and in many cases, their opinions were similar. Lisa Swem was mayor, Commissioners were Tom Trull, Dave Habicht, Charles Trapp and Kyla Newsom. Al Anderson was city manager, and Rob Heiney was city clerk. City attorney was Jeff Bailey, and Robert Savoie was police chief. Dino Jackson was superintendent of public works, Scott Entenman, park superintendent, Steve Worland, superintendent of the wastewater plant, Jon Yazell, fire chief, and Dave Runkewich, building inspector.

The meeting was at Stark School for the hearing on the curbs and gutters in the Liberty Heights section. The city had a chance to get workers from the CETA program and had thought that this would be a good project to get completed with the labor provided. Many neighbors felt that this would do nothing to help a more serious problem of drainage, and others felt that their own curbs were in satisfactory condition. After considerable discussion, at the suggestion of Mayor Joseph Bachman, it was decided to abandon present plans to repair the curbs and to have the whole project engineered so that the job could be done properly at a later date. The students didn't go along with this decision, feeling that the CETA help should be utilized.

Mrs. Joe Donlen appeared to ask for help and suggestions to keep people from crossing through the Red Bud Arms property on their way to school or to the park. She said it was annoying to the older residents

when they come close to the windows. Dino Jackson suggested that it might be helpful if there was an access to the park next to the church. Gene Wesner suggested that there be a meeting among some of those students present and the park board and members of the church to see if something could be worked out.

Larry Robinson was selected by Buchanan Township for the new area recreation board, and the commission approved his appointment.

A resolution was passed to confirm actions taken by the commission in regard to tax assessment, and the students went on record to commend the commission for their stand.

The ordinance to repeal ordinances involving parking meters was adopted by both the commission and the students.

Considerable discussion came about when the matter of establishing May 26 as Memorial Day came up. Commissioners Garbert and Wesner favored the traditional date. At first there was a tie vote, but Garbert finally changed his vote reluctantly.

A request from the American Legion was approved for a banner to be placed across Front Street at the time of the American Legion state convention at Camp Madron June 20-22.

The city manager was authorized to reject bids received for street salt because they were too high. He's to shop around for a better price.

Don Holmes asked if there were any provision for a tornado warning. People seemed to recall that a continual blast of the fire siren used to be used. The city manager was asked to look into it.

## City Budget Is Up Slightly Over Last Year

The city commission must approve Buchanan's new budget by their second meeting in May. The tentative budget report shows an increase in just about every department.

In 1974, 15 mills raised \$565,248 in local taxes. Buchanan's state equalized valuation is estimated to increase from \$37,684,338 in 1974 to \$46,360,000 in 1975. Based on this figure, 14 mills would collect \$649,040 in local taxes. The city estimates that it will receive \$76,600 (a decrease of \$14,900) from state shared revenue and \$77,924 from federal revenue sharing. This plus other sources of revenue will bring the total of the general fund to \$880,224.

The city administration reports that it used 12 percent as a basis to increase allocations and maintenance items in proportion to the expected inflationary trend. They had budgeted \$881,670 in 1974-1975 and actually will have spent \$1,019,479.

The city's proposed budget is a disappointment, but hopefully it can still be cut. The school district has to make a tentative budget, but what they're talking about is also a big disappointment.

The city budgets \$1,446 less than they did a year ago, although they cut \$199,700 from public improvements. The city claims it is reflecting the expected inflationary trend and have to figure costs in most departments at 12 percent higher.

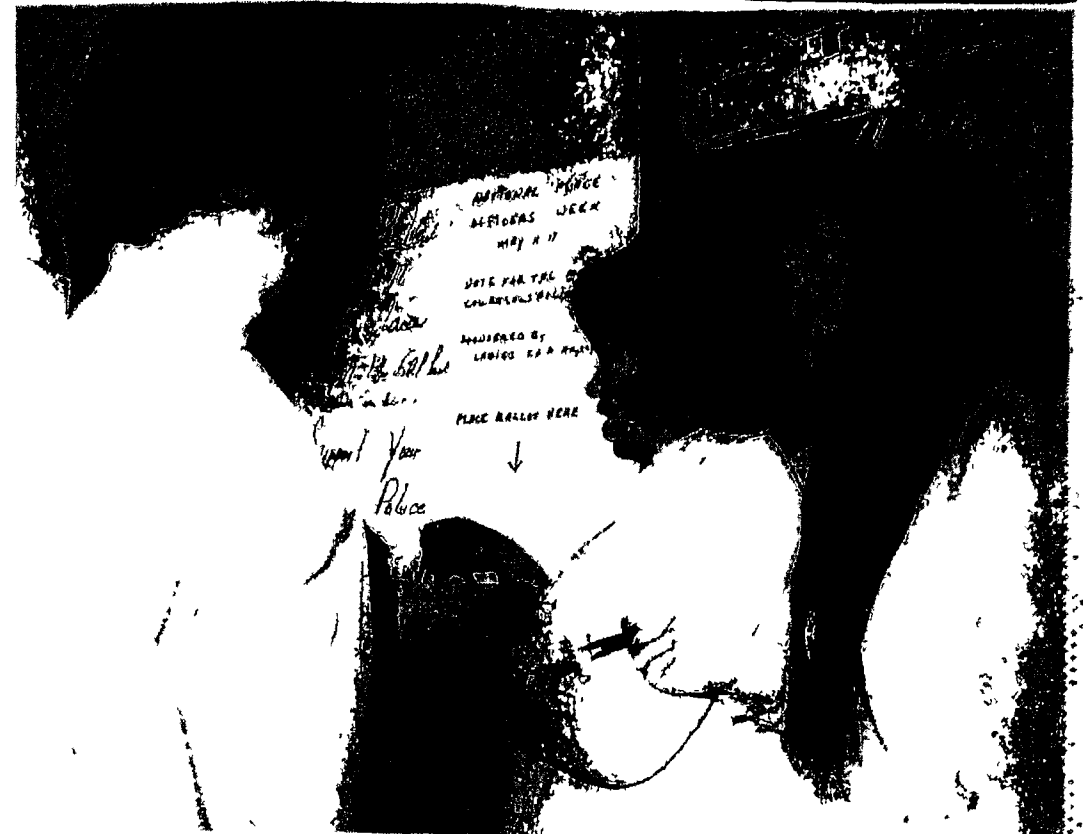
The city commission got a lot of publicity by instigating a "tax revolt." After their own appointed board of review upheld their own tax assessor, the commission publicly urged every other taxing body to lower millage. After all that thunder and with a tremendous raise in state equalized valuation, the best that apparently can be accomplished is a decrease of approximately a mill.

The school district told us last year that they needed an extra 1.4 mill which would be a one-time shot to get the middle school going. Now, with expected state equalized valuation still being considerably higher than the expected decrease in state aid, they are talking about getting back to the millage as it was before the "one-time shot".

Both the city and the school say it's because of increased salaries and increased fuel adjustments. Industries and businesses have had the same problem and have had to make drastic savings in those departments. That's why many people during this period of mass lay-offs, can't understand why so many are getting sizeable raises in pay.

It all boils down to the fact that, as the city commission is telling us, the whole system in the state of taxation on real and personal property is wrong.

We can all gripe about the fact that we're getting little or no tax relief, but little is being done about it. Our only chance is to keep harping to the state, county and local governments to spend our money as though it were theirs.

## School District To Shoot For 17 Mills Operational

The board of education set their millage requirements at 17 mills. They explained that the state equalized valuation would be up considerably and that 17 mills would raise \$1,545,737, an increase of \$360,878. But the administration said that state aid would decrease \$274,695 less than last year.

In a statement issued by the board it was pointed out that the schools have been "caught up in the spiraling cost increases" and cited heating costs as one big item.

A great deal of the increase in budget is salaries. The board stated that "the teachers are the most important resource for educational betterment for the children of the Buchanan community and it is desirable to keep this dedicated staff that we have and give them a salary which is commensurate to their work and which will keep them in a competitive position within the southwestern Michigan area."

Last year, the millage was raised 1.4 mills, and the total reduction this year is 1.36. Of this reduction, 61 mills could be cut from the debt retirement fund.

The community will be asked to vote on this millage at the June 9 election and to select two candidates out of four for the school board. Vern Lubben and Dr. Richard Beistle did not seek re-election. The candidates are Robert Luke, William DeVos, Cletha Wade and Mrs. Conrad Larson.

The school district figures their state equalized valuation at \$77,455,329 as compared with \$60,992,232 a year ago.

## City May Get

## More EPA Money

Out of the blue, the city of Buchanan received word from the Environmental Protection Agency that an additional grant for the city's wastewater treatment plant will be forthcoming. The expected amount is \$38,300. City manager Robert Faulhaber said, "As city manager, I'm delighted, but as a citizen, I don't understand it."

Apparently, in the government's recent efforts to pump money into the economy, additional grants are being added to existing ones rather than forming new grants for new sewage disposal plants.

Buchanan can use this money for construction, including work already being done on the Brookway extension area in providing drainage for it. According to the city treasurer's office, some \$1,103,947 had already been received from either state or federal sources for the wastewater treatment plant.

The letter from the E.P.A. was difficult for anyone to interpret, and the city officials interpreted it as meaning that this excess money will be forthcoming. But nobody is making any plans to spend it until the check arrives.

## ICB Changing Its Parking

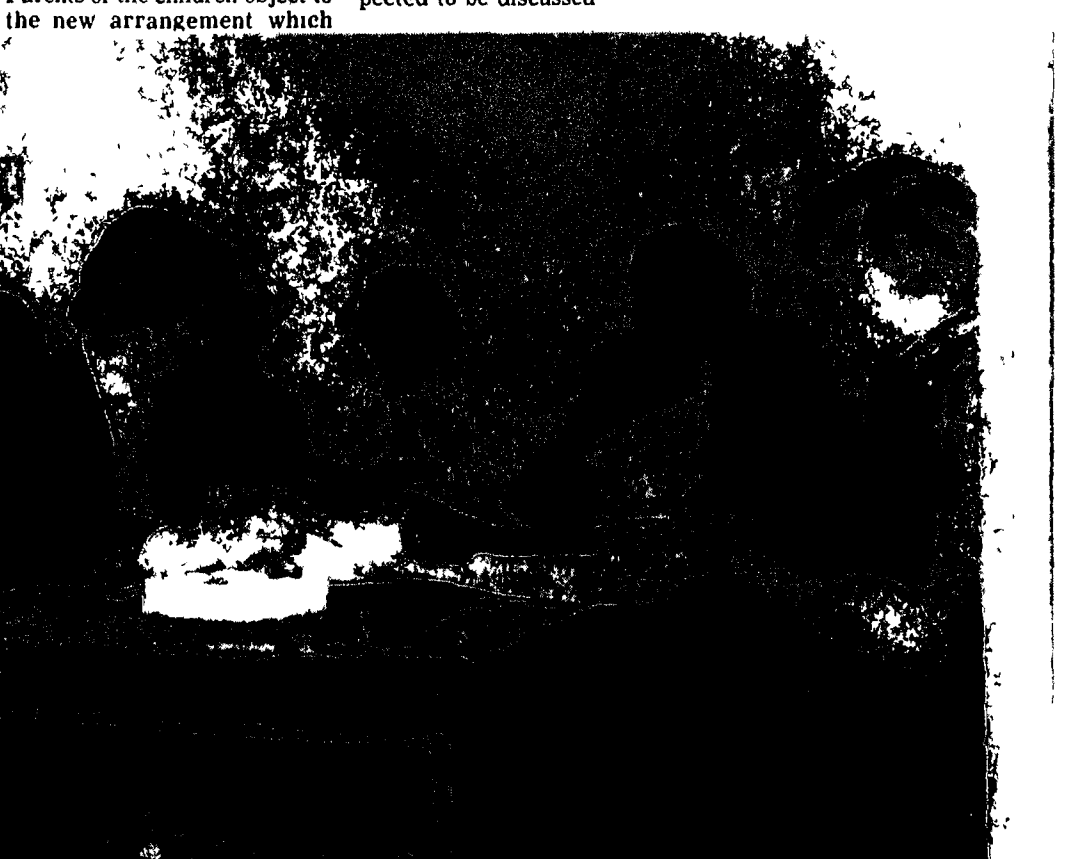
The Inter-City Bank in Buchanan has re-arranged their parking lot for the convenience of their customers and their employees. They are re-sealing it and will have new directional lines painted.

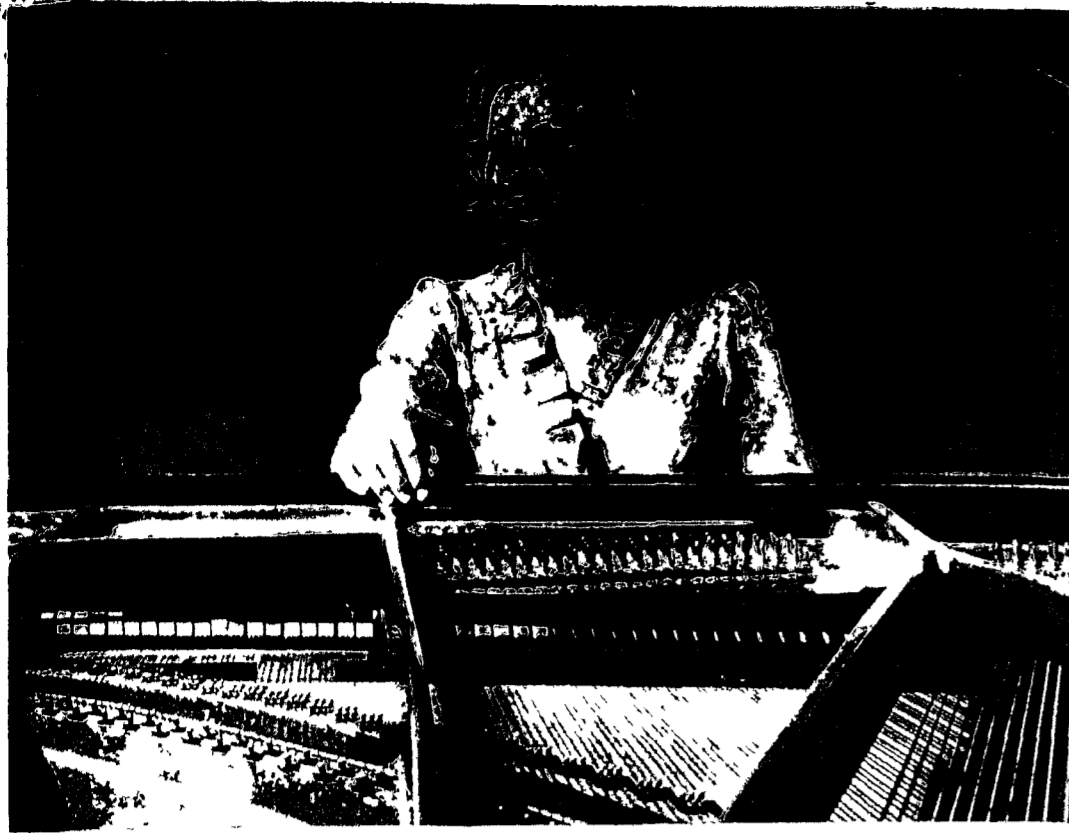
The bank is hopeful that, when everybody gets used to the new system, several bottle necks will be eliminated, and traffic and parking will be more convenient for everybody.

**A Minute  
With Mary**

**Hoarding: No-No**  
If consumers restrain their impulse to buy now and hoard, there should be no shortage of home canning supplies this year. Manufacturers of home canning lids, rings and jars assume there will be more available this year than last.

In an effort to prevent hoarding, most manufacturers are allocating supplies on a quarterly basis so there will be supplies on hand when pickling cucumbers and tomatoes are ready for harvest. One major manufacturer says his firm is allocating canning supplies to distributors on the basis of past customer sales but that doesn't mean there's a shortage.

Home canners you are advised to buy a few lids each time they're available and buy only what you know you'll need. Probably the best approach is to learn expected crop yields, plant only the amount you'll need to furnish fresh product to your family during the fresh season and/or freeze some for later use instead of canning it.

And don't forget 5 persons

If you've been thinking about canning and freezing fruits and vegetables but just don't know where to begin, you'll be pleased to know that the Cooperative Extension Service has the answer. Even a short visit to Fernwood this week will offer an enchanting and ethereal experience, as was the sensation of many who spent Mother's Day here and attended the delightful choral concert given by Walter Ginter and the Contempcos of Niles.

This Friday evening, May 16 at 8 p.m. Fernwood entertains a special guest speaker who is most familiar with whales of the world. Dr. David Morgan received his PhD in Zoology from the University of Rhode Island. His interest in the Beluga or White Whale has led him on many expeditions along the East Coast, Canada and the West Indies, recording whale sounds and their means of communicating. He is presently studying the communication system of fresh water fish as a Vertebrate and Aquatic Biologist at Notre Dame. His lecture entitled "Whales Present Status, Future Hopes", is free to members and children under 12 years with a nominal admission for non-members.

Silversmithing class with Katherine Willard continues Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 7 to 10. Students have learned the variety of shapes and designs that can be made. Beginners have discovered brass and copper as the most favorable metal to work with for "starting out" in making rings, bracelets, and other ornaments. ### City Registers

### Protest With State

The city of Buchanan, in a continuation of its "tax revolt" has notified the state tax commission that it doesn't intend to defend any tax assessments placed on the 1975 roll. Any company appealing their assessments before the state tribunal would automatically name Buchanan as defendant.

In a letter to the state tax commission, the city commissioners went on to state that they specifically don't intend to defend the assessments itemized in the petition for review filed by Clark Equipment. In the letter, the commissioners outlined their actions of delivering their tax roll to the County Board of Supervisors "in protest that the system under which the assessments were arrived at seriously place in jeopardy any local control over the tax burden of our taxpayers."

The commissioners stated that they had agreed on the credibility of the assessment figures which had been presented by Clark Equipment, and that the commissioners believed that the board of review didn't act judiciously, as advised, in considering the case of Clark's assessments.

The commissioners went on to state that they didn't condone the "arbitrary pressures exerted on the assessor, nor did it condone the actions of the board of review "where judgement is excluded by an insistence on a "by the book" narrow perspective to the justice and fairness of assessment procedures."

The commissioners summarized by stating "The city of Buchanan does not condone the erosion of local control over the tax destinies of local property owners. The system, as promulgated by the administrative rules of the state tax commission, the state assessor's board, and the county equalization department, results in constantly increasing taxation without an approved vote of the taxpayer."

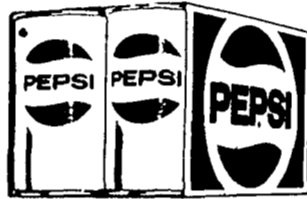

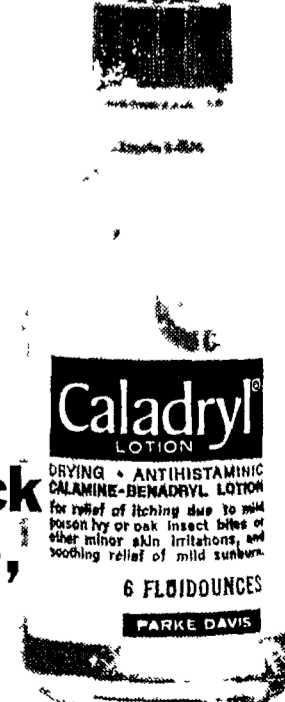

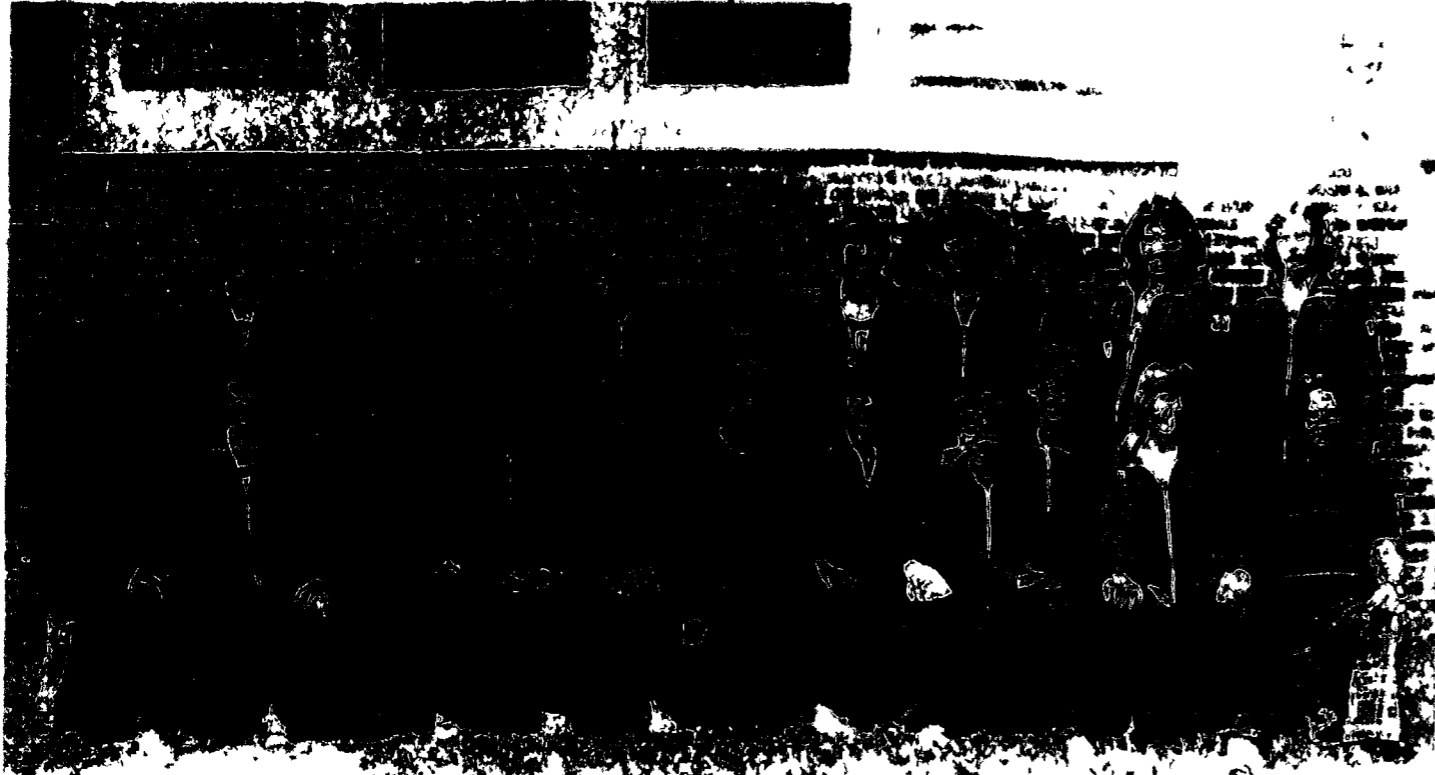


Dr. Maria McDermott

**Time to Control Water Weeds.** Lakefront property owners might well begin gearing up now if they want to try controlling aquatic plants this year, suggests the Department of Natural Resources.

Late spring, when plants are actively growing, is the most effective time to apply herbicides to the surface of the water, the department notes. And, it reminds, anyone who wants to do that must get a permit -- free of charge -- from the Bureau of Water Management Water Quality Appraisal Section.

The only exception to the permit law is a small pond, owned by one person, that has no discharge to other surface water of the state.

### To Improve Grounds Before 1975 Fair

The Board of Directors of the Berrien County Youth Fair has approved several improvement projects for the Fair Grounds at Berrien Springs to be completed before the 1975 Youth Fair opens Tuesday, August 12, to run through Saturday, August 16. The Open Horse Show will precede the Youth Fair on August 8 through 10 with some 1,000 horses expected for this event.

Two new commercial display buildings 60 x 200 ft. are under construction, being built by volunteer help and six fair employees. Buildings are pole type construction, shingle roof, and metal siding. The old commercial buildings are being converted to home economics and crafts youth exhibit buildings. With this change, nearly all exhibit buildings are being converted to other exhibits, except horticulture, swine, poultry, and beef.

Black-topping through the farm machinery area will connect the present blacktop with the new buildings. Six inch water mains will be installed to carry necessary water to the newly developed area and a new rest room proposed for the South area. A perimeter roadway will be put in for easy access to all areas of the grounds. A milking parlor is being completed in the dairy barn which will add to spectator attractions as well as the convenience of the dairy exhibitors.

Improvements are many, funds are limited, but through the generosity of many cooperative Berrien County residents and firms, volunteers are making these projects possible. It is estimated the listed improvements will run \$125,000.

### Church Youth Group Undertakes Project

The Youth Fellowship of the Buchanan Church of God, 1128 North Main Street has taken on a big project. Choosing the purchase of new hymnals as its project, the group plans to raise funds by garage sales, bake sales, car washes and the picking up of aluminum cans for sale to a recycling company. The last will be done in the township area and near the church.

The church board has approved such a project in the light of the real need of hymnals because of new church growth and worn hymnals. The church has already nearly doubled in the past six months and the youth are taking on many new responsibilities.

### From an interview with Dr. Francis:

## Grow A Mini-garden

Your lot may seem no bigger than a postage stamp, but that doesn't mean you can't grow your own fresh vegetables. You just have to work a little harder at seeing the possibilities.

Michigan State University extension horticulture specialists suggest that vegetables don't have to be grown in neat, long rows and wide open spaces. Try mixing them in among the annuals in your flower garden, growing them as borders and trims or planting them in containers on your porch or balcony.

Many vegetables, including cherry tomatoes, spinach, carrots and lettuce, are very attractive plants, the specialists point out. Tomatoes, in fact, were grown as ornamental plants years before anyone ever got up the nerve to eat one! For borders along a walk or flower bed, try leaf lettuce, romaine, Swiss chard, beets, carrots, radishes or even strawberries.

If you have room for a small garden plot, concentrate on vegetables that will give high returns for the space they use — such as lettuce, onions, beans and bush squash. Grow tomatoes in cages and train beans and vegetables like cucumbers and melons that take up a lot of space to grow on fences or stakes. Plant quick growing crops like radishes and green onions in odd spots around your home grounds — don't take up garden space with them.

You can also interplant slow-growing crops like broccoli or other cool-weather crops like kale and cauliflower between rows of early-maturing beans or every yard or so in rows of lettuce or beets. By the time the later-maturing crops need a little elbow room, their neighbors will have come and gone.

The cultural requirements of your mini-garden are the same as those of a big garden: fertile, well drained soil, water and sunlight. Provide these, plus protection against disease and insect pests, and you'll soon be putting fresh vegetables on the table.

According to the IRS, the first rebate checks are being mailed out May 10. The process will continue through the end of June. If you filed your tax return early, you should be among the first to receive your rebate check. About 78 million checks will have to be mailed out. ## REGULATION AND TRUCKING

Some people feel the regulated transportation system of the United States should not be regulated. They argue, the industry which approves of regulation, must be lining their pockets because of it. And for these reasons, they argue the Interstate Commerce Commission should be abolished.

We have regulation for one prime reason - to insure transportation service and standardized rates for communities located away from major shipping centers such as Detroit. Here, there is no cutthroat competition or biased rates. A shipper in Alpena can send his freight for the same rate as a shipper of similar freight in Detroit.

Shippers and merchants in places like Muskegon, Jackson, Petoskey and Midland can count on regular service and standard rates that do not change daily, or hourly because of ICC regulation.

The way we see it, without regulation, Michigan communities would have little to depend upon, except extremely poor service and a very unfair rate system.

A regulated transportation system is not the best of all possible worlds. But it is far better than no transportation system at all. Or worse, a government-run system.

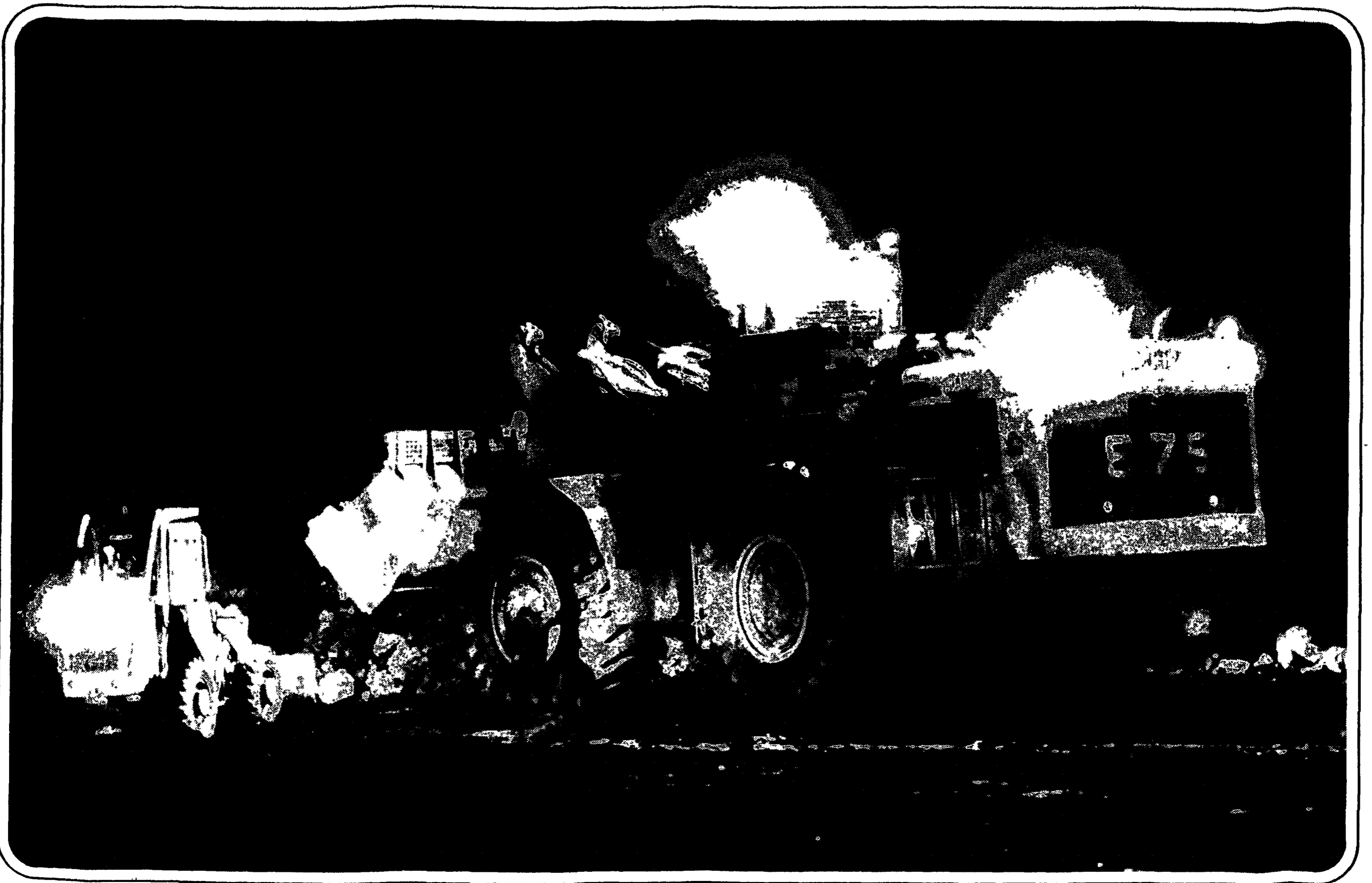

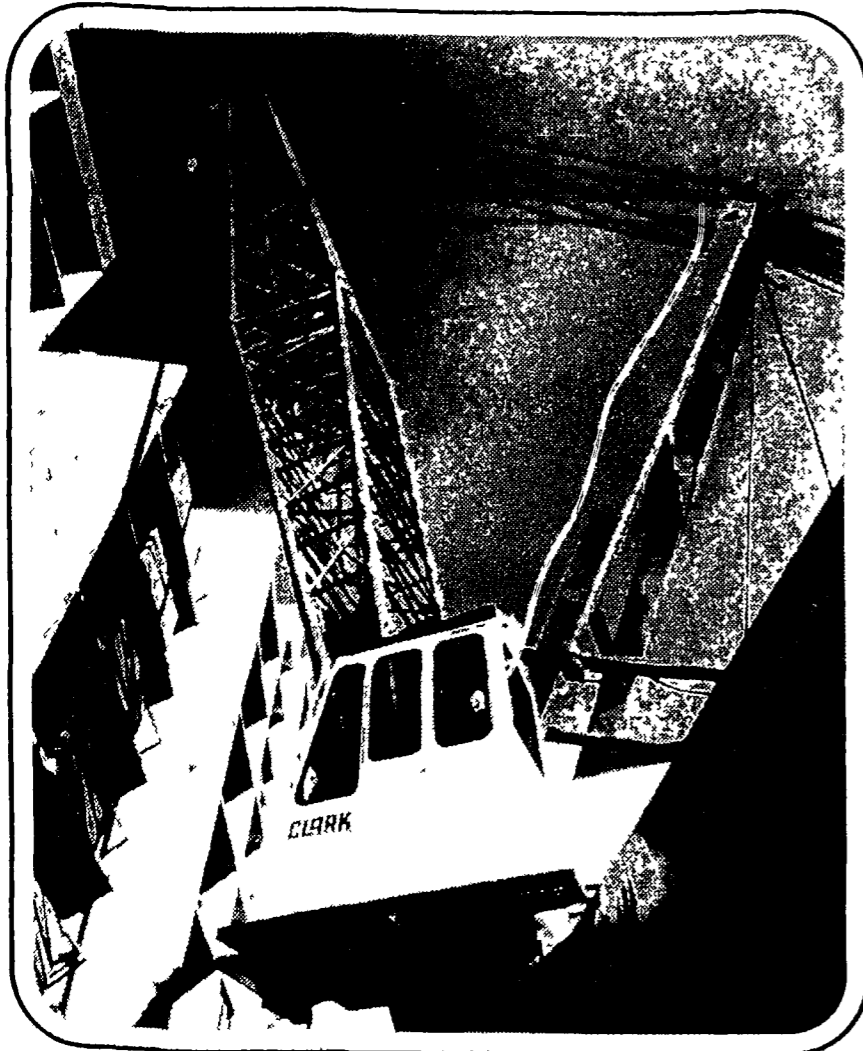

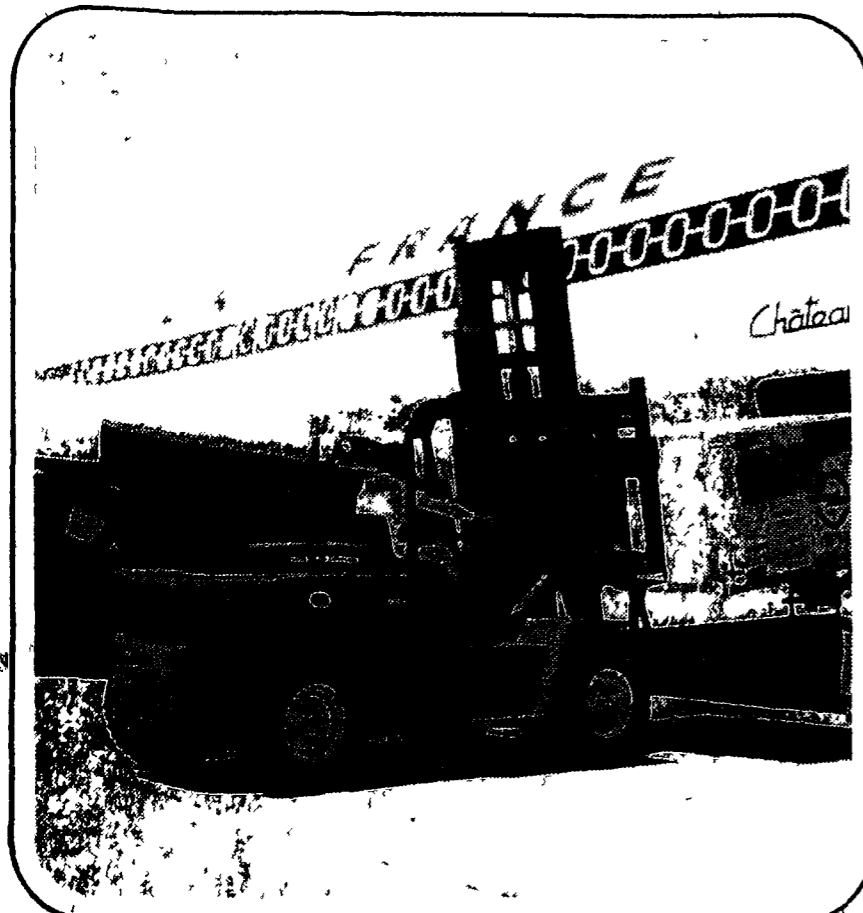

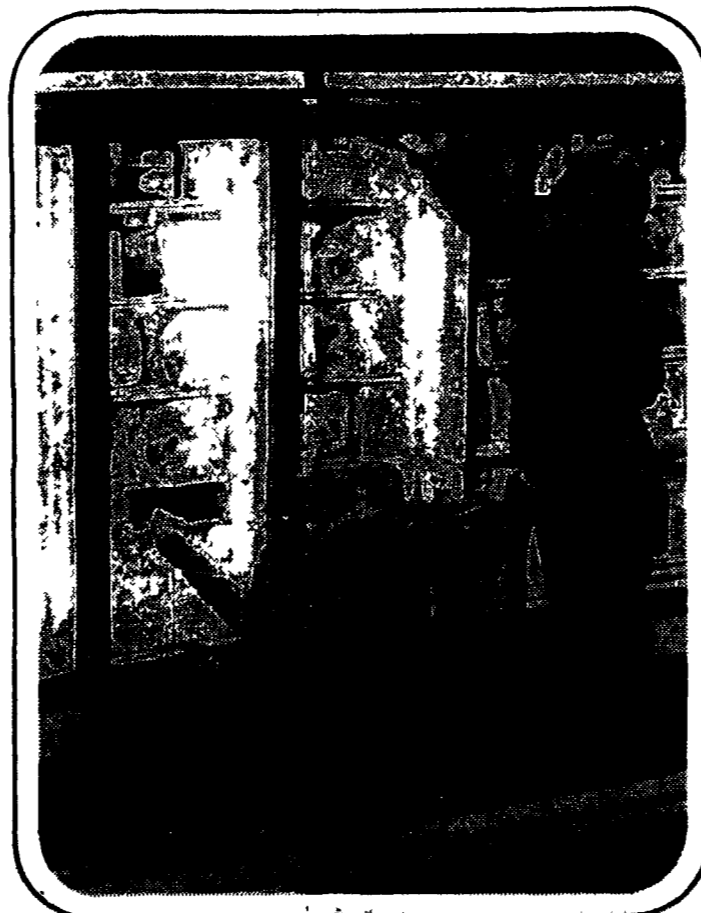
